NOTABLES

- For the first time in her 22-year head coaching career, FSU head coach Sue Semrau must replenish her entire starting five from a season ago as seniors AJ Alix, Chatrice White, Shakayla Thomas, Imani Wright and Ama Degbeon all graduated. Despite returning just four letterwinners from last year's team that finished 12-4 in the ACC, Semrau has plenty of talent waiting in the wings.
- The new foundation for Florida State Women's Basketball has a chance to be strong moving forward with the nation's sixth-ranked recruiting class that is very guard-heavy. The class includes four guards in Izabela Nicoletti (No. 16 overall; Brazil), Kourtney Weber (No. 51; New Orleans), Morgan Jones (No. 66; Jonesboro, Ga.) and Amaya Brown (No. 99; Albuquerque, N.M.) as well as power forward Valencia Myers (No. 63; Solon, Ohio). Nicoletti will sit out the season after sustaining a knee injury on July 25.
- A candidate for Florida State's breakthrough player of the year is sophomore shooting guard Savannah Wilkinson, a native of London, England, who has experience on Great Britain's National Team. Wilkinson had a very productive summer playing in the FIBA U20 Championships and is already a proven shooter who shot 43.3 percent from 3-point range last season in limited time. With a year under her belt at the collegiate level and a good adjustment to American culture, Wilkinson enters her second season with a lot of promise.
- For the first time in quite some time, Florida State Women's Basketball has brought in multiple new coaches who help form a very knowledgeable and experienced coaching staff. During the off-season, former FSU student-athlete and coach Brooke Wyckoff was elevated to Associate Head Coach as she begins her eighth season with her alma mater. Also, Head Coach Sue Semrau added Joy McCorvey from Michigan as well as JC Carter from Utah State as her assistant coaches.

Florida State Women's Basketball's ascension has been startling. In recent seasons, the Seminoles have proven they belong among the elite.

Over the last four years, Florida State Women's Basketball has:

- Finished in the Top 15 or higher of the final USA Today Poll (7th in 2015, 12th in 2016, 7th in 2017, 14th in 2018).
- One of just seven schools to secure four consecutive AP Top-15 final rankings.
- Has totaled 25+ wins in each of the last four years (111 wins).
- Joins only Notre Dame and Louisville as programs whom have won 75 percent or more of their conference games in each of the last four seasons.
- Stayed in the Top 15 of the USA Today Poll for the last 68 weeks.
- One of 10 NCAA Division I programs to make multiple Elite Eights since 2015.
- 58-5 record at the Donald L. Tucker Center since 2014-15.
- 34-4 over its last 38 games against in-state opponents.
- Garnered a 111-27 overall record.
- Ensured a Top-4 seed in the ACC Tournament each season since 2014-15.
- Produced 12 All-America Honors.

- Recorded 25+ wins for the fourth straight season, finishing with a 26-7 overall record.
- Clinched a double-bye in the ACC Tournament for the fourth consecutive year, finishing third in the conference with a 12-4 record.
- Joins only Notre Dame and Louisville as programs whom have won 75 percent or more of their conference games in each of the last four seasons.
- Reached the NCAA Tournament for the 13th time in the last 14 seasons.
- Won its 15th consecutive NCAA First Round game, defeating Little Rock – a streak that dates back to 1991.
- Averaged the second-most points in a season in program history with 81.0 points per game. It was also just the second time FSU averaged 80+ in a season.
- Recorded nine wins against NCAA Tournament opponents.
- Earned a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year and the fifth time in program history.
- Ranked in the Top 20 nationally in field goal percentage (20th), offensive rebounds per game (16th), rebound margin (sixth), rebounds per game (11th), scoring margin (10th) and scoring offense (13th).
- Led the ACC in rebounding offense (42.8), rebounding margin (+10.0) and offensive rebounding percentage (41.4 percent).
- Finished the Associated Press Poll ranked 11th, securing a Top-15 finish for four straight seasons to join just seven other schools (UConn, Notre Dame, South Carolina, Baylor, Louisville, Oregon State and Stanford).
- Finished 14th in the Final USA Today Poll, staying in the Top 15 for the third straight year.
- Set a program record with 229 made 3-point field goals.
- Set a program record for free throw percentage at 72.3 percent (previous high was 71.8 percent in 2009-10).
- Delivered eight wins against Top 55 RPI opponents entering the NCAA Tournament.
- Reached its fifth ACC Tournament semi-final.
- Finished 4-0 against rivalry schools Miami (3-0) and Florida (1-0). Included in those wins was FSU's largest margin ever vs. the 'Canes (105-67) and its largest road win ever vs. UF (84-54).
- Led by the winningest senior class in program history with 111 wins (Ama Degbeon, Shakayla Thomas, AJ Alix, Chatrice White and Imani Wright).
- Out-rebounded its opponents by 10 or more boards in 19 different games.
- Churned out multiple All-Americans for the fourth consecutive year (Shakayla Thomas and Imani Wright).
- Had multiple All-ACC First Team performers for the second straight year (Thomas and Wright).
- Tied program record with four All-ACC Academic Team selections (Wright, AJ Alix, Chatrice White, Ama Degbeon).
- Extended its regular-season record to 15-0 against travel opponents Miami and Clemson since 2014-15.
- Finished 13th in the country with 1.086 points per possession.
- Improved its record against in-state opponents to 34-4 over the last 38 games, including 7-0 in 2017-18.
- Finished 5-0 in games that were decided by five points or less.
- Signed the nation's sixth-ranked recruiting class according to ESPNW.
- Tied for its highest ranked win ever when it defeated No. 2 Louisville on the road, marking the program's eighth AP Top 5 win.
- Recorded a program-record five 100-point games, including in back-to-back games for the first time vs. Miami (105-67) and Virginia Tech (107-62).
- School-record three 100-point games against ACC opponents.
- Boasts the 11th toughest schedule in the nation, with opponents combining for a .631 winning percentage.

The Seminoles are one of **10 Division I programs** who have made two or more NCAA Elite Eight appearances since 2015.

Florida State has reached the round of eight in two of the last four seasons.

2009-10 SEASON (29-6)

- No. 3-seeded Florida State Women's Basketball reached its first NCAA Elite Eight following an exhilarating 74-71 win over No. 7 seed Mississippi State.
- The Seminoles set a then-school record with 29 victories while winning its second consecutive co-ACC regular season title.
- FSU went 12-2 in ACC play, defeating North Carolina, Miami and Maryland.

2014-15 SEASON (32-5)

- Ranked seventh in the final USA Today Poll on April 8, marking FSU's highest final ranking ever.
- Reached the NCAA Elite Eight for the second time in school history with a 66-65 win over No. 3 seed Arizona State.
- Was the only Division I men's or women's team to out-rebound every opponent in the regular season. FSU out-rebounded its opponents in 36 of its 37 games played overall.
- Finished 18-3 in non-conference play and boasted an average scoring margin of +20.2 against opponents outside of ACC play.

2016-17 SEASON (28-7)

- Matched the 2014-15 team for the best final school ranking ever at No. 7 in the USA Today Poll.
- Eclipsed the previous school record of six Top 25 wins (2014-15) by winning nine games against ranked foes.
- Became the highest-scoring Seminole squad in ACC history, averaging 79.0 points per game.
- Delivered a 13-3 record in ACC play, finishing second.



21 YEARS OF COACH SUE

Sue Semrau became the 10th head coach in Florida State women's basketball history on June 13, 1997. At her introductory press conference, she said "I'd have to have a lot of faith that this (program) could be a sleeping giant."

Semrau guided Florida State to its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 10 years, and its first as a member of the ACC, in 2001. Current Associate Head Coach Brooke Wyckoff and FSU Senior Associate A.D./SWA Vanessa Fuchs were seniors on that team.

The native of Seattle, Wash., who took a major rebuilding job, is the active coaching leader in the conference in ACC Coach of the Year awards. Semrau is a four-time winner of the honor, winning in 2001, 2005, 2009 and 2015.

In the 2005-06 season, Semrau became the winningest head coach in FSU Women's Basketball history.



She helped guide the United States U18 and U19 teams to gold medals in 2010 and 2011, respectively. Semrau most recently represented her country at the highest level as a USA Basketball Women's National Team Training Camp court coach in Sept. 2017.

The 10th season under Sue Semrau couldn't have been any sweeter as her 2006-07 squad made school history. A 68-61 victory over Stanford in the second round of the NCAA Tournament sent the Seminoles to their first NCAA Tournament Sweet 16.

The Seminoles were road warriors in 2008-09 as they posted a perfect 10-0 record on the road, including a 7-0 mark in the ACC which helped propel them to a share of the regular season title with Maryland. A year later FSU did it again, compiling another 12-2 ACC mark to lead the conference in 2010.

A then-school record 29 wins in the 2009-10 season was highlighted by FSU's first trip to the NCAA Elite Eight after defeating Mississippi State.

It was a three-peat of No. 3 seeds in the NCAA Tournament, as the Seminoles compiled a 24-8 record and an 11-3 mark in ACC play under Semrau.

In the 2012-13 season, Florida State had a league-best and a school-record three All-ACC First Team selections, advanced to the NCAA Tournament second round and tallied its eighth 20-win season with Semrau at the helm.

Semrau won the 2013 Kay Yow Heart of a Coach Award presented by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Semrau reached the pinnacle of her coaching career by winning three different national coach of the year honors in the 2014-15 season. The Seminoles finished with a school-record 32 wins (32-5) while advancing to their second NCAA Elite Eight. She also picked up her fourth ACC Coach of the Year award.

Back-to-back NCAA Sweet 16 appearances highlighted another strong season for the Seminoles in 2015-16. FSU finished 25-8 overall and went 13-3 in the ACC, its second-most wins in the conference ever.

Semrau helped set the standard once again in 2016-17, setting a program record with nine AP Top 25 wins and helping FSU reach its third NCAA Elite Eight.

WORLDWIDE SEMINOLES

Whether it's representing Spain on the Olympic Team or playing for USA Basketball, Florida State Women's Basketball has gone worldwide in its quest for bringing in the best players across the globe.

A PAIR OF SEMINOLES MAKE MEMORIES IN RIO

- Seminoles Leticia Romero and Leonor Rodriguez became members of Spain's first Olympic medalist basketball team, earning the silver at the 2016 Summer Olympic Games in Rio.
- Romero and Rodriguez became the 11th and 12th Olympic medalists at Florida State, and were the first FSU athletes to finish with a silver medal since former track & field athlete Kim Batten won silver at the 400 meter hurdles in 1996.
- Romero averaged 5.8 points off the bench, including a superb 16-point game (6-of-6 shooting) in 14 minutes of play vs. China.
- Rodriguez delivered 12 points in 14 minutes off the bench in a 97-43 win over Senegal, highlighting her breakthrough moment.

