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THIS IS FLORIDA STATE WOMEN'S GOLF

Florida State University is an elite, research intensive, public institution and one of the two original preeminent universities in Florida. Located in Tallahassee, Florida's capital city, the university affords students and faculty opportunities for interaction with state and federal agencies for internships, research and part-time employment, as well as numerous social, cultural and recreational activities. FSU's welcoming campus is located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, in a community that fosters free inquiry and embraces diversity.

BEGINNINGS

Florida State was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851. The institution first offered instruction at the postsecondary level in 1857 and is the longest continuous site of higher education in Florida. In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College. In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women. In 1947, the school returned to coeducational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University.

41,900 & COUNTING

In 1946, there were 2,583 students enrolled. In 2017, enrollment stood at 41,900. Of that number, 78 percent were undergraduates, 19 percent were graduate students and 3 percent were unclassified; 81.3 percent were in-state students; 94 percent were from the United States; students hailed from all 50 states and the District of Columbia; 18 states contributed 100 or more students each; 20 foreign countries contributed 30 or more students each; 55.7 percent were female and 44.3 percent were male; 32.7 percent were minorities and 5.5 percent were international students.

LAY OF THE LAND

The university's main campus encompasses 476 acres in Tallahassee, Leon County; the Panama City Campus has 25.6 acres in Panama City, Bay County. The university owns more than 1,650 acres in Leon, Bay, Collier, Franklin, Sarasota and Gadsden counties. In addition, sites are leased in various counties in Florida and other locations overseas.

WEALTH OF OPPORTUNITY

With 18 colleges and The Graduate School, students may take courses of study leading to a baccalaureate degree in 220 fields in 104 degree programs, to a master's or advanced master's degree in 115 degree programs in 220 fields, to a specialist degree in 13 degree programs, to a doctoral degree in 72 degree programs, as well as to a professional degree in two degree programs. The academic divisions are the Colleges of Applied Studies; Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication and Information; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education; Engineering; Entrepreneurship; Fine Arts; Hospitality; Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; Motion Picture Arts; Music;











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NICKLAUS TO REMODEL FSU GOLF COURSE

Spearheaded by Jack Nicklaus II, the course will be the first of "Legacy" designs and features support from the Nicklaus Company. Nicklaus II has created about 35 of his own designs along with 18 co-designs with his father.

Nicklaus Design is responsible for more than 400 golf courses throughout the world, 300 of which have been designed by Jack Nicklaus himself.

"The two of us are very thrilled to give Florida State something very special," Nicklaus II said. "It's an honor to be here and I am very confident we can deliver a great golf course."

Both men walked throughout the course in an attempt to potentially re-route the course. Nicklaus II mentioned that he will return at a later date to finish the re-routing plans.

"We found a nice golf course but I want to get a better golf course."

Nicklaus furthered this, mentioning that the course required more balance and that there are too many uphill shots.

"Golf is a more pleasant game played downhill because when you play uphill, you're blinded. We want to make as many really good golf holes as we can."

The Nicklaus family carries a storied history with FSU and this highlights one of the reasons that they took on this project. Nicklaus has had one child and five grandchildren attend the school and is excited to give back to the university.

"Florida State is a great university and we are very honored to be a part of this, Nicklaus said." Because of our family ties, it was a project we really wanted to get involved in."


The Seminoles Golf Course was initially opened in 1962 and has witnessed a fair amount of change since its inception. FSU has repeatedly invested in updates to its facilities throughout the years.

"We are shooting to have the golf course open during the fall of 2019," Nicklaus II said. "So in order to accomplish that we want to begin this fall."

The Nicklaus family has its sights set on creating a spectacular course and mentioned the caliber they want it to achieve.

"I think that (coaches) Trey and Amy's goal is to have a golf course that the NCAA is just going to say, 'Wow. We want to be able to hold a golf tournament there.'

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SOYEARS OF WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS



While women's athletics had held a rich tradition in Tallahassee since the early 1900's when Florida State was the Florida State College for Women, the 2018-19 season marks the 50th Anniversary of a continuous women's intercollegiate program at FSU.

Since volleyball took the floor in 1968 as the first-ever women's intercollegiate sport for the Seminoles, FSU has been a national leader in promoting and supporting women's athletics.

Florida State has won seven national championships over the last 50 years. Softball earned back-to-back AIAW (Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women the precursor to the NCAA) national titles in 1984-85 and captured the 2018 NCAA Title just months ago. Golf won the AIAW national title in 1981, and track & field the NCAA National Championship at the 1984 outdoor meet and 1985 indoors. Soccer won the 2014 NCAA National Championship.





ANY BOND HEAD COACH



In her first eight seasons as Florida State's head coach, Amy Bond has developed one of the most competitive programs in the country – one that is consistently competing for conference and national honors. She continues to build her program on the strength of bringing the best players into her program and teaching them to be winners on the collegiate level. Bond's goals are to win team national championships as she produces outstanding players – players who can be successful on the professional levels after they have left their marks as college players at Florida State.

Bond, the 2017 ACC Coach of the Year, has led the Seminoles to a school record three consecutive appearances in the NCAA Championship Finals and to eight straight NCAA Tournament appearances. Her teams have recorded the top six single season scoring averages in school history including a school-record 288.1 team average during the 2016-17 season when the Seminoles won a school-record six events and led the ACC in stroke average. The Seminoles have ranked in the top four in the ACC in stroke average in each of the last four seasons.

Under Bond, the Seminoles have finished in the top-20 in the NCAA Championship Finals in each of the last three seasons including a tied for 12th place finish in 2018 – the second best national finish in school history. The Seminoles have finished in second place in the NCAA Regional Championships twice in the last three seasons (at Shoal Creek in 2016 and at Tallahassee in 2018) and have finished as the ACC runners-up twice since 2017 (2018 and 2018).

Individually, Bond has mentored 15 of the top 16 golfers in school history. She recruited and coached two-time All-American Matilda Castren -- the Seminoles' all-time stroke average leader as well as two-time All-American Morgane Metraux who is ranked among the top five golfers in school history. Bond is currently coaching Amanda Doherty, who is the second ranked golfer in school history.

Bond, who grew up in a family of coaches, led Florida State the one of the greatest seasons in school history in 2017.

The Seminoles were ranked No. 1 in the nation, won six tournament championships, had four players named to the All-ACC team, led the nation in scoring average vs. par, led the nation in par 5 scoring in route to Bond being named the ACC Coach of the Year. Florida State won an unprecedented six tournaments to tie for the national lead. Never before had any team in Florida State history won more than five events in a single season. Florida State took over the nation's No 1 ranking after winning the Jim West Challenge and the Cardinal Cup during the fall season. The Seminoles then earned the highest NCAA regional seed in school history (No. 2), and finished in third place in the NCAA Columbus Regional Championship before earning their second consecutive top-20 finish at the NCAA National Championship Finals.

During her first eight seasons as Florida State's Head Women's Golf Coach, Bond has coached seven All-Americans, two NCAA Regional Champions, 16 All-ACC selections, 23 All-ACC Academic Honor Roll selections with 57 academic honors, 17 players who have been named to the All-ACC Academic team and eight who have been named Academic All-Americans.

In her eight seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have played in eight NCAA Championship tournaments, produced the school's first two NCAA Regional Champions (Maria Salinas in 2012 and Matilda Castren in 2016), earned seven All-American honors (Matilda Castren in 2014 and 2017, Salinas in 2011 and 2013, Morgane Metraux in 2017 and 2018 and Amanda Doherty in 2018), earned 16 All-ACC selections (Salinas in 2011 and 2012, Jessica Negron in 2013, Castren in 2014, 2016 and 2017, Alex Milan in 2014, Lydia Gumm in 2015 and 2017, Kim Metraux in 2016 and 2017, Morgane Metraux in 2017 and 2018) and Doherty in 2018) and have had 23 players earn All-ACC Academic honors.

As the Seminoles' head coach, she has led Florida State to eight consecutive NCAA Championship Tournament appearances – a streak that brings the program's current school-record streak to 12 consecutive NCAA appearances entering the 2018-19 season.

With her student-athlete first approach, her love of the game of golf, her unbridled love for Florida State University and her ability to recruit top-level talent, Bond constantly works to take the Seminole Women's Golf Program to a higher level. That higher level is in the classroom, with her relationships with her players, and Florida State's success on the golf course have all allowed her program to become recognized as one of the top all-around programs in all of college golf.

The Seminole Women's Golf Team is recognized as a star among stars as Florida State is annually celebrated as one of the top athletic programs in the nation. Florida State has finished in the top 25 in the Director's Cup in each of the last nine years.

