Florida State has been a mainstay in the collegiate softball scene since being one of the pioneer programs of the sport in 1978. Over the last 40 years, the Seminole program has done its part to help grow the game exponentially in that time span by churning out several All-America players, staffing quality coaches and stringing together many impressive seasons, including a trip to the 2014 and 2016 Women's College World Series.

With the 2018 season marking head coach Lonni Alameda's 10th as the Seminole skipper, the direction of the program remains on the right path. Forty-win seasons continue to be a staple of the program, with 34 in the program's 40 years, including 1750 -win seasons. NCAA Championship appearances are always expected, with the Seminoles being one of just nine schools to make an NCAA Regional in every year since 2000.

Historically, there are not many programs that can match the numbers put up by Florida State: 15 Atlantic Coast Conference titles, nine NCAA Women's College World Series appearances, two AIAW national titles, 31 All-Americans with 46 total AllAmerica honors and 30 NCAA Championship appearances.

Being a Florida State softball student-athlete does not mean the sole focus is just on the field. Joining the program puts you in an instantaneous family that is fostered by a fun-loving coaching staff that brings out the best in each player through teambuilding activities.

In addition to the years of tradition etched in the Florida State softball program, the concept of team never holds a greater meaning than for those dressed in Garnet and Gold. Led by Alameda's fun yet focused approach, Florida State softball student-athletes leave their careers with life-long memories.

## Community and Academic Success

- Seminole Softball completed over 1,000 hours of community service in the last academic year; a testament to the hard work and commitment of the FSU softball coaches and players.
- The Seminoles recorded a 100 percent participation rate in a variety of activities, including Literacy Week, National StudentAthlete Day, Miracle League Softball, as well as meeting with cancer patients at Tallahassee Memorial Healthcare.
- The Noles also "adopted" Madison Marshall in 2016 through a partnership with the Friends of Jaclyn Foundation. The 16-year old from Clarksville, Fla., found out she had brain cancer in 2015. - FSU earned the Golden Nole award in 2014 and 2015, given to the program with the highest amount of community service hours per student-athlete.
- A team leadership group, known as The Tribe, meets weekly to help promote group activity among the team. The leadership council helps coordinate activities such as Dugout Club Socials, seasonal newsletters, community service activities and more. - The program carries several All-ACC Academic Honor Roll students, All-ACC Academic team members, postgraduate scholarship winners, CoSIDA/ESPN All-District and All-American performers.
- The Seminoles placed seven student-athletes on the 2017 AllACC Academic Softball Team - Sydney Broderick, Ellie Cooper, Morgan Klaevemann, Meghan King, Dani Morgan, Anna Shelnutt and the 2017 ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year Alex Powers.
- Kelly Hensley earned the 2013 ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for her success both on and off the field.
- The Seminoles have also committed to cleaning a portion of Tallahassee's Tharpe Street as part of Florida's Adopt-A-Highway program.

## The Seminole Softball Complex

- Known as one of NCAA softball's best venues, JoAnne Graf Field at the Seminole Softball Complex is a modernized athletic facility that caters quite well to student-athletes, coaches and fans.
- Since opening in 1999, Florida State has enjoyed the benefits of playing on their home field. The Seminoles have recorded 494 victories in their 18 years at JoAnne Graf Field.
- The complex's unique design was featured in Athletic Business Magazine's 2002 Architectural Showcase.
- Approaching nearly 12,000 square feet, the FSU Softball batting facility is functional, unique and aesthetically pleasing.
- The facility, which was awarded the 2011 AIA Tallahassee Chapter Design Achievement Honor Award, is endorsed for its combination of external features, comfortable nature and multiple purposes within the sport of softball.
- The near million dollar facility that was spear-headed by architects Lewis + Whitlock is a beacon for future player development, while providing safety from inclement weather. - The updated batting cage facility allows for training in any kind of weather or environment. There are four batting cages and four bullpen slots on the ground floor, while the second floor is an open space with artificial turf that can be used in multiple ways. - The Mary Ann Stiles \& Barry Smith team building is the home of the Florida State softball and soccer teams. It houses the coaches' offices, which overlook the soccer and softball fields, a reception area, large team and coaches locker rooms, a visiting team locker room and training and equipment rooms.
- One of FSU's most celebrated and renowned alumni couples, Mary Ann Stiles and Barry Smith epitomize the ultimate in professional and athletic achievement. A pioneer in fundraising for women's athletics, Mary Ann Stiles was among the first Golden Chiefs to financially support the women's programs at Florida State. Barry Smith was instrumental in building the Varsity Club and was one of the first inductees into FSU's Hall of Fame. - The second floor includes additional office space, meeting rooms, tradition space, a classroom furnished with transferable desks and chairs, dry-erase boards, projection screen. - In 2015, FSU finished remodeling the lower level, complete with an all-new locker room, as well as an updated training room with brand new contrast baths.

## NINE WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES • 15 ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

## 2014 WOMEN'S CDLLEGE WORLD SERIES

For the first time since 2004, the Florida State Seminoles advanced to Oklahoma City, Okla., for the Women's College World Series. It marked the first time that FSU had reached the WCWS since the NCAA updated the tournament to include the super regional round in 2005.

Making the World Series seemed unlikely for FSU as it lost game one of the Tallahassee Super Regional by a score of 17-3 to No. 13 Michigan. It set the record for most runs allowed in Seminole history and the 14 run margin of defeat was the largest ever.

Refusing to concede the series defeat, Florida State came out and shutout the Wolverines in game two of the series, 6-0, and were tied 2-2 in the bottom of the seventh inning of game three before senior outfielder Courtney Senas blasted a two-run walk-off home run to deep left center to end the game but begin the celebration at home plate.


Once in OKC, the Seminoles got down to work to continue their impressive season which included the program's 12th ACC Championship and FSU's 24 conference wins set a single-season record in the ACC.

Several Noles were honored with weekly, conference and regional accolades throughout the season, but the final award was given to junior pitcher Lacey Waldrop at the WCWS banquet on the 50th floor of the Devon Tower. Waldrop earned the 2014 USA Softball National Player of the Year award, becoming FSU's second winner of the award following Jessica van der Linden in 2004. Florida State is also the only school with multiple winners of the award.

The first opponent for Florida State was No. 1 Oregon. Junior shortstop and NFCA First Team All-American Maddie O'Brien led off the game with a single to center and Senas followed later the inning with a walk but

the Noles were unable to score a run. Oregon's starting pitcher would only allow two other baserunners for the rest of the game. Waldrop allowed three runs in 5.0 innings as the Seminoles lost to the Ducks, 3-0, to fall into the loser's bracket.

Two days later, FSU faced Baylor in an elimination game. Alex Kossoff led the Noles at the plate, going 2-for-3 with a run scored, including a nice bunt single in the third. However, FSU was unable to capitalize on its chances in the same way that Baylor did. Home runs by BU shortstop Jordan Strickland in the second and sixth inning accounted for four of the seven runs in the contest as Baylor eliminated Florida State from the World Series with a 7-2 victory.

