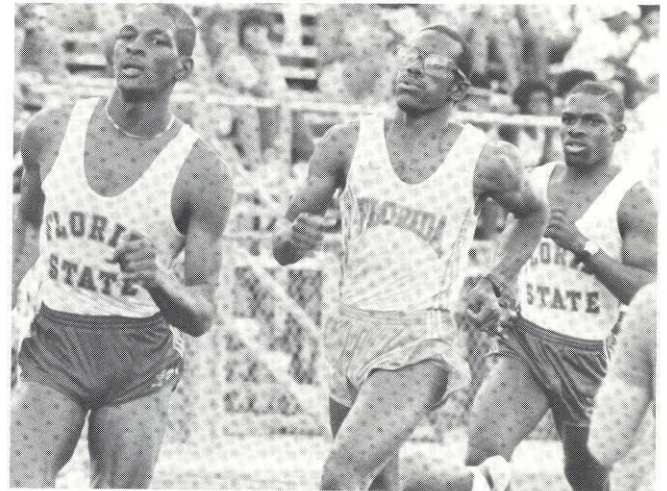

COACHING STAFF



Dick Roberts
Men's Track & Field Coach

A veteran of 22 years of coaching track and field, Florida State graduate Dick Roberts is in his ninth season at the helm of the men's track program. Eighteen of Robert's 22 years have been spent at FSU, including eight as an assistant coach, two as a graduate assistant and eight as the head coach.

Since he took over the programs reins in 1978, Roberts has led the Tribe to a 70-25-1 record, eight consecutive Metro titles and six top 20 finishes. In addition, Roberts' squads won the 1978 and 1979 Metro Conference Indoor Championships, the only two that have been held. Twenty-nine athletes have received 61 All-American awards and four have been national champions. Sprinter Walter McCoy (1977-81) was a member of the 1980 and 1984 Olympic teams. Seminole athletes reset FSU school records in 25 events in the eight years that Roberts has headed the program. He was named Metro Conference Coach of the Year in 1978, 79, 80, 81 and 84.

The highest national Tribe finishes under Roberts came in 1979 and 1980 when the Seminoles were 10th and third, respectively. In 1980, the squad had a 9-0 scored meet record before surprising the nation with its highest national finish ever. Roberts was named District 3 Coach of the Year.

The St. Petersburg native was an outstanding middle distance runner for FSU and earned three varsity letters before graduating in 1964. He put his name in the school's record books in the indoor half-mile and as a member of the two-mile and distance medley relays. He also won the Florida Intercollegiate mile twice during his career.

He remained on the Tallahassee campus for two additional seasons as a graduate assistant, receiving his master's degree in 1966.

He then moved to Dunedin High School as head track and field coach where he led his team to the state championship in 1968, earning Florida High School Coach of the Year honors. His athletes won 10 individual state championships and set 13 state records during his three seasons as head coach.

Roberts returned to FSU in 1970 as academic advisor for all Seminole athletes as well as head cross country and assistant track and field coach.

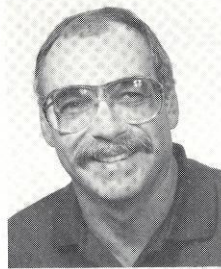
Roberts currently is in the first year of a two-year term as president of the NCAA Track and Field Coaches Association, the highest office in collegiate track and field. He served as vice president of that organization for the 1984 and 1985 seasons. He also served as an assistant coach for the 1982 National Sports Festival and the 1984 Pan American Junior team.

Roberts has spoken at many track and field affairs as well as participating in others. Those include track and field clinics sponsored by the Florida High School Athletic Association, Hardee's, the Marine Corps, Medalist, the National High School Athletic Association and the NCAA Track and Field Coaches Association.

Roberts has served as the meet director for the FSU-hosted Domino's Pizza Relays for several years and it was largely behind his efforts that the meet was born. Today, the Domino is the South's largest outdoor track meet with over 1,000 competitors representing almost 100 colleges, universities and track clubs. In 1986, the meet will be expanded to include women.

Roberts was also the driving force behind Florida State bidding on and receiving the recommendation as the host site for the 1988 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Roberts was tutored by Mike Long, who headed the Seminole track and field program for 23 years after its inception. Dick is married to the former Allene Hughes of St. Petersburg.



Terry Long
Women's Track & Field Coach

Florida State graduate Terry Long returned to his alma mater in June as head coach of the women's track and field team with the challenge of keeping the nationally-ranked program in the limelight. Known nationally as a sprint coach, Long will also be coaching the FSU men in the 100 and 200 meters.

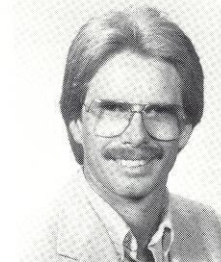
A 1963 alumnus who served as assistant men's track and field coach at the University of Florida for the past two seasons, Long began his career in the high school ranks at Lake City and Delray Beach High Schools. His notoriety in the coaching ranks came about during 13 years of coaching at Santa Fe and Seminole Community Colleges. Over those years, he developed hundreds of All-Americans and 60 national junior college champions. His teams won 11 state junior college track and cross country titles. He was named JuCo National Coach of the Year three times and three times he coached the Seminoles to runner-up spots in the national championship chase.

Long's name is also familiar in Florida State track and field circles. Mike Long Track is named after his father, who coached three of his sons during a 23-year career at FSU. Today, Jim is an assistant with the men's program and Curtiss is head coach at Western Kentucky. In 1981, Terry joined his father in the state of Florida Track Hall of Fame.

In December of 1984, Long received one of his greatest honors as he was named head coach of the United States' entry in the first World Indoor Track Championships in Paris. He is presently co-chairman of the National Olympic Development Sprint Committee.

The 44-year old has also served as coach of the Athletic Attic and Bud Light Track clubs and has won five national TAC championships with his indoor and outdoor teams. Probably the most famous athlete he has coached on an individual basis is Chandra Cheeseborough, an Olympic gold medalist on two relays who now serves as a graduate assistant in the FSU program.

The Leon High School graduate, who also received his master's degree from FSU, is married to the former Dee Dee Malone and they have two children.



Al Schmidt
Cross Country Coach
Assistant Track & Field Coach

Al Schmidt begins his fourth season as Florida State women's cross country and assistant track coach in 1985 and takes on a new role with the men's track program as well. For the first time, Schmidt takes over the reins of the men's cross country team and will also serve as an assistant men's track coach.