FLORIDA STATE STAYS CONNECTED TO USA BASKETBALL

- FSU Head Coach Sue Semrau spent three days as a court coach for the United States Women's National Team Training Camp held at Santa Barbara from Sept. 30-Oct. 2. It was Semrau's third stint with USA Basketball, and allowed her to coach some of the absolute best players in the world.
- Semrau is one of 11 Seminoles whom have participated as a coach or played with USA Basketball.
- For the third straight year, FSU was represented on the United States' governing body of basketball. Shakayla Thomas played with the 2015 FIBA U19 World Championship Team, FSU alumna Natasha Howard participated on the 2016 USA Select Team and senior Chatrice White was involved in the FIBA 3X3 Team in 2016.
- Natasha Howard made quite an impression on the USA Select Team. One of FSU's all-time greats dropped a game-high 24 points against the Olympic Team, including a blistering 18 points in the fourth quarter alone.

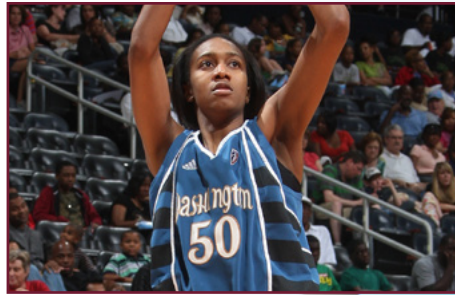
FSU Women's Hoops has made its mark in the WNBA and overseas. Seminole Alumna continue to play in some of the best women's basketball leagues in the world.

- Ivey Slaughter was added to the Las Vegas Aces during the pre-season of 2017.

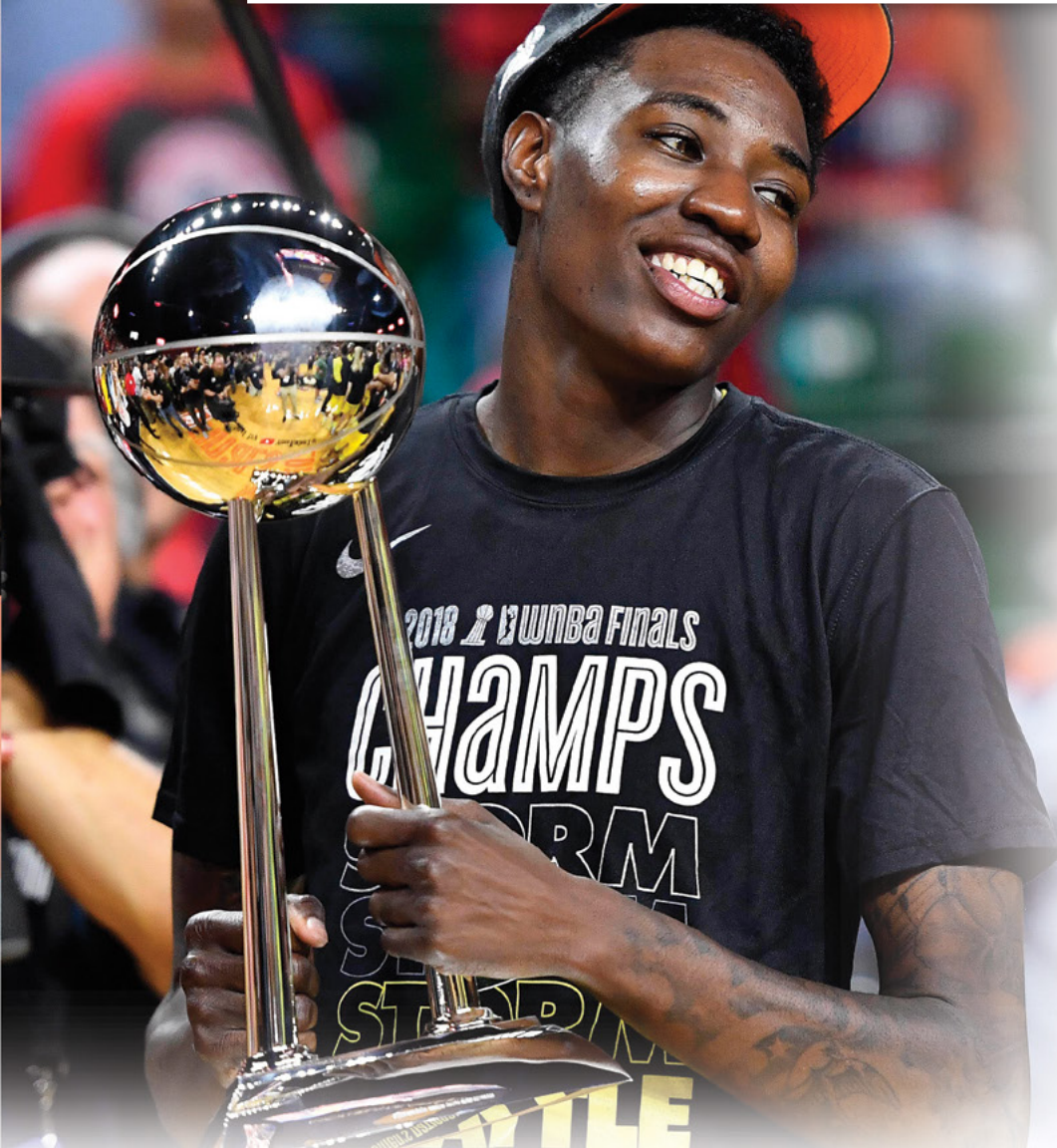

THE YEAR OF NATASHA HOWARD



- Florida State Women's Basketball Alumna Natasha Howard picked up her second straight WNBA title on Sept. 12, and did so emphatically in leading the Seattle Storm to a 98-82 Game 3 win over the Washington Mystics.
- Howard led all players with 29 points and 14 rebounds in a dominant effort, leading the Storm to a three-game sweep and allowing the franchise to win its first WNBA title since 2010.
- The native of Toledo, Ohio, was a run-away winner for the WNBA's Most Improved Player in 2018. The Seminole legend proved her worth all season, especially in the WNBA Finals when she played well in Game 1 with 19 points (8-of-9), five rebounds and two blocked shots in an 89-76 win.
- In the WNBA Playoffs, Howard averaged 15.8 points, 8.3 rebounds, shot 57.3 percent from the floor, 50 percent from 3-point range, added 1.3 blocked shots and 1.0 steals per game. Washington Mystics Head Coach Mike Thibault called her the biggest difference maker in this year's Seattle Storm squad.
- "One of my biggest joys as a coach is to watch a Seminole leave our program and do bigger things," Head Coach Sue Semrau said. "Tasha's gift is to give. She's grown that gift and given everything she has to help WNBA teams get to the Finals four consecutive years and help the last two win it all."
- Semrau built a tight bond with Howard in their four years together at FSU (2010-14), in addition to the previous years spent recruiting her. Howard has now gone to four consecutive WNBA Finals with the Indiana Fever (2015), Minnesota Lynx (2016 and 2017) and now the Seattle Storm (2018).

FSU MILESTONES

FLORIDA'S FIRST

Led by all-time leading scorer, Sue Galkantas (2,323 points), the Seminoles advanced to their first-ever NCAA Tournament during the 1982-83 season, becoming the first school from the state of Florida to advance to the "Big Dance."

WYCKOFF LEADS 2001 NOLES

Led by senior star and current assistant coach

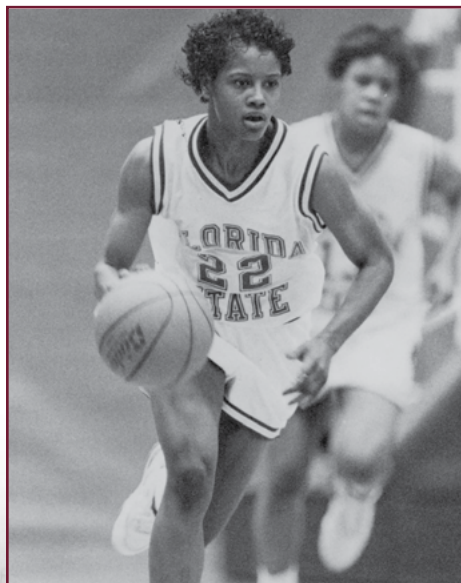
Brooke Wyckoff, Florida State advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1991 in 2001. Wyckoff, Levys Torres and April Taylor all earned All-ACC honors for the 19-12 Seminoles.

A highlight of the season came when the Noles upset No. 4 Duke, 71-69, in Durham for the first time since 1993. Led by Traylor's 30 points, FSU defeated Tulane, 72-70, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.



BURNS THE BEST

Wanda Burns led FSU to one the greatest seasons in school history in 1991, guiding the Seminoles to a 25-7 record and the Metro Conference Championship in their final year in the league. Burns averaged 18.5 ppg and was named Metro Conference Player of the Year as FSU advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year.



HODGES HANGS 39 ON THE TERPS

Senior star Roneeka Hodges scored a then-school-record 39 points to lead FSU to a 95-91 overtime win over No. 15 Maryland on Jan. 16, 2005, in Tallahassee. The Seminoles came back from 12 down in the second half, and Hodges scored seven points in the extra frame.

BACK-TO-BACK ACC CHAMPS

In 2009, the Seminoles finished with a 12-2 mark in conference play to capture their first regular season ACC title. A year later FSU did it again, compiling another 12-2 ACC mark to lead the conference in 2010. Florida State captured 11 different all-conference awards during the two-year streak.

2010 ELITE EIGHT

Led by All-ACC performers Jacinta Monroe and Courtney Ward, Florida State won a then-school-record 29 games and advanced to its first-ever NCAA Elite Eight with a 74-71 win over Mississippi State in the 2010 Dayton Regional Sweet 16.

THREE-SEED-THREE-PEAT

In 2009, Florida State was awarded its then-highest ever seed in the NCAA Tournament – a No. 3 seed in the Duluth Region. A year later, in 2010, the Seminoles nabbed a No. 3 seed again – this time in the Dayton Region. In 2011, the Seminoles completed the No. 3 seed three-peat at the Dallas Region.

RECORD THREE

The entertaining 2012-13 season was highlighted by a school-record three All-ACC First Team selections for FSU. They include guards Alexa Deluzio and Leonor Rodriguez and forward Natasha Howard.

AN ALL-AMERICA TRADITION

Numerous Seminoles have garnered All-America honors through the years, beginning with Sue Galkantas in 1983 and most recently by Imani Wright and Shakayla Thomas in 2018. Other notable FSU All-Americans include: Bev Burnett (1988), Wanda Burns (1991), Tia Paschal (1993) and Brooke Wyckoff (2001).