While it was the best season in a decade, and one of the best in program history, the Seminoles know that they have the talent and passion to not only return to OKC and the Women's College World Series in the future, but that they have the goal of finishing the job and being the last team standing as the National Champion.

## 2016 WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

For the second time in three seasons, FSU softball returned to Oklahoma City and the Women's College World Series after earning an NCAA Super Regional sweep of Utah at JoAnne Graf Field on May 27-28. It marked the ninth time overall in program history that Florida State has reached the WCWS.

Prior to the games getting underway, a trio of Noles were honored for their success as Alex Powers, Jessica Burroughs and Jessie Warren received All-America honors from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association. It marked the sixth time that Florida State had earned three All-Americans in one season and the first time that all three returned for the next season. Powers and Burroughs also received 2016 ACC Player and Pitcher of the Year honors, respectively.


The Seminoles opened up the 2016 WCWS with a game against No. 15 Georgia. After breaking out to a 2-0 lead on a first-inning home run by Warren, FSU allowed the Bulldogs back into the game with three total errors in the second and third innings as Georgia took a 4-2 lead. A two-run home run in the sixth inning by Alex Powers tied the game at 4-4, but another FSU defensive error (a WCWS record-tying seventh error of the game) allowed Georgia to score an unearned run in the seventh inning to win 5-4 to send FSU to the loser's bracket.

On Elimination Saturday, Florida State battled back with a win over No. 14 UCLA, taking down the Bruins by a score of 8-4. After starter Meghan King allowed a firstinning grand slam to UCLA, Jessica Burroughs came in relief and retired 19 of the last 21 UCLA batters as FSU scored multiple runs in the second, third and fifth innings to complete the comeback victory and continue on in the 2016 WCWS.

As weather caused problems for games in OKC, the next contest between No. 7 FSU and No. 2 Michigan was forced to move to Sunday, June 5. In what became a pitcher's duel, both teams struggled to get their offense going as each squad only had five baserunners reach base for the entire game. A single to lead off the third by Alex Kossoff, followed by a walk to FSU's Morgan Klaevemann, a fielder's choice by Jessie Warren and a walk to Alex Powers loaded the bases for Sydney Broderick. A wild pitch by U-M's Megan Betsa allowed Klaevemann to dash home, scoring the only run of the game as FSU held on for the 1-0 victory. The win over No. 2 Michigan was the highest ranked win for head coach Lonni Alameda in her eight seasons at FSU.

Reaching the WCWS semifinals for the third time in school history, FSU continued with a game against No. 5 Auburn on Sunday night. In a back-and-forth fight, both teams battled as a spot in the Championship finals was on the line. FSU struck first with a run in the top of the first, but Auburn scored three in the bottom of the inning. The Noles tied it up at 3-3 in the second and took a 4-3 lead on an RBI single by Carsyn Gordon in the third, but the Tigers answered with three runs in the bottom of the third for a 6-4 advantage.

A solo home run in the fourth gave Auburn a 7-4 lead, but the Noles would not give up until their final at bat. Freshman Cali Harrod tied the game with a three-run home run in the seventh inning to force extra innings. Despite getting a runner to second with one out in the eighth, FSU was unable to push across a run. In the bottom of the inning Auburn hit a leadoff single, and along with an FSU error, put the winning run on third with no body out. A fielder's choice to third base drove in the winning run, giving Auburn a 8-7 win and sending them to the WCWS Championship Series.

## "PLAY FOR THOSE WHO CAN'T"

One of the foundational principles that Florida State softball is built on is, "Play for those who can't." The Seminoles have displayed that throughout the years, including recently with people like Taylor Foster, Madison Marshall and Monk Bonasorte.

Taylor Foster became part of the FSU family in 2013 through a connection with the ACC, and despite growing up in North Carolina, dreamed of playing softball for the Seminoles. Foster was diagnosed with bone cancer in at the age of 13 and her passion and enthusiasm in the face of such adversity never faltered. The Noles would routinely stop by to see Taylor and her family when playing NC area schools and the players and coaches would often keep touch via calls, texts and video chats. After her passing in April of 2014, an annual memorial tournament and camp was started and organized by FSU softball players, coaches and support staff for youth in North Carolina to share Taylor's passion for the game and tell of her legacy.

In 2016, and through a partnership with The Friends of Jaclyn Foundation, FSU softball adopted Madison Marshall who had been diagnosed with a brain tumor in 2014 at the age of 14. The Friends of Jaclyn Foundation was created in 2005 and pairs children with pediatric brain tumors with collegiate sports teams, as they have seen the symbotic relationships that are formed help both the child going through such a difficult situation, but also the teams that are able to come along side a family and help them fight and learn a new appreciation and persepctive on life.

Monk Bonasorte, one of the main FSU athletic administrators responsible for hiring Lonni Alameda as head coach in the fall of 2008, had played football at FSU in the late 70s, and was voted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1995. As a result, he bled Garnet and Gold and became a signifcant supporter of FSU softball, as well as all of the other sports on campus. In October of 2015, Bonasorte was diagnosed with brain cancer, yet never wavered in his passion for FSU and life. Right up to his passing in November of 2016, he continued to give his life to this university and be an example of the Florida State "Unconquered" spirit.

In 2017, the Lonni Alameda Softball Camps began the Monk Bonasorte Camp (Camp MB42), where the young players in attendance not only learn about the skills of softball, but also about life and who Monk was, what he meant to Florida State and how he battled through such adversity. All of the proceeds of the annual camp go to the FSU Monk Bonasorte Scholarship, and to date, the camp has raised over $\$ 8,500$.

There are numerous other relationships that have been formed over the years with young fans like Amber Howard and Maddie Briscoe, and even former players such as Dana Bailey that have battled cancer, the FSU players and staff know that there is much more to life than just this game. Though several are now gone, they are certainly not forgotten and remain a significant part of Seminole softball to this day.

## NINE WOMEN’S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES•15 ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS HEAD COACH LONNI ALAMEDA



Entering her 10th season as the head coach of the Florida State softball program in 2018, Lonni Alameda has guided the Seminoles back into one of the nation's best teams. After seven Women's College World Series appearances from 1987-2004, the Seminoles have returned to the final site of women's collegiate softball twice in the last four seasons (2014 and 2016), including a WCWS semifinals appearance in 2016, as well as five consecutive trips to the NCAA Super Regionals (2013-17). Florida State has earned five ACC regular season titles in a row, four straight ACC Tournament titles and now owns 15 ACC Championships.

FSU has played in the NCAA postseason every year under Alameda, and is one of only nine schools to participate in the NCAA Tournament in every season since 2000. Since Alameda has made Tallahassee her home, she has led the Seminoles to eight ACC Championship game appearances in nine seasons, with titles in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017.

Alameda and the Noles made program history in 2017, as Florida State earned a No. 1 ranking in the NFCA poll for the first time, holding the spot for eight consecutive weeks. FSU also earned its first win over the NFCA No. 1 team in the country as an 11th-inning home run by Alex Powers gave the Noles a 3-1 victory over Florida on May 3. The Seminoles added their fifth straight ACC regular season title, posting a 24-0 record in league play, culminating in their 15th ACC tournament championship. FSU is one of three Power 5 schools to post an undefeated conference record, along with Nebraska in 1998 (16-0) and Iowa in 1997 (22-0).

