1981-82 WOMEN'S BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

After a 14-15 record a year ago, Florida State head coach Janice Dykehouse has her top ten players back to go along with a fine freshman and a bevy of talented walk-ons who could make room for themselves on the roster.

While Florida State lacked experience last year, that area should be a plus this time around.

"This is the first time we have more upperclassmen and returning players since I've been here," she says. "We have talent and if things fall in place for us, we could make tremendous strides. But again, each game will be challenging since every team in the nation is now recruiting aggressively and the talent is more widespread.

"Last year we had eight new players on our roster and we fell short of our expectations. I attribute a lot of that to the youth and newness of that team."

Soph forward Sue Galkantas is the most talked about returning player, and with good reason. As a freshman, the 6-0 Galkantas scored at a 21.6 clip—among the nation's top 20 in that category, pulled down almost 10 rebounds a game and was second on the squad in assists.

Galkantas was selected to the National Sports Festival's South squad following her banner freshman season but could not participate after having minor surgery on her knee. With a full recovery, Galkantas should find herself in the limelight again this season.

Also returning to starting positions are 6-0 senior forward Laine Lasseter and junior guard Lisa Foglio. Lasseter is second on the all-time FSU points list and returns with averages of 13.1 and 5.6. She was the squad's leading percentage shooter, canning 52 percent of her attempts.

Foglio is coming off a gimpy knee which held her out of the last two games of the 80-81 campaign. She was named all-state after averaging 12.7 points and just over 3.5 assists.

Dykehouse has others who contributed off the bench last year. Guard Sunnie O'Neal, a midseason transfer, averaged 3.6 assists and provided speed in the backcourt. Glenda Stokes, a 6-0 center, averaged six points and 6.4 rebounds while first-year player LeeVayn Oliver averaged five points and an equal number of rebounds. Three year letterwinner Linda Gray (5.5 ppg) also returns.

Dykehouse went after quality in lieu of quantity and originally signed just two prospects. One of them, Betty Edmonson, a 6-2 Parade All-America, informed Dykehouse before school started that she wanted to enroll in the Army. "I'll make no bones about it," said Dykehouse. "Losing Betty hurt. We had expected to make tremendous strides in our program and she was a big part of those plans. But she's not with us and we'll carry on. We still have the talent and desire to improve upon last year."

Dykehouse also added the name of Joye Burroughs, an all-state player from Belle Glade, Fla., to the list. "Joye has great body control to go along with speed and quickness," says the third-year coach. "She can help us out in full court pressure situations as well as add a scoring threat. She has great potential to become a quality point guard."

Every position should be more solid for the Seminoles this season. At guard, Dykehouse has two fine players in Foglio and O'Neal and the addition of Burroughs will give much-needed speed to that area. Also figuring here is Lynn Marnie, a part-time starter last year, walk-on transfer Meg Fahey and soph Jill Baker. "We're above average in our ability to score from this position," says Dykehouse. "We'll be able to penetrate more and be more diversified in what we can do."

The front court is stable and should be the most productive offensive area. Galkantas and Lasseter are two proven players and both are bona fide scoring threats. In addition to that duo, walk-on Nancy Galkantas, older sister of Sue, will provide depth. Sophomore LeeVayn Oliver showed promise as a freshman and could challenge at the forward swing slot while Linda Gray helps off the bench.