POST-GRADUATE SCHOLARS

The importance of success in academics is a pillar of the FSU women's basketball program as Seminole student-athletes have captured over 100 ACC Academic Honor Roll and Academic All-ACC selections. Three former FSU stars have even earned ACC Postgraduate Scholarships: Christy Derlak (1993-94), Brooke Wyckoff (2000-01) and Christian Hunnicutt (2010-11).

THE ACC'S BEST

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has captured 90 all-conference honors, including recent coaches' ACC Player of the Year Shakayla Thomas in 2017.

AN FSU LEGEND SAYS GOODBYE

Natasha Howard cemented herself as arguably the greatest all-around player in Florida State women's basketball history with an unbelievable senior season.

Included was a school-record 40-point game against Syracuse, establishing a school-record 41 career double-doubles and finishing fourth in school history with 20.5 points per game in 2013-14. As a senior, she produced FIVE 30-point games, becoming the first Seminole to accomplish the feat.

SECOND TIME ELITE

The 2014-15 season will go down as the best in school history with a program record 32 wins. FSU advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight once again, defeating No. 3-seeded Arizona State 66-65. The Noles had five players average double figures in their outstanding season.

WHAT A RUN!

Florida State made three consecutive NCAA Sweet 16s in 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17, including going to Elite Eights in 2015 and 2017. The unprecedented run solidified the Seminoles as one of the nation's top programs in the country.

COACH SUE HONORS

- Florida State Women's Basketball head coach Sue Semrau prepares for her 22nd season with the Seminoles, taking the Top-10 program to enormous heights in her illustrious coaching career.
- A four-time winner of the ACC Coach of the Year award and Florida State's all-time leader in wins, Semrau has earned a reputation as a coach that not only keeps her team in the national rankings by leading her players to victory but also one that helps foster the personal and professional growth of the student-athletes.
- "Coach Sue" has guided the Seminoles to 14 NCAA Tournaments, including three Elite Eight appearances in 2010, 2015 and 2017, five NCAA Sweet 16s in 2007, 2010, 2015, 2016 and 2017, won a pair of gold medals with USA Basketball and has seen 31 student-athletes earn academic all-conference honors.
- Recently, Semrau was a court coach for the USA Basketball Women's National Team from Sept. 30-Oct. 2, 2017, in Santa Barbara, Calif.
- Over the last 10 years, Florida State has averaged over 25 wins per season and had 15 players sign professional contracts either in the WNBA or with a European club team. Ten Seminoles have been selected in the WNBA Draft since 2009, most recently Imani Wright (second round by Phoenix Mercury) and Shakayla Thomas (second round by Los Angeles Sparks). FSU once had a stretch of three consecutive WNBA first-round Draft picks in Adut Bulgak (12th in 2016), Natasha Howard (fifth in 2014) and Jacinta Monroe (sixth in 2010).
- Semrau is so respected among her peers in the coaching community that she was named president of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in the summer 2013 after serving as the vice president since 2010. Semrau recently finished up her tenure as WBCA President following the 2014-15 season.
- Owns 12 20-win seasons as head coach of Florida State.

THIS PAST SEASON (2017-18)

- Recorded 25+ wins for the fourth straight season, as the 2017-18 Noles finished with a 26-7 overall record.
- Florida State clinched a double-bye in the ACC Tournament for the fourth consecutive year, finishing third in the conference with a 12-4 record.
- Won its 15th consecutive NCAA First Round game, defeating Little Rock – a streak that dates back to 1991.
- The Seminoles averaged the second-most points in a season in program history with 81.0 points per game. It was also just the second time FSU averaged 80+ in a season.
- Finished the Associated Press Poll ranked 11th, securing a Top-15 finish for four straight seasons to join just seven other schools (UConn, Notre Dame, South Carolina, Baylor, Louisville, Oregon State and Stanford).
- Finished 4-0 against rivalry schools Miami (3-0) and Florida (1-0). Included in those wins was FSU's largest margin ever vs. the 'Canes (105-67) and its largest road win ever vs. UF (84-54).
- Led by the winningest senior class in program history with 111 wins (Ama Degbeon, Shakayla Thomas, AJ Alix, Chatrice White and Imani Wright).

- Churned out multiple All-Americans for the fourth consecutive year (Shakayla Thomas and Imani Wright).
- Had multiple All-ACC First Team performers for the second straight year (Thomas and Wright).
- Ranked in the Top 20 nationally in field goal percentage (20th), offensive rebounds per game (16th), rebound margin (sixth), rebounds per game (11th), scoring margin (10th) and scoring offense (13th).

MOLDING TRUE STUDENT-ATHLETES

- As successful as Florida State has been on the court, Semrau's commitment to community service is just as important to her program's identity.
- Once again in 2017-18, Semrau partnered the Seminoles with Samaritan's Feet, a non-profit organization dedicated to changing lives through shoe distributions around the world. Semrau annually coaches a game barefoot in an effort to raise money, and the Seminoles took a break from the 2010 Junkanoo Jam in the Bahamas to give back on Thanksgiving.
- In the summer 2017, Florida State went to Bainbridge, Ga., to participate in a Samaritan's Feet washing where coaches, student-athletes and support staff made a monumental impact to everyone involved.
- FSU was also able to spread its message of hope and inspiration to the U.S. Virgin Islands around Thanksgiving in 2016, doing another shoe distribution overseas to an area middle school.
- The 2016-17 Seminoles once again fulfilled their duties of giving back to the community and making strong connections within the Big Bend area. FSU influenced both children and adults by visiting schools, playgrounds and other locations that allowed it to positively impact and connect with the community. The sight of FSU Women's Basketball coaches and student-athletes performing good deeds around the community is not an uncommon one.
- Additionally, the Seminoles have been known to extend a helping hand when on the road, making visits to the Boys and Girls Club at the Coalition for the Homeless in Orlando and elementary schools in Harlem, West Chester and Wadsworth, Ohio and Martinsville, Ind., as well as the Duke Hospital in Durham, N.C.
- In August 2013, Semrau and the Seminoles held a basketball clinic for youth in Dakar, Senegal, in addition to visiting an orphanage during the team's 2013 Foreign Tour.
- These efforts have molded countless Seminoles into superstars in the game of life following their hoops careers. Current assistant coach Brooke Wycykoff (Class of 2001) and Christian Hunnicutt (Class of 2011) each earned prestigious ACC Postgraduate Scholarships, while Vanessa Fuchs (Class of 2001) served as Interim Athletics Director at Florida State and is currently the Seminoles' Senior Women's Administrator.
- For the third straight year in 2018, FSU tied or led the ACC with four All-ACC Academic Team members.

RECENT SUCCESS

- The 2009-10 season served as the perfect example of just how strong the Florida State's women's basketball program has become under Semrau. The Seminoles captured their second consecutive regular-season ACC Co-Championship and made it all the way to the Elite Eight of the annual NCAA Tournament as a then-program-best No. 3 seed for the second straight season.
- Along the way, FSU set the school record for most wins in a season with 29, most conference triumphs ever with 12 and highest national ranking ever at No. 9. Those three school marks were all broken by the 2014-15 team.
- After the 2009-10 season was complete, star forward Jacinta Monroe was taken sixth overall in the 2010 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics; a draft slot that was the highest ever for an FSU women's basketball player prior to Natasha Howard's selection as the fifth pick by the Indiana Fever in 2014.
- During a 24-8 campaign in 2010-11, the Seminoles extended their NCAA Tournament streak to seven consecutive years, nabbing another No. 3 seed. Along the way, forward Cierra Bravard nabbed honorable mention All-America honors and teamed with point guard Courtney Ward to capture All-ACC accolades.
- Overall, Semrau has guided nine different players to All-America honors in her 21 years.

HISTORY

- It could be argued that Semrau's best coaching job occurred in the 2014-15 record-setting year where new accomplishments were being made seemingly every game. Florida State finished with a 32-5 overall record, shattering the school record for wins while also setting new records for ACC wins (14), Top 25 wins (6, since broken by the 2016-17 team) and regular-season victories (27). For the first time ever, the Seminoles finished undefeated at the Donald L. Tucker Center, going 16-0.
- FSU highlighted its 2014-15 year by earning a 66-65 win over No. 3 seed Arizona State in the NCAA Sweet 16 in Greensboro, N.C., reaching its second Elite Eight appearance in program history. The Noles finished second in the ACC regular season with a 14-2 record, reached the ACC Tournament title game for the first time ever and garnered a program-best No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament before taking down Alabama State (91-49) and 20th-ranked FGCU (65-47) in the first two rounds at the Tucker Center.
- Semrau earned several national and conference coaching honors in 2015 after FSU was predicted to finish fifth in the ACC and ultimately steam-rolled most of its competition. She was named the ACC Coach of the Year by the Blue Ribbon Panel and the ACC coaches. Semrau was also named the ESPNW National Coach of the Year, the WBCA Coach of the Year and the Associated Press Coach of the Year.
- Many college basketball fans, media and other personnel took notice of the way Coach Sue was able to blend a team with six new players and create one of the most collective, team-oriented and entertaining groups in the sport.
- Semrau's fourth ACC Coach of the Year honor gives her the distinction of having the most among active ACC coaches.
- The fact that the 2014-15 team became the first in program history to average five double-figure scorers proves how well a new cast of faces played together under Semrau's system. Offensively, the Noles averaged 75.5 points which was their highest in the previous 24 years.
- In 2014-15, FSU also set the single-season record for 3-point field goals made (216), offensive rebounds (625), defensive rebounds (986) and total rebounds (1,611). One of its most impressive feats was being the only Division I basketball team – men's or women's – to out-rebound every opponent during the regular season. Overall, FSU out-rebounded 36 of its 37 opponents.
- Florida State became one of just seven NCAA Division I programs to make the Elite Eight in two of the last three years in 2016-17, finishing with a 28-7 overall record. The Seminoles defeated a school-record nine AP Top 25 teams, including eighth-ranked and second-seeded Oregon State in the NCAA Sweet 16 in Stockton, Calif.
- FSU finished second in the ACC with a 13-3 conference record and tied its highest end-of-season ranking in the USA Today Poll at seventh. The 28 wins tied for the third-most in program history, with 10 of those victories coming against RPI Top 50 opponents.
- Once again, there was no shortage of individual accolades for the Seminoles. Junior forward Shakayla Thomas became FSU's first ACC Player of the Year, while senior point guard Leticia Romero became the program's first three-time All-American. Both standouts were named Associated Press and WBCA All-Americans while being all-conference performers.

- Junior center Chatrice White was honored as the ACC Sixth Player of the Year, the third straight for FSU, and senior Brittany Brown was named to the ACC All-Defensive Team for the second straight season.