Since Schmidt's arrival in Tallahassee in August of 1982, the Lady Seminole track program has won two national championships - the 1985 NCAA indoor and 1984 outdoor - and has taken the runnerup spot at the NCAA outdoor meets in 1983 and 1985. Schmidt helped build those teams in his role as FSU's recruiting coordinator for track and field as well as in his work with the distance runners. This season he will again work with both men and women distance runners.

Schmidt's teams have also enjoyed success in cross country. His 1984 squad finished fourth at the NCAA Region III meet and

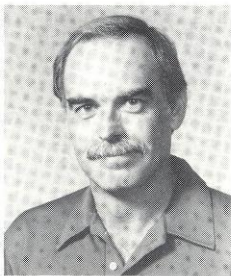
narrowly missed a bid to the national championship event.

Prior to joining the FSU women's program, Schmidt spent one year as assistant men's track and field coach at the University of Kansas. While there, he worked with the distance runners in both cross country and track and helped the Jayhawks capture Big Eight titles in indoor and outdoor track.

Schmidt will not be a newcomer to Metro Conference track and cross country competition either. From 1976-81, Schmidt was head coach of the men's track and field program at St. Louis University. During his five seasons at St. Louis, his cross country team was Metro Conference champion (1977) and runner-up (1978) before the school dropped out of the conference.

A 1973 graduate of St. Louis, Schmidt also attended the University of Missouri for two years where he ran on the Tiger cross country and track teams. Upon transferring back to his hometown, Schmidt served as an assistant track coach at the University of Missouri-St. Louis while finishing his degree.

Schmidt holds a Level I coaching certificate from The Athletics Congress (TAC) and was chosen in 1985 to conduct the Florida High School Athletic Association Coaching clinic for distance and middle distance runners. In 1979, he represented the United States on a Brazilian tour during which he helped conduct coaching clinics for the State Department.



Jim Long
*Assistant Track
& Field Coach*

Jim Long, a former Florida State sprinter, enters his ninth season on Florida State's track and field coaching staff.

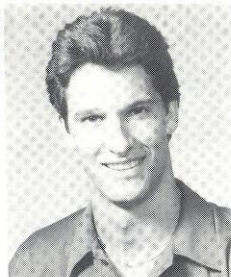
The son of former FSU head coach Mike Long, Jim came to the FSU program in 1975 from Leon High School, where he served as head track and field coach. From 1975 until 1977, his coaching duties were in the sprint and hurdle events. From 1978 until 1984, Long worked with the hurdles, pole vault and decathlon. His present duties include both hurdle races and certain decathlon events.

During his years on the Florida State staff, he has coached 16 NCAA All-Americans, six of those individual, as well as 12 Metro Conference champions.

Long has served as a clinician for the last four years at the U.S. Olympic Development camp in Orlando along with brothers Terry, head women's coach at Florida State, and Curtiss, head coach at Western Kentucky.

Long has a bachelor's degree in humanities, a master's degree in history and needs only a dissertation before completing a doctorate in physical education.

He and his wife Janis have two sons, Justin, 9, and Jarrett, 6.



Jeff Ward
*Assistant Track and
Field Coach*

Jeff Ward is the newest member of the Seminole track and field staff, having achieved full-time status during the summer months. Ward took over when former assistant John Brogle accepted a coaching job in Italy.

Ward is really no newcomer to Tallahassee. He helped coach the FSU pole vaulters in 1983 before returning in 1985 for another year

as a graduate assistant. Ward spent 1984 in Eugene, Oregon, training for the Olympics.

During that time, the Miami (Ohio) University graduate was selected to the World University Games team and five other United States national teams. His best performance of the year came at the World University Games where he vaulted 18-0½ feet. An achilles tendon injury and the subsequent surgery prevented Ward from trying out for the U.S. Olympic team.

As a collegian, the East Lansing, Michigan native was an outstanding pole vaulter. He owns the seventh highest collegiate pole vault of all-time (18-2½) and finished fifth in the nation at the NCAA Championships. That performance earned him All-American status. He is the only Michigan native to have ever vaulted 18 feet.

Ward received a bachelor's degree in physical education from Miami in July of 1982. In December of 1984 he earned a master's in athletic administration from Florida State while on an NCAA post graduate scholarship.

Ward's specialty area of coaching is the pole vault but he also coaches the throwing events, the high jump and the decathlon. In 1984, his athletes won the Metro Conference Championship in four of the seven events he coached. Two of his pole vaulters increased their jumps by close to two feet to 16-6. Ward will also be coaching the Lady Seminole high jumpers, throwers and heptathletes.

In addition to his coaching duties, Ward will serve as an instructor in the FSU School of Physical Education.



Chandra Cheeseborough
Graduate Assistant Coach

Chandra Cheeseborough, winner of three medals at the 1984 Olympics, joins Florida State's women's track and field program as a graduate assistant coach. Cheeseborough, who is taking the year off as a competitor, is pursuing a master's degree in leisure services at Florida State.

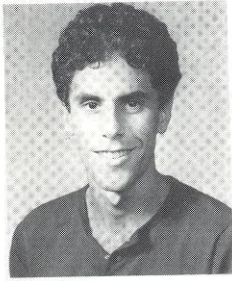
The Jacksonville, Fla. native won a silver medal in the 400 meters in Los Angeles, and also won a pair of golds on the USA 400 and 1,600 meter relay teams. She was also a member of the 1980 Olympic team that stayed home and she finished sixth in the 100 meters at the 1976 Montreal Olympics as a high school senior.

The 1981 graduate of Tennessee State University has been running in the nation's spotlight for 10 years. As a junior at Ribault High School in 1975, she made the Pan American team and finished second in the TAC meet in both the 100 and 200 meters. She was the Florida high school champion in 1977.

Although Tennessee State did not compete in the NCAA, Cheeseborough continued to impress throughout her college career, running on the 1979 400 meter relay at the Pan American Games in addition to training for and making a second Olympic team.

In 1983, while running for Athletics West under FSU coach Terry Long, Cheeseborough established her personal best in the 200 of 21.99. She switched to the 400 meters for the '84 Olympics and had not run the event 10 times when she recorded a 49.05 clocking in Los Angeles.

Cheeseborough will work with Florida State athletes competing from 100 meters through the 400 meters.



