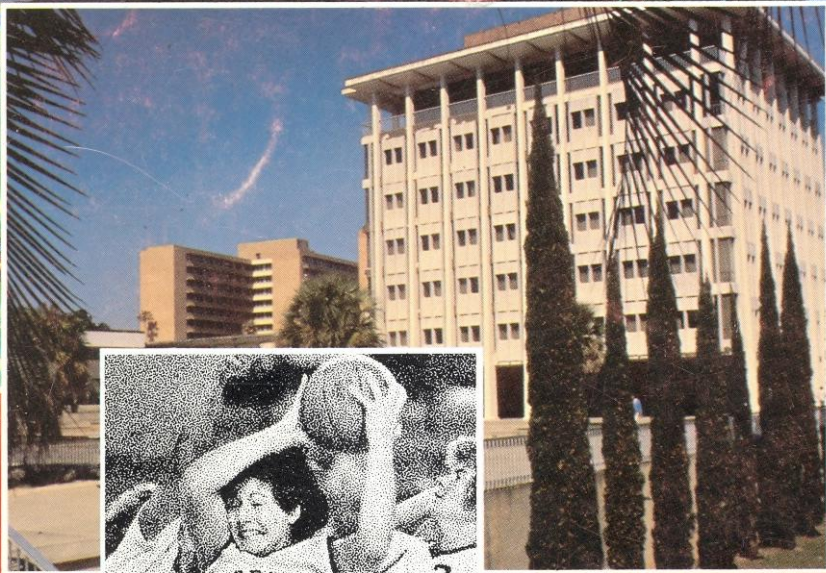
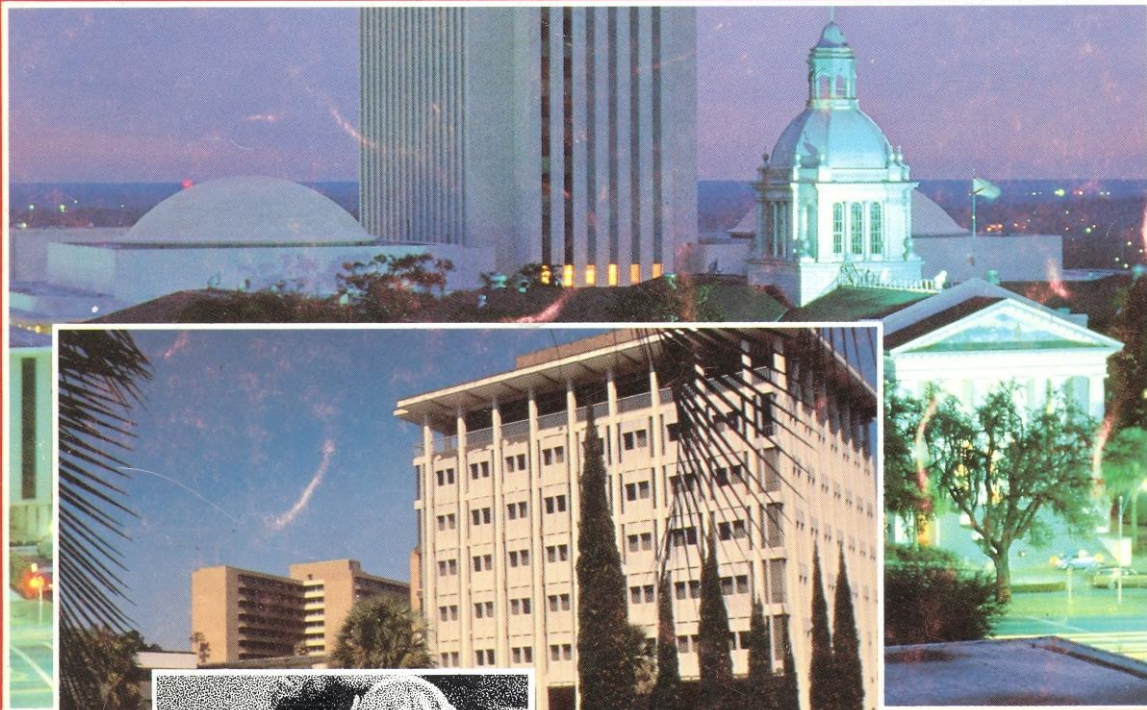

