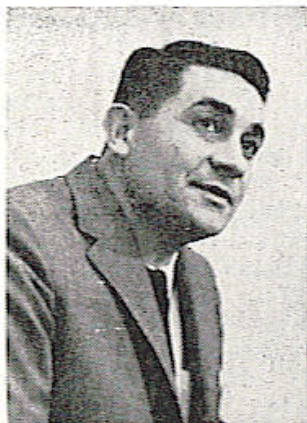

VAUGHN MANCHA

Not many persons have enjoyed such a varied and successful career as Vaughn Hall Mancha, who has devoted inestimable time and energy to athletics as a player, coach, teacher, and administrator.



Practically as legendary in Alabama football circles as Don Hutson and Harry Gilmer, Mancha began his present pursuit as director of Florida State's seven-sport program of intercollegiate athletics in November, 1959. He has tackled his newest role with all the fervor that characterized the performances that made him a 240-pound All-Southeastern Conference center at Alabama for four seasons (1944-1947) and everyone's All-American.

Mancha, who gained wide popularity with FSU officials and fans while serving as line coach from 1952 through 1956, returned to FSU as athletic director following three years at Columbia University as an assistant football coach and associate member of the Department of Physical Education.

Born in Sugar Valley, Ga., in 1921, Mancha moved to Birmingham at an early age. He entered Alabama in 1944, when he was issued jersey No. 41, a number Alabama's football opponents tried to dodge for four years. During Mancha's four seasons, Alabama rolled up a 30-9-2 record and played in three major bowl games. Vaughn was a starter when the Crimson Tide met Duke in the 1945 Sugar Bowl, Southern Cal in the 1946 Rose Bowl, and Texas in the 1948 Sugar Bowl.

He was such a standout in the '45 Sugar Bowl that he was named to the All-Time Sugar Bowl team (1945-52 period). In 1955, he was named to Alabama's All-Time Crimson Tide.

He sandwiched in a year of play with the professional Boston Yankees (1948) while earning B.S. and M.A. degrees at Alabama. In 1949 he accepted an appointment as head coach and athletic director at Livingston (Ala.) State, where he put in a highly successful three-year tenure.

Mancha first came to Florida State in 1952 as an assistant football coach and an assistant professor of Physical Education. In 1957, he left for Columbia, where in addition to his teaching and coaching duties he completed all work for the Doctorate with the exception of the dissertation.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, he is the father of three children: Clare, 12; Nan, 10; and Dit, 2½.

BASKETBALL

J. K. (BUD) KENNEDY, Head Coach

J. K. (Bud) Kennedy moves into his fourteenth year as head basketball coach at Florida State. He has a veteran squad that could be one of the best in FSU's 15 years of basketball. However, the Seminoles face their toughest schedule in history and, as a result, their final record may not be a valid measurement of their overall ability.



Heading a list of seven returning lettermen is All-America candidate forward Dave Fedor. The 6-6 senior from Zephyrhills, Fla. — he played high school basketball in Germany—led the Seminoles in six statistical departments as a sophomore and nine as a junior, establishing all-time school records in rebounding (400) and most field goals in a single game (16). He tied all-time FSU record for most game points (43).

Florida State, which annually plays one of the toughest independent schedules in the South, again will play such impressive opponents as Ohio State (runner-up to Cincinnati in last year's NCAA championship tournament), Wisconsin, Rice, Auburn and Tennessee—to mention a few.

Overall, the Seminoles will play eight Southeastern Conference games during 1961-62—two each with Florida, Georgia and Auburn, one with Alabama and Tennessee. FSU also meets highly-regarded Miami (Fla.) twice.

Kennedy, whose 13 previous Seminole teams have won 162 games and lost 155, was born at Lawrence, Kan.—a natural basketball setting. He attended the University of Kansas, Baker University, and Kansas State Teachers College, playing basketball at all three schools. He was a standout football player at Baker and Kansas State Teachers.

His first coaching experience before leaving college was at San Diego, Calif., where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years. Through his next few years, Kennedy coached various high school teams in the Midwest with marked success. He also coached while serving as a Naval Officer.

Kennedy came to Florida State in 1948 as Athletic Business Manager, assisted in the basketball program that year, and became head coach the following season.

HUGH DURHAM, Assistant Coach

One of the finest basketball guards in Florida State history, Hugh Durham begins his second season as assistant varsity coach. Durham coached the 1959-60 freshman team to a sparkling 8-1 record prior to moving up to the varsity as Coach Bud Kennedy's assistant.

