former back ups are Leslie Barton and Susan Buttery. Barton, who turned in an outstanding performance in the College World Series, will take over Bullock's left field spot while Buttery can play either left or rightfield, as she saw time at both positions last season. The most familiar face in the outfield will be senior Becky Harrison, who has taken over the starting centerfield spot after an outstanding fall. Additionally, sophomore Tina Getherall, who can play all outfield spots effectively, should prove an outstanding help to this strong Lady Seminole outfield.

**BATTERY:** With the loss of Debbie DeJohn, senior Christy Larsen will take on the leadership position on the mound. An All-South Region selection last year, Larsen is one of the best five hurlers in the country when up to speed, says Graf. With 201 strikeouts last season, second in the nation, and an earned run average of 0.35, sixth in the nation, Larsen should see her best year ever this year and is in line to break several Seminole pitching records. Also returning to the mound this year is sophomore Toni Gutierrez. Turning in 52 strikeouts in 50 innings last season, Gutierrez is developing rapidly as one of the Tribe's strongest pitchers. The new face visiting the mound this year will be freshman Rebecca Aase, who will see spot starting duties as scheduling calls.

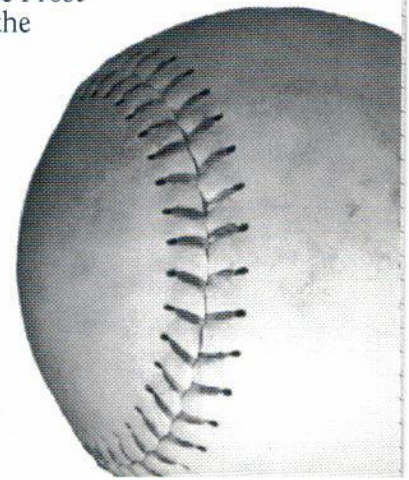
Once again calling the pitches for Florida State's pitchers will be senior Julie Rice. Since injured in a post-game celebration following the regional championship last year, Rice is not completely 100% but has worked hard to come

back this season and should be successful. An All-South Region selection, Rice was errorless in 320 attempts behind the plate last year. Backing her up is senior Lora Migliaccio, a very intelligent catcher who calls an outstanding game and turned in an excellent performance in last year's College World Series after the injury to Rice.

**OFFENSE:** Although Graf feels Florida State's hitting will be shaky at the beginning, she says it should pick up strength as the season progresses. Sophomore Leslie Barton, who turned in a team-leading five home runs last year, and junior Penny Siqueiros, the team leader in both hits (56) and RBI (23), will be counted on to score some runs for the Lady Seminoles. Additionally, several players that did not hit well last year are hitting well now, swinging at much better pitches and making good contact with the ball. Strong baserunners Christy Larsen, Tina Getherall and Shannan Mitchem, who combined for 15 stolen bases last year, should continue to keep opposing infielders on their toes.

**SCHEDULE:** The 1991 Lady Seminole schedule is probably the toughest Florida State has ever seen. In striving to make FSU more nationally competitive, the Lady Seminoles will face top power-house teams from all over the country both at home and away such as UCLA, last year's national champs, Arizona, Creighton, Connecticut, South Carolina and South Florida in addition to many other top ranked schools with strong softball organizations. Lady Seminole Field will play host to 16 regular season home dates as well as the 18-team Lady Seminole Invitational in mid March. On the road, Florida State will travel to participate in the Arizona Invitational, the South Florida Invitational, the Southern Invitational in Birmingham, the Frost Cutlery Invitational in Chattanooga and the Massachusetts Invitational. ♦

## JOANNE GRAF

**HEAD COACH**  
13TH YEAR, 533-135-4

Fifteen games into the 1990 season, Joanne Graf achieved a milestone few NCAA Division I softball coaches have achieved. She earned her 500th win. Sharing that lofty position with Graf are only six other Division I coaches.

Last year, in her seventh year of fast-pitch competition, Graf successfully placed Florida State among the upper echelon of national competition. In an effort to reach that level, Florida State has been selected for post-season play in each of the last five years.

And in 1990, Graf took her Lady Seminoles all the way to the NCAA Softball College World Series for the second time, the first just three years earlier in 1987.