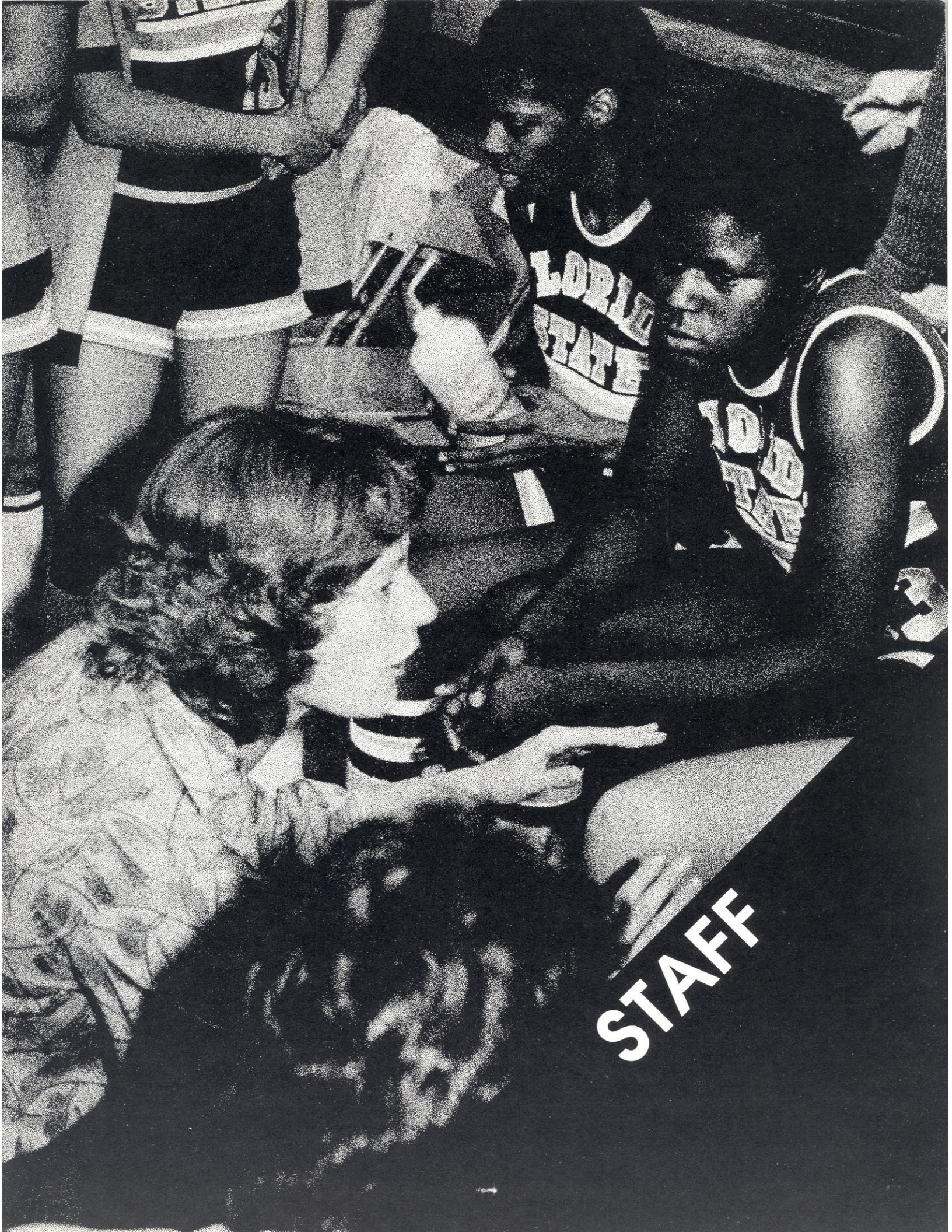
"I think one of the biggest differences in our forwards and centers will be our defensive capabilities," says Dykehouse. "We're quicker and we've got people who are starting to understand the fundamentals of not just one type of defense, but many."

While the talent and experience have improved, so has the schedule. Florida State, working towards an eventual round robin series within the Metro Conference, has scheduled every Metro school but Cincinnati. Add to that three tough tournaments: the Lady Sunshine Classic, the Purdue Boilermaker Classic and the Hurricane New Year's Classic. The Lady Sunshine field includes WNIT champion Georgia, McNeese State and Valdosta State. At Purdue, FSU will see a host of strong midwest teams while Miami has also drawn some top teams for its tourney.

Topping that part of the schedule are games with top 20 Old Dominion and South Carolina.

"We've scheduled more home games this season with more of a range of talent involved," says Dykehouse. "We have seven doubleheaders in the new Leon County Civic Center and another six in Tully Gym. We don't go on the road as much and that will be an asset for us."

When Dykehouse took over the program at Florida State, folks considered the Seminoles to be in the top 200 teams around the country. Last year, the top 100 list included Florida State. In a preseason Street and Smith outlook, Florida State is now mentioned in the top 50. This is the direction Janice Dykehouse has in mind for the Florida State program.

Janice Dykehouse
Head Basketball Coach

Janice Dykehouse enters her third season as head basketball coach of the Florida State Seminoles. In two previous seasons, her teams have compiled a 27-37 record. Last season, she coached the squad to a 14-15 record.

When Dykehouse was hired by Florida State for her first head coaching assignment, she brought with her both playing and coaching experience.