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. Interviews

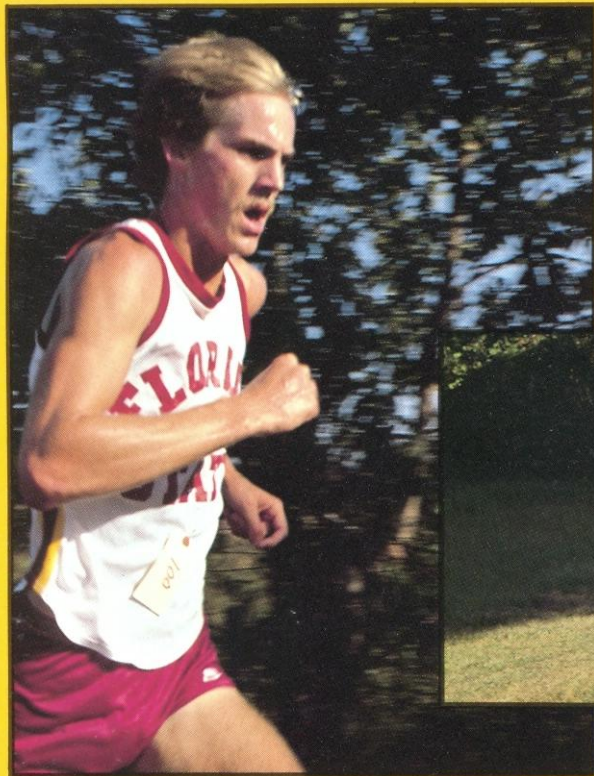

This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

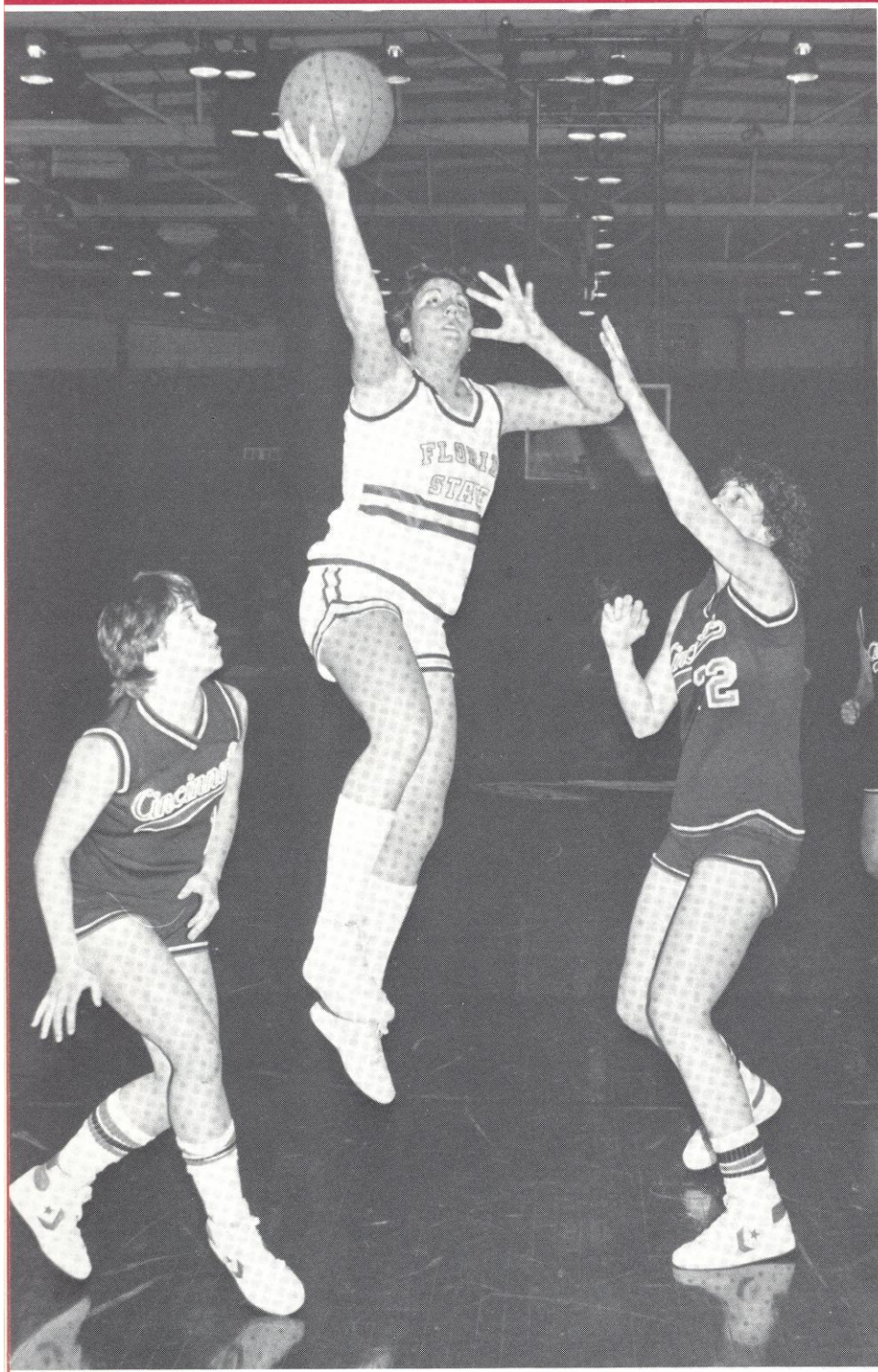

OUTLOOK '85

Although most coaches would panic at the thought of fielding such a young team, Dykehouse-Allen looks forward to the challenge the upcoming season will bring.



When Florida State opens its 1984-85 season on November 14 against Albany State, FSU head coach Jan Dykehouse-Allen will put a team on the floor that has only one player with more than one year's experience in the Lady Seminole program.

Although most coaches would panic at the thought of fielding such a young team, Dykehouse-Allen looks forward to the challenge the upcoming season will bring.

FSU, which is coming off a 13-18 year that was filled with tragedy, injury and an ambitious schedule, will be looking for vast improvement this season.

"Going into last year, I thought we looked good on paper," Dykehouse-Allen said. "But things began to happen. We lost a great player in Brenda Cliette because she wanted to concentrate on track; while another starter was lost to academic difficulties. Injuries kept two other starters out during several stretches of the season. I'm not making excuses, but we had our share of misfortune."

On the positive side, Florida State returns five players that were either full or part-time starters over the course of last season. All but one were freshmen which should provide the Seminoles with a solid starting point in '85 and for the years to come.

Leading the way is sophomore Lorraine Rimson. A freshman All-America pick last season, Rimson averaged close to 15 points and nine rebounds per contest and was the team's leading rebounder in 16 of 31 games.

At shooting guard, FSU returns two excellent players in senior Celia Slater and sophomore Lori Smith. Coming off an ankle injury which caused her to miss several games, Slater averaged 7.3 points per contest. Playing just 21 minutes per game, Smith added almost nine points per game.

Sheri Kaminski gives the Seminoles a solid returning starter at the all important point guard position. Playing close to 30 minutes a game, Kaminski averaged six points and five assists per contest - finishing third in the Metro Conference in that category. She also had a team high 55 steals.

Rounding out the list of returning players is 6-2 sophomore center Linda-Ann McGowan. Used mainly in reserve, McGowan underwent an intense off-season conditioning program and should improve her scoring (3.9) and rebounding (2.9) statistics significantly.

