- Senior leadership will be a key part of FSU's success this season. Of its 10 active student-athletes, five are seniors including redshirt senior guards AJ Alix and Imani Wright as well as senior forward Shakayla Thomas and senior centers Ama Degbeon and Chatrice White
- The Seminoles will attempt to keep their lofty program standards afloat in 2017-18.
 Over the last three seasons, FSU has won 13 or more games in ACC regular season play (16-game schedule).
- Senior forward Shakayla Thomas, who joins Ama Degbeon as the team's lone fouryear seniors, will go after a worthy mark. Thomas looks to join former guard Leticia Romero as the program's two three-time All-Americans.
- Florida State Women's Hoops begins the 2017-18 season ranked 25th in the ES-PNW Way-Too-Early Preseason Top 25 Poll. Those rankings did not include the transfer of All-Big 12 guard AJ Alix.

Florida State Women's Basketball's ascension has been startling. In recent seasons, the Seminoles have proven they belong among the elite.

Over the last three years, Florida State Women's Basketball has:

- Finished in the Top 12 or higher of the final USA Today Poll (7th in 2015, 12th in 2016, 7th in 2017).
- Stayed in the Top 15 of the USA Today Poll for the last 49 weeks.
- Become one of seven NCAA Division I programs to make the Elite Eight in two of the last three years.
- Recorded 18 AP Top 25 wins.
- Gone 40-8 in ACC play.
- Become one of seven NCAA Division I programs to make the Sweet 16 in each of the last three years.
- Garnered an 85-20 overall record.
- Averaged 13.3 ACC wins.
- Produced 10 All-America Honors.
- Produced 14 ACC Honors.

- Extended its NCAA First Round win streak to 14 consecutive games following an 87-66 win over Western Illinois.
- Went 13-3 in the ACC and finished as conference runner-up, the third straight year of winning 13 or more ACC games.
- Finished 11th in the final NCAA RPI and 12th in the strength of schedule.
- Went 10-6 against RPI Top 50 opponents.
- Finished fifth nationally in scoring margin (+20.7) and seventh in rebound margin (+9.1)
- Earned its third consecutive double bye in the ACC Tournament.
- Stayed in the Top 15 of the USA Today Poll for the second straight year.
- Led the ACC in scoring margin, rebounding defense, rebounding margin and offensive rebounding percentage.
- Shot 46.7 percent from the floor, the highest field goal percentage since the 1991-92 season.
- Recorded 361 steals, the most since the 1990-91 season.

ELITE EIGHTHISTORY



The Seminoles are one of **seven Division I programs** who have made two or more NCAA Elite Eight appearances since 2015. The other schools include UConn, South Carolina, Notre Dame, Baylor, Tennessee and Stanford.

Florida State has reached the round of eight in two of the last three seasons.

2009-10 SEASON (29-6)

- No. 3-seeded Florida State Women's Basketball reached its first NCAA Elite Eight following an exhilarating 74-71 win over No. 7 seed Mississippi State
- The Seminoles set a then-school record with 29 victories while winning its second consecutive co-ACC regular season title.
- FSU went 12-2 in ACC play, defeating North Carolina, Miami and Maryland.

2014-15 SEASON (32-5)

- Ranked seventh in the final USA Today Poll on April 8, marking FSU's highest final ranking ever.
- Reached the NCAA Elite Eight for the second time in school history with a 66-65 win over No. 3 seed Arizona State
- Was the only Division I men's or women's team to out-rebound every opponent in the regular season.
 FSU out-rebounded its opponents in 36 of its 37 games played overall.
- Finished 18-3 in non-conference play and boasted an average scoring margin of +20.2 against opponents outside of ACC play.

2016-17 SEASON (28-7)

- Matched the 2014-15 team for the best final school ranking ever at No. 7 in the USA Today Poll.
- Eclipsed the previous school record of six Top 25 wins (2014-15) by winning nine games against ranked foes.
- Became the highest-scoring Seminole squad in ACC history, averaging 79.0 points per game.
- Delivered a 13-3 record in ACC play, finishing second.

20 YEARS OF COACH SUE

Sue Semrau became the 10th head coach in Florida State women's basketball history on June 13, 1997. At her introductory press conference, she said "I'd have to have a lot of faith that this (program) could be a sleeping giant."

Semrau guided Florida State to its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 10 years, and its first as a member of the ACC, in 2001. Current assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff and FSU Senior Associate A.D./SWA Vanessa Fuchs were seniors on that team.

The native of Seattle, Wash., who took a major rebuilding job, is the active coaching leader in the conference in ACC Coach of the Year awards. Semrau is a four-time winner of the honor, winning in 2001, 2005, 2009 and 2015.

In the 2005-06 season, Semrau became the winningest head coach in FSU Women's Basketball history.









She helped guide the United States U18 and U19 teams to gold medals in 2010 and 2011, respectively. Semrau most recently represented her country at the highest level as a USA Basketball Women's National Team Training Camp court coach in Sept. 2017.

The 10th season under Sue Semrau couldn't have been any sweeter as her 2006-07 squad made school history. A 68-61 victory over Stanford in the second round of the NCAA Tournament sent the Seminoles to their first NCAA Tournament Sweet 16.

The Seminoles were road warriors in 2008-09 as they posted a perfect 10-0 record on the road, including a 7-0 mark in the ACC which helped propel them to a share of the regular season title with Maryland. A year later FSU did it again, compiling another 12-2 ACC mark to lead the conference in 2010.

A then-school record 29 wins in the 2009-10 season was highlighted by FSU's first trip to the NCAA Elite Eight after defeating Mississippi State.

It was a three-peat of No. 3 seeds in the NCAA Tournament, as the Seminoles compiled a 24-8 record and an 11-3 mark in ACC play under Semrau.



In the 2012-13 season, Florida State had a leaguebest and a school-record three All-ACC First Team selections, advanced to the NCAA Tournament second round and tallied its eighth 20-win season with Semrau at the helm.

Semrau won the 2013 Kay Yow Heart of a Coach Award presented by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Semrau reached the pinnacle of her coaching career by winning three different national coach of the year honors in the 2014-15 season. The Seminoles finished with a school-record 32 wins (32-5) while advancing to their second NCAA Elite Eight. She also picked up her fourth ACC Coach of the Year award.

Back-to-back NCAA Sweet 16 appearances highlighted another strong season for the Seminoles in 2015-16. FSU finished 25-8 overall and went 13-3 in the ACC, its second-most wins in the conference ever.

Semrau helped set the standard once again in 2016-17, setting a program record with nine AP Top 25 wins and helping FSU reach its third NCAA Elite Eight.

WORLDWIDE SEMINOLES

Whether it's representing Spain on the Olympic Team or playing for USA Basketball, Florida State Women's Basketball has gone worldwide in its quest for bringing in the best players across the globe.

A PAIR OF SEMINOLES MAKE MEMORIES IN RIO

- Seminoles Leticia Romero and Leonor Rodriguez became members of Spain's first Olympic medalist basketball team, earning the silver at the 2016 Summer Olympic Games in Rio.
- Romero and Rodriguez became the 11th and 12th Olympic medalists at Florida State, and were the first FSU athletes to finish with a silver medal since former track & field athlete Kim Batten won silver at the 400 meter hurdles in 1996.
- Romero averaged 5.8 points off the bench, including a superb 16-point game (6-of-6 shooting) in 14 minutes of play vs. China.
- Rodriguez delivered 12 points in 14 minutes off the bench in a 97-43 win over Senegal, highlighting her breakthrough moment.

FLORIDA STATE STAYS CONNECTED TO USA BASKETBALL

- FSU Head Coach Sue Semrau spent three days as a court coach for the United States Women's National Team Training Camp held at Santa Barbara from Sept. 30-Oct. 2. It was Semrau's third stint with USA Basketball, and allowed her to coach some of the absolute best players in the world.
- Semrau is one of 11 Seminoles whom have participated as a coach or played with USA Basketball.
- For the third straight year, FSU was represented on the United States' governing body of basketball. Current senior Shakayla Thomas played with the 2015 FIBA U19 World Championship Team, FSU alumna Natasha Howard participated on the 2016 USA Select Team and senior Chatrice White was involved in the FIBA 3X3 Team in 2016.
- Natasha Howard made quite an impression on the USA Select Team. One of FSU's all-time great dropped a game-high 24 points against the Olympic Team, including a blistering 18 points in the fourth quarter alone.







- The Seminoles spent time in Rome, Naples, the Amalfi Coast and Sicily in Italy. In Spain, FSU experienced the beautiful city of Barcelona and also traveled to Girona, the home area of redshirt freshman Iho Lopez.
- Florida State played three opponents in Naples, Sicily and Barcelona. FSU defeated Italy Selezione 103-33 on Aug. 8, topped the Sicily All-Stars 122-36 on Aug. 11 and beat the Barcelona All-Stars 106-65.
- A variety of activities occurred, from seeing the Sistine Chapel, visiting the Vatican City, boatriding the beautiful waters of the Amalfi Coast, shopping in Las Ramblas in Barcelona and more. FSU even took in a Real Madrid-FC Barcelona soccer match!



