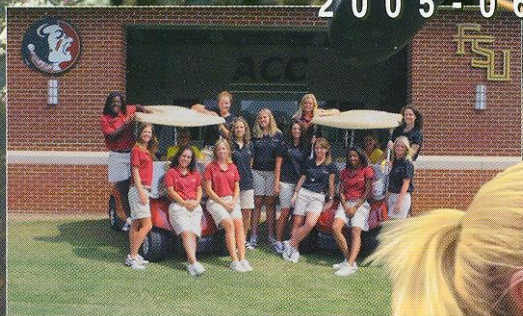

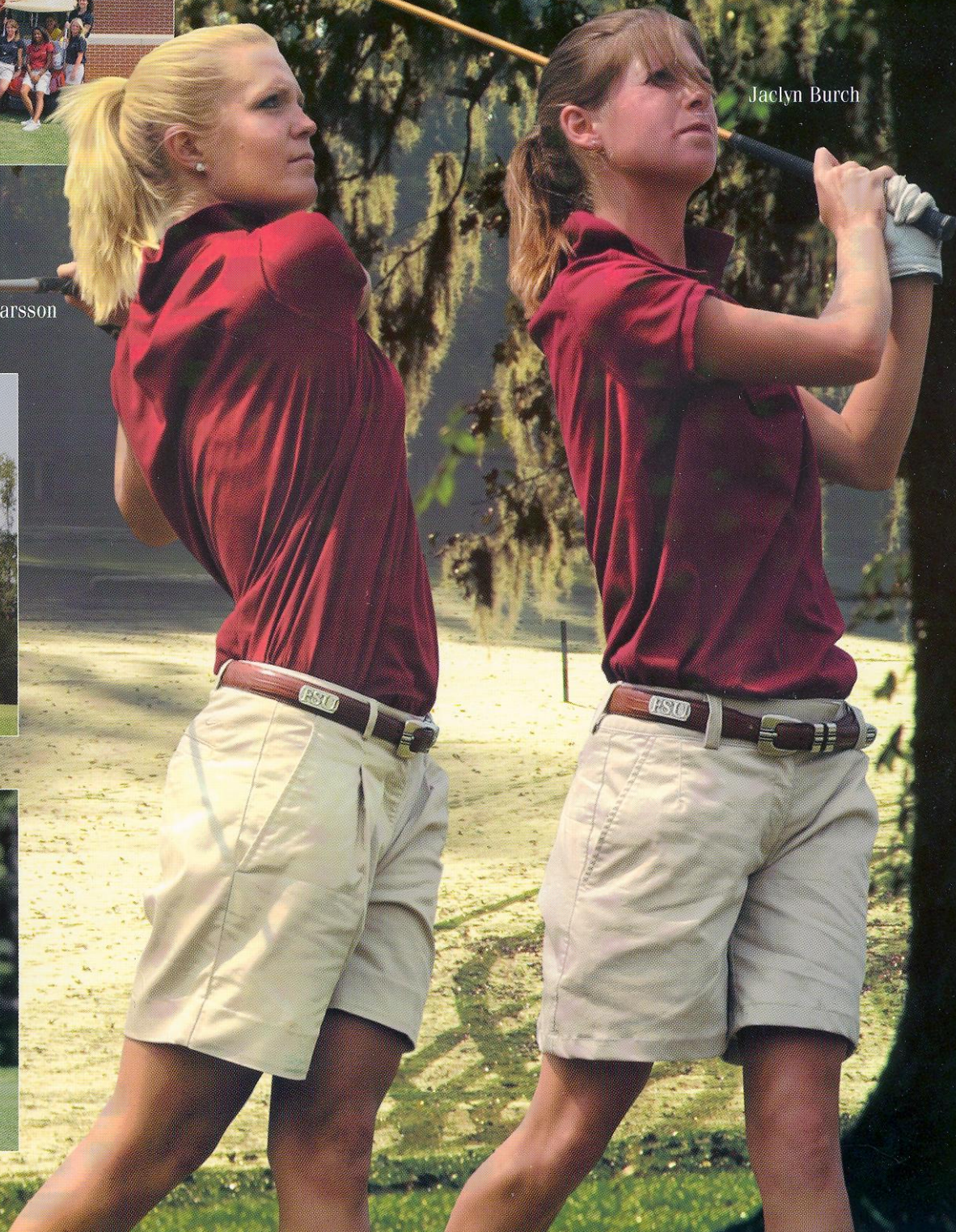

Stupples wins first major

Former Seminole ties record for lowest score in a major with 19-under 269 at Women's British Open

SUNNINGDALE, England — Karen Stupples began the final round of the Women's British Open eagle-double eagle. It was the kind of start Annika Sorenstam needed.

Stupples won her first major title with a record-tying score of 19-under 269, while defending champion Sorenstam's bid to become the second woman to win all four majors back-to-back ended in a tie for 13th.

"It's quite mind blowing," Karen Stupples said Sunday after winning her first major. "It's something that I never knew was going to happen."

This time the victory went to a hometown talent who has been playing on the LPGA Tour for six years after playing at Florida State from 1992 to 1995. She won her first title in the opening tournament of the season, and now she has a major to go with it and a check for \$290,880.

"It's quite mind blowing," Stupples said after finishing five strokes ahead of Rachel Teske. "It's something that I never knew was going to happen."

Stupples shot an 8-under 64 in the final round on the Old Course at Sunningdale to tie the record-low score in a major, set by Dottie Pepper at the 1999 Nabisco Dinah Shore.

Starting the round a stroke behind third-round co-leaders Heather Bowie and Teske, Stupples began the day with an eagle on No. 1 and a double-eagle on the second hole.

At the 475-yard second, she followed a huge drive with a 5-iron from 202 yards, the ball bouncing onto the green and rolling straight at the hole. The flag initially stopped the ball from dropping in.

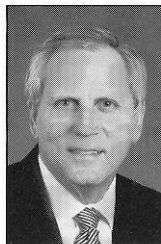

Finally, the decisions and priorities of the Department should always focus on our student-athletes - first, as individuals; second, as students; and third, as athletes.

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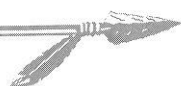

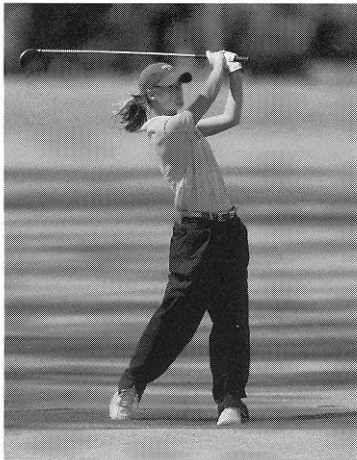

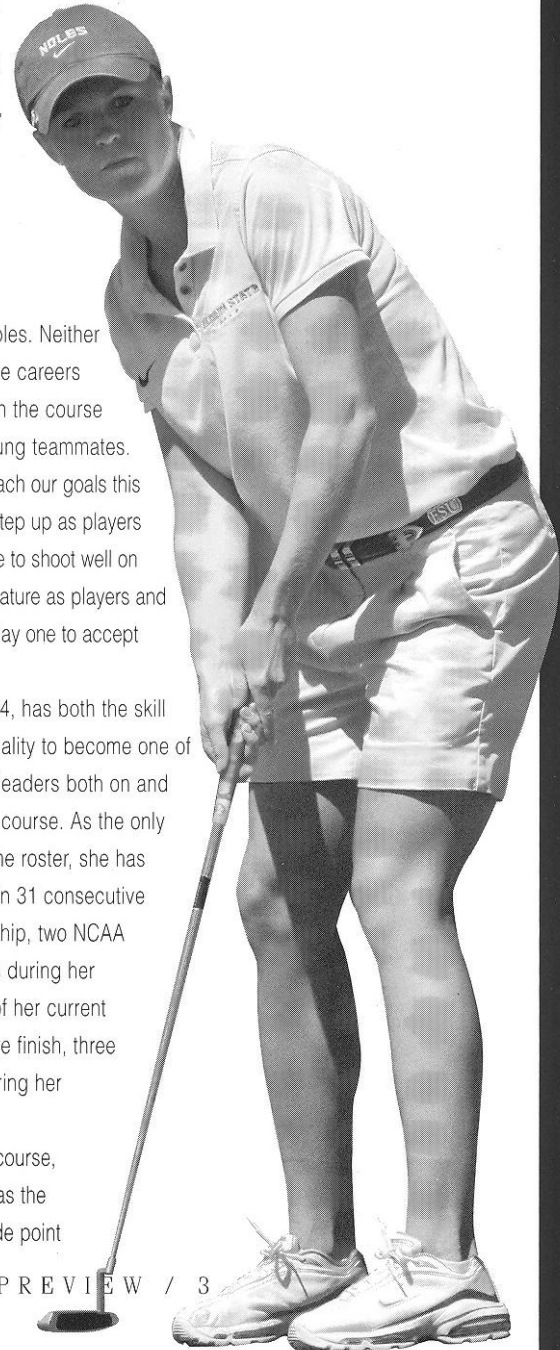

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Time To Step Up



The Florida State women's golf team begins the 2005-06 season with all of the pieces in place to make a return to the national rankings and earn its way back to the NCAA Championship tournament – places the Seminoles have grown accustomed to being recently and during the illustrious history of the program under head coach Debbie Dillman.