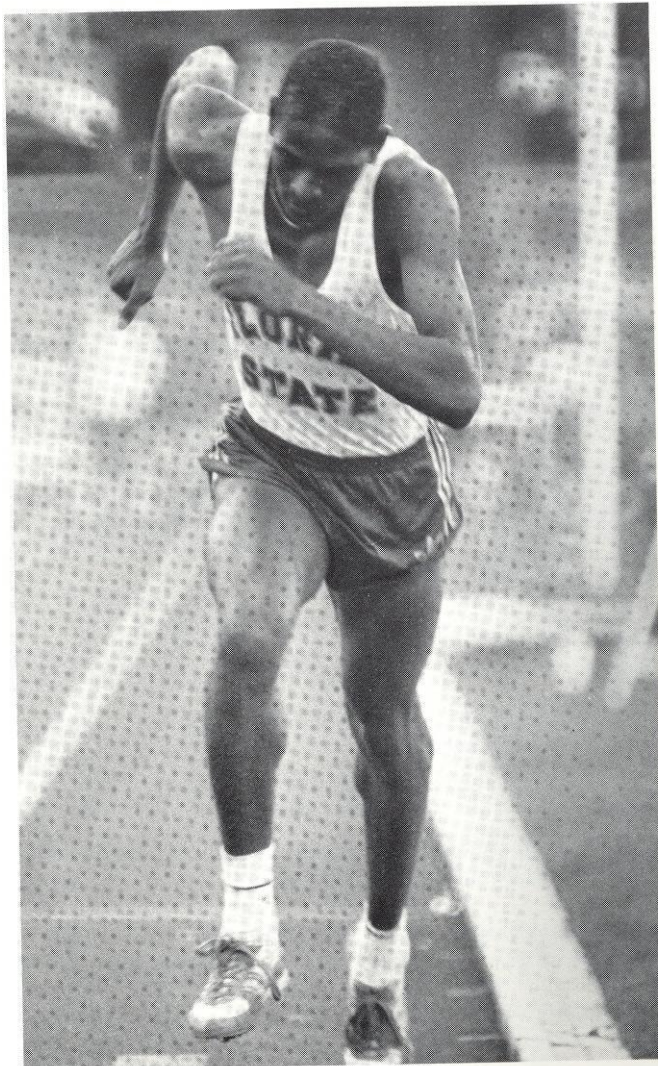
Larry Greene
Graduate Assistant Coach

Larry Greene, a 1983 Florida State graduate, will assist head coach Al Schmidt with both the men's and women's cross country programs as a graduate assistant.

While at Florida State, Greene was a three-time NCAA qualifier and won the Metro Conference individual crown in 1981. He was also captain of the Seminole' cross country team that finished eighth in the nation. During his cross country and track careers, Greene set the Metro Conference 5 mile cross country record as well as the indoor 3000 meter indoor Metro Conference record.

Since graduation in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in English, Greene has continued to run competitively. In 1984, Greene had a banner year, placing fourth in the United States Championships in the 10,000 meters and running the fastest half marathon in the world. The Tamarac, Florida native also ranked seventh in North America for distances between 20 and 30 kilometers.

He is presently pursuing a master's degree in sports psychology.

1985 Women's Cross Country

For Al Schmidt, looking at his 1985 women's cross country squad brings to mind the old good news, bad news story.

The good news is from top to bottom, Schmidt's squad will be solid. Unlike previous years, when a weak link hurt the Lady Seminoles in their bid for an NCAA berth, the 1985 team has depth and talent throughout the lineup.

So what could possibly be the bad news? The bad news is what Schmidt has in quantity will have to overcome a shortage of quality and experience. Of the top four runners of last season, who Schmidt says were FSU's "strongest ever," only two return. Of those two, only senior Janie Regis has more than one season of collegiate cross country experience.

Regis, who was FSU's third runner last season, is back stronger than ever and appears ready to take over the top spot. Schmidt's eyes positively light up when talking about her potential.

"Janie is the cream of the crop in cross country and can go as far as she wants to this season," Schmidt said. "I think she has the potential to be a cross country All-American."

As the lone senior on the cross country squad this year, Regis will lead a relatively inexperienced group of cross country runners. Two of those did run in the top five for FSU in 1984 though. As a freshman, Brenda Moore was the fourth member of that "strongest top four" while junior Barbara Matthews ran in the fifth position most of the season. Moore came on strong toward the end of last season and performed well at regionals. Schmidt is ready for both of these cross country "veterans" to make a move into the top three.

Behind Regis, Moore and Matthews, the 1985 picture gets fuzzy. Of the remaining eight members of the team, four are newcomers to Florida State, two have never run cross country before and two are walkons who ran for the Tribe last season.

Of those eight, it's anybody's guess who will come on and take a spot in the top five. While sophomore Anita Cicanese and junior Sue Pockell both ran cross country for Florida State last year, neither could crack the top five. Schmidt hopes that each can improve and contribute this season.

Two Lady Seminole track standouts will also try their cross country legs this year. Junior Samantha Green and senior Kelley Hackler are 800 meter experts who may be a pleasant surprise on cross country courses in 1985.

"I'm excited about seeing what the 800 meter runners can do in cross country," Schmidt said. "I think running cross country will improve their strength and in turn their performances on the track this spring."

In addition to the two 800 meter returnees, a pair of newcomers excel in that event on the track as well. Both junior college transfer Jennifer Jonas and freshman Fran Gordon are primarily known for their 800 abilities.

As for the 1985 schedule, it is filled with tough invitationals. Three in-state meets will be at South Florida and Florida and at home for the annual FSU Invitational. In addition, Schmidt scheduled the Alabama Invitational in Tuscaloosa in October.

For the first time, the Metro Conference will host a women's cross country championship. The conference added the sport beginning this season and the first championship meet will be run in November in Louisville.

"I think the Metro adds a touch of excitement to our season," Schmidt said. "But in a way, it makes it harder because we must look at both Metro and regionals as our 'big' meets of the year. Of course our ultimate goal is to get as many people, whether team or individual, qualified for nationals."

Although it would appear Schmidt has quite a job ahead of him after losing his top two runners, he is excited about working with his 1985 team. "We may not be as strong as last year at the top, but I think if everyone runs to the best of her ability, we can have a good year in cross country," Schmidt said. "We want everyone to improve over the course of the cross country season. If they do that as individuals, the team will come together."

Schmidt hoped the quantity, depth and enthusiasm of his 1985 FSU cross country squad can overcome a lack of experience to propel Florida State to the 1985 NCAA Championships.

1985 Men's Cross Country

In terms of team goals, new men's cross country coach Al Schmidt has few for his 1985 FSU squad. He believes there is "no limit" to how far the team can go, yet he places no expectations.

His only goal is that each individual improve over the course of the cross country season.