As a player, Bond earned a spot on the ACC's 50th Anniversary team. As an assistant coach, she helped the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances. As Florida State's head coach, she has led the Seminoles to eight NCAA Championship appearances. She earned all-region honors in 1999 as she finished in a tied for 11th place at the NCAA East Regional Championship.

Throughout her playing career at Florida State, she played as one of the Seminoles' top players (she was named Florida State's team MVP in 1997, 1998 and 1999), played with a number of touring professionals (including LPGA major winner and current Golf Channel analyst Karen Stupples) and has coached many of Florida State's recent greats including the only four-time golf All-American in school history (Caroline Westrup). While achieving success during her career as a player and a coach, Bond has never lost sight of her ultimate goal: the success and achievements of her student-athletes.

In her 13 seasons as a Seminole coach (five as an assistant and eight as the head coach), every student-athlete who has played golf at Florida State has earned her bachelor's degree and every one played on at least two NCAA Tournament teams during their careers. The Seminoles are among the NCAA leaders with a perfect APR rating during Bond's eight seasons as Florida State's head coach.

FLORIDA STATE IS HOME FOR BOND

Amy Bond joined the long and illustrious list of Florida State alumni who have returned to coach their alma mater when she was named the Seminoles' head coach on June 25, 2010. She returned to her Seminole roots after an outstanding playing career at Florida State (1994-99) during which she finished in 30th place in the 1999 NCAA Championship Finals and a five-year career as an assistant coach (2001-06). Bond is one of three Florida State University alumni who are current head coaches at their alma mater joining Jennifer Hyde (Women's Tennis) and Mike Martin (Baseball).

AS THE HEAD COACH AT FLORIDA STATE

Florida State Head Coach Amy Bond has guided each of her first eight Seminole teams to the NCAA Championships. Including her four years as a Seminole player (1994-99), her five years as a Seminole assistant coach (2001-06) and eight as Florida State's head coach, Bond has participated in 16 of 17 NCAA Regional Championships while wearing the Garnet and Gold. The Seminoles will look to play in their school record 14th consecutive NCAA Championship Tournament in 2019.

BOND LED FLORIDA STATE TO A HISTORIC SEASON IN 2017

Florida State enjoyed one of the top seasons in school history in 2017 as it earned the nation's No. 1 ranking, won a school record six tournament championships, were the No. 2 seed at the NCAA Columbus Regional Championship and played in the NCAA Championships finals for the second consecutive season. The Seminoles led the ACC and finished second nationally with a school record stroke average. Individually, two different golfers won five different tournament championships, a school record four golfers were earned All-ACC honors and two earned All-American honors. Academically, each of Florida State's five starters were named to the All-ACC Academic Golf Team, all 12 members of the team were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and three players were named to the WGCA All-American Scholar Team. The Seminoles finished the 2016-17 season ranked No. 6 by GolfWeek and No. 11 by Golfstat.

FLORIDA STATE EARNED OUTSTANDING SUCCESS IN 2016

Florida State finished the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat, 24th nationally by Golfweek and finished 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals. The Seminoles finished in second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional, won team championships in the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finished in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, had two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Metraux) and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Kim Metraux). Academically, the Seminoles had each member of its team named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, saw four players named to the ACC All-Academic Women's Golf Team (Castren, Lydia Gumm, Kim and Morgane Metraux) and had two players (Kim and Morgane Metraux) named to the WGCA All-American Scholar Athlete team.

2014 WAS A SPECIAL SEASON AT FLORIDA STATE

Amy Bond led Florida State to its ninth consecutive NCAA Regional Championship, to the team championship at the Web.com/Marsh Landing Intercollegiate, had one player earn All-American honors (Matilda Castren), and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Alex Milan) in 2014. In earning All-ACC honors, Castren established a school record for low stroke average in a single season with her 71.83 scoring mark. Florida State's team victory at the Web.com/Marsh Landing Intercollegiate was the first team championship by the Seminoles since the 2010 season when it won the Bryan National Collegiate championship.

BOND AS A TOURNAMENT HOST

Bond's passion for growing the game of golf has increased her desire to plan and host largescale tournaments at Florida State. She hosted the NCAA East Regional Championship in 2014 and the NCAA Tallahassee Regional Championship in 2018. Both were 18-team events that showcased the best in women's collegiate golf. Bond has played host to six Florida State Match-Up Tournaments and will host a third Regional championship in May 2022 as she continues to attract high level competition to the city of Tallahassee on an annual basis.

SUCCESS AT PRINCETON

Bond was successful in her first head coaching position at Princeton (2006-10) as she guided the Tigers to eight tournament victories and top four finishes in four Ivy League championship tournaments. The Tigers finished in second place in the Ivy league championship in 2007. Bond coached Susannah Aboff to consecutive Ivy League individual championships in 2008 and 2009. It marked only the third time in league history that a player had won consecutive individual conference championships. Aboff earned All-Ivy League honors three times during her career in becoming just the second player in school history to be named to the all-league team three times in her career. During her four seasons at Princeton, only the Tigers and Harvard performed consistently well in the conference championship by finishing in the top four of the team championship from 2007-10.

RECRUITING SUCCESS AT FLORIDA STATE

During her tenure as the head coach at Florida State, she has continued the tradition of recruiting talented players and outstanding student-athletes to Tallahassee. The Seminoles' 2018 recruiting class (Caroline Hodge, Frida Kinhult, Puk Lyng Thomsen, Amelia Williamson, Beatrice Wallin) is not only considered to be the best class in school history, but it is among the top classes in the history of women's college golf. Her list of top recruits includes Matilda Castren, the Seminoles' all-time leading golfer for stroke average and individual wins, and five players who have been named WGCA Academic All-Americans Scholar Athlete team. Kim and Morgane Metraux, two of the top rising amateur players in the world, were also recruited by Bond to attend Florida State. In five years as an assistant coach at Florida State, Bond helped recruit five players who earned All-ACC honors a total of 12 times and formed the nucleus of two top 20 ranked teams. The Seminoles finished in a tie for 16th nationally in 2006 and in a tie for 19th nationally in 2004. She was also instrumental in recruiting Caroline Westrup - the only four-time All-American and four-time All-ACC selection in school history.

RECRUITING SUCCESS AT PRINCETON

During her four seasons at Princeton, Bond coached/recruited two players (Susannah Aboff and Kelly Shon) who qualified to play in at least one NCAA Regional Championship each and five players who earned All-Ivy League honors a total of 11 times. Aboff won eight individual tournament championships during her career and finished in a tie for 23rd place at the NCAA East Regional Championship in 2009 - the third highest NCAA regional finish in the history of the Princeton program. Shon played in the 2011 and 2012 US Women's Open and was ranked No. 4 nationally among junior golfers at the time she was recruited. She is still the highest ranked junior recruit to ever attend an Ivy League institution. Shon earned All-American Honorable Mention Honors from the Women's Golf Coaches' Association in 2013, played in the 2013 NCAA East Regional Championship and the 2013 NCAA National Championship, was named the Ivy League Golfer of the Year and won Ivy League Championship in 2013

PROFESSIONAL PLAYERS

Bond has recruited and coached eight players who have played, or who are currently playing professional golf. She coached Kristin Tamulis (Florida State) who is currently playing on the LPGA Tour. She also recruited and coached four-time All-American Caroline Westrup (Florida State) who played in the 2013 U.S. Open, three who are playing on the Symetra Tour (Lacey Agnew, Morgane Metraux and Alex Milan) and two who earned success on the Symetra Tour (Jaclyn Burch and Macarena Silva), one on the European Tour (Maria Salinas), one on the LET Access Tour and three players (Susannah Aboff, Marlowe Boukis and Michelle Grilli) who began their professional careers on the LPGA Symetra Tour.

SEMINOLES AT THE 2013 U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

Bond and the Seminoles were well represented at the 2013 U.S. Women's Open at Sebonack Golf Club with four of the top players in the history of the program – Karen Stupples, Kristin Tamulis, Macarena Silva and Caroline Westrup – all playing in the event. Prior to the event, Bond said of the one of the greats foursomes in program history: "This is a great week for each of the four players and for the Florida State women's golf program. To have four of our players in the U.S. Open in the same year is exciting and illustrates the rich tradition of our program. I am very happy for Karen, who I have known for so many years and for Kris, Maca and Caroline who I had the good fortune of coaching during their careers at Florida State. Playing in the U.S. Open is an awesome accomplishment for all of them and I couldn't be happier for all of them."

