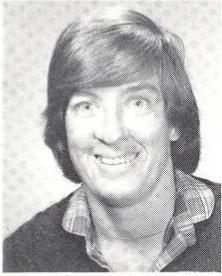

Head Softball Coach

In three seasons as head coach of Florida State's softball program, JoAnne Graf has put together quite a record. She's led her teams to three consecutive state titles (1979, 80, 81), one region championship (1981) and surpassed those accomplishments by winning the AIAW's first-ever national championship last year. All told, Graf's record at Florida State is an impressive 117-32, a winning percentage of .785.

Sixteen of Graf's players have been named to the all-state team and eight to the all-region team. Last year, five athletes were named to the all-championship team at the national tournament. Graf received her first coaching honor in 1981 when she was named FAIAW Softball Coach of the Year.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater as head coach in 1978. Prior to that, she was earning her master's degree in physical education at North Carolina-Greensboro while coaching three of the school's sports teams. She was head coach of the men's and women's swimming teams and assistant softball coach. In 1977, the softball team was the NCAIAW state champion.

While an undergraduate at Florida State, Graf was a member of both the tennis and softball teams. She served as co-captain for the 1974 and 1975 softball squads that finished second in the state softball tournament.

Graf is the national softball chairperson for the AIAW and is in her second year as Region III softball chairperson. She has also served as a chairperson on the state level.

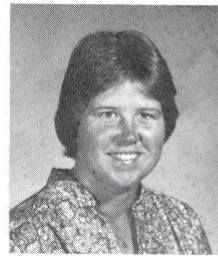
Graf directs Florida State's softball camp each summer on the Tallahassee campus. Each year more campers have enrolled.

She is presently pursuing her doctorate degree in administration.

Her coaching philosophy is simple. "My job is to help the athlete develop to her greatest potential as a ball player and a person," she says. "I care about the quality of my coaching and the quality of my program. When I recruit an athlete, I'm going to do the best possible job I can for her and I think she will give me 100 percent in return."

Winnie Dodgion
Assistant Softball Coach

Winnie Dodgion joined the Florida State softball staff as assistant coach in January of this year, bringing with her outstanding experience as a player and coach. She comes to the Seminole program from Liberty Junior High School in Orlando where she taught physical education and coached the softball team.

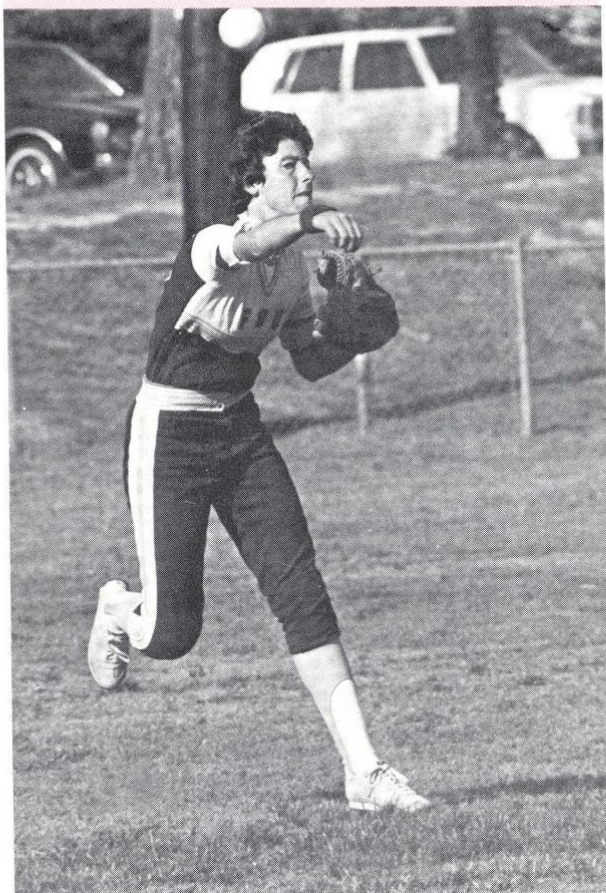
Dodgion also has previous experience at the University of Central Florida, where she was assistant softball coach in 1979 and again for three months in 1981 and at Boone High School where she was softball coach from 1974-75.