"Cross country is an integral part of track and field," Schmidt said. "We like to emphasize track season yet still work hard on cross country. If we have a strong program in track, we will have a solid cross country squad as well."

Although he does not think in terms of team finish, Schmidt is excited about the 11 members of his 1985 squad and their potential, especially that of senior Greg Doss.

Unlike most of the team, Doss is an experienced collegiate cross country runner ready to lead the young but talented 1985 Seminoles. Doss was FSU's top runner last season, finishing second at the state championship and sixth at the Metro Conference meet to win all-Metro honors for the second consecutive year.

"I'm excited about getting the chance to work with Greg," Schmidt said. "He has the ability to go as far as he wants to athletically and will help our young people this season by providing leadership."

Besides Doss, Schmidt will look to the only other senior on the squad, Ben Paxton, for leadership. Paxton started off strong in 1984 but a stress fracture cut his cross country season short.

FSU's other "veterans" are a pair of sophomores, Chris Brooks and Chris Duggan. Both gained valuable experience last year and Brooks surprised coaches with his finishes at the Troy State dual meet (5th) and Metro Conference Championship (22nd). Duggan's specialties are the 800 and 1,500 meters, but he could make his way into the FSU top five in 1985.

What has Schmidt excited about this year's team is a group of newcomers who he believes will form the nucleus of a solid team for years to come. Of the five additions, freshmen Matt Farnen and Mike Clerc could be the most valuable. Each has extensive cross country experience, Clerc taking the 3A state high school cross country championship in 1984 while Farnen was not far behind. They are two of the strongest middle distance/distance runners Florida State has ever signed, and according to Schmidt, runners to build a team around.

"They are just outstanding," Schmidt said of his two top recruits. "We don't want to put any pressure on them, though. We just want them to develop and improve this season. They are the wave of the future, a nucleus we can build on."

Other new additions this season are freshmen Jeff Ellis and David Keen and junior Ocky Clark. Clark, an extremely talented 800-meter man, will work out with both cross country and track this fall, but is an unknown quantity as far as cross country is concerned.

Ditto Ellis and Keen, although with hard work and some experience in collegiate events, either one could make it into the FSU top five.

Schmidt rounds out his squad with returnees John Charlton and John Howe. Both were listed on the cross country roster in 1984, but neither cracked the top five nor did they participate in all meets. With work, they could surprise coaches.

Despite the change in coaching, the schedule looks familiar. The Tribe will run in several invitationals in the early part of the season in order to prepare for the Metro Conference and NCAA Region III meets. And although Schmidt has no predictions, he holds to his "no limitations" philosophy.

"This team has the makings of a very solid group," Schmidt said. "In the next three years, we want to bring FSU into contention to go to nationals from our region, which is the toughest region in the country."

Schmidt feels his 1985 men's team can go far, yet all he asks is that each athlete improve as the season progresses. With senior leadership from Doss and Paxton, good performances from freshmen Clerc and Farnen, steady development of the rest of the team, and a little luck, the future looks bright for the 1985 Seminoles and for the cross country team for years to come.

Women's Track and Field

An era has ended, and a new one begun. For Florida State's women's track and field program, 1986 will be a season of regrouping and rebuilding. After top three national finishes in each of the last five years and national championships in 1984 (outdoors) and 1985 (indoors), a new coaching staff and group of young athletes await the challenge of maintaining that traditional excellence.

Terry Long, who replaces 1984 NCAA Coach of the Year Gary Winckler, is really no stranger to the program, having graduated a varsity track athlete in 1963. His father, Mike, coached at Florida State for 23 years and brother Jim currently is an assistant coach with the men's program.

"We're looking at the 1986 season as being a rebuilding year," says Long. "We have some obvious strengths - the relays, sprints and jumps. We hope to solidify a potentially outstanding hurdle group and I think we'll be more competitive in the middle distance events. "But there are a number of factors that make it a rebuilding year," he continues. "Our field events are totally void. And we've got some very big challenges in the 400, 400 hurdles and 1,500."

Only two NCAA individual scorers remain on the FSU roster, but together they accounted for all but one of FSU's outdoor national points a year ago when the team finished in a tie for second in the country. Esmeralda Garcia and Michelle Finn also scored the bulk of points at the indoor national where FSU surprised by winning the team title.

"Two people don't make a team," says Long. "But they're the first step to having a national scoring squad."

Garcia's return is a bonus. The indoor and outdoor triple jump champion in 1985, she was granted an extra year of eligibility by the NCAA. Her initial attendance at FSU was interrupted when she and her husband had to return to their native Brazil soon after the 1981 season.

Finn will be a junior and was a two-time national champion as a sophomore, winning the indoor 55 meters and the outdoor 100.

There will be a number of newcomers to build around Garcia and Finn. The headliners include high school All-American sprinter Angela Curry, junior college All-American Jennifer Jonas and hurdler Ann Gervin, a transfer who becomes eligible. Sprinter Janet Davis did not participate for FSU a year ago and also returns.

THE SPRINTS - Florida State's obvious strength in its surge to national prominence has been its strong sprinting corps, and Long sees no need to change any of that. Finn will be the leading returner in the nation in the 100 and she was second in the 200 at the NCAA meet. Garcia's return helps strengthen the 100 - she was fifth in the nation last season and also ran in the 200 at the NCAA Meet. Sophomore Andrea Thompson ran a few 200s a year ago and was a member of FSU's third place 400 meter relay at the outdoor championships. Junior Janet Levy has been concentrating on the 400 but she does run a leg on the 400 meter relay.

Curry, a state titlist in the 100 and 200 out of Evans High School, will be the newcomer to watch while Davis was sixth in the 200 at the 1984 NCAA Championships and should pick up where she left off. Scotland native Dawn Flockhart will also be available in the sprints but a prior commitment with her country will not allow her to participate in the NCAA Championships this season.

Florida State has a host of runners in the 400, but all are still chasing NCAA qualifying standards. Levy has continued to improve and turned in a team best 53.57 as a sophomore in 1985, showed steady improvement and ran 54.48 in the last meet of the regular season. Fellow soph, Canadian Carol Samuels, adds depth in the event. All will be candidates for the 1,600 meter relay, as will 800 meter specialist Samantha Green and Garcia.

THE HURDLES - The 100 meter hurdles continue to be one of the backbone events of the Florida State program. Junior and two-time NCAA qualifier JoAnn Brown is back to improve on her season best 13.52 timing from a year ago. Transfer Ann Girvan, with 13.55 credentials, is eligible, too. Long also wants to take a close look at sophomore Thompson in this event.

