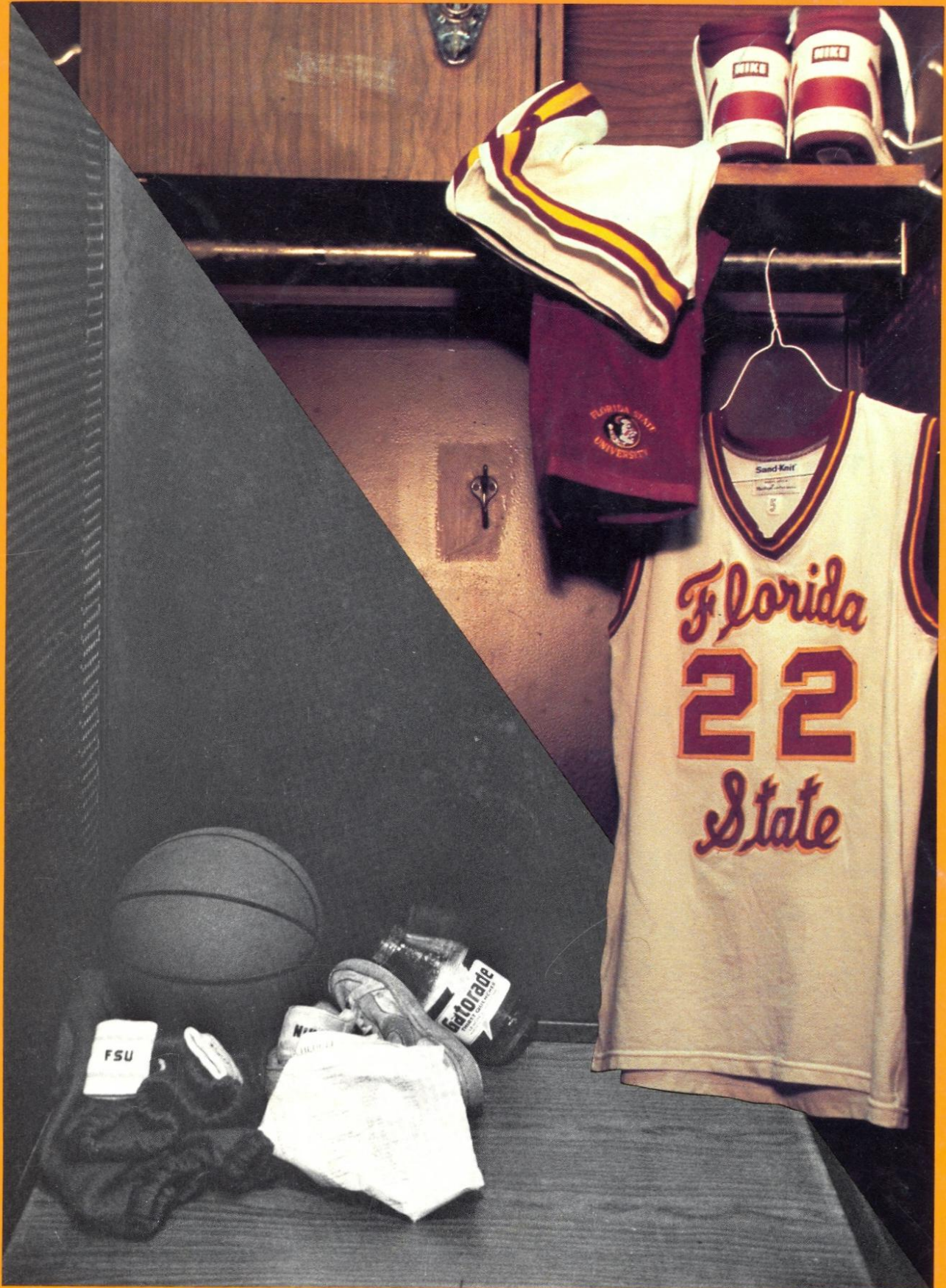

MEDIA INFORMATION

Florida State's 1986-87 basketball guide has been designed for use by the media. Any questions not covered in this brochure concerning FSU Women's Basketball should be directed to the Florida State Sports Information Office.