FSU MILESTONES

FLORIDA'S FIRST


Led by all-time leading scorer, Sue Galkantas (2,323 points), the Seminoles advanced to their first-ever NCAA Tournament during the 1982-83 season, becoming the first school from the state of Florida to advance to the "Big Dance."

WYCKOFF LEADS 2001 NOLES

Led by senior star and current assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff, Florida State advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1991 in 2001. Wyckoff, Levys Torres and April Taylor all earned All-ACC honors for the 19-12 Seminoles. A highlight of the season came when the Noles upset No. 4 Duke, 71-69, in Durham for the first time since 1993. Led by Traylor's 30 points, FSU defeated Tulane, 72-70, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.



Wanda Burns led FSU to one the greatest seasons in school history in 1991, guiding the Seminoles to a 25-7 record and the Metro Conference Championship in their final year in the league. Burns averaged 18.5 ppg and was named Metro Conference Player of the Year as FSU advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year.









HODGES HANGS 39 ON THE TERPS

Senior star Roneeka Hodges scored a then-schoolrecord 39 points to lead FSU to a 95-91 overtime win over No. 15 Maryland on Jan. 16, 2005, in Tallahassee. The Seminoles came back from 12 down in the second half, and Hodges scored seven points in the extra frame.

BACK-TO-BACK ACC CHAMPS

In 2009, the Seminoles finished with a 12-2 mark in conference play to capture their first regular season ACC title. A year later FSU did it again, compiling another 12-2 ACC mark to lead the conference in 2010. Florida State captured 11 different all-conference awards during the two-year streak.



2010 ELITE EIGHT

Led by All-ACC performers Jacinta Monroe and Courtney Ward, Florida State won a then-schoolrecord 29 games and advanced to its first-ever NCAA Elite Eight with a 74-71 win over Mississippi State in the 2010 Dayton Regional Sweet 16.

THREE-SEED-THREE-PEAT

In 2009, Florida State was awarded its then-highest ever seed in the NCAA Tournament – a No. 3 seed in the Duluth Region. A year later, in 2010, the Seminoles nabbed a No. 3 seed again – this time in the Dayton Region. In 2011, the Seminoles completed the No. 3 seed three-peat at the Dallas Region.

FSU MILESTONES

RECORD THREE

The entertaining 2012-13 season was highlighted by a school-record three All-ACC First Team selections for FSU. They include guards Alexa Deluzio and Leonor Rodriguez and forward Natasha Howard.

AN ALL-AMERICA TRADITION

Numerous Seminoles have garnered All-America honors through the years, beginning with Sue Galkantas in 1983 and most recently by Leticia Romero and Shakayla Thomas in 2017. Other notable FSU All-Americans include: Bev Burnett (1988), Wanda Burns (1991), Tia Paschal (1993) and Brooke Wyckoff (2001).

POST-GRADUATE SCHOLARS

The importance of success in academics is a pillar of the FSU women's basketball program as Seminole student-athletes have captured over 100 ACC Academic Honor Roll and Academic All-ACC selections. Three former FSU stars have even earned ACC Postgraduate Scholarships: Christy Derlak (1993-94), Brooke Wyckoff (2000-01) and Christian Hunnicutt (2010-11).

THE ACC'S BEST

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has captured 90 all-conference honors, including recent coaches' ACC Player of the Year Shakayla Thomas in 2017.







AN FSU LEGEND SAYS GOODBYE

Natasha Howard cemented herself as arguably the greatest all-around player in Florida State women's basketball history with an unbelievable senior season. Included was a school-record 40-point game against Syracuse, establishing a schoolrecord 41 career double-doubles and finishing fourth in school history with 20.5 points per game in 2013-14. As a senior, she produced FIVE 30-point games. becoming the first Seminole to accomplish the feat.





SECOND TIME ELITE

The 2014-15 season will go down as the best in school history with a program record 32 wins. FSU advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight once again, defeating No. 3-seeded Arizona State 66-65. The Noles had five players average double figures in their outstanding season.

WHAT A RUN!

Florida State has made three consecutive NCAA Sweet 16s in 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17, including going to Elite Eights in 2015 and 2017. The unprecedented run solidifies the Seminoles as one of the nation's top programs in the country.



HONORS

- Florida State Women's Basketball head coach Sue Semrau comes off her milestone 20th season with the Seminoles, and enters the 2017-18 year looking to build off another NCAA Elite Eight finish.
- A four-time winner of the ACC Coach of the Year award and Florida State's all-time leader in wins, Semrau has earned a reputation as a coach that not only keeps her team in the national rankings by leading her players to victory but also one that helps foster the personal and professional growth of the student-athletes.
- "Coach Sue" has guided the Seminoles to 13 NCAA Tournaments, including three Elite Eight appearances in 2010, 2015 and 2017, five NCAA Sweet 16s in 2007, 2010, 2015. 2016 and 2017, won a pair of gold medals with USA Basketball and has seen 31 student-athletes earn academic all-conference honors.
- Most recently, Semrau was a court coach for the USA Basketball Women's National Team from Sept. 30-Oct. 2, 2017, in Santa Barbara, Calif.
- Over the last nine years, Florida State has averaged over 25 wins per season and had 15 players sign professional contracts either in the WNBA or with a European club team. Eight Seminoles have been selected in the WNBA Draft since 2009, most recently Leticia Romero (second round by Connecticut Sun) and Kai James (third round by New York Liberty). Prior to that, FSU's last three WNBA Draft picks in Adut Bulgak (12th in 2016), Natasha Howard (fifth in 2014) and Jacinta Monroe (sixth in 2010) had all gone in the first round.
- Semrau is so respected among her peers in the coaching community that she was named president of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in the summer 2013 after serving as the vice president since 2010. Semrau recently finished up her tenure as WBCA President following the 2014-15 season.

THIS PAST SEASON

- Florida State became one of just seven NCAA Division I programs to make the Elite Eight in two of the last three years, finishing with a 28-7 overall record in 2016-17. The Seminoles defeated a school-record nine AP Top 25 teams, including eighth-ranked and second-seeded Oregon State in the NCAA Sweet 16 in Stockton, Calif.
- FSU finished second in the ACC with a 13-3 conference record and tied its highest endof-season ranking in the USA Today Poll at seventh. The 28 wins tied for the third-most in program history, with 10 of those victories coming against RPI Top 50 opponents.
- Once again, there was no shortage of individual accolades for the Seminoles. Junior forward Shakayla Thomas became FSU's first ACC Player of the Year, while senior point guard Leticia Romero became the program's first three-time All-American. Both standouts were named Associated Press and WBCA All-Americans while being all-conference performers.
- Junior center Chatrice White was honored as the ACC Sixth Player of the Year, the third straight for FSU, and senior Brittany Brown was named to the ACC All-Defensive Team for the second straight season.

MOLDING TRUE STUDENT-ATHLETES

- As successful as Florida State has been on the court, Semrau's commitment to community service is just as important to her program's identity.
- Once again in 2016-17, Semrau partnered the Seminoles with Samaritan's Feet, a non-profit organization dedicated to changing lives through shoe distributions around the world. Semrau annually coaches a game barefoot in an effort to raise money, and the Seminoles took a break from the 2010 Junkanoo Jam in the Bahamas to give back on Thanksgiving.





- In 2017, FSU once again participated in this endeavor. FSU was also able to spread its message of hope and inspiration to the U.S. Virgin Islands around Thanksgiving in 2016, doing another shoe distribution overseas to an area middle school.
- The 2016-17 Seminoles once again fulfilled their duties of giving back to the community and making strong connections within the Big Bend area. FSU influenced both children and adults by visiting schools, playgrounds and other locations that allowed it to positively impact and connect with the community. The sight of FSU Women's Basketball coaches and student-athletes performing good deeds around the community is not an uncommon one.
- Additionally, the Seminoles have been known to extend a helping hand when on the road, making visits to the Boys and Girls Club at the Coalition for the Homeless in Orlando and elementary schools in Harlem, West Chester and Wadsworth, Ohio and Martinsville, Ind., as well as the Duke Hospital in Durham, N.C.
- In August 2013, Semrau and the Seminoles held a basketball clinic for youth in Dakar, Senegal, in addition to visiting an orphanage during the team's 2013 Foreign Tour.
- These efforts have molded countless Seminoles into superstars in the game of life following their hoops careers. Current assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff (Class of 2001) and Christian Hunnicutt (Class of 2011) each earned prestigious ACC Postgraduate Scholarships, while Vanessa Fuchs (Class of 2001) served as Interim Athletics Director at Florida State and is currently the Seminoles' Senior Women's Administrator.
- For the second straight year in 2017, FSU tied or led the ACC with four All-ACC Academic Team members. Brown, Ivey Slaughter, Romero and White each were FSU's representatives.

RECENT SUCCESS

- The 2009-10 season served as the perfect example of just how strong the Florida State's women's basketball program has become under Semrau. The Seminoles captured their second consecutive regular-season ACC Co-Championship and made it all the way to the Elite Eight of the annual NCAA Tournament as a then-program-best No. 3 seed for the second straight season.
- Along the way, FSU set the school record for most wins in a season with 29, most conference triumphs ever with 12 and highest national ranking ever at No. 9. Those three school marks were all broken by the 2014-15 team.
- After the 2009-10 season was complete, star forward Jacinta Monroe was taken sixth overall in the 2010 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics; a draft slot that was the highest ever for an FSU women's basketball player prior to Natasha Howard's selection as the fifth pick by the Indiana Fever in 2014.

