DR. HOWARD G. DANFORD

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Dr. Howard G. Danford heads Florida State University's vast athletic and physical education program. He has served as director of athletics and physical education for men since 1947.

Prior to his arrival at Florida State, Danford served for seven years as director of health, physical education,

and safety in the Madison, Wisconsin, public school system.

Since coming to Florida State University, Danford has seen football rise from a pick-up sport in 1947 to major college status, as well as guiding all other phases of the FSU athletic program, which includes nine varsity sports, a complete physical education and recreation curriculum, and the nationally famous Florida State University Circus, "Flying High," and the equally famous "Gymkana."

The next big step in the overall physical education program will be taken with the completion of FSU's new gymnasium

on the East Campus. When this structure is completed, it will contain all facilities for the men's physical education program.

A graduate of Ohio University, Dr. Danford received his master's and doctorate degrees from New York University in 1943.

Dr. Danford is an author of note, his most recent work being the book "Recreation in the American Community," published in 1953. He has also authored numerous magazine articles and has held prominent positions in several national organizations. He is currently a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Volleyball Association; chairman of the Curriculum Research Committee of the College Physical Education Association; chairman of the Policies Committee of the Federation of National Professional Organizations for Recreation; and chairman of the Florida AAU Volleyball Committee.

One of America's volleyball pioneers, Dr. Danford made an extensive six weeks tour of Germany and France last winter, serving as an instructor for the U. S. Army's 1955 volleyball clinics. Danford made the trip at the request of the Commander in Chief of United States Army, Europe.

Under Dr. Danford's guidance and direction, Florida State's excellent program of intercollegiate athletics has grown in size and stature, and is now becoming recognized as one of the finest in the nation.

Danford's enthusiastic interest in the whole program of intercollegiate athletics at Florida State has resulted in phenomenal achievements made by all Seminole athletic squads in the eight short years Florida State has been engaging in intercollegiate sport.

BASKETBALL

J. K. "BUD" KENNEDY, Coach

J. K. "Bud" Kennedy, beginning his eighth year as FSU head basketball coach this season, faces his most difficult task yet during the 1955-56 campaign.

Against the strongest opposition in Tribe history, Bud must guide this year's team to something approaching the near-perfect record on last season's brilliant squad.

Kennedy's 1954-55 aggregation won 22 while losing only four in grabbing the initial FIBC championship and gaining the quarterfinals of the N.A.I.A. tournament in Kansas City.

Though blessed with a wealth of talent this year, Kennedy still faces a high hurdle—a murderous slate which opens with N. C. State, a perennial power, and includes such giants as Loyola and Georgia. Kennedy will miss All-America Ham Wernke, gone now from active competition with graduation (although he will be back as a Tribe aide.)

Bud was born in a natural basketball setting, at Lawrence

Kansas, right in the heart of the cage country. He attended college at the University of Kansas, Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College, playing basketball at all three institutions. He also was an outstanding football player at Baker and Kansas State Teachers.

Kennedy got his first coaching experience before finishing college. After a successful first year at Baker, he was called to San Diego, California, where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years.

Bud's next coaching job was at Warrensburg, Mo., High School, where he directed basketball, baseball and track with marked success for two years. After he was graduated from Kansas State Teachers, Kennedy's Warrensburg basketball teams went to the Missouri State tournament each year, and advanced as far as the semifinals the second season.

From Warrensburg, Kennedy went to Kansas City, where he supervised physical education in the elementary schools, and at Westport High School. After six years with the Kansas City School System, Bud was appointed Assistant Director of Recreation for the city of Madison, Wis. He stayed at this job for three years, then went into the navy for the next three.

While in the Navy, Kennedy got back to coaching basketball. He tutored teams at the Naval Training Station at Purdue and while overseas at Tubabo, Philippine Islands.

Kennedy came to Florida State as Athletic Business Manager in 1948, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head cage coach the following year.

Coach Kennedy is married—his wife's name is Laura. They have two sons, Hugh and Bob, one granddaughter, Sharon, and one grandson, Kim.

ASSISTANT COACH MIKE LONG

Mike Long, a personable fellow who stepped into the head track coaching shoes last year, begins his third season as assistant Seminole basketball coach. Mike joined the FSU coaching staff two years ago after 10 seasons in Florida's high school ranks.

