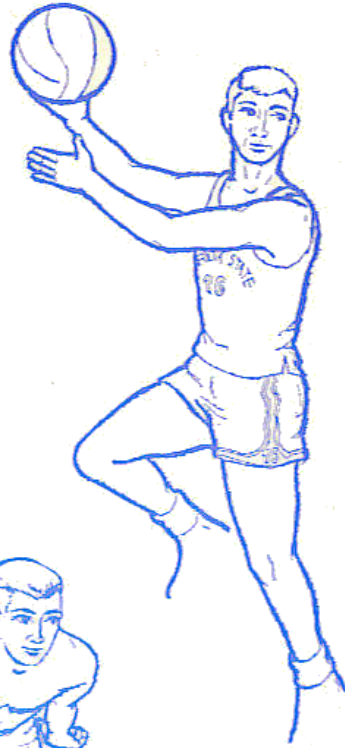

THE FSU ATHLETIC PROGRAM

Growing in stride with booming Florida, The Florida State University boasts one of the most successful athletic programs in the southeastern United States.

It was Florida State College For Women until 1947 when a legislative act made it Florida State University. In the 10 short years since it has evolved an eight-sport program that has been successful in .671 per cent of its contests.

This brochure will deal primarily with the three winter sports—basketball, swimming and gymnastics. The other sports in the program are football, baseball, track, golf and tennis.

A ninth intercollegiate sport — Volleyball — was dropped from the program last year after it won the National Collegiate championship. The reason? Not enough competition in this section of the country.

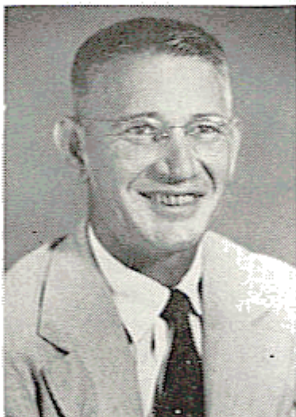

BASKETBALL

J. K. (Bud) KENNEDY, Coach

It's a long, narrow path from the 9-17 record the Seminoles posted last year to becoming probably the best team in Florida State University's short basketball history (10 years).

But with a tall, well-balanced lineup sprinkled with juniors and sophomores, its very possible that is the course FSU fortune will take this year.

Dan Boltz (6-6) and Burt Decle (6-5) are a pair of junior college graduates everyone wanted. They're almost sure starters with the Seminoles this fall.

And junior guard Hugh Durham, who averaged 19.6 points a game last year with one performance of 43 points, is back sharper than ever.

Sophomore guard Jim Savage (6-5) was an outstanding performer on the freshman squad last year and is slated to move all the way up. And senior center Larry Strom (6-6) is due a starting nod.

With definite hopes of an improved team, FSU Coach Bud Kennedy has gone out of his way to provide a tough schedule which will bring Army, Oklahoma City University and Georgia to the home court.

On the road, the Seminoles will meet such teams as Tennessee, Florida, Louisiana State, Marshall College, Xavier, Furman and Memphis State.

Kennedy, who has been the guiding hand behind FSU basketball fortune the past 9 years, was born in a natural basketball setting—at Lawrence, Kansas.

He attended the University of Kansas, Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College. He played basketball at all three schools and was an outstanding football performer at Baker and Kansas State.

Kennedy got his first coaching experience before leaving college at San Diego, Calif., where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years.

Though his next few years, Kennedy coached at various high schools with marked success throughout the midwest. He also coached while serving as a Naval Officer.

Kennedy came to Florida State in 1948 as Athletic Business Manager, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head coach the following season.

MIKE LONG, Assistant Basketball Coach

Mike Long, the assistant basketball coach who spends his springs guiding FSU's track team, begins his fifth year as Coach Kennedy's right hand man.

Mike joined the FSU staff three years ago after ten seasons in the Florida high school athletic circles.

A graduate of the University of Minnesota, Long was a standout track and field performer there. He won the regional olympic pole vault tryout title in 1936.

He was for seven years head basketball coach and assistant football coach at Ft. Myers, Fla., High School. Previously, he coached at Sarasota, Fla., High School.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES

Hugh Durham, guard. Junior from Louisville, Ky. . . . may be the man who makes the Seminoles go . . . set school scoring record for sophomore last year with 509 points, for 19.6 average . . . also set individual game scoring mark with 43 points . . . he'll be the middle man in the offense, and is set for another great year.

Dan Boltz, forward. 6-6 senior from Quincy, Ill. . . . One of two junior college grads from Chipola Junior College . . . a big boy at 235 pounds, he's hard to move and will give the team added board strength . . . has good movements in and around the basket.

