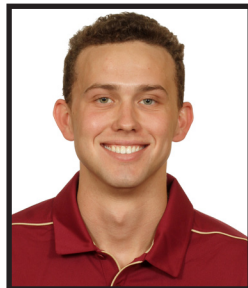

COACHING RESUME: FLORIDA GULF COAST HEAD COACH - 2006-2016, FLORIDA ATLANTIC - 1999-2006

Neal Studd became the eighth head coach of Florida State swimming and diving on July 20, 2016.

The six-time Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association Coach of the Year brought a wealth of experience to Tallahassee after building Florida Gulf Coast University from scratch into one of the best mid-major programs in the country in his nine years at the helm.

In his third season at the helm, the Seminoles broke nine records 11 times, captured four All-American performances, three honorable mentions, four ACC event titles, two ACC silvers and three bronze medal performances.

Studd helped the men's team to its best season under his tutelage, finishing 14th at the 2019 NCAA Championships, tying the sixth highest performance in school history.

The Seminoles took home three All-American relay finishes from the meet for the first time since 1998. The team of senior Will Pisani, freshman Jakub Ksiazek, seniors Emir Muratovic and Kanoa Kaleoaloha finished fifth in both the 200 free and 400 free relays at NAAs, marking the highest finish at the meet in school history.

Both swims also established new school records and took home ACC gold and silver respectively.

Muratovic, freshman Izaak Bastian, Kaleoaloha and Pisani placed seventh in the 200 medley relay at NAAs and also took bronze at ACCs in school record-timing.

Individually, Kaleoaloha captured two ACC gold medals, winning the 100 fly in school record-timing of 44.93 before taking the 100 free at 42.34.

Pisani brought home FSU's 10th ACC title in the 50 free, clocking 19.21 and followed that performance with an 11th place finish in the event at NAAs after posting his personal best at 19.12. Studd then coached Pisani to qualify for the 2019 FINA World Championships for Team Canada by placing third in the 100m free.

The women's team highlighted its season with an 11-1, 3-0 ACC record, which tied the best showing in school history. The Seminoles picked up a pair of ranked wins on the road, first defeating No. 13 Minnesota before downing No. 23 Alabama.

A pair of freshmen breaststrokes carried the Seminoles at the conference and national level, led by Ida Hulkko who finished fifth in the 100 breast at the NCAA Championship with the second fastest time in school history at 58.58 after taking bronze at ACCs. Nina Kucheran also earned a trip to the NCAA Championships and took silver in the 200 breast in school record timing of 2:08.78.

Outside of the pool, the women's team won its sixth-straight CSCAA Scholar All-America status and also captured its second Director's Cup for Service Award, which is given to the FSU team that averages the most community service hours.

Studd has also built up a presence of Seminoles competing at international meet as seven swimmers competed at the 2019 FINA World Championships and five swam at the 2019 World University Games with Tayla Lovemore winning gold in the 50m and 100m fly and Kucheran earning bronze in the 4x100 medley relay for Team Canada.

In 2017-18, the Seminoles broke eight school records 14 times throughout the year, earned six ACC swimming medals and three All-America honors.

The men's 200 free relay produced one of the best NCAA finishes in school history, placing seventh behind junior Will Pisani, senior Chad Mylin, senior Joe Plechy and junior Kanoa Kaleoaloha in school record-setting fashion (1:16.13), capturing All-America accolades, which were the first men's honors of his career.

Florida State also won the consolation heat of the 400 free relay behind junior Emir Muratovic, Plechy, Pisani and Kaleoaloha, becoming the first team in school history to break the 2:50 barrier, clocking 2:49.70.

The Seminoles finished the 2018 NCAA Championships in 21st place after being included in every CSCAA poll during the season.

The women's team was led by senior Tayla Lovemore, who captured her second straight All-America honorable mention in the 100 fly behind a 16th place finish at the NCAA Championships after she won ACC bronze. Her classmate Natalie Pierce won her first ACC title in the 100 breast and also secured silver in the 200 breast, setting a new school record at 2:09.05, becoming the fastest breaststroker in FSU history.

Freshman Madeline Cohen took down one of the oldest swimming records in the book, dropping a near eight seconds in the 200 back to take down a mark that was set back in 2010, clocking 1:53.51, qualifying for the NCAA Championships.