Those pieces included four returning members of the starting line-up and one of the top recruiting classes in recent memory who are beginning their careers as Seminoles. The Seminoles' four returners – senior Caroline Larsson, junior Jaclyn Burch and sophomores Whitney Brummett and Whitney Wright – are veterans who have played well during their careers and who are looking to return the Seminoles to the national elite. The young group of players vying for the coveted fifth spot in the line-up came to Florida State to continue the long tradition of championship golf in Tallahassee.

"Our players know that being ranked nationally and playing in the NCAA Championship is what we all

expect to achieve each year," said Dillman. "Not only was it a disappointment when our season ended early, but it was a shock to all of us. We all have to be committed to earning our way back to nationals. We are close and I think our players know what they have to do to play golf the Florida State way again."

The commitment to winning begins with the Seminoles' upperclassmen – Larsson and Burch. Considered to be two of the top golfers in the Atlantic Coast Conference, both players have earned all-conference honors and have played in the nationals at

least once during their careers as Seminoles. Neither has missed a match during their collegiate careers and both will have to step up their play on the course and in their roles as leaders with their young teammates.

"For our team to be successful and reach our goals this season, both Caroline and Jaclyn have to step up as players and leaders," said Dillman. "They both have to shoot well on the course and help our younger players mature as players and as people. We are counting on them from day one to accept those responsibilities."

Larsson, an All-ACC selection in 2004, has both the skill and personality to become one of the team's leaders both on and off the golf course. As the only senior on the roster, she has competed in 31 consecutive matches including one NCAA Championship, two NCAA Regionals and three ACC Championships during her career. Her career is unmatched by any of her current teammates as she has earned one top-five finish, three top-10 finishes and 10 top-20 finishes during her career.

In addition to performing well on the course, Larsson's academic career is unmatched as the senior psychology major holds a 3.92 grade point

average and never earned a grade below an A-.

"As a senior and a fourth-year starter, Caroline needs to step up and be our team leader," said Dillman. "She has been through so many situations in so many different events and needs to share her experiences with our younger players to help them continue to improve. She is one of the most mature people I have ever coached and her teammates need to understand how she takes care of many of the aspects of her daily life."

Burch, an All-ACC selection in 2005, is another player who

needs to continue to develop into a team leader for the Seminoles to return to their rightful place in the national rankings this season. She, too, has competed at the highest levels of collegiate golf and took her game to an even higher level as she played in the U.S. Amateur, the Pub Links and the North/South Amateur during the summer of 2005.

Burch is also an experienced golfer who has played in 20 events during the first two years at Florida State. She has also never missed an event since joining the Seminoles' line-up as a freshman and has played in one NCAA Championship, one NCAA Regional and two ACC Championships during her career. She played so well as a sophomore in earning all-conference honors that each of her scores during both the fall and spring seasons in 2004-05 were counted toward the team score – the only player on the team to contribute so mightily to the Seminoles' success during the year.

"We are really excited about Jaclyn and her potential this season," said Dillman. "She earned All-ACC honors at the end of last season and then played well on the national level over the summer. As she continues to improve as a player, we are going to continue to improve as a team. Fortunately, Jaclyn's best days as a Seminole are definitely ahead of her."

A pair of sophomores – Whitney Brummett and Whitney Wright – had quite an impact on the team last season as members of the Seminoles' starting line-up during the entire season and two of the top newcomers in the ACC. Not only are the two Whitney's talented golfers, but they represent the future of the Seminoles with three years of eligibility remaining as the 2005-06 season begins.

Brummett, the runner-up for Freshman of the Year honors in the ACC, played as the Seminoles' No. 1 golfer throughout much of her freshman season. She showed improvement throughout the season and displayed the fact that her best golf is certainly in her future. Brummett led the Seminoles with six top 25 finishes and helped the team earn six top-10 team finishes during the 2004-05 fall and spring seasons.

Brummett earned two top-five finishes and earned a top-25 placing in her first career ACC Championship as a freshman. She was Florida State's top finisher in four events and was among the team leaders in number of rounds counted toward the team score in her first season.

"The most exciting aspect of Whitney Brummett's game is that she played so well, yet there is so much room for her to improve in everything she does on the course in a given round," said Dillman. "It's exciting for our team that she is only a sophomore and will get better each time we play in an event."

Wright also displayed the potential as a freshman that will help her to become one of the Seminoles' top golfers during her career. She cemented her position in Florida State's starting line-up for years to come as she played in all nine of the teams events during her freshman season.

Wright displayed her competitive spirit and heart as she helped the Seminoles to six top-10 team finishes in 2004-05. She closed her inaugural collegiate season with a 16th place finish in her first ACC Championship appearance and played well during the Seminoles' nine-day tour of the world's greatest golf links of Scotland.

"Whitney Wright continues to improve both physically and mentally each time she steps onto the course," said Dillman. "Improving her outlook after each shot she takes is important to Whitney's game and she works on that each day in practice and in every round she plays. She has a bright future ahead of her as a member of this team."

A number of Seminoles, both veterans and newcomers, will compete for the coveted fifth spot in Florida State's starting line-

up. A pair of returning players – junior Michelle Steakin and senior Kristin Sordel – has played as members of the starting line-up during their careers while a handful of younger Seminoles and newcomers could earn the opportunity to represent Florida State during the year.

Sordel, one of three Seminoles selected to the 2005 NGCA Scholar Athlete Team, has experience on her side as she has played in 20 events during her collegiate career including four as a member of the Seminoles' starting line-up during the 2004-05 fall and spring seasons. While earning a 4.0 grade point average last year, she played in four of the most competitive tournaments as a member of Florida State's starting line-up and helped the Seminoles' earn two top-10 team finishes.

Steakin played in the Lady Gator and the Lady Gamecock Invationals and was one of the lowest scoring members of the Seminoles' "B" team during the spring of 2005. Her experience could give her an advantage in earning playing time this year. Steakin has played in seven career events and carded a career-low score of 72 in competition during the spring of 2005.

"Kristin and Michelle have played a lot and have played well for us," said Dillman. "I'm looking forward to watching their continued individual improvement and working with them as they play well in qualifiers for each of our tournaments. They are both good players who represent our program well."

Three players who are in the program for their second season and who will also compete for playing time this season are sophomores Ashleigh Anderson, Kim Haskins and Ashley Kemp. All three have played competitive golf at the junior level and all three improved as golfers during their freshman season at Florida State.

Both Kemp and Haskins earned valuable experience as members of Florida State's "B" team as freshmen. Kemp was the top performer on the Seminoles' "B" team as she played in four events and earned three top-10 finishes. Her best finish of her first season was a tie for sixth place at the Bash at the Beach during the spring season. Haskins also enjoyed success during her freshman season as she competed in two of the first two events of her Seminole career. Anderson hopes her continued improvement will put her in position to compete for the Seminoles as a sophomore.

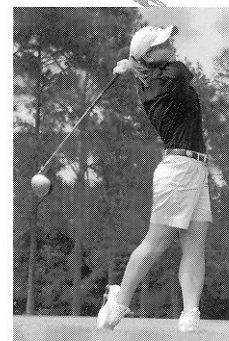
"We were very pleased with the play of Ashleigh, Kim and Ashley last season," said Dillman. They are important members of our team who work each day in practice to push themselves and every other member of our team to improve. They will all have their chance to help us this season."

The Seminoles' four newcomers are all talented and mature enough to be significant contributors to the success of the Seminoles during both the fall and spring seasons. The group

includes one junior, Kayla Shaul, and three freshmen, Lauren Cousart, Erica Gonzalez and Sara Young.

Shaul, the most experienced of the group, is a junior college transfer from Daytona Beach Community College. She earned JUCO All-America honors and earned individual national championship medalist honors as she led DBCC to the 2004 JUCO National Championship. Shaul's presence on the team and playing experience at a high level of collegiate golf make her an ideal candidate for the remaining spot in Florida State's line-up.

Cousart is an advanced golfer and student whose five years of competitive junior golf participation has prepared her well for the high level of play at the Division I level. She did not play high school golf. Instead, she opted to compete on the junior circuit to better prepare her to play in the ACC on the national collegiate level. Gonzalez is also an experienced golfer from the talent-rich area of South Florida. She comes to Florida State as one of the top prep golfers in the state who also competed and was suc-

cessful as a junior golfer. Young will add depth to the team and comes to Florida State from Jacksonville, Fla.

"Our group of new players will be ready to step in and help us from the start of practice," said Dillman. "We are expecting all of the newcomers to step up and compete against our returning players for a spot in the line-up. We recruited these players to help us right away. We fully expect that they will help us throughout their careers."

With talent and experience throughout making up nearly all of the Seminoles' starting line-up and talented players working to become successful members of the line-up, Dillman has assembled another team that will represent the Seminole women's golf tradition well. It's a team that will represent Florida State University well both on and off the course and one that will compete among the nation's elite.

Head Coach

National rankings, tournament success, postseason play, overwhelming achievement on the golf course and in the class room have become the foundations of the Florida State women's golf program. For more than 25 years, the Seminole program has been a constant national contender on the golf course and a leader among its peers in the classroom.

The cornerstone of the Florida State program is Head Coach Debbie Dillman who is in her 22nd season as the Seminoles' head coach. The former Seminole player has helped make the program a national contender on an annual basis.

Dillman has led Florida State to 12 NCAA Championship appearances in the last 15 years, including top 20 national finishes in both 2003 and 2004. During her career as the Seminoles' head coach, she has guided the team to 17 tournament championships and more than 65 top-10 finishes. Dillman has coached three All-America players and nine individuals who have earned All-ACC honors a total of 12 times.