Although five solid veterans return, Florida State must get immediate production from its newcomers if the Lady Seminoles are to improve on last year's record.

Much of this help should come from its front court players. Junior Felicia Black, a 6-0 junior transfer from Pensacola Junior College, may be the answer at small forward. Black had an outstanding freshman year at Pensacola Junior College, but missed most of last year with a knee injury. She appears fully rehabilitated and should challenge for a starting position. Gussie Clark, a second team all-state performer from Clinch County High School in Homerville, Georgia, will also see action at forward.

One area that FSU has needed help at since the graduation of Glenda Stokes in 1982 is center. All-state

selection Sarah Hall, a 6-2 freshman from Manatee High School, will team with McGowan to give FSU solid depth. FSU's center position was also bolstered with the addition of walkon transfer Terry McCarty, a 6-1 all-star from Brattleboro Union High in Vermont.

At guard, FSU will have several young prospects providing depth to the veterans. To compliment Kaminski, Dykehouse-Allen signed all-state point guard Jan Piatnik out of Lakewood High in St. Petersburg. Piatnik averaged 15 points and eight assists last year.

Bev Burnett of Tallahassee's Rickard High School (28 points per game) will be one three players looking for time at the shooting guard position.

Another all-Big Bend performer is Val Garrett. A first year player out of Grand Ridge High School, Garrett was the team's MVP for the last four years and was a *USA Today* all-state selection.

In January, one additional player will become eligible. Penny Stone transfers from the University of Clemson, where she played two years. Stone, a member of the United States Olympic handball team, was a standout player at Johnsonville High School in South Carolina where she averaged 29 points and 12 rebounds per game. Stone could see action at either guard or forward.

Although FSU will not face a schedule as difficult as the one in 1984, this year will be a stern test for the Lady Noles. Conference contenders South Carolina, Memphis State, Louisville and Cincinnati appear on the 27-game slate, as well as top 20 powers Auburn and Tennessee. In addition, the '85 slate features a home and home series with SEC power Florida and a matchup with Colorado.

"Although our schedule is not as difficult as last season's, it is not an easy one," Dykehouse-Allen says. "I believe it's a fair, quality schedule but one in which we will have to play well to win our share of games. In terms of comparison, I believe it falls in the top 40 nationally in toughness.

"Our team is a young one, but I am looking forward to the challenges this season will be bringing. We have some good athletes, but it will depend on the amount of time it takes to gel as a team."

Jan Dykehouse-Allen
Head Coach

Jan Dykehouse-Allen enters her sixth year as head coach of the Lady Seminole basketball program. In that time period, Florida State has risen to the status of nationally recognized power.

The climb to the top was a swift one for FSU under Dykehouse-Allen. Taking over a program that had a hard time winning at the regional level, Dykehouse-Allen quickly taught the Lady Seminoles how to win and win frequently.

In only her third season, Dykehouse-Allen led FSU to a 28-10 record and a second place finish in the National Women's Invitational Tournament - the first time a Florida State women's basketball team appeared in any type of national tournament.

One year later, the 1983 Lady Seminoles realized several dreams. Several times over the course of that season, Florida State appeared in the Associated Press Top 20 poll. An appearance in the NCAA national championship tournament fulfilled another goal. That team finished with a 24-6 record.

Despite a 13-18 rebuilding last year last season, Florida State's record over the past three years still stands at a sparkling 67-34 - good for a .663 winning percentage against schedules that compare with the hardest in the country.

Dykehouse-Allen's coaching abilities have been recognized at the national level. She has been nominated as "Coach of the Year" by several publications and was voted "Florida Women's Basketball Coach of the Year" in 1982. Dykehouse-Allen serves on several important



committees, including the NCAA regional selection committee, the Mel Greenberg top 20 coaches poll, and the Wade Trophy selection committee.