WORKING MEDIA - Requests for working credentials should be made to Tania D. Giauque, FSU Sports Information Office, at least one week prior to the game for which credentials are being requested. At the Leon-County Civic Center, working media will be seated at the press table on the floor in front of the East stands. For games at Tully Gym, media will be placed along the press table on the floor in front of the North stands.

PARKING - For games played at the Leon-County Civic Center, a parking pass must be requested along with game credentials. Parking will be at the Civic Center Lot or at the FSU Law Library. For games at Tully Gym, ample parking is readily available and no pass is required.

PHOTOGRAPHERS - Accredited photographers will be admitted to both the Leon-County Civic Center and Tully Gym upon presentation of appropriate credentials. Working credentials should be requested at least one week in advance from FSU Sports Information Office.

RADIO - Sections for radio broadcast are reserved at both Tully Gym and at the Leon-County Civic Center.

PHONES - Telephone service is available at both Tully and the Leon-County Civic Center. In order to obtain an individual line for broadcasting, contact Centel Telephone Company of Tallahassee. Call Centel at (904) 222-2236 and have them contact FSU Sports Information Office for placement.

THE BUILDERS OF A TRADITION



MEET MARYNELL MEADORS

Head Coach Marynell Meadors may be new to Tallahassee but she's an old friend to the sport of basketball. Meadors, who comes from Tennessee Tech, has the statistics to prove her prowess in the

sport. In her 16-year stint as head coach of the Golden Eaglettes, Meadors recorded a 363-139 record, placing her second among active Division I coaches. Meadors, who coached for the Ohio Valley Conference, guided the Golden Eaglettes to the NCAA championships in 1982 and 1985. Eight of those 16 years her team also made appearances in the AIAW national championships.

While the honors and achievements mentioned above are what every coach dreams of, there's one thing Meadors places more emphasis on than winning. . . academics.

"I stress the importance of academics," said Meadors. "The ball goes flat after four years and then you have to make a living for yourself." Those words must have had some impact on the women she's coached in the past because Meadors has established a 99 percent graduation rate.

Meadors took over her responsibilities at the end of April. She will be taking over a squad which finished 12-18 last season. However, Meadors is no stranger to hard work and the time it takes to establish a stable program, or to put one back on its' feet.

In 1970, five years after graduating from Middle Tennessee, Meadors established the basketball program at Tennessee Tech and spent the next 16 years building and refining it.

"We (coaching staff) know we have our work cut out for us," said Meadors, referring to FSU. "But we also know we have a lot of talent waiting for us."

Meadors is a patient woman and she knows miracles aren't going to happen overnight, but she's also an aggressive woman when it comes to her livelihood. In time, Meadors hopes to make those dreams a reality.

"So much of what happens will be determined in how lucky we are in recruiting," said Meadors. "If we're fortunate enough to sign the right recruits we can build in a hurry."

Don't be mislead though, Meadors isn't so concerned with getting such power players that she'll go to junior colleges for experienced athletes.

"I'd much rather sign freshmen and have them for four years," said Meadors. "It may take us three, four or five years but we feel as though we have the support and funding to produce a winning program."

When Meadors says "winning", she doesn't mean it lightly. While interviewing for the position at FSU, Meadors was asked what some of her future goals would be. She very readily answered, "First we want to win the metro conference championship. Secondly, we'd like to eventually be ranked in the top 20, but somewhere down the road I want us to play in the national championship."

And so the story unfolds.



ASSISTANT COACHES



Robyn Markey
Assistant Coach

If there's one person that already knows the ins and outs of Marynell Meadors coaching system, it's her assistant Robyn Markey.

Markey's a true believer in Meadors' ability to teach the sport of basketball. Under the guidance of Meadors, Markey lead the Ohio Valley Conference in assists and steals her senior year at Tennessee Tech and also captained the Golden Eaglettes.