It's no surprise good things keep coming Florida State's way in the fast-pitch game under Graf's tutelage. It's a carry-over effect from the days of back-to-back slow-pitch national titles in 1981 and 1982.

In seven years of fast-pitch competition, Graf has directed the Lady Seminoles to 314 victories for a winning percentage of better than seventy-five percent. In her first five years at Florida State, she accumulated 219 wins playing the best slow-pitch competition in the nation. Her 533-135-4 overall career record checks in with a .795 winning percentage.

Graf, who was voted the South Region Coach-of-the-Year in 1986 after leading Florida State to its first NCAA post-season tournament, has seen 23 of her players elected to NCAA South All-Region teams. In 1987, FSU produced its first fast-pitch All-America in shortstop Tiffany Daniels.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater after two years at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro where she earned her master's degree in physical education. Graf also worked in the athletic department at UNC-Greensboro as head coach for the University's men's and women's swim teams and assistant softball coach.

Graf, who serves as director of the Florida State softball camp each summer, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association. She was also a member of the NCAA Softball Committee and chairwoman of the NCAA softball advisory committee for the South region.

She is presently seeking her doctorate degree in administration.

## CONNIE CLARK

**ASSISTANT COACH**  
SECOND YEAR

Former All-American pitcher Connie Clark joined the Lady Seminole softball staff at the start of the 1990 season, bringing several years of teaching on the national level as well as the international level to Florida State.

After earning a Bachelor of Science degree from Cal State Fullerton in Physical Education in 1987, she has worked as a private instructor at the Rod Carew Baseball School in California and conducted clinics in Tokyo, Japan, Auckland, New Zealand and Shanghai, China.

While at Cal State Fullerton, Clark twice participated in the Women's College World Series and defeated Florida State 4-0 in the first round of the 1987 World Series. In 1986, she led the nation with a 0.18 earned run average pitching for the national championship Titan team. Her senior season, she finished third in the nation with 33 wins. She was also named All-America and won the prestigious Broderick Award for Collegiate Softball Player of the Year.

A recognized clinician speaker on pitching, Clark works with Florida State's nationally ranked pitching staff in addition to coaching first base for the Lady Seminoles. She also assists JoAnne Graf in the softball recruiting process.



## JACKIE SAVIS

**GRADUATE ASSISTANT**

Beginning her third season as a graduate assistant with the Lady Seminole softball team, Jackie Savis provides Florida State with 16 years of fast-pitch softball experience.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Savis played at the collegiate level at the University of Minnesota. Appearing in 147 games for the Gophers, Savis was part of two Big Ten Championship teams and Minnesota's first NCAA tournament bid.

At Minnesota, Savis enjoyed a fine academic career as well, graduating with honors in psychology. A three-time Big Ten All-Academic team selection, Savis won three Patty Berg awards for academic and athletic excellence. She also received the President's Student Leadership and Service Award and the Assembly Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics Award for the outstanding graduating senior.

Savis is currently working on a master's degree in sport psychology at FSU.

Also featured among the 18-team field are eight teams which finished in the final regional polls of 1990.

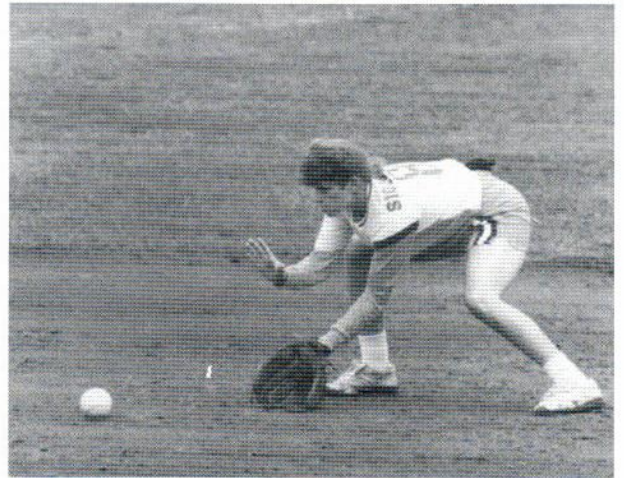

Success can be defined in many ways, especially when it comes to Florida State athletics. In the past few years, Florida State has appeared at the top of the national rankings of almost every sport. From football and baseball to softball and track, FSU is a contender in every realm of the athletic world.