The Seminoles extended their ACC series unbeaten streak to 41, posting a 37-0-4 series record against conference opponents since 2012. No current Florida State player has ever lost a series to a conference opponent as the Noles have earned a record of 107-10 in their last 117 ACC regular season games.

Alameda also earned her fifth ACC Coach of the Year honor in 2017, moving into a tie for second-most in league history with North Carolina's Donna J. Papa. She now trails only NFCA Hall of Famer and former FSU head coach JoAnne Graf who tallied six ACC Coach of the Year awards in her illustrious career.

Florida State matched its record from 2016 by placing six members on the 2017 All-ACC First Team, including Jessica Burroughs (Pitcher of the Year) and Jessie Warren (Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year). Burroughs and Warren were also named NFCA First Team All-Americans, while Morgan Klaevemann (second team) and Alex Powers (third team), also earned a spot on the national teams. The Noles tied for the most All-Americans in the nation with Florida and Arizona and it marked the first time in the fastpitch era that Florida State softball had received four All-American accolades. The Seminoles ended with a 55-8-1 record, marking the third time in the last four seasons that Florida State has eclipsed the 50 -win total.

In 2016, Alameda led Florida State back to the WCWS, reaching the semifinals for the third time in school history and ending with a No. 4 national ranking, which tied for the highest final NFCA ranking ever for FSU. The Noles posted a 55-10 record, including 11 wins over ranked opponents. FSU defeated No. 2 Michigan (1-0) and No. 3 Auburn (4-3), marking the highest ranked wins at FSU under Alameda, and both coming away from Tallahassee as the Auburn win came on the road and the Michigan victory at the WCWS.

The Noles finished 2016 with a 21-2 record in conference play and Alameda earned ACC Coach of the Year for the fourth straight season as Jessica Burroughs and Alex Powers earned ACC Pitcher and Player of the Year honors, respectively. FSU set an ACC record with six members on the All-ACC First Team as Burroughs and Powers were joined by Ellie Cooper, Meghan King, Morgan Klaevemann and Jessie Warren. Burroughs, Powers and Warren were named NFCA All-Americans, marking the sixth time that FSU had three All-Americans in the same season.

During the summer of 2016 and 2017, Alameda has coached the USSSA Pride of the National Pro Fastpitch league. The Pride posted the best record in the league in 2016, before falling to the Chicago Bandits in the NPF Championship Series.

The Seminoles reached the NCAA Super Regionals for the third consecutive season in 2015, finishing with a record of 49-14 and a No. 10 ranking in the final poll by the NFCA. FSU earned a trio of conference awards as Jessie Warren was named ACC Freshman of the Year, Lacey Waldrop secured ACC Pitcher of the Year honors for the second-straight season and Alameda was chosen as the ACC Coach of the Year for the third consecutive year.

The Noles earned 11 wins against ranked opponents in 2015 and have 37 ranked wins overall in Alameda's seven seasons at the helm of FSU. Several Seminoles etched their name into the NCAA record book as senior Maddie O'Brien led the nation with 73 walks, good for No. 11 all-time in NCAA history. Freshman Morgan Klaevemann's 26 -game hitting streak is the second-longest in FSU history and ranks No. 24 overall in NCAA history.

Florida State posted its best season in a decade with a 55-9 record in 2014 to finish ranked No. 7 in the country by both the NFCA and USA Softball. The Seminoles won 24 ACC games to set a new school and ACC mark for conference wins in a season and also set program records in runs scored (400), home runs (65), extra base hits (168), RBI (363), walks (318) and slugging percentage (.493).

Several individuals earned regional and national awards as junior pitcher Lacey Waldrop was named USA Softball National Player of the Year. Waldrop joined Jessica van der Linden (2004) as Seminoles to win the national honor. Florida State was the first school in the coun-

try to have multiple players win the award. Waldrop joined junior shortstop Maddie O'Brien as an NFCA First Team All-American, marking the first time that FSU had placed two players on the first team in program history.

Waldrop and O'Brien also won 2014 ACC Pitcher and Player of the Year, respectively, while Alameda earned ACC Coach of the Year honors for the second year in a row. The Seminoles placed three players on the All-Region First Team, six players on the All-ACC Team, and five members on the ACC All-Tournament Team.

The signature win of the 2014 season came at the Tallahassee Super Regional, when senior Courtney Senas hit a two-run, walk-off home run against No. 13 Michigan to send the Seminoles to the Women's College World Series for the first time since 2004.

It was an impressive season in 2013 for the Seminoles as they fought through several injuries to key players yet reached the NCAA Super Regionals for the first time since 2006 following a miraculous comeback against South Alabama in the Mobile Regional championship game. The five-run comeback with two outs in the top of the seventh against the 13th-seeded
 Jaguars personified the team's never-say-die attitude. FSU finished with a 44-19 record and Alameda was named the ACC Coach of the Year, along with a school-record four All-ACC First Team selections and five overall.

The Seminoles set a new school mark with an 18-2 record in ACC play en route to the program's 11th ACC regular season title. As the pitching coach, Alameda was influential on one of the most dynamic duos in the nation in Lacey Waldrop and Monica Perry. Waldrop earned NFCA Third-Team All-America honors, the first at Florida State since 2009, while Perry emerged as the most dominant pitcher in ACC play.

Aside from the five total All-ACC Team members in 2013, Alameda coached her first ACC Scholar Athlete of the Year when Kelly Hensley was recognized for the honor. Hensley also was named to the Capital One Academic All-America Third Team.

In 2012, the Seminoles achieved a mark of 47-16, their most wins since going 62-12 in 2004. Alameda led FSU to a 15-13 record against NCAA postseason teams throughout the year, which included nationally-ranked victories over No. 14 UCLA, No. 23 North Carolina twice and Women's College World Series participant LSU.

As the team's pitching coach, Alameda's influence on FSU starters Lacey Waldrop and Monica Perry was enormous. Both pitchers finished in the Top 30 nationally in earned run average, making FSU one of just five programs to have multiple pitchers in the top 30. Each hurler earned ACC Pitcher of the Week honors twice, and were named to the All-ACC squad. As a unit, the Seminoles finished 10th in the country with a 1.53 team ERA. In 2012, four more student-athletes made the All-ACC Team under Alameda's watch including Tiffani Brown, Briana Hamilton, Perry and Waldrop. Brown and Shayla Jackson also were named to the NFCA All-Southeast Region Second Team.

In just her third season as head coach at Florida State, Alameda helped the Seminole softball program snap a seven-year ACC title drought to highlight an entertaining 2011 season. Despite making the conference tournament in Atlanta as the No. 4 seed, it was Alameda's season-long coaching tactics combined with the energy of her motivated group that enabled the Seminoles to storm through the competition and defeat second-seeded North Carolina, 4-1, to clinch an automatic NCAA Regional bid.