The Florida State women's golf team has been a fixture in the national rankings for the last 25 years. The Seminoles have also become regular contenders for both team and individual honors in the Atlantic Coast Conference since joining the league in 1992. In addition, the Seminoles are annually invited to play in the most prestigious tournaments in all of college golf and can usually be found near the top of the leader boards in those events.

Dillman has established the Seminole program as one of the nation's best by recruiting the nation's top talent to Tallahassee. Her strength as a recruiter is evidenced by the number of former players who have played, or

who are playing, professionally and the number of players who enjoyed tremendous success as collegians.

Among the numerous current pros recruited by Dillman are Karen Stupples and Tiffany Faucette. Stupples won two tournaments during her collegiate career as a Seminole and qualified for the LPGA on her first attempt. She was also a member of Great Britain's Curtis Cup teams in 1996 and 1998. Stupples earned her first LPGA Championship in

2004 as she won the Welch's/Fry's British Open Championship. Faucette was a three-year member of the Seminole women's golf team who is currently playing on the Ladies' European Tour. She won the 1997 McDonald's Open Championship and was runner-up at the 1995 Canadian Women's Amateur Championship.

Dillman recruited and coached Kristin Tamulis, Florida State's first three-time All-ACC selection who graduated from Florida State in 2003. Tamulis has played in three U.S. Women's Open Tournaments. She played on the Futures Tour in 2004 where she earned five top-10 finishes and is currently playing on the LPGA Tour where she finished 18th in the 2005 Courning Classic.

Dillman's teams consistently rank among the best in the ACC and the nation. In the last five years, she has guided the Seminoles into the NCAA Tournament five times, produced seven All-ACC selections and helped the Seminoles improve their standing in the ACC – considered by many to be the toughest women's golf conference in the nation.

Dillman was honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-of-the-Year in 1992, the Seminoles' first year in the conference. The Seminoles finished second in the conference tournament that season and finished only two strokes behind North Carolina for the team championship.

Dillman was a member of Florida State's 1980 nationally ranked squad and 1981 AIAW national championship team.

Dillman attended Florida State as an undergraduate and played golf from 1979-1982. While taking classes and playing golf, she also worked at Seminole Golf Course allowing her to learn both the management side and the competitive side of golf. Dillman has a daughter Annelynn (11).

Assistant Coach

Amy Bond, one of the 50 greatest golfers in Atlantic Coast Conference history, is in her fifth season as an assistant coach at Florida State. She is an integral part of the Seminoles' program and is involved in every phase of the success of the program.

She serves as the tournament director for the ACC/SEC Challenge, a 16-team tournament that Florida State annually hosts in Destin, Fla. She has helped the tournament grow from its infancy into one of the top women's tournaments in the country. From securing hotel rooms for all 16 teams and associated working staff, to course management, to serving as the official score keeper during all three rounds of the event, Bond helps pull a small army of people together to give the student-athletes a chance to compete at the highest level.

Bond also serves as the head coach of the Seminoles' "B" team which competed in four events in 2005. Her recruiting duties have been expanded as she spent the last two summers at various junior golf tournaments searching for the next great Seminole player.

During her career as a player and an assistant coach at Florida State, Amy Bond has become a part of, and helped sustain, the Seminoles' outstanding winning tradition. During her three years as a player, she helped lead the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances including the 1999 NCAA Championship. As an assistant coach, Bond has helped the Seminoles reach the NCAA Tournament three times including consecutive appearances in the NCAA Championship in both 2003 and 2004.

A 1998 All-ACC selection, Bond was the Seminoles' top player from 1997-1999 as she earned 10 top-10 finishes and was named the team's Most Valuable Player each year. She competed in the NCAA Championship tournament as a senior in 1999 (finishing in 30th place) and played in three NCAA regional tournaments during her career. In addition, she finished in the top-20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments and was the medalist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida State Championship Tournament. Bond earned 14 top-15 finishes during her collegiate career.

During her first three years as an assistant to Head Coach Debbie Dillman, Bond helped coach the Seminoles to the 2002 NCAA Central Regional Championship and the 2003 and 2004 NCAA Championship where they earned top-20 national finishes both years. She also coached four All-ACC selections - Kristin Tamulis (2002 and 2003), Caroline Larsson and Katie Quinney (2004) and Jaclyn Burch (2005).

Bond has also enjoyed success as a professional golfer.

She joined the professional ranks and began playing on the SBC Futures Tour in 1999. In 2000, she made 13 cuts in the 17 events she entered and gained tour status that allowed her to play in each of the scheduled SBC events in 2001. She participated on the tour during the summers of 2002 and 2003.

The Ocala, Fla., native earned Academic All-America honors during her senior season and was a four-time ACC Honor Roll selection. She earned her bachelor's degree in sport management in 1997 and her master's in sports administration in 1999. Bond was a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Council (1997-99) and represented Florida State University at the NCAA Leadership Conference in 1999.

Bond also enjoyed a successful junior career before coming to Florida State. She won the Marion County championship in 1992 and the Yancy Junior championship in 1991, 1992 and 1994. Bond was a four-year varsity team member at Vanguard High School where she earned all-area honors four times and won the district championship her senior season.



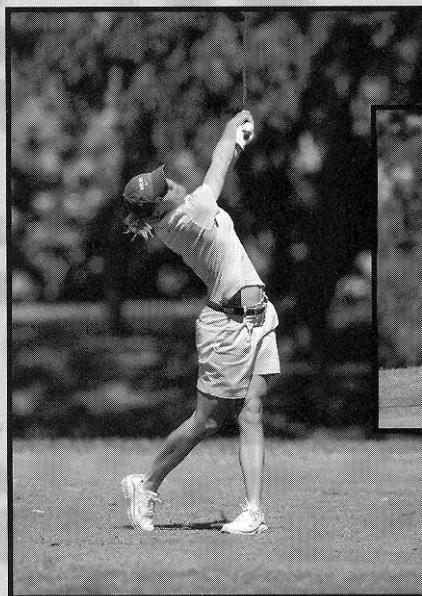

2004-05 Season Review

FLORIDA STATE EARNS SIX TOP-10 TEAM FINISHES IN 2004-05

The Florida State women's golf team earned six top-10 team finishes including a season-best tie for second finish at the Ryder/Florida Championship and a placing of sixth at the ACC Championship during the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons.

The Seminoles were led by sophomore All-ACC selection Jaclyn Burch and ACC Freshman of the Year nominee Whitney Brummett who earned a combined eight top-20 individual finishes. The Seminoles displayed consistent improvement throughout the course of the season as they played their best three events

in the spring season with their best score and finish coming at the Ryder/Florida Championship. Brummett, who earned a team-leading two top-10 individual finishes, earned the best finish by a Seminole individual as she placed in a tie for third at the Ryder. The freshman led

three Seminoles in the top 10 (also Whitney Wright and Caroline Larsson) of the individual standings of the Ryder.

BURCH EARNS ALL-ACC HONORS

Sophomore Jaclyn Burch who led the Seminoles with a career-low 76.78 stroke average during the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons, was named to the All-ACC team in a vote by the league's eight head coaches. Burch led the Seminoles to six top-10 team finishes. Her selection marks the eighth time a Seminole golfer has earned All-ACC honors in the last six years. In earning all-conference honors for the first time during her career, Burch became only the third sophomore in school history to earn All-ACC honors joining current teammate Caroline Larsson (2004) and former Florida State All-America Kristin Tamulis (2001) as second-year Seminoles who have earned the honor.

THE WHITNEY'S LEAD THE WAY

The Seminoles' best tournament showing during the spring of 2005 was at the Ryder/Florida Championship. The Seminoles earned their season best finish and tied for

second with a team total score of 913 over the three-day tournament. It was the Seminoles best tournament score of the spring. The Seminoles carded their top two single-round scores with a 299 in the first round and a 306 in the second round. Freshman Whitney Brummett led the way as she shot a 72-77-76 (225 total) while finishing tied for third place in the individual standings. Freshman Whitney Wright also had a good performance during that tournament posting scores of 74-78-74 (237) while finishing tied for fifth place. Sophomore Jaclyn Burch finished in a tie for 10th place in the individual standings.

SEASON BESTS

During the spring 2005 season, three Seminoles finished with stroke averages in the 70's: Jaclyn Burch (77.93), Whitney Brummett (79.33) and Caroline Larsson (79.80). The lowest round of the season belonged to Brummett who posted 72 in the first round of the Ryder/Florida Championship.

CONSISTENCY

Sophomore Jaclyn Burch led the Seminoles as she posted five scores below +5 strokes over par or better. Burch's total of five was only one-third of the Seminoles' team total of 14 strokes at +5 or better. Burch also led the team in stroke average (77.93).

Junior Caroline Larsson has played in 31 consecutive events and has never missed playing in an event for the Seminoles during her career. She has played in two NCAA Championships, two NCAA Regionals and three ACC Championships.