A graduate of the University of Minnesota (1937), Long was a standout track and field performer there. He won the Regional Olympic pole vault tryout title

in 1936.

For seven years Long was head basketball and assistant football coach at Ft. Myers (Fla.) High. Previously he had coached three years at Sarasota (Fla.) High.

Mike is married—his wife's name is Lois. They have four sons, Steve, 15, Terry, 13, Curtis, 11, and

Jim. 6.

FRESHMAN COACH HAM WERNKE

Han Wernke, FSU's new freshman cage coach, should provide this year's edition of the Baby Seminoles

with plenty of inspiration.

Wernke, a three-time Helms Foundation All-America choice, finished his great career only last year in a blaze of glory. Ham's total points for a career—1,409—is an all-time Tribe record.

Ham is 22 years old and is married.

Dick Artmeier . . . Clarksburg, Ind. Senior forward . . . 6-1 . . . 190 pounds . . . A three-year letterman, Arty is one of the squad's finest rebounders and roughest competitors under the basket . . . Has a sharp one hand push shot . . . especially tough in the clutch, determined defensive man.

Jimmy Oler . . . From Economy, Ind. . . . Senior guard . . . 5-10 . . . 180 pounds . . . Oler, along with the departed Ham Wernke helped man the guard posts on the mythical all-state five . . . one of FSU's greatest cagers, Oler rang up 549 points last season for a school and possible state high . . . A driving type player, Oler has one of the most accurate eyes in basketball . . . his specialty is layups, one hand push shots from outside . . . averaged 21.1 points last season, looking forward to even greater year this season.

Gary Wold . . . Madison, Wis. . . . Senior center . . . 6-7 . . . 210 pounds . . . Difficult to guard, Wold's best shot is his hook, a long lazy shot with remarkable accuracy from a considerable distance out . . . Only FSU starter to wear glasses . . . will probably be FSU's best rebounder this season.

Although listed as a center now, this lean fellow will probably break into the starting lineup as a forward . . . considered one of the Seminoles' most improved players . . . gained aggressiveness last season, should be one of the Tribe's most valuable men.

Ed Wursbach... Daytona Beach... 6-4... 180... One of the Tribe's shorter skyscrapers standing only 6-4, Wursbach is a picturebook type player besides being a threat with either hand... rated as good bet for plenty of duty in this his senior year... plays forward.

GYMNASTICS

HARTLEY PRICE, Coach

Recognized as one of the most competent coaches in the history of gymnastics in the United States, Dr. Hartley Price begins his seventh year as coach of the

nationally-famous Florida State University gymnastics team.

Competing with the best gymnastics talent in the land, Dr. Price has led FSU gymnasts to five national team titles in five seasons, the NCAA and NAAU crowns in 1951 and repeating as NCAA team champion in 1952 after being edged out of a second straight AAU title. In 1954 FSU won the NAAU Championship and again in 1955.

In addition, Dr. Price is credited with developing FSU's Olympic stars Bill Roetzheim and Don Holder, who represented the United States at Helsinki, Finland in 1952.

However, national championships are not exactly new to the Seminole coach. As gymnastics coach at the University of Illinois in the 1930's, his teams won four NCAA titles and twice copped the national AAU crown.

Born in Brisbane, Australia, Dr. Price was an standout athlete in "The Land Down Under" before coming to the United States. In Australia he won a number of gymnastics titles.

After coming to America in the early '20's, Dr. Price entered Springfield College in Massachusetts where he was a member of the gymnastics team. He was graduated from Springfield with a BS in physical education in 1928.

He later studied at the University of Illinois where he received his BS in education in 1929 and his MS in education in 1931. He received his PhD at N.Y.U. in 1945.

During World War II, Hartley served as head of gymnastics and tumbling at the Navy's pre-flight school in Iowa and later at St. Mary's (Calif.) in the same capacity. In addition, he served as coordinator for the Navy's aviation gymnastics program and authored the Navy's official tumbling and gymnastics guide. Author of numerous magazine articles, Dr. Price has been a senior member of the NCAA since 1938.

In 1949, Price was the recipient of a research award from the American Academy of Physical Education and in 1950 was listed in the monthly supplement of Who's Who in America.