Burt Deckel, 6-5 guard from Louisville, Ky. . . . Boltz's teammate at Chipola . . . gives the Seminoles good size on the outside, and is an excellent shot, ranking in the top 20 among junior college boys in field goal percentage.

Tom Garcia, guard. Senior from Fort Myers . . . a returning senior, he is as speedy as they come and one of the best defensive men on the team . . . also an excellent playmaker, with the scrap and desire which make up for his comparatively short stature at 5-8.

Larry Strom, center. Senior from Jacksonville . . . Moved in at a starting post last year after coming here from Jacksonville Junior College . . . Possibly the most accurate shot on the squad, he hit on 51.4% of his shots, finished third in scoring with 240 points . . . He's ready for a banner year.

Jim Liteky, guard. Junior from Jacksonville . . . Has followed Strom here from Jax JC . . . has terrific speed, and is another excellent shot . . . though only 6-2, he's a tough rebounder.

GYMNASTICS

HARTLEY PRICE, Coach

Numbering among the most outstanding gymnastics coaches in the country, Dr. Hartley Price begins his ninth year as coach of Florida State's nationally known team.

Dr. Price has led FSU to five national titles in the past six years. His teams swept the NCAA and NAAU in 1951, repeated as the NCAA team champion in 1952 after being edged out of a second successive AAU title. In 1954, FSU won the AAU title and then repeated again in 1955.

In addition, Price is credited with developing FSU's Olympic stars Bill Roetzheim, Don Holder, Jack Miles and Rafael Lecuona.

FSU isn't the only school at which Price has won national championships. As gymnastics coach at the University of Illinois in the 1930s, his team won four NCAA championships and twice walked off with NAAU titles.

Born in Brisbane, Australia, Dr. Price was a standout athlete in the land down under before coming to the United States. There, he won a number of gymnastics titles.

After coming to the U. S. in the early '20s, he entered Springfield College in Massachusetts where he was a member of the gym team. He graduated from Springfield with a BS in physical education in 1928.

He later studied at the University of Illinois where he received his BS in education in 1929 and his MS in education in 1931. He received his PhD at N.Y.U. in 1945.

During 1945, Price served as head of gymnastics and tumbling at the Navy's pre-flight school in Iowa and later at St. Mary's (Calif.) in the same capacity. In addition, he served as coordinator for the Navy's aviation gymnastics program and authored the Navy's official tumbling and gymnastics guide.

In 1949, Price was the recipient of a research award from the American Academy of Physical Education and in 1950 was listed in the monthly supplement of Who's Who in America.

Be sides heading the competitive side of the gymnastics program at FSU, Dr. Price also directs the nationally-famous student Gymkana production which has become a sought-after show throughout the southeast.

Price has as his objective to keep FSU among the top ten gymnastics teams in the nation. But since 1951, his Seminole outfits have never been out of the top five.

SWIMMING

N. B. (BIM) STULTS, Coach

Florida State's swimming team won 9 of 12 meets last year, making it one of the south's most successful. Yet, the three meets it lost totaled as many as Seminole swimmers had lost altogether in five previous years.

FSU swimming has been that good.

Under Bim Stults, Seminole mermen have compiled an impressive total of 62 victories, 16 defeats and a single tie in dual competition. Stults is entering his ninth season.

Stults has guided the Seminoles through three unbeaten seasons during that span—1951, 1954 and 1955—and only eight dual losses since 1950. At one point, his teams carried a 25-meet winning streak that spread over a three-year period.

Among Stults' outstanding achievements at Florida State has been the development of All-Americans Roger Slater and Ernie Stock. Stock was an all-around ace, specializing in the breast stroke. Slater won his laurels as a diver.

The Stults era at FSU has also produced some noteworthy team championships. The Seminoles have won the Florida AAU the last two years and last year also won the Georgia AAU. In 1951, the Tribe tied for the Southeastern AAU championship and was second in the Southern Regional AAU. FSU tied for seventh in the National AAU meet that same year.

Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with an AB degree. After graduating, he went directly to Ross High School in Fremont, Ohio, as head swimming coach, where he won the Ohio state championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen also finished third in national competition four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 as a Lt. Cmdr., he returned to Ohio State until he came to Florida State in 1948.

ALF KING, Asst. Swimming Coach

Serving for the second straight year as Coach Stults' assistant is a former student of the mermen mentor, Alf King.

King was on Stults' state champion high school team at Fremont High in Fremont, Ohio. After three years in the Navy, King went to Ohio University.

A breaststroke artist, King swam on Central Collegiate and Mid-American Conference championship teams while at Ohio U. He found time to—and still does—play semi-pro baseball during the summers.

Alf came to Florida State after teaching at Fremont High School and is doing graduate work in addition to his coaching efforts.