CHANGED CULTURE

- Semrau's 405 career win total with the Seminoles more than doubles the second-most victories by an FSU coach (Marynell Meadors, 132), and her tenure has accounted for 14 of FSU's 17 all-time NCAA Tournament appearances.
- Semrau basically built the Seminoles from scratch, as she inherited a program coming off a 5-22 record in 1996-97 and hadn't reached double figures in wins in four years. She has accumulated 42 AP Top 25 wins in her 20 seasons. When she arrived in Tallahassee, FSU had not won vs. a nationally-ranked team in the previous four seasons.
- By her fourth year, Semrau had completely turned the program around, capturing a 19-12 record and the first NCAA Tournament appearance in a decade. The 2000-01 season served as the jumpstart for unprecedented success.
- FSU had only four 20-win seasons before Semrau guided the Noles to six 20-win seasons over a seven-year stretch beginning in 2004-05. She has now led the Noles to 12 20-win campaigns through 21 seasons, including a 32-win season in 2014-15.

A RESPECTED AND SEASONED COACH

- Prior to coming to Florida State, Semrau served three years as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Wisconsin under Jane Albright. While in Madison, she contributed to the Badgers' three-straight winning seasons and two NCAA Tournament appearances, including the program's first ever back-to-back 20-win seasons.
- Semrau first joined Albright at Northern Illinois in 1991 where she assisted in leading NIU to three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.
- Before her hiring at Northern Illinois, Semrau served as head women's basketball coach and assistant athletic director at Occidental College in Los Angeles for four years where she compiled a 51-47 overall record.
- She also coached soccer for two seasons and was responsible for the administrative duties of fundraising and promotions at the Division III institution.
- Semrau also worked as the public relations and promotions director for the L.A. Heat professional soccer team from 1986-87, and as the public relations director for the Seattle Storm soccer team in the previous year.
- A native of Seattle, Wash., Semrau is a graduate of Shorecrest High School. She went on to attend the University of Puget Sound for two years. Semrau transferred to the University of California-San Diego in 1984 where she was a team co-captain and Co-MVP.
- She graduated in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in communications and received her master's degree in athletic administration from the University of Southern California in 1988.
- Coach Sue is the Godmother of assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff's daughter, Avery (4 ½).

BROOKE WYCKOFF

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH



- **8th Season at Florida State**
- **Florida State, 2001**

- She sparked the rise of the Florida State women's basketball program as a standout player on the court from 1997 to 2001. Ten years later, Brooke Wyckoff returned to the Seminoles – this time on the bench, joining Sue Semrau's revamped staff beginning in the 2011-12 season.
- Through seven seasons, Wyckoff's tremendous results in defensive game planning, coaching the post players, recruiting, scouting and other areas resulted in a reward: Being named the team's associate head coach on May 1, 2018.
- In her four seasons of taking over the defense, FSU's sub-60 points allowed in three of the past four years mark the only three times the program has surrendered less than 60 in a season.
- In her most recent season in 2017-18, the Seminole standout helped FSU record 25+ wins for the fourth straight season, finishing with a 26-7 overall record. The Seminoles once again displayed their rebounding hallmark, ranking sixth nationally in rebound margin and 11th in rebounds per game.
- Inside players Shakayla Thomas, Ama Degbeon and Chatrice White each enjoyed banner senior seasons in 2017-18 – Thomas became FSU's second three-time All-American, while White and Degbeon developed into two of the ACC's most feared defensive post players.
- She has helped Florida State mark its territory in her native state of Ohio, signing McDonald's All-American Valencia Myers of Solon, Ohio. Myers helps compose another Top-5 recruiting class for the Seminoles in 2018.
- Wyckoff also helped post player Chatrice White have a strong first season with the Seminoles, earning ACC Sixth Player of the Year honors. Front-court performer Shakayla Thomas was named the ACC Player of the Year and earned All-America honors for the second straight season.
- Wyckoff's recent season in 2016-17 once again produced strong defensive results: The Seminoles went to their second NCAA Elite Eight in three years after allowing just 58.3 points per game, the third straight year they have held opponents to under 60 points per game. FSU led the ACC in rebound margin, rebounding defense, rebounding margin and offensive rebounding percentage. Since Wyckoff has taken control of the defensive game plan, FSU has put up record-setting numbers against the opposition.
- Her Spanish connections, being fluent in the Spanish language after enjoying a professional career overseas, resulted in point guard Leticia Romero finishing her career as the first three-time All-American in program history in 2016-17.
- In the 2015-16 season, Wyckoff's impact was felt once again. The Seminoles were one of eight programs nationally who enjoyed consecutive trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 and finished the season with a 25-8 overall record.
- Wyckoff's work on the defensive end yielded positive results in 15-16: FSU allowed just 57.5 points per game, which follows a 2014-15 season when it allowed only 57.3 points per game.
- FSU's dominance on the glass was evident again in 2015-16. The Seminoles finished first in the conference in rebounding defense (29.1), rebounding margin (+12.0), defensive rebounding percentage (73.2) and offensive rebounding percentage (44.1 percent). Of the 16 ACC opponents faced, 11 were held to under 40 percent shooting.
- She was an instrumental part of Florida State's 2014-15 campaign that included a school record for wins (32-5) and the program's second trip to the NCAA Elite Eight. The Seminoles finished the season with their highest final ranking ever at seventh in both the Associated Press and USA Today Polls as well as the RPI.
- Wyckoff's work with the post players proved to be beneficial for two-time All-American Adut Bulgak. The Edmonton, Canada, native flourished in her senior year as a WBCA All-American, the Team MVP, an All-ACC performer and a Senior CLASS All-American. Bulgak was selected with the 12th pick in the first round of the WNBA Draft to the New York Liberty, giving FSU a run of three straight first-round selections (all post players in Bulgak, Natasha Howard and Jacinta Monroe).
- Wyckoff's primary scouting duties shifted to the defense and her hard work in game preparation paid dividends for the Seminoles. The 2014-15 Seminoles allowed just 57.3 points per game, which is the lowest they've ever surrendered. Florida State ranked third nationally with a +12.3 rebound margin and held nearly half (18 of 37) of their opponents to under 35 percent shooting. In each of the last two seasons (2015-16 and 2014-15), FSU has finished in the Top 5 in rebounding margin.





- FSU's defense, anchored by Bulgak as a junior, set a school record for total rebounds with 1,611, and allowed just 0.77 points per possession in 2014-15. The Seminoles never allowed more than 80 points scored.
- Wyckoff's efforts on the recruiting trail once again loomed large. Having played professionally in the Canary Islands, she is fluent in Spanish and was a big reason for the arrival of Romero in the 2014 summer. Romero enjoyed an All-America season for the Seminoles in 2014-15 and added more All-America honors as a junior and senior, being granted immediate eligibility mid-season and sparking FSU to a record-setting run.
- In 2013-14, FSU finished 21-12 and reached the NCAA postseason for the ninth time in the previous 10 years. A group that was short on depth due to transfers and injuries at the beginning of the season found a way to reach the second round of the NCAA Tournament and earn 10 Top 100 RPI wins. Senior forward Natasha Howard emerged as one of the top players in the country, averaging 20.5 points, 9.3 rebounds and 59.4 percent shooting.
- Wyckoff has been an influential figure in Howard's life both on and off the court, admired because of her personable nature and ability to connect well with her student-athletes. Under Wyckoff's tutelage, Howard had one of the most dominant seasons in school history as a senior, which included averaging 23.3 points and 9.6 rebounds against top-notch ACC competition. Howard was rewarded with the fifth overall selection by the Indiana Fever in the 2014 WNBA Draft, the highest in school history. Howard went on to win a WNBA Championship with the Minnesota Lynx in 2017.
- In the 2012-13 year, FSU posted a 23-10 record, finished fourth in the ACC and advanced to its eighth NCAA Tournament in nine years. Along the way, Wyckoff, a star forward during her playing career, helped the Seminoles land a school-record and a conference-best three players on the All-ACC First Team, as senior guards Alexa Deluzio and Leo Rodriguez and junior forward Natasha Howard collected honors from the conference office.
- Four years later, Rodriguez would join fellow Canary Islands native Romero in the 2016 Summer Olympic Games and earn a silver medal in Rio – the country's first medal in women's basketball.
- Senior forward Chasity Clayton also nabbed ACC Sixth Player of the Year accolades, as Florida State finished in the top 10 nationally in both scoring and field goal percentage. FSU's 74.8 points per game average and .453 shooting percentage were its highest marks in 20 years.
- Without a doubt, Wyckoff was one of the greatest Seminoles ever to wear the Garnet and Gold on the hardwood before playing nine seasons in the WNBA. Wyckoff's experience at the professional level has given the Seminoles a rare commodity on the bench.
- Along with the immediate credibility her hoops career provides, Wyckoff possesses an amiable personality that has made her an immediate hit on the recruiting trail. Her efforts led the Seminoles to sign one of the nation's top incoming recruiting classes in 2013. Led by four-star McDonald's All-America center Kai James as well as Ivey Slaughter, Brittany Brown and Gabby Bevilard, the Noles' 2013 signing class featured three Top 100 players and ranked as the nation's No. 7 class by All-Star Girls Report and No. 11 by ESPNW HoopGuriz. That senior class won 106 games at FSU, the most in program history.
- Wyckoff's recruiting abilities shone through once again with the 2014 class, signing highly-touted prospects Shakayla Thomas, Chania Ray and Ama Degbeon. The addition of the No. 1 junior college center in the nation, Adut Bulgak, once again provided the Noles with an abundance of talent as she garnered All-America honors as a junior and senior at FSU.
- Wyckoff also serves as the Seminoles' program's liaison with the FSU academic support staff in addition to her on-court duties. In each of the last three years (2016, 2017, 2018), FSU has either led or tied for the conference lead in All-ACC Academic Team selections.
- In her first year back at FSU, Wyckoff, a star versatile forward during her career, helped tutor all-conference forwards Cierra Bravard and Howard. Bravard later signed a professional contract with the WNBA's San Antonio SilverStars and played the 2013 WNBA season with the Seattle Storm. Howard led the ACC in double-doubles in 2012, then set a single-season school record with 15 double-doubles as a senior.
- A native of West Chester, Ohio, the talented post/wing was one of the top high school players in the country before signing a National Letter of Intent with FSU in 1997 in what was Semrau's first season in Tallahassee.
- In her freshman year, Wyckoff made an immediate impact as she set a single-season record at the time with 80 blocks on her way to earning ACC All-Freshman Team honors. Conference accolades continued to roll in during her next three years with a pair of All-ACC Third Team selections (1999 and 2000) and finally an All-ACC First Team honor as a senior in 2001.
- Wyckoff's 1,350 career points is the 14th-most in school history and her 804 rebounds rank seventh. She ranks No. 2 at FSU in career blocks with 209. She averaged 12.4 ppg and 7.4 rpg while starting all 109 games she played in her career.
- Perhaps most importantly, Wyckoff was the cornerstone of the Seminoles' first winning season in nine years as the team posted a 19-12 record in 2001 and finished fourth in the ACC. That season culminated in the school's first trip to the NCAA Tournament in 10 years and All-America honors for Wyckoff, which was the first national accolade for an FSU women's basketball player since 1993. She capped her career by scoring 14.6 ppg and pulling down 6.6 rpg that final season.
- In addition to boasting the honor of being just one of four former 'Noles to have their jerseys' retired, Wyckoff was also an outstanding performer in the classroom. She is the only Seminole to ever earn four All-ACC Academic Women's Basketball Team honors as well as four nods to the ACC Academic Honor Roll.

