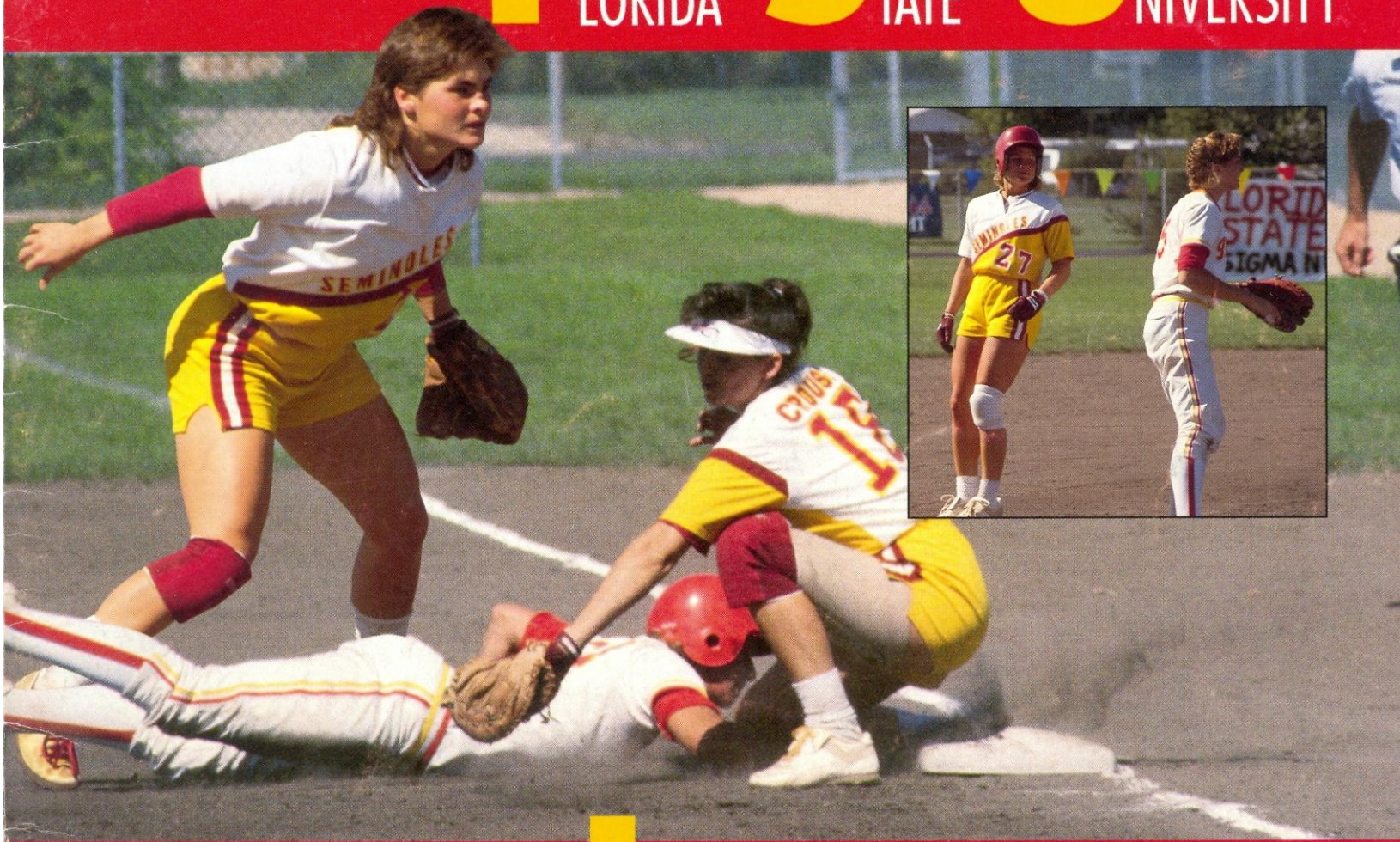

# LADY SEMINOLE SOFTBALL—1989 OUTLOOK

## AIMING FOR A FOURTH CONSECUTIVE NCAA TOURNAMENT BID

The 1989 season will have special meaning to three four-year seniors on the Florida State softball team. Should the Lady Seminoles advance into the NCAA tournament for the fourth consecutive time in 1989, these seniors will have seen post-season competition in each of their years at FSU. It's a claim not many Seminole athletes can boast.

Lori Crouse, Tiffany Daniels and Kari Keith, a trio of two-year starters, will form the nucleus of the 1989 Florida State squad. Head coach JoAnne Graf welcomes this wealth of experience and leadership the seniors provide. "We've got a solid core of senior leadership heading into this year," Graf said. "It will show when the season gets to a point when a pick me up is needed."

Florida State's appearance in the 1988 National Invitational Championship provided a quick preview of the 1989 season. The Lady Seminoles finished third in the pre-season tournament which featured six teams from the 1988 NCAA Top 20 Coaches Poll, advancing into the championship game. "To finish third in an early tournament like that was a good sign," Graf said. "The defense was solid but the offense was a little behind. It was a good experience for us."