LARSSON IMPROVES SCORES IN SPRING SEASON

Junior Caroline Larsson played her best golf at the end of her junior season. She averaged 78.67 strokes per round in the last three tournaments (nine rounds) after averaging 81.50 strokes per round in the first two events (six rounds) of the spring season. Larsson finished within the top 50 of the individual standings in the last three events of the spring (including a seventh place finish at the Ryder/Florida Championship) after finishing

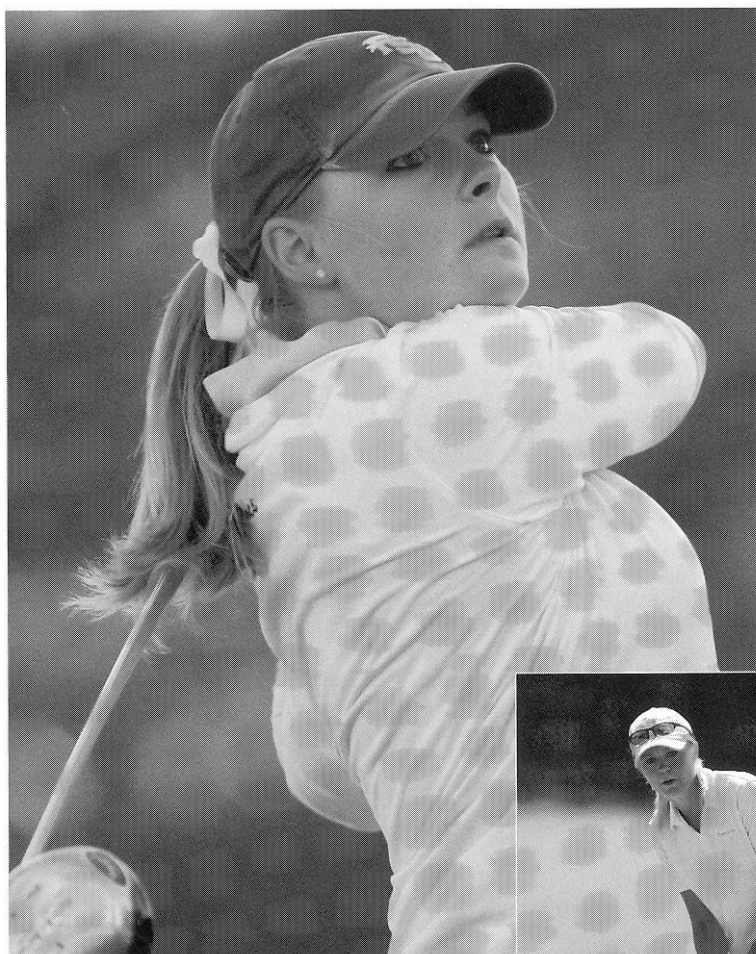

SEMINOLES WIN DIRECTOR'S CUP FOR SERVICE

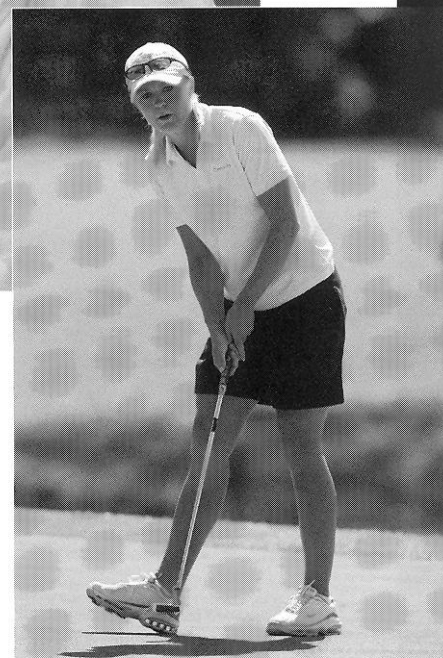

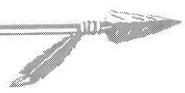

This Is Florida State



Landis Hall has been renovated from a traditional dormitory style living environment into one of the most functional and popular spots on the Florida State campus at a cost of nearly \$20 million.

From its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee to a nearly four-decade stint as the Florida State College for Women to its return to coeducational status as a university, Florida State University has developed into an acclaimed research institution with excellence in teaching, research and public service.

The university enrolls nearly 39,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students. Of these, 24.2 percent are minorities. Students are from all 50 states and the District of Columbia, as well as 132 foreign countries.

Florida State offers an impressive breadth of academic degree programs. Students may take courses of study leading to a baccalaureate degree in 94 programs, a master's degree in 107 degree programs, a doctorate in 73 degree programs, a specialist certification in 28 degree programs and a professional designation in two degree programs. Courses are offered through 16 schools and colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education; Engineering; Human Sciences; Information; Law; Medicine; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Sciences; Social Work; and Visual Arts and Dance.

Our students have the opportunity to work and study alongside two Nobel laureates, five members of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences, seven members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and two winners of the Pulitzer Prize. Florida State faculty also lead several scholarly fields in citations of published work.

Several members of the Florida State faculty were recognized with major awards in 2005, including two Guggenheim Fellowships, a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, a Leopold Leadership Fellowship, five Fulbright fellowships, an Alexander Von Humboldt award, a new member elected into the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, a new member elected a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and a new member elected into the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Florida State has many academic programs that consistently rank among those at the nation's top 25 public universities, including programs in business, chemistry, creative writing, criminology, ecology and evolutionary biology, information, law, meteorology, oceanography, physics, political science, psychology, public policy, sociology and statistics.

The university had many noteworthy achievements in 2005. Among them:

- The College of Law ranked among the top 30 public law schools in the United States; the environmental law program ranked 14th nationally and is considered one of the strongest in the Southeast.
- The School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts was recognized by the Directors Guild of America for its distinguished contribution to American culture through film and television, joining fellow honorees Robert DeNiro, Jonathan Demme and other entertainment luminaries at the Fifth Annual DGA Honors. In addition, the school was honored with two Student Oscars and five Collegiate Television Academy Awards; more than those received by students from any other school in the history of the industry.
- The Askew School of Public Administration and Policy was identified as the fourth most productive in the country among public affairs schools, and ranked third most productive in terms of published works by graduate students.
- The risk management/insurance program was named one of the most highly recognized programs in the nation, ranked in the top 10 by *U.S. News and World Report*.
- The College of Medicine, the first newly accredited allopathic medical school in more than 20 years, graduated its first class and matched all students to residencies.
- Several faculty members in the English department were recognized with awards, including the prestigious Mary McCarthy Prize in fiction, awarded to Paul Shephard; an O. Henry Award for Elizabeth Stuckey-French; the Gustave O. Arlt Award from the Council of Graduate Schools to Nancy Bradley Warren; and the National Magazine Award to Robert Olen Butler.

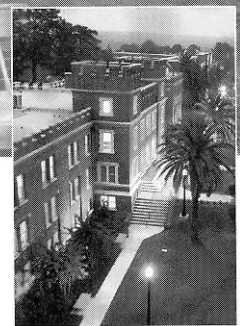
Students also have the opportunity to conduct research in specialized interdisciplinary centers, such as the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory, the Institute of Molecular Biophysics and the School of Computational Science; to participate in interdisciplinary work across campus, such as efforts that integrate economics, geography, climate forecasting, law and other environmental courses and programs; and to work with faculty to forge new relationships among professions, including medicine, the physical sciences, engineering, business and law.

Students at Florida State are encouraged to participate in international education through the university's programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, France, Panama, China, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Germany, Ireland and the Caribbean. The university's study sites in Valencia, Spain; Florence, Italy; London, England; and the Republic of Panama are considered by many to be among the nation's best.

Florida State's main campus is spread over 450.5 acres in Tallahassee. Within the state, the university maintains facilities in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. In addition, the Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State also operates the Ringling Center for the Cultural Arts in Sarasota, which includes the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art, the largest museum/university complex in the nation.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.7 million book titles and 9.1 million microforms. The university's library holdings rank among the top 30 public research universities in the United States, according to 2003-2004 data. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. Florida State also maintains science, music, library and information science, medicine, engineering and law libraries, as well as the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library, which houses the papers, photographs, audio recordings, video recordings and memorabilia of the longtime congressman from Florida. Library materials and services also are available at the university's Panama City campus, as well as at the international study centers, and a collection of art and related materials is on display at the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art in Sarasota. Collectively, the Florida State libraries are a member of the Association of Research Libraries, an association of the top research university libraries in the United States.

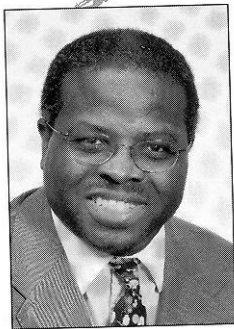

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY COMPLIANCE OFFICE

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce you to some of the rules governing NCAA athletics.

Key Definitions You Should Know

Representative of Athletics Interests: A representative of the institution's athletics interests (AKA Booster) is an individual who is known (or should have been known) by a member of the institution's athletic department to:

- Have participated in or to be a member of an agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics program;
- Have made financial contributions to the athletics department or to an athletics booster organization of that institution;
- Be assisting or to have been requested (by the athletics department staff) to assist in the recruitment of prospects;
- Be assisting or to have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families; or
- Have been otherwise promoting the institution's athletics program.

Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete ("prospect") is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, regardless of whether he or she participates in athletics. A prospective student-athlete maintains his or her identity as a prospect, even after he or she signs a National Letter of Intent or financial aid agreement, until he or she attends the first day of practice or participates in an official team practice, whichever is earlier.

Contact: A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parents, relatives or legal guardian(s) and an institutional staff member during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. In the sport of golf, a coach can contact you once in the month of April at your school and three more times after July 1 before your senior year in high school.

Evaluation: An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

Phone Calls and Letters

During the month of March during your junior year in high school, a coach may make one phone call to you. After that, phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1, before your senior year in high school. A coach or faculty member is limited to one phone call per week except that unlimited phone calls may be made:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university.
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you.

- During the time beginning with the National Letter of Intent signing date through the two days after the signing date and after a National Letter of Intent or scholarship agreement is signed.