FSU was represented in four relays at the NCAA Championships, just two seasons after not fielding any. In addition, freshman Elise Olsen along with Lovemore, Pierce and Cohen competed in individual swimming events. The Noles improved upon two of their school records, establishing new marks in the 200 free relay (1:28.49) and 400 medley relay (3:32.32).

The future also looks bright for the Noles, as Studd secured top recruiting classes including the eighth-ranked women's class according to swimswam.com for the 2018-19 season.

Studd wasted no time in 2016-17, getting to work, helping the FSU men's team improve to a fifth place finish at the ACC Championships, while helping the women score over 100 more points at the meet than a season ago.

The women were highlighted by Pierce, who placed fourth in the 100 breast at the NCAA Championships in school record timing of 58.25 after missing out on an invitation to the meet in 2016. Pierce went on to also place fourth at the World Championship Trials in the 50m breast in the summer of 2017.

Studd also coached Lovemore and Christina Loh to school records and NCAA individual bids in the 100 fly (51.6) and 200 breast (2:10.55) respectively.

Both teams also saw significant improvement in relays as the women's team set new FSU records in 200 free, 200 medley and 400 medley relays.

Chad Mylin won bronze at the ACC Championships in the 50 free before leading the Noles to an All-American honorable mention behind a 11th place finish in the 200 free relay.

Studd has also coached several student-athletes on the international level, including Lovemore and Daniella Van den Berg, who both competed at World Championships during the 2016-17 season. Also, Freshmen Felipe Ribeiro de Souza (Brazil) and Vladimir Stefanik (Slovakia) represented their countries at the 2017 World University Games and Pisani captured a pair of Canadian National titles in both 2017 and 2018.

Studd captured seven CCSA Championships in eight years, guiding the Eagles to a 32-1 conference dual record since the program's 2007-08 inception, when FGCU became a Division I institution.

His program celebrated its finest season in 2014-15, finishing 26th at the NCAA Championships with 37.5 points behind three individual scoring performances and the school's first All-American relay finish. For his efforts, he received Coach of the Meet honorable mention accolades.

Last season the Eagles posted wins over three ACC teams (FSU, Notre Dame, Miami) while 2016 CCSA Swimmer of the Year, Elise Haan, took home three conference titles and earned All-America honorable mention with a 16th place finish in the 100 back.

Studd coached several standouts during his nine seasons, but none were more decorated than Emma Svensson, who finished her career with four NCAA appearances which included a pair All-America honorable mention accolades in the 50 free, finishing 12th at both the 2014 and 2015 Championships. Svensson also captured the Elite 89 honor at the 2013 meet, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest cumulative GPA. She was also selected as the 2015 CCSA Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was nominated for the NCAA Woman of the Year Award.

Among a plethora of honors, Svensson was inducted into the FGCU Hall of Fame following the 2014-15 season.

Kira Toussaint brought home the program's first All-American performance in 2014, finishing seventh in the 100 back at the NCAA Championships and later earned the 2014 CCSA Swimmer of the Year accolades. She followed her rookie campaign with an eighth-place showing in the 100 back and 12th place finish in the 200 back in 2015.

FGCU established its dominance of the CCSA at the 2009 championships; the first of five consecutive titles. During that stretch, the Eagles captured seven Most Outstanding Swimmers of the Meet and Most Outstanding Freshman honors, in addition to three Swimmer of the Year accolades.

Prior to FGCU, Studd spent eight seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Florida Atlantic. He returned to FAU after spending one year with the Wall Street firm of Morgan Stanley following his graduation in 1998.

Once Studd returned to swimming, he was tasked with working with the sprinters. Under his instruction, the group established the majority of the school records which he had previously held. His group also posted Sun Belt Conference records in addition to several National Independent Conference and Sun Belt titles.

Studd coached St. Lucia at the 2012 Olympic Games as well as the 2011 FINA World Championships. He then moved on to coach Barbados at the 2013 World Championships.

A native of Ipswich, United Kingdom, Studd was the national junior champion, team captain and record-holder in the 200m free. He competed at FAU from 1994-98 where he was the men's team captain and Olympic Trials qualifier.