"Robyn played four years for me and was one of the most competitive athletes I had," said Meadors. "Her dedication and hard work has carried over into her coaching technique."

After playing at Tennessee Tech and then graduating with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Markey moved to Burlington, Vermont where she filled the head coaching position for the Lady Catamounts for three years.

However, that position quickly changed when late in April, Markey received a phone call from Meadors inviting her to join



the Florida State coaching staff.

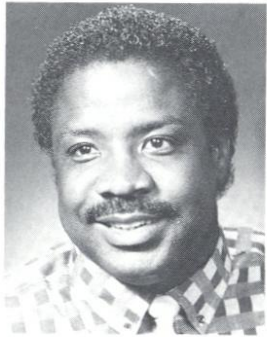
"It didn't take but a sentence or two and I heard her answer 'yes'."

Since Markey's arrival in May she has assumed the role as recruiting coordinator. While Wayne Allen deals directly with the South, Markey's recruiting area is specifically the Northeast region. Markey who has spent as much time in the air as in the gym, feels confident about recruiting.

"If we do our homework and hustle I think we'll get the kids we're after," said Markey. "We have great facilities, an encouraging support staff, but most importantly we have a coach. Marynell is a very easy person to sell."

Markey and Meadors share a lot of the same philosophies and have similar coaching styles.

"We believe in doing things the right way. We both stress discipline and fundamentals," said Markey. "I am very confident Coach Meadors will make this program successful and I'm very proud to be working with her."



Wayne Allen
Assistant Coach

Assistant Coach Wayne Allen is entering his fourth year on the Florida State coaching staff. The Florida native began coaching at FSU in 1982 as assistant to Florida State's previous coach Janice D. Allen. Allen

is the only veteran on this year's coaching staff.

The 33-year-old assistant, predominately aids assistant coach, Robyn Markey in the recruiting of athletes. He does a considerable amount of his recruiting in the South because of his familiarity with the territory.

Allen first began coaching in 1975 at Vanguard High School in Ocala, Fla. At Vanguard, Allen assumed the head girls coaching position and then in 1977 he also started assisting the boys team. In Allen's seven year stint at Vanguard he was very productive in both instances. He initiated the girl's program and built it into a



reputable one, known around the state and country, for starting a non-winning program and building it into one with two consecutive state championships in 1982 and 1983.

Allen, who played football for four years in Wildwood, Fla., college ball at Bethune Cookman and then one year for the Kansas City Chiefs will be able to empathize with his players.

"Wayne is a very talented and successful coach, and he's very knowledgeable about the talent in this state," said Meadors. "More importantly he's excellent on the floor and relates extremely well with college level athletes."

Although Allen's primary duties will be with the recruiting and scouting, he will also be involved with summer camps.

"She is a disciplinarian," said Allen. "No doubt about it, within the next two years if she gets the kids she wants, she'll turn this program around. While I'm here, my goal is to help her (Meadors) make this the best team it can be."



Wrenetta Gaw
Graduate Assistant

Another newcomer to the Florida State coaching staff is first year graduate assistant Wrenetta Gaw.

Gaw also comes from Cookeville, Tenn., where she managed for four years at Tennessee Tech under Meadors.

"I've enjoyed working for Marynell," said Gaw. "She's easy going and fair. I always knew the harder I worked the more responsibility she would give me."



Gaw is currently working on her master's degree in athletic administration. She received some prior experience to her graduate work when she toured South America as a member of Athletes in Action. During the six-week tour, Gaw was appointed Administration Director. Some specific duties Gaw will be undertaking at FSU are coordinating travel, helping with pre-season, and various other administrative duties. "It's great to have Wrenetta around," said Meadors. "She's so well organized. I depend on her like I depend on my right arm."