- During a 24-8 campaign in 2010-11, the Seminoles extended their NCAA Tournament streak to seven consecutive years, nabbing another No. 3 seed. Along the way, forward Cierra Bravard nabbed honorable mention All-America honors and teamed with point guard Courtney Ward to capture All-ACC accolades.
- Overall, Semrau has guided eight players to All-America honors in her 20 years.
- It could be argued that Semrau's best coaching job occurred in the 2014-15 record-setting year where new accomplishments were being made seemingly every game. Florida State finished with a

SUE SEMRAU'S CAREER RECORD

32-5 overall record, shattering the school record for wins while also setting new records for ACC wins (14), Top 25 wins (6, since broken by the 2016-17 team) and regular-season victories (27). For the first time ever, the Seminoles finished undefeated at the Donald L. Tucker Center, going 16-0.

■ FSU highlighted its 2014-15 year by earning a 66-65 win over No. 3 seed Arizona State in the NCAA Sweet 16 in Greensboro, N.C., reaching its second Elite Eight appearance in program history. The Noles finished second in the ACC regular season with a 14-2 record, reached the ACC Tournament title game for the first time ever and garnered a program-best No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament before taking down Alabama State (91-49) and 20th-ranked FGCU (65-47) in the first two rounds at the Tucker Center.



- Semrau earned several national and conference coaching honors in 2015 after FSU was predicted to finish fifth in the ACC and ultimately steam-rolled most of its competition. She was named the ACC Coach of the Year by the Blue Ribbon Panel and the ACC coaches. Semrau was also named the ESPNW National Coach of the Year, the WBCA Coach of the Year and the Associated Press Coach of the Year.
- Many college basketball fans, media and other personnel took notice of the way Coach Sue was able to blend a team with six new players and create one of the most collective, teamoriented and entertaining groups in the sport.
- Semrau's fourth ACC Coach of the Year honor gives her the distinction of having the most among active ACC coaches.
- The fact that the 2014-15 team became the first in program history to average five double-figure scorers proves how well a new cast of faces played together under Semrau's system. Offensively, the Noles averaged 75.5 points which was their highest in the previous 24 years.
- In 2014-15, FSU also set the single-season record for 3-point field goals made (216), offensive rebounds (625), defensive rebounds (986) and total rebounds (1,611). One of its most impressive feats was being the only Division I basketball team men's or women's to out-rebound every opponent during the regular season. Overall, FSU out-rebounded 36 of its 37 opponents.

CHANGED CULTURE

- Semrau's 401 career win total with the Seminoles more than doubles the second-most victories by an FSU coach (Marynell Meadors, 132), and her tenure has accounted for 13 of FSU's 16 all-time NCAA Tournament appearances.
- Semrau basically built the Seminoles from scratch, as she inherited a program coming off a 5-22 record in 1996-97 and hadn't reached double figures in wins in four years. She has accumulated 41 AP Top 25 wins in her 20 seasons. When she arrived in Tallahassee, FSU had not won vs. a nationally-ranked team in the previous four seasons.

- By her fourth year, Semrau had completely turned the program around, capturing a 19-12 record and the first NCAA Tournament appearance in a decade. The 2000-01 season served as the jumpstart for unprecedented success.
- FSU had only four 20-win seasons before Semrau guided the Noles to six 20-win seasons over a seven-year stretch beginning in 2004-05. She has now led the Noles to 11 20-win campaigns through 20 seasons, including a 32-win season in 2014-15.

A RESPECTED AND SEASONED COACH

- Prior to coming to Florida State, Semrau served three years as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Wisconsin under Jane Albright. While in Madison, she contributed to the Badgers' three-straight winning seasons and two NCAA Tournament appearances, including the program's first ever back-to-back 20-win seasons.
- Semrau first joined Albright at Northern Illinois in 1991 where she assisted in leading NIU to three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.
- Before her hiring at Northern Illinois, Semrau served as head women's basketball coach and assistant athletic director at Occidental College in Los Angeles for four years where she compiled a 51-47 overall record.
- She also coached soccer for two seasons and was responsible for the administrative duties of fundraising and promotions at the Division III institution.
- Semrau also worked as the public relations and promotions director for the L.A. Heat
 professional soccer team from 1986-87, and as the public relations director for the Seattle
 Storm soccer team in the previous year.
- A native of Seattle, Wash., Semrau is a graduate of Shorecrest High School. She went on to attend the University of Puget Sound for two years. Semrau transferred to the University of California-San Diego in 1984 where she was a team co-captain and Co-MVP.
- She graduated in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in communications and received her master's degree in athletic administration from the University of Southern California in 1988.
- Coach Sue is the Godmother of assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff's daughter, Avery (3 ½).

- Since his arrival, Florida State is 324-138 (.701) in the last 14 seasons
- 2017 WBCA National Assistant Coach of the Year
- Has helped the Seminoles to the NCAA Postseason in 12 of the last 13 years
- Florida State women's basketball associate head coach Lance White has developed a reputation as one of college basketball's best game-planners and recruiters. It's no secret that his connection with the Seminoles over the last 14 years has resulted in a dramatic rise in the program's success.
- During his 14 years with the Garnet and Gold, FSU has gone 324-138 (.701) and recorded 11 20-win seasons. Responsible for Florida State's offensive principles, White had another strong showing on the sidelines in FSU's 25-8 campaign in 2016-17.
- The 2016-17 Seminoles, which reached their second NCAA Elite Eight in the last three years, averaged 79.0 points per game the highest by the program since 1990-91. FSU's offense once again paved its way among the elite, finishing fifth nationally in scoring margin (+20.7) and shooting 46.7 percent from the floor. FSU's field goal percentage was its best since the 1991-92 season.
- White was a key part to the All-America seasons once again by Shakayla Thomas and Leticia Romero. Thomas became a two-time All-American while Romero became the first three-time All-American in program history. In addition, Chatrice White was named the ACC Player of the Year and was a key part of Florida State leading the ACC in scoring margin and offensive rebounding percentage.
- For his standout coaching efforts in 2016-17, White was named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association National Assistant Coach of the Year. The incredible progress since White came aboard to Tallahassee in 2003 is staggering FSU has made the NCAA postseason in 12 of the last 13 seasons and has won at least one NCAA Tournament game in its last 14 appearances.
- The 2015-16 Seminole squad reached the NCAA Sweet 16 for the second consecutive year, shooting 45.6 percent from the floor. FSU's marksmanship from the field was the 15th-best nationally.
- Led by all-conference seasons once again from Thomas and Adut Bulgak, FSU eclipsed 900 field goals made for the eighth time in program history and just the fourth time as ACC members
- What is known as the best season in school history in 2014-15, Florida State emerged as one of the most entertaining teams to watch in college basketball. White's emphasis on spacing the floor, sharing the ball and looking for the fast break culminated in FSU averaging 75.5 points per game its highest point production in 24 years prior to last year's scoring success.
- One of White's seemingly hardest tasks to tackle at the start of the 2014-15 season was to create a cohesive offense with several new faces. He accomplished that and plenty more, as the Seminoles became the first team in program history to average five double-figure scorers. The Noles finished in the Top 15 nationally in scoring margin (eighth, 18.2), field goal percentage (13th, 45.0) and offensive rebounds per game (13th, 17.0). The Noles' team-oriented offensive attack was also highlighted by their 585 total assists, the fifth time they recorded 500+ assists in a season and just the second time since 1994-95.
- FSU ended its tremendous 2014-15 campaign making 1,053 field goals, the second-most in school history. The offense of junior center All-American Bulgak and sophomore All-America guard Romero sparked a unit that looked as if it had played together for several years prior. Bulgak added an All-ACC First Team selection, Romero earned second-team honors and freshman forward Thomas was the ACC Sixth Player of the Year and an All-ACC Freshman Team member.
- The 2014-15 group set endless program marks that will be hard to top, including most wins (32), most 3-point field goals made (216), highest final ranking (seventh), most ACC wins (14), most Top 25 wins (6) and most home wins at the Donald L. Tucker Center (16). Since then, the 2016-17 team matched the highest end-of-season ranking and seventh and defeated nine Top 25 teams.
- White played a vital part in the development of several Florida State student-athletes in the 2013-14 season, most notably Natasha Howard and Cheetah Delgado. Howard posted five 30-point games en route to earning All-America honors from the Associated Press and Women's Basketball Coaches Association. Delgado had a remarkable year at the point guard spot, breaking the single-season record for assists at FSU with 216 and averaging the most by an ACC player (7.43) since the 2007-08 season.