He graduated from FAU in 1998 with a B.S. in finance before earning his MBA from FAU in 2002. Studd and his wife Leah have two children, Henry and Sophia.





JOHN PROCTOR

John Proctor enters his sixth season as the head diving coach at Florida State having the highest honor any coach could merit on his resume - coaching an athlete in the Olympic Games.

Proctor, arrived in Tallahassee for the 2014-15 season from Midland, Texas inheriting a talented crop of divers that included Katrina Young. He helped Young to an All-American honor on 1-meter on top of an ACC title. Young captured silver on platform before qualifying for the NCAA Championships. Following her collegiate career, Young remained under Proctor's instruction working strictly on 10-meter events.

At the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials, Young sat in fourth place before jumping to second in the final round in order to qualify for the Olympic Games in Rio, becoming the fourth FSU diver to compete in the games. In the summer of 2019, Young brought home two bronze medals from the FINA World Championships, finishing third in the 10-meter synchro and the mixed team event.

Four of Proctor's divers advanced to the 2019 NCAA Championships, with sophomore Joshua Davidson taking 14th on 1-meter, earning All-America honorable mention. Davidson also won silver on 1-meter at ACCs and bronze on 3-meter. His four career ACC medals are the most since Terry Horner captured seven in his career.

Junior Molly Carlson brought home her second-career ACC Diving Meet MVP after scoring the most individual points at the meet. She won bronze on 3-meter, finished fourth on platform and placed ninth on 1-meter.

In 2018, Proctor's divers collected five medals at the ACC Championships including one gold from senior Blaire Mulka, who won women's 1-meter. Carlson advanced to the NCAA Championships where she earned her second career All-America honorable mention, placing 15th on 3-meter after overcoming an injury to win ACC bronze. Davidson won silver on 3-meter and bronze on 1-meter before advancing to his first career NCAA's on both springboards.

Proctor was selected as the 2017 ACC Female Diving Coach of the Year after coaching Carlson to the 2017 ACC Female Diver of the Year. Carlson capped off her historical rookie season with a 13th place finish on platform at the NCAA Championships after being named the 2017 ACC Diving Meet MVP where she won gold on platform and bronze on 1-meter.

In addition to Carlson, freshman Ayla Bonniwell

captured the ACC title on 1-meter and moved on to win All-America honorable mention on 1-meter at NCAA's behind a 16th place finish.

Carlson and Bonniwell led the women's squad to 193 total points at the ACC Championships, scoring the highest total of any team at the meet.

Senior Dylan Grisell also left his mark in FSU history by becoming the first diver to capture back-to-back All-America honors on platform and just the seventh to accomplish the feat on any board dating back to 1958 when he placed ninth on platform at 389.00.

During 2015-16, Proctor coached Grisell to a seventh place finish on platform at the 2016 NCAA Championships, becoming the first All-American in the event in school history.

He also coached rookie Cassidy Gebhart to an NCAA bid after she placed fifth on platform at the ACC Championships.

In his first season in a different element, Proctor felt right at home as a collegiate coach.

He led three divers to the NCAA Championships, in addition to Young, he also helped freshman Tyler Roberge capture an honorable mention on 1-meter.

At the ACC Championships, Proctor helped the men's team score 113 points in three events, led by Roberge and Grisell who dove in two championship final heats each.

Young grabbed silver on platform at ACC's and secured a pair of ACC Diver of the Week accolades during the season.

Proctor joined the Seminole staff after serving as the Program Director and Head Diving Coach of City of Midland (COM) Aquatics in Midland, Texas for 15 years (1999-2014). He built a nationally-known program where he has produced over 50 junior national individual champions including four USA Junior All-Starts and has also coached a finalist in every USA Diving National Meet since 2009.

In 2011, COM Aquatics was named a USA Diving Center of Excellence.

Since 2008, Proctor has occupied the volunteering position of Coaching Representative on the Board of Directors at USA Diving after previously collaborating on the Committee for Competitive Excellence in 2004.

In 2012, he was invited to join the USA Diving staff at the FINA Grand Prix in Rostock, Germany.

While at the helm of COM Aquatics, Proctor oversaw the development of 225 athletes ranging from beginners to elite level divers in addition to heading the growth of five assistant coaches. Proctor has also been the heart of fundraising for the club, generating over three-million dollars in athletic scholarship money since 1999 while directing the Dive Parent Booster Club.