A prospect of any age could receive the following from a coach

- Questionnaire
- Camp brochure
- NCAA educational information

After September 1 of a prospect's junior year, a coach could provide

- Written correspondence, including letters, e-mails, instant messages and text messages
- Game programs (only on an official or unofficial visit)
- Media Guide
- Official academic, admission and student services publications and videotapes produced by the institution and are available to all students
- Any other information may be provided via the institution's Web site.

Who is Permitted to Recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletic programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office.

New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the N.O.L.E.S. program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal and career development and community service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the N.O.L.E.S. program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided with opportunities to focus on personal growth such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college is a major focus of the N.O.L.E.S. program. The program is designed to work in cooperation with Florida State's career center to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of the Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication skills and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community. During the 2004-05 academic year, Seminole student-athletes donated nearly 4,500 hours of community service activities.



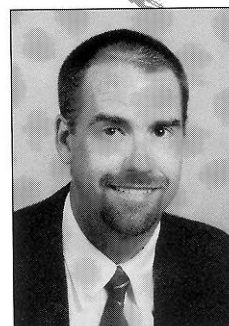
Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. One of the foundations of building leaders is the Athletic Ambassadors program. The Athletic Ambassadors have the opportunity to attend seminars and listen and learn from outstanding guest speakers. They learn skills that will not only benefit them as students and as athletes, but as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole Banquet and plans many events including orientation for incoming student-athletes and the annual Back-to-School picnic.

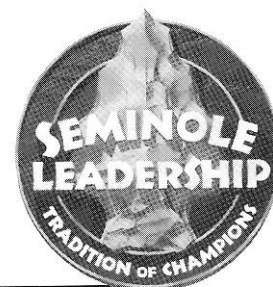

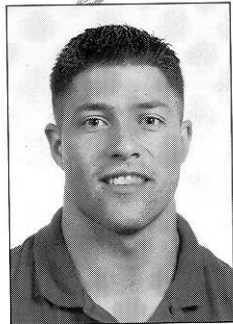

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a preconditioning program before the season gets under way. The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

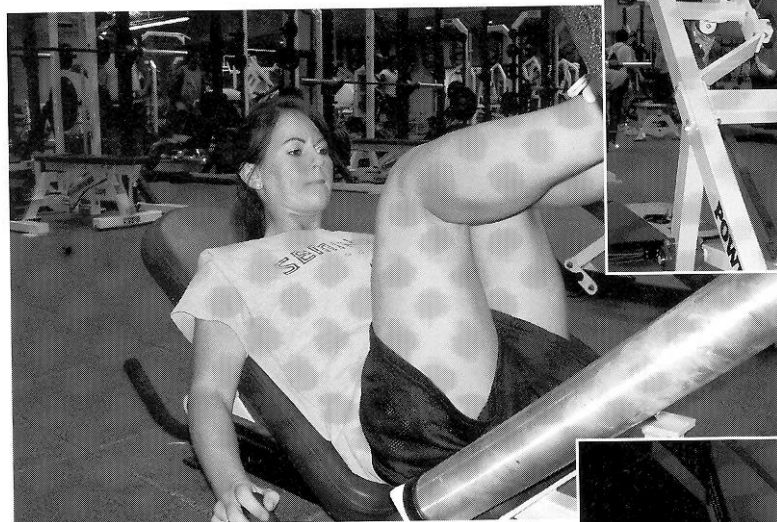
Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.

Graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach Josh Hingst works directly with the women's golf team.

Hingst comes from the University of Nebraska where he served as a student assistant for three years, graduate assistant for one year and fulfilled duties as the swimming Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach and Director of Performance Nutrition for six months. While at Nebraska he worked with football, men's and women's basketball, swimming and diving and tennis.

Hingst attended the University of Nebraska where he graduated earning a bachelor's degree in the fields of exercise science and nutritional sciences and dietetics. He became a full-time member of the Seminole Strength and Conditioning staff in 2003. Hingst earned his master's degree in clinical nutrition with an emphasis in sport nutrition in 2004 at Florida State.

Hingst is a certified strength coach through both the National Strength and Conditioning Association and the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association. He is also a United States Weightlifting certified club coach.



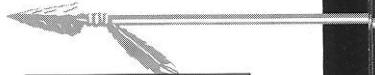
The Seminole women's golfers follow a strength program designed specifically for each member of the team at Florida State.

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SUPPORT

An overview of an Award Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, an outstanding support program has been developed that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Florida State Athletic Academic Support program director Mark Meleney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist student-athletes in the transition into college and provide continuous support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Florida State's program operates on a "proactive" rather than a "reactive" approach. The academic staff does not wait around for a crisis to occur. They gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. They also stay informed on the daily progress of the student-athletes through constant communication with the Florida State faculty.

In the summer of 2004, the Academic Support Unit moved into its new home, a state-of-the-art facility in the newly constructed Moore Athletic Center. The multi-million-dollar structure, which is located in the north end zone of Doak Campbell Stadium, is the new home of Florida State athletics. Some of the features in the new academic support area include a 32-station computer lab for student-athletes, 10 private tutorial rooms and a five-station "Learning Center" for student-athletes with learning deficiencies and/or disabilities. The compliance, student services, business, sports information and athletics marketing offices are also housed in the facility, providing a more efficient and functional department, thus allowing student-athletes an opportunity for balanced and improved time management.

The academic support staff is comprised of a director, associate director, administrative assistant, six academic counselors, two learning specialists, several graduate assistants and approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Meleney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings over 20 years of advising experience to the position. Over the last nine years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from *Athletic Management Magazine*.

Tutor and Mentor Program

The department of athletics at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing the student-athlete with one of the

finest and most comprehensive tutorial and mentor programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as the progress towards their ultimate goal of earning a college degree. Florida State hires approximately 50 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. In addition, mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. They are responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation and communication with faculty.

Academic Honors and Awards

Florida State University student-athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More than \$350,000 in Postgraduate Scholarship monies have been granted to Florida State student-athletes over the past 10 years, as well as numerous other academic honors and awards.

Florida State named 169 student-athletes to the 2005 Atlantic Coast Conference Honor Roll. In the 2004-05 academic year alone, Florida State boasted three ACC Weaver James Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship winners, three National Academic All-Americans, two Arthur Ashe, Jr., Sports Scholar Award Winners, two District Academic All-Americans and one NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship finalist.

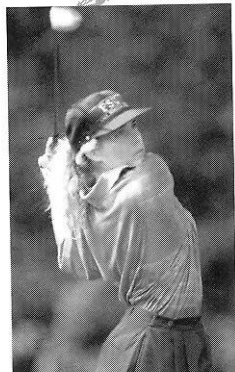

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE WOMEN'S GOLF

The Seminole women's golf program has a long tradition of success. Since the spring of 1990, the Seminoles have won 11 team championships – an average of nearly one a year. Equally as impressive is the more than 70 top-five individual finishes the squad has compiled in just over 100 tournaments.

Florida State won the championship at the Ann Rhoads/University of Alabama Intercollegiate during the fall of 2003. The Seminoles claimed the championship of the Ryder/Florida Championship during the Spring of 2003. During the event, All-American Kristin Tamulis finished first in the individual standings to mark her first of two career individual wins.

Many Seminole golfers have made their mark on the Seminole record book during their careers. Led by two-time All-ACC selection Karen Stupples, who won two individual tournament championships during her career, a total of seven Florida State golfers

have earned individual medalist honors at nine different tournaments. Stupples earned All-America second-team honors in 1995.

Since the beginning of the 1990 season, 20 Seminole golfers have posted top-five individual finishes. Current Seminole assistant coach Amy Bond, who completed her career in 1999, captured medalist honors at the Ryder/Florida Championship and led Florida State to the team title in the event. Bond earned All-ACC honors that season. Tamulis finished second at the Ryder/Florida Championship in leading the Seminoles to the team title in 2002.

Florida State has played in the NCAA Regionals in each of the last four seasons and made eight NCAA appearances from 1991-99 including seven straight from 1991-

97. Florida State played in the NCAA Tournament and made eight regional appearances during the decade of the 1990's.

1981 National Championship Team

The Florida State women's golf team won the 1981 A.I.A.W. National Championship with a three-stroke victory over the University of Georgia. The Seminoles finished the tournament with a 1,220 four-round score to best the Lady Bulldogs who finished the event with a 1,223 score.

Florida State entered the final round of the championship with a one-stroke lead over Georgia but had to rally to win the event. The Seminoles stumbled on the front nine during the final day and fell behind by a mere two strokes. The turn, however, proved to be Florida State's turn of fortune as four of the five Seminole golfers birdied the 17th hole and Florida State was on its way to its first national championship.

The Seminoles' national championship team featured three of the top all-time golfers in Florida State history. Lisa Young, Florida State's finisher during the 1981 national championship, earned All-America honors that season along with Michele Guibault. Barb Bunkowsky, who earned All-America honors in 1982, finished 14th in the national championship field as she birdied the final five

holes of event to help lead the Seminoles to the title.

Seminole Golf Hall of Fame

In order to qualify as a member of the Seminole Golf Hall of Fame, Seminole golfers must have either won a PGA or LPGA event, won an NCAA individual championship or won a USGA amateur championship.



Jane Geddes played on Florida State's 1981 A.I.A.W. National Championship team and has been one of the top pros on the LPGA tour.

