lorida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 45 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of exciting additions to its record of excellence since the decade of the 1990s began:

Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. And, under the leadership of the university's 11th president, Dr. Dale W. Lick, who took office in August 1991, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A public institution and a senior member of the nine-

Mexico and the Appleton Museum in Ocala. The university's theater and film professional-training programs, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training and FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts, both located in the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, opened in 1990. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, Yugoslavia, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 274 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering

science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex at Innovation Park and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four nuclear research centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,500, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business

administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 28,600 students and their needs and interests. The Honors and Scholars program, the Distinguished Lecture Series. Student Government,

the all-collegiate Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students can participate.

Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida.

Florida State continues to progress and grow — from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a topranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

In all areas of its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.



member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$412 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$100 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the private, non-profit FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.


The main campus is spread over 396 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has the smallest campus in the SUS, acquired about 49 acres in 1991-92 after many years of being landlocked at 347 acres. The university owns a total of 1,172 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of

(operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,577 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and four of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,914 administrative, professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 1.94 million book titles, 18,751 serials and 4.4 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's main



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hen the 1992-93 women's golf team looks in the mirror this season, they will have a completely different look. There are a few new faces and names to add to the starting line-up this season. With the loss of seniors

Mary Lee Cobick and Emma Rundle, the team looks to reserves Kelly Pittman, Marie-Josee' Rouleau, and Tiffany Faucette, new recruits Kate Burton and Mabel P. del Pobil, walk-on Sarah Stimac, and FSU returnee Maria Castellucci to bring the team to their third straight NCAA Championship.

The team comes off of an extremely successful season that includes wins at the Lady Seminole Invitational and at the Ryder/Florida State Intercollegiate. The team hadn't won the Lady Seminole in 10 years and it was the first time in 22 years that the Tribe won the Ryder/Florida State Intercollegiate. In seven out of the teams' nine tournaments last season, they placed in fifth or better, including second place finishes at the Diet Coke/Roadrunner Invitational, the Beacon Woods Invitational, the LSU Fairwood Invitational, and their first ever ACC Tournament.

"We have a young team in age, but they don't have a lack of experience. The freshman," says women's coach Debbie Dillman, "have a lot of tournament experience and once they adjust to the college life, they will definitely take off."

Team seniors Kelly Pittman and Marie-Josee' Rouleau

bring a wealth of knowledge and competitive skills to their teammates. Both seniors competed with the Lady Seminale 14th place national team of last season and hope to return to Nationals with their new team this season for an improved

Kelly Pittman, out of Vidalia, Georgia, is one of two seniors on the 1992-93 squad and with her senior status, Kelly brings experience and leadership in tournament play to the team. The climax of her junior year came with a season-high finish sixth place in the 1992 Ryder/Florida State Intercollegiate Invitational. Kelly entered the starting line-up during the middle of last year by consistently shooting low scores. She kept and held that position with top 20 finishes in five of the seven tournaments she played in.

Marie-Josee' Rouleau, the second senior to grace the squad, hails from Quebec, Canada, and was the winner of the Canadian Amateur in August of 92, Josee' had top 20 finishes in five of her tournaments during the season. Her highest finish was in the Lady Seminole Invitational where she placed in second behind teammate Erica Firnhaber. She has come back strong again this year, placing fifth in her first tournament.

Junior Maria Castellucci returns to the Tribe after a one year hiatus. She will be a definite competitor in the spring, and will be looking to make up for time lost.

The lone sophomore on the team, Tiffany Faucette out of Ormand Beach, Florida, was a Lady Seminole reserve last year. She has worked her way into the starting line-up and it looks like she's there to stay. Her scores continue to improve and her patience has earned her position.