- The blue-collar, hard-working nature of the 2013-14 team resulted in a 21-12 overall record and the program's 11th straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament Second Round following a win at No. 7 seed lowa State in the Stanford Regional.
- FSU has won at least one game in its last 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, the secondlongest active win streak in the ACC behind Duke.
- White was promoted to associate head coach prior to the 2012-13 season and his game planning and strategy took the Garnet and Gold offense to heights it hadn't seen in over 20 years
- Florida State finished in the top 10 nationally in both scoring and field goal percentage. The Seminoles' 74.8 points per game average and .453 shooting percentage were their highest marks since the 1991-92 and 1992-93 seasons, respectively. Senior guards Alexa Deluzio and Leonor Rodriguez and junior forward Natasha Howard gave FSU a school-record and an ACC-leading three All-ACC First Team selections, while senior forward Chasity Clayton captured ACC Sixth Player of the Year honors. The Seminoles finished fourth in the league.
- Additionally, Florida State captured back-to-back regular season ACC titles in 2010 and 2011, and advanced to the 2010 NCAA Tournament Elite Eight. The 2010-11 season was a culmination of seven consecutive NCAA postseason appearances, all with White on the bench.
- Considered by head coach Sue Semrau to be one of the rising stars of the coaching profession when she hired him in 2003, White has helped FSU reach new levels of success and brought an infectious energy to the program.
- White has directed the FSU defense and offense during his tenure as well as been one of the country's top recruiters. In 2012, CollegeInsider.com named him one of the nation's Top 20 assistant coaches in the country.
- The defensive coordinator for most of his tenure, White added the Seminoles' offense to his direction in 2011. He continues to hold responsibilities with recruiting, film and opponent breakdown in addition to assisting with camps each summer.
- Florida State experienced two of its greatest defensive seasons under White's tutelage as the team set a school record during the 2008-09 campaign by limiting opponents to 61.1 points per game. The Seminoles then broke that record in 2009-10 with a season that saw them hold opponents to just 60.8 points per contest. In 2012-13, the `Noles outscored opponents by 9.8 points per game.

- Since White's arrival, many Seminoles have captured unprecedented individual success. Eight players have been picked in the WNBA Draft, eight Seminoles have earned ACC All-Defensive team honors and FSU has nabbed 35 all-conference awards. In addition to the four All-ACC honorees in 2012-13, Christian Hunnicutt was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2011 and Jacinta Monroe was selected No. 6 by the Washington Mystics in the 2010 WNBA Draft. Monroe's selection was surpassed by Howard's No. 5 pick in the 2014 WNBA Draft by the Indiana Fever.
- White was well prepared when he arrived at Florida State. He came from Texas Tech where he spent 10 seasons, including seven years as an assistant coach, with the Lady Raiders' top-10 program under legendary head coach Marsha Sharp.
- Some of White's responsibilities at Texas Tech included individual workouts, scouting reports, perimeter and post player development and all aspects of recruiting, including mail correspondence and recruiting visits. White also served as the academic liaison for the women's basketball team, directing study hall and monitoring academic progress while also handling player relations.
- During White's time in Lubbock, Texas Tech won three Big 12 Championships and advanced to seven-straight NCAA Tournaments, including five Sweet 16 and two Elite Eight appearances. He was a student assistant on Tech's 1993 National Championship team and a graduate assistant coach for two seasons before being elevated to a full-time coach.
- While in Lubbock, Texas, White worked with some of the best players the game has ever seen. Among the players he influenced were National Player of the Year and three-time WNBA Player of the Year Sheryl Swoopes and also Plenette Pierson, who was named 2007 WNBA Sixth Woman of the Year.
- A 1996 graduate of Texas Tech, White earned his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science. He went on to receive a Master's Degree in sports administration in August of 1998. He attended Lubbock Christian University for three semesters before transferring to Texas Tech in January of 1993.
- As a high school athlete in Spur, he was a three-time All-District selection, two-time All-Region, and two-time third team all-state choice in basketball. His high school basketball and football teams advanced to the regional round both his junior and senior years. In addition to his football and basketball accolades, he was listed in the Spalding Top 100 tennis players in 1991.
- White is an NCAA certified recruiter and member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association. He is married to the former Melanie Smith, who is a professor at Florida A&M University. The Whites are the proud parents of Quentin and Vivian.



BROOKE WYCKOFF

- ASSISTANT COACH
- 7TH SEASON AT FLORIDA STATE

- She sparked the rise of the Florida State women's basketball program as a standout player
 on the court from 1997 to 2001. Ten years later, Brooke Wyckoff returned to the Seminoles
 this time on the bench, joining Sue Semrau's revamped staff beginning in the 2011-12
 season.
- Six years later the results speak for themselves. Wyckoff was an instrumental part of Florida State's 2014-15 campaign that included a school record for wins (32-5) and the program's second trip to the NCAA Elite Eight. The Seminoles finished the season with their highest final ranking ever at seventh in both the Associated Press and USA Today Polls as well as the RPI
- Wyckoff's most recent season in 2016-17 once again produced strong defensive results: The Seminoles went to their second NCAA Elite Eight in three years after allowing just 58.3 points per game, the third straight year they have held opponents to under 60 points per game. FSU led the ACC in rebound margin, rebounding defense, rebounding margin and offensive rebounding percentage. Since Wyckoff has taken control of the defensive game plan, FSU has put up record-setting numbers against the opposition.
- In her three seasons of taking over the defense, FSU's sub-60 points allowed in each year are the only three times it has surrendered less than 60 in program history. Wyckoff also helped post player Chatrice White have a strong first season with the Seminoles, earning ACC Sixth Player of the Year honors. Front-court performer Shakayla Thomas was named the ACC Player of the Year and earned All-America honors for the second straight season.
- Wyckoff's Spanish connections, being fluent in the Spanish language after enjoying a professional career overseas, resulted in point guard Leticia Romero finishing her career as the first three-time All-American in program history in 2016-17.
- In the 2015-16 season, Wyckoff's impact was felt once again. The Seminoles were one of eight programs nationally who enjoyed consecutive trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 and finished the season with a 25-8 overall record.
- Wyckoff's work on the defensive end yielded positive results in 15-16: FSU allowed just 57.5
 points per game, which follows a 2014-15 season when it allowed only 57.3 points per game.
- FSU's dominance on the glass was evident again in 2015-16. The Seminoles finished first in the conference in rebounding defense (29.1), rebounding margin (+12.0), defensive rebounding percentage (73.2) and offensive rebounding percentage (44.1 percent). Of the 16 ACC opponents faced, 11 were held to under 40 percent shooting.
- Wyckoff's work with the post players proved to be beneficial for two-time All-American Adut Bulgak. The Edmonton, Canada, native flourished in her senior year as a WBCA All-American, the Team MVP, an All-ACC performer and a Senior CLASS All-American. Bulgak was selected with the 12th pick in the first round of the WNBA Draft to the New York Liberty, giving FSU a run of three straight first-round selections (all post players in Bulgak, Natasha Howard and Jacinta Monroe).
- Wyckoff's primary scouting duties shifted to the defense and her hard work in game preparation paid dividends for the Seminoles. The 2014-15 Seminoles allowed just 57.3 points per game, which is the lowest they've ever surrendered. Florida State ranked third nationally with a +12.3 rebound margin and held nearly half (18 of 37) of their opponents to under 35 percent shooting. In each of the last two seasons (2015-16 and 2014-15), FSU has finished in the Top 5 in rebounding margin.
- FSU's defense, anchored by Bulgak as a junior, set a school record for total rebounds with 1,611, and allowed just 0.77 points per possession in 2014-15. The Seminoles never allowed more than 80 points scored.
- Wyckoff's efforts on the recruiting trail once again loomed large. Having played professionally in the Canary Islands, she is fluent in Spanish and was a big reason for the arrival of guard Leticia Romero in the 2014 summer. Romero enjoyed an All-America season for the Seminoles in 2014-15 and added more All-America honors as a junior and senior, being granted immediate eligibility mid-season and sparking FSU to a record-setting run.
- In 2013-14, FSU finished 21-12 and reached the NCAA postseason for the ninth time in the previous 10 years. A group that was short on depth due to transfers and injuries at the beginning of the season found a way to reach the second round of the NCAA Tournament and earn 10 Top 100 RPI wins. Senior forward Natasha Howard emerged as one of the top players in the country, averaging 20.5 points, 9.3 rebounds and 59.4 percent shooting.
- Wyckoff has been an influential figure in Howard's life both on and off the court, admired because of her personable nature and ability to connect well with her student-athletes. Under Wyckoff's tutelage, Howard had one of the most dominant seasons in school history as a senior, which included averaging 23.3 points and 9.6 rebounds against top-notch ACC competition. Howard was rewarded with the fifth overall selection by the Indiana Fever in the 2014 WNBA Draft, the highest in school history.