OUTLOOK



Setting the record straight is what Marynell Meadors had in mind when she accepted the head coaching position at Florida State. Meadors, who comes from Tennessee Tech, will essentially be taking over the same team that finished 12-18 in last year's campaign. If Meadors' past record is any indication of the future, Florida State's Lady Seminole basketball team should be back on track towards national prominence.

Because of her late arrival in April, Meadors was unable to do any recruiting for the 1986-87 season but hopes to sign three or four new hoopsters during the early signing period, and by next season hopes to have eight or nine new ballplayers on the FSU squad.

"Don't get me wrong. I think there's a lot of talent right here," said Meadors. "From early meetings with the team, I have received every indication that these athletes possess the desire to win."

The talent is most definitely there. This year's team returns eight lettermen, Sheri Kaminski and Brenda Cliette being the only two seniors. Kaminski returns as one of the top point guards and ranks high in career assists with 50, despite missing all or part of 15 games last year with an assortment of injuries.

Florida State welcomes back an old friend and a world class sprinter in Cliette. Cliette, who averaged 11.3 points per game and 9.3 rebounds in her freshman year at the forward position, will give the Seminoles an added dimension on both ends of the court. Cliette took two years off from the hardwood to concentrate on her track, during which time she was an eight-time All-American.

"Obviously Brenda is a great athlete," said Meadors. "She's the type of athlete that will rebound the ball, hit the outlet pass and still be the first one down the floor on the fast break."

Meadors will use Cliette's ability to move the ball quickly down the floor establishing the fast break game that she ran so well at Tennessee Tech making her the second winningest coach in the NCAA.

At center, the Seminoles return the talented Sarah Hall. Last season Hall averaged 10 points and eight rebounds per game, leading her team in both statistical categories. Hall also gained international experience over the summer--touring South America with Athletes in Action.

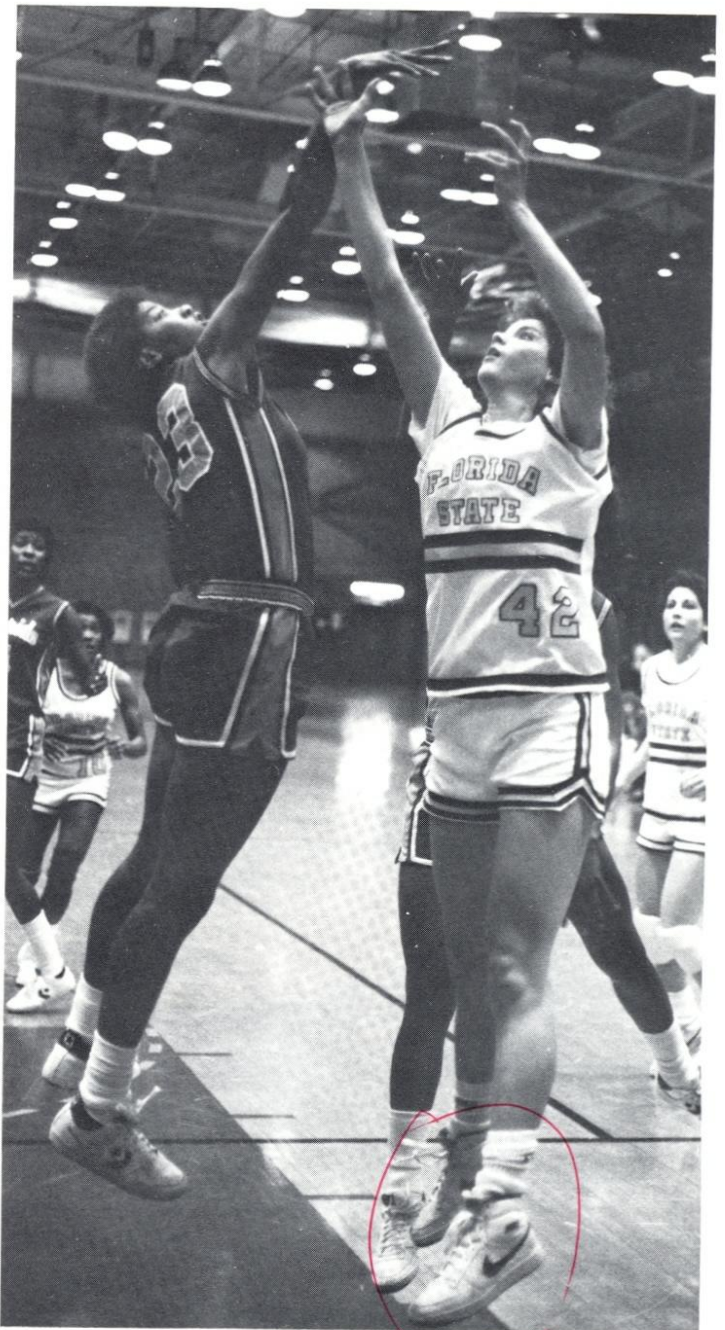
"I think that being a part of Athletes in Action has made Sarah a more diversified player," said Meadors.