With the loss of seniors Emma Rundle and Mary Lee Cobick, Dillman recruited two freshmen. "They are improving every day," Dillman says of Kate Burton and Mabel P. del

Burton hails from Wallington, Surrey, England, and has a wealth of experience in her background, including the South Eastern Championship in 1990, 1991, and 1992. Teammate and freshman Mabel P. del Pobil comes to Florida State from Eada, Spain. She was a member of the Spanish national team from 1990 until 1992 and competed in many international tournaments as a representative of the team.

"I think that this year, with the new Regional Qualifying System, we should do well," says Dillman. "I expect to make it to the regionals. Our district is the strongest in the east and making it to the regionals is as difficult as making it to the nationals.

"I think that if the seniors keep focus, the younger players will follow suit and this will be a very strong year for us."



SENERGE COLUMN

The Seminole Golf Course, designed by William W. Amick, is located approximately two miles west of the university campus. The first nine holes were completed in 1963 and the completion of the additional nine was in 1968.

The golf course measures 5,930 yards from the championship tees, and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, TIFTON 328 (bermuda) are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0.

The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Seminole Golf Course is now run and operated by Club Consultation and Management, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improvements made and within the next five years it should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.









KELLY PITTMAN

Debbie Dillman, the coach of Florida State University's women's golf team, has entered her ninth year in that

position. Essentially the backbone of the women's team, Dillman is in charge of coaching the team, as well as completing administrative duties.

Last year, Dillman coached the Lady Seminole golf team to its second NCAA National Championship appearance since 1981. The Lady Seminoles were nationally ranked in seventh place before the National Championship and played extremely well under the coaching of Dillman by placing 14th in the competition. In 1991, the Lady Seminoles finished 14th in the nationals held in Columbus, Ohio. Prior to that, the Tribe had only been to the nationals one time -1981- a tournament which they won in a sudden death situation.

Dillman was an undergraduate student from 1979-82 at Florida State and worked at the Seminole Golf Course in various capacities. This experience helped Debbie by giving her useful exposure to the many complications and incidents that can arise when handling a golf course and a competition.

In teaching her teams, Debbie uses much of the knowledge she gained from her work both on and off the golf course. Her knowledge of the sport of golf in the areas of management, competition regulations and rules, and entertainment has grown from the various work and competitive experiences that she has had.

Currently in her free time, Dillman raises Tennessee Walking horses on a farm in the nearby area of Tallahassee.

A native from Davison, Michigan, Dillman grew up with golf in her family. Her parents were heavily involved in country club management. During her high school career, Dillman was named three time Flint Junior Golf Champion from 1977-79, (named the number one golf program in the country). She was the captain of her high school team for four years and was twice a runner-up at the Michigan State Championship, while shooting a tournament record and winning the regional title her senior year.




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

Lady Seminoles Travel To Tempe, Arizona To Compete In The 11th Annual National Tournament

The Lady Seminole golf team returned to the NCAA's for the second year in a row after a ten year hiatus last spring. The team travelled to Tempe to compete against 17 teams at the Karsten Golf Course on the Arizona State University campus. The ladies placed in 14th for a second time in two seasons with scores of 313-314-306-303 for 1236. The Lady Seminoles entered the tournament with an seventh place ranking. San Jose State won the championship with scores of 299-290-292-290 for 1171. Arizona placed second, four strokes behind the leader.

The individual winner of the tournament was Vicki Goetze of the University of Georgia who shot a blistering 69-74-72-65 for 280 total, beating out 1991 champion Annika Sorenstam of the University of Arizona.

Individually, the Lady Seminole team gained confidence and their scores improved from the year before. The high finish was made by Erica Firnhaber who finished in a tie for 47th. Emma Rundle followed closely with a drastically improved tie for 51st over 96th the year before. Kelly Pittman, in her first appearance in the NCAA's, finished in a tie for 67th, Marie-Josee' Rouleau finished in a tie for 82nd, and Mary Lee Cobick finished in a tie for 89th.