FRED POWERS, Freshman Coach

Fred Powers, a 1959 graduate of FSU, takes over as head freshman coach for his second season. Powers guided the 1960-61 frosh to a record of 5 wins and 5 defeats.

Powers is completing work on a masters degree in education.

The Baby Seminoles will be playing their largest schedule ever—an unprecedented 17 games which includes teams from as far away as Columbia, Ky.

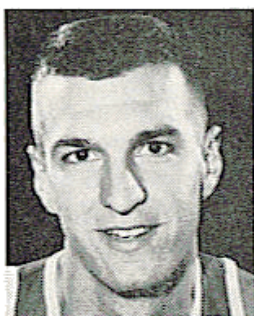

SEMINOLE SHORTS



23—RUFUS ASHWORTH. Senior, Guard, 21, 6-4, 175, Coral Gables. Rufe has been a consistent performer for the Seminoles in his three years of varsity ball. He can play either forward or guard and perform well in either position. The Miami All-City standout is an excellent defensive stalwart. "Ash" was the Tribe's 5th leading scorer last season.

45—FAUREST COOGLE. Sophomore, Forward, 20, 6-3, 185, Louisville, Ky. Faurest gives the Seminoles much needed bench strength. "Coogs" was very instrumental in the Tribe's 63-58 upset victory over Kentucky on the Wildcats home court. Faurest does not have great speed but makes up for that deficiency with desire.

41—WALLY DALE. Sophomore, Guard, 19, 6-0, 176, Coral Gables. Wally is a sophomore who was held out last year for more seasoning. A possessor of quick hands—Dale should give the Seminoles depth at guard. Wally gets off his jump shot exceptionally fast.



11—JACK DAVIS. Senior, Guard, 22, 6-0, 155, Hagerstown, Ind. The playmaking of the "redhead" has sparked many FSU victories in the last two years. Jack has good hands, is an excellent dribbler and can drive with the best of them. One of the best defensive guards around—Davis was the fourth leading scorer for the Tribe last year.



25—TIM EDNEY. Senior, Guard, 182, Montgomery, Ala. Tim is one of the strongest men on the squad. A lefthander—Edney is at his best around the basket—either on a drive or on twisting layups underneath. His experience makes Tim a valuable man to have around.

21—BOB EK. Sophomore, Forward, 20, 6-3, 170, Jacksonville. A possessor of the shortest name in basketball—Bobby was held out last year to gain more experience running the Seminole shuffle. Ek has a good jump shot and with game experience could be one of the Tribe's better performers.



43—DAVE FEDOR. Senior, Forward, 21, 6-6, 192, Zephyrhills. Dave is probably the best basketball player in Seminole history. Basically a lefthander who can do most anything on a basketball court with either hand, Fedor is amazingly consistent. Over a two year period (49 games)—Fedor has never failed to score in the double figures. The honorable mention All-American has been praised by opposing coaches from Ohio to Miami (Fla.). Auburn coach Joel Eaves said, "Fedor is a tremendous ballplayer—a good shooter, a good ballhandler—he can do about anything you want done. He's a real fine pro prospect—he can face the bucket." Ohio State's Fred Taylor said, "My assistant coach told me before the game that Fedor was the best corner man we would face all year. I got shook up just looking at his field goal percentage." Fedor hit eight out of 10 from the field against the Buckeyes while holding All-American Jerry Lucas to 11 points—the second lowest of Lucas's collegiate career. As a sophomore, Fedor averaged over 21 points a game while pulling down 400 rebounds. Last year Dandy Dave hit over 50 per cent of his field goal attempts while hauling in 456 rebounds. The 6-6 lefthander was named the most valuable player in the 1959 Gator Bowl Tournament. Dave is co-captain of the Seminoles for the second straight year.

13—CHARLIE LONG. Junior, Forward, 20, 6-4, 190, Louisville, Ky. Charlie has one of the best outside shots on the Seminole squad. A scrapper on the boards—Long was the third leading scorer for the Tribe last season. During his freshman season the Eastern high product led the squad in scoring by averaging 25 points a game while hitting over 62 per cent of his field goal attempts.

35—BOBBY LOVELL. Sophomore, Guard, 19, 6-2, 190, Chattanooga, Tenn. Lovell is the only player from last year's freshman team to make the varsity. Bobby averaged 20 points a game last year while hitting 50 per cent of his shots from the field. Lowell has good size and hands—with game experience he could help the Seminoles.