- In the 2012-13 year, FSU posted a 23-10 record, finished fourth in the ACC and advanced to its eighth NCAA Tournament in nine years. Along the way, Wyckoff, a star forward during her playing career, helped the Seminoles land a school-record and a conference-best three players on the All-ACC First Team, as senior guards Alexa Deluzio and Leo Rodriguez and junior forward Natasha Howard collected honors from the conference office.
- Four years later, Rodriguez would join fellow Canary Islands native Romero in the 2016 Summer Olympic Games and earn a silver medal in Rio – the country's first medal in women's basketball.
- Senior forward Chasity Clayton also nabbed ACC Sixth Player of the Year accolades, as Florida State finished in the top 10 nationally in both scoring and field goal percentage. FSU's 74.8 points per game average and .453 shooting percentage were its highest marks in 20 years.
- Without a doubt, Wyckoff was one of the greatest Seminoles ever to wear the Garnet and Gold on the hardwood before playing nine seasons in the WNBA. Wyckoff's experience at the professional level has given the Seminoles a rare commodity on the bench.
- Along with the immediate credibility her hoops career provides, Wyckoff possesses an amiable personality that has made her an immediate hit on the recruiting trail. Her efforts led the Seminoles to sign one of the nation's top incoming recruiting classes in 2013. Led by four-star McDonald's All-America center Kai James as well as Ivey Slaughter, Brittany Brown and Gabby Bevillard, the Noles' 2013 signing class featured three Top 100 players and ranked as the nation's No. 7 class by All-Star Girls Report and No. 11 by ESPNW HoopGurlz. That senior class won 106 games at FSU, the most in program history.
- Wyckoff's recruiting abilities shone through once again with the 2014 class, signing highly-touted prospects Shakayla Thomas, Chania Ray and Ama Degbeon. The addition of the No. 1 junior college center in the nation, Adut Bulgak, once again provided the Noles with an abundance of talent as she garnered All-America honors as a junior and senior at FSU.
- Wyckoff also serves as the Seminoles' program's liaison with the FSU academic support staff in addition to her on-court duties.
- In her first year back at FSU, Wyckoff, a star versatile forward during her career, helped tutor all-conference forwards Cierra Bravard and Howard. Bravard later signed a professional contract with the WNBA's San Antonio SilverStars and played the 2013 WNBA season with the Seattle Storm. Howard led the ACC in double-doubles in 2012, then set a single-season school record with 15 double-doubles as a senior.
- A native of West Chester, Ohio, the talented post/wing was one of the top high school players in the country before signing a National Letter of Intent with FSU in 1997 in what was Semrau's first season in Tallahassee.

- In her freshman year, Wyckoff made an immediate impact as she set a single-season record at the time with 80 blocks on her way to earning ACC All-Freshman Team honors. Conference accolades continued to roll in during her next three years with a pair of All-ACC Third Team selections (1999 and 2000) and finally an All-ACC First Team honor as a senior in 2001.
- Wyckoff's 1,350 career points is the 14th-most in school history and her 804 rebounds rank seventh. She ranks No. 2 at FSU in career blocks with 209. She averaged 12.4 ppg and 7.4 rpg while starting all 109 games she played in her career.
- Perhaps most importantly, Wyckoff was the cornerstone of the Seminoles' first winning season in nine years as the team posted a 19-12 record in 2001 and finished fourth in the ACC. That season culminated in the school's first trip to the NCAA Tournament in 10 years and All-America honors for Wyckoff, which was the first national accolade for an FSU women's basketball player since 1993. She capped her career by scoring 14.6 ppg and pulling down 6.6 rpg that final season.
- In addition to boasting the honor of being just one of four former 'Noles to have their jerseys' retired, Wyckoff was also an outstanding performer in the classroom. She is the only Seminole to ever earn four All-ACC Academic Women's Basketball Team honors as well as four nods to the ACC Academic Honor Roll.
- In 2001, she earned an ACC Postgraduate scholarship and was named to the ACC Legends Class of 2010. In 2002, she was named to the 51-member ACC 50th Anniversary Women's Basketball Team.
- She also played with the USA Women's Basketball Select Team for three consecutive summers.
- In 2011, Wyckoff was inducted into the Butler County Sports Hall of Fame as well as the Florida State Athletic Hall of Fame and the Greater Cincinnati Basketball Hall of Fame.
- Following her senior year, Wyckoff was selected by the Orlando Miracle in the second round of the WNBA Draft. She spent two seasons in Orlando before the team moved to Connecticut where she played another three seasons with the Sun.
- She was then selected by the Chicago Sky in the 2006 WNBA Expansion draft and played for that franchise until 2009.
- During her nine-year WNBA career, Wyckoff appeared in 242 games.
- After concluding her professional basketball career, Wyckoff served as an assistant girls basketball coach at Lakota East High School in Cincinnati, Ohio.
- Wyckoff has one daughter, Avery

- Florida State Assistant Coach Danielle Atkinson begins her fourth year as a member of the Seminoles' coaching staff. Her coaching, scouting and recruiting abilities have played an enormous role in FSU's tremendous three-year run, which began in her first season in 2014-15 and includes a 40-8 record in ACC play.
- In 2016-17, Atkinson had to balance her work responsibilities with motherhood as she welcomed her daughter London into the world during the season. After getting some necessary time away, she returned to the bench for a good portion of ACC play and the postseason, helping the Seminoles reach their second NCAA Elite Eight in the last three years.
- Her work on the recruiting trail paid off once again, welcoming in a good 2017 class that includes forward Savannah Wilkinson (London, England) and "Say Say" Lassiter (Dorchester, Mass.). FSU also brought in All-Big 12 graduate transfer guard AJ Alix and Maryland forward Kiah Gillespie.
- Atkinson finished her second season at FSU in 2015-16, helping the Seminoles to a 25-8 overall record and a second consecutive NCAA Sweet 16 appearance. Her individual work with guard Leticia Romero helped the Spaniard to a second straight All-America season, while her excellent recruiting work has given FSU the No. 4 signing class in the nation according to ESPNW. Romero would finish as FSU's first three-time All-American in 2017.
- Headed by Atkinson's ability to connect with the younger generation, five talented freshmen comprise FSU's 2016 recruiting class: Nicole Ekhomu (No. 19 overall; Guard; Bolingbrook, Ill.), A'Tyanna Gaulden (No. 21 overall; Guard; Ocilla, Ga.), Jasmine Walker (No. 23 overall; Forward; Montgomery, Ala.) as well as Nausia Woolfolk (No. 53 overall; Guard; Fort Valley, Ga.) and Iho Lopez (Forward; Spain).
- Another rising star in the coaching profession, Atkinson continues to help FSU stay among the nation's best programs through her work on the practice courts, in the games and on the recruiting trail.
- Atkinson wrapped up her first year at FSU by playing a huge part in the team's record-breaking 2014-15 season. Her immense devotion toward game preparation and scouting, practice planning, in-game adjustments and recruiting connections has already benefited the Seminole program immeasurably.
- Possessed with a great coaching demeanor and hard-working attitude, Atkinson fit in with the FSU coaching staff and student-athletes right away. The Seminoles' season-long success included several of Atkinson's scout games, and her ability to prepare the team so well in various situations such as out-of-bounds plays aided the group tremendously.
- She worked individually with several players, helping junior center Adut Bulgak and sophomore guard Leticia Romero enjoy All-America seasons while freshman standout Shakayla Thomas earned ACC Sixth Player of the Year and All-ACC Freshman Team honors. Atkinson's tutelage helped Florida State to a school-record 32 wins, including 27 by double digit points.
- Florida State women's basketball head coach Sue Semrau announced the hiring of Danielle Atkinson (formerly Danielle Santos) as the team's newest assistant coach on June 3, 2014.
- Known as an experienced coach with a great deal of knowledge in a variety of coaching realms, Atkinson has risen through the coaching ranks since starting her career as an assistant coach at Hofstra from 2006 to 2010. She has enjoyed successful stops with the Pride, Illinois State (2010-2012) and most recently Kentucky (2012-14).
- "Danielle is someone who has made a great impact in each of her stops at Hofstra, Illinois State and Kentucky," Semrau said upon the hiring of Atkinson. "Danielle brings both the knowledge and passion to excel in this profession and is a perfect complement to our staff. We are very excited to have her."
- While at Kentucky in her two seasons, Atkinson played a large role in helping the Wildcats to an NCAA Elite Eight run in the 2012-13 season and a trip to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2013-14. Responsible for coaching guard play, Atkinson was heavily involved in the progression of backcourt mates Jennifer O'Neill (All-SEC guard) and Linnae Harper (All-SEC freshman guard) in the 2013-14 year.
- In Atkinson's first season in Lexington, former Kentucky guard A'dia Mathies was named the 2013 SEC Co-Player of the Year as well as a Wooden Award finalist under her watch.
- Even before her arrival at FSU she was a tremendous recruiter, making strong connections in the North, South and Midwest. A large part of her successful coaching career has been her ability to develop tremendous relationships with student-athletes and their families through her engaging approach. She helped the Wildcats land the 17th-ranked 2014 recruiting class according to ESPNW.