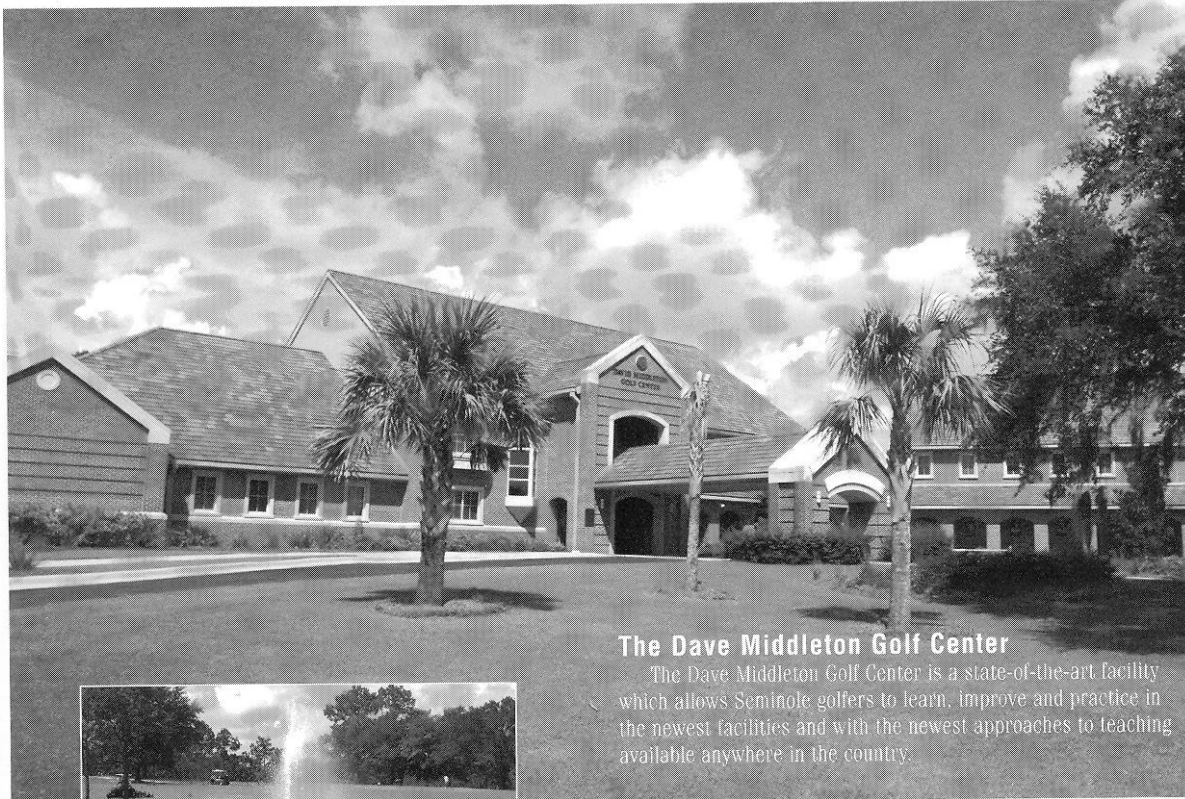

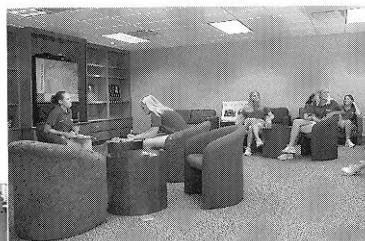
The Dave Middleton Golf Center

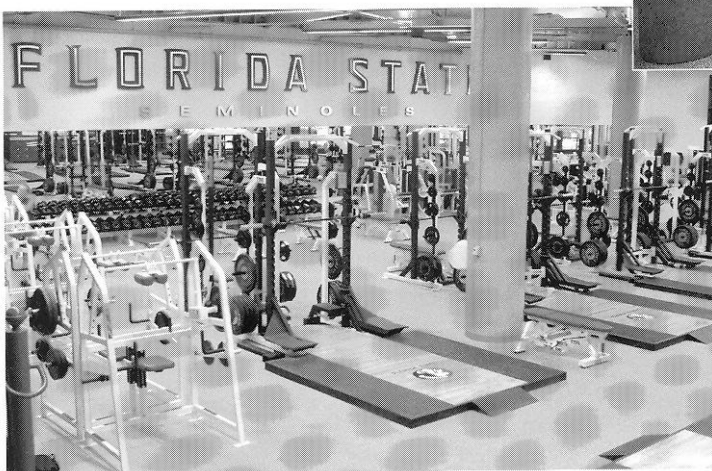


The Don A. Veller Seminole Golf Course

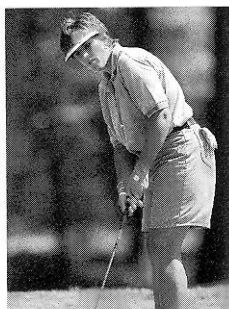


The Roger Holler Champions Training Complex

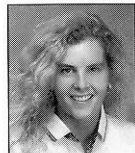

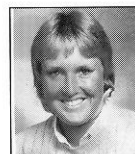

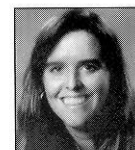

2005 ACC Women's Golf

The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in women's golf. Each of the seven teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and together form the top women's golf conference in the nation.

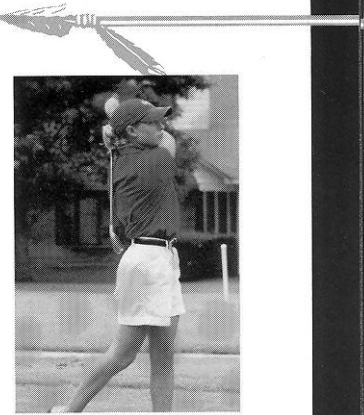
Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. Florida State has been one of the most successful women's golf teams in the league since their arrival. The Seminoles have finished second in the league championship three times (1992, 1995 and 1999) and finished third in 2001. Debbie Dillman was named the ACC Coach of the Year in 1992.

Florida State is one of four ACC teams to have participated in the NCAA Championship in two of the last three years. The Seminoles finished 19th in the nation during the 2004 season.

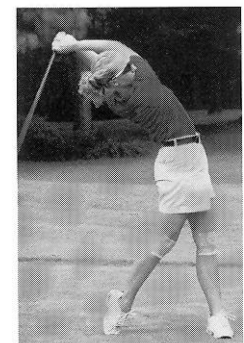
Jaclyn Burch finished in a tie for 10th place and led the Seminole women's golf team to a sixth place finish at the 17th annual Atlantic Coast Conference Championship at the Carmel Country Club in 2005. Burch's finish marked the fifth consecutive season a Seminole has finished in the top 10 of the individual standings at the conference championship. Burch shot a two-over par 74 in the final round to earn her first career top 10 finish.

No. 1 ranked Duke won its 10th consecutive ACC Championship as it outdistanced the field by an incredible 47 strokes. The Blue Devils led the event wire-to-wire. Brittany Lang won the individual championship as she led four Blue Devils in the top four individual spots as she closed the championship with a two-under par 70. It was only the second sub par round of the event. It marked the second consecutive season Lang has won the ACC individual championship.

Burch led four Seminole players who finished in the top 30 of the individual standings as she played her best tournament of the spring season. She was nearly flawless during the round as she earned par scores on 16 of 18 holes and bogied only two holes. Burch played the final two rounds of the event at a combined six over par after finishing the first round at nine-over par. Freshman Whitney Wright (Rockingham, N.C.) earned her second consecutive top-20 individual finish with a five-over par 77 in the final round for a 237 total. She played the final nine holes of the tournament at one-under par. Wright played three of her last six rounds with scores of 75 or better and finished in a tie for fifth (Ryder/Florida Championship) and in 16th (ACC Championship) in the individual standings of her last two events.



Katie Quinney earned All-ACC honors in 2004 as the Seminoles finished in fifth in the ACC Championship.



Kristin Tamulis is the only three-time All-ACC honoree in Florida State history. She earned the honor in 2001, 2002 and 2003.

Burch Named to All-ACC Women's Golf Team

Jaclyn Burch, who led the Seminoles in stroke average in 2005, was named to the All-ACC women's golf team in a vote by the league's eight head coaches. Burch led the Seminoles to six top-10 team finishes and averaged a career-best 76.78 strokes in nine events during the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons. Her selection marks the eighth time a Seminole golfer has earned All-ACC honors

in the last six years. In earning all-conference honors for the first time during her career, Burch became only the third sophomore in school history to earn All-ACC honors joining current teammate Caroline Larsson (2004) and former Florida State All-America Kristin Tamulis (2001) as second-year Seminoles who have earned the honor. Burch is the ninth player in school history to earn All-ACC honors. Beginning with Erica Firnhaber in 1992, nine Seminoles have earned All-ACC honors 11 times. Tamulis, who is currently playing on the LPGA Tour, earned the honor three times and is the only Seminole to earn the honor more than twice. Former Seminole Karen Stupples, who won the 2004 Women's British Open, earned All-ACC honors twice during her Florida State career.

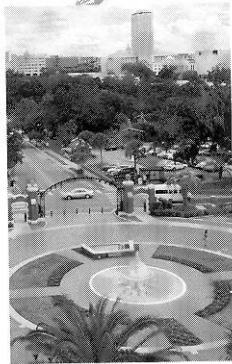

The Don Veller Seminole Golf course was redesigned in 2004 and is home to the Seminoles' practice greens, training center and clubhouse.