- In 2001, she earned an ACC Postgraduate scholarship and was named to the ACC Legends Class of 2010. In 2002, she was named to the 51-member ACC 50th Anniversary Women's Basketball Team.
- She also played with the USA Women's Basketball Select Team for three consecutive summers.
- In 2011, Wyckoff was inducted into the Butler County Sports Hall of Fame as well as the Florida State Athletic Hall of Fame and the Greater Cincinnati Basketball Hall of Fame.
- Following her senior year, Wyckoff was selected by the Orlando Miracle in the second round of the WNBA Draft. She spent two seasons in Orlando before the team moved to Connecticut where she played another three seasons with the Sun.
- She was then selected by the Chicago Sky in the 2006 WNBA Expansion draft and played for that franchise until 2009.
- During her nine-year WNBA career, Wyckoff appeared in 242 games.
- After concluding her professional basketball career, Wyckoff served as an assistant girls basketball coach at Lakota East High School in Cincinnati, Ohio.
- Wyckoff has one daughter, Avery. She is also a founding member of Moms in Coaching, a group of mothers who coach basketball that meet every year at the NCAA Women's Final Four.

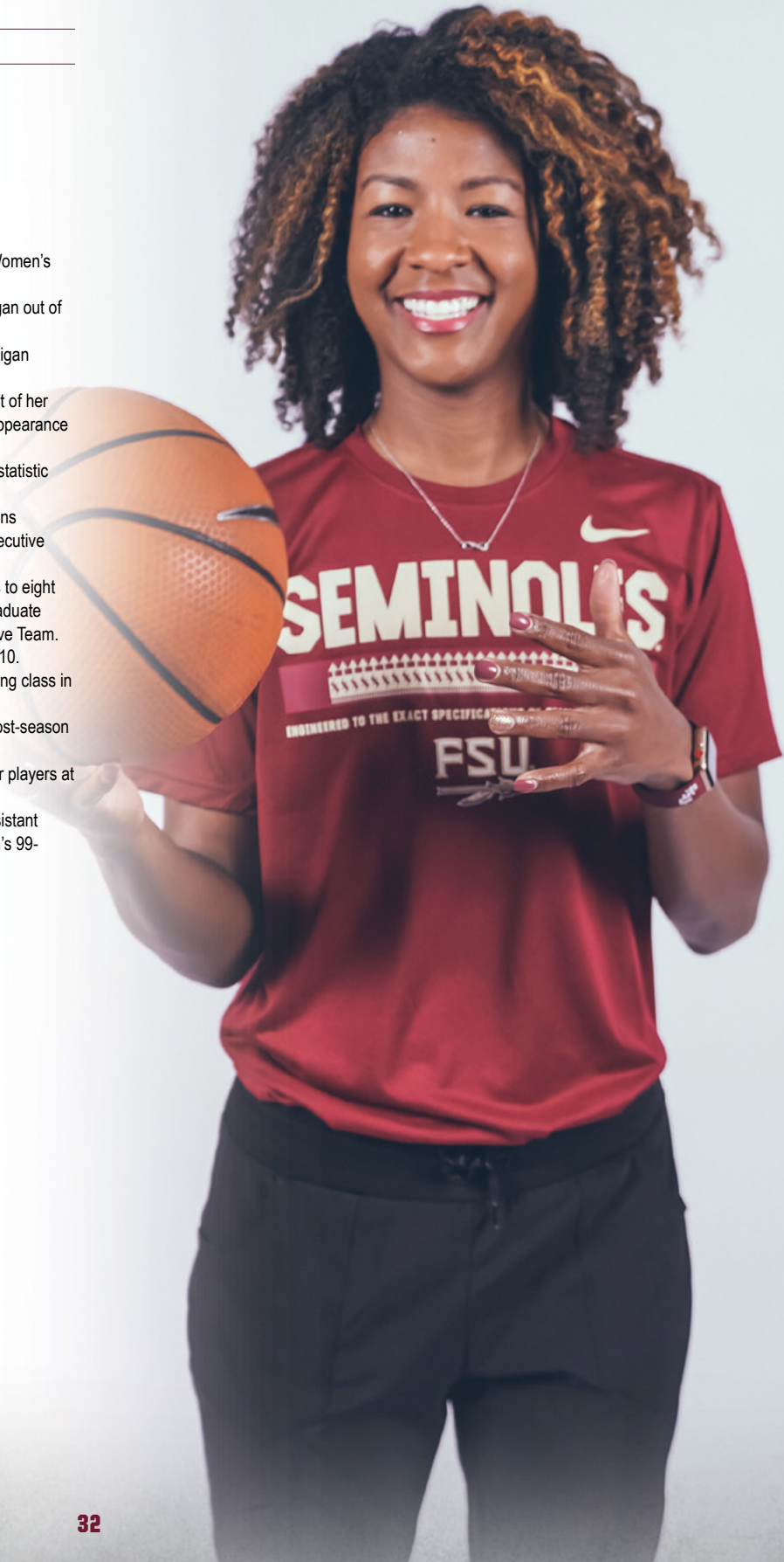

- St. John's, 2010

- Joy McCorvey was announced as an assistant coach for the Florida State Women's Basketball team on May 4, 2018, by head coach Sue Semrau.
- McCorvey spent her last six years (2012-18) as an assistant coach at Michigan out of the Big Ten.
- A four-year captain at St. John's from 2006-10, she helped build up the Michigan women's basketball program during her six seasons in Ann Arbor.
- One of her responsibilities over her last five years has been the development of her post players, helping pave the way for a second-round NCAA Tournament appearance for the Wolverines in 2017-18.
- Michigan led the Big Ten in rebound margin at +8.5 per game, a statistic that has been synonymous with Florida State's success.
- A special 2016-17 season in which Michigan set its program mark with 28 wins included helping former post player Cyesha Goree receive her second consecutive All-Big Ten second team honor.
- McCorvey's established résumé also includes coaching five different players to eight All-Big Ten honors, including incoming Florida State Women's Basketball graduate assistant Jillian Dunston who earned a spot on the 2018 Big Ten All-Defensive Team.
- She received a Bachelor of Science in Child Education from St. John's in 2010.
- McCorvey was part of a coaching staff that signed a consensus Top-20 signing class in 2015.
- As a former student-athlete from 2006-10, she led the Red Storm to three post-season trips which included an NCAA Second Round appearance in 2010.
- She ranks third at St. John's with 777 career rebounds and is one of just four players at the school with 700+ points and rebounds.
- McCorvey, a three-time BIG EAST All-Academic Team selection, was an assistant coach at her alma mater in 2011-12 in a season that included ending UConn's 99-game win streak and reaching the program's first NCAA Sweet 16.





