50 YEARS OF WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS AT FSU



While women's athletics had held a rich tradition in Tallahassee since the early 1900's when Florida State was the Florida State College for Women, the 2018-19 season marks the 50th Anniversary of a continuous women's intercollegiate program at FSU.

Since volleyball took the floor in 1968 as the first-ever women's intercollegiate sport for the Seminoles, FSU has been a national leader in promoting and supporting women's athletics.

Florida State has won seven national championships over the last 50 years. Softball earned back-to-back AIAW (Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women the precursor to the NCAA) national titles in 1984-85 and captured the 2018 NCAA Title just months ago. Golf won the AIAW national title in 1981, and track & field the NCAA National Championship at the 1984 outdoor meet and 1985 indoors. Soccer won the 2014 NCAA National Championship.

1968-73

1989-93

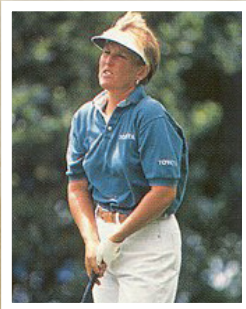

1994-98

- A new era of Florida State athletics began in 1995 with the addition of women's soccer.
- The first female "jersey" retired in FSU track & field history is that of nine-time All-American Kim Batten who set the world record in the 400-meters and won a silver medal in the 1996 Olympics.



- Florida State broke ground on a new soccer/softball complex in the spring of 1998.

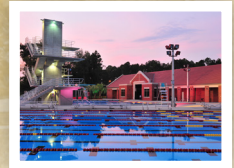

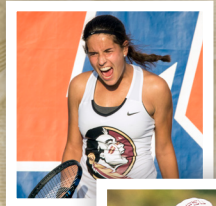

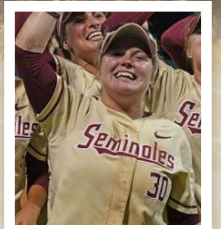

COACHING RESUME: FLORIDA GULF COAST HEAD COACH - 2006-2016, FLORIDA ATLANTIC - 1999-2006**

Neal Studd became the eighth head coach of Florida State swimming and diving on July 20, 2016.

The six-time Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association Coach of the Year brought a wealth of experience to Tallahassee after building Florida Gulf Coast University from scratch into one of the best mid-major programs in the country in his nine years at the helm.

In 2017-18, the Seminoles broke eight school records 14 times throughout the year, earned six ACC swimming medals and three All-America honors.

The men's 200 free relay produced one of the best NCAA finishes in school history, placing seventh behind junior Will Pisani, senior Chad Mylin, senior Joe Plechy and junior Kanoa Kaleoaloha in school record-setting fashion (1:16.13), capturing All-America accolades, which were the first men's honors of his career.

Florida State also won the consolation heat of the 400 free relay behind junior Emir Muratovic, Plechy, Pisani and Kaleoaloha, becoming the first team in school history to break the 2:50 barrier, clocking 2:49.70.

The Seminoles finished the 2018 NCAA Championships in 21st place after being included in every CSCAA poll during the season.

The women's team was led by senior Tayla Lovemore, who captured her second straight All-America honorable mention in the 100 fly behind a 16th place finish at the NCAA Championships after she won ACC bronze. Her classmate Natalie Pierce won her first ACC title in the 100 breast and also secured silver in the 200 breast, setting a new school record at 2:09.05, becoming the fastest breaststroker in FSU history.

Freshman Madeline Cohen took down one of the oldest swimming records in the book, dropping a near eight seconds in the 200 back to take down a mark that was set back in 2010, clocking 1:53.51, qualifying for the NCAA Championships.

FSU was represented in four relays at the NCAA Championships, just two seasons after not fielding any. In addition, freshman Elise Olsen along with Lovemore, Pierce and Cohen competed in individual swimming events. The Noles improved upon two of their school records, establishing new marks in the 200 free relay (1:28.49) and 400 medley relay (3:32.32).

The future also looks bright for the Noles, as Studd secured top recruiting classes including the eighth-ranked women's class according to swimswam.com for the 2018-19 season.

Studd wasted no time in 2016-17, getting to work, helping the FSU men's team improve to a fifth place finish at the ACC Championships, while helping the women score over 100 more points at the meet than a season ago.

The women were highlighted by Pierce, who placed fourth in the 100 breast at the NCAA Championships in school record timing of 58.25

after missing out on an invitation to the meet in 2016. Pierce went on to also place fourth at the World Championship Trials in the 50m breast in the summer of 2017.

Studd also coached Lovemore and Christina Loh to school records and NCAA individual bids in the 100 fly (51.6) and 200 breast (2:10.55) respectively.

Both teams also saw significant improvement in relays as the women's team set new FSU records in 200 free, 200 medley and 400 medley relays.

Chad Mylin won bronze at the ACC Championships in the 50 free before leading the Noles to an All-American honorable mention behind a 11th place finish in the 200 free relay.