Dodgion, a 1978 graduate of Central Florida, was a scholarship softball player at the school from 1975-78. After graduation, she played for the "Dots" slow pitch softball team in Miami, where the squad won the national Open championship in 1979. As a player/coach for the Orlando Stars in 1981, she was Most Valuable Player of the national tournament, won by the Stars. She also received the Golden Glove award in the regional tourney and was named MVP in the Metro tourney that year.

Dodgion's responsibilities include the fall conditioning program and working with the outfielders and pitchers. She is also involved in recruiting and handles general administrative duties.



Outlook for 1982



What could possibly top winning the state, regional and national championships all in the same year? "Winning it twice in a row," says head coach JoAnne Graf, whose team is faced with exactly that task when the season opens March 2.

It won't be easy. Not many teams can boast that they've won two national championships back to back. But Graf and her team are setting out toward that goal.

Last year's squad won 54 games and hit .434 as a team. Yet Graf maintains that her squad is better this year and most of that improvement will show up in the offense. "There's going to be more competition within the team for starting positions," she says. "If it's worked in a positive way, it will benefit us. There's more depth in every position and whoever has the hot bat will play. We won't have any weak bats in the lineup."

Graf is most worried about how her team will respond to the pressure of defending its title. "That will be the toughest thing," she says. "Everyone will be out after us. Our opponents will have a slight advantage in that area."

Many of the players from that championship squad are back, but three starting infielders were lost. Graduation claimed catcher Venus Ross and third baseman Carol O'Domski and first baseman Charlotte Cates did not return to school.

With those folks gone, the fourth-year coach will look to senior Jan Sikes and junior Darby Cottle to pull the infield together. Second baseman Sikes hit .477 last year, third on the team, and committed only nine errors in 59 games. Shortstop Cottle led FSU in three offensive categories, hits (83), doubles (6) and homeruns (12) while batting .428. She was second in RBI's with 45.

The key position for the Seminoles is catcher, where Graf must replace Ross, who was the team's MVP the last two seasons. Junior college transfer Toney Donaldson was recruited to replace Ross. "Toney can provide us with the same kind of offensive power that Venus did," says Graf, "but we'll need to get her some defensive experience back there."

First base is another key position that the Seminoles must fill with new spikes. A two-way battle for the job looks to be between Sandie Williams (who will begin school in January) and Lee Ann Harrell. Harrell, a sophomore, is a walkon.

A probable replacement for O'Domski at third is Carla Bingham, a transfer from Florida Junior College. Bingham is a better hitter than O'Domski but needs experience at the position after playing shortstop in junior college.

"Since we're replacing three new infielders, that has to be an area of concern for us," says Graf. "We think we have quality replacements but the infield will have to start from scratch and learn to work together."

Also figuring in the infield's plans are freshman Wendy Davis, who will probably back up Cottle at shortstop, and sophomore Kelly Tillman who proved to be a valuable backup for Sikes last season. Freshman Kelly Shaw will also seek playing time.

Florida State's outfield returns intact and was handled a year ago by Linda Tyrrell (lf), Cathy Gooding (cf), Natalie Drouin (rf) and Toni Robinette (sf). But Graf maintains that all four will be pushed by newcomers and no starting spots are guaranteed. "This is where I refer to our depth and added offensive ability," she says. "We have a lot of insurance in the outfield and whoever is hitting will play."

Sunnie O'Neal, last year's leading hitter (.512) although she only played in 23 games, is one player who could figure to move someone out of a starting job in the outfield. O'Neal also plays basketball for FSU and got off to a late start last season. Also figuring here is Wendy Davis, already mentioned as a backup for Cottle at shortstop. "Wendy has great potential and if she comes around fast, we may have to find a spot for her," says Graf. Valuable pinch hitter Layne Salvador will serve as a backup for the outfield.

Florida State's pitching tandem of sophomore Susan Painter and senior Stacey Saunier could be the finest in the country. Both have had their share of experience, with Saunier pitching the first half of last season and Painter taking over in midseason when her bat proved to be the stronger one. In this position, like the outfield, whoever is hitting will probably start.

Florida State's schedule is much the same as last year's. It's a combination of doubleheaders and single games against Division I competition with a few junior colleges fitted in. Again, Florida State will be participating in numerous invitationals and will host its own, the Lady Seminole Invitational, for the first time.

How hard is it to defend the national championship? Others who have tried will say it's not easy. But don't tell JoAnne Graf and her Florida State Seminoles that. They think they can.