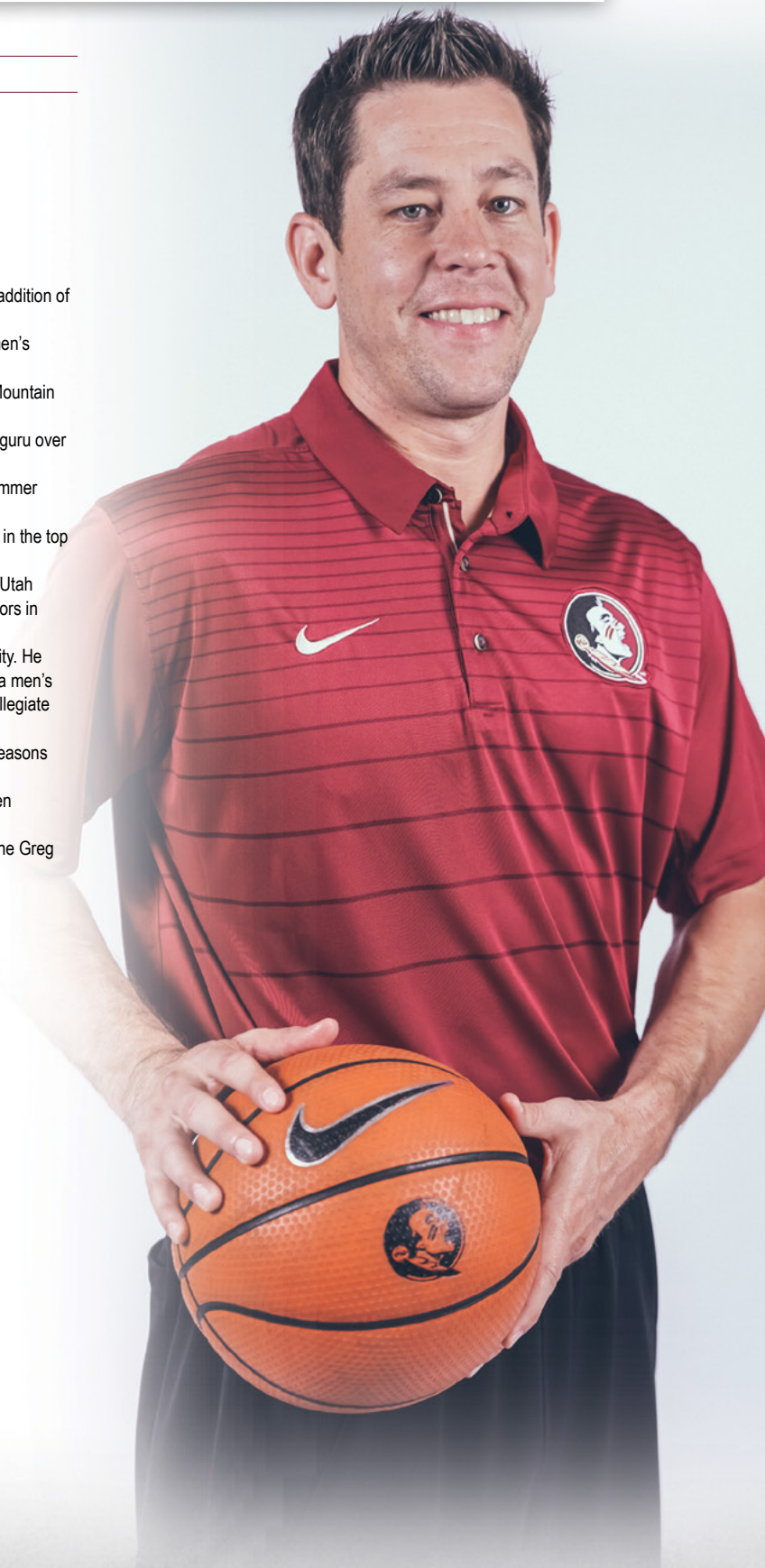
JC CARTER

- Florida State Women's Basketball head coach Sue Semrau announced the addition of JC Carter to the Seminole family on May 4, 2018.
- Carter brings several years of experience coaching both the men's and women's game.
- Carter was an assistant coach over the last four years at Utah State of the Mountain West Conference.
- A 2002 Southwest Baptist University graduate, he has become an offensive guru over the years.
- While with the Aggies program, he oversaw player skill development, ran summer camps and played a big role in recruiting.
- Under his watch, the 2015-16 season was highlighted by the Aggies ranking in the top half of the Mountain West in every offensive category.
- Carter has coached many all-conference selections – In his four seasons at Utah State, he helped two players earn Mountain West Freshman of the Year honors in guard Eliza West (2017) and fellow guard Funda Nakkasoglu (2015).
- Carter spent one season as a men's assistant coach at John Brown University. He also spent four seasons at his alma mater, Southwest Baptist University, as a men's assistant coach beginning in 2007 and guided it to the Mid-American Intercollegiate Athletics Association title in 2008.
- His first head coaching position was with the SBU women's team for three seasons beginning in 2008.
- His collegiate playing career started at Angelina College in Lufkin, Texas, then transferred to Stephen F. Austin as a sophomore.
- Carter finished his remaining two years at SBU in Bolivar, Mo., and earned the Greg Germany 2002 Senior Leadership Award.
- Carter received his undergraduate degree at SBU in 2002.
- He is the father of two sons, Landon and Tate.

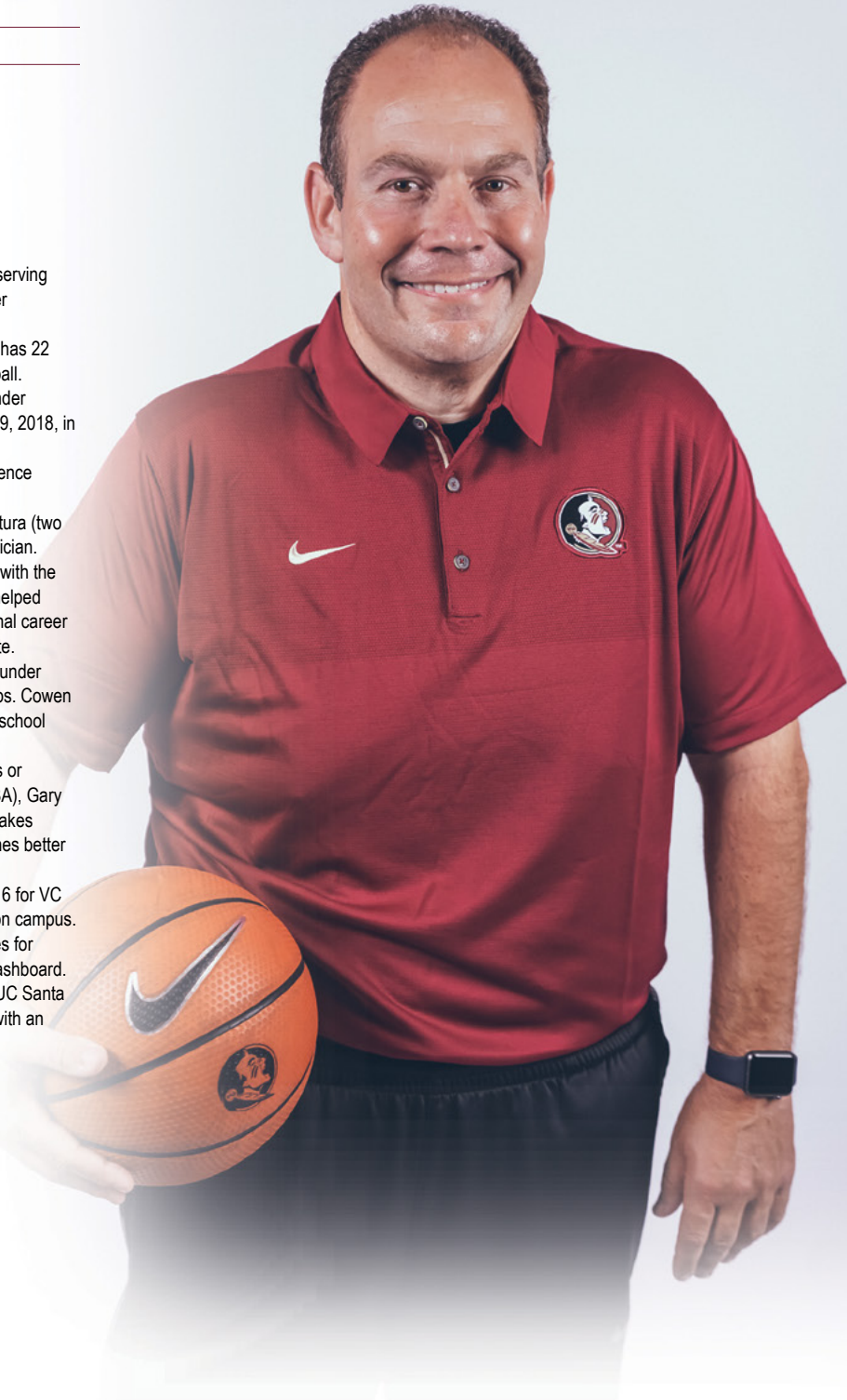
WILL COWEN

- Will Cowen brings loads of experience in a variety of ways to Florida State, serving his first season with the Seminoles as women's basketball's director of player development.
- The former Director of Intercollegiate Athletics (2009-18) at Ventura College has 22 years of athletic coaching experience in football, basketball, track and baseball.
- His countless efforts in his final season at Ventura earned him the JC/CC Under Armour Athletics Director of the Year, which was presented to him on June 29, 2018, in Washington, D.C.
- During his tenure, Ventura recorded five state championships and 67 conference championships.
- Cowen's specific basketball background includes serving three years at Ventura (two as the head coach), 15 years of high school coaching and 14 years as a clinician.
- In Cowen's three years with the men's basketball program, Ventura finished with the best record in the Western State Conference in two of those years. Cowen helped guide current Houston Rockets small forward James Ennis III to a professional career after he spent one year under Cowen before transferring to Long Beach State.
- He has served as a clinician at countless camps, including when he worked under "America's Basketball Guru" Pete Newell at one of his famous big man camps. Cowen has also taught at 11 College Tall Women's Camps as well as 44 other high school boys' and girls' camps with Frontline Basketball.
- Other legends of the game whom Cowen has worked with at different camps or clinics include: Ann Meyers Drysdale (Naismith HOF), Bob Kloppenburg (NBA), Gary Kloppenburg (WNBA) and Bill McClintock (1959 NCAA Champion). Cowen takes great pride in sharing ideas, developing great teachers and helping all coaches better prepare communicate and understand their players.
- One of Cowen's top endeavors while at Ventura was securing funding in 2016 for VC Pirates Cove, a student success center serving over 1,300 at-risk students on campus. The program has experienced dramatic improvement in course success rates for enrollees while closing many achievement gaps along the Student Equity Dashboard.
- A native of Ventura, Calif., Cowen earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree from UC Santa Barbara as a Spanish major in 2000. He then got his Masters of Education with an emphasis in physical education in 2003 from Azusa Pacific University.

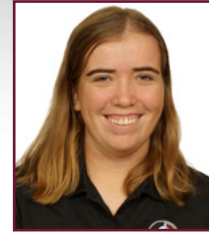

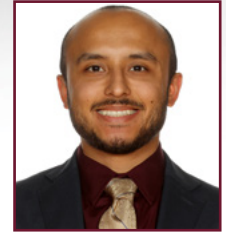

JOHN THRASHER University President

John Thrasher, a Florida State University alumnus and former state legislator, is the university's 15th president.

Thrasher assumed the presidency on Nov. 10, 2014, after a successful career as a state legislator, businessman, lobbyist and lawyer. As president, Thrasher has focused his efforts on elevating FSU's reputation as a preeminent research institution. He has presided over a \$1 billion

fundraising campaign, advanced the university's academic and research mission, championed diversity and inclusion, and welcomed the best and brightest students in the university's history.

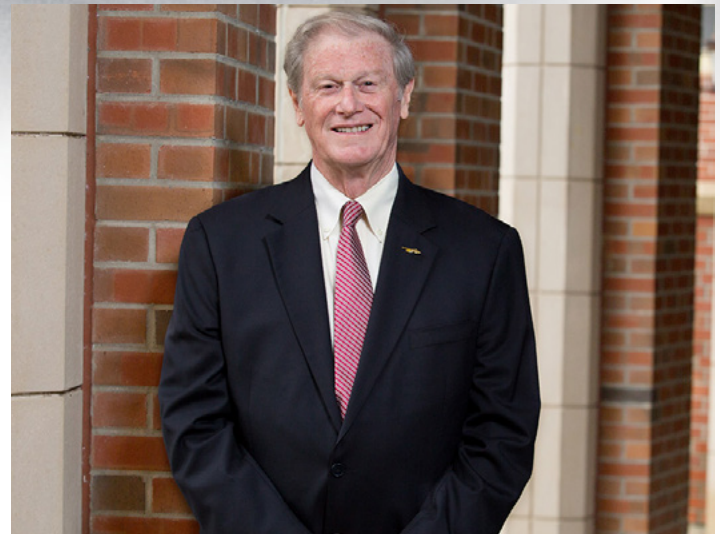
Thrasher earned a bachelor's degree in business from Florida State in 1965.

After graduating, he joined the U.S. Army where he received the Army Commendation Medal in Germany and was awarded two Bronze Stars for his service in Vietnam. He was honorably discharged as a captain in 1970.

Thrasher then returned to his alma mater to earn a law degree with honors in 1972.

After working in private law practice in Daytona Beach and Tallahassee for several years, Thrasher returned to Jacksonville to serve as general counsel of the Florida Medical Association, a position he held for 20 years. He also served as "of counsel" to the Jacksonville law firm of Smith, Hulsey & Busey from 1996 to 2008. Thrasher was a partner of Southern Strategy Group, a Tallahassee-based governmental relations firm, from 2001 to 2009.

Thrasher's political career began in 1986 when he was elected to the Clay County School Board where he served as vice chairman, then chairman. He then became a state representative in 1992, and he was re-elected without opposition in 1994, 1996 and 1998.