Studd has also coached several student-athletes on the international level, including Lovemore and Daniella Van den Berg, who both competed at World Championships during the 2016-17 season. Also, Freshmen Felipe Ribeiro de Souza (Brazil) and Vladimir Stefanik (Slovakia) represented their countries at the 2017 World University Games and Pisani captured a pair of Canadian National titles in both 2017 and 2018.

Studd captured seven CCSA Championships in eight years, guiding the Eagles to a 32-1 conference dual record since the program's 2007-08 inception, when FGCU became a Division I institution.

His program celebrated its finest season in 2014-15, finishing 26th at the NCAA Championships with 37.5 points behind three individual scoring performances and the school's first All-American relay finish. For his efforts, he received Coach of the Meet honorable mention accolades.

Last season the Eagles posted wins over three ACC teams (FSU, Notre Dame, Miami) while 2016 CCSA Swimmer of the Year, Elise Haan, took home three conference titles and earned All-America honorable mention with a 16th place finish in the 100 back.

Studd coached several standouts during his nine seasons, but none were more decorated than Emma Svensson, who finished her career with four NCAA appearances which included a pair All-America honorable mention accolades in the 50 free, finishing 12th at both the 2014 and 2015 Championships. Svensson also captured the Elite 89 honor at the 2013 meet, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest cumulative GPA. She was also selected as the 2015 CCSA Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was nominated for the NCAA Woman of the Year Award.

Among a plethora of honors, Svensson was inducted into the FGCU Hall of Fame following the 2014-15 season.

Kira Toussaint brought home the program's first All-American performance in 2014, finishing seventh in the 100 back at the NCAA Championships and later earned the 2014 CCSA Swimmer

of the Year accolades. She followed her rookie campaign with an eighth-place showing in the 100 back and 12th place finish in the 200 back in 2015.

FGCU established its dominance of the CCSA at the 2009 championships; the first of five consecutive titles. During that stretch, the Eagles captured seven Most Outstanding Swimmers of the Meet and Most Outstanding Freshman honors, in addition to three Swimmer of the Year accolades.

Prior to FGCU, Studd spent eight seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Florida Atlantic. He returned to FAU after spending one year with the Wall Street firm of Morgan Stanley following his graduation in 1998.

Once Studd returned to swimming, he was tasked with working with the sprinters. Under his instruction, the group established the majority of the school records which he had previously held. His group also posted Sun Belt Conference records in addition to several National Independent Conference and Sun Belt titles.

Studd coached St. Lucia at the 2012 Olympic Games as well as the 2011 FINA World Championships. He then moved on to coach Barbados at the 2013 World Championships.

A native of Ipswich, United Kingdom, Studd was the national junior champion, team captain and record-holder in the 200m free. He competed at FAU from 1994-98 where he was the men's team captain and Olympic Trials qualifier.

He graduated from FAU in 1998 with a B.S. in finance before earning his MBA from FAU in 2002. Studd and his wife Leah have two children, Henry and Sophia.

John Proctor enters his fifth season as the head diving coach at Florida State having the highest honor any coach could merit on his resume - coaching an athlete in the Olympic Games.

Proctor, arrived in Tallahassee for the 2014-15 season from Midland, Texas and inherited a talented crop of divers that included Katrina Young. He helped Young to an All-American honor on 1-meter on top of an ACC title. Young captured silver on platform before qualifying for the NCAA Championships. Following her collegiate career, Young remained under Proctor's instruction working strictly on 10-meter events.

At the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials, Young sat in fourth place before jumping to second in the final round in order to qualify for the Olympic Games in Rio, becoming the fourth FSU diver to compete in the games.

In 2018, Proctor's divers collected five medals at the ACC Championships including one gold from senior Blaire Mulka, who won women's 1-meter.

Sophomore Molly Carlson advanced to the NCAA Championships where she earned her second career All-America honorable mention, placing 15th on 3-meter after overcoming an injury to win ACC bronze. Freshman Joshua Davidson won silver on 3-meter and bronze on 1-meter before advancing to his first career NCAA's on both springboards.

Proctor was selected as the 2017 ACC Female Diving Coach of the Year after coaching Carlson to the 2017 ACC Female Diver of the Year. Carlson capped off her historical rookie season with a 13th place finish on platform at the NCAA Championships after being named the 2017 ACC Diving Meet MVP where she won gold on platform and bronze on 1-meter.

In addition to Carlson, freshman Ayla Bonniwell captured the ACC title on 1-meter and moved on to win All-America honorable mention on 1-meter at NCAA's behind a 16th place finish. Carlson and Bonniwell led the women's squad to 193 total points at the ACC Championships, scoring the highest total of any team at the meet.

Senior Dylan Grisell also left his mark in FSU history by becoming the first diver to

capture back-to-back All-America honors on platform and just the seventh to accomplish the feat on any board dating back to 1958 when he placed ninth on platform at 389.00.

During 2015-16, Proctor coached Grisell to a seventh place finish on platform at the 2016 NCAA Championships, becoming the first All-American in the event in school history.