Lady Seminoles Return to NCAA's for 10 Year Anniversary in '91


The Lady Seminole golf team participated in the 10th NCAA anniversary championships in Columbus, Ohio during the week of May 23, 1991. The championship also marked the 50 year anniversary of women's competition in collegiate sports. It was the first time since 1981 that the Lady Seminoles participated in a national competition. The team had the excellent rankings to bring them into this field of 17 teams and going into the tournament, Florida State was tied for fouth in the NCAA Collegiate rankings.

Starting the first day in eighth place, the Lady Seminoles struggled to find their place in the competition. They played against the toughest teams in the country, including Miami (FL), University of Florida, UCLA, Arizona, San Jose State, University of South Florida, and Georgia among others in the 17 field team. On the second day, Florida State fell to 14th place and remained there for the rest of the tournament.

UCLA and San Jose State fought for the title on a playoff hole, and UCLA came out the victor for the overall competition. Winning the individual title was Annika Sorenstam of the University of Arizona.

Florida State Women Win 1981 Championship

Florida State won its fourth and most important tournament championship of 1981 at the AIAW National Championships. By rallying on the back nine on the final day of the tournament, the Lady Seminoles surged to the lead over the Lady Bulldogs of Georgia.







After the third round, FSU led by one stroke over the host Lady Bulldogs. A stumble on the front nine of the final round pushed the Tribe back two shots behind Georgia. Florida State, however, came back on the final nine and when four of the five FSU players birdied the 17th hole, Florida State was on its way to finishing three shots ahead of Georgia.

Three Lady Seminole golfers from that team were named All-American during their careers. Lisa Young was FSU's top finisher in third place; Barb Bunkowsky did her part on the final day with birdies on the last five holes and came in a tie for 14th; Michele Guilbault, who had won the Dick McGuire Invitational earlier in the season, was the third player in the 1981 selection.

New to the NCAA's for Women

For the first time in women's collegiate golf history, the women will be competing in a regional system. This means that in order to qualify for the nationals, teams will have to qualify in the regionals for a bid to the national tournament.

Strength Training and Conditioning

It is important to every coach and athlete to be in top physical shape for their performances in Florida State athletic competitions and on the road. The Lady Seminole golf team has a special training time and work-out based on each golfers ability, strengths, and weakness. It is imperative that care be taken for injuries and any mishaps that can occur during competition.

The training staff at Florida State are equipped with the best possible equipment to make the chances of accidents improbable. They work consistently to prevent injuries and to ensure the excellence of our players in competition.







Being an athlete at Florida State University means receiving the best care and treatment possible. All of the student-athletes undergo pre-season screening so a certified trainer can detect any potential injuries an athlete may incur throughout the season. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. The program is closely monitored by head trainer Robin Gibson or one of her nine staff members.

Rehabilitation is another important component of the

Seminole training room. Even though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are unavoidable for the 125 athletes who participate in non-revenue sports. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at Haney, Henderson, & Stowers who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.

Body fat, weight control and drug testing are all responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.

Academic Advising

The primary concern of being a student-athlete at Florida State University is getting an education and taking advantage of the many opportunities offered to assist golfers. Trudy Raybun's Office of Academic Advising aids students who participate in all of the non-revenue sports with their admissions, class schedules, registration process, and the normal progress towards a degree. Raybun and her two graduate assistants also monitor each athlete in their class performance and recommend tutors when necessary.

Academic Support is supervised by Nick Menacof, who oversees the study hall area and tutorials his office provides. As student-athletes learn to juggle practicing 20 hours a week and making eight to nine road trips during their season, plus a full class load, they find comfort in knowing there is a support staff to help them accomplish the ultimate goal of receiving a quality education.

The Lady Seminole golfers take the concern of schooling to heart and have consistently held one of the top grade point averages among all of the university's teams. They won the award of academic excellence for their 1990-91 season with a combined grade point average of 3.07 and have a history of winning this award. The ladies won the same award in 1989, again with a combined grade point average of 3.06.