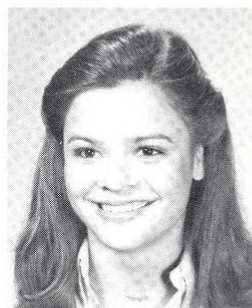

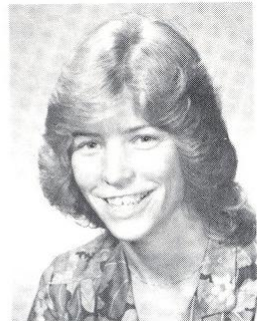

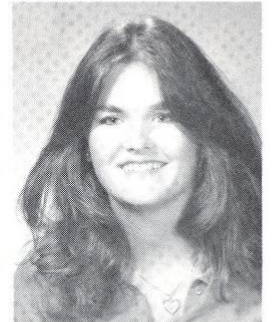

The first AIAW Division I slowpitch softball national championship was held in 1981 on the campus of North Carolina State in Raleigh, N.C. Florida State won it. But there was much more to the 1981 season than the last four wins which gave FSU the inaugural crown.

Florida State finished 54-7 over the season, the most wins in the sport in the school's history and the best winning percentage (.885) ever. Along the way, Florida State won three invitational tournaments, including the Lady Gator, Miami Dade-North and Georgia Tech tourneys. Then the Seminoles swept through the state and regional tournaments, going undefeated and stretching their season's winning streak to 17 games.

Once on the North Carolina State campus, Florida State played close to error-free softball and left no doubt in softball circles who was the best team in the nation.

A first round win over Western Carolina came by a 13-9 score. Although the game was tied up 8-8 in the third inning, Florida State came on strong to record its easiest victory of the championship.

Second round opponent and host N.C. State gave JoAnne Graf's squad a run for its money. After the fourth frame, it was a scoreless game. FSU edged ahead 2-1 in the fifth inning and increased that lead to 4-2 in the sixth before the Wolfpack scored once in the seventh to end the game at 4-3.

Perhaps the best game came against second seeded East Carolina. Although the final 12-3 score doesn't indicate a close game, the score was knotted 3-3 after regulation play. In the eighth, the Seminoles scored nine unanswered runs to earn a berth in the national championship game against North Carolina.

Florida State jumped out in front of the Tarheels quickly and led 1-0 after one inning. The score remained the same until the sixth when FSU scored three more times to lead 4-0. Carolina threatened in the seventh and final inning. With one out and one runner already across the plate, there were three Tarheels on the basepaths. But, a Florida State double play ended the threat and FSU had itself a 4-1 victory and its first women's national championship.

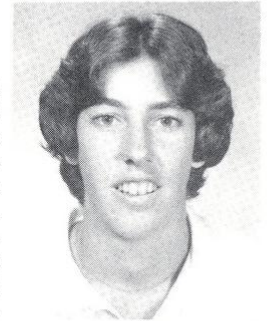

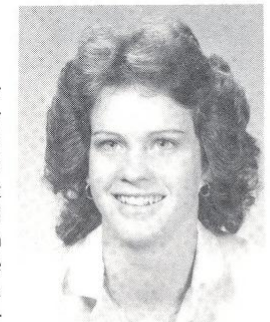

C. W. "Hootie" Ingram
Director of Athletics

C. W. Hootie Ingram is in his first year as athletic director at Florida State. Assuming his post on January 16, 1981, Ingram brings to Florida State an outstanding reputation as athletic administrator.

Prior to accepting the Florida State post, Ingram worked with the prestigious Southeastern Conference for eight years — first as an assistant commissioner and then as an associate commissioner since 1978.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played football for the University of Alabama from 1951-54. Following a stint in the army after graduation from college, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years in the high school ranks, Ingram moved into college coaching. He served as an assistant coach at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas. He assumed the head coaching job at Clemson University in 1970 and remained there for three years before joining the SEC.

While with the SEC, Ingram's duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpretations and eligibility.



Barbara Palmer
Women's Athletic Director

As the women's athletic director at Florida State since 1977, Barbara Palmer has been instrumental in the development of women's athletics at FSU to the point that the Lady Seminole athletic program is regarded as one of the finest in the country.

Only one women's team has experienced a losing record in the last two years, while two teams—golf and softball won their respective national championships in 1981.

Palmer's duties as women's athletic director include the hiring of coaches, preparation of budgets, monitoring of scheduling and travel and raising of funds. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

Palmer is currently president of Region III of the AIAW.

This is Florida State



Florida State University—the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles— has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million before the end of 1981.