Perhaps the greatest testimony of Dykehouse-Allen's coaching style came from former player Sue Galkantas - who finished her career last season with over 2000-points.

In an interview last winter, Galkantas said "When I came here as a freshman, the program was down. Some of the older players treated the game as a joke. Something to do. I was impressed with the way Coach Dykehouse handled the situation. She was intent on building a winner and I knew I wanted to be a part of that atmosphere. Looking back, I made the right decision."

A quick glance at Dykehouse's background reveals the reason for success. She possesses a wealth of experience as both a teacher and student of the game.

After a fine career at Grand Rapids Junior College, Dykehouse-Allen transferred to Grand Valley State College where she paced her squad to a 38-12 mark over two seasons. Averaging 12 points and 11 rebounds per game, she led her team to a 22-6 mark her senior season.

Following graduation with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Dykehouse-Allen went on to play one season of AAU ball in Allentown, Pa. before concluding her career with Union Sportive Vierzon - a French national team. The senior team she played on finished with a 22-4 record. She also coached the junior team to an undefeated season.

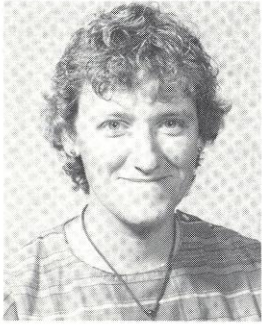

In addition to coaching duties with Vierzon, Dykehouse-Allen's credentials included stops at Lehigh University (PA), American High School in Paris, and Spring Lake High School (MI), before moving to the University of Denver where she served as assistant basketball coach.

Dykehouse-Allen left Denver in 1979 to become FSU's third varsity basketball coach.

The 30-year-old coach hopes the successes of the past couple of years have laid a foundation for the future. "Our chief priority is for every player we recruit to earn a marketable degree from Florida State. Within that frame work, we also want to have a winning program and allow each athlete to develop to her highest potential.

"If our program accomplishes both these goals, I will consider our program successful."



Kelly Jordan

Assistant Coach

In her first year in the Lady Seminole basketball program is Assistant Coach Kelly Jordan.

As assistant coach, Jordan is responsible for monitoring the academic progress of the Lady Seminole basketball team, as well as handling the guards and situation zone offenses. In addition, Jordan is in charge of travel and several other administrative matters as assigned by the head coach.

Jordan comes to Florida State after spending the last six years at Stetson University as head basketball coach. While at Stetson, Jordan guided the Lady Hatters from Division II to Division I status. She was named Florida AIAW Coach of the Year in both 1980 and 1981.

In addition to coaching the basketball team, Jordan also served as head softball coach from 1978 to 1981. For the past six years, Kelly was the women's athletics coordinator for the university.

A 1976 graduate of Wake Forest University, Jordan lettered in both basketball and volleyball. Following graduation with a degree in physical education and health, Jordan remained at her alma mater as one year as graduate assistant coach in volleyball and basketball before being elevated to assistant coach in both sports where she served for an additional year.

Jordan's coaching experience also includes a year of work at the prep level.

A member of several committees, including the Stayfree Coach of the Year and Parade All-American selection committee, Jordan has worked several camps; including serving as associate director of the Stetson Basketball School from 1981 to 1983.

Jordan, 30, has also been the featured speaker at several basketball clinics around the state.



Wayne Allen

Assistant Coach

Wayne Allen, an outstanding prep coach for nearly a decade, is the newest member of the Florida State Lady Seminole coaching staff.

As an assistant to Coach Dykehouse-Allen, Wayne's main responsibilities include recruiting, development of the post position and defensive zones coach.

A 1975 graduate of Bethune Cookman College, Allen spent one year as a player for the Kansas City Chiefs professional football team, before joining the

coaching staff and faculty at Ocala's Vanguard High School.

In nine years at Vanguard, Allen wore various coaching hats including head girls' coach, assistant coach for the boys' team and head volleyball coach.