The graduation of three-time NCAA qualifier Chris McKay leaves a void in the 400 meter hurdles for the 1986 season.

MIDDLE DISTANCE - The 800 meters could be one of FSU's strongest events. The leading returner is Green, who improved as the 1985 season progressed and will be looking to qualify for the NCAAAs as a junior. Kelley Hackler, a redshirt in 1985, could end up as the event's leader before the season is over. Hackler was an NCAA qualifier as a sophomore. Six-time junior college All-American Jonas is the newcomer holding top credentials. Freshman Fran Gordon will run here, too.

Florida State lost NCAA indoor and outdoor scorer Nancy Rettie in the 1,500 and only sophomore Brenda Moore and senior Jeannie Messinese return. Messinese has run 4:27.83 while Moore's top time a year ago was 4:31.82

DISTANCE - Inexperience characterizes the distance group. The leading returner in the 3,000 would be senior Janie Regis, who has a best of 9:39.39. Moore and junior Sue Pockell have some experience in the event and Jackie Lebel, a freshman from Brandon, Fla. fits in here too. Regis and Lebel will also find themselves running the 5,000 along with redshirt sophomore Barbara Matthews, who runs both the 5,000 and 10,000. Regis has run 35:00.87 in the 10,000.



THE JUMPS - The horizontal jumps are the most stable area of the field events, simply because of Garcia. Not only was she the NCAA triple jump champion, but she finished as the runnerup in the long jump as well. Finn long jumped last year in one meet, but it's unlikely that she would take up the event on a full-time basis. Walkon Tonja Hunt gives FSU an extra entry in the triple jump.

The Lady Seminoles graduated All-American Wendy Markham in the high jump but freshman Latoshia Crews, also a heptathlete, will begin a four year career. Her best is 5-8 that placed her third in the state.

THE THROWS - Only Venecia Williams, a sophomore walkon, is listed on the roster in the throwing events. This is an area undoubtedly where Terry Long will concentrate recruiting efforts for 1987.

THE SCHEDULE - Florida State is the defending national champion of the NCAA Indoor Championships but 1986 host Oklahoma City's 176-metered bank board track will make it difficult for the Lady Seminoles to repeat that honor. Although the team attends three meets in Gainesville in addition to meets in New York City and at LSU, none of the tracks will provide FSU with experience on the NCAA-type track.

Florida State's outdoor schedule includes four home meets, highlighted by the first Domino's Pizza Relays for women. The Seminoles will also sponsor the Eastern Airlines Invitational, the Springtime Invitational and the Seminole Twilight meet. Away weekends include the Florida Relays, Martin Luther King Games, the National Invitational Championships and the Gatorade Classic. The NCAA Outdoor Championships will be held June 4-7 in Indianapolis, Ind.

"The character of this team is that they'll probably do more that people will expect," says Long. "We've got good across-the-board strength. We just don't have the extreme amount of quality that's been here in previous years."

The new era is underway.

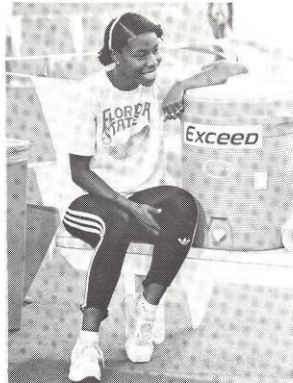

WENDY MARKHAM RECEIVES POST GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

A 1985 graduate of Florida State, three-time All-American and high jump school record holder Wendy Markham became the first athlete from FSU to receive an NCAA post-graduate scholarship. The four-year student athlete compiled a 3.9 grade point average and earned first team Academic All-American honors as a senior, becoming the first woman at Florida State to be named to that team. Markham's excellence was not restricted to the classroom; she scored points for Florida State in four national championships, her highest finish coming as a sophomore when she broke the NCAA meet record in finishing second in the country. Markham also helped lead FSU to the 1984 NCAA title.

Florida State - Nobody Has Done It Better

Following Florida State's quick rise to its national outdoor championship in 1984, many track and field analysts expected the program to quietly retreat to an anonymous level. Why? Simply because the athletes responsible for 129 of the winning 145 points had graduated and were now but names in the record books.

Nobody expected FSU to win the indoor national championship on March 9, 1985. With a few athletes left over from possibly the greatest sprinting team ever assembled on the college level, and with a newcomer who really wasn't a newcomer at all, Florida State won its second national championship in less than a year. The rise of Michelle Finn, who was a surprise winner at 55 meters, was clearly a reason for FSU's success as was Esmeralda Garcia, who had returned to Florida State following a three year absence. The time off didn't seem to hinder Garcia as she promptly went out and set the world record in the triple jump. Just six athletes totaled enough points for FSU to win.

To prove that it wasn't a fluke, the Lady Seminoles came powering back at the Outdoor NCAA Championships and ended in a tie with LSU for second place. Finn, just a sophomore, won her second

individual national title in the 100 meters while Garcia doubled by winning the triple jump again. Finn went on to finish second in the 200 while Garcia took fifth in the 100 and third in the long jump. The two weren't done until they had each run a leg on FSU's 400 meter relay.

Back in 1980, when no one in women's track and field circles knew much about the Lady Seminoles, the program began to grow. Led by the late Roger Smith and his capable assistant Gary Winckler, the two recruited the core of what would become the 1984 national championship team. In that first year alone, FSU caught the nation entirely by surprise and finished third. By 1983, FSU had continued to prove that it was among the best programs in the nation after a pair of second place finishes under Winckler, who had taken over the reins of the program. The national championship in 1984 was nothing more than the fruits of a strong foundation that had been built. Over that five year period, from 1981 until 1985, Florida State produced 51 indoor All-Americans, 57 outdoor All-Americans and a cross country All-American.

And now, in 1986 under head coach Terry Long, a new era begins.

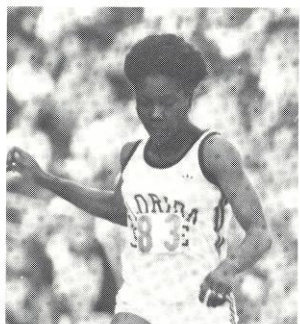

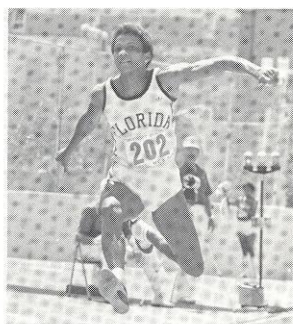

MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Head coach Dick Roberts hasn't been this excited in a long time. He's beaming over his 1986 Seminole track and field team, and with good reason!