- Atkinson also presents a strong in-game mindset, assisting heavily with scouting reports and helping with game adjustments and substitutions. She also served in other capacities with Kentucky, running summer basketball camps and skill sessions as well as helping her teams reach their goals in the classroom as the academic coordinator.
- She developed many of her current skill sets while at Illinois State, helping the Redbirds to two postseason trips which included a 2011-12 team that was chosen sixth in the Missouri Valley Conference preseason poll and finished second with a 13-5 league record.
- Atkinson got her start with Hofstra and spent four seasons in Hempstead, N.Y., including her final two years as the recruiting coordinator in addition to her assistant coach duties.
- At Hofstra, she was responsible for implementing the team's offensive strategies which helped the Pride record two 20-win seasons in her tenure, including a school-record 26 games in her first season. Atkinson's influential coaching style helped nine of her former players at Hofstra earn All-Colonial Athletic Association honors, while four went on to play professionally overseas.
- Atkinson is a Marietta, Ga., native who earned several academic honors while being a four-year letterwinner for the University of Florida from 2002-06. She was a three-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection, an Arthur Ashe Jr. Scholar Athlete Second Team member and a District 3 CoSIDA Academic All-America Team member.
- While in Gainesville, she graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Exercise and Sport Sciences with a concentration in Sport Management. Atkinson also minored in education and business administration.
- Atkinson emerged as a cerebral guard who left her career at Florida with some worthy achievements She finished her career seventh all-time at UF with 80 3-pointers, ranked 11th with 162 steals, 11th with 265 assists and fifth with a 78.2 free throw percentage.
- On May 24, 2015, the former Danielle Santos married Cleveland Atkinson. The two have one daughter, London.

- In order to ensure that everything is running smoothly away from the basketball court, Florida State needs a "coach" behind the scenes. Now in her 12th season with the FSU women's basketball program, Melissa Bruner has the daunting task of keeping everyone on the same page as Director of Basketball Operations.
- A former collegiate head coach and a four-sport letterwinner in college, Bruner is able to deftly handle a wide range of responsibilities in all facets of the program. She coordinates all areas of team travel and is also in charge of facility usage and management of all practices and games.
- She assists head coach Sue Semrau with scheduling and serves as the program's liaison with the athletics department's administration. Bruner oversees the equipment operations for the program and assists with the Seminole girls' summer camps.
- In addition to her administrative duties with the program, Bruner is also in her 11th season working as the color analyst for the radio broadcast of all FSU women's basketball games. She will join new play-by-play announcer Ariya Massoudi on several radio and ACC Network Extra broadcasts in the 2017-18 year.
- Bruner came to Florida State after serving four seasons as assistant athletics director and head women's basketball coach at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The Kohawks reached the IIAC Tournament all four years of her tenure and advanced to the quarterfinals in her final season.
- Bruner's players earned six all-conference honors. Bruner and Semrau previously worked together for two seasons at the University of Wisconsin-Madison while Semrau was an assistant coach.
- Bruner was Director of Women's Basketball Operations for the Badgers for seven years where she assisted in public relations, team travel and practice arrangements. Prior to her duties at Wisconsin, Bruner earned a master's degree in physical education, with a concentration in athletic administration, from Ohio University in 1995. She received her business administration and accounting degree with a minor in physical education from Coe College in 1994.
- As a Kohawk, Bruner earned Academic All-Midwest Conference honors in softball, basketball, tennis and volleyball.
- In recognition for her athletic and academic achievements, she was named a national GTE Academic All-American her senior year of college.

John Thrasher, a Florida State University alumnus and former state legislator, is the university's 15th president.

Thrasher assumed the presidency on Nov. 10, 2014, after a successful career as a state legislator, businessman, lobbyist and lawyer. As president, Thrasher has focused his efforts on elevating FSU's reputation as a preeminent research institution. He has presided over a \$1 billion fundraising campaign, advanced the university's academic and research mission, championed diversity and inclusion, and welcomed the best and brightest students in the university's history.

Thrasher earned a bachelor's degree in business from Florida State in 1965. After graduating, he joined the U.S. Army where he received the Army Commendation Medal in Germany and was awarded two Bronze Stars for his service in Vietnam. He was honorably discharged as a captain in 1970.

Thrasher then returned to his alma mater to earn a law degree with honors in 1972.

After working in private law practice in Daytona Beach and Tallahassee for several years, Thrasher returned to Jacksonville to serve as general counsel of the Florida Medical Association, a position he held for 20 years. He also served as "of counsel" to the Jacksonville law firm of Smith, Hulsey & Busey from 1996 to 2008. Thrasher was a partner of Southern Strategy Group, a Tallahassee-based governmental relations firm, from 2001 to 2009.

Thrasher's political career began in 1986 when he was elected to the Clay County School Board where he served as vice chairman, then chairman. He then became a state representative in 1992, and he was re-elected without opposition in 1994, 1996 and 1998.



Thrasher was unanimously elected as the speaker of the Florida House of Representatives in 1998. He was elected to the Florida Senate in 2009 and subsequently re-elected. He served as chairman for the Republican Party of Florida in 2010.

From 2001 to 2005, Thrasher was the first chair of Florida State University's Board of Trustees. He was a key supporter of legislation that brought funding to the development of FSU's College of Medicine, and a building at the college is named in his honor.

In 2016, he was inducted into the FSU College of Business Hall of Fame. He currently serves on the College Football Playoff Board of Managers.

Born in Columbia, S.C., Thrasher moved to Florida as a child and grew up in Jacksonville. He and his wife, Jean, have three children and eight grandchildren.

Stan Wilcox was named FSU's 11th full-time Director of Athletics in August of 2013 and promoted to Vice President in July of 2016. In his four years on the job the Seminoles won the school's third football National Championship in 2013 and the University's first-ever soccer National Championship in 2014. Also, the athletic department has recorded three top-15 finishes in the Learfield Sports Athletic Director's Cup fielding fewer sports than almost any other school in the top-25 of the standings.

Wilcox has been at the helm during a span that is one of the most successful in the history of Seminole athletics. FSU has claimed 13 ACC Coach of the Year honors in the last three years and won 19 conference titles. During Wilcox's tenure there have been 23 ACC Player of the Year honors awarded to Seminoles and FSU student-athletes have received more than 200 All-America honors. Add to that a Heisman Trophy winner and 17 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans and the arc of the program under his direction is apparent.

Facilities upgrades have also been a major focus since Wilcox arrived in Tallahassee. In the last few years the Tucker Center, home to FSU's men's and women's basketball programs, has been completely transformed with new seating, state-of-the-art scoreboards and numerous infrastructure improvements. The arena underwent another \$10 million worth of renovations, which included new locker rooms, player lounges, training rooms and auxiliary areas. Seminole football offices, locker rooms, common areas, meeting rooms, coaches' locker rooms and players' lounge areas have all been significantly renovated or newly constructed. In his short time at the helm, locker room renovations for soccer, softball and beach volleyball have also been completed.

Wilcox came to Florida State from Duke where he served as Senior Deputy Director of Athletics from 2008-2013. During his time at Duke, Wilcox's duties included managing the day-to-day operation of the department and oversight of the football program. Other oversight responsibilities included Human Resources, Contracts, Legal Affairs, Athletics Training, Strength and Conditioning, Equipment, Campus Recreation, Physical Education, Marketing and Promotions, Ticketing, Digital Media, Sports Information and Video Operations. In addition, Wilcox was responsible for coordinating football scheduling.

Before arriving at Duke, Wilcox, a former basketball letterman at Notre Dame, spent three years as the deputy director of athletics at his alma mater. Prior to returning to South Bend in 2005, he served 11 years as an associate commissioner of the BIG EAST Conference.

While working at the BIG EAST Conference, Wilcox was the league's representative to the NCAA Management Council from 2000-05 and served on the Management Council subcommittees on incentives and disincentives, governance, nominations and the task force to review the NCAA's one-time transfer exception rule. His national compliance responsibilities extended to the NCAA recruiting task force and the basketball issues committee. His internal BIG EAST Conference duties included handling the league's NCAA governance, legislative, enforcement, compliance services and legal issues. In recognition of his outstanding service, he was awarded the 2001-02 National Association of Athletics Compliance Coordinators Outstanding Achievement Award.

In addition to his Florida State duties, Wilcox currently holds several national and ACC leadership positions including: membership on the NCAA Administrative Cabinet; NCAA Football Oversight Committee; Internal ACC Network Content Committee; Chair of the ACC Women's Basketball Committee; and, LEAD1 Board of Directors.

Throughout his career Wilcox has spent considerable time expanding opportunities for others. He helped to create the Minority Opportunity Athletics Association and subsequently served as a member of its Board, and from 2003 to 2005 he was President of the Black Coaches Association (BCA).

Before his tenure at the BIG EAST Conference, Wilcox worked as a legislative assistant at the NCAA from 1989-94. Prior to that, he worked as a senior court analyst for the Kings County Supreme Court in Brooklyn, N.Y., from 1982-89. Following his graduation from Notre Dame in 1981 with a degree in economics, he spent one year as an account executive for Serres, Visones & Rice Insurance in New York, N.Y. and was a graduate assistant basketball coach at C.W. Post College.

A native of North Babylon, N.Y., Wilcox played in 100 career games on the hardwood for the Fighting Irish and was a member of Notre Dame's 1978 club that faced Duke in the NCAA Final Four in St. Louis, Mo. He helped the Irish to a four-year ledger of 92-26 with four NCAA Tournament berths. Wilcox went on to earn a juris doctor degree from the Brooklyn Law School in 1988 and is a member of the New York State Bar Association.

Stan is married to the former Ramona Harrell and has three daughters: Yasmeen, Nadia, and Soraya (who is married to Adam Kent and has a daughter, Cora). Ramona has three sons: James, Brian, and Charles.





