A Note to the Media, Fans and Opponents

Seminole Soccer contact Mandi Copeland of the Florida State University Sports Information Office is ready to assist you with any questions or requests you may have about the 1999 Seminole Soccer program, media guide, coaches and student-athletes. HOW TO COVER THE SEMINOLES

Members of the media are supplied with weekly press releases, including updated individual tournament and career statistics, as well as conference and national rankings and information on upcoming matches or events. Results and statistics may be obtained in the sports information office or off the Atlantic Coast Conference's faxback system. Pertinent team and player information will also be available at the Seminole Soccer/ Softball Complex for all home matches. If you would like to schedule personal interviews with the coaches or players contact Copeland in the FSU Sports Information office at least 24 hours in advance. Coach Baker is generally available in his office during weekday afternoons. Athletes home phone numbers will not be released.

WHERE THE HOME MATCHES WILL BE

All 1999 Seminole Soccer home matches take place at the Seminole Soccer/ Softball Complex (capacity 1000). The soccer field is located just south of the FSU football practice field off of Stadium drive. Media members will be provided parking passes and will be seated in a designated area. Please notify the sports information office prior to home matches for credentials to be assigned. Any accredited photographer wishing to shoot the matches must check in with Copeland prior to gameday so proper credentials can be assigned.

JUST A NOTE OF INTEREST

When figuring out the FSU goalkeepers' goals against attempted average take the number of goals scored against the FSU goalie, multiply the figure

by 90, then divide by the goalkeeper's minutes played (goals scored * 90/minutes played). In order to figure out the goalie save percentage, divide the FSU goalkeeper's number of saves by that same number of saves plus goals scored against her (saves/ saves + goals).

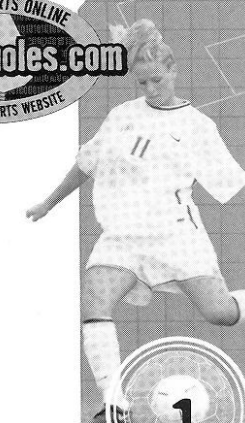

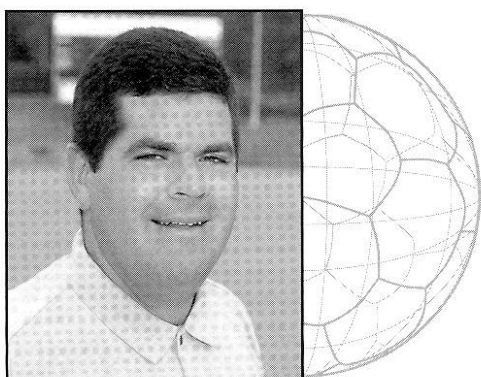

Patrick Baker

Head Coach

Otterbein College - 1989
1st season at FSU

Patrick Baker enters his first year as the head coach at Florida State University, becoming only the second coach in the young program's history.

During his five years at the University of Pennsylvania Baker established a 42-37-5 record. Baker led the 1997 squad to the best finish in school history as they finished 14-5-0 and were crowned the ECAC Champions and was named the 1997 Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year. Baker served on the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Division I Mid-Atlantic Rankings committee from 1995 to 1998 and served on the Intercollegiate Soccer Coaches Association of America (ISAA) South Region Rankings Committee from 1990 to 1993.

Baker is also a noted member of the United States Youth Soccer community. He currently serves as the U.S. Youth Soccer Association South Region Coach and has attended South Region Olympic Development (ODP) camps since 1990. Baker has a total of 12 years experience at all levels of the Olympic Development Program. He served four years at the U-14 state level in North Carolina and was the 1996 U-17 ODP state coach for Pennsylvania. Baker coached the U-16 and U-18 ODP South Regional camps for eight years and was the assistant coach for the U-17 South Region team from 1991-93. Baker was the U.S. South Region Amateur coach for five years where he received the national coach of the year award in 1994.

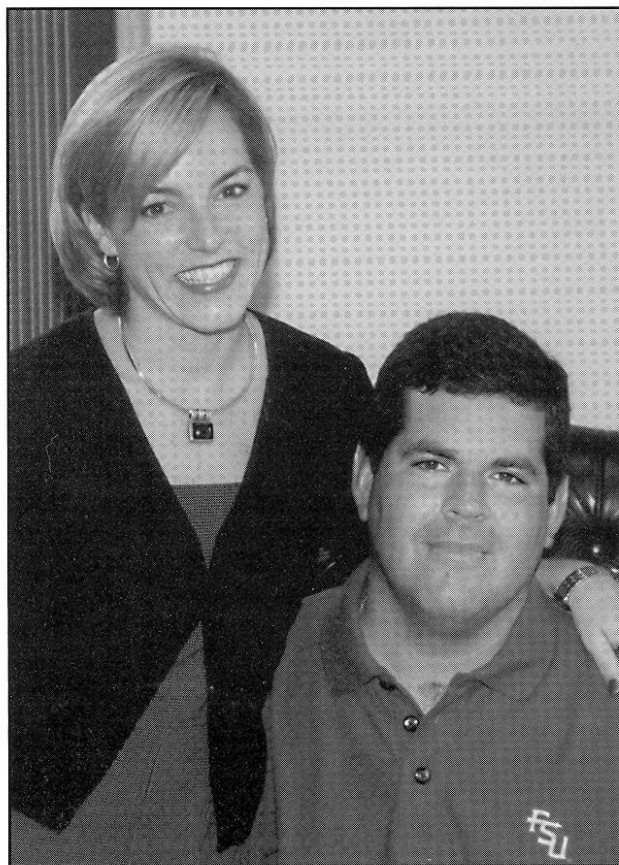
Baker continues to assist head coach Lauren Gregg with the women's national team for the third consecutive year. He served as Gregg's assistant for the U-20 national team

the past two years and was recently named the assistant coach for the 1999 U-21 women's national team.

Prior to his head coaching stint at the University of Pennsylvania, Baker achieved much success at the Division III level where he coached North Carolina Wesleyan to three NCAA Division III tournament appearances and Top 10 finishes. He compiled a 45-21-4 in his five years and was twice named the Dixie Conference coach of the year. In 1991, Baker was named the National Soccer Coaches of America Association's Division III South Region Coach of the Year. He was the NCAA Division III South Region Committee in 1993 as well as a member of the NCAA Division III South Region Tournament Committee

Baker received his Bachelor of Arts from Otterbein College in 1989 where he was a starter all four years for the men's soccer team and was named team captain as a senior.

He is married to Kelly Sack, the former head women's soccer coach at Rider University.



Coach Baker Q & A

Why did you choose to come to FSU?

It was tough to leave the University of Pennsylvania, but I felt we could compete and eventually win a national championship here at Florida State. The new facility makes our complex the best in the country and we already play in the very competitive Atlantic Coast Conference. Hearing the commitment the athletic administration has for women's soccer was very exciting and something that I wanted to be a part of. I get to be in a great state with fantastic weather, offer young ladies the opportunity to attend a wonderful university and receive an education, coach in the premier women's soccer conference and build another nationally-recognized program.

What are some of the key ingredients in turning a program around?

I feel the most important ingredient is recruiting. It doesn't matter how good of a coach you are; if you don't have the horses- you will lose the race. Recruiting is 70 percent of the game now. Being competitive and winning is another essential part of the process. If you can be competitive with your first recruiting class and then build a foundation of winning seasons, that helps a great deal. Developing a system of play that is attractive to watch and one that players want to play in is what attracts the athletes as well as providing a positive internal coaching structure for the players to work with and develop from. Building individual and team confidence and establishing team unity is key in becoming a successful team.