Thrasher was unanimously elected as the speaker of the Florida House of Representatives in 1998. He was elected to the Florida Senate in 2009 and subsequently re-elected. He served as chairman for the Republican Party of Florida in 2010.

From 2001 to 2005, Thrasher was the first chair of Florida State University's Board of Trustees. He was a key supporter of legislation that brought funding to the development of FSU's College of Medicine, and a building at the college is named in his honor.

In 2016, he was inducted into the FSU College of Business Hall of Fame. He currently serves on the College Football Playoff Board of Managers.

Born in Columbia, S.C., Thrasher moved to Florida as a child and grew up in Jacksonville. He and his wife, Jean, have three children and eight grandchildren.

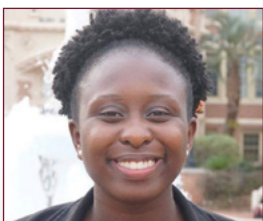

Hartmann currently serves on the ACC Equity Committee and the ACC Softball Committee. She previously served a four-year appointment on the NCAA Women's Basketball Issues Committee. She also served a four-year term (2002-06) on the NCAA Women's Basketball Committee and one year (2001-02) as a member of the NCAA Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet.

After earning four varsity letters as a member of the basketball team, Hartmann graduated from Syracuse University in 1991 with a degree in photojournalism. She went on to receive a master's degree in education-sport administration from Georgia State University in 1995.

Hartmann and her husband, Troy, are the parents of two children, Samuel and Olivia.



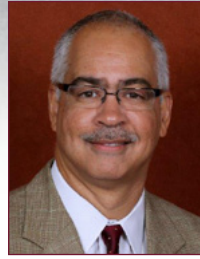
JIM CURRY Senior Associate Athletics Director

Jim Curry was appointed to the athletics department's executive leadership team and named Senior Associate Athletics Director in 2016. In his current role, he provides direct oversight for both the compliance and equipment office, and serves as the sport administrator for football, men's tennis and women's tennis.

KARL HICKS Deputy Director of Athletics for External Operations

Karl Hicks was hired in the spring of 2014 to the newly-created position of Deputy Director of Athletics for External Operations at FSU. Hicks oversees all external operations for athletics including tickets, sports information, marketing and promotions, communications, website and risk management and serves as the staff liaison with Seminole Productions as well as oversight of the men's basketball program and all athletics facilities.

Hicks was the ACC Senior Associate Commissioner for Men's Basketball Operations from 2007-2014. During his seven years at the league office his responsibilities included oversight of all men's basketball operations, as well as management of the ACC Men's Basketball Tournament and two NCAA Men's Tournament opening rounds hosted by the conference in 2009 and 2012, respectively.

Prior to his role with the ACC, Hicks served as the Assistant General Manager and Senior Vice President of Basketball Operations for the NBA's Charlotte Bobcats from 2003-2007. His initial foray in professional sports came in 2000 when he was hired by the NBA as Executive Director of the newly-created National Basketball Development League, where he spent three years. He also served at the Southeastern Conference (1998-2000) as Assistant Commissioner for Institutional and Student Services and at the NCAA (1994-1998) as an Enforcement Representative.

A 1983 graduate of the University of New Hampshire with a B.A. in Communications, Hicks was a member of the men's basketball team and went on to serve as an assistant basketball coach at his alma mater (1984-1985) and at the American University in Washington, DC (1985-1990).

Hicks earned a master's degree in business administration from the University of Maryland in 1992, and resides in Tallahassee with his wife Melanie and son Eli.



MICHELE OSBORNE Senior Associate Athletics Director for Governance and Compliance

Michele Osborne, a 2001 graduate of Florida State University, is a member of the executive staff of the Florida State Department of Athletics and serves as a Senior Associate Athletics Director to the Department. Prior to her current position, Osborne served as an Associate General Counsel in the Office of the General Counsel at Florida State.

Prior to making the move to the Athletics Department, Osborne focused her practice on University Athletics and Real Estate matters, advising the Department, the Donald L. Tucker Civic Center, the FSU Facilities Department and the FSU Real Estate Foundation on their daily activities. She was responsible for overseeing legal matters relating to athletics, business and commercial transactions, purchasing, construction, and real estate.

Prior to returning to her alma mater, Osborne served as Judicial Clerk to the Honorable Robert M. Gross, Fourth District Court of Appeal of Florida, Senior Staff Attorney to Justice Raoul Cantero, III, Supreme Court of Florida, and was a Senior Litigator and Advisor to the Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund of the State of Florida while at the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

Osborne earned her Bachelor's Degree in History and Political Science from Florida State in 2001. She graduated magna cum laude from the Nova Southeastern University Shepard Broad Law Center in 2005.

Osborne and her husband, Mike, have two sons, Myles and Mayson.



VANESSA FUCHS

Senior Associate Athletics Director/SWA

Vanessa Fuchs has a long history at Florida State University as a student-athlete and administrator and in May of 2012 she was promoted to the role of Senior Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator after serving as the department's Associate Athletic Director for Compliance since 2010.

As a member of the department's executive leadership team, Fuchs has direct oversight of Women's Basketball, Indoor Volleyball, Beach Volleyball, Sports Performance (Sports Medicine, Nutrition, Strength and Conditioning) and Student Services while also chairing the sport administrator group responsible for day-to-day administrative support for each of FSU's 20 sports. In addition, Fuchs currently serves as co-chair of the athletics department Substance Abuse Program, co-director the Champions Auction (has raised over \$500K for FSU's women's athletics programs), Title IX Deputy Coordinator for athletics, is a member of the university's Diversity and Inclusion Council and serves on the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Women's Basketball, Women's Volleyball, Autonomy and SAAC Committees. In 2015, Fuchs was appointed to serve on the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Committee after completing a four-year term on the Board of Directors for the National Association for Athletic Compliance (NAAC). Fuchs was most recently appointed to serve on the FSU Varsity Club Board of Directors in May 2017. For the 2018-19 academic year, Fuchs will spearhead the planning efforts for a year-long celebration of FSU's 50th Anniversary of Intercollegiate Women's Athletics.

In June of 2015, Women Leaders In College Sports (formerly NACWAA) named Fuchs the DI Administrator of the Year. Florida State followed that recognition in October 2016 by honoring Fuchs with the Champions Beyond the Game Award (scholarship era), recognizing former FSU women athletes who have excelled in life after college sports.

In June of 2013, former Florida State President Dr. Eric Barron named Fuchs the school's interim Athletics Director as she became the first female to lead the Seminoles' Athletic Department. The former Seminole basketball player was one of just seven females leading an athletics department among the 124 schools that participated at the FBS level in 2012.

Since joining the athletics staff in 2010, Fuchs has focused her time on providing strategic direction for departmental initiatives focused on student-athlete welfare, enhancing athletic performance, gender equity, ethnic diversity and Title IX. Fuchs oversaw the facilities staff from 2012-2015 and during that time, the department's 10-year Facilities Master Plan was completed. Fuchs was also instrumental in building a comprehensive NCAA rules education program, implementing a department-wide recruiting and compliance software system and establishing a new team structure for the compliance office. All of which assisted the department in a successfully fulfilling its NCAA probationary period which concluded in March 2013.

Prior to arriving at Florida State, Fuchs committed seven years to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in Indianapolis, Indiana. In 2007, her extensive knowledge of NCAA legislation, interpretations and the NCAA's governance process earned her a promotion to Associate Director of Academic and Membership Affairs (AMA).

Fuchs remained rooted in AMA throughout her tenure with the NCAA. Fuchs was primarily responsible for supervising the functions of the Legislative Relief Waiver Team and contributed heavily to issuing interpretations, serving as a staff liaison to NCAA governance committees and leading project teams for the association.

Before embarking on her career with the NCAA, Fuchs got her start working for the Atlantic Coast Conference as a Championships Intern in 2001. The Pompano Beach, Fla., native was a four-year letter winner for the Seminoles' women's basketball team from 1997-2001. She was the team co-captain in her senior year. Fuchs finished her career as a three-time ACC Honor Roll selection.

Fuchs graduated Magna Cum Laude with a bachelor's degree in communications at Florida State University and earned her master's degree from the University of North Carolina in sport administration. Her father, Don, was a pole-vaulter at Florida State and her brother Joseph is also an FSU alumnus.



DR. GREG BEAUMONT

Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies/ Senior Associate Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Academic Services

Greg Beaumont is both an Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies, and Senior Associate Athletics Director for Florida State University's Student-Athlete Academic Services.

In his position within the athletic department, Beaumont leads a team of academic advisors and learning specialists who provide quality academic support and counseling for more than 500 student-athletes. Dean Beaumont plays an active role in the leadership team in Undergraduate Studies while being part of the executive staff in the Department of Athletics. Beaumont's Athletic Academic staff is dedicated to the academic support and success of all Seminole student-athletes.

Dr. Beaumont earned his B.S. in Finance from the University of Florida, and earned his M.A. and Ph.D. in English from Florida State University. In addition to being an associate dean of Undergraduate Studies and a senior associate athletics director, he has also served as an adjunct instructor in English, having taught courses covering the Short Story, Women in Literature, British Literature, Contemporary Literature and Freshman Composition. He was also an instructor in the First Year Experience Program and for the Freshman Interest Group Program. Beaumont has won the Fred Standley award for excellence in teaching from FSU's English Department as well as having received the Phi Eta Sigma Award for Excellence in Teaching. A Vietnam veteran, he supports the campus veterans' programs.

Long-time residents of Tallahassee, Dr. Beaumont is married to his high school sweetheart, Sharon Ann. They have two children, Sarah and Matt, and five grandchildren.

Faculty Athletics Representative

Pamela L. Perrewé (Ph.D.) has spent her entire career at FSU and is in her seventh year as the Faculty Athletics Representative to the NCAA and the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC). She served as the President for the ACC during the 2015-16 academic year and currently serves on the Progress-Toward-Degree committee for the NCAA.

Dr. Perrewé is the Robert O. Lawton Distinguished Professor, the Haywood and Betty Taylor Eminent Scholar of Business Administration, Professor of Management, Professor of Sport Management, and Distinguished Research Professor at Florida State University. She received her Bachelor degree in Psychology from Purdue University and her Master and Ph.D. degrees in Management from the University of Nebraska. 50 YEARS OF WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS AT FSU



While women's athletics had held a rich tradition in Tallahassee since the early 1900's when Florida State was the Florida State College for Women, the 2018-19 season marks the 50th Anniversary of a continuous women's intercollegiate program at FSU.

Since volleyball took the floor in 1968 as the first-ever women's intercollegiate sport for the Seminoles, FSU has been a national leader in promoting and supporting women's athletics.