Under Alameda's guidance, the 2011 Seminoles created a noteworthy program achievement - for the first time in school history, FSU softball reached 12 consecutive NCAA Regionals. Her group also won two games in the Athens Regional, defeating Georgia State and UAB, to get to the final day of a regional for the first time since 2006.

Adding to Alameda's on and off-field influence, Sarah Hamilton became just one of two conference players in 2011 to be named to the All-ACC Team for the third time in her career. Shayla Jackson and Jen Lapicki joined Hamilton on the 2011 all-conference squad. Hamilton ended her illustrious career as one of the best pitchers in school history, with Alameda playing a large role in her success. Among her noteworthy feats, Hamilton became the first hurler in FSU history to finish with at least 1,000 career strikeouts, ending her four-year stay with 1,005 Ks.

In her second season as FSU head coach in 2010, Alameda led the Seminoles to a 44-18 record and second-consecutive appearance in not just the ACC Championship game but its 11th-straight appearance in the NCAA Division I Softball Championship. At the time, FSU's ACC Championship game appearance marked the 14th time in school history it had the chance to play for a title - a total number that is more than any other school in the conference.

Under Alameda's tutelage, the 2010 Seminoles accomplished a lot of statistical feats. Not only did FSU get off to its best start since 1993 by starting the year 20-2, but the team capped off the year with high marks in a bevy of categories. The Seminoles' 297 batting average was the best since 2003 and their 226 strikeouts at the plate were the fewest since the 1998 campaign.

Individually, Alameda coached several FSU student-athletes who earned recognition for their hard work on the field and in the classroom. Carly Wynn was named an All-ACC First Team selection and Terese Gober, Sarah Hamilton and Ashley Stager were each placed on the All-ACC Second Team. Robin Ahrberg, Tiffani Brown and Hamilton each got the nod on the ACC's All-Tournament team. Wynn and Hamilton captured Louisville Slugger/NFCA Division I All-Southeast Region Second Team honors, while Wynn was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Third Team.

Alameda came to Florida State prior to the 2009 season and went on to surpass 200 career coaching victories in her first year in Tallahassee (she picked up win No. 300 on March 17, 2012 against Fairfield and added win No. 400 at North Carolina on March 30, 2014). The Seminoles finished the 2009 campaign with a 44-16 record and achieved the best conference record in school history at the time with a 17-4 league mark.

For her team's exploits on the field in 2009, Alameda and the Seminoles had the opportunity to host a regional in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 2004 season. Alameda coached several Seminoles that garnered postseason awards as Hamilton was named a Third Team Louisville Slugger/NFCA Division I All-American as a sophomore. Hamilton was also named ACC Pitcher of the Year, an ACC First Team member and to the Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region Team. Then-senior catcher Kaleigh Rafter was also named to the All-Region team and was an All-ACC First Team member as well. Wynn and Gober (both second team) were also student-athletes coached by Alameda who were recognized as All-ACC players.

Alameda carries an impressive coaching résumé on the international level and from 2004 to 2008 helped in the development of Canada's National Team. She aided Canada up until the 2004 Summer Olympics and resumed as an assistant following the Rebels' 2005 season. In the summer of 2006, Canada qualified for the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, China, after its strong showing in the World Championships. Alameda spent the summer of 2008 with the Canadian team which ended its quest for the gold with a fourth-place finish at the Beijing Olympic Games.

Alameda came to FSU from UNLV, where she spent five seasons reviving the Rebels' program. She replaced Dr. JoAnne Graf, who retired after 30 seasons with the Seminoles.

Alameda went 25-35 in her first season at UNLV in 2004, which was a four-game improvement over 2003's final tally. She then posted a staggering 44-19 mark in 2005 and the program's first trip to NCAA Regionals since 1996. Alameda was named Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year in 2005 and the entire staff garnered NFCA West Regional Coaching Staff of the Year honors.

The 2005 season featured an assault on the program's record book, appearances in the national statistical rankings and the introduction of several conference and national award winners. The 44 wins were the third-most in the program's history, while the 17 Mountain West Conference wins were the most-ever since joining the league in 1999. After being predicted to finish last in the league, UNLV excelled, placing second in the league in both the regular season and Mountain West Conference tournament.

In 2006, the squad was set back by injuries and fell to 26-37, but saw a 180-degree turnaround in 2007 and finished with a 37-27 mark as Alameda earned MWC Coach of the Year honors for the second time.

Alameda and UNLV had high hopes for 2008 and had the Rebels ranked in the ESPN.com/USA Softball Collegiate Top 25 Poll for the first time in program history. After starting the season 9-1-1, UNLV moved up to No. 18 in the ESPN.com/USA Softball Collegiate Top 25 Poll, but injuries to four starters proved costly as the season progressed.

Under Alameda's direction, the Rebels enjoyed recognition at the conference and regional level. Five Rebels garnered Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Regional honors while 13 players earned all-Mountain West Conference accolades, including two pitchers of the year and one freshman of the year awards.

To Alameda, academics are just as important as on-the-field production. Since taking over the program, the Rebels had 58 Academic All-MWC honorees. Over that time span, the team had 10 or more honored in a season four times, including 11 softball student-athletes in 2008. The softball program had 21 MWC Scholar-Athletes selected, as well.


In her nine seasons at Florida State, Alameda's academic priorities have been apparent. She has coached two ACC Scholar Athlete of the Year, thre academic All-Americans, five NCAA postgraduate scholarship award winners, 13 academic all-district team members and 30 All-ACC Academic Team players.

During her tenure at UNLV, Alameda also stressed the importance of community service and had players volunteer their time at the Nevada Childhood Cancer Foundation and Child Haven while participating in breast cancer walks and blood drives. Her emphasis has not changed since arriving at FSU, with the 2011 Seminole Squad earning honors such as the SemiGnome Award for community service and routinely producing standout student-athletes who are honored for their charitable ways. One of those players was Kelly Hensley who was awarded a 2013 Top Six For Service honor. In 2014 and 2015, the Seminole softball program earned the FSU Director's Cup for Service as they averaged over 35 hours of community service per student-athlete to lead all 20 FSU varsity sports.

Alameda moved to Las Vegas after eight seasons as the assistant coach at Stanford University, where she helped guide the Cardinal to a 320-179-1 record and six straight NCAA Regional appearances. She oversaw the pitching staff there and produced three All-Americans: Becky Blevins, Marcy Crouch and Dana Sorenson.

Prior to her stint at Stanford, Alameda spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Barry University (Miami Shores, Fla.). She helped the Buccaneers to a fifth-place NCAA Division II finish in her first year. She also spent some time on the international stage, serving as an instructor for both the Aruba (1995) and Spanish (2000) national teams.

An all-around great athlete, Alameda began her collegiate career as a pitcher at St. Mary's University (San Antonio, Texas) where she led the Rattlers to the NAIA Tournament in her only season. She later transferred to Oklahoma in 1989 and played softball and volleyball for the Sooners. She was a two-time All-Big Eight selection as a first and third baseman, while hitting . 359 as a senior in 1992.

Alameda earned her bachelor's degree in communications from Oklahoma in 1993 and played softball professionally in Europe for a season before beginning her coaching career.