What do you see as a time table for building a successful program at FSU?

I would like for people to first understand that takes some time to build a top program. We won't be a Top 15 team overnight but I give myself and my staff three to four recruiting classes. The team will concentrate this year on being fit, organized, passionate and trying to play a quality style of soccer. Our early recruiting signees for the 2000 season have been extremely positive and hopefully that interest will continue into the 2001 class. Winning will help that time table- success at Florida State will breed success. Once we have that break out year, the challenge will be to maintain that level. We would like to be in the NCAA Tournament by 2000 and hopefully have the entire conference see post season play by 2003.

What has the new complex done for the program?

It legitimizes our program as one that is taking women's soccer very seriously. This is the best women's soccer complex in the country. We have the field of dreams in a beautiful stadium setting. There are days when it looks too good to be true. Having the offices and lockerrooms at the facility makes our complex all inclusive. You don't have to leave for anything; our players have everything at one site. It really is our home away from home and it's a pleasure to come to this brand new setting very morning. When recruits come on campus and see the commitment visually, they will realize that this is going to be a special place to play and a program on the rise.

Before coming to Florida State you built two programs to the national level. Talk about building those two programs and what it took to build them:

I started with North Carolina Wesleyan in Rocky Mount, N.C., which is a small liberal arts college. We promoted a wonderful soccer complex, great weather, a good education with small class sizes and the opportunity to play right away. Not to mention, we played Duke, North Carolina and NC State and it was before the big increase in women's soccer programs. Having played high school and college soccer in Ohio, we blanketed that state in recruiting and garnered some very good players. Interestingly enough, we never had a player from North Carolina.

They were from Ohio, Maryland, Texas, Georgia, New York and Florida. We had a breakout year with my second recruiting class and never dropped out of the Top 10 the following three years. Being able to eventually sell people on the idea of playing for a Division III national championship really helped us maintain our level of excellence.

From there I was hired at Penn to do what I had done at NCWC- take a losing program and make it a winner. Our region consisted of Maryland, Virginia, William and Mary, Penn State, James Madison, to name a few and winning at the Division I level was tougher than at the Division III level. We implemented the same recruiting process and our first class in the Ivy League provided Penn with their first ever winning season. I learned a valuable lesson that next year because we lost. We didn't maintain a focus or intensity. Then in 1997 we went 14-5-0 with three of our losses on the road to Duke, Maryland and North Carolina. We were crowned ECAC Champions and were runners-up in the Ivy League. Last fall was another solid season with a 12-4-1 overall record and a #6 finish in the regional rankings.

Aside from the collegiate field, you have been active in the Olympic Development Program (ODP). What is it like being the South Region ODP coach?

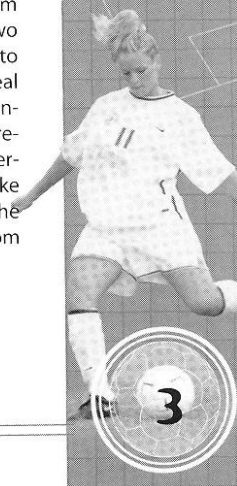
Being the head coach of the Region III ODP program is a huge honor. When I think of the coaches across our great region, I'm certainly dumbfounded that I was given this great opportunity. The toughest thing to do as the regional coach is to hold myself accountable for every player in our three weeks of camp over the summer. I try to approach each week with the intention of watching each player. The inter-regional events are great because we see how successful our selection process has been. Any time you can call a young lady and let her know she has been selected to a national pool or team, her reaction is pretty special to see.

You have also served on a National Level with the U-21 women's national team. What has the experience of working with Head Coach Lauren Gregg and the team been like?

When Lauren called me to assist her, it was one of the biggest days of my life. You see the national teams play and I help our regional players get to that next level, but I never thought I would be selected to help with a national age group. We won the Nordic Cup this past August and I was so happy for Lauren and the players. Working with that kind of talent on a daily basis is incredible. The future of our full national team is very bright when you see the developing talent at the U-21 level. I had never been an assistant to someone before, but I learned a lot from Lauren and about what it takes to be successful at the international level. The experience was worth its weight in gold.

After 10 years of college coaching, how would you describe yourself as a coach?

Well, after a decade of being a head coach, I feel like I'm a program builder. Coaches, like players, have a track record over time and at two separate schools we have taken losing teams and turned them into nationally recognized programs. I care about my players a great deal and they know they can come to me with anything- soccer or non-soccer related. I'm open and honest with my team and feel they respond to me in the same way. I like to work hard and try to be a perfectionist at a number of things. I see myself as a solid recruiter. I like players with personality, good character, a sense of humor and the desire to be successful on and off the field. I always ask more from myself than I ever do of my players.

1st season at FSU

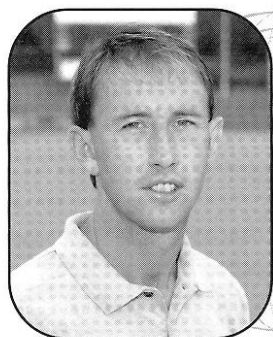
Lauren Cyran enters her first year as an assistant coach for the Florida State soccer program after spending one year under Coach Baker at the University of Pennsylvania. She will serve as the recruiting coordinator for the soccer program and will assist with on the field duties.

Cyran served as assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania for the 1998 season where she worked with all aspects of the program. She served as the recruiting coordinator as well as playing an active part in the on the field training and practices. Prior to joining Penn, Cyran was the head coach of a Durham, North Carolina Under-12 girls soccer team for two years and served as the assistant coach with the Lakewood Fury's Under-15 soccer team. She also was a coach at the Duke University soccer camp in 1996 and served three years as an instructor for the Lakewood Fury's soccer camp.

A native of Littleton, Colorado, Cyran graduated from Duke University in 1998 with a bachelor's in public policy studies. As a four-year letterwinner, she garnered Second-Team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in 1994 and 1997 and served as the team captain her junior and senior years. Cyran was also named Rookie of the Year in 1994 and the team's MVP defender as a junior.

As a member of the 1996 and 1997 Western Regional Champion Denver Diamonds during the summer, Cyran was named team captain both years and was named to the 1997 all-star team. She also played one season with the Colorado Lakewood Fury, an Under-20 USWISL team, and served as the team captain.

Cyran will work towards her masters degree in higher education administration during her time at Florida State.



Darren Ambrose

Assistant Coach
USC Spartanburg - 1993
1st season at FSU

Assistant Coach Darren Ambrose comes to the Florida State soccer program after spending three years as an assistant coach for the women's and men's soccer programs at Rhodes in Memphis, Tennessee. At FSU, Ambrose will be responsible for goalkeeper training and working with academics and coordinating administrative duties.

During his tenure at Rhodes, Ambrose was an integral part of the success of both programs that had a combined record of 77-33-3, one Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) Championship, two NCAA tournament appearances and three second place finishes in the SCAC. His responsibilities included recruiting, team and goalkeeper training and numerous administrative duties.

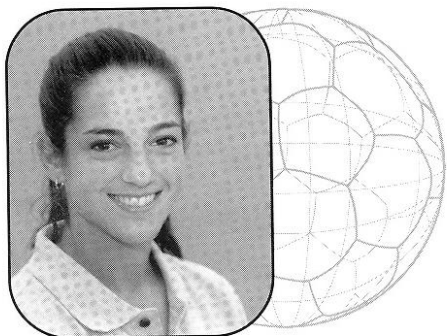
Ambrose has also been active in the youth soccer community. As head coach of the Memphis FC '81 girls, Ambrose led the squad to second place in the State Cup in 1997 and a State Championship 1998. He has served as a regional staff coach for the Olympic Development Program in regions II and III and was a Tennessee ODP state staff coach from 1993-95. He holds both the USSF A License and the NSCAA Advanced National Diploma.