Cindy Hartmann was hired in the spring of 2014 to the newly created position of Deputy Director of Athletics for Administration at FSU. She joined FSU's executive athletic staff with primary responsibility for personnel management and human resources. She also is the sport administrator for soccer, softball and the men's and women's swimming and diving programs.

Prior to Florida State, Hartmann served as Associate Athletic Director for Compliance at Duke for five years. At Duke she administered the compliance office and served as primary sport oversight for the Blue Devil's rowing program and secondary administrator for women's basketball. Before transitioning to her compliance role, Hartmann served as Assistant Director of Athletics for Human Resources beginning in 2008. Prior to her work at Duke, she worked at the University of Dayton for over a decade serving most recently as an Associate Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator from 2001-07.

A native of Syracuse, NY, Hartmann's previous experience in college athletics includes stints at Georgia Perimeter College, Georgia State University, the University of Connecticut, and the University of Tennessee.

Hartmann currently serves on the ACC Equity Committee and the ACC Softball Committee. She previously served a four-year appointment on the NCAA Women's Basketball Issues Committee. She also served a four-year term (2002-06) on the NCAA Women's Basketball Committee and one year (2001-02) as a member of the NCAA Academics/Eligibility/ Compliance Cabinet.

After earning four varsity letters as a member of the basketball team, Hartmann graduated from Syracuse University in 1991 with a degree in photojournalism. She went on to receive a master's degree in education-sport administration from Georgia State University in 1995.

Hartmann and her husband, Troy, are the parents of two children, Samuel and Olivia.



Karl Hicks was hired in the spring of 2014 to the newly-created position of Deputy Director of Athletics for External Operations at FSU. Hicks oversees all external operations for athletics including tickets, sports information, marketing and promotions, communications, website and risk management and will serve as the staff liaison with Seminole Productions as well as oversight of the men's basketball program.

Hicks was the ACC Senior Associate Commissioner for Men's Basketball Operations from 2007-2014. During his seven years at the league office his responsibilities included oversight of all men's basketball operations, as well as management of the ACC Men's Basketball Tournament and two NCAA Men's Tournament second and third rounds hosted by the conference in 2009 and 2012, respectively.

Prior to his role with the ACC, Hicks served as the Assistant General Manager and Senior Vice President of Basketball Operations for the NBA's Charlotte Bobcats from 2003-2007. His initial foray in professional sports came in 2000 when he was hired by the NBA as Executive Director of the newly-created National Basketball Development League, where he spent three years. He also served at the Southeastern Conference (1998-2000) as Assistant Commissioner for Institutional and Student Services and at the NCAA (1994-1998) as an Enforcement Representative.

A 1983 graduate of the University of New Hampshire with a B.A. in Communications, Hicks was a member of the men's basketball team and went on to serve as an assistant basketball coach at his alma mater (1984-1985) and at the American University in Washington, DC (1985-1990).

He earned a master's degree in business administration from the University of Maryland in 1992, and resides in Tallahassee with his wife Melanie and son Eli.



Matt Behnke is Florida State Athletics' Senior Associate Athletic Director for Business and Chief Financial Officer. This is his fifth year serving in this role.

As the Department's chief financial officer, Behnke is responsible for all departmental business and financial matters, including budgetary oversight and financial reporting. He will assist in the departments' strategic planning efforts as well as serve as the Department's representative with all other University financial divisions. In addition, he will oversee the department's information technology functions. He serves as the financial liaison to all athletic direct support organizations (DSO's), including Seminole Boosters, Inc. and FSU Financial Assistance, Inc. Under the guiding principles of transparency and enhanced financial reporting, Behnke has led the efforts to simplify the Department's fiscal affairs by consolidating the multiple budgets of the Department and reporting the Department's budget in a transparent and concise manner. The result, the Department's Athletic Budget Reporting Package and the enhanced Annual Financial Statements, have been recognized for its presentation of the fiscal condition of the Department.

Behnke has been involved with Seminole athletic finances since 2004 as a member of the Seminole Boosters, Inc., the University's athletic development and fundraising organization. Becoming the Booster Chief Financial Officer in 2009, he oversaw all financial matters and worked with the department's business functions on all consolidated reporting functions. He was responsible for strategic planning, budgetary development and communication, financial reporting, student-athlete endowment investment implementation, and Seminole athletic facility financing. He led the effort to finance the new Albert J. Dunlap Indoor Training Center (opened in August 2013) and the new Student Housing Facility (opened in August 2014).

A native of Three Oaks, MI, Behnke graduated from Florida State University with a bachelor's degree in accounting in 1998. He began his career at the public accounting firm Thomas Howell Ferguson P.A. in Tallahassee, where he earned his CPA certification from the State of Florida Board of Accountancy.

Behnke has previously served on the FSU Fraud Prevention & Detection Committee as well as numerous Florida Institute of CPA committees. He currently serves as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference Finance Committee as well as the Seminole Boosters Student-Athlete Endowment Committee.

Behnke is married to the former Kelly May, and they have one son, AJ.



Jim Curry was elevated to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director for Governance and Compliance, and appointed to the department's executive leadership team in 2016. He provides direct oversight for both the compliance and equipment office, and serves as the sport administrator for football, men's tennis and women's tennis.

Curry joined the Seminoles in 2011 as the Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance, having previously served in the same capacity at the University of Maryland and Coastal Carolina University. He was named Florida State's Senior Compliance Administrator and Associate Athletics Director for Compliance in 2012.

Curry has spent more than a decade working in college athletics and is heavily involved in national governance activities. Vanessa Fuchs has a long history at Florida State University as a student-athlete and administrator and in May of 2012 she was promoted to the role of Senior Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator after serving as the department's Associate Athletic Director for Compliance since 2010.

As a member of the department's executive leadership team, Fuchs has direct oversight of Women's Basketball, Indoor Volleyball, Beach Volleyball, Sports Performance (Sports Medicine, Nutrition, Strength and Conditioning) and Student Services while also chairing the sport administrator group responsible for day-today administrative support for each of FSU's 20 sports. In addition, Fuchs currently serves as co-chair of the athletics department Substance Abuse and Drug-Testing Program, Title IX Deputy Coordinator for athletics, is a member of the university's Diversity and Inclusion Council Communication Subcommittee and serves on the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Women's Basketball, Women's Volleyball, Autonomy and SAAC Committees. In 2015, Fuchs was appointed to serve on the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Committee after completing a four-year term on the Board of Directors for the National Association for Athletic Compliance (NAAC). Fuchs was most recently appointed to serve on the FSU Varsity Club Board of Directors in May 2017.

In June of 2015, Women Leaders In College Sports (formerly NACWAA) named Fuchs the DI Administrator of the Year. Florida State followed that recognition in October 2016 by honoring Fuchs with the Champions Beyond the Game Award (scholarship era), recognizing former FSU women athletes who have excelled in life after college sports.

In June of 2013, former Florida State President Dr. Eric Barron named Fuchs the school's interim Athletics Director as she became the first female to lead the Seminoles' Athletic Department. The former Seminole basketball player was one of just seven females leading an athletics department among the 124 schools that participated at the FBS level in 2012.

Since joining the athletics staff in 2010, Fuchs has focused her time on providing strategic direction for departmental initiatives focused on student-athlete welfare, enhancing athletic performance, gender equity, ethnic diversity and Title IX. Fuchs oversaw the facilities staff from 2012-2015 and during that time, the department's 10-year Master Facilities Plan was completed. Fuchs was also instrumental in building a comprehensive NCAA rules education program, implementing a department-wide recruiting and compliance software system and establishing a new team structure for the compliance office. All of which assisted the department in a successfully fulfilling its NCAA probationary period which concluded in March 2013.

Prior to arriving at Florida State, Fuchs committed seven years to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in Indianapolis, Indiana. In 2007, her extensive knowledge of NCAA legislation, interpretations and the NCAA's governance process earned her a promotion to Associate Director of Academic and Membership Affairs (AMA).

Fuchs remained rooted in AMA throughout her tenure with the NCAA. Fuchs was primarily responsible for supervising the functions of the Legislative Relief Waiver team and contributed heavily to issuing interpretations, serving as a staff liaison to NCAA governance committees and leading project teams for the association.

Before embarking on her career with the NCAA, Fuchs got her start working for the Atlantic Coast Conference as a Championships Intern in 2001. The Pompano Beach, Fla., native was a four-year letter winner for the Seminoles' women's basketball team from 1997-2001. She was the team co-captain in her senior year. Fuchs finished her career as a three-time ACC Honor Roll selection.

Fuchs graduated Magna Cum Laude with a bachelor's degree in communications at Florida State University and earned her master's degree from the University of North Carolina in sport administration. Her father, Don, was a pole-vaulter at Florida State and her brother Joseph is also an FSU alumnus.

MATTHEW SCHMAUCH LEADERSHIP AWARD

Matthew Schmauch, an Assistant Director of Academic Support who worked with the women's basketball program for four seasons, was instrumental in the academic success of FSU student-athletes. His influence went beyond the classroom. He was an ambassador, a mentor, a friend, a big brother, a fan — truly a shining example of where hard work and determination can take you. This award, established in his memory, is given annually to the women's basketball player who exemplifies these characteristics of leadership.