Red-shirt Mary Buchanan will also compete for playing time at the center slot. Also competing for playing time at the forward position will be sophomore Angela Tucker, and juniors Gussie Clark and Terri McCarty. The Seminoles will be without sophomore Veronica Bouknight who underwent

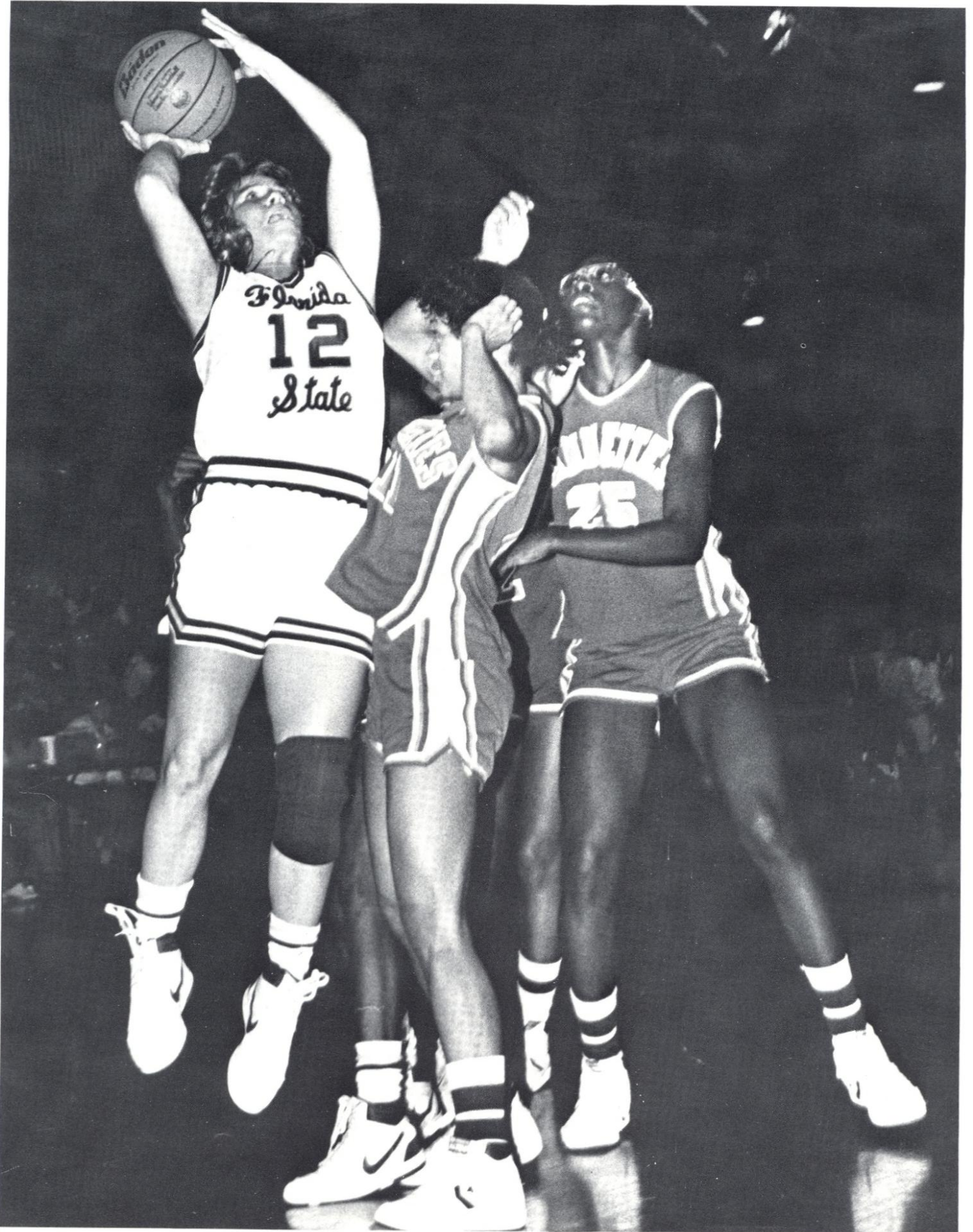
knee surgery in August and will receive a medical red-shirt for the upcoming season.