He also coached rookie Cassidy Gebhart to an NCAA bid after she placed fifth on platform at the ACC Championships.

In his first season in a different element, Proctor felt right at home as a collegiate coach.

He led three divers to the NCAA Championships, in addition to Young, he also helped freshman Tyler Roberge capture an honorable mention on 1-meter.

At the ACC Championships, Proctor helped the men's team score 113 points in three events, led by Roberge and Grisell who dove in two championship final heats each.

Young grabbed silver on platform at ACC's and secured a pair of ACC Diver of the Week accolades during the season.

Proctor joined the Seminole staff after serving as the Program Director and Head Diving Coach of City of Midland (COM) Aquatics in Midland, Texas for 15 years (1999-2014). He built a nationally-known program where he had produced over 50 junior national individual champions including four USA Junior All-Starts and has also coached a finalist in every USA Diving National Meet since 2009.

In 2011, COM Aquatics was named a USA Diving Center of Excellence. Since 2008, Proctor has occupied the volunteering position of Coaching Representative on the Board of Directors at USA Diving after previously collaborating on the Committee for Competitive Excellence in 2004.

In 2012, he was invited to join the USA Diving staff at the FINA Grand Prix in Rostock, Germany.

While at the helm of COM Aquatics, Proctor oversaw the development of 225 athletes ranging from beginners to elite level divers in addition to heading the growth of five assistant coaches. Proctor has also been

the heart of fundraising for the club, generating over three-million dollars in athletic scholarship money since 1999 while directing the Dive Parent Booster Club.

During his 15 years in Midland, Proctor had volunteered for other duties that included both Junior (2000-2005) and Senior (2006-2008) Diving Representative roles for the Northwest Texas Diving Association.

Prior to 1999, Proctor was the head coach of the Tucson Diving Team while serving as the diving team manager for the University of Arizona (1997-1999). He previously was the Head Diving Coach at Ballard High School in Louisville, Ky. (1995-1996) after starting his coaching career as an age group instructor at Auburn Diving Club (1992-1993).

Under head coach Neal Studd, Quevedo coaches the middle distance and stroke groups while heading up international recruiting.

Quevedo comes to FSU after serving as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Auburn for three seasons (2013-16) where he played a big part in international recruiting. He worked with all groups, including the professionals who competed in the 2016 Olympic Games where he was a coach for Suriname.

Prior to Auburn, Quevedo coached on the club and high school levels and was the head coach of the National Training Center Aquatics in Clermont, Fla. where he produced senior and junior national swimmers. In addition to NTCA, he coached both the boys and girls teams at the Montverde Academy.

While an athlete at Auburn, Quevedo specialized in fly and free and was a vital part

of bringing home the Tigers second NCAA title in school history in 1999. That season, he was a part of the squad that set the U.S. Open and NCAA Record in the 200 free relay that stood for four years.

Quevedo was also an international competitor for Venezuela, including the 2000

Olympic Games in Sydney in the 100 fly and 400 free relay. He was the national champion in the 50m and 100m fly events in 2000 and is the current masters long-course world record-holder for the 50m fly (24.15), which he set in 2009. He also is a two-time Pan-American Games medalist.

Dan Carrington enters his third season as an assistant coach at Florida State. Carrington comes to FSU after serving as an assistant coach for Miami (Ohio) University for two seasons, following his second stint at Duke.

In his second season under head coach Neal Studd, Carrington primarily coaches the distance group and instructs with a big focus on technique, which includes the use of video feedback and personalization of stroke for each swimmer.

Carrington also serves at the recruiting coordinator.

While at Duke, Carrington helped 12 swimmers achieve All-ACC status from 2011-2014, in addition to qualifying athletes for the NCAA Championships.

Carrington also served as the head coach at Southwestern University from 2009-11 in Georgetown Texas, where he helped produce the first SCAC champion in two seasons and first NCAA automatic qualifier

and All-American in school history.

In 2011, Carrington earned the ASCA Award of Excellence, which is an honor that recognizes those coaches who coach a swimmer to a top-eight finish at one or several USA national championships.

His first stint at Duke came in 2007-08 season, which was his first collegiate job.

In addition, Carrington served as the Site Director and coach at the Durham YMCA, was an assistant and age group coach for Delaware Community Schools and an assistant for Yorktown High School.

Carrington earned his Bachelor of Science Degree from Ball State in 2002. In addition to his coaching experience he served as an Associate at Biogen Idec from 2013-2014 and was a QC Chemist for Eisai from 2011-2013.

Carrington and his wife have two daughters, Grace (10) and Liana (8).





EMMA SVENSSON

Emma Svensson enters her second year as an assistant coach after being promoted from a graduate assistant after earning her masters degree from Florida State in the spring of 2017. She works with all groups, assists with day-to-day operations and recruiting.