The Grand Rapids, Mich. native enjoyed four years of varsity collegiate basketball in addition to several years of AAU and international ball. She first attended Grand Rapids Junior College, playing there for two seasons while helping lead the squad to the national tournament where it finished as high as fourth.

Her collegiate career continued at Grand Valley State College where she saw her teams compile records of 22-6 and 16-6. Her senior team finished third in the region, beating teams such as Ohio State, Michigan State, Michigan and Illinois State. She carried a game average of 15 points and 11 rebounds. In 1976, Dykehouse graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Dykehouse's playing career continued as she played center-forward for the AAU Allentown Crestettes in 1976. With Dykehouse averaging 16 points, the Crestettes finished fifth in the nation.

She finished her playing career as a player-coach for Union Sportive Vierzon, a French National Team. The senior team on which she participated had a 22-4 record and won the division title. Dykehouse averaged 22 points. She also coached the junior team to an undefeated season.

Prior to accepting the job at Florida State, Dykehouse was an assistant coach for the University of Denver where she worked on a master's degree in sports science.

Dykehouse also has previous coaching experience at the American School in Paris, Lehigh University (Pa.) and Spring Lake (Mich.) High School.

She currently serves on the selection committee for both the Wade Coach of the Year and

Player of the Year awards, representing Region III.

Dykehouse, only the second full-time women's basketball coach at Florida State, runs her own summer camp at FSU. Last summer some 275 youngsters enrolled, making it Florida's largest summer basketball camp.

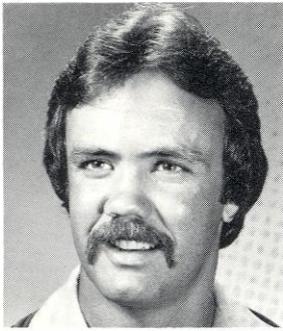
Dykehouse's philosophy at FSU is simple. "I want my players to be highly competitive on the floor, yet well-rounded off the court," she says. "I want them to be poised and to be ladies."

She wants them to be students, too. "If someone on my team gets a failing grade on a test, they don't play the next game. The first role is as a student. Then they are basketball players. If they can't do both, they shouldn't play."

"When my players graduate from FSU, I want them to be productive members of society," she concludes.

DENNIS McNELIS
Assistant Coach

Dennis McNelis is in his second year as assistant to Janice Dykehouse. McNelis came to Florida State by way of Clemson University where he was head volleyball and assistant basketball coach for two seasons. While at Clemson, the volleyball team had a two-year record of 61-23 and won the state championship. The Lady Tiger basketball squad was consistently in the nation's top twenty.

McNelis, 32, also has coaching experience at the high school level. He coached at Walsingham Academy in Williamsburg, Va.

for three years, leading his girl's basketball team to the Catholic League state title in 1976 and earning Coach of the Year honors.

At Poquoson High School in Virginia, McNelis' squads were the state champions and state runners-up with 25-0 and 26-1 records. During his tenure, Poquoson set the Virginia record for most consecutive wins with 76. He was named Kellogg's Coach of the Year in Virginia in 1976.

All told, McNelis' five-year high school coaching career record shows a neat 99-18 log.

McNelis is a 1971 graduate of Belmont Abbey College where he received his bachelor's degree in sociology. He obtained a Master's of Education in Personnel Services from Clemson in May, 1980.

McNelis' responsibilities as Dykehouse's assistant include coaching the defense, fast break and guards. He is the coordinator of Florida State's recruiting efforts.



Cherry Rivers
Part-time Coach

Florida State's all-time leading scorer, Cherry Rivers, is in her first year as a graduate assistant for her alma mater.

Rivers played for the Seminoles between 1976 and 1980. Her 1,636 point total is an FSU school record and her career scoring average of 15.9 is third on the all-time list. She is also the school's all-time leading rebounder with 1,029.

Following her career at FSU, Rivers went to Venezuela where she played semi-pro ball. Two months later, she was drafted in the fifth round by the Chicago Hustle of the now-defunct W.B.A., and played there a short time.

She returned to Miami, her hometown, where she was an assistant coach for Miami Dade South Junior College for the 1980-81 basketball season. Dade South won the Division I junior college state championship and had a 22-5 record.

Rivers returned to FSU last spring and received her bachelor's degree in Counseling, Health and Rehabilitation.



Heidi Owen
Graduate Assistant Coach

After a four-year varsity basketball career, Heidi Owen has joined the Florida State coaching staff as a graduate assistant.