As coach of the girls' team, Allen directed Vanguard to back-to-back state championships in 1982 and 1983. His 1984 team went 28-6, winning the district, regional and sectional championships before bowing in the state semi-finals - just two wins away from an unprecedented third straight championship. His record over the last two years stands at a sparkling 55-10.

In eight years as the boys' assistant, Vanguard compiled a 134-38 record and claimed state championships in 1978, '79 and '80.

His volleyball teams were 115-12 overall and reached the state semifinals three times.

A staff member of several collegiate summer camps, Allen was selected state 3A Coach of the Year in 1982, and also was selected to coach in several all-star games. He repeated as Coach of the Year in 1983.

In addition to his degree in education, Allen has completed 18 hours of work towards a master's degree at Nova University.



Terri Hartmann

Graduate Assistant Coach

A former basketball star with the University of Florida, Terri Hartmann begins her first year on the Lady Seminole basketball staff. Hartmann, 23, played and lettered four seasons with the Lady Gators before earning her bachelor's degree in physical education in December of 1983.

As graduate assistant coach, Hartmann will assist Coach Dykehouse-Allen with practices, scouting, and other administrative duties as assigned.

Hartmann brings solid credentials to her new post, working several summer camps as a coach, including stops at the Pocono Invitational Girl's Basketball Camp (Pennsylvania), Florida State University Basketball Camp in 1983, Florida Lady Gator Basketball Camp (1979-82) and Buz Narbut's Girl's Basketball Camp in Bradenton, Florida (1981).

As a player, Hartmann was selected as most improved player on the squad in her sophomore season and was also selected to the first-team of the 1983 All-Academic Southeast Conference.

A native of New Port Richey, Florida, Hartmann was a standout athlete in three sports at Hudson High School - earning several athlete of the year awards.

An honor student throughout high school and college, Hartmann was active in several honor societies and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

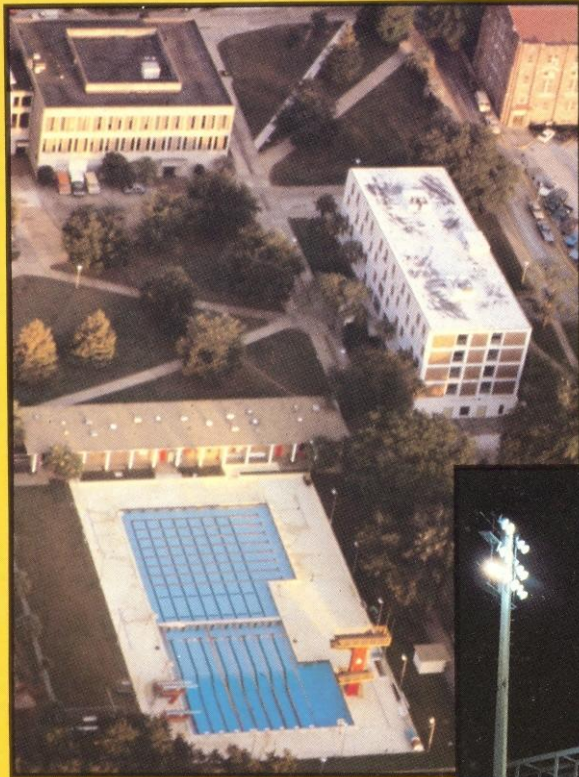


Athletic Facilities

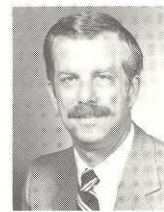


C.W. "Hootie" Ingram
Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



Charles W. Ehrhardt
Faculty Athletic
Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.



Bob Goin
Associate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



Barbara Palmer
Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic receives each year.

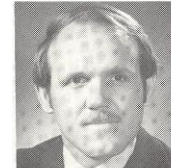

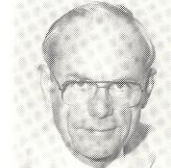