Svensson was a Hall of Fame swimmer at Florida Gulf Coast under Studd from 2011-15. She was a four-time NCAA qualifier, scoring the Eagles' first points at the national level behind a 12th place showing in the 50 free in 2014. She matched that performance in 2015, while helping the Eagles qualify for their first ever NCAA championship final, finishing eighth in the 200 free relay.

As a three-time Coastal Collegiate Sports Association and FGCU record holder, Svensson was the two-time (2013,2015) CCSA Women's Most Outstanding Performer of the Meet in addition to the 2013 CCSA Swimmer of the Year. She also helped the Eagles to four-straight CCSA titles.

Academically, she was selected as the NCAA Elite 89 award winner in 2013, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest GPA at the NCAA Championships. Svensson was tabbed as the CCSA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2015 along with the Eagle Scholar-Athlete Award.

A native of Uppsala, Sweden, Svensson graduated from FGCU in 2015 where she majored in business economics and completed her master's degree in the spring of 2017 at Florida State in financial mathematics.

Nick Zorn enters his first year as an assistant coach for the FSU swimming and diving teams after serving two seasons as a volunteer assistant at Alabama.

Zorn helped the Crimson Tide men achieve back-to-back NCAA top 15 finishes while being ranked in the CSCAA Top 25.

While in Tuscaloosa, Zorn spent the 2016-17 season working with the sprinters before moving over to coach the breast-stroke group in 2017-18, which was led by junior Justine MacFarlane who took 16th in the 100 breast at the 2018 NCAA Championships. She also helped Alabama to a 12th place finish in the 200 medley relay.

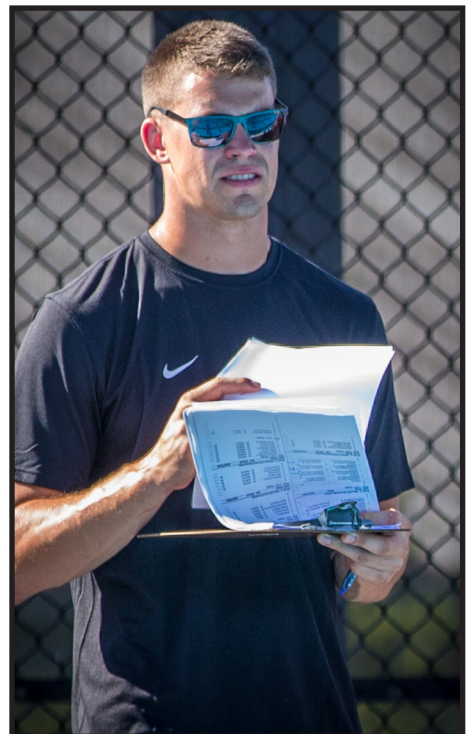
Outside of the pool, Zorn assisted the staff with international recruiting and also led dryland training for the student-athletes during the summer.

Zorn also worked with rising senior Robert Howard over the summer, where he set a new Alabama LCM record in the 100m free at 48.67 at the 2018 Phillips 66 National Championships and he also added an

eighth place finish in the 50m free at 22.17.

The Marietta, Georgia, native got his start in coaching during his senior season at Delta State University by assisting the local club team, Delta Aquatic Club.

Zorn was an All-American at Delta State where he specialized in the free events. He helped lead the Statesmen to five NSISC relay titles during his career and was the individual champion in the 100 free as a senior in 2016.



THE MORCOM AQUATICS CENTER



In 2008 Florida State opened its new \$10.5 million Morcom Aquatic Center. The state-of-the-art facility is located off-campus next to the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course. The main pool features up to 30 practice lanes and maintains a temperature of 80 degrees. FSU uses the same pool that hosted the 2005 FINA World Championships in Montreal, Canada. During those World Championships nine world records were broken. Included in the record breaking performances were American's Aaron Peirsol (200m back), Ian Crocker (100m fly) and Jessica Hardy (100m breast).

The Morcom Aquatics Center, celebrated its anniversary of its 10-year dedication on Sept. 20, 2018.

"We are so grateful to have such a beautiful home like Morcom," FSU head coach Neal Studd said. "It is such a pleasure to come here every day. We are so thankful to Russ and Genie (Morcom) for their support as they've helped this program immensely with their generosity over the past decade."

In addition to serving as the home of the Seminoles for practice and competition, the Morcom Aquatics Center is a staple for local high school practices and meets and is also open to the FSU student community and the public seven days a week.

The facility also holds the Tallahassee Youth Triathlon Series and is also home to Club Seminole and Tomahawk Diving.

The diving well features two one-meter

and two three-meter springboards as well as one, three, five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meter platforms. The platforms are 10 feet wide making them the widest in the nation. The diving pool is kept temperature controlled at 82 degrees and also features a compression bubble used to soften a divers impact during entry while practicing platform dives. Divers will also be able to practice their dives using the dryland equipment which includes two springboards attached to an intricate rope and pulley system, multiple trampolines and four dry boards.

Spacious locker rooms and coaches offices are located in the adjoined 10,000 square-foot building, which house the athletes equipment and coaching staff.