During his 15 years in Midland, Proctor has volunteered for other duties that included both Junior (2000-2005) and Senior (2006-2008) Diving Representative roles for the Northwest Texas Diving Association.

Prior to 1999, Proctor was the head coach of the Tucson Diving Team while serving as the diving team manager for the University of Arizona (1997-1999). He previously was the Head Diving Coach at Ballard High School in Louisville, Ky. (1995-1996) after starting his coaching career as an age group instructor at Auburn Diving Club (1992-1993).





DAN KESLER

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH • FIRST YEAR • WINGATE '05

COACHING RESUME: ASSISTANT COACH - ARIZONA STATE (2012-19), ASSISTANT COACH - WINGATE (2007-2012)

Dan Kesler is in his first season as the associate head coach at Florida State.

Kesler brings a wealth of experience to Tallahassee, including seven seasons at Arizona State where he worked with the distance and middle distance groups while serving as the recruiting coordinator. Kesler spent his final four years working under FSU alum Bob Bowman - who is best known for coaching the most decorated Olympian of all-time, Michael Phelps.

In 2018-19, Kesler's distance swimmers were a part of six of Arizona State's seven scoring swims at the Women's NCAA Championships, where the team finished 20th.

Cierra Runge secured a pair of individual All-American swims, finishing fourth in the 500 free at 4:35.39 before placing eighth in the 1650 free at 15:53.72. Runge also earned honorable mention behind an 11th-place finish in the 200 free (1:43.76). In her first season at ASU, Runge set new school records in the 200 free (1:43.46), 500 free (4:34.64), 1000 free (9:35.26), 1650 free (15:51.72) and as a part of the 400 and 800 free relays.

Emma Nordin also followed Runge with an honorable mention 1650 free, finishing ninth at NCAAs and both swimmers were a part of the 400 and 800 free relays that placed 14th and 12th respectively.

Prior to ASU, Kesler spent five years as the top assistant swimming coach at Wingate University overseeing the mid-distance

and distance swimmers. Kesler served on the Division II top 25 poll selection committee for the 2011-2012 season.

With Kesler at the helm, the Wingate men's team captured Bluegrass Mountain Conference championship titles in each of his five years and posted four top-six finishes at the NCAA Division II national championship meets.

Iaroslav Denysenko was voted the 2012 NCAA Division II Swimmer of the Meet after winning three national titles in the 500, the 1000 and the 1650 free and finishing as the runner-up in the 200 free. Denysenko broke a 10-year-old NCAA Division II championship record in the 500 Free.

All 19 records on both men's and women's teams were broken during his tenure at Wingate.

Following a stellar high school career, Kesler was a key member of the North Carolina State University Wolfpack swimming team. As a junior, he served as a team captain and was an ACC finalist in the distance events. He was also a 2000 Olympic Trials qualifier while representing Green Terror Aquatic Club.

A native of Westminster, Maryland, Kesler was a member of the NC State swim team from 2000-03. Swimming runs in the Kesler family as his brother Rob, is also a swim coach for the North Baltimore Aquatic Club and is the head coach at South Carroll Swim Club.



DAN CARRINGTON

Dan Carrington enters his fourth season as an assistant coach at Florida State.

Carrington comes to FSU after serving as an assistant coach for Miami (Ohio) University for two seasons, following his second stint at Duke.

In his second season under head coach Neal Studd, Carrington primarily coaches the distance group and instructs with a big focus on technique, which includes the use of video feedback and personalization of stroke for each swimmer.

Carrington also serves at the recruiting coordinator.

While at Duke, Carrington helped 12 swimmers achieve All-ACC status from 2011-2014, in addition to qualifying athletes for the NCAA Championships.

Carrington also served as the head coach at Southwestern University from 2009-11 in Georgetown Texas, where he helped produce the first SCAC champion in two seasons and first NCAA automatic qualifier and All-American in school history.

In 2011, Carrington earned the ASCA Award of Excellence, which is an honor that recognizes those coaches who

coach a swimmer to a top-eight finish at one or several USA national championships.

His first stint at Duke came in 2007-08 season, which was his first collegiate job.