BOND ON THE NATIONAL SCENE

Bond, a past President of the Women's Golf Coaches Association, served as the President of the organization from 2013-16. He served as a past President from 2016-18. She has held a number of positions on the national governing board after serving the organization as its treasurer beginning in 2008. Bond began on the WGCA Board as its treasurer (2008-12), was as its vice president (2012-13) and then as its President (2013-16). The WGCA was formed in 1983 as an organization to promote participation in women's collegiate golf. The vision of WGCA since its inception has been to encourage the playing of intercollegiate golf for women in correlation with a general objective of education and in accordance with the highest tradition of intercollegiate competition.

ACADEMIC ACCOLADES

Academic success is the cornerstone of Florida State's program under Amy Bond. In 2016 (10), 2017 (12) and 2018 (eight), every member of the Seminole Women's Golf Team was named to the ACC Honor Roll, 13 players were named to the All-ACC Academic team and eight were named Academic All-Americans by the WGCA. The Women's Golf Team earned the highest grade point average of the Seminoles' 20 athletic teams in 2016 (3.591) and 2017 (3.616). The Seminoles' individual success has certainly translated into team success during Bond's head coaching tenure at Florida State. The Seminoles team was lauded by the NCAA for attaining a perfect multi-year Academic Performance Rate score of 1000 for the latest measuring period in 2016-17. The Florida State women's golf team has achieved a perfect APR in each of Bond's seasons as Florida State's head coach. Calculated over the four most recent years of data, the multi-year APR is a real-time measurement of eligibility and retention of student-athletes competing on every NCAA Division I sports team. Bond developed her academic achievement philosophy as a player at Florida State as she was named an Academic All-American in 1998 and 1999 and earned ACC Academic Honor Roll accolades three times during her playing career (1996, 98, 99). Bond's teams in both 2016 and 2017 were presented with the Golden Torch at Florida State's annual Black Tie student-athlete gala for the team with the highest GPA. Bond's 2015 team finished the spring semester with 12 players earning a 3.0 grade point average or higher. The women's golf team was the only team at Florida State to accomplish that feat during the spring 2015 academic semester.

TOP 50 PLAYER IN ACC HISTORY

Bond was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference 50th Anniversary team in 2002 along with Seminole greats Karen Stupples and Louise Wright. Bond was a 1998 All-ACC selection, as well. She earned 10 top-10 finishes during her career and was named the Seminoles' Most Valuable Player each year during her career. Bond competed in the NCAA Championship tournament in 1999 and played in three NCAA regional tournaments while finishing in the top 20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments. She was an All Region selection in 1999 and was the medalist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida State Championship tournament.

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAMPIONS

The Seminoles Women's Golf Team has won 13 of the last 17 Athletic Director's Cups for Service at Florida State's annual Golden Nole Banquet. The Athletic Director's Cup for Service is presented annually and is the most prestigious award given to the Seminole student-athletes. It goes to the team that contributes the most service hours to the community over the course of an entire year. The Seminoles won the Athletic Director's Cup for Service in each of Bond's five years as an assistant coach and in four of her first eight seasons as the Seminoles' head coach.

PERSONAL

An Ocala, Fla., native, Bond earned a Bachelor's Degree in Sport Management from Florida State in 1997 before earning her Master's Degree in Sport Administration from Florida State in 1999. Bond's twin brother, Tommy, is the Director of Athletics and head baseball coach at Trinity Catholic in Ocala, Fla. Tommy led Trinity Catholic to the 4A state championship in 2014.

ROBERT DUCK ASSISTANT COACH/DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT



Robert Duck, who has worked with the two greatest collegiate golfers in school history, and who has helped both the Seminoles' men's and women's golf teams reach the nation's No. 1 ranking, is in his eighth season as an assistant coach with both programs at Florida State University. His ability to teach the game of golf to the nation's top golfers has helped elevate Florida State's programs to rank among the nation's best in both sports.

Duck was one of six finalists for the Jan Strickland Award presented by TaylorMade and the Golf Coaches Association of America in 2018. The award is presented to the nation's most outstanding assistant coach in collegiate golf. The Strickland Award is presented to the NCAA Division I, II, III, NAIA or NJCAA assistant coach who has excelled in working with their student-athletes both on the course and in the classroom.

Under Ducks' tutelage, both Seminole teams have become perennial leaders in the national rankings and course statistics as well as in the production of All-Americans and All-ACC performers. He has helped raise the profiles of both programs to the levels necessary to compete as top collegiate programs on an annual basis.

Duck worked closely with Brooks Koepka – two-time U.S. Open Champion, 2018 PGA Champion and 2012 ACC Player of the Year – and Matilda Castren – the all-time career stroke leader for the Florida State women (72.52) – as he has helped develop the top golfers in program history. Duck has worked with eight of the top 10 scoring men and eight of the top 10 scoring women in school history. Koepka, who won the 2017 and 2018 U.S. Open titles, and who finished his Seminole career with a 71.84 stroke average, and Harry Ellis, the 2017 Amateur Champion, are among the players he has worked with during his Florida State career. Ellis completed his career at Florida State as a two-time AlL-ACC selection after playing as a member of the Great Britain and Ireland team in the 2017 Walker Cup.

Duck plays an integral role in the successes of both programs, including the men's national ranking of No. 1 in 2016 and the women's national ranking of No. 1 during the 2017 season. He has helped coach both programs into the NCAA Tournament in each of his first seven years while working with All-Americans and All-ACC honorees on both teams.

In his first seven seasons at Florida State, the men have produced nine All-Americans, 16 All-ACC selections, two ACC Golfers of the Year (Koepka in 2012 and Hank Lebioda in 2016) and three ACC Freshmen of the Year, while the women have produced six All-Americans and 13 All-ACC performers. Duck worked with a school-record four Seminole women who earned All-ACC honors in 2017.

During each of his seven seasons, the Seminole men and the Seminole women have appeared in the NCAA Tournament seven times each with the men finishing ninth in the team standings in the 2012 NCAA Championship finals and 11th in the 2015 NCAA Championship finals, and the women finishing in tied for 12th in 2018 and 15th at the 2016 NCAA Championship Finals. The men have finished in second twice and third once while the women have finished second once, third once and have earned two fourth place finishes in their respective ACC Championships.

Duck's work with Florida State's players has led to incredible individual success in his first seven seasons in Tallahassee. His teaching abilities and coaching philosophies have helped accelerate the careers of two of the top men's players in school history – Koepka and Daniel Berger – as well as six of the top performers in school history on the women's side – Matilda Castren, Lydia Gumm, Morgane Metraux, Kim Metraux, Maria Salinas and Jessica Negron. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2012 and was a three-time All-ACC selection, while Berger, who has won twice on the PGA Tour, earned All-ACC honors and played for the United States' Palmer Cup team in 2013. Duck also worked with Seminole All-American Hank Lebioda – who earned All-America honors in 2016, was the 2014 CC Freshman of the Year, a four-time All-ACC selection and was a member of the 2014 United States Palmer Cup Team. Castren earned All-American honors in 2014 and 2017, is a three-time All-ACC honoree and holds the record for lowest stroke average in

school history. Morgane Metraux earned All-American and All-ACC honors in both 2017 and 2018 and finished in a school-best fifth place in the individual standings at the 2018 NCAA Championship Finals. Kim Metraux earned All-ACC honors in both 2017 and 2018. Gumm was an All-ACC selection in 2015 and 2017, Salinas finished in a tie for first in the NCAA Central Regional and earned All-America honors in 2012 and Negron earned All-ACC honors in 2013.

DUCK AND TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIPS

Duck has helped the Seminoles women to seven team championships and the men to 16 – a total of 23 in his seven seasons at Florida State. The women won a school-record six tournament championships in 2018 – one more than the school record of five during the Seminoles' national championship season in 1981. He has also helped the women earn school-record second place finishes at the 2017 NCAA Shoal Creek and 2018 NCAA Tallahassee Regional Championships. Duck has helped coach the Florida State men to 16 tournament championships. The Seminoles won four consecutive tournaments, earned six overall team championships and were the No. 1 overall seed in the NCAA Glo championships in 2015. The Seminoles – both the men and the women – have been ranked among the nation's top 30 teams throughout his first six seasons at Florida State. The men were ranked No. 1 in 2015 while the women were ranked No. 1 in 2017.

COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck is one of the stars in collegiate coaching. He was the acting head coach at Augusta State in 2002, served the Jaguars as a volunteer assistant coach during the 2001-02 season and was an assistant coach for the program during the 2002-03 season. During his tenure as the acting coach at Augusta State, the Jaguars were ranked as high as No. 9 nationally.