Since the unveiling, Florida State has hosted several prime events. The Morcom Aquatics Center served as host to the 2009 USA Diving Nationals, the 2010 National Zone Diving Championships and the 2010 US Master Championships. It also was the diving training site for the 2009 World Championships, which took place in Rome, Italy.

The Morcom Aquatics Center continued to host events for USA Diving, including the 2013 World Championship Trials and the 2014 U.S. World Cup Synchro Trials, where FSU student-athletes competed with some of the best divers in the world. During these competitions, Katrina Young took advantage of her home pool and earned bid to the 2013 World University Games and the 2014 World Cup while Kelsey Goodman qualified for a FINA Grand Prix in Mexico in 2013.

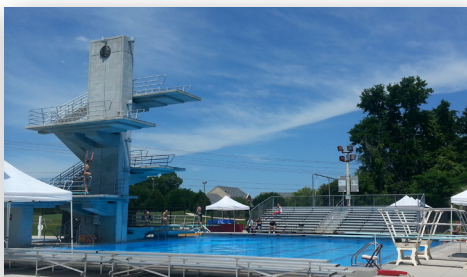
In addition to high profile meets, the facility also serves as an ideal site for training camps. Both the USA and British Diving teams have utilized the diving area multiple times prior to major international meets.

Over the past 10 seasons, the facility has seen several upgrades including a new diving dryland area, starting blocks, lane ropes and flags.

Named after Russ and Genie Morcom, who provided the lead gift to the facility, the Morcom's are avid supporters of FSU athletics. Russ earned a degree from Florida State in engineering and served two terms as chairman of Seminole Boosters. He was also named a Trustee to the FSU Foundation Board and the FSU Alumni Association inducted him into the Circle of Gold.

In 2014, Russ was selected as the Moore-Stone Award winner and was elected in the FSU Hall of Fame.

"We're so pleased with the way the facility turned out and appreciate all the hard work that went into its planning and construction," Morcom said. "For us, it has been a wonderful place to meet our student-athletes, develop friendships with our coaches and attend competitions. We are especially looking forward to this year's active home schedule and hope many FSU fans will come out to see the swimming and diving team in action."

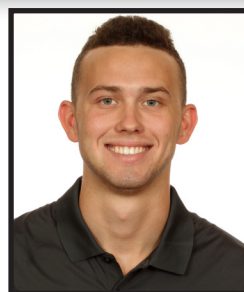

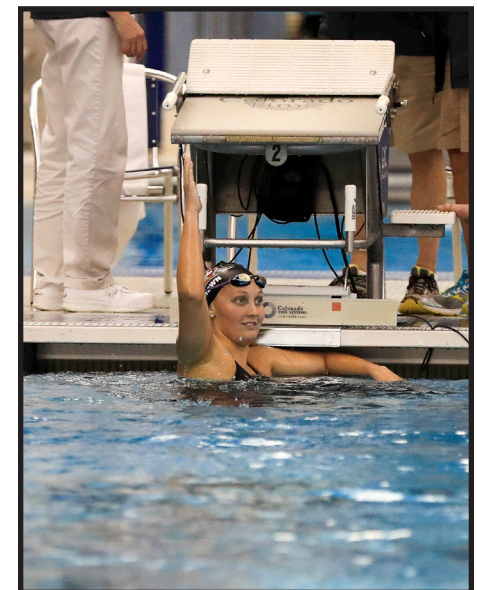

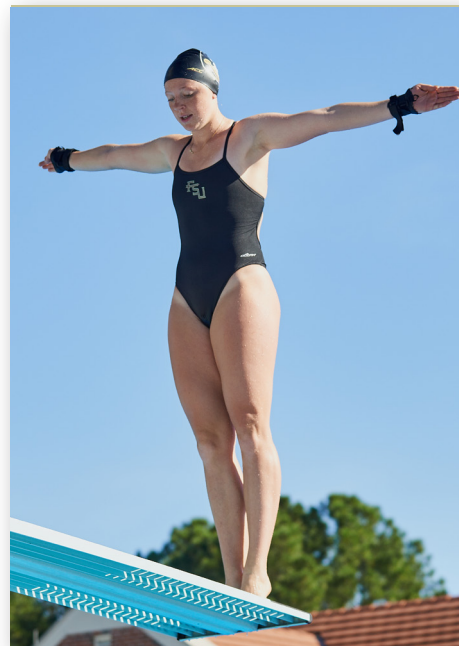
• Studd will call upon Ida Hulkko (Mikkeli, Finland) and Nina Kucheran (Sudbury, Ont.) to take over in all three breast-stroke races. Hulkko established herself as one of the top sprint breaststrokers in Europe after finishing fifth in the 50m breast at the European Championships in Glasgow, UK in August while Kucheran brought home a silver medal at the 2018 Junior Pan Pacific Championship in the 100m breast for Team Canada. Kucheran will also represent her country at the 2018 Youth Olympics in October.