"We have had the best recruiting year that we've had since 1980," he says. "Added to that is the excellent progress of our returning athletes. This year we'll have an opportunity to take another step forward in regaining national attention."

That national attention last came to the Seminoles in 1980, when the squad placed third in the NCAA Outdoor Championships. "On the surface the success we've had since then would appear to be excellent," says Roberts "We won our ninth consecutive Metro Conference title. We've continued to beat our in-state rival Florida. And we've continued to produce All-Americans."

But the real goal for success, according to Roberts, is to grab a share of the national limelight. "We predicted that last year would be a start back to the national prominence," he says. "We want to finish annually in the top 20 and we haven't done that in the last few years. That reality motivates us."

Roberts graduation losses were not that significant. His recruiting was. The headliner for the group he brought in would be junior transfer Ocky Clark, who is simply one of the best 800 meter men in the country. "Ocky brings maturity and stability to our program," says Roberts. He also brings proven credentials that include his being named to the World University Games team last August. Clark should be an immediate hit in the scoring column at the NCAA Championships.

Other potential scorers from the newcomers circle include juco transfer Carter Williams, a 400 and 800 runner who Roberts calls "the catch of the year," Clark Waddell, an important cog as a sprinter in Odessa Junior College's last two national championships, junior high jumper Tom Stitt, freshman pole vaulter Larry Carr and Mike Clerc, the state's top miler and two-miler as a high schooler.

Those athletes join a list of already established upperclassmen headed by four-time senior All-American Leander McKenzie, who is one of the top intermediate hurdlers in the U.S. Also classified as probable scorers would be a pair of sophomores in 800 meter man George Gardner, whose freshman season was cut short because of injury, and 400 meter dasher Thomas Johnson. Junior possibilities include Charlie Carr, who was redshirted a year ago with an injury and should repeat as an NCAA qualifier in the intermediate hurdles, and Tom Riether, and up-and-coming decathlete and pole vaulter.

Others with potential to qualify include seniors Greg Doss (5,000), Mike Bell (shot put) and Jimmy Daniel (100), sophomores Billy Close (long jump) and Chris Duggan (1,500) and freshman Matt Farnen (3,000 steeplechase).

THE SPRINTS - Roberts will be counting on six athletes for productivity in the 100, 200 and 400. The trio of Waddell, Daniel and freshman Sammie Smith should be a top-notch group in the 100. Waddell has already run NCAA qualifying times in junior college while Daniel's nagging injuries prevented him from returning to top form last year. Smith, more heralded on the football field, was the state sprint champion as a junior.

Waddell and Daniel should also be one-two in the 200 meters while often-injured senior Kevin Gordon will compete with Smith for the third position.

Roberts hopes to have two NCAA qualifiers in the 400. While Williams is almost an automatic, barring injury, Johnson just missed the cutoff standards last year as a freshman. Gordon has on occasion run an open 400 and he ran a leg on FSU's NCAA eighth place All-American 1,600 meter relay team. The relay could be one of FSU's strongest, since it lost only Vince Washington (he is just eligible indoors). Competition will be strong among returners Johnson,



McKenzie and Gordon, newcomers Williams and Waddell, and Carr, who ran a leg in 1984. The 400 meter relay will be chosen from Waddell, Daniel, Johnson, Williams and Gordon.

MIDDLE DISTANCE - Unquestionably, the Seminoles have one of the best trios of 800 meter runners in the country. In the world-class Clark, Gardner and Williams, Florida State has an average time of 1:47.0. "We could have the best 4 x 800 meter relay in the country during the indoor season," says Roberts. "On paper I don't know anyone who could figure any stronger than us." To form the foursome, Roberts would add Johnson, who ran a cool 1:50.38 in his only attempt at the open 800 as a freshman.

Clark again excels and could also score in the 1,500 at the NCAA Championships, but breaking the FSU school record will be his first goal. He would need to top 3:43.6.

Gardner is also a natural double over to the 1,500 and shows much promise. Duggan, a sophomore, continues to improve while senior Ben Paxton will also compete for the third slot.

DISTANCE - Florida State doesn't have very much experience or depth, but it does have some young talent. No steeplechaser returns to the Seminole fold but freshmen Matt Farnen and Mike Clerc will be getting their first exposure to the event. Roberts has a feeling that one of the two will find his niche here. The duo were two of the top finishers at the state high school meet in cross country as well as the mile and two-mile over the past two seasons.

Senior Greg Doss leads the pack of 5,000 and 10,000 meter runners and coaches are hoping for a great year from him. Farnen and Clerc will run the 5,000 and sophomore Chris Brooks will challenge too.

THE HURDLES - The hurdles are solid and should produce points for Florida State at the NCAA Championships once again. McKenzie, who finished fourth in the intermediates at the last two NCAA Outdoor Championships, has run 17 sub-50 times in the event. His best a year ago was 49.33 in the finals at Austin. He also runs a steady NCAA qualifying time in the highs. Carr, who qualified in 1984 and ran in Eugene, should give FSU two qualifiers in the intermediates. Arthur Blake, the state's top prep hurdler two years ago, has transferred to FSU and is sitting out this season.

THE JUMPS - Sophomore Billy Close will be the performer to watch in both horizontal jumps. After fighting an injury at the end of last season, he jumped a career best 25-1 in the last meet. He hasn't had much of a chance to compete in the triple, but once he passes the 50-foot mark, NCAA qualifying standards won't be that far away. Sophomore Tony Eaton provides depth for scored meets.

There's much-needed new blood in the high jump with a pair of newcomers holding impressive credentials. College of DuPage transfer Tom Stitt was the national runnerup indoors and outdoors with a best of 7-1½. Darrell Wills, a sophomore, is a retired basketball player who has decided to take up jumping once again. He cleared 6-11 in open competition last spring and has three years of eligibility remaining. Senior Ashley Peeples, fourth in the Metro last year, and footballer David Etheridge are the lone veterans returning.

FSU's pole vaulting has improved by leaps and bounds! Two vaulters who return have cleared at least 16-6. Add newcomer Larry Carr, whose 16-0 vault in high school is the top mark ever in the state, and the Seminoles should dominate most rivals in this event and come up with an NCAA qualifier. Tommy Riether tied for the Metro Conference title and sophomore Joel Smith improved to a third place finish in the Metro. Both have bests of 16-6. Junior Brian Fitzsimmons had to sit out last season with an injury but he returns with a best of 16-0 3/4. Also returning is junior Brian Frazier, who has vaulted 15-6.