The Florida State Athletics Department lost a dear member of its Seminole family on June 13, 2003. Matt Schmauch, 29, an Assistant Director for the Athletic Academic Support Program at Florida State, died from anaphylaxis due to an allergic reaction to nuts while representing FSU at the N4A convention in St. Louis, Mo.

A native of Allen Park, Mich., Schmauch had been a valuable member of the athletic academic support staff since 1996. A glowing role model in the classroom, Schmauch earned a bachelor's degree in finance from Florida State in 1995 and went on to receive a master's degree in athletic administration from FSU in 1996.

In 2003-04, the Florida State women's basketball program created a special award in honor of Schmauch.

ALICIA "ICE" GLADDEN

The Florida State women's basketball family suffered an immeasurable loss on April 19, 2013, when former standout guard Alicia "Ice" Gladden passed away at the age of 27 following a tragic car accident.

Nicknamed "Ice" because of her smooth style of play on the court, Gladden was an enormous part of Florida State's program-building trip to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2007. The native of Orange Park, Fla., who always showcased a beautiful left-handed touch was known as someone who made you smile and carried an infectious personality.



- Gladden became the only Seminole to capture ACC All-Defensive Team honors three times.
- At the time, she set the Florida State career record for steals (275) as well as the single-season record (101) in 2004-05.
- Led the 'Noles in scoring in her junior and senior seasons, culminating by averaging 13.5 points and leading FSU to its first-ever NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in 2007.
- Two-Time All-ACC Third Team performer and an All-ACC Honorable Mention player who became the 20th member of Florida State's 1,000 point club, finishing with 1,403 career points which is currently 11th all-time

HALL OF FAMERS




The Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame enjoys a rich tradition. Florida State is fortunate to boast an athletics program that reflects the integrity achieved by an academic institution with over 150 years of success.

There are over 300 members of the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. The first and largest class was inducted in 1977 and there has been a class inducted every fall since with the exception of 1996 when Florida State spent the year celebrating its 50th Anniversary of athletics.

Five former women's basketball greats - Sue Galkantas, Tia Paschal, Wanda Burns-Jackson, Brooke Wyckoff and Bev Burnett - are members of the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame.

SUE GALKANTAS HALL OF FAME 1989


Florida State may never forget the scoring power of Sue Galkantas, who with an amazing 2,323 career points, is the most prolific scorer in Seminole basketball history. That total is the most points ever scored by a player, male or female — in Florida State history. Galkantas is currently one of just 67 players in NCAA history to amass 2,300 career points and 1,000 career rebounds.



Averaging 19.4 points per game in her career — a mark that still ranks number one on the career lists — was just a glimpse of the impact that she had as a Seminole. In her rookie year, she broke the FSU freshman scoring record and was named a freshman

All-American in numerous publications. By her sophomore year, Galkantas had already scored her 1,000th point and established herself as one of the top 20 scorers in the nation. In her junior season, she led FSU to a 24-6 record and to its first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Overall, she scored in double figures in 115 of 120 games and still holds 10 career and single-season records. In 1989, Galkantas also became the first female FSU athlete to have her number retired.

TIA PASCHAL HALL OF FAME 1999

The Florida State women's basketball program previously enjoyed its greatest success during the four-year career of Tia Paschal, who lettered for the Seminoles from 1989 to 1993.

A forward from Thomson, Ga., Paschal was an immediate contributor for Florida State and was a three-year starter after averaging 20 minutes of play as a rookie. She ended her career averaging 19.4 points and 7.4 rebounds as a senior while earning first team All-ACC honors and second team All-America honors

by the American Women's Sports Federation. During her career, she helped lead the Seminoles to two consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances in 1989-90 and 1990-91 as well as a Metro Conference championship in the 1990-91 season.

Paschal's versatility made her a weapon in every facet of the game, which is evident by the records she still holds at Florida State. She nearly holds the records free throws made (14) in a game and is third for steals in a career (269). Paschal is also among FSU's top

10 in five season and six career records and ranks third all-time in scoring with 1,662 points.

Honors came in abundance for Paschal throughout her career. After redshirting the 1988-89 season with a knee injury, Paschal took the conference by storm as a freshman, earning Metro Conference All-Rookie Team honors. She earned Metro All-Tournament Team honors two seasons and was twice named the conference Player of the Week.

Paschal continued playing the game that she loves professionally. Since her graduation in criminology in

1993, Paschal's professional overseas experience included stops in Germany, Sweden and Spain. She also played one season with the Charlotte Sting of the WNBA.

HALL OF FAMERS

WANDA BURNS HALL OF FAME 2006

Wanda Burns overcame adversity to become a successful women's basketball player at Florida State. One of Marynell Meadors' first recruits, Burns was a highly-touted 5-foot-8 guard out of Macon, Georgia.

Though she carried a 3.0 GPA in high school, her SAT scores were below the required score to meet the new NCAA Prop 48 rule and she had to sit out her freshman season. Burns used the year to hit the books and get acclimated to campus life.



She took the court in 1988-89 with something to prove. She averaged 11 points a game and led the team with 92 assists, helping FSU to its first winning season since 1983.

She electrified the team in 1989-90 and sparked FSU to a 21-9 record and to the NCAA Tournament. Burns set an FSU record for free throw percentage and led the team in scoring, three pointers and steals.

In 1990-91, her final season, Burns was named Metro Conference Player of the Week, set a single game record with 10 steals in a game and led the team in three-point shooting. FSU enjoyed one of its most successful seasons with a record of 25-7. Burns led the Metro Conference in scoring at 18.5 points per game and scored double figures in 38 consecutive games. She was named Metro Conference Tournament MVP and Player of the Year and also earned Hanes Her Way NCAA Woman of the Year and Second Team All-American honors.

Burns still ranks among FSU's top 10 in two career and seven single-season statistical categories.

BROOKE WYCKOFF HALL OF FAME 2011

Florida State women's basketball assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff solidified her place among the all-time great 'Noles in September 2011 with her induction into the Florida State Athletic Hall of Fame.

Wyckoff, who was a star forward for head coach Sue Semrau's first hoops teams from 1997-2001, became the fourth women's basketball player to be inducted into the Hall of Fame on Sept. 2 at a ceremony at the University Center Club, joining Sue Galkantas (Class of 1989), Tia Paschal (Class of 1999) and Wanda Burns (Class of 2006).



"Getting inducted into Florida State's Hall of Fame is the biggest honor I have ever received," Wyckoff said. "It's amazing. It's surreal and an honor to be among the amazing athletes that are in it. It was a great opportunity for me to reflect on my career here, and to thank everybody publicly made it so special."

Wyckoff and the rest of her illustrious class – Tony Brown, Sam Cowart, Marshall McDougall, Stephen Parry, Chris Weinke and Andy Miller – were also honored on Bobby Bowden Field at Doak Cambell Stadium during FSU football's 2011 season-opening football game versus Louisiana-Monroe.

A recent addition to Semrau's coaching staff, Wyckoff was hired by her alma mater in the summer 2011. Wyckoff spent nine years in the WNBA, playing for the Orlando Miracle, Connecticut Sun and the Chicago Sky.

Wyckoff was one of the top high school players in the country but chose to leave West Chester, Ohio, to play for Sue Semrau and Florida State. She made an immediate impact setting an FSU record with 80 blocked shots as a freshman in 1997.

She went on to earn All-ACC honors as a sophomore and junior and capped her senior season (2001) with first team All-ACC honors as well as All-America honors. She was also FSU's only four-time Academic All-ACC performer and received an ACC postgraduate scholarship.

Wyckoff scored 1,350 points over her storied FSU career and finished as the second best shot blocker the Seminoles have ever produced with 209. She grabbed 804 career rebounds to also rank among FSU's all-time Top 10.

BEV BURNETT HALL OF FAME 2012

Tallahassee native Bev Burnett rounded out her Florida State career as one of the most prolific scorers in school history. A four-year letterwinner from 1985-89, Burnett finished her career with 1,509 points, a mark that ranks sixth in FSU history. She also ranks fifth all-time in scoring average at 15.6 points per game.

A team captain, the 5-foot-9 forward earned All-Metro Conference First Team honors in both 1988 and 1989 and led the Seminoles in scoring in each of those seasons with averages of 21.3 and 15.9

points per game, respectively. Her 21.3 points per game average in 1988 still ranks as the

second highest single-season mark in Florida State women's basketball history.

Burnett is a six-time member of the FSU 30-point club and her 34 points vs. both Florida A&M (1986) and Virginia Tech (1988) is tied for the eighth-most points scored in a game by a Seminole. She was also named a third team All-American by the American Women's Sports Federation in 1988 and has numerous conference player of the week honors to her credit.

She became the fifth women's basketball player inducted into the FSU Hall of Fame.

RETIRED JERSEYS

The Florida State Women's Basketball has enjoyed a long and rich tradition. Part of that legacy includes honoring some of the top players in program history by retiring their jerseys. Four Seminoles in Sue Galkantas (1980-84), Tia Paschal (1988-93), Wanda Burns (1988-91) and Brooke Wyckoff (1997-01) have had their jerseys retired, with Burns and Paschal being the most recent in a joint jersey retirement ceremony on Jan. 28, 2007.