• Local standout Stephanie Holmes (Tallahassee, Fla./Chiles) was a key addition to the distance group, where she will provide a huge boost in the 500 free and 1650 free. She will lead the group along with senior Daniella Van den Berg, who saw a huge time drop in the 1650 free at the ACC Championships where she placed 13th with a time of 16:24.21 and was recognized as the team's most improved swimmer for the 2017-18 season.

• Laura Jensen (Odense, Denmark), is the top 200m free swimmer from Denmark. She helped her country place seventh in the 800m free relay at the European Championships where she split a career best of 2:00.27. Kertu Alnek (Tartu, Estonia) was also very busy at the meet for Estonia, competing in seven events including the 50m fly and 100m and 200m free.

• Boglárka Boncz (Szeged, Hungary) and Texas A&M transfer Dorothy Halmy (Shenendoah, Texas) will also be factors in the fly events, while Lauren Hew (Grand Cayman, Cayman Islands), Madeleine McDonald (Windsor, Ont.) will be top newcomers in both backstroke events.

• The Seminoles return juniors Molly Carlson (Toronto, Ont.) and Ayla Bonniwell (Ithaca, N.Y./Ithaca Senior HS) to lead the team in diving the season. Carlson sat most of 2017-18 out due to injury after winning the ACC Diver of the Year award in 2016, but she quickly recovered to score bronze



on 3-meter at ACC's before securing an All-America honorable mention in the event at the NCAA Championships.

• Head Diving Coach John Proctor added Grace Cable (Windermere, Fla./Florida Virtual) to the group, who is a well-rounded diver with international experience under USA Diving that specializes on platform.

• Florida State returns its top backstroke from the 2017-18 season as Madeline Cohen (Lawrenceville, Ga./Brookwood HS) will look to earn her second-straight NCAA bid. Cohen broke the oldest swimming record in the book after she dropped a near eight seconds in the 200 back to claim the mark at 1:53.51. Cohen was also the backstroke in the 400 medley relay that set a new school record in 2018 at 3:32.32.

• Sophomores Ana Zortea and Emma Terebo will also be key contributors in medley and free relays and in the 100 back. Terebo was a member of the school record-setting 200 free relay at 1:28.49 in 2017 and competed at the NCAA Championships.

• Seniors Shelly Drozda (Thornton, Colo./Mountain Range/Indiana) and Meg Brown (Chelmsford, Mass./Chelmsford

HS) will continue to be a factor for the Seminoles in the IM events along with freshman Hannah Womer (San Jose, Calif./Leland HS). Additionally, Kucheran is expected to be another key addition in both races. Drozda is also one of the top Seminoles in the 500 free and 200 back.

2018-19 OUTLOOK

The Florida State men's swimming and diving team is looking to keep building on their success under third-year head coach Neal Studd after finishing 21st at the 2018 NCAA Championship. With the addition of a recruiting class with top-notch talent and a powerful senior class, the Seminoles are poised to climb the ranks in 2018-19. The Seminoles will be led by senior captain William Pisani (West Palm Beach, Fla./Suncoast HS), who is coming off of one of his best summers of competing where he represented Canada at the 2018 Pan Pacific Championships in Tokyo, Japan. He turned in his personal best time in the 100m fly, finishing 13th at 52.94 and also earned a second swim in the 50m free where he touched in 14th place at 22.51.

Pisani was a part of school history last season, becoming head coach Neal Studd's first to set a men's individual record as he claimed the 100 free at 42.41. Pisani was a part of the All-American 200 free relay that finished seventh at the NCAA Championships and the 400 free relay that won the consolation heat, becoming the first team to break the 3:50 barrier.

Key Notes for 2017-18

• The Seminoles will return three of the four legs from the 400 free relay including Pisani, Emir Muratovic (St. Petersburg, Fla./Ridgewood HS) and Kanoa Kaleoaloha

(Aiea, Hawaii/Kamehameha HS), who are all seniors.

• Muratovic competed at the 2018 European Championships this summer for Bosnia and Herzegovina after setting the national record in 50m free (22.84) and 100m free (50.33).

• Pisani, Muratovic and Kaleoaloha were three of seven swimmers that were under the 20-second barrier in the 50 free in 2017-18 for FSU. The Seminoles Griffin Alaniz (Rockville, Md.) from that group.

• Juniors Rudo Loock (Pretoria, South Africa) and Vladimir Stefanik (Varin, Slovakia) helped the Noles set a new 800 free relay school record last season, breaking a mark that was set back in 2009. Both versatile athletes, Loock and Stefanik will be called upon to contribute individually and in relays throughout the season.

• All three divers returning are major assets on the boards, all of which have competed in finals at the 2018 ACC Championships. FSU will be led by NCAA qualifier and ACC silver medalist Joshua Davidson (Tomball, Texas) for his sophomore season. Junior Aidan Faminoff (Victoria, B.C.) will look to improve on his ACC bronze medal on platform while his classmate Cameron Thatcher (Toledo, Ohio/Liberty HS/Stanford) will look to get back to the NCAA Championships during his junior campaign.