Born near Sheffield, England, Ambrose began playing soccer with the youth programs of Sheffield United of the English League first division and Doncaster Rovers of the English League third division and participated on the English Schools Regional Team. He came to the United States in 1989 to play goalkeeper for USC-Spartanburg. He was named the Adidas National Player of the Year in 1992-93 and was the first USCS player to be named a GTE Academic All-American. Ambrose also carried USCS Outstanding Senior Student-Athlete honors in 1992-93.

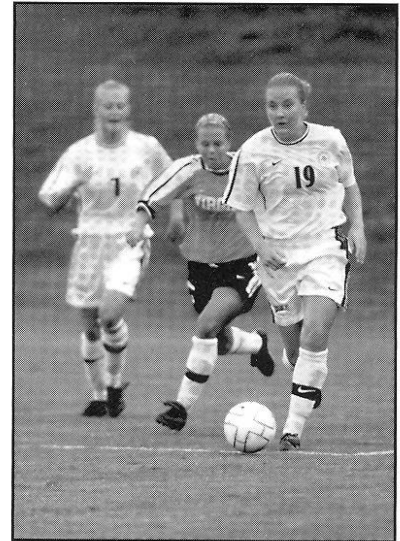

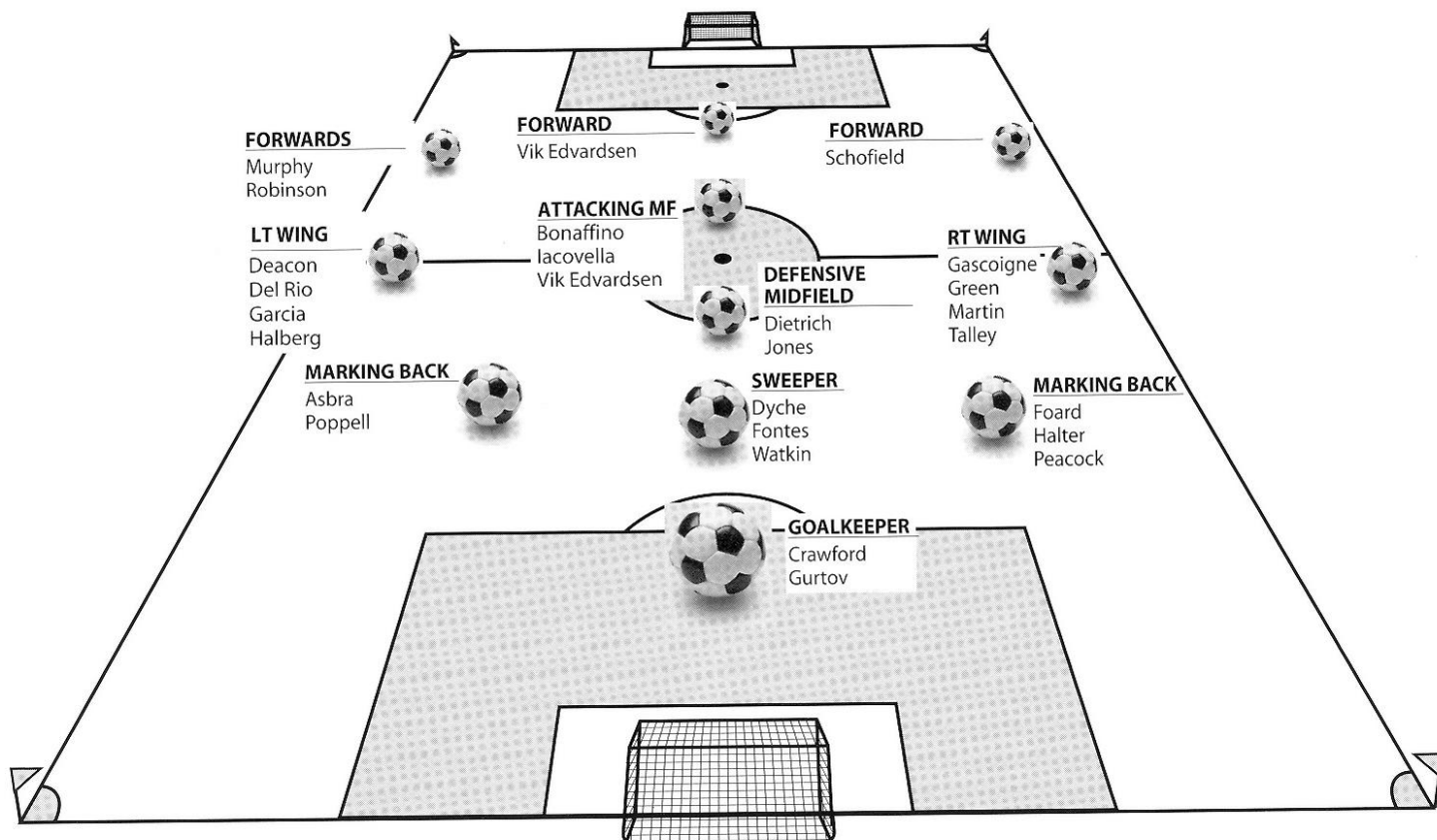

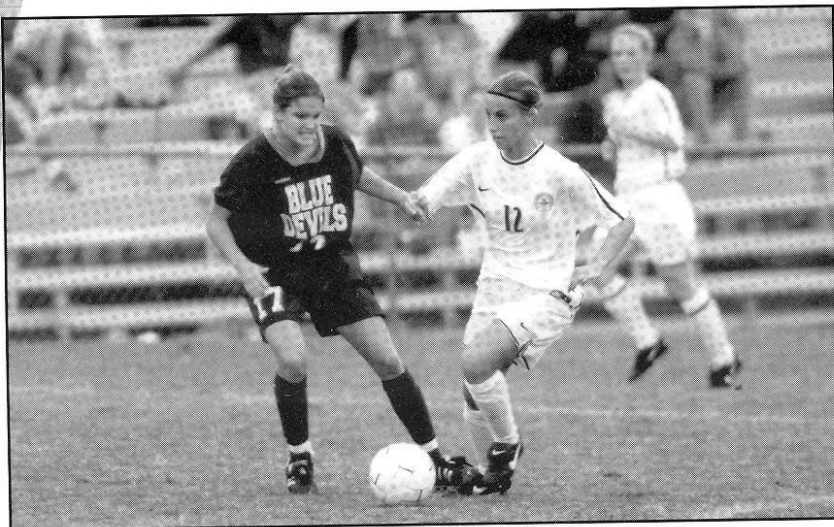

1999 Outlook



New faces, new coaches, a new facility and a new season. With all the new happenings for Florida State women's soccer, the 1999 season looks to be filled with excitement and promise.

The 1999 team looks to improve on last year's 7-11-3 mark under new Head Coach Patrick Baker. The Seminoles graduated their program's first recruiting class last spring and lost seven solid performers but return a good nucleus of players. Four seniors will lead the 13-member recruiting class into what will be an exciting fall in Tallahassee.