Assistant Florida State softball coach Travis Wilson will begin his seventh season at Florida State in 2018 as he helps with the Seminole offense and defense. FSU has earned five regular season ACC titles, four ACC tournament championships, five trips to the NCAA Super Regionals, two appearances in the Women's College World Series and posted a 305-76-1 record (.800 winning percentage) in his six years at Florida State.

The Noles have turned their offensive production around under Wilson, as they have had at least 335 runs scored, 460 hits, 50 home runs and 300 RBI in each of the last five seasons. When Wilson arrived at Florida State after the 2011 season, the Seminoles had finished the year with 286 runs scored, 40 home runs and 238 RBI.

2017 saw the Seminole offense become one of the best in the nation, as Florida State finished in the top 10 in the NCAA in eight different categories, including slugging percentage (fourth -0.544 ), on base percentage (fourth - 0.429), scoring (fifth - 6.63) and batting average (seventh - 0.329). FSU set school records with 94 doubles and 71 home runs, and along with its 24 triples became the first team since Notre Dame in 2010 to tally at least 90 doubles, 20 triples and 70 home runs in a season.

Seven different FSU players recorded over 35 RBI in 2017, led by junior Jessie Warren who topped the team with a .413 batting average, 14 doubles, 23 home runs, 68 RBI and a .922 slugging percentage as she earned NFCA First Team All-America honors, along with ACC Player and Defensive Player of the Year accolades.

FSU posted a perfect 24-0 record in ACC play in 2017 for its fifth consecutive regular season conference title, and is one of three Power 5 schools to have an undefeated conference slate - Nebraska (16-0 in 1998) and Iowa (22-0 in 1997).

FSU broke several school records and nearly toppled a few others in 2016 as the Noles established program records with 459 runs scored, 407 RBI and a .323 batting average. The team also finished second in FSU history with 155 stolen bases and 63 home runs, and fourth all-time with 87 doubles.

Redshirt junior Alex Powers and Jessie Warren carried the FSU offense to the 2016 WCWS semifinals, as each were named NFCA All-Americans. Powers, the 2016 ACC Player of the Year, led the team with a .396 batting average and 16 doubles, while adding 16 home runs and 62 runs scored. Warren led the team and finished in the top 10 nationally with 20 home runs, 78 RBI and 72 runs scored, ranking second in FSU history in a single season in all three categories.

The 2016 offense was aggressive and effective as five players had at least 11 stolen bases, seven players had at least nine doubles and 10 different student-athletes hit a home run en route to an ACC regular season and tournament championship. The Noles set an ACC record with six members on the All-ACC First Team as Powers and Warren were joined by Jessica Burroughs, Ellie Cooper, Meghan King and Morgan Klaevemann.

A pair of freshmen led the Seminole offense in 2015 as Jessie Warren earned ACC Freshman of the Year honors and finished with 19 home runs, 57 RBI and 53 runs scored to lead the team. Morgan Klaevemann led the team with a . 393 batting average and 20 stolen bases as the outfielder also recorded a 26 -game hitting streak from March 25 to May 17. The Noles earned the ACC Championship for the second year in a row and advanced to the NCAA Super Regional round for the third consecutive season in 2015.

The 2014 Seminoles reached the Women's College World Series for the first time since 2004, posted a 55-9 record and earned the ACC regular season title with a 24-3 mark. The 24 ACC wins set a new school and ACC record for conference wins in a season and gave the Seminoles the No. 1 seed on their way to winning their 12th ACC Tournament Championship.

Under Wilson's guidance, the Florida State lineup was dangerous from top to bottom and saw many players recognized for their success. Maddie O'Brien set new singleseason school records for home runs (24), RBI (83), walks (56) and slugging percentage (.942) on her way to being named an NFCA First Team All-American and ACC Player of the Year. Courtney Senas was named to the NFCA All-Southeast Region First Team would have set school records in home runs (15) and RBI (57) if not for her teammate, as both totals were more than any Seminole had hit prior to the 2014 season.

As a team, the Seminoles set program records in runs scored (400), home runs (65), extra base hits (168), RBI (363), walks (318) and slugging percentage (.493). These marks eclipsed several records that were set during the impressive 2013 campaign that saw FSU reach its first NCAA Super Regional since 2006. Wilson helped Florida State achieve record-breaking numbers in just his second season as the Seminoles shattered the previous home run record of 49 in 2007 by producing 60 round-trippers in 2013. For the first time ever, four Seminoles finished with double-digit home runs including Courtney Senas (14), Kelly Hensley (13), Maddie O'Brien (10) and Celeste Gomez (10).

Florida State's 316 RBIs in 2013 set a school record, topping the previous mark of 313 in 2004. The 2013 squad also set a program record for slugging percentage at .476 , were able to win 17 games by mercy rule and recorded 20 games with double-digit base hits. Wilson also oversees the team's fielding and with early-season injuries in 2013 throwing players into makeshift positions, Wilson worked arduously with each infielder and outfielder on their mechanics and created a well-accomplished group that got the job done.

Joining fellow assistant coach Craig Snider as the team's offensive instructors, Wilson helped the Seminoles make strides at the plate in their debut 2012 year. Coaching a youthful unit that included just one everyday senior starter, Wilson also made a great impact on the team's defensive game as it became a sound group in the field.

In 2012, the Seminoles finished the year with a .966 fielding percentage to rank in the upper echelon on a national scale. FSU became an entertaining group to watch defensively as student-athletes such as third baseman Briana Hamilton, shortstop Maddie O'Brien, second baseman Tiffani Brown and centerfielder Courtney Senas made a bevy of highlight-reel plays throughout the season. A fundamentally-sound unit of infielders and outfielders collectively produced both the routine and difficult plays.

It was the solid play of FSU's defensive stalwarts that helped the Seminoles begin the 2012 season with a 16-0 record, the second-best start in school history. The 16-game win streak ties for the 12th longest winning stretch for the program.

Wilson is seen as an excellent instructional mind by FSU's student-athletes, which was evident from the first day of practice in the fall 2011. He is a reliable arm for batting practice who is always offering excellent teaching points to better enlighten each player. Wilson has proven to be an absolute student of the game who utilizes various statistics in his meticulous game-day preparation.

Wilson is a native of New Zealand who has already taken on an important role in recruiting. The baseball, softball and cricket veteran serves as the Seminoles' hitting and fielding coach, using his past success as a player to better serve his student-athletes.
"Travis is from both professional baseball and the New Zealand National Program," head coach Lonni Alameda said when Wilson first arrived in the summer 2011. "From the first time I met Travis I knew he would be a great fit for our program. It is not often you come across someone that has played the same game that the girls do and yet has 10 years of Major League Baseball experience. He is personable and he has won at the highest level of this game from the men's side. He has played every position you can on the field and has been among some of the world's best in men's fastpitch. I believe Travis will be able to relate to the players on a unique level as he stills plays the game. He is excited about this opportunity and can help our program get to the next level."

Alameda's words have become prophetic so far, with Wilson doing an excellent job of working with each student-athlete and enhancing their overall game. In just four seasons of work, countless players have improved their offense and expanded their defensive abilities through the work of Wilson.