COLLEGIATE PLAYING EXPERIENCE

Duck enjoyed a standout career at Augusta State (1998-01) where he earned All-America honors as a sophomore (1999) and led the Jaguars to three NCAA Championship appearances (1998, 1999, 2001). He is one of the top golfers in the storied history of the Augusta State program and remains listed prominently in the record book 15 years after his playing career ended. Duck is ranked second in school history for lowest stroke average by a freshman (73.22), which stood as the school record for nearly 15 years. It is an average that still ranks in the top-15 in school history. His career stroke average of 73.86 is ranked 14th in school history. During his career, he earned 12 top-10 and 28 top-20 individual finishes.

COLLEGIATE COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck's ability to communicate with the players he coaches is illustrated by the success those players have earned on the golf course. In his first seven seasons at Florida State, he has worked with 16 All-Americans, 29 All-ACC honorees, two ACC Golfers of the Year and four ACC Freshmen of the Year. Each of the 14 teams (seven men's and seven women's) he has helped coach at Florida State has played in the NCAA Tournament and both teams have been ranked in the nation's top-20 during the first seven years of his tenure in Tallahassee.

AS A CADDY FOR MORGANE METRAUX AT THE 2017 U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

Duck enjoyed the honor of caddying for Florida State All-American Morgane Metraux at the 2017 U.S. Women's Open at the Trump National Golf Course in Bedminster, N.J. The incredibly special invitation came from Metraux shortly after she qualified for the event. "I was very excited to have been asked by one of our players to caddie for her in the U.S. Open. To have the opportunity to watch Morgane progress to this level and play against the best in the world is a proud moment and one that I will always remember."

2017 WAS A HISTORICAL SEASON FOR THE FLORIDA STATE WOMEN

2017 was an incredibly special season for the Florida State women. The Seminoles were ranked No. 1 in the nation, won six tournament championships, had four players named to the All-ACC team, led the nation in scoring average vs. par, led the nation in par 5 scoring and Head Coach Amy Bond was named the ACC Coach of the Year. Florida State won its first tournament of the season and went on to win an unprecedented six tournaments to tie for the national lead. Never before had any team in Florida State history won more than five events in a single season -- not even the Seminoles' 1981 A.I.A.W. National Championship team. The Seminoles earned the highest NCAA regional seed in school history (No. 2), and finished in third place in the NCAA Columbus Regional Championship before earning their second consecutive top-20 finish at the NCAA National Championship Finals. A record number of Seminoles (four) earned All-ACC honors while two were celebrated with All-American honors.



2015 WAS ONE OF THE BEST IN THE HISTORY OF THE MEN'S PROGRAM

Duck helped the Seminole men's golf team to the best season in program history in 2015. The Seminoles finished 11th in the final standings at the NCAA Men's Golf Championships, finished in second place in the ACC Championships, earned a program-best national ranking of No. 1 during the season, were the No. 1 seed in the NCAA men's Golf Championship tournament, had three players earn All-American honors (third time in school history three players earned All-American honors in the same season) and set a single-season school record with six tournament wins.

2014 WAS A BANNER YEAR

Duck's coaching efforts in 2014 helped the Seminole men to a second place finish in the ACC championship, a fifth place finish in the NCAA Raleigh Regional and an appearance in the NCAA Championship Finals for the third consecutive year. He helped coach one All-American, the ACC Freshman of the Year and All-ACC selections Jack Maguire and Hank Lebioda. The Seminole men won the USF Invitational as they posted the best single round team and tournament score in team history in winning the championship. Duck helped coach freshman Matilda Castren, who earned All-American Second Team and All-ACC Honors and who was the runner-up for ACC Player and Rookie of the Year honors, as well as All-ACC selection Alex Milan.

SUCCESS OF BROOKS KOEPKA

Duck worked with All-American Brooks Koepka, the 2017 and 2018 U.S. Open and 2018 PGA Championship winner, during his final season as a Seminole (2011-12). Koepka was named the ACC Player of the Year and led the Seminoles to a ninth place finish at the NCAA Championship finals in 2012. Koepka earned his PGA Tour card for the 2014-15 season as he finished in a tie for fourth place at the 2014 U.S. Open – a finish which also earned him an invitation to play in the 2015 Masters Championship. In 2017, Koepka had the lowest aggregate score in the four major tournaments on the PGA Tour. Koepka won the championship of the 2015 Phoenix Open for his first PGA Tour victory. In winning the and 2017 and 2018 U.S. Open championships, Koepka became one of only seven golfers in the 118-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.

SUCCESS OF DANIEL BERGER

Duck coached Daniel Berger, the 2016 and 2017 FedEx St. Jude tournament champion on the PGA Tour, during his stellar two-year career as a Seminole. Berger won two individual titles (the spring 2013 Gator Invitational and the spring 2013 Seminole Invitational), was a two-time First-Team All-American, was named to the All-Nicklaus Team, the All-ACC Team and the Ping All Region team as a sophomore at Florida State. He led the ACC in stroke average and carded his collegiate career low score of 65 during the spring of his sophomore season. Berger was named the 2015 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year.

ON COURSE COACHING

Because he has played and coached at such high levels, Duck is known as a players' coach. His ability to help each student-athlete create long-term training schedules and encourage them to work towards those goals on a daily basis has helped create a teaching environment that has fostered the recent successes of both the Seminoles' men's and women's programs.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY AS A PLAYER

Duck led Augusta State (now Georgia Regents University) to three NCAA Championship tournament appearances and helped the Jaguars to a seventh place finish as a senior, the best finish in program history at the time. With the foundation put in place by Duck and his teammates, the Jaguars won the NCAA Titles in 2010 and 2011.

SUCCESS IN PROFESSIONAL WORLD

Duck enjoyed a successful career as a manager of professional golfers for the Hambric Sports Group (2003-2012) before accepting his current assistant coaching position at Florida State. Based in London, Duck was the supervisor of the European Division of Hambric Stellar Golf. He was a player manager who oversaw public relations and marketing for seven clients including 1988 Masters champion Sandy Lyle, 2005 European Tour Rookie of the Year Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano, former Augusta State All-American Oliver Wilson and Francesco Molinari.

PERSONAL

Duck is married to the former Michelle Digsby. The couple has two daughters, Annabel (11) and Hannah (eight). He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Marketing from Augusta State in 2001. A native of Northampton, England, he represented Great Britain-Ireland as a member of the 1998 Palmer Cup team. Duck played in the 1997 European Amateur Championship and finished tied as the runner-up with Sergio Garcia and Luke Donald.

MATT WHALL Assistant coach



Second Season at Florida State

University of Loughborough, 2014

Matt Whall, who helped coach the Seminole men's and women's teams into their respective NCAA Tournaments during the 2017-18 season, is in his second season as an assistant coach at Florida State. During his first season in Tallahassee, he helped both the Seminole men and women earn their school-record 13th consecutive NCAA Regional Championship births.

During his first season at Florida State, Whall helped the Seminole women to five topfive team finishes – including second place finishes in the ACC and NCAA Regional Championships and helped coach two All-Americans – Morgan Metraux and Amanda Doherty. He helped the Seminole men to two team championships (the Mobile Sports Authority Intercollegiate and the Seminole Intercollegiate) and to a sixth place finish in the NCAA Oklahoma Regional Championship and coached All-American and ACC Freshman of the Year John Pak.

Whall began his collegiate coaching career at Texas Tech where he helped the Lady Raiders to two appearances in the NCAA Championships in his three seasons in Lubbock. During his tenure at Texas Tech, the Lady Raiders advanced to the NCAA Regional Championships three times and made two trips to the National Championship Finals (2015 and 2017). The Lady Raiders advanced to the match play portion of the 2015 NCAA Finals for the first time in school history.

Whall helped Texas Tech to a program-best fifth-place finish in the 2015 NCAA Championships. The Lady Raiders were making just their second all-time appearance in the NCAA Championships. During the 2015-16 season, Whall helped lead the Lady Raiders to another NCAA Regional appearance. In addition, he helped Gabby Barker earn the singleseason school record with a 72.30 strokes average. She was named the 2016 Big 12 Player of the Year and earned All-America Honorable Mention honors.

Whall worked with Lady Raider standout Sofia Garcia in 2017 as she put together one of the best freshmen seasons in Texas Tech history. She closed her first collegiate season with a 73.60 scoring average - the sixth-lowest in program history and the lowest ever for a Texas Tech freshman.

Whall began his coaching career on the amateur circuit in his native United Kingdom where he was part of the England Golf coaching staff for the Under-16 Regional Girls squad.