• Other key additions for the Seminoles are Cooper DeRyk (Truckee, Calif./Forest Charter HS), Izaak Bastain (Boca



Raton, Fla.) Jakub Ksiazek (Szczecin, Poland), Max McCusker (Gladstonbury, UK). Bastain will be one of the top breast-strokers on the team after swimming in the finals of the 2018 Central American and Caribbean Games of both the 100m and 200m breast for the Bahamas. Ksiazek, DeRyk and McCusker will all be factors in the free races.

• Junior Max Polianski (Auckland, New Zealand) will look to build on his successful sophomore season where he qualified for the NCAA Championships in the 200 fly at 1:42.44. He earned second swim in all three of his individual events at the ACC Championships, including a seventh place finish in the 200 IM at 1:45.59. He also placed 16th in the 400 IM at 3:51.08. Alaniz will also join Polianski in the 400 IM and is also the top returning 200 back swimmer at 1:43.29.

• In addition to Pisani, senior John Vann (Battle Creek, Mich./Lakeview HS) will serve the season as a team captain.

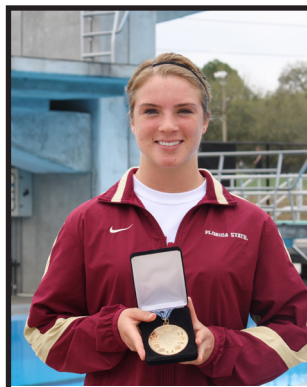

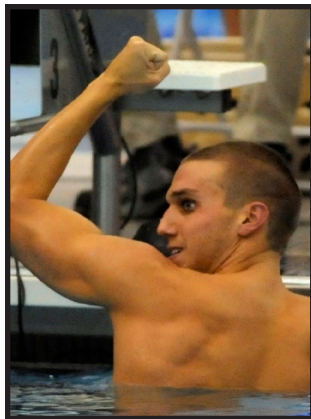

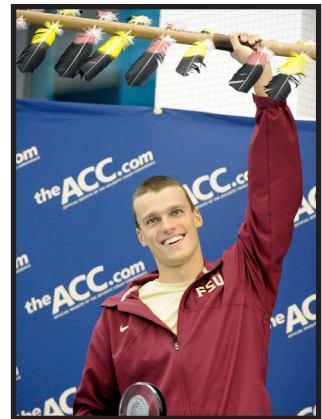

JOHN THRASHER

University President

John Thrasher, a Florida State University alumnus and former state legislator, is the university's 15th president.

Thrasher assumed the presidency on Nov. 10, 2014, after a successful career as a state legislator, businessman, lobbyist and lawyer. As president, Thrasher has focused his efforts on elevating FSU's reputation as a preeminent research institution. He has presided over a \$1 billion fundraising campaign, advanced the university's academic and research mission, championed diversity and inclusion, and welcomed the best and brightest students in the university's history.

Thrasher earned a bachelor's degree in business from Florida State in 1965. After graduating, he joined the U.S. Army where he received the Army Commendation Medal in Germany and was awarded two Bronze Stars for his service in Vietnam. He was honorably discharged as a captain in 1970. Thrasher then returned to his alma mater to earn a law degree with honors in 1972.

After working in private law practice in Daytona Beach and Tallahassee for several years, Thrasher returned to Jacksonville to serve as general counsel of the Florida Medical Association, a position he held for 20 years. He also served as "of counsel" to the Jacksonville law firm of Smith, Hulse & Busey from 1996 to 2008. Thrasher was a partner of Southern Strategy Group, a Tallahassee-based governmental relations firm, from 2001 to 2009.

Thrasher's political career began in 1986 when he was elected to the Clay County School Board where he served as vice chairman, then chairman. He then became a state repre-



sentative in 1992, and he was re-elected without opposition in 1994, 1996 and 1998.

Thrasher was unanimously elected as the speaker of the Florida House of Representatives in 1998. He was elected to the Florida Senate in 2009 and subsequently re-elected. He served as chairman for the Republican Party of Florida in 2010.

From 2001 to 2005, Thrasher was the first chair of Florida State University's Board of Trustees. He was a key supporter of legislation that brought funding to the development of FSU's College of Medicine, and a building at the college is named in his honor.

In 2016, he was inducted into the FSU College of Business Hall of Fame. He currently serves on the College Football Playoff Board of Managers.

Born in Columbia, S.C., Thrasher moved to Florida as a child and grew up in Jacksonville. He and his wife, Jean, have three children and eight grandchildren.

Interim Athletics Director

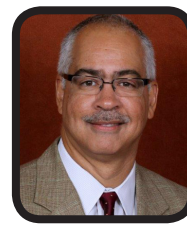
FSU Interim Athletics Director David Coburn brought a wealth of legislative and state budget experience to the university's administration when President Eric Barron hired him in 2012.

Lawton Chiles from 1992-94.