Overall, 11 players return from FSU's 1988 squad which finished the season 44-14. Five newcomers have been added to bolster the Lady Seminole lineup. "I think we have a good mix of classes on this year's roster," Graf said.

With perhaps its toughest schedule to date ahead, here's how Florida State enters the 1989 season position by position:

**INFIELD:** The Florida State infield is solid for 1989 with three of four starters returning. Two of FSU's four-year seniors, Tiffany Daniels and Lori Crouse hold down the shortstop and first base spots, respectively. Daniels, a two-year South All-Region selection, sustained a knee injury prior to the 1988 season, but showed no signs of lasting damage. By season's end, she was playing with a confidence which earned her All-American status in 1987. Crouse, who Graf calls one of the best at first base in the country, will continue to aid infielders with her ability to dig out less than perfect throws. Returning at second base is sophomore Kelly Flaczinski, who enters the season with improved quickness. Her familiarity with the rest of the infield will aid her already surprising development at the position. Third base finds the only newcomer in freshman Shannan Mitchem of Stone Mountain, GA. "Shannan has all the athletic tools to play the position, she just needs the experience," Graf said. Freshmen Shannon Aiken at first base and Hunter LaFountain at second provide backup in the infield. The ever-adaptable Christy Larsen and senior newcomer Kym Averill could also see action in the Lady Seminole infield.

**OUTFIELD:** Experience and depth highlight the FSU outfield as its three regulars return for 1989. "We've got an awful lot of speed in the outfield to cover ground," Graf said. "They're also experienced and communicate well

with each other." Florida State will use a four player shuffle in the outfield to accommodate Christy Larsen when pitching. Senior Kari Keith, who has the strongest arm of FSU outfielders, will return in left field. The shuffling will occur in center and right field on days that Larsen pitches. When Larsen pitches, senior Sandy Martinez will occupy center and freshman Penny Siqueiros will be in right. On days Larsen does not pitch, she will use her speed and arm strength in center while Martinez goes to right. Sophomore Becky Harrison and freshman Brenda Richardson will playing key backup roles in the outfield.

**BATTERY:** As in prior years, Florida State will use a two-pitcher rotation featuring junior Debbie DeJohn and sophomore Christy Larsen. Both return after successful 1988 seasons as DeJohn led FSU pitchers with 18 wins, and Larsen placed seventh in the final NCAA statistics for strikeouts per seven innings with a 6.3 average. Graf notes that the difference in style between DeJohn and Larsen, should work to FSU's advantage. "Debbie is a finesse pitcher who has good placement and Christy is a power pitcher who can throw it by hitters," she said. "Our opponents should have a problem adjusting from game to game." Should injuries or fatigue plague the Lady Seminole pitching staff, senior Kym Averill can be used on the mound. Sophomores Julie Rice and Lora Migliaccio will handle the chores. Rice performed admirably as a freshman starter, though she was not slated for an immediate contribution. "She was thrown into the starting role unexpectedly and responded," Graf said. "She improved quickly and gained experience by making mistakes and learning from them."

**OFFENSE:** Florida State lost just one of its top eight hitters from 1988, so the offensive firepower is once again potent. Senior shortstop Daniels has led FSU in home runs and batting average for the past two seasons and will look to repeat the feat in 1989. In her freshman season, Christy Larsen was a reliable leadoff batter with a .290 average and 11 stolen bases. Graf says the batting order is solid from top to bottom with the capability to produce power, as well as base hits. "Of course we look to Tiffany Daniels for power and Kari Keith and Julie Rice can hit the ball hard," she said. "The rest of the lineup has consistent base hitters." A pleasant surprise in her freshman season was Flaczinski, who contributed 24 RBI while batting in the cleanup position.

**OVERALL:** With Florida State gaining national prominence in the fast-pitch game, it faces its toughest schedule to date. The 1989 schedule features games against top 20-ranked Louisiana Tech, Northern Illinois and Illinois State, as well as tournament competition against Nebraska, Arizona, Arizona State, South Carolina, North Carolina, Iowa State and Missouri. The key to another successful season is keeping the juniors and seniors healthy, Graf said. "We've got some talented underclassmen but they are untested. We need to keep that junior and senior leadership intact for a full season."



# LADY SEMINOLE SOFTBALL COACHES



**HEAD COACH  
JOANNE GRAF**  
11th year, 446-105-4

The 1989 season will have a certain bearing for JoAnne Graf, now entering her second decade as the head coach of the Florida State Lady Seminole softball team.

In just her sixth year of fast-pitch competition, Graf has successfully placed Florida State among the upper echelon of national competition. Last year, for the first time since 1984 when FSU adapted to the game, the Lady Seminoles were ranked in the NCAA Coaches Poll from the beginning of the season until its conclusion. Florida State began the season with its highest ranking ever, seventh, and ended the season at 16th.