At the guard position a familiar face in Jan Piatnik returns for her third year of Seminole basketball. Piatnik who started 17 of 27 games last season led her team with 80 assists from the point position. Junior Val Garrett and sophomore Valene Harris will also be vying for playing time at the guard slot. Garrett who played in 25 games last year will add speed and experience at the guard position. Harris averaged 5.5 points and 4.0 rebounds as a freshman.

Considering the coaching prowess that Meadors brings into the program, the raw athletic ability of a world class sprinter that Cliette contributes, and the experience that Hall returns to the program, the Florida State squad could look to a promising season.

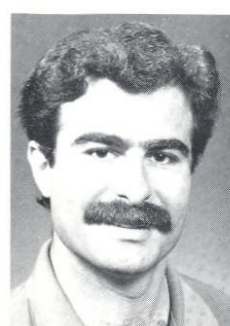

FSU LEADERS:

SARAH HALL AND BRENDA CLIETTE

Sarah Hall didn't think she was destined for collegiate basketball action, but by the time she graduates from Florida State she may be one of the best centers to have gone through the women's program.

Hall, at 6'2", begins her junior year as leading rebounder, 8.5, and point contributor, 11.3, per game on the Lady Seminole squad. Hall shares the record for most blocked shots, 32, in one season with teammate Brenda Cliette. Although these are tremendous athletic feats for Hall, perhaps her most memorable basketball experience occurred this past summer when she traveled and competed with Athletes in Action. Hall is the first player from Florida State to be chosen to the team.

Athletes in Action is a Christian organization composed of Division I players from throughout the country. Hall was selected to the second team that toured South America, competing against international teams for five weeks.

In their first two contests against the Brazilian International team, the U.S. team came up short. However, in their next sixteen attempts they went unblemished with a final 16-2 mark.

Although their victories were heartfelt, the happiness of winning the games didn't surpass emotions felt for the crowd they played for.

"I learned so much about myself as a person and a competitor," said Hall. "I also learned about performing and competing under a lot of different circumstances.

Some of the circumstances in which Hall played under were not your modern day playing facilities.

"At Equador we played on a dirt court with rusted baskets and no net," said Hall. "Some nights we played in frigid weather on scarcely lit courts."



One of their stops was in Peru, perhaps one of the poorest South American countries. Hall relates an experience in which eight or nine people were sharing a hut and how she felt helpless.

"Although I felt sorry for these children," said Hall, "I realized that they still possessed something I never had coming out of high school, hope."

Head Coach Marynell Meadors has a lot of hope where Hall's concerned and believes she'll be a contributing factor to the success of this year's squad.



"Brenda is probably one of the most phenomenal athletes I have ever seen," these words were spoken by head coach Marynell Meadors. Meadors believes that Cliette's speed, quickness, and jumping ability will make her one of the premier players in the Metro.