The Lady Seminole softball team, the surprise team of the 1990 College World Series, upsetting second-ranked Fresno State to reach the final days of the tournament, is just one example of Seminole success in the less-publicized non-revenue sports. Success stories like that happen every year at Florida State. In the 1989-90 season, FSU sent a team or individual representative to NCAA Championship competition in 12 of 16 sports.

Consider this. In addition to the Lady Seminole softball team's third place finish at the NCAA Softball College World Series, the Lady Seminole basketball team ended 1989-90 with a 21-9 record and played host to an NCAA Tournament game in only its second NCAA tournament appearance ever; Florida State volleyball finished the 1989 season with a record of 30-5, claimed the Metro Conference Championship for the fifth consecutive year and participated in the NCAA Tournament; Florida State track and field captured its 13th consecutive Metro Conference Championship and finished the 1990 season as the 13th best squad in the country; and Florida State tennis, swimming and golf teams have been successful on the conference and national level as well.

What is the key to all this success?

Athletic Director Bob Goin believes it is Florida State's people.

"The key to our success is good leadership," Goin said. "Coaches and student-athletes working together to achieve a high standard of academic and athletic performance."

Everyone knows what Head Coach Bobby Bowden has done for Florida State football. When Bowden came to Florida State, the football record for the previous ten years was 57-59-4. Now, at the close of his 15th season, Bowden's FSU record is 205-74-3 ... quite a difference!

Florida State baseball's Mike Martin is another success story. In his 11 years with the Tribe, Martin has compiled a record of 600-204-3 for a winning percentage of .748. Martin-coached teams appeared in four College World Series in the 1980s, made 11

consecutive NCAA tournament appearances and have claimed eight consecutive Metro titles.

That habit of success is spreading. In the four years Pat Kennedy has directed the Florida State men's basketball program, the Seminoles have been on an upward swing. Kennedy's record with the Tribe heading into the 1990-91 season was 60-45, and he plans to get FSU back into the NCAA Tournament in 1990-91 with a young, talented team.

But, Bowden, Martin and Kennedy are not the only successful coaches at Florida State. Florida State's non-revenue coaches have proven that they too can play with the big boys.

Lady Seminole softball coach JoAnne Graf is a good example of that. In 1990, the Lady Seminoles made their second trip to the College World

Series in the past four years, and Florida State is one of only four schools to appear in five straight NCAA Regional Tournaments. In Graf's 12 years at FSU, her teams have chalked up a record of 533-135-4 for a winning percentage of .796 to rank her second among active coaches in winning percentage. Graf is also fifth on the list of all-time career victories. And for the second consecutive year, Florida State was ranked in the NCAA Coaches Poll throughout the entire 1990 season, finishing at number three. Florida State starts the 1991 season in the number seven spot.

Additionally, Graf has seen 23 of her players chosen to NCAA All-South Region teams. She directed the switch from slow- to fast-pitch softball, and after leading her slow-pitch teams to a national championship in 1981, has seen her fast-pitch squads nearly reach the pinnacle of collegiate sports.

Of course, Florida State coaches are not the whole story of success. They're only as effective as the student-athletes they bring to Florida State. Lately, FSU coaches have signed some of the top recruiting classes in the nation. But not only are they the top recruits athletically, they are top recruits in the classroom, too.

According to Goin, "These recruiting classes have their priorities straight. These student-athletes have the potential to succeed off the field as well as on."

As for priorities, Goin makes his clear.

"We want to provide the best opportunity for our coaches and student-athletes to achieve academic and athletic success," he said. "Doing that, we'll be setting a precedent of excellence."

JoAnne Graf and the Lady Seminole softball team are meeting and exceeding that precedent in 1991. ◇

# THE UNIVERSITY

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

**F**lorida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

The Department of Physics' Tandem Van de Graff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation, houses two powerful atom smashers which also provide unique research opportunities.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 26,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as a coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.

The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs and the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences and four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences—represent major strengths of the University. FSU prides itself on pursuing academic quality while maintaining a friendly, welcoming atmosphere. Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

The physical growth of the University during the 15-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning. ♦