From 1996-2004, Wilson played seven seasons in the Atlanta Braves organization covering all stops from Rookie Ball to Triple-A. He enjoyed much success in his professional stint, being named an All-Star for the Appalachian League (1998), South Atlantic League (1999) and the Carolina League (2000). He was named Carolina League Player of the Year for the Myrtle Beach Pelicans, and led the Grapefruit League in hitting for the Braves during spring training in 2001.

Wilson ended his professional career in 2004 with the Cincinnati Reds' organization in Chattanooga, Tenn. As a softball player in New Zealand for the Black Sox, he made his debut as a 16 -year old in 1994 and was named both the New Zealand Softballer of the Year and the Canterbury Softballer of the Year after posting a team-best . 396 batting average in 1996. He would earn the Canterbury Player of the Year honor multiple times and become one of his country's biggest softball ambassadors. Wilson also was named the New Zealand Softballer of the Year in 1996 and 2006, and was voted into the New Zealand Softball Hall of Fame in 2017.

Wilson's most recent baseball stint was as an instructor for the Idaho Falls, a Rookie League team of the Kansas City Royals. His tasks included scouting the Pioneer League, writing reports and utilizing video while communicating with the Royals organization on several prospects. His efforts have helped the Royals claim their status of having the best farm system in Major League Baseball, as asserted by several minor-league publications. On the field, he helped his players develop their infield/outfield skills, base running and hitting mechanics. Wilson also served as expert commentator for the ISF Men's World Softball Series, and was fielding coach and video analyst for the Black Caps of the New Zealand Cricket Association.

From 2015-2017, he has served as the assistant coach for the USSSA Pride of the National Pro Fastpitch league, helping the Pride lead the league in the regular season standings and finish second in the postseason in both 2015 and 2016, falling in the NPF Championship Series to the Chicago Bandits each year.

Wilson is married to his wife, Jill. The two have a son named Tyler and a daughter named Josie.

Assistant Florida State softball coach Craig Snider will start his seventh season with the Seminoles in 2018 and has already done wonders with the Seminole hitters in just six years in Tallahassee. The Noles have seen immense success in his four years at FSU, posting an .800 winning percentage (305-76-1) with four ACC Championships, five regular season ACC titles, five NCAA Super Regional trips and two appearances at the Women's College World Series, including a WCWS semifinal appearance in 2016.

Snider has guided the Noles to be more productive at the plate as FSU is routinely among the best in the ACC and the country in several offensive statistical categories. Florida State broke school records in home runs (71), doubles (93), batting average (.329) and slugging percentage (.544) in 2017, which added to the records for runs scored (459) and runs batted in (407) set in 2016.

Florida State matched its conference record with six All-ACC First Team members in 2017, as the Noles finished the season with a perfect 24-0 record. Only three schools in Power 5 conferences have ended the year undefeated, as the Noles are joined by Nebraska (16-0 in 1998) and Iowa (22-0 in 1997). Florida State has not lost an ACC series since 2012 and are 37-0-4 in their last 41 conference series and a combined 107-10 (.915) in regular series games against ACC opponents.

Junior third baseman Warren set the FSU career HR record in 2017, passing Maddie O'Brien's mark of 55 in just her third season and earned the second NFCA All-American honor of her career. The Seminoles earned their first-ever No. 1 ranking in the NFCA poll in 2017 and ended the year with a 55-8-1 record, marking the third time in the last four years that FSU has reached the 50-win plateau.

Behind a pair of All-American hitters - Alex Powers and Jessie Warren - the Noles finished 2016 in the top 10 nationally in on-base percentage, scoring, stolen bases and winning percentage. FSU posted a 21-2 record in the ACC in 2016 and ended the year in Oklahoma City with a 55-10 record.

In 2015, the Seminoles were among the top three in the conference in eight categories and led the ACC with 18 triples. The Noles were carried offensively in 2015 by a pair of freshmen, Jessie Warren and Morgan Klaevemann. Warren finished with 19 home runs and 57 RBI as she earned ACC Freshman of the Year honors, while Klaevemann posted a 26-game hitting streak - second-longest in FSU history and No. 24 all-time in NCAA history - and led the team with a .393 batting average.

Snider and the offense were an enormous part of the 2014 resurgence of FSU softball onto the national scene. The Seminoles posted a 55-9 record and won the school's 12th ACC Championship and advanced to the Women's College World Series for the first time since 2004.

The 2014 offense set several new records, many that were set just one year prior as Snider and the rest of the staff have been able to change the perception of Florida State being only a pitcher's school into one where the Seminoles perform all phases of the game at a high level. FSU broke the previous marks for runs scored (400), home runs (65), extra base hits (168), RBI (363), walks (318) and slugging percentage (.493). The Noles also finished with a . 304 batting average, which was the first time since 1995 that the team had finished with a mark above . 300 .

FSU placed four position players on the 2014 All-ACC Team (O'Brien, Senas, East and Hamilton) and also four on the ACC All-Tournament Team (O'Brien, Gomez, Hensley and Brown).

Despite his short time in Tallahassee, Snider had coached numerous players who are now listed on FSU's single-season top 10 list in many categories. Maddie O'Brien set school records in home runs (24), walks (56), RBI (83) and slugging percentage (.942) in 2014 on her way to being an NFCA First Team All-American and the ACC Player of the Year. Courtney Senas added 15 home runs, 57 RBI and tied Tiffani Brown with 65 runs scored. In all, eight of the top nine home run, the top five walk, the top six RBI and four of the top six run totals in Florida State single-season history have come from players coached by Snider since 2012.

The success in 2014 only built upon the foundation laid in 2013 that set school marks for home runs (60), RBIs (316) and slugging percentage (.476). In no way was the offense one-dimensional, as the Seminoles also posted a 292 batting average and recorded 156 extra base hits, just two shy of the program record at the time.

Snider helped accomplish so much success at the plate despite being without three key everyday players who were out with seasonending injuries early in the year. Known as a tradition-rich program with enormous pitching feats, Snider helped give a vital boost to the Seminole bats that helped carry the team along with good pitching in 2013 and watched three position players in Senas, freshman Victoria East and Bullock earn All-ACC selections.

Arriving in the summer of 2011, Snider helped foster a winning attitude and developed tremendous camaraderie with student-athletes and recruits immediately. He worked actively to improve the individual performances of several student-athletes in the 2012 season, helping players such as Briana Hamilton, Tiffani Brown, Kirstin Austin and others record banner years. Hamilton and Brown earned selections to the All-ACC First Team for the first time in their careers, while Austin's noticeable improvement at the plate gave the Seminoles an enormous spark throughout the year.


In 2012, Snider's daily teachings helped the team establish a strong sense of plate discipline. FSU's 230 walks were vital toward manufacturing runs, with it being the team's highest total since 2004. Throughout the season, the Seminole offense proved to be a clutch-hitting bunch that could come through in late-game situations. It was also a fundamentally-sound group that improved greatly in situational hitting, contributing to its 47-16 overall record.