15—DALE REEVES. Sophomore, Center, 20, 6-7, 230, Louisville, Ky. Dale is the biggest player on the squad and uses his size to advantage. Known to the squad as "big'un", Dale was held out last year to gain more experience. Counted on to relieve Swain and Fedor for board strength—Reeves is counted on heavily for the future.

31—DALE RICKETTS. Junior, Guard, 20, 6-2, 170, Versailles, Ind. Ricketts has the potential of being one of the finest guards in Seminole history. A deft ballhandler—the lefthanded slickster is at his best under and around the basket. He possesses a fine jump-shot along with his exceptional passing.



33—RAY SWAIN. Senior, Center, 21, 6-4, 190, Jacksonville. Ray is co-captain of the squad and one of the finest centers in Seminole history. The "swisher" as he is known to the squad led the Tribe last year in field goal percentage—hitting nearly 54 per cent—setting a school record in that department. The Landon high product averaged over 17 points a game last year while hauling in 418 rebounds. Ray is small as college centers go but he makes up for it with desire—always hustling. The "swisher" was All-State at Landon. Ray has made many important points and hauled in many key rebounds for the Seminoles, the past two seasons.

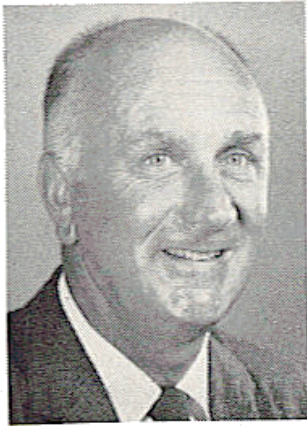

SWIMMING

N. B. (BIM) STULTS, Head Coach

Florida State's swimming team opens its fourteenth year under the leadership of Coach N. B. (Bim) Stults with a phenomenal record of 99 wins, 18 losses, and two ties in dual meet competition. That is a championship percentage of .840.



This impressive record marks FSU's swimmers as one of the outstanding collegiate squads in the nation. The Seminoles swept past nine out of ten opponents last year, losing only to Southern Methodist (a team which spoiled an unbeaten skein for the Tribe in 1959).

Stults has guided the Seminoles through four undefeated seasons—1951, 1954, 1955, and 1960 — and only eleven dual losses since 1950. At one point his teams carried a 25-meet streak that spread over three seasons.

Among Stults' outstanding achievements at Florida State has been the development of five All-Americans, one of whom (diver Curt Genders) captured the national low board NCAA diving championship last year. Unfortunately, Genders graduated the same year. The only other All-American from last year's squad—Buck Hiles—was also lost through graduation. Other All-Americans to swim for FSU were Bob Weber, diver, 1959 and 1960; Ernie Strock, breaststroke, 1954, and Roger Slater, diver, 1950 and 1951.

Stults' 13-year reign at Florida State also has produced some noteworthy team championships. The Seminoles won the inaugural Florida Intercollegiate championship in 1959, then came back to win in 1960 and again in 1961. They won the Florida AAU title from 1956 through 1958 and the Georgia AAU crown in 1957, 1958, 1960, and 1961.

Stults was graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with a B.A. degree. He went directly to Ross High School in Fremont, Ohio, as head swimming coach, where his teams won the Ohio state championship five times and were runners-up twice. His Ross High swimmers finished third in national competition on four occasions.

In 1939, Bim served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving as a Lt. Comdr. in the Navy from 1942 through 1946, he returned to Ohio State until he came to Florida State in 1948.

DEE EDINGTON, Assistant Coach

A former All-America swimmer at Michigan State, Dee Edington is in his third year as assistant coach under Bim Stults.

The 23-year-old product of Huntington, Ind., national YMCA breaststroke champion in 1959, helped Michigan State win the Big Ten championship in 1957 and to earn second and third-place national finishes in 1958 and 1959, respectively.

Edington was voted the outstanding freshman swimmer in 1956 while setting a Big Ten freshman record in the 200-yard breaststroke. He earned All-America recognition in the long-distance freestyle (14 miles) event in 1955.

Edington has guided the FSU freshmen to a 9-4 record in the two seasons he has coached the Baby Seminoles. A holder of numerous medals and trophies, he is completing graduate work in the Department of Physical Education.