In addition, Carrington served as the Site Director and coach at the Durham YMCA, was an assistant and age group coach for Delaware Community Schools and an assistant for Yorktown High School.

Carrington earned his Bachelor of Science Degree from Ball State in 2002. In addition to his coaching experience he served as an Associate at Biogen Idec from 2013-2014 and was a QC Chemist for Eisai from 2011-2013.

Carrington and his wife have two daughters, Grace (11) and Liana (9).





EMMA SVENSSON

ASSISTANT SWIMMING COACH · THIRD YEAR · FGCU '15

Emma Svensson enters her third year as an assistant coach after being promoted from a graduate assistant after earning her masters degree from Florida State in the spring of 2017. She works with all groups, assists with day-to-day operations and recruiting.

Svensson was a Hall of Fame swimmer at Florida Gulf Coast under Studd from 2011-15. She was a four-time NCAA qualifier, scoring the Eagles' first points at the national level behind a 12th place showing in the 50 free in 2014. She matched that performance in 2015, while helping the Eagles qualify for their first ever NCAA championship final, finishing eighth in the 200 free relay.

As a three-time Coastal Collegiate Sports Association and FGCU record holder, Svensson was the two-time (2013,2015) CCSA Women's Most Outstanding Performer of the Meet in addition to the 2013 CCSA Swimmer of the Year. She also helped the Eagles to four-straight CCSA titles.

Academically, she was selected as the NCAA Elite 89 award winner in 2013, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest GPA at the NCAA Championships. Svensson was tabbed as the CCSA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2015 along with the Eagle Scholar-Athlete Award.

A native of Uppsala, Sweden, Svensson graduated from FGCU in 2015 where she majored in business economics and completed her master's degree in the spring of 2017 at Florida State in financial mathematics.



NICK ZORN

ASSISTANT SWIMMING COACH · SECOND YEAR · DELTA STATE '16

COACHING RESUME : ALABAMA (VOLUNTEER) 2016-18, DELTA AQUATIC CLUB - 2015-16

Nick Zorn enters his second year as an assistant coach for the FSU swimming and diving teams after serving two seasons as a volunteer assistant at Alabama.

Zorn helped the Crimson Tide men achieve back-to-back NCAA top 15 finishes while being ranked in the CSCAA Top 25.

While in Tuscaloosa, Zorn spent the 2016-17 season working with the sprinters before moving over to coach the breast-stroke group in 2017-18, which was led by junior Justine MacFarlane who took 16th in the 100 breast at the 2018 NCAA Championships. She also helped Alabama to a 12th place finish in the 200 medley relay.

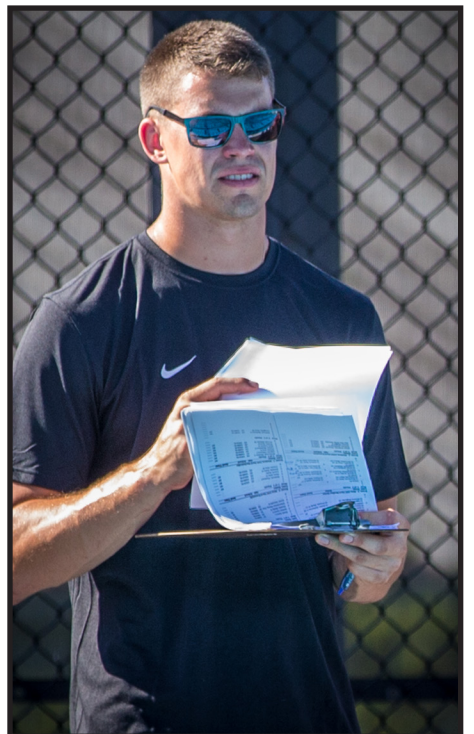
Outside of the pool, Zorn assisted the staff with international recruiting and also led dryland training for the student-athletes during the summer.

Zorn also worked with rising senior Robert Howard over the summer, where he set a new Alabama LCM record in the 100m free at 48.67 at the 2018 Phillips 66 National Championships and he also added an

eighth place finish in the 50m free at 22.17.

The Marietta, Georgia, native got his start in coaching during his senior season at Delta State University by assisting the local club team, Delta Aquatic Club.