The Franklin, Ky. native has built a reputation for being a difference maker everywhere he has been, which includes Stephen F. Austin, Oklahoma, Centenary and Lindsey Wilson College. Over the last decade, Snider has propelled each of his teams toward tremendous improvement at the plate, and looks to continue his history of success as FSU's hitting coach.

In his most recent stint at Stephen F. Austin as an assistant coach, Snider helped turn the Southland Conference program around right away. He took over as hitting coach in 2007 following a season in which the Ladyjacks finished with a .229 batting average. Over the next three seasons, SFA batted .274 (2008), 275 (2009) and .278 (2010). He also led the team to sharp spikes in home runs, on-base percentage and slugging percentage, as SFA recorded 43 round-trippers in Snider's first season after hitting just 16 the season before.

At Stephen F. Austin, Snider took on several roles in guiding the program toward its recent success. He devised hitting and defensive workouts during the fall, directed all aspects of camps, developed team-building exercises, served as a fundraising arm, handled much of the recruiting and recruiting databases and oversaw his student-athlete's academic progress.
"I'm extremely impressed with Craig's character," FSU head coach Lonni Alameda said. "He is a genuine person who works hard and loves the game. He has been a part of bigger programs as well as mid majors and I believe that makes him a tremendous coach as you have to be very creative in your coaching as you relate to different styles of athletes. Craig also brings a wealth of recruiting connections. He is very good with people and respected by many and he will now embrace those relationships as a Seminole."

Snider, who has been involved as a coach in softball since 2001, previously assisted in producing three All-Americans at Oklahoma from 2005-06, and played a large role in creating scouting reports as a graduate assistant coach for the Sooners. At his alma mater of Centenary, he helped lead the school to two Mid-Con Tournament championships while providing analysis for recruiting, hitting, fielding and putting together chart systems. His versatility also included field maintenance and even putting together the team's highlight videos in 2004 and 2005.

At Lindsey Wilson College from 2001-03, Snider guided the team to batting averages above .300 every season. He was heavily involved in the recruiting process as an assistant coach and oversaw all summer camps.

In 2017, Snider joined the coaching staff of the USSSA Pride in the National Pro Fastpitch league.
Snider is married to his wife, Lauren, who is a native of Bellville, Texas. The two have one daughter, Riley and one son, Henry.

## VOLUNTEER ASST COACH KENDRA LYNCH



Kendra Lynch comes to Florida State after an exceptional career at the University of North Carolina. From 2014-17, Lynch was a dual-threat player for the Tar Heels, posting a batting average of .320, with 188 hits, 32 doubles, 52 home runs, 168 RBI and a .644 slugging percentage from the plate, while adding a 45-29 record in the circle with a 4.42 ERA and 280 strikeouts in the circle.

Lynch, earned NFCA All-American Second Team honors and was a Top 34 finalist for USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year in 2017 after posting one of the best offensive seasons in UNC history - . 374 batting average, .791 slugging, 144 total bases, 13 doubles, 21 home runs and 68 RBI, setting single-season records in RBI and total bases, while hitting the second-most home runs.

She handled nearly all of the pitching for UNC in 2016, working $80 \%$ of the defensive innings in the circle and setting singleseason records for appearances (53), starts (47), innings (301.1) and complete games (33). She posted a 28-19 record, along with a save and five shutouts.

As a sophomore in 2015, Lynch started 43 games in the outfield, along with eight starts as a pitcher. She batted .302 while finishing fourth on the team with 12 home runs and 35 RBI, while amassing a record of 5-0 with 32 strikeouts in the circle.

The Indianapolis, Ind., native earned ACC Player of the Week twice in her career, as well as ACC Pitcher of the Week three times during her four years in Chapel Hill. She graduated in 2017 with a degree in Exercise and Sport Science and was a member of the Veteran Leaders program in the Richard A. Baddour Leadership Academy. She was awarded the title of Leader of Distinction, the highest award bestowed by the program.

Ellie Cooper remains a part of the Florida State softball program, but takes her next step into the coaching ranks as a student assistant coach in 2018 after wearing the Garnet and Gold from 20142017.

Cooper led the Seminoles to four consecutive ACC regular season and ACC Tournament Championships, four apperances in the NCAA Super Regional round and two trips to the Women's College World Series (2014 and 2016).

A two-time All-ACC member and an NFCA All-Region member in 2016, she finished her career with a .319 batting average, 191 hits, 141 runs scored, 31 doubles, seven triples, seven home runs, 122 RBI, 80 walks and 26 stolen bases. Her 122 RBI rank 10th all-time in Florida State history, while her runs scored and walk totals are just outside the top 10 .

The team captain in 2017, Cooper not only led the Noles on the field, but also helped set the tone for the program off the field as a member of the FSU Softball Tribe. The softball team has consistently given back to the community and in 2014 and 2015 earned the FSU Director's Cup for Service, given to the athletic program that amassed the most community service hours per team on campus.

Cooper also excelled in the classroom, earning All-ACC Academic Team and NFCA Scholar-Athlete honors throughout her career, as well as receiving CoSIDA Academic All-Region First Team honors in 2015.

She has been a member of the New Zealand National Team since 2012 and its team captain since 2016. She has played all over the world in Junior and Senior level tournaments and World Championships.

## 2017 SEASON IN REVIEW

- The Seminoles earned their first-ever No. 1 national ranking on February 21, which was held for eight consecutive weeks. The eight No. 1 rankings is the 12th-most all time among the 17 schools to ever hold the top spot in the National Fastpitch Coaches Association poll.
- Advanced to the NCAA Super Regional for the fifth season in a row and appeared in the NCAA Tournament for 30th time overall and 18th consecutive year, becoming one of nine schools to participate in the NCAA postseason every year since 2000 - Alabama, Arizona, Louisiana, Michigan, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, UCLA and Washington. The Seminoles have won each of their last 13 games in the regional round of the NCAA Tournament and have outscored their opponents by a combined score of 47-11. FSU is 59-39 all-time in the NCAA Regional Round.
- FSU was a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, which was the highest postseason ranking in school history. The Noles have been one of the top eight national seeds in three of the last four seasons.
- Won its fourth straight ACC Championship and 15th overall, defeating Virginia (16-0), Notre Dame (6-0) and North Carolina (4-3) at the ACC Tournament in Chapel Hill, N.C.
- Matched or set eight different records during the ACC Championship: Anna Shelnutt tied a single-game record with two home runs against Virginia on May 11, while her seven RBI broke the previous record of five. Those seven runs were part of a 12 -run third inning against the Cavaliers, setting a new record for runs in an inning, and helping the Noles break the record for runs in a game with 16 . Overall, FSU hit four home runs in the game to tie the previous record, while the 16 RBI set a new single-game
 mark. As a team, the Seminoles drove in 26 RBI in their three games, tying the record set by Georgia Tech in 2006 over five games.
- Earned fifth straight ACC regular season championship with a perfect 24-0 record in the ACC. Became the first Power 5 school to go undefeated in conference play since Nebraska (16-0) in 1998.
- Lonni Alameda was named ACC Coach of the Year for the fifth year in a row.
- Placed a league-record six members on the All-ACC First Team - Jessie Warren, Jessica Burroughs, Morgan Klaevemann, Sydney Broderick, Alex Powers and Meghan King. Warren was named ACC Player of the Year and ACC Defensive Player of the Year, while Burroughs received ACC Pitcher of the Year honors for the second year in a row. Sophomore Cali Harrod was also selected to the All-ACC Second Team.
- Had four student-athletes named NFCA All-Americans - Jessie Warren, Jessica Burroughs, Morgan Klaevemann and Alex Powers. It marked the first time in the fastpitch era (since 1984) that the Noles have had four All-Americans in one season.
- It also increased the total to 12 NFCA All-Americans in nine seasons under Alameda.
- Morgan Klaevemann was also named a CoSIDA Academic All-American, becoming just the second Seminole to receive both athletic and academic All-American honors in the same year, joining Brandi Stuart (2002)
- Florida State tied a school record with six members on the NFCA Southeast All-Region teams, including four on the First Team. Redshirt seniors Jessica Burroughs and Alex Powers, along with juniors Jessie Warren and Morgan Klaevemann were chosen on the First Team, while senior Sydney Broderick and redshirt sophomore Meghan King were named to the Second and Third Teams, respectively. It was the fifth time in school history