In addition to his coaching accomplishments, Whall was previously certified as a PGA Advanced Professional and holds numerous qualifications in golf psychology, putting, short game coaching and club hitting.

He graduated from the University of Loughborough in the United Kingdom and spent time learning much of the coaching and teaching aspects of the game from mentor and former Palmer Cup coach for England, David Ridley.

FIRST SEASON WITH THE SEMINOLE WOMEN

Whall helped the Seminole women to their 13th consecutive NCAA Regional Championship appearance and to the second best finish in school history (tied for 12th) in the NCAA Championship Finals in his first season at Florida State. The Seminoles finished second in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional (tied for the best regional finish in school history), finished second in the ACC Championship (tied for the best ACC Championship finish in school history) and earned seven top!5 team finishes in 11 events.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP EXPERIENCE

Whall is an experienced coach whose work has helped produce top NCAA Championship Finals finishes at both Florida State and Texas Tech. The Seminole women finished in a tied for 12th place at the 2018 NCAA Championship Finals (the second best finish in school history) while the Texas Tech women finished in fifth place in the 2015 NCAA Championships (the best finish in school history).

NCAA REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SUCCESS

In his first three seasons as a coach on the collegiate level, he has helped lead each of his teams to incredible NCAA Regional Championship success. The Seminoles finished in second place in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional in 2018 while Texas Tech finished fifth in the NCAA San Antonio Regional in 2015 and fifth in the NCAA Lubbock Regional in 2017.

WHALL COACHES ALL-AMERICANS

Whall coached three All-Americans during his first season at Florida State – John Pak from the men's team and Morgane Metraux and Amanda Doherty of the women's team. All three players also earned All-ACC honors while Pak was named the Freshman of the Year in the ACC and was one of five players named to the Phil Mickelson All-Freshman team.

TEAM TITLES

Whall helped Florida State to five top-five team finishes in his first season at Florida State. Included in those top team finishes were school-record tying second place finishes at the NCAA Tallahassee Regional Championships and the ACC Championships. The Seminoles finished in a tie for 12th at the NCAA Championship Finals – the second best national finish in school history. Whall coached Texas Tech to two team championships and 32 top-10 team finishes in his three years in Lubbock.

PERSONAL

Whall and his wife, Jenny, have a son, Noah (one).

TREY JONES HEAD MEN'S GOLF COACH - DIRECTOR OF GOLF



Top national finishes, All-Americans, professional success and academic achievement have become synonymous with the Florida State men's golf program under Trey Jones. Now in his 16th season as the head men's coach and Director of Golf for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf programs, Jones has lifted the sport of golf at Florida State to new heights. Under his direction, there is no limit on how high the Seminole programs will go. Florida State Golf will remain in excellent hands in the foreseeable future, as Jones' contract was extended through the 2020 season.

"Trey has done an outstanding job and I am pleased that he has committed to FSU's longterm success," said Wilcox. "We are consistently competing at the very highest level and our program, which has had great past success, is arguably at its strongest ever. We look forward to continued success under Trey's outstanding leadership."

Jones is responsible for attracting nationally ranked recruiting classes, upgrading the Seminoles' schedule to where it is ranked among the nation's toughest on an annual basis and creating one of the most functional player development facilities in all of college golf on one of the Seminoles' five home golf courses. Jones continues annually to build on the Seminoles' success in developing the nation's top talent into national contenders and collegiate golf's elite players.

Florida State Men's Golf achieved three team victories in the 2017-18 year and enjoyed a breakthrough freshman campaign by All-American John Pak. FSU won the year-opening Doc Gimmler, the Mobile Sports Authority Intercollegiate and the Seminole Intercollegiate. Four different individual winners emerged in Pak (Seminole Intercollegiate), Harry Ellis (Marquette Intercollegiate, Mobile Sports Authority Intercollegiate), Jamie Li (co-won the Mobile Sports Authority Intercollegite with Ellis) and Bennett Baker (USA Individual Tournament).

Jones oversaw another solid season in 2016-17, as FSU finished 14th in the NCAA Finals and reached four days of competition at Rich Harvest Farms. Redshirt senior Cristobal Del Solar and redshirt junior Harry Ellis recorded All-America honors while also being named to the All-ACC Team. Ellis' turnaround has been one of the highlights of Jones' career, as the England native recorded career bests in scoring average (71.62), average vs. par (+0.54) and rounds played (39). Ellis would go on to win the British Amateur and participate in the 2017 Open Championship (+12). He also had exemptions to the 2018 Masters and 2018 U.S. Open as an amateur.

FSU's two All-ACC selections in 2018, which included Pak and Ellis, makes it 12 straight years the Seminoles have garnered multiple all-conference selections. Their sixth consecutive trip to the NCAA Finals in 2017 was the longest active streak in the ACC and tied for the fifth-longest nationally before falling just shy in 2018.

Heading into the 2018-19 season, FSU has finished in the Top five in 66 of its last 97 tournaments played, equating to an impressive 68 percent.

The top-notch head coach helped FSU Men's Golf achieve more milestones in 2016. For the fifth consecutive year, the Seminoles made the NCAA Tournament. Senior Hank Lebioda became the third Seminole to win ACC Player of the Year honors, while redshirt junior Cristobal Del Solar's career year put him on the All-ACC Team and PING Southeast All-Region Team alongside Lebioda. Senior leader Lebioda was also a PING All-American. Jones guided Florida State to one of its most successful seasons in program history in 2015, earning ACC Coach of the Year honors for the second time. FSU ranked No. 1 in the Golf Coaches Association of America Poll for most of the season and entered the NCAA Tournament as the No. 1 overall seed for the first time ever. The Noles set a school record with six tournament victories and established three All-Americans in Jack Maguire (First Team), Hank Lebioda (Second Team) and Rowin Caron (Third Team) – the most in a single year.

Named the 2008 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year as he led the Seminoles to the first conference championship in the sport of golf in school history, Jones is no stranger to competing with the nation's best in one of the top conferences for college golf.

Building championship teams and elevating those teams onto the national stage is nothing new to Jones, who has earned five conference coach of the year awards and led 16 of his 21 teams at the Division I level to the NCAA Championship tournament. His teams consistently hold prominent places in the national rankings, are adept at winning conference championships and are annually among the top producers of All-American and all-conference performers.

Jones has become one of the winningest coaches in school history in his first 15 years in Florida State. He is the only coach in school history to lead the Seminoles to 13 NCAA Tournament appearances (no other coach has led Florida State to more than five appearances) and he is ranked first in school history with 23 tournament championships (second is nine by Don Veller). The Seminoles have appeared in a school record 13 consecutive NCAA Tournaments entering the 2018-19 season.

There is plenty more excitement on the horizon for Jones and both the men's and women's Seminole golf programs. Legendary golfer Jack Nicklaus and his son, Jack Nicklaus II, will be overseeing a complete renovation of the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course that is projected to be completed in the Fall 2019.

Jones also co-hosts a radio show on SiriusXM PGA Tour Radio called Beyond The Tips, airing on Wednesdays at 9 p.m. ET.

2015 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

A prominent season was capped by an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championship Finals, as the Seminoles fell just short of reaching the top eight by the final round. Individually, Jack Maguire finished 22nd overall while Del Solar ended at 35th. Maguire would earn first-team All-America honors from Golfweek and second-team honors from the GCAA, while Lebioda earned second-team All-America honors from both organizations. Rowin Caron highlighted his junior season as a third-team Golfweek All-American while getting honorable mention accolades from the GCAA. FSU enjoyed a dominant stretch of winning four consecutive tournaments, and also won four tournaments by coming from behind on the final day.

2014 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State once again returned to the NCAA Championship Finals, but it was with a much different looking team from the previous year. The Seminoles fielded the youngest team in the tournament with two freshmen, two sophomores and a senior and was one of only three schools (in a field of 30), with only one upperclassman in the line-up. Freshman Jack Maguire became the first freshman to be ever named an All-American at Florida State as he was named to the second team by Golfweek and to the third team but the GCAA. Maguire and sophomore Hank Lebioda were named to the All-ACC team and Maguire was tabbed the ACC Freshman of the Year. The Seminoles smashed apart the record book at the USF Invitational as the team posted the lowest round (24-under 264) and lowest three-round tournament score (41-under 823) in school history. Maguire created his mark with the lowest round in school history (10-under 62) and second lowest tournament score (16-under 200).

TREY JONES HEAD MEN'S GOLF COACH - DIRECTOR OF GOLF

2013 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in 11th place at the 2013 NCAA Championship Finals at the Capital City Club Crabapple in Atlanta, Ga. The Seminoles are just one of two teams to finish in the top 11 of the NCAAs in three of the last four years. Sophomore Daniel Berger led the team at the Championships finishing tied for second with a 6-under 204. Both Berger and Chase Seiffert earned All-American status for the year as Lebioda was named 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year.