Perhaps the most obvious difference in the program is Baker and his coaching staff. Baker came to Florida State from the University of Pennsylvania, bringing with him a decade of collegiate coaching and a solid background in the youth soccer community. "Hearing the commitment the athletic administration has for women's soccer was very exciting and something that I wanted to be a part of," Baker said. "I get to be in a great state with fantastic weather, offer young ladies the opportunity to attend a wonderful university and receive an education, coach in a premier women's soccer conference and build another nationally recognized program."

When Baker came to Florida State, he brought Lauren Cyran with him. Cyran assisted Baker at Penn after graduating from Duke University in 1998. He also added Darren Ambrose, who comes to FSU from Rhodes College, while graduate assistant Natalie Rich completes the coaching staff.

The 1999 season marks the first full season for the Seminoles in the new Seminole Soccer Complex. The facility houses soccer and softball and includes a press box, con-

cessions stand and a team building with team and visiting rooms, training and equipment rooms, a large work area and coaches offices which overlook their respective fields.

"We have a field of dreams," Baker said. "There are days when it looks too good to be true. You don't have to leave for anything and our players have everything at one site. It really is our home away from home."

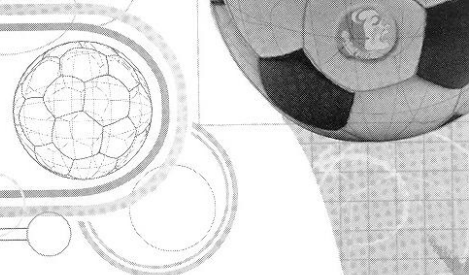
Thirteen new faces don the young Seminole roster. The coaching staff will look to the senior leadership of Jamie Gurtov, Angela Bonaffino and Leslie Del Rio to take the Seminoles into a successful year. Gurtov led the ACC last year in goalie saves and was fourth in save percentage. Along with the three returning seniors are seven returning juniors and three sophomores, including Maren Vik Edvardsen. Vik Edvardsen broke into the Seminole record book, scoring four goals against Furman to break the single game record for goals scored in a game.

The 11 freshmen have the opportunity to make an immediate impact with the loss of seven seniors from the 1998 squad. Leading the newcomers will be Gina Iacovella, a senior from Prospect, Conn., who spent her first three years at the University of South Carolina. Sarah Crawford, a junior from Lilburn, Ga., came to FSU from Georgia State where she spent two years in goal for the Golden Panthers. The group of newcomers also includes Cindy Schofield, a freshman from Lakeland, Fla., who holds the Florida high school record for most goals in a career (238) as well as holding the second spot nationally in career goals.

Adding more flare to a season of change will be a strong schedule as the Seminoles open the season at National Champion Florida on August 27. FSU will open its home season with Miami on August 29. Other non-conference opponents on the season's slate include Georgia, who is ranked 22nd in the NSCAA preseason poll, as well as Wright State and Texas A&M. The Seminoles will also take on in-state rivals Jacksonville, Stetson, South Florida and Florida International.

The Seminoles will look to become a factor in the always-challenging Atlantic Coast Conference race. NC State, Duke and Maryland will visit Tallahassee while the Seminoles will travel to preseason ranked #1 North Carolina, #12 Clemson, #18 Virginia, and #23 Wake Forest.

Position Breakdown



FORWARDS:

The Seminole forwards will be a young attacking squad comprised of one junior, one sophomore and two freshmen. These four will provide the offense on the scoring end of the field.

Sophomore Maren Vik Edvardsen will be the main front runner for the Seminoles this fall. The Norwegian had a very good spring and should be a scoring threat all year long with her technical game and ability to read the game at a very high level. Vik Edvardsen made an immediate impact as a rookie as she broke into the record book in the first game of the season last year with her four goals against Furman. She broke the single game record for goals as well as notching a spot in the Top 20 in the country in single game goals and also set records for most points in a game (8) and tied the records for most goals in the 1st and 2nd half (2 each) and the most points in the 1st half (4). Junior April Murphy also returns at the forward position. Murphy has the ability to change the complexion of the game with her speed and will compete for a starting position. She added four goals and two assists last season and has the quickness and ability to score goals quickly, which will be an asset this fall.

Freshman Cindy Schofield and Amanda Green could also make an immediate impact in the 1999 season. Schofield holds the Florida state high school record for most goals in a career with 238 and also holds the second spot in the country in career goals. Her ability to take a player one-on-one and move through a defense will be an important part of the Seminole attack. Green, a native of Safety Harbor, Fla., will add to the offense with her athleticism. She adds a physical presence and powerful shot to the line-up.

MIDFIELD:

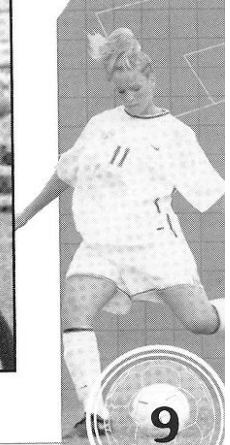
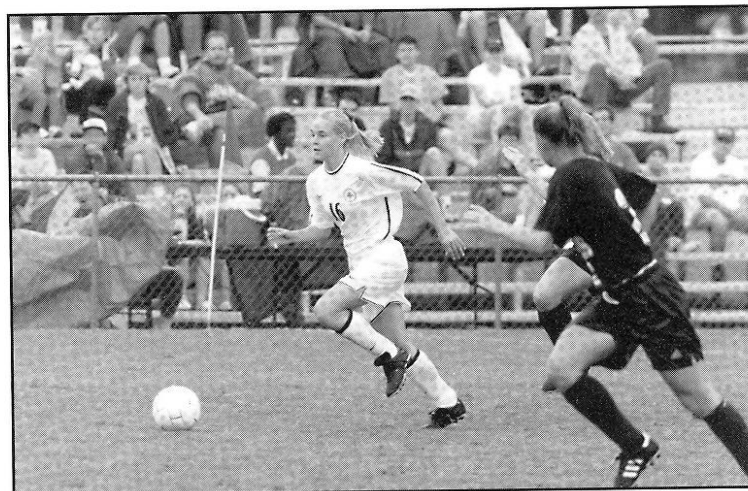
The midfield, like the forward line, will be a blend of old and new faces alike. With the veteran's experience and younger players adding depth, the Seminole midfield will be something to reckon with.

Returning centrally for her senior year will be Angela Bonaffino who will be a key in running the show for the Seminoles. Her solid technical skills and vision give her the ability to score out of the midfield. Sophomore Marte Vik Edvardsen also returns to the attacking midfield. Her solid work ethic and passing skills paired with her ability to

get the ball behind opponent's defenses help in setting up her teammates to get into scoring position. Joining the veterans in the central midfield will be senior Gina Iacovella, a transfer from South Carolina. A very skillful player, Iacovella brings her experience, determination and composure on the ball to the team.

Also returning in the central midfield will be defensive midfielder Stephanie Dietrich. The junior has the defensive pressure, ability to win balls in the air, and is a strong tackler who uses her technique to push the ball upfield or win the one-on-one situations. The lone freshman at the defensive midfield position who will see playing time is Meredith Jones, who followed Baker to the sunshine state from West Chester, Pa. She will be a valuable addition to the Florida State program. With her high work rate, great understanding of the game and skill on the ball, Jones should make an immediate impact on the midfield. Ansley Gascoigne and Trish Martin, both freshman, will add depth at the central midfield.