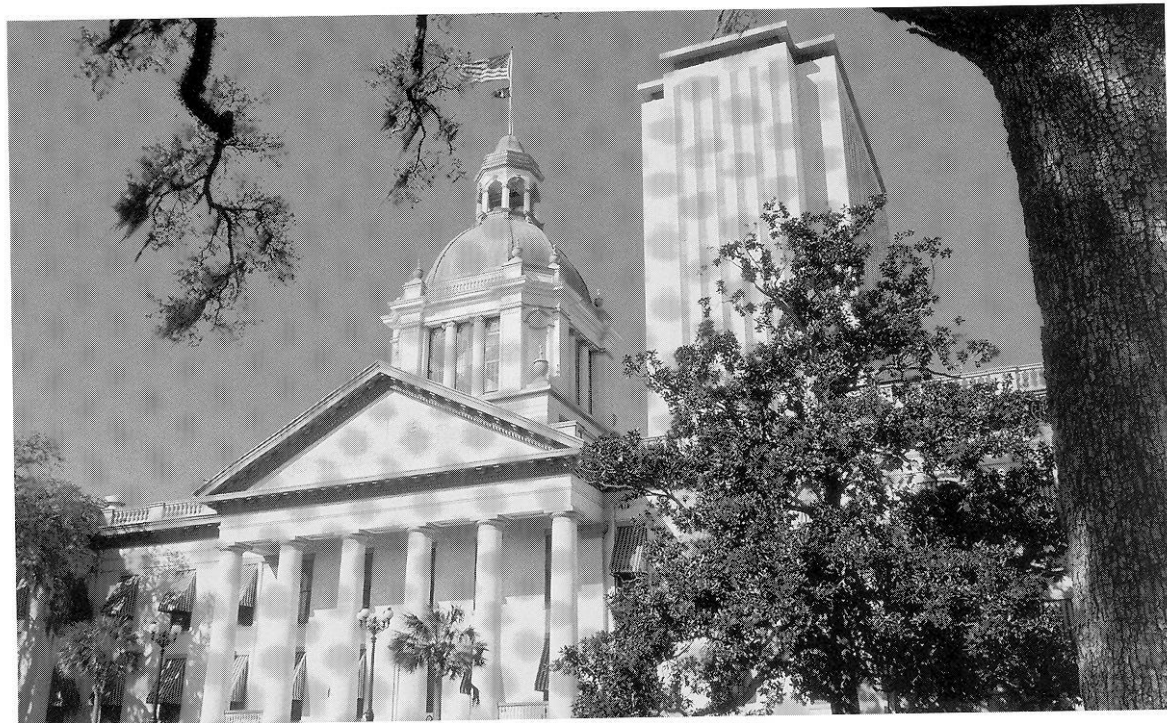

The fairways vary from tree lined to open, the greens are fast and a lake comes into play which challenges each player on each hole.

This Is Tallahassee



Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations and nearby beaches.

Among low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts, and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State – Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a genteel Southern belle with good manners, old plantation homes and y'all-come hospitality – a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The

Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out – one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other

by boat from Pensacola – to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" – derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

The New Capitol building rises at the center of Tallahassee's downtown as a sleek modern structure, juxtaposed next to the Old Capitol, built in the more classic domed style. A gallery atop the 22-story New Capitol provides a sweeping view of the hilly city and its tree-lined streets. From it, you can see all the way to Georgia, less than 20 miles away.

Around the capitol complex, a 10-block historic district spreads, preserving the town's gracious old homes along a linear park and holding an historic inn, bars and restaurants patronized by Senators and sophomores alike. With no shortage of culture, downtown also offers museums, theater and art galleries. Artists have turned the old warehouses of the Downtown Industrial Park into the studios and cafes of Railroad Square. The Museum of Florida History, nearby, is highly acclaimed for its scan of the state's past, and the Mary Brogan Museum of Art and Science, along with changing art exhibits, brings to a kid's level hands-on exhibits. Other sightseeing favorites include the Floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens, Bradley's Country Store, FAMU Black Archives and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum.



Tallahassee is famous for its "canopy roads," streets and thoroughfares lined with 200-year-old oaks draped with Spanish moss.



The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century street cars carry passengers to antebellum mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights.

Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and non-stop entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation – from canoeing down dark, cypress-lined rivers and biking up steep slopes to exploring backcountry wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf – just 30 minutes away – offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones." Local wildlife areas, such as the

St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

For another favorite "sport" – shopping – two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of "playing options," from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to five-star. Local specialties include homemade country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy, accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfasts, rustic "gentlemen" lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. The debut of Southwood, which held its grand opening in 2002, gives Tallahassee a course it can call excellent. The Southwood Golf Course is the keystone to a 3,200-acre development located on the eastern edge of Tallahassee. Designed by the team of Fred Couples and Gene Bates, the course is on an uncommon piece of land which is a picnic setting of trees broken by soft slopes and cozy coves. The course itself is located over 175 acres and was created within a design that gracefully captures to the genteel feel of the land. The holes play before the various scenes of a former plantation, moving from a jaunt around a wetland area through a thicket of pine trees in into an open meadow. The trademarks of the course are the magnificent oak trees that stud the landscape. The topography speaks loudly of the untapped potential of golf in Tallahassee.

Golf Magazine named it one of the best courses in the nation to open in 2002. Couples said it has the potential to be a "premier course in the Southeast."

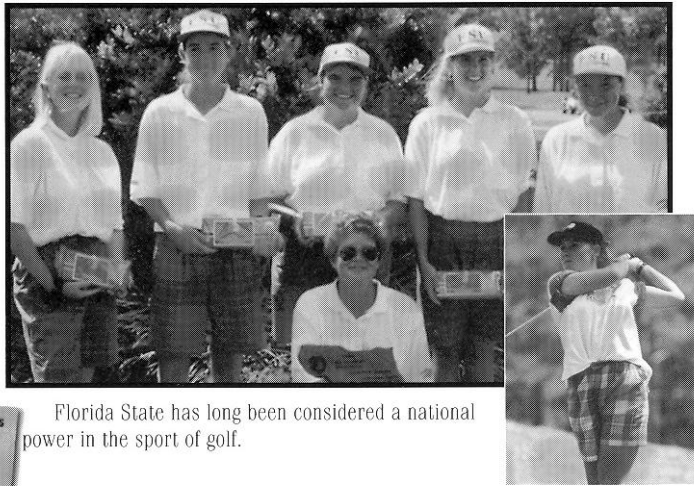

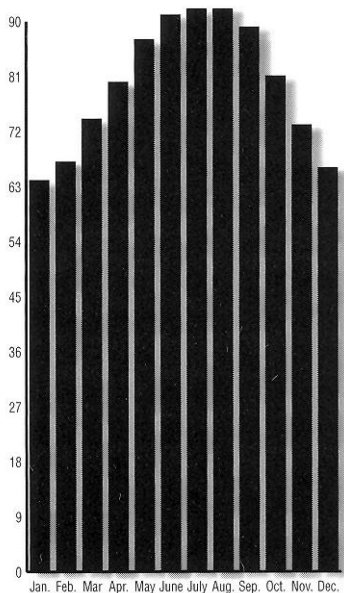

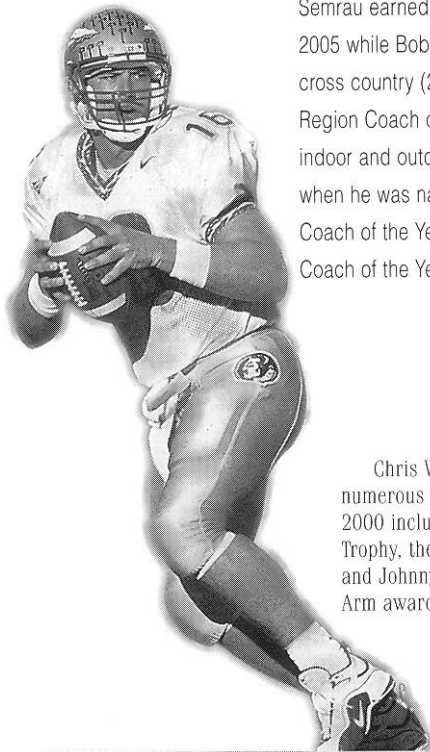

Coaching Excellence

When it comes to legendary head coaches, its hard to argue anyone has been as fortunate. The Seminoles have three head coaches who have established records that rank them with the greatest coaches ever to roam an NCAA sideline.

Florida State is the only NCAA school with three coaches in the top 10 for all-time victories in their respective sports and in the top five in wins and winning percentage among active coaches. Bobby Bowden (football), JoAnne Graff (softball) and Mike Martin (baseball) have combined for 3,035 victories. Each coach appears in the top two for active winning percentage, active wins of all-time victories.

The caliber of coaches at Florida State is second to none and year after year, these coaches are recognized for excellence nationally, regionally and at the conference level. Sue Semrau earned the second ACC Coach of the Year award in 2005 while Bob Braman was recognized for his stellar year in cross country (2004 NCAA South Region Coach of the Year) and both indoor and outdoor track and field when he was named the ACC Coach of the Year as well as region Coach of the Year in both sports.



Chris Weinke won numerous national awards in 2000 including the Heisman Trophy, the Davey O' Brian and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm awards.

In The Community...

Seminole student-athletes are committed to making a positive impact on the community, serving almost 4,500 hours of community service during the 2004-05 school year. They also helped raise thousands of dollars in direct support to charities.