2012 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State earned an eighth place national finish at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals to mark the second time in three seasons the Seminoles finished in the top eight of the standings at the national tournament. The Seminoles entered the championship ranked No. 19 in the nation by GolfStat and finished as one of only two teams ranked outside of the top eight to finish in the top eight of the final standings.

2010 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in a tie for third place at the 2010 NCAA Championship Finals to earn the best national finish in school history. The Seminoles fell to Augusta State (the 2010 National Champion) in the semifinals of the championship tournament after defeating Texas Tech in the first round of match play. The Seminoles led the stroke play portion of the tournament and finished in second place to earn the No. 2 seed in the match play portion of the event. The third place finish at the NCAA Championship marked the best finish in school history – one better than the Seminoles fourth place national finish in 1957 and tied for fourth place finish in 1958.

2008 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State, which was led by All-Americans Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage, won its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference championship as it defeated Duke by three strokes at the 2008 ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles defeated Duke as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the school's first ever ACC championship in the sport of golf. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tournament with four players under par. Blixt and Savage led the way with eight-under par 208 scores as they both finished in a tie for third in the individual standings.

RECRUITING

Known as one of the nation's most dynamic recruiters, Jones is nationally recognized as one of the top talent scouts in all of collegiate golf. His ability to recruit talented players, which in turn helps him build solid teams, is one of the aspects of coaching that has made Jones a top Division I coach. Florida State's recruiting class ranked fourth best in the nation in 2007, fifth best in 2008, sixth best in 2005 and among the nation's top 15 in 2006, 2010 and 2012.

HANK LEBIODA

Hank Lebioda, who played at FSU from 2012-16, will go down as one of the top golfers in school history. The four-year letterwinner leaves FSU as the program's career leader in par or better rounds (76), percentage of counting scores (93.4 percent) and birdies (467). The Winter Springs, FIa., native was the 2016 ACC Player of the Year, a four-time All-ACC Team member, a two-time All-America and a two-time ACC Player of the Month. Having an FSU legacy in his family, Lebioda embodied the true of meaning of being a Seminole. On July 23, 2017, he won his first pro tournament at the Mackenzie Investments Open in Montreal, Canada.

BROOKS KOEPKA

Jones coached Brooks Koepka - the school record holder for lowest stroke average in a single season (71.09) and for a career (71.85) - the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2010 and 2012 and a three-time All-ACC selection. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year twice, the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2009 and earned All-American twice in his career in leading the Seminoles to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and two top-10 NCAA Championship Finals finishes. As a senior, Koepka tied the school record with a nine under par score of 63 in the third round of the FAU Spring Break Invitational and set the school record with his 199 total for three rounds of the event. Koepka won three events as a senior - at the Brickyard Collegiate Championship, the Seminole Intercollegiate, the FAU Spring Break Invitational. Koepka secured his status on the PGA Tour by tying for fourth place in the 2014 U.S. Open, and finished the 2015 season with Top 10 major finishes at The Open Championship (T-10th) and the PGA Championship (T-5th). He won his first tournament at the 2015 Waste Management Phoenix Open, and caught many's attention with an impressive 3-1 record at the 2016 Ryder Cup for the United States. He then captured his first Major Championship at the 2017 U.S. Open in Erin Hills, and became the first golfer in 29 years to win back-to-back U.S. Opens when he conquered Shinnecock Hills in 2018.

DANIEL BERGER

Under Jones' tutelage, Daniel Berger secured All-America status in 2013 by earning first-team honors from the GCAA and Golfweek. Berger's 69.79 average score in the 2012-13 year makes him the only Seminole to shot sub-70 in a season, an average score that led the country. He finished as an All-ACC selection in the same spectacular year, and joins former teammate Koepka as two of the best young players on the PGA Tour. Berger was honored as the 2014-15 PGA Tour Player of the Year, and won his first tournament at the 2016 FedEx St. Jude Classic, then repeated his victory in 2017 at the same tournament.

JONAS BLIXT

Jones coached one of Florida State's all-time best players – Jonas Blixt – to All-America honors and the first individual ACC Championship in school history. Blixt earned Ping/Division I All-American First Team honors in 2008 and Ping/Division I All-American second team honors in 2007. He is one of only three players in school history to earn All-American First and Second Team honors during his career. Blixt won the ACC individual championship in 2007 to become the first Seminole to win ACC medalist honors. He helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship – the first ACC golf championship in school history – and earned All-ACC honors twice during his career. Blixt is currently playing on the PGA Tour with three wins, the 2012 Frys.com Open, 2013 Greenbrier Classic and the 2017 Zurich Classic of New Orleans. He finished tied for second in the 2014 Masters Tournament and fourth in the 2013 PGA Championship.

DREW KITTLESON

Jones also coached Drew Kittleson, who will long be remembered as one of the top golfers in school history. Kittleson played in the Masters Championship at Augusta in 2009, the U.S. Open at Bethpage Black in 2009, four NCAA Championships and four ACC Championships during his standout career as a Seminole. He earned All-American Honorable Mention honors from Ping/Golf Coaches' Association of America in 2010 and Southeast Regional All-American honors in 2011. Kittleson helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship – the first ACC golf championship in school history and to a third place finish at the NCAA Division I Championship finals in 2010 – the highest national finish in school history. After a second place finish at the 2009 U.S. Amateur, he earned exemptions to play in both the 2009 Masters and U.S. Open Championships. Kittleson is currently playing on the Web.com Tour.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Committed to the academic and athletic success of his student-athletes, Jones has coached 38 members of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, nine members of the ACC Academic Golf Team and five members of the Golf Coaches' Association of America All-American Scholar team. His team was also nationally recognized in 2010 as one of the few schools in the NCAA to achieve a perfect APR score of 1000 since the inception of the Academic Progress Rate program in 2003. During his tenure at Georgia State, he coached 10 members of the Atlantic Sun All-Academic team and 20 members of the TAAC All-Academic team.

JONES NATIONALLY

Jones has been an active member of the Golf Coaches Association of America since 1993. He is currently a member of the steering committee for the Collegiate Golf Hall of Fame. Jones served the board as the Division I Director for the East Region and served as the chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee. He was also a representative in the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

GEORGIA STATE

Trey Jones was named the head coach at Georgia State in 1995 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the southeastern United States. He led the Panthers onto the national scene for the first time in school history including their first appearance in the NCAA Championship tournament (2003), first conference championship (1998, Trans America Athletic Conference) and highest national ranking (20th during the 2000 season). Jones was responsible for the program in its entirety including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and all budgetary matters. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1997-2003. During that period, the Panthers earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

PERSONAL

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh, who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. They are the proud parents of a daughter, Jordan (16) and a son, Drew (12). Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991. Jones is a 27-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State for eight years (1996-2003) before becoming only the fifth coach in the history of the Seminole program in 2004. Prior to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped hone those programs into national contenders.

JENNIFER SANTIAGO DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS



Jennifer Santiago was named Director of Operations for the men's and women's golf teams in 2014. Prior to working with the golf teams, she was the Director of Operations for the men's and women's track and field teams at Florida State.

Santiago has been a member of the athletics staff at Florida State since 2007 when she joined the Athletic Academic Support Unit. She was Associate Director of the Academic Support Unit and became the Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance in 2009. She served the department in that capacity until 2012 when she began working with the National Championship Track and Field teams.

Santiago previously worked as the Assistant Athletic Director for Student-Athlete Development at Georgia State University, as well as spending four years as a high school English and history teacher before coming to Florida State.

An author, Santiago has three published novels.

A native of Sarasota, Fla., Santiago earned her undergraduate degree in English from Villanova University and a Master's in Education from the University of Pennsylvania.

In 2001, she married Matt Balog. The couple has four children: Tauara, 35, Alexander, 15, Nicolas, 13 and nine-year old Lucas.

2017-18 SEASON IN REVEW

SEMINOLES CONTINUE TO MAKE THEIR MARK ON THE NATIONAL SCENE

Florida State continued to make its presence known nationally as it enjoyed another sensational year during the 2017-18 fall and spring seasons. Under the direction of eighth-year Head Coach Amy Bond, Florida State finished tied for 12th at the NCAA Championship Finals (the second best NCAA finish in school history) marking the first time in school history the Seminoles have earned three straight top-20 national finishes. The Seminoles finished second in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional (tied for the best regional finish in school history). finished second in the ACC Championship (tied for the best ACC Championship finish in school history) and earned seven top-5 team finishes in 11 events. Florida State finished the season ranked No. 19 nationally by GolfWeek and No. 20 nationally by GolfStat. Senior Morgane Metraux earned All-American Honors for the second year from the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA) while Metraux and sophomore Amanda Doherty earned All-NCAA Tallahassee Regional Honors and All-ACC Honors. Morgane Metraux finished in a school-record best tied for 5th place in the NCAA National Championship Finals.

