From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thousands of degree-seeking ex-GI's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The University's expanse and complexity today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 29,000 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,300 faculty and 2,600 staff members. About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.

In the past several years, the University has joined an elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State
University also offers young people
ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom
learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social
organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than
200 other registered student organiza-

tions active on campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.

Being a student at Florida State University means stepping into a tradition of more than 130 years of higher education. From its Flying High Circus to its Supercomputer Computations Research, Florida State provides a panorama of excitement, blending the educational and social sides of campus life.





Pitching, speed, defense, and power. Dr. JoAnne Graf's 1993 Lady Seminole softball team has all of those ingredients, making a trip to the NCAA College Softball World Series very possible. What also makes an appearance possible are six returning starters in the field and the return of Florida State's top two pitchers.

"Our goals will be very high because we do have a lot of returning talent and a lot of experience," said Graf. "To repeat what we did last year, we have to

stay injury-free."

What Florida State did last year was win the inaugural Atlantic Coast Conference Softball Championship, set an NCAA record for victories in a season with 63, make their seventh straight appearance at the NCAA Regionals, and ended their season in Oklahoma City at the NCAA Softball World Series for the third consecutive season and fourth time in six years.

To get back to the Series FSU will rely heavily on these ingredients:

Pitching - The Lady Seminoles return their top two pitchers, senior Toni Gutierrez and junior Rebecca Aase. Gutierrez had a phenomenal 1992, a year in which she was named ACC Player of the Year, first team All-South Region, and second team All-American. She compiled a 35-9 record with a 0.47 ERA and was second in the nation in victories, eighth in ERA, and 14th in strikeouts per seven innings. Aase was a first team All-ACC selection last year and has won 36 consecutive games. She went 28-0 last season with a 0.79 ERA and ranked eighth in the country in wins.

Marla Looper, a junior college transfer from Crowder College of Missouri, will provided much needed pitching depth missing last season. She was a junior college All-American the past two years and was the MVP of the Junior College National Tournament last season.

"Toni will really benefit from the fact that we now have two support pitchers," Graf said. "She was starting to get worn out towards the end of last season but that shouldn't happen this year."

Speed - The Lady Seminoles return their top two base stealers from a year ago. Senior Cindy Gordon, who will take over at shortstop after playing in center field last year, recorded 21 thefts. Center fielder Leslie Barton stole a school record 35 bases during the 1992 campaign, senior Jennie Dillmore will



continue as FSU's pinch running specialist after scoring 14 runs in that role a year ago.

Defense - Catcher Leslie Adams, returns for her final season after making just six errors in close to 500 chances and throwing out 27 of 59 runners attempting to steal.

Power - Florida State returns three players, Barton, senior right fielder Susan Buttery, and junior second baseman Lisa Davidson, who combined for 12 home runs and 45 extra base hits last season.

Even though the outlook couldn't look much brighter there are still a couple of big holes to be filled. Florida State lost the left side of its infield, shortstop Penny Siqueiros and third baseman Shannan Mitchem, to graduation. Gordon takes over at short while sophomore Laurie Shepard or junior Jennifer Olow will look to fill the void at third.

"The loss of Penny and Shannan will hurt, but I am confident that Cindy, Laurie and Jen can get the job done," said Graf.

The rest of the infield is set with senior Heather Conway returning at first and Davidson at second.

The outfield has two returning starters, Buttery in right and Barton.

Buttery was a first team All-ACC and first team All-South Region last season after she hit .350 with three home runs and 39 runs batted in. She was also named the Most Valuable Player in the first ACC Softball Tournament. Not only was Barton a threat on the base paths, but also one at the plate. She hit .355, second on the team with three homers and 38 RBI's and was an honorable mention All-South Region performer.

Left field will be anchored down by freshman Shamalene Wilson, and fellow freshmen Stacie Symonds and Tina Wood will back up in the infield and

outfield, respectively.

The 1993 schedule is demanding, as always. The Lady Seminoles will travel to four tournaments, the South Florida Invitational in Tampa, the prestigious Pony Invitational in Fullerton, California, the North Carolina Invitational in Chapel Hill, and the Diamond Classic in Amherst, Massachusetts. Florida State will also host their tenth annual Lady Seminole Invitational and will again play host to the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament in April.

Dr. JoAnne Graf, Head Coach 15th Season – 657-156-4 1992 ACC Coach of the Year

Dr. JoAnne Graf's 14th year at Florida State included reaching the milestone of 600 victories. Graf is listed among the top 20 most winningest coaches in the country accumulating an 80% win record. The record of 657-156-4 looks impressive as does the path Graf has led the Lady Seminoles down the past few years.

Under Coach Graf Florida State has been to the NCAA College World Series in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma for three consecutive years and four over her career. In nine years of fast-pitch competition, Graf has directed the Lady Seminoles to 438 victories for a winning percentage of better than eighty percent. In her first five years at Florida State, she accumulated 219 wins playing the best slow-pitch competition in the nation and claimed two national titles.