Florida State has won seven national championships over the last 50 years. Softball earned back-to-back AIAW (Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women the precursor to the NCAA) national titles in 1984-85 and captured the 2018 NCAA Title just months ago. Golf won the AIAW national title in 1981, and track & field the NCAA National Championship at the 1984 outdoor meet and 1985 indoors. Soccer won the 2014 NCAA National Championship.

A year-long celebration will launch with the "Garnet And Golden Celebration" on September 2. All event dates and details will be posted at Seminoles.com/50th and on social media utilizing the hashtag #GarnetAndGolden.

MATTHEW SCHMAUCH LEADERSHIP AWARD

Matthew Schmauch, an Assistant Director of Academic Support who worked with the women's basketball program for four seasons, was instrumental in the academic success of FSU student-athletes. His influence went beyond the classroom. He was an ambassador, a mentor, a friend, a big brother, a fan — truly a shining example of where hard work and determination can take you. This award, established in his memory, is given annually to the women's basketball player who exemplifies these characteristics of leadership.



The Florida State Athletics Department lost a dear member of its Seminole family on June 13, 2003. Matt Schmauch, 29, an Assistant Director for the Athletic Academic Support Program at Florida State, died from anaphylaxis due to an allergic reaction to nuts while representing FSU at the N4A convention in St. Louis, Mo.

A native of Allen Park, Mich., Schmauch had been a valuable member of the athletic academic support staff since 1996. A glowing role model in the classroom, Schmauch earned a bachelor's degree in finance from Florida State in 1995 and went on to receive a master's degree in athletic administration from FSU in 1996.

In 2003-04, the Florida State women's basketball program created a special award in honor of Schmauch.

ALICIA "ICE" GLADDEN

The Florida State women's basketball family suffered an immeasurable loss on April 19, 2013, when former standout guard Alicia "Ice" Gladden passed away at the age of 27 following a tragic car accident.



Nicknamed "Ice" because of her smooth style of play on the court, Gladden was an enormous part of Florida State's program-building trip to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2007. The native of Orange Park, Fla., who always showcased a beautiful left-handed touch was known as someone who made you smile and carried an infectious personality.

In 2015, Florida State Women's Basketball established the Alicia Gladden Defensive Player of the Year Award in her honor.

- Gladden became the only Seminole to capture ACC All-Defensive Team honors three times.
- At the time, she set the Florida State career record for steals (275) as well as the single-season record (101) in 2004-05.
- Led the Noles in scoring in her junior and senior seasons, culminating by averaging 13.5 points and leading FSU to its first-ever NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in 2007.
- Two-Time All-ACC Third Team performer and an All-ACC Honorable Mention player who became the 20th member of Florida State's 1,000 point club, finishing with 1,403 career points which is currently 11th all-time

HALL OF FAMERS



The Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame enjoys a rich tradition. Florida State is fortunate to boast an athletics program that reflects the integrity achieved by an academic institution with over 150 years of success.

There are over 300 members of the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. The first and largest class was inducted in 1977 and there has been a class inducted every fall since with the exception of 1996 when Florida State spent the year celebrating its 50th Anniversary of athletics.

Five former women's basketball greats - Sue Galkantas, Tia Paschal, Wanda Burns-Jackson, Brooke Wyckoff and Bev Burnett - are members of the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame.

SUE GALKANTAS HALL OF FAME 1989

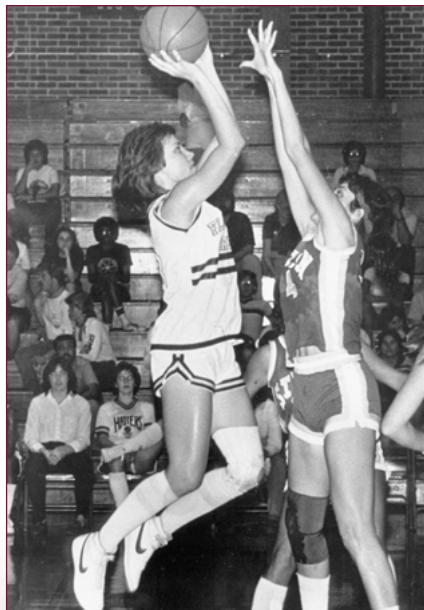
Florida State may never forget the scoring power of Sue Galkantas, who with an amazing 2,323 career points, is the most prolific scorer in Seminole basketball history. That total is the most points ever scored by a player, male or female — in Florida State history. Galkantas is currently one of just 157 players in NCAA history to amass 2,300 career points and 1,000 career rebounds.



By the time Galkantas graduated in 1984, her name was listed in nearly every statistical category in the FSU records book.

Averaging 19.4 points per game in her career — a mark that still ranks number one on the career lists — was just a glimpse of the impact that she had as a Seminole. In her rookie year, she broke the FSU freshman scoring record and was named a freshman All-American in numerous publications. By her sophomore year, Galkantas had already scored her 1,000th point and established herself as one of the top 20 scorers in the nation. In her junior season, she led FSU to a 24-6 record and to its first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Overall, she scored in double figures in 115 of 120 games and still holds 10 career and single-season records. In 1989, Galkantas also became the first female FSU athlete to have her number retired.

TIA PASCHAL HALL OF FAME 1999

The Florida State women's basketball program previously enjoyed its greatest success during the four-year career of Tia Paschal, who lettered for the Seminoles from 1989 to 1993.



A forward from Thomson, Ga., Paschal was an immediate contributor for Florida State and was a three-year starter after averaging 20 minutes of play as a rookie. She ended her career averaging 19.4 points and 7.4 rebounds as a senior while earning first team All-ACC honors and second team All-America honors by the American Women's Sports Federation. During her career, she helped lead the Seminoles to two consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances in 1989-90 and 1990-91 as well as a Metro Conference championship in the 1990-91 season.

Paschal's versatility made her a weapon in every facet of the game, which is evident by the records she still holds at Florida State. She nearly holds the records free throws made (14) in a game and is third for steals in a career (269). Paschal is also among FSU's top 10 in five season and six career records and ranks third all-time in scoring with 1,662 points.

Honors came in abundance for Paschal throughout her career. After redshirting the 1988-89 season with a knee injury, Paschal took the conference by storm as a freshman, earning Metro Conference All-Rookie Team honors. She earned Metro All-Tournament Team honors two seasons and was twice named the conference Player of the Week.

Paschal continued playing the game that she loves professionally. Since her graduation in criminology in 1993, Paschal's professional overseas experience included stops in Germany, Sweden and Spain. She also played one season with the Charlotte Sting of the WNBA.

WANDA BURNS HALL OF FAME 2006

Wanda Burns overcame adversity to become a successful women's basketball player at Florida State. One of Marynell Meadors' first recruits, Burns was a highly-touted 5-foot-8 guard out of Macon, Georgia.



Though she carried a 3.0 GPA in high school, her SAT scores were below the required score to meet the new NCAA Prop 48 rule and she had to sit out her freshman season. Burns used the year to hit the books and get acclimated to campus life.

She took the court in 1988-89 with something to prove. She averaged 11 points a game and led the team with 92 assists, helping FSU to its first winning season since 1983.

She electrified the team in 1989-90 and sparked FSU to a 21-9 record and to the NCAA Tournament. Burns set an FSU record for free throw percentage and led the team in scoring, three pointers and steals.

In 1990-91, her final season, Burns was named Metro Conference Player of the Week, set a single game record with 10 steals in a game and led the team in three-point shooting. FSU enjoyed one of its most successful seasons with a record of 25-7. Burns led the Metro Conference in scoring at 18.5 points per game and scored double figures in 38 consecutive games. She was named Metro Conference Tournament MVP and Player of the Year and also earned Hanes Her Way NCAA Woman of the Year and Second Team All-American honors.

Burns still ranks among FSU's top 10 in two career and seven single-season statistical categories.

BROOKE WYCKOFF HALL OF FAME 2011

Florida State women's basketball assistant coach Brooke Wyckoff solidified her place among the all-time great 'Noles in September 2011 with her induction into the Florida State Athletic Hall of Fame.

Wyckoff, who was a star forward for head coach Sue Semrau's first hoops teams from 1997-2001, became the fourth women's basketball player to be inducted into the Hall of Fame on Sept. 2 at a ceremony at the University Center Club, joining Sue Galkantas (Class of 1989), Tia Paschal (Class of 1999) and Wanda Burns (Class of 2006).



"Getting inducted into Florida State's Hall of Fame is the biggest honor I have ever received," Wyckoff said. "It's amazing. It's surreal and an honor to be among the amazing athletes that are in it. It was a great opportunity for me to reflect on my career here, and to thank everybody publicly made it so special."

Wyckoff and the rest of her illustrious class – Tony Brown, Sam Cowart, Marshall McDougall, Stephen Parry, Chris Weinke and Andy Miller – were also honored on Bobby Bowden Field at Doak Campbell Stadium during FSU football's 2011 season-opening football game versus Louisiana-Monroe.

A recent addition to Semrau's coaching staff, Wyckoff was hired by her alma mater in the summer 2011. Wyckoff spent nine years in the WNBA, playing for the Orlando Miracle, Connecticut Sun and the Chicago Sky.

Wyckoff was one of the top high school players in the country but chose to leave West Chester, Ohio, to play for Sue Semrau and Florida State. She made an immediate impact setting an FSU record with 80 blocked shots as a freshman in 1997.

She went on to earn All-ACC honors as a sophomore and junior and capped her senior season (2001) with first team All-ACC honors as well as All-America honors. She was also FSU's only four-time Academic All-ACC performer and received an ACC postgraduate scholarship.

Wyckoff scored 1,350 points over her storied FSU career and finished as the second best shot blocker the Seminoles have ever produced with 209. She grabbed 804 career rebounds to also rank among FSU's all-time Top 10.

BEV BURNETT HALL OF FAME 2012

Tallahassee native Bev Burnett rounded out her Florida State career as one of the most prolific scorers in school history. A four-year letterwinner from 1985-89, Burnett finished her career with 1,509 points, a mark that ranks sixth in FSU history. She also ranks fifth all-time in scoring average at 15.6 points per game.



A team captain, the 5-foot-9 forward earned All-Metro Conference First Team honors in both 1988 and 1989 and led the Seminoles in scoring in each of those seasons with averages of 21.3 and 15.9 points per game, respectively. Her 21.3 points per game average in 1988 still ranks as the second highest single-season mark in Florida State women's basketball history.

Burnett is a six-time member of the FSU 30-point club and her 34 points vs. both Florida A&M (1986) and Virginia Tech (1988) is tied for the eighth-most points scored in a game by a Seminole. She was also named a third team All-American by the American Women's Sports Federation in 1988 and has numerous conference player of the week honors to her credit.

She became the fifth women's basketball player inducted into the FSU Hall of Fame.