THIRD-CONSECUTIVE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS FINALS APPEARANCE RESULTS IN TOP-12 NATIONAL FINISH

Senior Morgane Metraux finished in a tie for fifth place in the individual standings, and the Seminole women's golf team finished in a tie for 12th place in the team standings in the 2018 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship at the Karsten Creek Golf Club at Oklahoma State University. The Seminoles' finished only seven strokes out of eighth place which would have advanced them into match play in the championship for the first time in school history. The tied 12th place finish for Florida State at the NCAA Championship Finals is the second best in school history and is the sixth top-15 finish in school history. Seminole Head Coach Amy Bond, who led the Seminoles into the NCAA Championship Finals for the school-record third consecutive season, became the first coach in school history to lead the Seminoles to three consecutive top-20 national finishes. Florida State finished tied for 12th in 2018, 15th in 2016 and 20th in 2017.

SEMINOLES FINISH SECOND IN NCAA TALLAHASSEE REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Senior Morgane Metraux and sophomore Amanda Doherty both finished in a tie for fourth place in the individual standings, and the Seminole women's golf team finished in second place in the team standings in the 2018 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Tallahassee Regional Championship at the Don Veller Seminole Golf Club. The Seminoles' second place finish advanced them to the NCAA Championship Finals for the school-record third consecutive season. Florida State enjoyed its best round of the season - a 12-under par 276 -- to move up from a tie for third after two rounds and into second place in the final standings. The Seminoles' played the second best round of the day for the second consecutive round. Additionally, the Seminoles' round of 276 is tied for the fourth lowest single round score in school history. In tying the school record for best team finish in an NCAA Regional Championship (second), the Seminoles placed two players (Morgane Metraux and Amanda Doherty, both tied for fourth) in the top five of the individual standings in an NCAA regional for the first time in school history. The individual scores of 206 by Metraux and Doherty are tied for the sixth best in school history and ranks the best in school history in NCAA regional of finals competition.





FLORIDA STATE FNIISHES IN SECOND PLACE AT THE ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Senior Morgane Metraux finished in a tie for third and sophomore Amanda Doherty finished in a tie for fifth in the individual standings, and the Florida State women's golf team finished in second place in the team standings at the ACC Women's Golf Championships at the Grandover Resort in Greensboro, N.C. The individual finishes for Metraux and Doherty marked the first time in school history the Seminoles had two players finish in the top five of the ACC Championships. Florida State's second place team finish marked the first time in school history the Seminoles finished in the top-two in consecutive seasons after also finishing in second place in 2017.

METRAUX EARNS ALL-AMERICAN HONORABLE MENTION HONORS FROM THE WGCA

Senior Morgane Metraux has earned All-American Honorable Mention honors as named by the Women's Golf Coaches Association, marking the second consecutive season she has been named as one of the nation's top golfers. Metraux enjoyed her best season as a Seminole as she carded a career-best 71.69 stroke average – the best single season stroke average in school history. She finished in a tie for third in the individual standings at the ACC Championships, a tie for fourth at the NCAA Tallahassee Regional Championships and in a tie for fifth in the NCAA Championship Finals. Metraux's tied for fifth place finish in the NCAA Championship Finals is the best national finish in school history.

2017-18 SEASON IN REVEW



MORGANE METRAUX, DOHERTY EARN GOLFWEEK ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

Senior Morgane Metraux and sophomore Amanda Doherty, who helped lead the Seminole women's golf team to a 12th place finish in the 2018 NCAA Championship Finals, earned All-American Honorable Mention honors from GolfWeek for their outstanding performances during the 2018 season. Metraux (71.69 stroke average) and Doherty (72.09) enjoyed the best seasons of their careers as they helped the Seminoles finish in the top 20 of the NCAA Championships for the school-record third consecutive season.

MORGANE METRAUX, DOHERTY EARN ALL-REGION HONORS

With their tied for fourth place finishes in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional Golf Championships, senior Morgane Metraux and sophomore Amanda Doherty both earned All-Region honors. Metraux earned the honors for the second time in her illustrious Seminoles career after earning the honor in 2015 when she finished in a tie for 10th place at the NCAA San Antonio Regional Championships.

FLORIDA STATE'S FINAL NATIONAL RANKINGS

Florida State finished the 2017-18 season ranked within the nation's top-20 in both national polls – 19th by GolfWeek and 20th by GolfStat. Senior Morgane Metraux finished her career ranked as the No. 32 individual in both polls while Amanda Doherty closed her sophomore season ranked No. 46 by GolfWeek and No. 58 by Golfstat.

FLORIDA STATE'S TEAM FINISHES

Florida State earned three runner-up team finishes in 2017-18 (second of 15 at the Ocean Course Invitational; second of 12 at the ACC Championships and second of 18 in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional). The Seminoles were one of only four teams in the ACC with at least three team finishes of second place or better. The list includes Florida State, Duke (seven finishes of second place or better), Louisville (four finishes of second place or better) and Miami (three finishes of second place or better).

SEMINOLES POST TOP STROKE AVERAGES

Florida State finished one of the best statistical seasons in program history as it posted the second best team stroke average in school history (291.8) and had three players (Morgane Metraux, 1st; Amanda Doherty, 4th; and Kim Metraux, 14th) finish with stroke averages that ranked among the top 15 in school history for a single season.

PAIR OF SEMINOLES IN THE ACC'S TOP SEVEN FOR STROKE AVERAGE

Florida State's Morgane Metraux (fourth, 71.69) and Amanda Doherty (seventh, 72.09) both finished the 2017-18 season ranked among the top seven individuals for stroke average in the ACC in 2018. The Seminoles, Duke and Wake Forest had two players each in the top seven of the individual stroke leaders in the ACC.

DOHERTY AMONG ACC LEADERS FOR TOP-FIVE AND TOP-10 FINISHES

Sophomore Amanda Doherty finished the season ranked third in the ACC with a career-high four top-five finishes (Florida State Match-Up, 2; Brickyard Collegiate, T2; NCAA Tallahassee Regional, T4 and ACC Championship, T5). The ACC leader for top-five individual finishes was Jennifer Kupcho of Wake Forest with six. Kupcho won the individual NCAA Championship. Doherty finished sixth in the ACC with a career-high five top-10 finishes (Florida State Match-Up, 2; Brickyard Collegiate, T2; NCAA Tallahassee Regional, T4; ACC Championship T5 and in the Ocean Course Invitational, T10).



2017-18 SEASON IN REVEW

DOHERTY MADE A LIVING IN THE 60'S AS A SOPHOMORE

Sophomore All-ACC selection Amanda Doherty finished tied for the team lead with six rounds carded in the 60's during the fall 2017 and spring 2018 seasons. She carded two rounds in the 60's during the NCAA Tallahassee Regional Championships (69 in the first round and a career-low 66 in the second round) and has carded at least one round in the 60's in four of her 11 events this season. Doherty carded multiple rounds in the 60's in the Florida State Match-Up and the NCAA Tallahassee Regional Championship.

KIM METRAUX'S CONSISTENCY

Senior Kim Metraux has played as one of the most consistent golfers in school history throughout her four-year Florida State career. As a freshman, she averaged 75.57 strokes in 23 rounds. In the three years since her freshman season, she has averaged 73.53 strokes in 35 tournaments (7,424 strokes in 101 rounds). Metraux averaged 73.53 (sophomore season), 73.43 (junior season) and 73.53 (senior season) in each of her last three seasons. She holds three of the top 15 single season scoring averages in school history and is ranked fifth in school history with her 73.87 career average.

SUMNER'S FRESHMAN SEASON AMONG BEST IN SCHOOL HISTORY


Kathleen Sumner, who earned two top-10 finishes as a freshman in 2017-18 (tied for sixth at the Dickson Intercollegiate and tied for seventh at the Brickyard Collegiate) finished her first collegiate season with a 75.74 stroke average – the sixth best by a freshman in school history. The school record for best average by a freshman is 71.83 by Matilda Castren in 2014. In the Seminoles' lineup during the 2017-18 season were four players (Amanda Doherty, third; Morgane Metraux, fourth; Sumner, fifth, and Kayla Jones, seventh) who all ranked in the top 10 for best averages by a freshman in school history.