THE THROWS - Florida State's weakest link is its throws, but there are a few bright spots. Mike Bell returns for his senior season in the shot put and continues to improve. He's bigger and stronger and

his best a year ago was 58-1 3/4. Backing him up is fellow senior Mike Brinkman, who returns after sitting out last year with academic difficulties.

The discus will be handled by a pair of former walkons, Earl Jones and Mark Sleeman, who improved in every meet last year and should make significant contributions. A trio of walkons will be handling the javelin, including junior transfers John Dawson, and Horatio Garcia and freshman Tom Fetters. Dawson was the state javelin champ at Florida Junior College in 1985.

Brinkman, the school record holder in the hammer will be challenged by Sleeman and Garcia. Garcia, like Stitt and Brinkman, attended the College of DuPage in Illinois where he broke Brinkman's record with a 171-0 throw.

The decathlon is in the able hands of Riether, who is back for another two years. He could reach NCAA standards this year after winning the conference title as a sophomore.

THE SCHEDULE - Florida State never emphasizes the indoor schedule, but will have the opportunity this year to score nationally. Warmup meets to that indoor championship in Syracuse include meets in Gainesville and Baton Rouge as well as the Eastman Invitational in Johnson City, TN.

Because of the warm climate of Florida, the Seminoles are able to host six meets in Tallahassee during the outdoor season. The grand daddy of them all is the season opener, the Domino's Pizza Relays, one of the truly great collegiate and open meets in the country. Also included on the schedule are a pair of dual meets against Florida in Gainesville and Auburn in Tallahassee, the Florida Relays and a trip to Tampa for the inaugural Tampa Invitational.

Trips out of state include the Martin Luther King Games in Atlanta, the National Invitational Championships in Indianapolis (site of the NCAA Championships) and the Gatorade Classic in Knoxville.

"We're optimistic about this track and field season," says Roberts. "We've got the schedule and the athletes to go out and prove that we're one of the top teams in the country."

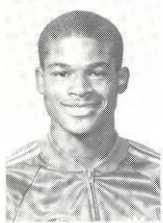

Florida State's NCAA Champions

DANNY SMITH, 60 yd. HH (7.1), 1974 and 1975

In 1975, Danny Smith became the first person to win the NCAA indoor championships in the 60 yd. high hurdles two years in a row. Including trials and finals over three years, Smith won 11 of 12 races, placing second to Olympic champion Rod Milburn in 1973.

WALTER McCOY, 600 yd. run (1:09.6), 1978

McCoy's upset victory as a freshman was only a tenth of a second off the NCAA meet record of 1:09.5 set by Olympian and world record holder Rick Wolhuter.

BRADLEY COOPER, Discus (212-6), 1979

Cooper's victory established a new NCAA meet record and climaxed an undefeated senior year. His record throw was the second longest in collegiate history.

MIKE ROBERSON, 200 Meters (19.96), 1980

Roberson saved his greatest collegiate race for his last one. After three races in the 4 x 400 relay (which placed third) and three races in the 100 meters where he finished second, he became the first human in history to break 20 seconds for 200 meters at sea level, finally winning an NCAA championship in the race he loved most.

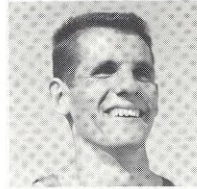

Mile Relay (3:16.7), 1980

Lead-off runner Nelson suffered a severe hamstring strain during the qualifying race but even so the Seminoles were the fastest qualifier. Boodie flew in the next morning and Ross replaced Nelson at the lead off. McCoy's come-from-behind anchor leg was the fastest of the meet and brought FSU the victory.



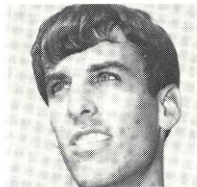

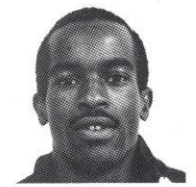

Florida State Hall of Fame

KEN MISNER, Elected 1977

The team captain of the 1970 and 1971 Seminoles, Misner specialized in distance events for FSU. He earned All-America status in two sports (track and cross country). Misner first made All-American in 1969 in cross country and repeated that honor in 1970. The following year, he was All-American in both the three and six mile runs. Misner at one time held school records in the indoor two mile run, as well as the outdoor, 2, 3 and 6 mile events.

MIKE LONG, Elected 1978

One of the most prolific coaches in the history of the sport, Mike Long headed the Florida State track and field program for 23 seasons. During that time, Long recorded a won-lost record of 145-51 and had only one losing season. He coached five undefeated teams at FSU and had five others that lost only once. During that period, he coached 14 athletes who garnered a total of 26 All-American titles.

MIKE KELLY, Elected 1979

An outstanding hurdler for Florida State in the late sixties, Kelly earned All-American honors in both the 120-yard high hurdles and the 440-yard IM hurdles. His combined time of 63.9 in those two events set a world mark that stood for seven years.

MIKE CONLEY, Elected 1980

As a member of Florida State's track team, Conley was one of the South's most dominating runners from 1956-58. During his junior and senior seasons, he went undefeated in the one mile run. So dominating was Conley that his time of 4:05.7 in the mile run at the Meet of Champions in Houston (1958) would set a Florida State school record that would stand for 16 years.

DANNY SMITH, Elected 1981

A three-time All-American in the hurdles, Smith at one time was co-holder of the world record in the indoor 50-yard hurdles. From 1975-76, Smith became the first athlete in NCAA history to claim back-to-back NCAA Championships in the indoor hurdles. A former world and NCAA record holder, Smith finished his career at FSU with seven university records to his credit.

BRADLEY COOPER, Elected 1984

Florida State's greatest field event performer came to Tallahassee from the Bahamas. In 1978, his junior year, Cooper won All-American honors when he finished fourth in the NCAA discus competition with a throw of 189 feet. His senior year, Cooper became FSU's first NCAA record-holder in track and field when he won the NCAA Championship discus event with a throw of 212-6. That mark stood for four years. Cooper, the co-captain of the 1979 track and field team, also holds the second-best shot put mark in FSU history at 60-2.

MIKE ROBERSON, Elected 1985

A World Class sprinter all four years (1976-1980) at Florida State, Mike Roberson set records at all levels of competition. He set FSU indoor and outdoor marks in the 60, 100 and 200, and Metro Conference records in the 100 and 200. Roberson won a gold medal in the 100 in the World University Games and was a member of the gold medal winning 400 meter relay team in the Pan American Games.