Zorn was an All-American at Delta State where he specialized in the free events. He helped lead the Statesmen to five NSISC relay titles during his career and was the individual champion in the 100 free as a senior in 2016.





MORCOM AQUATICS CENTER



In 2008 Florida State opened its new \$10.5 million Morcom Aquatic Center. The state-of-the-art facility is located off-campus next to the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course. The main pool features up to 30 practice lanes and maintains a temperature of 80 degrees. FSU uses the same pool that hosted the 2005 FINA World Championships in Montreal, Canada. During those World Championships nine world records were broken. Included in the record breaking performances were American's Aaron Peirsol (200m back), Ian Crocker (100m fly) and Jessica Hardy (100m breast).

The Morcom Aquatics Center, celebrated its anniversary of its 10-year dedication on Sept. 20, 2018.

"We are so grateful to have such a beautiful home like Morcom," FSU head coach Neal Studd said. "It is such a pleasure to come here every day. We are so thankful to Russ and Genie (Morcom) for their support as they've helped this program immensely with their generosity over the past decade."

In addition to serving as the home of the Seminoles for practice and competition, the Morcom Aquatics Center is a staple for local high school practices and meets and is also open to the FSU student community and the public seven days a week.

The facility also holds the Tallahassee Youth Triathlon Series and is also home to Club Seminole and Tomahawk Diving.

The diving well features two one-meter and two three-meter springboards as well as one, three,

five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meter platforms. The platforms are 10 feet wide making them the widest in the nation. The diving pool is kept temperature controlled at 82 degrees and also features a compression bubble used to soften a divers impact during entry while practicing platform dives. Divers will also be able to practice their dives using the dryland equipment which includes two springboards attached to an intricate rope and pulley system, multiple trampolines and four dry boards.

Spacious locker rooms and coaches offices are located in the adjoined 10,000 square-foot building, which house the athletes equipment and coaching staff.

Since the unveiling, Florida State has hosted several prime events. The Morcom Aquatics Center served as host to the 2009 USA Diving Nationals, the 2010 National Zone Diving Championships and the 2010 US Master Championships. It also was the diving training site for the 2009 World Championships, which took place in Rome, Italy.

The Morcom Aquatics Center continued to host events for USA Diving, including the 2013 World Championship Trials and the 2014 U.S. World Cup Synchro Trials, where FSU student-athletes competed with some of the best divers in the world. During these competitions, Katrina Young took advantage of her home pool and earned bid to the 2013 World University Games and the 2014 World Cup while Kelsey Goodman qualified for a FINA Grand Prix in Mexico in 2013. In addition to high profile meets, the facility also

serves as an ideal site for training camps. Both the USA and British Diving teams have utilized the diving area multiple times prior to major international meets.

Over the past 10 seasons, the facility has seen several upgrades including a new diving dryland area, starting blocks, lane ropes and flags.

Named after Russ and Genie Morcom, who provided the lead gift to the facility, the Morcom's are avid supporters of FSU athletics. Russ earned a degree from Florida State in engineering and served two terms as chairman of Seminole Boosters. He was also named a Trustee to the FSU Foundation Board and the FSU Alumni Association inducted him into the Circle of Gold.

In 2014, Russ was selected as the Moore-Stone Award winner and was elected in the FSU Hall of Fame.

"We're so pleased with the way the facility turned out and appreciate all the hard work that went into its planning and construction," Morcom said. "For us, it has been a wonderful place to meet our student-athletes, develop friendships with our coaches and attend competitions. We are especially looking forward to this year's active home schedule and hope many FSU fans will come out to see the swimming and diving team in action."

Noting the Olympics

- Florida State has had at least one representative in every Olympics since the 1996 Games in Atlanta.
- The 2000 Olympics had six Seminoles (Brendon Dedekind, Brett Peterson, Tal Stricker, Julio Santos, Stephen Parry, Wickus Neinaber) competing, which is the most in school history. 1996 had five (Keam Ang, Nelson Mora, Rob Brankis, Dedekind). 2004 and 2008 had four each.
- Phil Boggs (gold) and Stephen Parry (bronze) won FSU's only Olympic medals.
- Santos and Pavel Sankovich were both three-time Olympians, which are the most of any Seminole.