FLERLAGE CLOSES SEMINOLE CAREER

Senior Lexie Flerlage, who was a member of four NCAA Tournament teams during her career as a Seminole, played in three events during her career in the spring of 2017 (one) and the spring of 2018 (two). She played as an individual in the Florida State Match-Up in the spring of 2017 and played in two events as an individual during the spring of 2018.

MANGAN AND SALONEN EARN PLAYING TIME IN 2018

Sophomores Ashley Mangan and Sandra Salonen earned playing time for the first time in their careers in 2018. Mangan played in four events as a sophomore – the Schooner Fall Classic and the Stanford Intercollegiate during the fall of 2017 and the Florida State Match-Up and the Brickyard Collegiate during the spring of 2018 while Salonen played in the Florida State Match-Up, Evans Derby Experience and the Brickyard Collegiate.





EIGHT SEMINOLES NAMED TO ACC ACADEMIC HONOR ROLL

For the third consecutive year, every member of the nationally ranked Florida State Women's Golf team has been named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. The conference released the list of academic honorees with a record number of Seminole student-athletes, including Head Coach Amy Bond's team placing all eight members – the seventh consecutive season at least seven members of the team have been honored for their academic success by the ACC. The eight Seminole women's golfers on the 2018 ACC Academic Honor Roll includes four recent graduates – Lexie Flerlage (Venice, Fla./Real Estate), Kayla Jones (Milton, Ga./Marketing), Kim Metraux (Lausanne, Switzerland/Management) and Morgane Metraux (Lausanne, Switzerland/Management), Ashley Mangan (Clermont, Fla./Finance) and Sandra Salonen (Espoo, Finland/Sport Management) and freshman Kathleen Sumner (Charleston, S.C../Exploratory). Jones and the Metraux sisters tied the program record for ACC Academic Honor Roll appearances with four each.

FOUR SEMINOLES NAMED TO ALL ACADEMIC TEAM

Amanda Doherty, Kim Metraux, Morgane Metraux and Kathleen Sumner have been named to the All-ACC Academic Women's Golf team marking the fourth consecutive season at least four Seminoles have been named to the prestigious academic achievement team. The Seminoles led the ACC with four selections as Kim and Morgane Metraux became just the third and fourth players in school history to be named to the All-ACC Academic team in each of their four seasons at Florida State. To be eligible for consideration for the All-ACC Academic team, a student-athlete, regardless of class, must have earned a 3.00 grade point average for the previous semester and maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during her academic career. Florida State led the league with four honorees.

1981 AIAW NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

With two players finishing in the top 15 of the individual standings, the 1981 Florida State Women's golf team won the AIAW National Championship. The Seminoles, led by coach Verlyn Giles, finished in the top four of all ten regular season tournaments in which they participated. The team won the Lady Gator Invitational, the Lady Paladin Invitational, the Dick McGuire Invitational and the South Florida Invitational in Tampa, Fla. They also finished with one second place finish, four third place finishes, and one fourth place finish.

After the first two rounds of the four-day tournament Florida State found itself down by eight strokes – behind the host school, Georgia, and defending national champion Tulsa. The Seminoles shot a tournament-best 298 in the third round and took over the lead from Georgia. The Seminoles finished strong in the fourth and final round outlasting Georgia on the last hole to win the tournament by three strokes.

Seminole junior Lisa Young, who won three LPGA events later in her career, finished in third place in the individual standings – only one shot behind the champions. Florida State's Barb Bunkowsky finished in a tie for 14th. Jane Geddes, the 1986 U.S. Women's Open and 1987 LPGA Championship winner, finished tied for 31st. Michele Guilbault finished 57th and Marla Anderson finished in a tie for 73rd.

Young and Guilbault earned All-America First Team honors while Bunkowsky were honored with All-American Second Team honors. Four of the six members of the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame were on the Seminoles' National Championship team including Young, Bunkowsky, Guilbault and Geddes.



When Tricia Covel, the wife of country music mega-star Toby Keith, came up with the idea of starting a golf tournament to raise funds for the OK Kids Korral for pediatric cancer patients, they brought 12 invitations to the Women's Golf Coaches Association's Annual Conference in 2012. When one of those 12 invitations was presented to Seminole head coach Amy Bond, she knew she had hit the jackpot.

"I was so excited for our program to have been chosen as one of the schools to play in the inaugural Schooner Fall Classic in 2013," said Bond. "It is truly an honor to play in this event; one that I and the members of my team look forward to each season. The tournament has developed into one of the top events in women's college golf but, truthfully, it's about so much more than three great days on the golf course."

The Toby Keith Foundation was started in 2006 and supports the OK Kids Korral – a 25,000 square foot facility in Oklahoma City. The Korral is dedicated exclusively to serving the needs of pediatric cancer patients. This cost-free home away from home facility has 16 guest suites, a gourmet kitchen, playground and an indoor theatre.









COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Florida State University women's golf team has won the prestigious Athletic Director's Cup for Community Service in 13 of the last 15 years. The award is presented each year at the Golden 'Nole Banquet – one of the most important banquets of the year for all of Florida State's student athletes.

The Athletic Director's Cup for Service began during the 1996-1997 academic year in order to promote community service participation among all teams. The annual award recognizes the thousands of hours of community service Florida State studentathletes donate each year. Seminole student-athletes logged more than 6,100 community service hours in 2016 - an increase of 500 hours from last year.

"Community service is very important to my teammates and me," said senior Sherrell Buckley. "We make it a point to give back to the community ay time we have the chance. We are so very fortunate to be able to be student-athletes at Florida State and play the sport we love as Seminoles. With this privilege comes the responsibility to help others. We have the chance to help influence young lives in our community and we like to take advantage of every opportunity we have to help other."

During the 2015-16 school year, the women's golf team combined for 287 total hours of community service for an average of over 26.0 hours per team member.

"Giving back to the community of one of the most rewarding things we do as a team," said head coach Amy Bond. "We are very blessed to be members of the Florida State community and everyone is very supportive of us. It's nice to have the opportunity to spend time with others and raise funds for special causes. The best thing about serving our community is being in the community and encouraging togetherness. We enjoy that aspect of being members of the FSU family and make giving our time to others a regular part of our schedule."

The women's golf team annually participates in the Tee Off for Tots Tournament presented by the Tallahassee Memorial Hospital Healthcare Foundation. The Seminoles help raise charitable gifts and sponsorships that positively influence the medical outcomes of thousands of thousands of infants, children and their families. The annual event is held at Golden Eagle Country Club in Tallahassee and is in its 23rd year of raising money for those families in need of support for young children.











ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 65th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 150 national championships, including 75 in men's competition and 74 in women's and one in men's and women's fencing. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 169 times in men's competition and 134 times in women's action.

In the sport of women's golf, Duke is second in all-time NCAA championships with its six titles (1999, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2014), only trailing Arizona State's eight. Miami claimed one NCAA national title in 1984, before joining the ACC. Duke is third in NCAA individual champions, claiming four national medalists - Candy Hannemann (2001), Virada Nirapathpongporn (2002), Anna Grzebien (2005) and Virginia Elena Carta (2016).

The conference recognized women's golf as a conference sport in 1984-1986 when a minimum of four teams (Duke, North Carolina, NC State and Wake Forest) competed. After a five-year hiatus, women's golf became a sponsored sport once again in 1992 with Duke, Florida State, North Carolina and Wake Forest competing. NC State joined in 2001.

Duke has won 20 ACC championships, followed by Wake Forest (five), Virginia (two) and North Carolina (two). Duke leads the schools in ACC individual championships with 17, followed by Wake Forest (seven), Virginia (two) and North Carolina (two). Duke held off Florida State to win the 2017 ACC team championship while Leona Maguire of Duke won the individual title.

Florida State finished in a program record tying second place in 2017 – the fourth time in school history the Seminoles had finished in second place in the ACC Championships. The second place finish marked the best finish under seventh-year head coach Amy Bond. Florida State has now finished in the top-five of the ACC Championships five times in seven years under Bond including three fourth place finishes in 2012, 2013 and 2015

An ACC-record 10 women's golf teams (Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Louisville, Miami, Notre Dame, North Carolina, NC State, Virginia and Wake Forest) were represented at the NCAA Regionals in 2016. The ACC sent eight teams to the NCAA Division I Championship in 2017.

The 12 schools that will carry the ACC banner this season have produced 81 first or second team All-Americans, six National Player of the Years, five WGCA Division I Players of the Year, four national Freshmen of the Year and six National Coaches of the Year.