The wide midfield positions will contain a junior and two freshmen at the forefront. Junior Sarah Deacon will lead the wide positions with her creative one-on-one and wide playing abilities and will be a major contributor this fall. Freshmen Janey Hallberg and Katie Talley will also see time at the wide midfield positions. Hallberg, who comes to Florida State from Longwood, Fla., had a great preseason and is a very dynamic player on the wing. She has a complete game with good skills, vision and understanding with the ability to score goals. Talley, who played for the Top Hat club in Georgia, will challenge at the wing position as well. She is a talented player with pace and skill and will be counted on in 1999.



Position Breakdown

DEFENSE:

The defense should be a strong area for Florida State this fall as the Seminoles return six veterans and welcomes four new faces to the backfield.

Junior Rachael Watkin will anchor the defense and lead the sweeper position. Watkin, who started all 21 matches last season at the sweeper position, will use her experience and knowledge of the game to lead the defense. Her composure on the ball and maturity will be crucial in the success of the defense as well as her confidence to attack from the back, as she proved last year with the game-winning goal against Auburn. Nebraska transfer Heather Dyche will join Watkin at the sweeper position and will battle for the starting spot. Dyche, who scored the game-winning goal against Mercer, adds an excellent touch and control as well as accuracy in serving the ball and playing it out of the backfield.

Perhaps the most physical player on the Seminole squad, junior Danielle Foard will start as an outside marking back. Her aggressiveness and speed are two attributes that makes her one of the tougher players. Foard's ability to penetrate forward in the attack adds an additional element to her game. Senior Leslie Del Rio will see significant time at the marking back position after playing mainly as an outside midfielder throughout her career. Her quickness and tenacity are solid additions to the backfield. Junior Ashley Halter will also contend for time at the marking back position with her steadiness, experience and dominance in the air. Sophomore Christy Peacock will also vie for time in the backfield, adding versatility and a strong work ethic.

Three freshmen will add depth to the Seminole defense. Rookie Ashlee Fontes from Rochester Hills, Mich., will provide extra depth in the central defense. She is a strong player in the one-on-one defending situation and has

accurate distribution out of the back third of the field. Courtney Asbra from Arlington, Texas, will solidify and re-enforce the back-line with her solid distribution of the ball and tactical awareness. Jessica Poppell, who recently moved to Fernandina Beach, Fla., brings excellent distribution of the ball and composure on the field to the defense and will add strength this season.

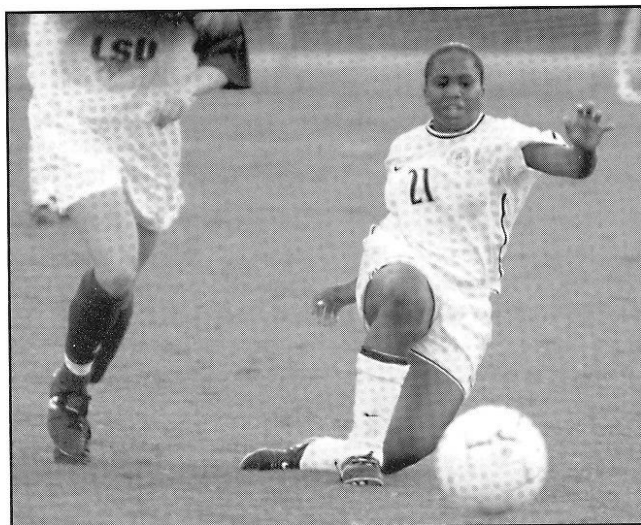
GOALKEEPERS:

The goalkeeper position will be one filled with talent and experience this season as Seminole veteran Jamie Gurtov and newcomer Sarah Crawford defend the Florida State goal. Both goalkeepers bring good match experience and are capable of handling the goalkeeping duties for the Seminoles this year.

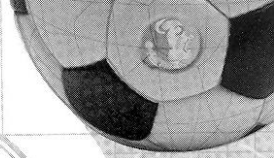
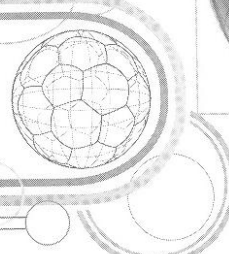
Gurtov returns for her senior campaign after a solid spring season but will be challenged for the starting role. She won the starting position and started in 20 games last season, nabbing 108 saves and recording a 2.01 goals against average. Gurtov also led the ACC in saves and was fourth in save percentage

at 72 percent in 1998. She has the technical ability to make the big saves when called upon.

Crawford is a newcomer to the Seminole roster but is an experienced goalkeeper on the collegiate level. A native of Lilburn, Ga., Crawford comes to Florida State by way of Georgia State where she was a two-year starter for the Golden Panthers. She started in all 38 matches she appeared, racking up 194 saves and 14.5 shutouts. Crawford reads the game at a very high level and has a tremendous physical and vocal presence in the goal area.

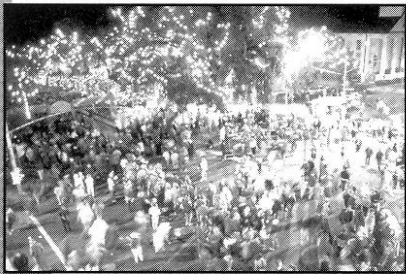


This is Tallahassee



Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as “The Other Florida” with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida’s capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.



Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs, site of America’s first

Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee’s spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee’s Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five “official” canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

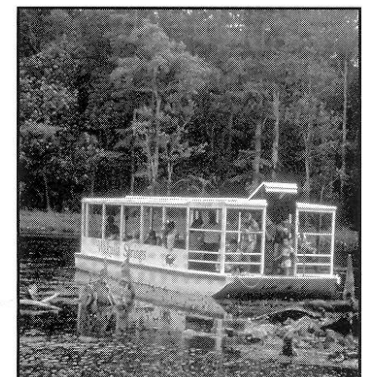
Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called “tallahassee” — derived from the words “talwa” meaning town and “ahasee” meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida’s capital.

The “old town” has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee’s perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran’s Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida’s oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for free — unheard of even 100 years ago.



Minutes from downtown lies the Governor’s Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida’s military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and

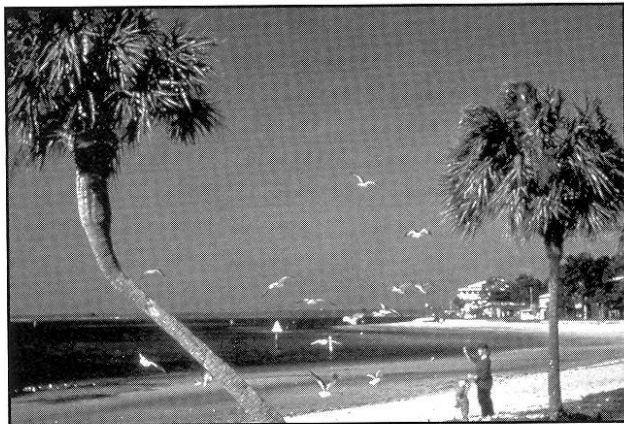


1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest fresh water springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the



Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

TALLAHASSEE'S AN ALL-AMERICA CITY! On June 26, judges from the National Civic League named Tallahassee as one of 10 cities to win the prestigious All-America City (AAC) award from the 1999 All-America City conference in Philadelphia. The All-America City award is the most prestigious and coveted award a community can win. The annual award recognizes exemplary, grassroots and problem-solving efforts of communities that cooperatively tackle challenges and achieve measurable results. Judging is based on the overall level of community involvement in solving critical local problems, including public-private partnerships.

"This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee," said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. "For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long — that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!"



This is FSU



Florida State University, recently celebrating its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a **"Research University I"** by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.