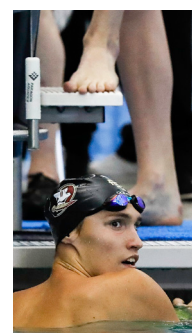

NOLES MAKE HISTORY AT 2019 FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



- Former Florida State standout diver Katrina Young made history this week at the 2019 FINA World Championships by winning two bronze medals for Team USA.

Young first teamed up with Samantha Bromberg in the women's 10-meter synchro event to win bronze with a score of 304.86 behind Malaysia (312.72) and China (345.24).

The Americans qualified for the final in fourth place (295.38) behind China (317.82), Canada (298.11) and Malaysia (297.18). In finals the race to the podium was tight as Young and Bromberg sat in fourth heading into their last dive, just 5.91 out of third. The duo scored 69.12 on a back 2 ½ with 1 ½ twists - just enough to overtake the Canadians, who scored 62.40 on an inward 3 ½ tuck.

Bromberg and Young put together a solid list that also included a front 3 ½ pike that earned 71.10 points and an inward 3 ½ tuck that scored 71.04 points.

"We felt like we dove solid. We have things to work on, but we were really happy with our focus throughout the competition," Young said. "I was nervous, but I tried to focus the best I could."

The bronze medal in women's 10-meter synchro was the first for Team USA since 2009 and just the third ever, since synchronized events were added at the 1998 World Championships in Perth, Australia.

The mixed team event consists of one male and one female diver, each of whom must perform three dives over three rounds. Each diver must do at least one dive from 3-meter and one dive from 10-meter, and all six groups of dives must be represented throughout the competition.

Young performed a back dive pike for 36 points on 3-meter in the first

round and then did two dives from 10-meter, earning 70.40 points on an inward 3 ½ tuck in round two and 56 points on an armstand double back with 1 ½ twists in the final round. Capobianco competed a reverse dive pike for 44 points on 10-meter in round one and then followed up with two 3-meter dives, starting with a front 2 ½ with 2 twists that earned 71.40 points in round two. Capobianco finished off the night with 79.80 points on a front 4 ½ tuck that put the American pair in the bronze medal spot behind China (416.65) and Russia (390.05).

The Shoreline, Washington, native, joins FSU legend Phil Boggs as the only Seminoles to medal in diving at the World Championships. Boggs claimed gold in the 3-meter springboard at the 1973, 1975 and 1978 meets for the United States.

Seven Florida State swimmers wrapped up competition at the 2019 FINA World Championships in Gwangju, South Korea on Sunday. The eight-day meet was highlighted with records from Emir Muratovic and Tayla Lovemore.

"It was exciting to see our Seminoles compete at the World Championships," FSU head coach Neal Studd said. "We always want to provide an environment where dreams of competing for their countries and thriving at the highest level become reality. I'm proud of what we have done here at FSU to make these things possible for our student-athletes."

In addition to Muratovic (Bosnia and Herzegovina) and Lovemore (South Africa), Vladimir Stefanik (Slovakia), Izaak Bastian (Bahamas), Will Pisani (Canada), Lauren Hew (Cayman Islands) and Ida Hulkko (Finland) were in action at the meet.

Coming off her two golds at the World University Games (July 4-10) in Naples, Italy, Lovemore competed in three relays. She started the meet by helping South Africa to a new African Record in the 4x100m free relay with a time of 3:43.35 behind a 56.21 split for 18th place.

The Durban, native also split 59.34 in the fly leg of the 4x100m medley relay and anchored the 4x100m mixed free relay, clocking a time of 56.30. Both relay squads for South Africa finished 17th.

Muratovic clocked a personal best in the 50m free with a time of 22.56, which lowered his national record for Bosnia and Herzegovina, tying him for 34th. Muratovic also tied for 37th in the 50m back (25.95) and 35th in the 100m free (49.59).

Hulkko swam in her second World Championship 50m breast final, finishing eighth with a time of 31.23.

Out of prelims, Hulkko qualified for semifinals in eighth place at 30.73 before advancing to finals in sixth after turning in a time of 30.61. Hulkko was 19th in the 100m breast with a time of 1:08.34 and also split a 1:07.35 in the 100m breast leg of the 4x100m medley relay, helping Finland place 18th.