Coburn is a triple Florida State alumnus having earned a bachelor's degree, a master's degree in Urban and Regional Planning, and a Juris Doctorate from the FSU College of Law.

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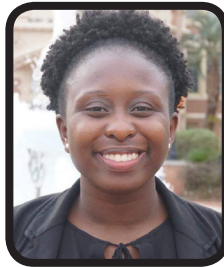

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency. Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 66th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 154 national championships, including 76 in men's competition, 76 in women's and two in men's and women's fencing. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 180 times in men's competition and 137 times in women's action.

The ACC is one of two conferences to have won two football national championships over the past five years. Florida State captured the final BCS National Championship in 2013, while Clemson claimed the College Football Playoff national championship in 2016. The ACC has had a team in the championship game in three of the last five years. Clemson's championship game victory in 2016 marked the seventh national title by an ACC school since the league's inception in 1953, and the 14th by a current league school.

Miami leads the way with five national titles, followed by Florida State (3), Clemson (2), Pitt (2), Georgia Tech (1) and Syracuse (1).

A year ago, the ACC secured 10 spots in the 2017 postseason bowl lineup - the most of any conference. Over the last two years, the ACC has had a nation's best 21 teams in bowl games. At least six ACC teams have made a bowl game appearance in 17 consecutive seasons.

In 2016, the ACC won nine bowl games, tying the existing NCAA record set in 2005 by the SEC. Prior to 2016, the ACC record for bowl wins in a season was five. In addition, over the past five years the ACC is second among all conferences with 54 bowl appearances, has the second-best record of any conference in BCS, New Year's Six and CFP games, and is tied for the most national championships (Florida State in 2013, Clemson in 2016).

ACC teams posted an NCAA-best 51-17 record (.750) against nonconference opponents in 2016, including a 17-9 mark (.654) against teams from the Power 5 conferences. The 51 wins were the most in league history and surpassed the previous high of 46 attained in 2013 and 2014. Nine ACC teams finished 2017 with winning records, including six teams with eight or more wins.

In 2017, a pair of ACC schools - Florida State and Virginia Tech - continued the two longest current Division I bowl streaks in the nation. FSU appeared in a bowl game for the 36th-straight year, beating Southern Miss in the Walk-On's Independence Bowl on Dec. 27. Virginia Tech, which has the longest streak recognized by the NCAA, played in its 25th-straight bowl in the Camping World Bowl on Dec. 28.

Thirteen of 14 ACC teams have earned an invitation to a postseason bowl game over the last two seasons. Over the last four years, every ACC team has enjoyed a trip to a bowl game and the league has made 43 postseason appearances.

The ACC has seven of the top 25 active coaches nationally in career victories - all of them with 100 or more - which is by far the most of any conference. The next closest league has four coaches in the top 25. Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson is in fourth place with 182 wins. He is followed by Miami's Mark Richt, who is eighth with 164 wins, Louisville's Bobby Petrino is 17th with 116, Wake Forest's Dave Clawson is tied for 19th with 111, Virginia's Bronco Mendenhall is 21st with 107, Duke's David Cutcliffe is 22nd with 103 and Clemson's Dabo Swinney is 23rd with 101.

The ACC continues to make its mark in the annual NFL Draft as the league had 45 players selected in this year's draft - the second-highest total by any conference, and the third-highest total in league history. That total also makes the ACC one of two leagues in the nation to have had at least 40 draftees in four of the last five years. In all, during that time the ACC has had 203 players drafted, the second-highest total of any league. NC State led all ACC schools with seven selections, a school record for the draft for the Wolfpack, topping a total of six draftees in 2006. Florida State and Miami each had six draftees, with Virginia Tech having a total of five. Louisville had four players chosen, followed by Boston College, Clemson, North Carolina and Pitt with three each, Virginia



and Wake Forest with two apiece and Syracuse with one player drafted

NC State DE Bradley Chubb was named the winner of the 2017 Bronko Nargurski Trophy, given annually by the FWAA to the nation's defensive player of the year. Chubb became the fourth ACC player in eight years to win the Trophy, joining Da'Quan Bowers of Clemson (2010), Luke Kuechly of Boston College (2011) and Aaron Donald of Pitt (2014). He is also the eighth player from a current ACC school to win the honor. Louisville quarterback Lamar Jackson finished third in the Heisman Trophy vote behind winning quarterback Baker Mayfield of Oklahoma and running back Bryce Love of Stanford. Jackson became only the second ACC player to be voted in the top three in two different years. Clemson's Deshaun Watson finished third in 2015 and was runner-up to Jackson in 2016.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 27 sports during the 2018-19 academic year - 14 for women and 13 for men. The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954.

The 13 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, with volleyball deciding its champion by regular-season play.

2017-18 Year in Review

The 2017-18 academic year saw four ACC teams capture four NCAA team titles. In all, the ACC has won 85 national team titles over the last 20 years and has won two or more NCAA titles in 35 of the past 37 years.

Academically, the member institutions of the ACC again led the way among Power 5 conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report.

ACC History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws. The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline. Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.