- In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 — with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale — of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."

- Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the **National High Magnetic Field Laboratory** at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The **world's largest magnet** — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the **off-campus research complex**, Innovation Park.

In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The **Card Application Technology Center** is a national leader in "smart card" systems.

- At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired **two supercomputers**, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.

- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million **University Center**, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

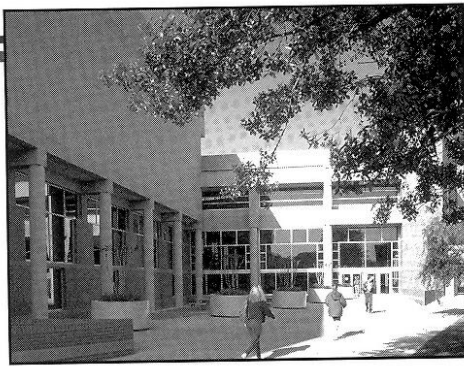
- In 1990, Florida State **ranked second in popularity nationwide** among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.

- FSU's high-tech program in **structural biology** in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million.

- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed **"Seminoles,"** joined the **Atlantic Coast Conference** as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the **1993 National Championship** and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first **Heisman Trophy**.

- The **Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center**, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball





1991 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African Americans.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is excelling in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, **Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte**, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member **State University System**, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is **\$474.3 million**. Faculty and administrators generate more than **\$102 million** annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: **FSU Foundation**, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, **Seminole Boosters** and **FSU Alumni Association**.

The main campus is spread over **451.6 acres in Tallahassee**; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its **25-acre campus in Panama City**, its **Marine Laboratory** on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The **Center for Professional Development and Public Service**, housed in the **Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center** on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers **286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs** through its **eight colleges** — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University,

and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and **eight schools** — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

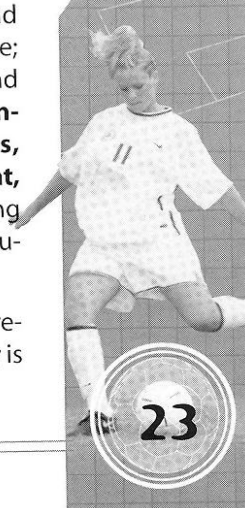
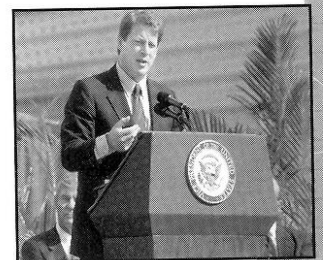
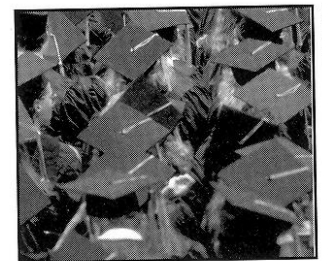
With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included **nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates**. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include **2.1 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.5 million micro-forms**. The main library facility, the **Robert M. Strozier Library**, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The **Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library** is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its **30,519 students** and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students). The **University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus** and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — **Florida State University** is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.

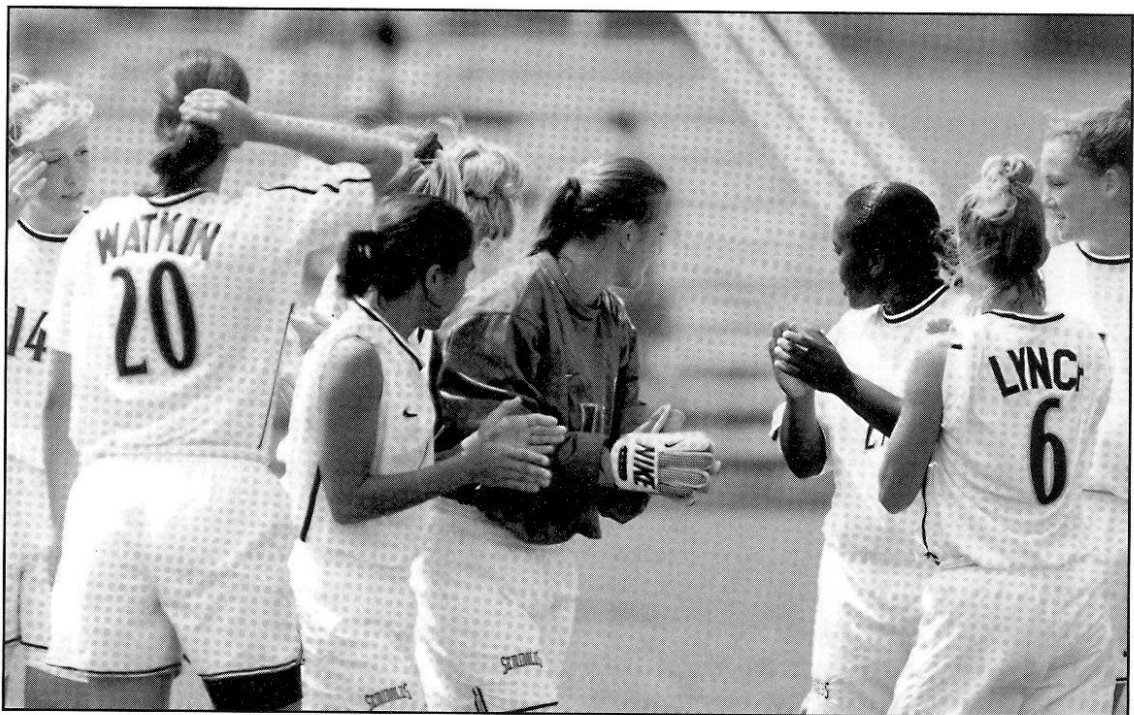
Since fielding its first women's team in 1968, Florida State University has continued to build a rich tradition in women's intercollegiate athletics. FSU began with volleyball and track and field in the early days and by 1975, supported seven intercollegiate women's teams. In 1995, Florida State introduced its ninth women's varsity sport as the women's soccer team took the field for the first time.

Seminole soccer competes in the Atlantic Coast Conference, which includes some of the toughest teams in the nation. The ACC boasts the 10-time National Champion North Carolina Tar Heels as well as other top ranked teams such as Virginia, Duke and NC State who have all reached the final four of the NCAA tournament. The conference has also had many players placed on the NCAA All-Tournament Team as well as having players named NSCAA All-Americans and tournament MVP's.