Representing Slovakia, Stefanik placed 42nd in the 50m fly (24.47), tied for 52nd in the 50m free (23.06) and finished 49th in the 100m free (50.27).

Hew competed at her first World Championships for the Cayman Island, finishing 56th in the 100m free (59.57) and 51st in the 50m free (27.26). She also was the anchor of the 4x100m mixed free relay, splitting a time of 59.74 and helping the Cayman Islands to a 24th place finish.

Bastian swam a time of 1:03.60 in the 100m breast for 58th place and also touched in 49th in the 50m breast (28.98) for the Bahamas.

Pisani was a member of Canada's 4x100m free relay team that finished 13th with a time of 3:15.06. Pisani went third and split a time of 49.21.

JOHN THRASHER

University President

John Thrasher, a Florida State University alumnus and former state legislator, is the university's 15th president.

Thrasher assumed the presidency on Nov. 10, 2014, after a successful career as a state legislator, businessman, lobbyist and lawyer. As president, Thrasher has focused his efforts on elevating FSU's reputation as a preeminent research institution. He has presided over a \$1 billion fundraising campaign, advanced the university's academic and research mission, championed diversity and inclusion, and welcomed the best and brightest students in the university's history.

Thrasher earned a bachelor's degree in business from Florida State in 1965. After graduating, he joined the U.S. Army where he received the Army Commendation Medal in Germany and was awarded two Bronze Stars for his service in Vietnam. He was honorably discharged as a captain in 1970. Thrasher then returned to his alma mater to earn a law degree with honors in 1972.

After working in private law practice in Daytona Beach and Tallahassee for several years, Thrasher returned to Jacksonville to serve as general counsel of the Florida Medical Association, a position he held for 20 years. He also served as "of counsel" to the Jacksonville law firm of Smith, Hulsey & Busey from 1996 to 2008. Thrasher was a partner of Southern Strategy Group, a Tallahassee-based governmental relations firm, from 2001 to 2009.

Thrasher's political career began in 1986 when he was elected to the Clay County School Board where he served as vice chairman, then chairman. He then became a state repre-



sentative in 1992, and he was re-elected without opposition in 1994, 1996 and 1998.

Thrasher was unanimously elected as the speaker of the Florida House of Representatives in 1998. He was elected to the Florida Senate in 2009 and subsequently re-elected. He served as chairman for the Republican Party of Florida in 2010.

From 2001 to 2005, Thrasher was the first chair of Florida State University's Board of Trustees. He was a key supporter of legislation that brought funding to the development of FSU's College of Medicine, and a building at the college is named in his honor.

In 2016, he was inducted into the FSU College of Business Hall of Fame. He currently serves on the College Football Playoff Board of Managers.

Born in Columbia, S.C., Thrasher moved to Florida as a child and grew up in Jacksonville. He and his wife, Jean, have three children and eight grandchildren.



David Coburn

Athletics Director

David Coburn was named Interim Athletic Director in August of 2018. The interim title was removed in May of 2019 when Coburn became the 12th full time Athletics Director in FSU history.

In his nine months as interim head of Athletics, Coburn applied his almost 40 years of legislative and university experience to address challenging budget issues and streamline, reorganize and implement new policies to help the department operate more efficiently and effectively.

"I am grateful to David Coburn for taking on this role permanently," FSU President John Thrasher said. "For years I have relied on his experience, integrity and good judgment, and the progress we have made under his leadership is already evident. I know the future of our championship Athletics program is as bright as ever and in good hands."

Prior to being named interim director of Athletics, Coburn served as chief of staff to President Eric Barron and then Thrasher.



Coburn brought a wealth of legislative and state budget experience to the university's administration when President Eric Barron hired him in 2012.

He is a 34-year veteran of the Florida legislative process, most recently Staff Director of the Florida Senate Committee on Ways and Means prior to coming to FSU. He served as Chief of Staff of the House of Representatives under two different Speakers, as Chief of Staff of the Senate under Senate President Ken Pruitt, and as Director of Planning and Budgeting for Gov. Lawton Chiles from 1992-94.

Coburn is a triple Florida State alumnus having earned a bachelor's degree, a master's degree in Urban and Regional Planning, and a Juris Doctorate from the FSU College of Law.

He and his wife, Dr. Mary Coburn, have two daughters and two grandchildren.

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