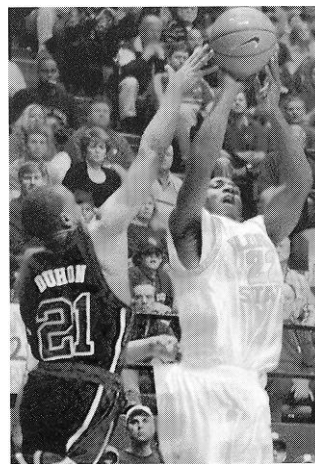
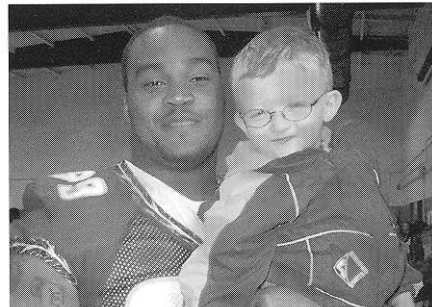
FSU student-athletes have volunteered their time working with students from every elementary and middle school in Leon County as well as schools in nearby Wakulla and Gadsden Counties. In addition, the Seminoles have participated in projects such as Habitat for Humanity, Relay for Life and Special Olympics, just to name a few.

Postgraduate Scholarships...

Florida State student-athletes have earned over \$300,000 in post-graduate scholarships over the past 10 years. They have also received 21 post-graduate scholarships from the ACC since 1992.

In 1996, Seminole Daryl Bush was the first ever recipient of the State Farm National Scholar Athlete of the Year award, now given annually.

Florida State boasts two NACDA Post-Graduate Award winners in the last five years. The scholarship, which was originated in 2001, grants \$10,000 scholarships to its recipients.

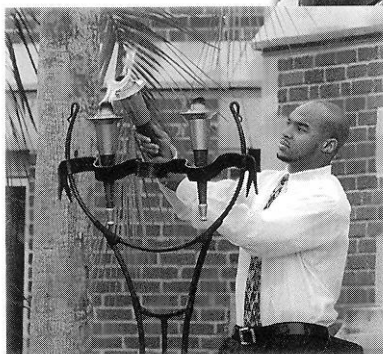
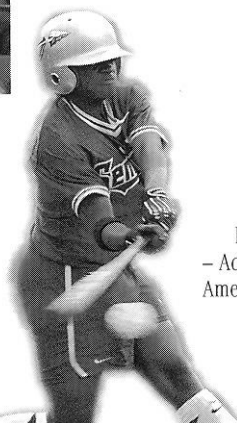

In The Classroom...

At the conclusion of the 2004-05 school year, five of Florida State's athletic teams had a 3.0 or better cumulative grade point average. In the spring, 2005 semester, 177 Seminoles achieved a minimum 3.0 semester grade point average while the average team semester GPA was a 2.813.

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has had six National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame National Scholar Athlete Award winners – more than all other ACC schools combined and a figures that ranks nationally in the past 12 years.

In 2001, former Seminole Chris Weinke was the recipient of the first ever ACC Scholar Award which is given annually to an excellent athlete and top scholar. Football's Chris Hope and baseball's Matt Lynch (2003) have also earned the distinction.

Florida State had three student-athletes garner national Academic All-American honors in 2005 when softball junior Natasha Jacob and track and field sophomores Garrett Johnson and Tom Lancashire earned such status. It marked the first time that three FSU student-athletes earned the honor in the same season.

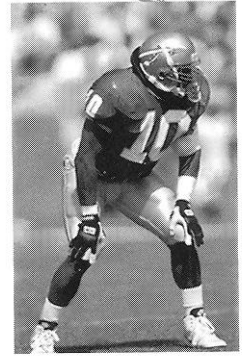
Florida State has more all-time ACC Academic Honor Roll selections (2,014) than All-ACC honorees (1,612). On top of that number, FSU athletes have been named

National Academic All-Americans 26 times and 24 Florida State student-athletes have received post graduate scholarships.

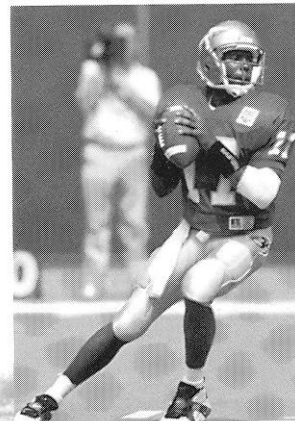
Top Athletes...

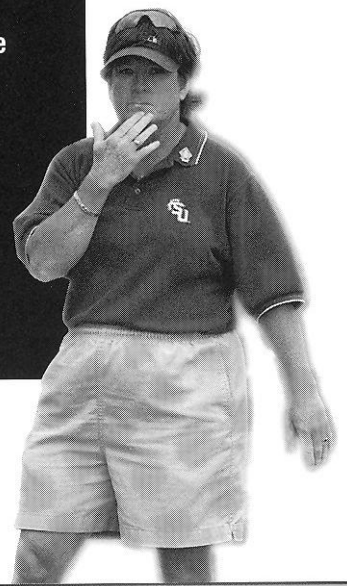

Top Teams...

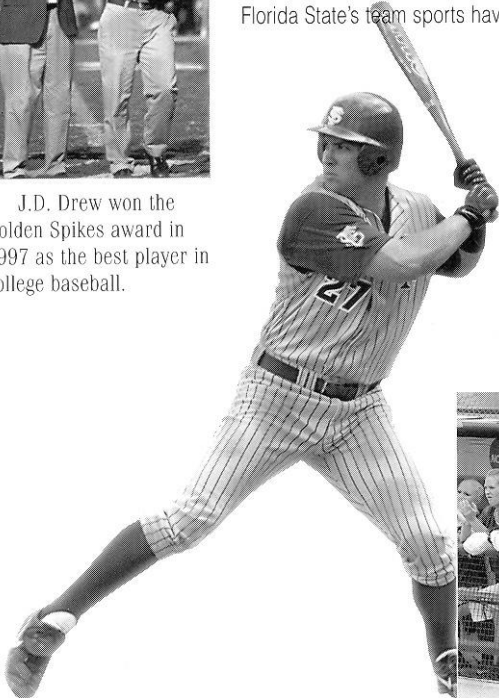

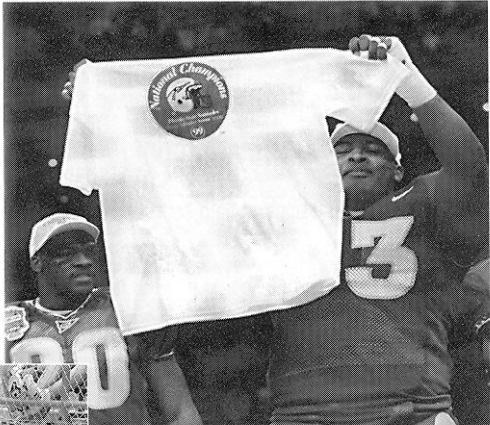

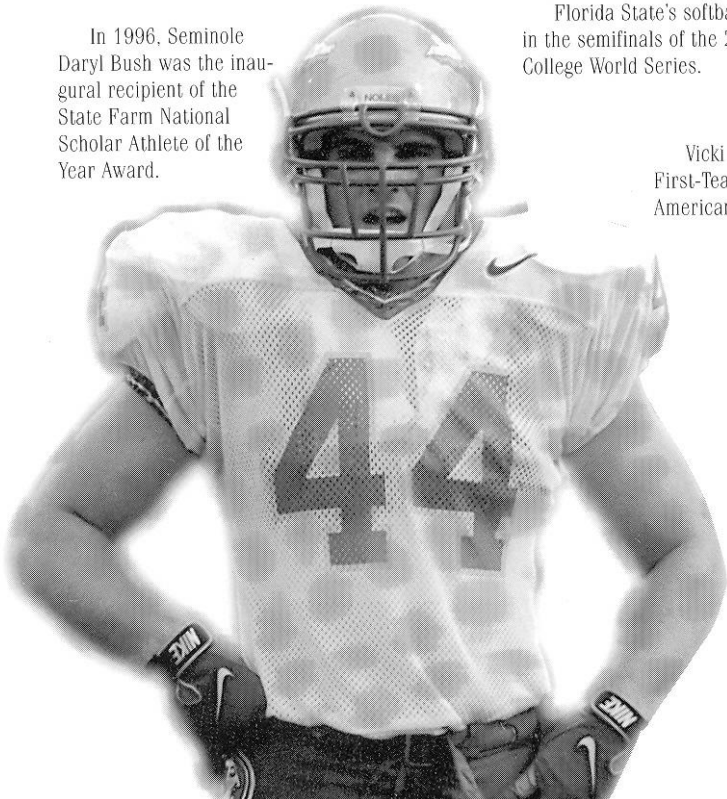

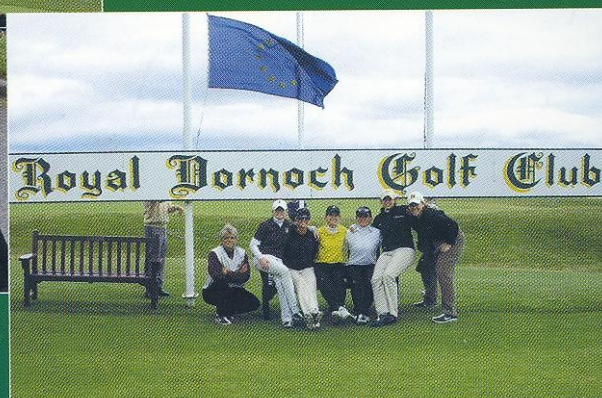