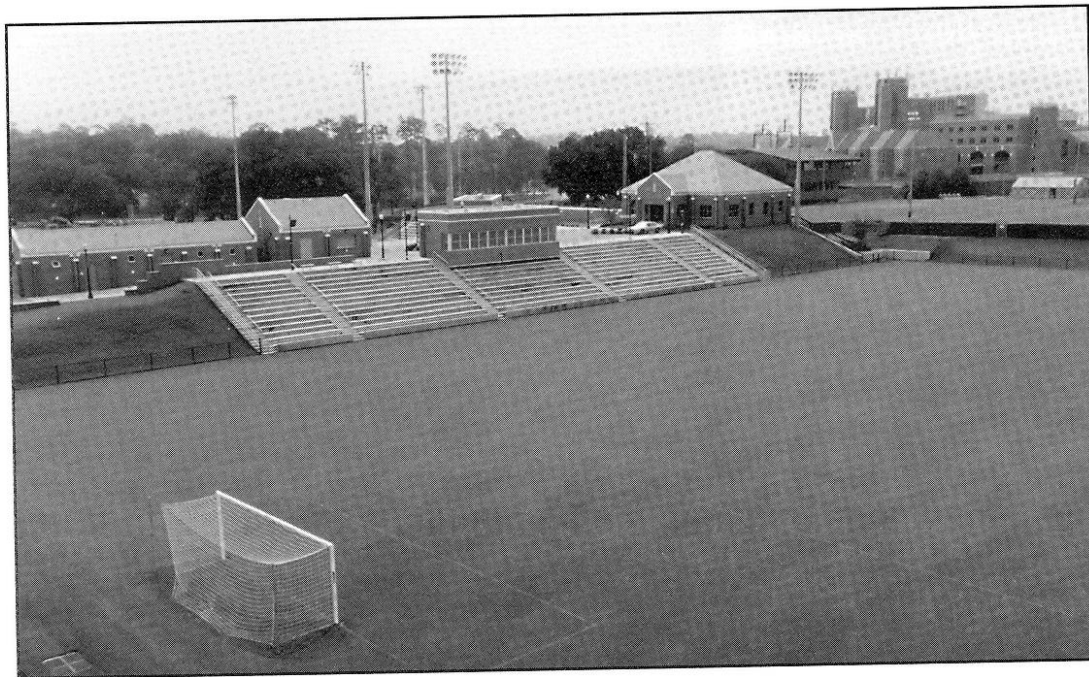
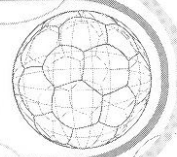
Along with their success on the field, the Seminoles have seen their experience as a student-athlete expand in the classroom. Seventeen women's soccer players garnered the All-ACC academic honors last season, including seven ladies who appeared on the honor roll for more than one year.

Soccer Complex



In 1995, Florida State introduced women's soccer as the 17th varsity sport. As a new state-of-the-art complex was in the planning stages, the team played its first three seasons on a renovated intramural field while Tully Gym housed the Seminole lockerroom. By the spring of 1998, Florida State's dream of a new complex began to become reality as ground was broken for the new facility and construction began. Although the facility was not completed, the Seminoles began playing on their new field in the fall of 1998. The 1999 season will mark the first full season in the new Seminole Soccer Complex, which is regarded as one of the nation's best with a new its top playing surface.

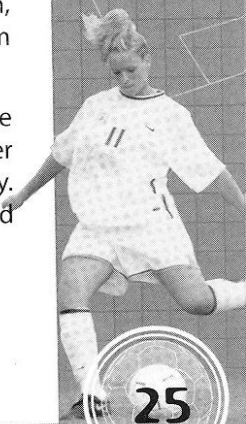
"We have the field of dreams in a beautiful stadium setting," Head Coach Patrick Baker said. "There are days when it looks too good to be true. Having the offices and lockerrooms at the facility makes our complex all inclusive. You don't have to leave for anything. Our players have everything at one site. It really is our home away from home."

The complex includes ticket and concession buildings and a spacious press box, including press seating and radio/television booths. The two-level team building houses the coaches offices which overlook their respec-



tive stadiums, a reception area, a combined workroom, large team and coaches lockerrooms, visiting team lockerrooms, and training and equipment rooms.

The Seminole Soccer Complex, which also houses the FSU Softball Complex, is located in between Dick Howser Baseball Stadium and Mike Long Track on Chieftan Way. The facility can be accessed from both Chieftan Way and Stadium Drive.



1998 in Review

In its first season at the new Seminole Soccer Complex, the Florida State's women soccer team, led by seven members of the inaugural team, made some great strides in 1998. The Seminoles won an ACC match, defeated a Top 25 ranked team and had several players break into the ACC and NCAA statistics.

FSU began the season with a 4-2 win over the Furman Paladins as freshman Maren Vik Edvardsen led the way with four goals. Vik Edvardsen, from Oslo, Norway, broke into the FSU record book as she took the individual game record for most points (8) and most goals (4). She also tied the record for most first half points (4) and most first and second half goals (2 each). Her four goals also put her among the top in the NCAA individual stats. The Seminoles beat Syracuse 3-2 at the Georgia Invitational before Georgia gave FSU its first loss of the season in the tournament's championship game.

Despite a solid performance, Seminoles opened the ACC season with a 4-3 overtime loss to #6 Virginia. Followed were losses to #1 North Carolina, Clemson and Wake Forest (1-3). The Seminoles tied Georgia State 1-1, lost to Miami 2-4, played two double overtime games where they tied South Florida 1-1 and defeated Florida International 1-0 and lost to Jacksonville 1-2.

The turning point for the Seminoles was the Florida match on October 13. The Seminoles hosted the Gators in front of a crowd of 1,046 and made the show worth



their while. Florida State held the eventual National Champion Gators to one goal until the final minute of the game and despite the 2-0 loss, the match was the best showing of the season for the Seminoles. Two days later FSU, shut out Stetson 4-0 and then traveled to #15 Maryland where the Seminoles got their first ACC win of the season and first ACC win since 1996 as they took a 3-2 win in overtime from the Terrapins. FSU completed their ACC regular season with a 0-0 double overtime tie with Duke and a 2-1 loss to N.C. State.

The Seminoles returned home for a "Curtain Call" for eight seniors as Florida State hosted Auburn. This match was extra special for the eight seniors, including seven of the inaugural members from 1995, as this was the last time these ladies would take the field at Florida State. Three seniors made their final game a special one as Jill Ford, Alex Osorio and Lauren Lynch each scored a goal in the convincing 6-1 win.

Florida State went into the ACC Tournament as the seventh seed and despite a 2-0 loss to Virginia, the Seminoles finished the season on a high note. With a 7-10-3 record, FSU finished seventh in the ACC, breaking out of the last place finish for the first time since the program began. Maren Vik Edvardsen ended the season in the NCAA Top 20 for most goals scored in a game and goalkeeper Jamie Gurtov topped the ACC in saves while holding the fourth spot in save percentage.

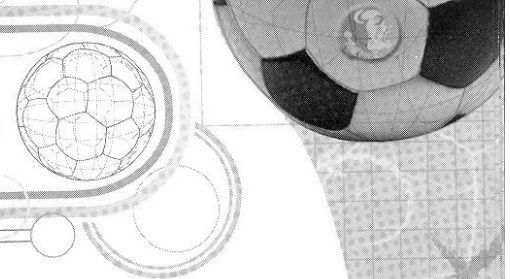

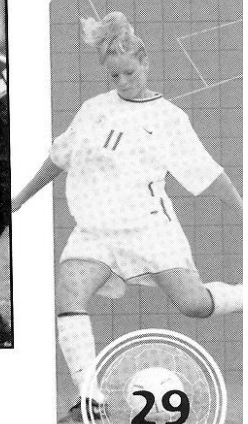
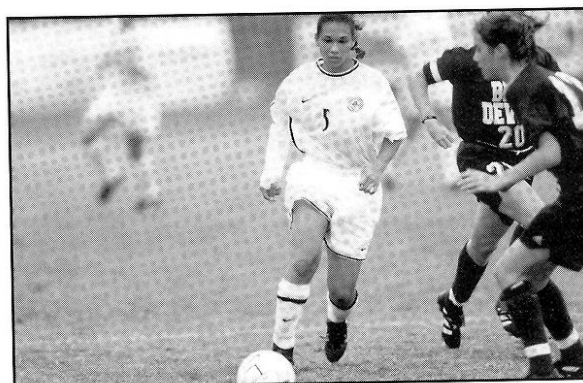

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ACC Biography

The Tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 46th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 72 national championships, including 37 in men's competition and 35 in women's. In addition, 108 men and 26 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

1998-1999 in Review

The 1998-99 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and seven individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 32 national team titles in the last nine years. The past year, the ACC was the only Division 1-A conference to have a team play in the national championship game in men's and women's basketball and football.