Besides heading the competitive side of the gymnastics program at FSU, Price also directs the nationally-famous student Gymkana production which has been presented throughout the Southeast for the past several years. Theme of the 1955-56 Gymkana show is "Latino."

In five seasons at Florida State, Dr. Price has directed his charges to 26 team championships and 207 individual titles.

Price has as his objective to keep FSU among the top ten gymnastics teams in the nation. At that rate he's well on the road to success. Last season his teams finished third in both the NCAA and NAAU championship meets. Since 1951, the Seminoles have never been out of the top five.

Swimming has only been a part of Florida State's collegiate athletic program since 1949, but in the seven years that have intervened, it has developed into one of the university's most consistent winners under the

In seven seasons, Stults' teams have compiled an enviable record of 44 wins, 11 defeats and a tie in dual competition which ranks them among the South's elite. Stults has directed the Seminoles to three undefeated seasons during that span—1951, 1954, and last year—and only three dual losses since 1950. Going into the current campaign, FSU boasts a 21-meet unbeaten skein that dates back to the early stages of the 1953 season.

In 1953-54, the Indian tankmen enjoyed their best season ever. They splashed to nine

straight wins and third place in the Southern Intercollegiate meet; giving FSU the glossiest college mark in the Deep South.

Last season the Tribe won six more straight, grabbing the Florida AAU in the process.

Among Stults' outstanding accomplishments at Florida State has been the development of All-America stars Roger Slater and Ernie Stock. Stock, an all-around ace who's back again this season, was named to the honor squad last year. Slater, star diver on the 1950-51 teams was named to the All-America squad, both those years.

The Stults Era at FSU has also produced some noteworthy team championships. The Seminoles captured the Florida AAU crown in 1951 and have been runners-up twice—1952 and 1953. In 1951, the Indians tied for the Southeastern AAU championship and in 1953 were second in the Southern regional AAU. FSU tied for seventh in the National AAU meet that same year.

Coach Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with an AB degree Bachelor of Arts. After graduation he went directly to Ross High School in Fremont, Ohio, as head swimming coach, where he won the Ohio State championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen also finished third in national competition four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 with the rank of Lt. Commander, "Bim" returned to Ohio State and remained there until coming to Florida State in 1948.

Coach Stults is married; his wife's name is Jeanne. They have one daughter, Susan.

ASSISTANT SWIMMING COACH DICK WELLS

Dick Wells, one of FSU's all-time swimming greats, returns this season to the scene of some of his finest accomplishments to help guide the 1955-56 Tribe tankmen.

Dick participated in the FSU athletic program from 1949-53 before going into the Army. He receives his BS in February and will continue in school to work towards a Masters degree in Recreation.

From Akron, Ohio, Dick holds both the 50 and 100 yard freestyle records at FSU and while in the service was First Army champion in the 100. Wells was Tribe captain in 1951-52 and in 1952-53 seasons.

Dick is married-his wife's name is Doris.

h is undergraduate days at Springfield he lettered in track and football as well as being a member of the Volleyball Club Team for four years. The Volleyball aggregation copped the New England Intercollegiate crown. Odeneal also was a member of the Golf Club and was winner of the annual Senior-Alumni golf trophy during his senior year at Springfield. Besides his sports activities, Coach Odeneal was president of the junior class, member of Alpha Phi Omega, National Scouting Fraternity, and Sigma Delta Psi, honorary athletic fraternity.

Since coming to FSU, Odeneal's teams have won the Florida AAU volleyball title five times, including last season, and were runnerup another time. In 1951 his squad won the Mid-South Open Volleyball tournament, a feat which had never been accomplished by any college team in the sport's history. Nationally, FSU had placed fifth, fourth twice, and third once in the four years previous to last season when the fabulous Seminoles grabbed the NCAA Championship. In 1954-55, the volleyballers were winners of the St. Petersburg Invitation, Knoxville's Smokey Mountain, state AAU, and Southern Intercollegiate Volleyball tournaments. They placed second in the New Orleans Crescent City tournament. Coach Odeneal's volleyballers are known throughout the country for their spirit and fair play.

Coach Odeneal designed the West and East campus FSU golf courses, teaches golf in the service program as well as being an ardent golfer. He is author of many volleyball articles appearing in various national publications and holds positions in the United States Volleyball Association. He is married, his wife's name is Ginny and they have two children, a daughter Cindy and a son, Tommy.