If Cliette's contributions to the Florida State track team are any indication of her potential as a lady cager she may just be the person to light Florida State basketball up.

Cliette who was a member of the 1983 basketball team averaged 11.3 points per game as a freshman and 9.3 rebounds and was well on her way to being a dominant force on the Metro basketball scene until running sidetracked her.

Although she considers basketball her first love she set it aside temporarily to compete on the FSU track team. It was through her track endeavors that she became an eight-time all-american and earned a spot on the U.S. Olympic team as an alternate.

Cliette was considered one of the top third leg relay runners following her sophomore year. The FSU senior was runner-up in both the 100 and 200 meter dashes in the women's NCAA championships. The thinclad also turned in stunning splits on the FSU relay teams along with Marita Payne, Randy Givens, and Angela Wright, shattering two NCAA records in the 4x100 and 4x200 yard relays.

Last summer, she won gold medals as part of relay teams at the Moscow Goodwill Games and the Olympic Festival. Cliette's performances speak for themselves and Meadors couldn't be happier to have such a gifted athlete returning to her squad.

"Before practice even started I heard so many good things about her," said Meadors. "But the beauty of it all is she's even better than what I heard."

Cliette, who still dreams of competing in the Olympics in 1988, is now putting those dreams on the back burner to play a sport her heart hasn't been able to let go of.

"It's great to be back and playing basketball again," said Cliette. I couldn't stand it the last two years, watching the team play and me not being able to."

Florida State University, a coeducational institution and a senior member of the nine universities in the state system, is in Tallahassee, Florida, the state's capital.

Located just a few blocks from the Capitol, the Florida State campus is considered to be one of the most beautiful in the southeast. The 347-acre campus is covered with hardwoods, pines and palms as well as springtime greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods.

The approximately 22,500 students currently enrolled at Florida State learn from a faculty of 1,500, which include four members of the National Academy of Sciences.

Florida State offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, engineering, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts. Honors programs are available for top students.

The University has been recognized by the Board of Regents for its continuing leadership at the graduate levels of education.

Overseas study programs in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland; Yugoslavia, Costa Rica and the Panama Canal Zone.

The University's location in the state capital affords excellent study, research and internship opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences, law and policy sciences.

Florida State is setting the pace as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. One of the few institutions of learning in the United States with its own supercomputer, FSU is attracting researchers from around the globe.

In 1982, Florida State received the Panama City campus, originally a part of the University of West Florida, through



administrative transfer from the Board of Regents and the state legislature. Today approximately 85 percent of the courses offered in Panama City are taught by full-time Tallahassee faculty.

The Bay County Commission purchased 21 acres, 16 of which make up Phase I of the new campus. The remaining acreage will be available for expansion into technical degree programs such as engineering and science.

Social life for many students in Tallahassee centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts. In the fall, the campus goes wild for football, supporting the Seminoles both at home and away.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. Both the men's and women's athletic programs are among the nation's best.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the

flying trapeze or highwire or in clown acts.

Florida State is growing. Construction has begun on the Florida A&M University/FSU College of Engineering Building, located adjacent to Innovation Park, two miles southwest of the FSU campus. It is expected to be completed by October 1987.

Construction began last fall on the new student union complex and construction is expected to be completed in 1987 on the Science Center Library.

Plans are also underway for a \$12.1 million multipurpose student gym, approved by the 1986 Legislature, as well as improvements to the central utility plant and renovation of the old Music Building (Music School South).

The College of Law's Village Green project has begun. When completed, the \$3.8 million project will feature four restored historic homes to be used as study, meeting and reception areas.

FSU President Bernard P. Sliger takes pride not only in the programs, but also in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.

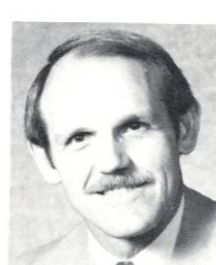