The ACC's 1998-99 national champions were Maryland in women's lacrosse, Virginia in men's lacrosse and Duke in women's golf. In addition, the ACC had six other teams participate in national title games — Florida State in football and baseball, Virginia in women's lacrosse, Duke in men's and women's basketball and North Carolina in women's soccer. Overall, ACC teams posted a 66-45-1 (.595) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 15 of the 24 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1998-99 season include 76 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 28 Top 10 showings.

Seven ACC teams, in seven different sports representing six of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 12th-straight year in 1998-99 as 1,552 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 1999-2000 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University, October 6-8. Conference championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

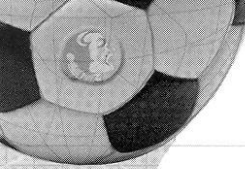
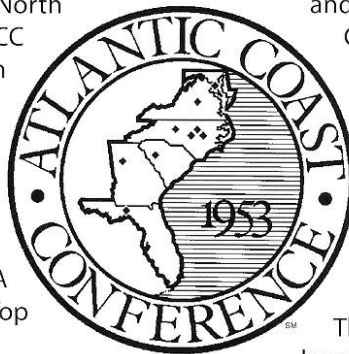
The History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

FSU Support Services

Academic Support

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal, FSU has developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs.

The program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, the academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. They gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. Coaches also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-of-the-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.



Mark Meleney

Director, Athletic Academic Support Programs

Mark Meleney became Florida State's Director of Athletic Academic Support Programs in 1997 and brings 12 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past five years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

A native of Iowa, Meleney began his college education at Buena Vista College, where he earned varsity letters

in football and baseball. Upon transferring to Florida State, he earned Bachelor's degrees in Management and Finance in 1986 and received a Master's in Athletic Administration from FSU in 1997. He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Athletic Administration.

Meleney oversees an academic staff comprised of five academic counselors, and administrative assistant, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of about 70 tutors and mentors.

Meleney and his wife Sarah are the parents of a five-year-old daughter, Montana Shea.

Soccer Academic Counselor

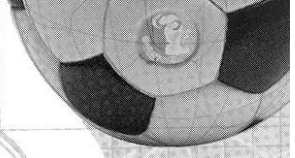
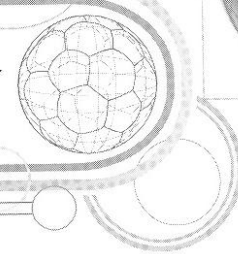

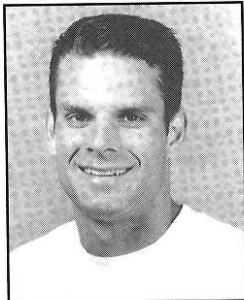
Strength & Conditioning



Strength, Conditioning, Medical Care and Treatment

Strength training, conditioning, medical care and treatment are a vital aspect of an athlete's performance on the field. At Florida State, a specially designed program is developed for women's soccer, emphasizing the objectives of strengthening and conditioning the athletes along with the proper medical attention.

Strength and Conditioning coach Ron Miller, assistant Sterling Brown and staff individually customize programs for each of the athletes, beginning with pre-conditioning, before the season even gets underway. Assistant Athletic Trainer Angela Sehgal, A.T.C., will handle the athletic training duties for the women's soccer team.

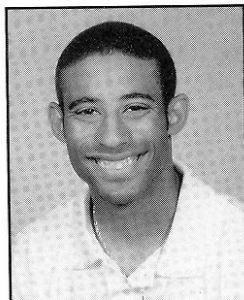

The workout is instrumental in improving muscular endurance, strength and cardiovascular conditioning on the field. Miller, who holds professional memberships in the National Strength and Conditioning Association and Aerobics and Fitness Association, works with the players in sport specific training which includes strengthening the major muscle groups used in soccer.

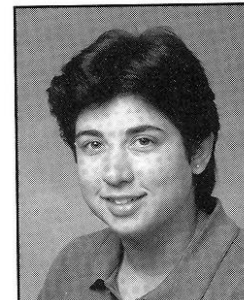

Athletes at Florida State University receive the best care and treatment possible. All of the student athletes undergo a preseason examination in order to prevent and detect any potential injuries that

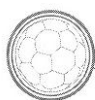
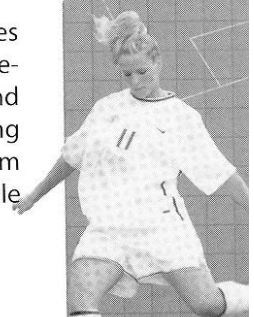
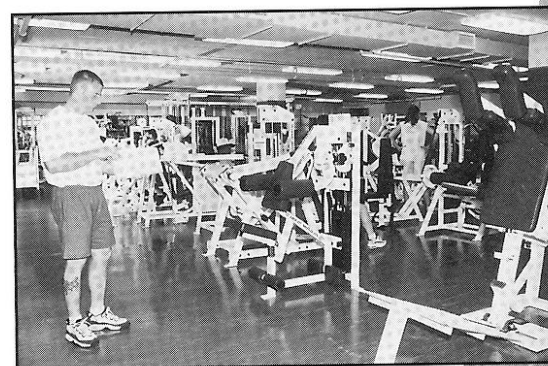
an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are sometimes a part of participating in athletics. Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room. Angela Sehgal and the rest of the FSU training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehabilitate after an injury. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who for many years have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.



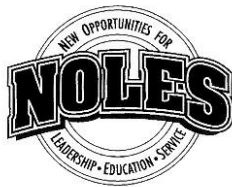
Angela Sehgal

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life. career development

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective commu-

nication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

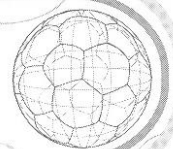
Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program are the Seminole Leadership Institutes that are held four times a year. These Institutes offer student-athletes the opportunity to learn skills that will benefit them as students, as athletes, and as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. The Institutes are based on building communication skills. Students have the opportunity to use the values and work ethic taught by athletic participation as the framework for their leadership development. The Institutes attract outstanding guest speakers who challenge Seminole student-athletes to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole banquet and plans such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back-to-school picnic.



NCAA Compliance



The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is Permitted to Recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests **may not** make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key Terms You Should Know

You become a **prospective student-athlete** if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A **contact** is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An **evaluation** is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid **official visit** to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

Phone Calls and Letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to **one telephone call per week** except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university

- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect **only** if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be pre-arranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

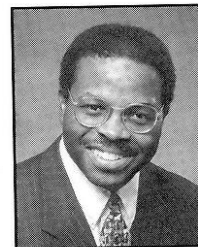
You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

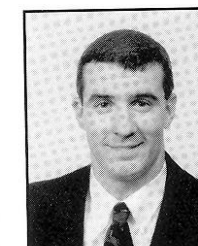
You may not provide **anything** to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.



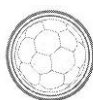
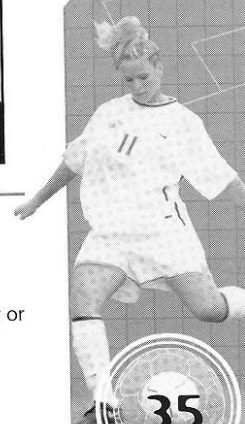