A native of Staten Island, N.Y., Owen lettered in basketball two years at Wagner College before transferring to East Carolina for her final two years of eligibility. She was a part-time starter and earned two letters at ECU. She graduated in 1981 with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

Owen has spent her summers coaching at basketball camps since 1976. She has been on the staff of Pat Kennedy's Poconos Camp and has also been on Kennedy's eastern coast tour.

Owen's duties include monitoring the weight training and academic progress of the athletes in addition to coordinating travel arrangements and budget.

She is presently working on a master's degree in business.

C. W. "Hootie" Ingram Director of Athletics



C. W. Hootie Ingram is in his first year as athletic director at Florida State. Assuming his post on January 16, 1981, Ingram brings to Florida State an outstanding reputation as athletic administrator.

Prior to accepting the Florida State post, Ingram worked with the prestigious Southeastern Conference for eight years/first as an assistant commissioner and then as an associate commissioner since 1978.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played football for the University of Alabama from 1951-54. Following a stint in the army after graduation from college, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years in the high school ranks, Ingram moved into college coaching. He served as an assistant coach at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas. He assumed the Head coaching job at Clemson University in 1970 and remained there for three years before joining the SEC.

While with the SEC, Ingram's duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpretations and eligibility.

Barbara Palmer Women's Athletic Director



As the women's athletic director at Florida State since 1977, Barbara Palmer has been instrumental in the development of women's athletics at FSU to the point that the Lady Seminole athletic program is regarded as one of the finest in the country.

Only one women's team has experienced a losing record in the last two years, while two teams—golf and volleyball won their respective national championships in 1981.

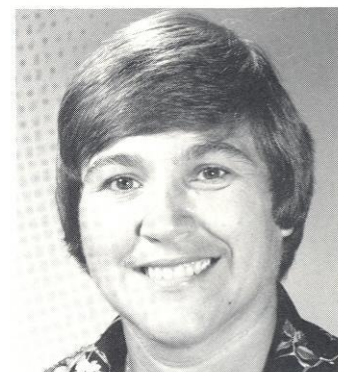
Palmer's duties as women's athletic director includes the hiring of coaches, preparation of budgets, monitoring of scheduling and travel and raising of funds. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

Palmer is currently president of Region III of the AIAW.

This Is Florida State

Florida State University—The home of more than 22,500 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex on the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges offer students the opportunity to pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer

programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of Florida State in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

One such program at Florida State is the Policy Sciences Center. It combines teaching and research in politics, economics and other social sciences to provide information and analysis for state government leaders, including the Governor, the Legislature and agency staff members. Already achieving national prominence, the Center studies and evaluates such topics as taxation, economic development, population, land use, family planning and human resources. Surveys conducted by the Center help legislators and others assess trends and changes in public opinion.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. The Florida State nuclear physics laboratory is ranked one of the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation. Because of this ranking, it has been recommended for higher funding.

Florida State is also the home of the Flying High Circus, the only collegiate circus in the United States. The Circus has delighted audiences the world over with breathtaking, highly-skilled performances that rival professional circuses. The student performers have earned a national reputation as a high-caliber student troupe. Their traveling show is primarily an aerial and stage presentation with approximately 90 students performing during a two-hour show.

Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center

A dream since the 1970's, Florida State basketball will finally have a new arena to play in when the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center opens its doors for the 1981-82 season.

The brick, steel and cement structure will provide seating for 13,500 basketball fans and will allow Florida State the opportunity to attract many of the top basketball schools in the nation.

The new 34 million dollar project will be the home of the women's team although games will still be played in historic Tully Gym from time to time.

PARKING—Limited to the Leon County Civic Center lot and the FSU Law Library. For games in Tully Gym, there should be ample parking in the lot.

PHOTOGRAPHERS—Accredited photographers, upon presenting a photo pass, will be allowed to shoot under both baskets in the Leon County Civic Center. At Tully Gym, all that is required is that your name be on the press list at the gym entrance.

RADIO—Sections are reserved in the crows booth in the Leon County Civic Center and above the court in Tully Gym.

PHONES—Telephone service is available in both the Leon County Civic Center and in Tully Gym. Should you need an individual line, it can be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Tallahassee. Call 904/222-2236 and have them contact the Sports Information Office for location.

SERVICES—Half-time stats and final stats will be provided to the media.