Graf, who was voted the 1992 ACC Coach of the Year and the South Region Coach-of-the-Year in 1986 after leading Florida State to its first NCAA post-season tournament, has seen 28 of her players selected to NCAA South All-Region teams. In 1987, FSU produced its first fast-pitch All-American in shortstop Tiffany Daniels. In 1991, Christy Larsen was named third team All-American and last season Toni Gutierrez was selected second team All-American.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater after two years at the University of North Carolina Greensboro where she earned her master's degree in physical education. Graf also worked in the athletic department at UNC-Greensboro as head coach for the university's men's and women's swim teams and assistant coach for softball.

Graf, who serves as director of the FSU softball camp each summer, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association and also served as a member of the NCAA Softball Committee and chaired the NCAA Softball Advisory Committee for the South Region. Recently Coach Graf became Dr. Graf after

Connie Clark, Assistant Coach Fourth Year

Former All-American pitcher Connie Clark joined the Lady Seminole softball staff at the start of the 1990 season, bringing several years of teaching on the national level as well as the international level to Florida State. In her three seasons as the head pitching coach, all but two Seminole pitching records have been broken. Both Christy Larsen and Toni Gutierrez, two of Clark's proteges, have been ranked among the top five pitchers in the country by NCAA statistics.

After earning a Bachelor of Science degree from Cal State Fullerton in Physical Education in 1987, Clark worked as a private instructor at the Rod Carew Baseball School in California and conducted clinics in Tokyo, Japan, Auckland, New Zealand and Shanghai, China.

While at Cal State Fullerton, Clark twice participated in the Women's College World Series and defeated Florida State 4-0 in the first round of the 1987 World Series. In 1986, she led the nation with a 0.18 earned run average pitching for the national champion Titan team. Her senior season, she finished third in the nation with 33 wins. She was also named All-America and won the prestigious Broderick Award for Collegiate Softball Player of the Year.

A recognized clinician speaker on pitching, Clark is extensively involved in recruiting new athletes to FSU and coordinates the Florida State summer fast-pitch pitchercatcher camp. Last summer, Clark started her Master's degree in sports administration at Florida State.



CJ Urse, Graduate Assistant Second Year

In her second year as a graduate assistant, CJ Urse continues her recruiting and specialized outfield duties on the Lady Seminole coaching staff. A native from Columbus, Ohio, Urse made her way to Tallahassee after a successful four-year career at Ohio State.

The former Buckeye was captain of her squad for the 1991 season and a two-time All-Big Ten Conference selection as well as a four-time Academic All-Big Ten and Scholar-Athlete. Urse was named 1989 Defensive Player of the Year while at OSU and Academic All-Region her junior and senior seasons.

Urse graduated from Ohio State with a physical education degree and is currently pursing a graduate degree in professional prep/athletic administration. She is from a family of five and enjoys rollerblading, waterskiing, golf and basketball.



Kelley Kirkland, Volunteer Assistant Second Year

Columbia, South Carolina native, Kelley Kirkland is also in her second year on the coaching staff at Florida State. Kirkland, a four-year letter-winner at the University of South Carolina, will continue her role of assisting Graf and Clark with practices and game operations.

Kirkland, who was named as a National Softball Coaches Association All-America Scholar-Athlete, graduated Cum Laude with a degree in physical education and athletic training. She is currently enrolled in the masters program of physical education at Florida State.

While playing for the Gamecocks from 1987-1991, Kirkland was a utility infielder. In 1989, her squad won the South Region championship in Tallahassee after defeating Florida State and Louisiana Tech, earning an appearance in the NCAA Softball World Series in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

After finishing her degree, Kirkland hopes to pursue a career in teaching and coaching on the secondary education level.

Entering the pre-season ranked 13th in the nation, Florida State jumped out to its best start in school history by winning its first 25 games. During that streak, one win was especially significant. On February 23, against West Florida, head coach JoAnne Graf won her 600th game at the helm of the Lady Seminoles. The team went on to win the first ACC Championship for Florida State University, and later took its third consecutive regional championship and made their fourth appearance to the NCAA College World Series.

Pitchers, Toni Gutierrez and Rebecca Aase more than held their own through a rigorous 70 game schedule. Gutierrez, who was a second team All-America pick, was ranked second in the nation for victories while Aase remained undefeated and set an NCAA record for consecutive victories without a loss (36). Not only was the pitching outstanding, but the Lady Seminole offense was remarkable as well.

FSU as a team hit .315 for the season 47 points higher than the previous school record of .268 set in 1987. Senior shortstop, **Penny Siqueiros** was the consistent force from the plate all season and was followed closely by **Leslie Barton** and **Susan Buttery.** 

Most quality teams are sound defensively and FSU was no exception. The Florida State defensive effort was spectacular, committing just 59 errors in 70 games. Its' .972 fielding percentage, fifth nationally, made it tough for opponents to ever lead an offensive charge.

During the 1992 campaign, the Lady Seminoles captured five major tournaments; the South Florida Invitational, Lady Seminole Invitational, North Carolina Invitational, ACC Tournament, and the Diamond Classic. Of the four tournaments that awarded an MVP, a Lady Seminole proudly took the honors.

Florida State ended their season in two-straight disappointing losses at the College World Series. The first to California 3-0 and then to Massachusetts 4-2, a team which they had beaten just weeks before.

"It was disappointing to lose when you play badly as opposed to playing well," said Graf. "But it gives the team an idea of where we want to be and we see what we want to shoot for next year."