In 1980 FSU's greatest team, led by Roberson, finished third in the nation. He won the NCAA 200 meter championship in 19.6, becoming the first human in history to break 20 seconds at sea level. He also picked up second place in the 100 and was a member of FSU's third place 400 meter relay.

This is Florida State



Florida State University, a coeducational institution with an enrollment of 21,500 students, is located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida.

The beautiful 345-acre campus is wrapped in greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with palm trees and moss-hung oaks. The campus looks enough like Ivy League schools, particularly around its older, Gothic buildings, that several times each winter New York

advertising agencies fake summer scenes supposedly shot at Princeton or Harvard. On the west side of campus, the scene is dominated by the contemporary, high-rise science complex.

There are more than 1,300 faculty including four members of the National Academy of Sciences. Florida State is one of only five universities in the nation to have its own supercomputer.

Academic programs in the sciences (notably physics, chemistry, biology and meteorology) and the performing arts (music, theater, visual arts and dance) have high national rankings. Other strong departments among the 15 schools and colleges include criminology, hospitality administration, accounting, statistics and interior design. FSU's pre-med program has a much higher than average medical school placement rate for its graduates.

Today, FSU offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater, visual arts and engineering, which operates in cooperation with Florida A&M University. The most popular majors at FSU are business, biology, computer science and communication.

Florida State has honors programs for its top students. Overseas study program in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Costa Rica, Yugoslavia and the Panama Canal Zone.

Social life for many centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's convenient lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze, on the highwire or in clown acts.

Fine entertainment is provided year-round by the FSU Schools of Music and Theater and the Department of Dance.

Student Campus Entertainment presents concerts, movies, lectures and other activities throughout the year and the Artist Series brings professional entertainers to campus.

Student government at FSU is one of the most powerful in the country. Elected students spend an annual budget of about \$1.7 million. Student government funds intramurals, activities at the Student Union and more than 200 interest organizations.



C.W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM *Athletic Director*

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie," has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference for eight years.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center - home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.

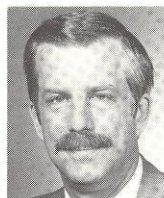


BOB GOIN *Associate Athletic Director*

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fifth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists in the day-to-day operations of the department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game-day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institution's first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



CHARLES W. EHRHARDT *Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman*

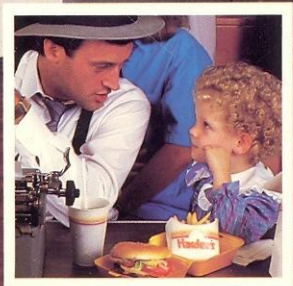
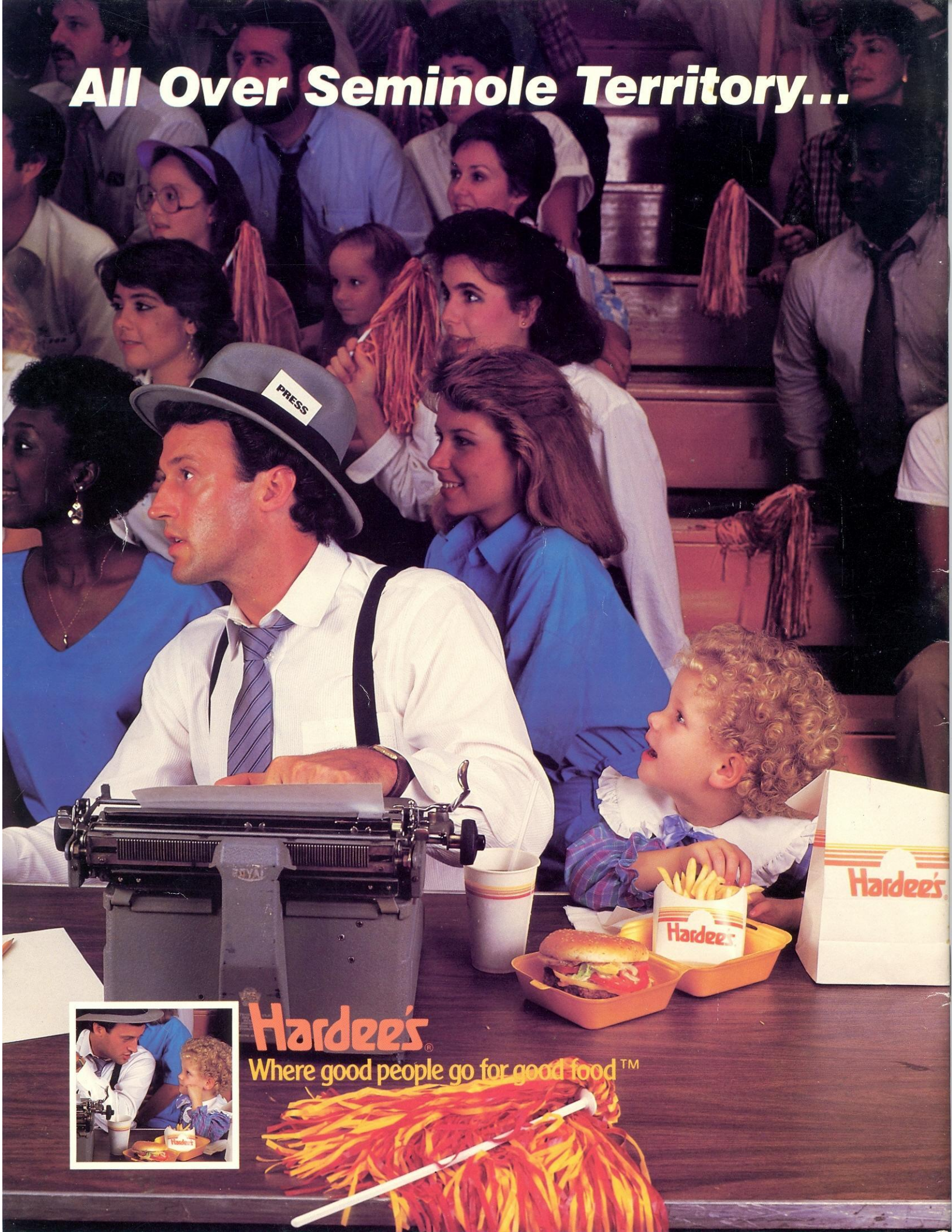
A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his second year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, having served 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeded Dr. James Jones, who held that position since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA and was also president of the Metro Conference in 1984-85.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962 before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

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