It's no surprise good things keep coming Florida State's way in the fast-pitch game under Graf's tutelage. It's just a carry-over effect from the days of back-to-back slow-pitch national titles in 1981 and 1982.

In an effort to reach that level, Florida State has been selected for post-season play in each of the last three years. Following a playoff win over Adelphi in 1987, Florida State advanced into the Women's College World Series for the first time.

In five years of fast-pitch competition, Graf has directed the Lady Seminoles to 227 victories for a winning percentage of better than eighty percent. In her first five years at Florida State, she accumulated 219 wins playing the best slow-pitch competition in the nation. Her 446-105-4 overall career record checks in with an .804 winning percentage.

Graf, who was voted the South Region Coach-of-the-Year in 1986 after leading Florida State to its first NCAA post-season tournament, has seen 16 of her players elected to NCAA South All-Region teams. In 1987, FSU produced its first fast-pitch All-America in shortstop Tiffany Daniels.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater after two years at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro where she earned her master's degree in physical education. Graf also worked in the athletic department at UNC-Greensboro as head coach for the University's men's and women's swim teams and assistant softball coach.

Graf, who serves as director of the Florida State softball camp each summer, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association. She is also a member of the NCAA Softball Committee and chairwoman of the NCAA softball advisory committee for the South region.

She is presently seeking her doctorate degree in administration.

Joining the Florida State coaching staff for the 1989 season is Louie Berndt, who comes to Tallahassee from one of the Lady Seminoles' top rivals in the south region, Nicholls State.

After three years as an assistant coach at the Thibodaux, La. school, Berndt will assist JoAnne Graf in an attempt to lead Florida State into NCAA post-season competition for the fourth consecutive year.

As well as occupying the first base coaching box, the Dearborn, Mich. native will direct her expertise toward tutoring the Florida State pitchers and catchers.

Berndt brings to Florida State nine years of coaching experience. She has run the gamut from a volunteer coach for city recreation departments to a high school coach, to a division I college coach.

A graduate of Western Michigan as a recreation major in 1983, she also occupied second base at WMU from 1980 to 1983. Compiling a four-year batting average of .335, Berndt and Western Michigan reached the AIAW World Series twice, were Mid-American Conference (MAC) conference champions twice and appeared in the NCAA World Series in 1982. Individually, Berndt earned AIAW All-America honors as a freshman in 1980 and NCAA All-America honors in 1982, as a junior. Following her senior year, she was invited to the Pan American Games tryouts.

A veteran of several summer softball camps, Berndt will assist in the yearly Florida State softball camp and head up the FSU recruiting process.



**JACKIE SAVIS  
GRADUATE ASSISTANT**

With 14 years of fast-pitch softball experience, Jackie Savis joins the Lady Seminole coaching staff for the 1989 season as a graduate assistant.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Savis played at the collegiate level at the University of Minnesota. Appearing in 147 games for the Gophers, Savis was part of two Big Ten Championship teams and Minnesota's first NCAA tournament bid.

At Minnesota, Savis enjoyed a fine academic career as well, graduating with honors in psychology. A three-time Big Ten All-Academic team selection, Savis won three Patty Berg awards for academic and athletic excellence. She also received the President's Student Leadership and Service Award and the Assembly Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics Award for the outstanding graduating senior.

Savis is currently working on a master's degree in sport psychology at FSU.

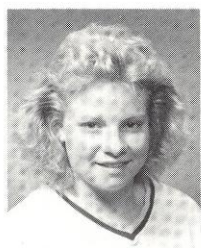

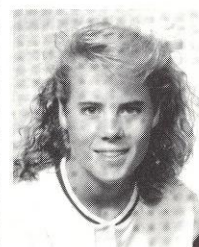

# FLORIDA STATE PLACES THIRD IN 1988 NATIONAL INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT

In its first competition of the 1988-89 year, Florida State took the third place trophy in the 16-team National Invitational Tournament played September 23-25 in Macomb, Illinois.

In the tournament, which featured six teams that were ranked in the NCAA Coaches poll, the Lady Seminoles won its first three games over Eastern Illinois (7-1), Akron (1-0) and Colorado State (1-0) to advance into the championship round.

In the final round, FSU could not come up with the crucial runs and lost to Iowa State 3-1 in nine innings to drop into the loser's bracket. The Lady Seminoles then dropped another close one to Oklahoma State, 2-1 in eight innings, to be eliminated. Iowa State, who will visit Tallahassee for the 1989 Lady Seminole Invitational, won the

tournament after losing to Oklahoma State to force a final game between the two teams.

For their efforts, shortstop Tiffany Daniels and utility player Christy Larsen were named to the All-Tournament team.

# THIS IS FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

The Department of Physics' Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation, houses two powerful atom smashers which also provide unique research opportunities.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 24,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.

The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs and the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences and four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences—represent major strengths of the University. FSU prides itself on pursuing academic quality while maintaining a friendly, welcoming atmosphere.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student govern-



ment, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

The physical growth of the University during the 11-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning.