that the Seminoles had six student-athletes chosen to the NFCA All-Region Teams.

- Jessica Burroughs (Feb. 21) and Jessie Warren (April 11) each received NFCA National Player of the Week honors.
- Jessica Burroughs was the No. 1 overall pick in the 2017 NPF Draft, becoming just the third Seminole ever to be selected No. 1 in a professional draft (Paul Wilson - 1994 MLB, Jameis Winston - 2015 NFL).
- Alex Powers received the 2017 Senior CLASS Award for softball, a national award given for excellence in the community, classroom, character and competition. She is the third Seminole ever to win the Senior CLASS Award, joining baseball's James Ramsey (2012) and softball's Lacey Waldrop (2015)
- Powers was also selected as the 2017 ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year as Florida State placed seven members on the All-ACC Academic Team as Powers was joined by Morgan Klaevemann, Sydney Broderick, Ellie Cooper, Meghan King, Dani Morgan and Anna Shelnutt
- Individual records were broken in 2017 as Alex Powers became the all-time leader in doubles (51) and tied the single-season mark in doubles (19), Jessie Warren passed the previous record for career home runs (62), and Jessica Burroughs tied the career (9) and single-season (4) marks for saves.
- The Seminoles were well represented on the ACC weekly accolades as an FSU student-athlete was recognized eight times during the 2017 season. Jessica Burroughs led the team with four ACC Pitcher of the Week awards (Feb. 21, March 7, March 21, March 28), while Jessie Warren was selected as ACC Player of the Week on March 21 and May 2, while Carsyn Gordon (March 28 - Player) and Meghan King (May 2 - Pitcher) each received one honor apiece.
- Jessica Burroughs and Jessie Warren were both among the Top 10 Finalists for the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year. Florida State was one of two schools to have multiple players on the list, joining Arizona's Katyiana Mauga and Danielle O'Toole. The ACC led all conferences with three finalists, as Syracuse's Sydney O'Hara was also honored.
- Florida State had outstanding defense in 2017, recording 25 shutouts on the season in their 64 games played. Along with the 25 shutouts, which obviously meant that no runner reached home plate, there were 14 games that an opposing runner did not reach third base. Also, there were three games - Florida A\&M (Feb. 11), Georgia Tech (March 5) and at Virginia (April 26) - where no runner reached second base.

## NINE WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES•15 ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS 198181982 NATIONAL CHAMPTONS

Before the games were televised on ESPN and before there were professional leagues, the main goal of collegiate softball was to go out, give your best and try to win, but mainly the student-athletes were there because they loved the game and they wanted to have fun. For two years in the early 1980's, the Florida State softball team not only had fun, but also dominated its competition and brought home a pair of national championships.

There was plenty of reason for optimism going into the 1981 season after FSU won 13 of its last 15 games the year before and was one game away from advancing to the AIAW National Tournament. Countering the momentum from 1980 was the inexperience of the 1981 roster which featured only six returnees but a host of talented newcomers.
"It was a lot of fun," former head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf said. "They had known each other from summer league ball so I think there was a lot of respect right away. Anytime you win it's a whole lot of fun. That team was in every game, they won, obviously, most of them, but it's always fun to coach people who win and they worked hard. They just had that confidence, that air that they were going to have to lose the game; no one was going to beat them."

Any concerns about the 1981 season were quickly erased as the Seminoles ran out to a 19-2 start with a trio of tournament titles. The only hiccup during the year came at the South Florida Invitational as FSU lost three of four but that also served as a wake up call as the Seminoles won 16-straight games to push their record to 38-5.

Just when the Seminoles had everything going in their favor, another bump in the road came. Winners of its last 16 games, FSU dropped a pair of games to East Carolina to finish second at the North Carolina State Invitational. But just like the losses at South Florida, the setback refocused the Seminoles when they needed it the most.

Few would have guessed that the 5-2 loss to the Pirates would be the Seminoles' last of the season. FSU took four-straight heading into the FAIAW State Tournament where it breezed to the state title with four more wins to match the most wins in school history. Up next was the AIAW Region III Tournament where the Seminoles took the next step, sweeping four more games to advance to the National Tournament.

Proving its versatility, FSU won every way possible, outscoring Western Carolina 13-9 in the first game before winning a defensive triumph 4-3 over North Carolina State. FSU disposed of the Pirates 12-3 then beat North Carolina 4-1 to capture the school's first national championship in women's athletics.

Postseason accolades came in for Darby Cottle as the shortstop collected All-America honors after hitting .428. Joining her on the AllAmerica squad was second baseman Jan Sikes as she hit . 477.
"Those teams were so full of life, heart, we had great camaraderie," former player Susan Painter said. "It started at the top with JoAnne. We had a great group of players, but she was the main component. She kept us on top and kept fighting for us and for the title. Every great team has a fit and that one certainly did. It was quite a group. We still keep in touch, but I miss that."

The pieces were in place for another run in 1982 and the Seminoles wasted no time as they won their first 12 games, highlighted by the title at the Florida Invitational - including eight shutouts. Ironically the "low point" of the season came at the Lady Seminole Invitational where FSU lost three in a row.

But just like they had done the previous year, the Seminoles bounced back to win 10-straight, including titles at the Friendly City and South Florida Invitationals. Twice during the middle half of the season the Seminoles scored 30 runs or more, including a 39-5 drubbing of Georgia Southern.

Despite all of FSU's success that year - the Seminoles won four of six regular season tournaments - there was one team it could not get past: rival Florida. Of the 10 losses that season, six came to the Gators, including back-to-back losses at the Montgomery Invitational where FSU finished second.


Similar to 1981, the losses refocused the Seminoles as they won their next 12 going into the FAIAW tournament. UF got the Tribe again 2-1 in the third game, but the Seminoles won a pair to claim the state title. Florida State had relatively little trouble in the regional tournament, only dropping a 2-1 decision to South Florida before beating the Bulls for the trophy.

The stage was set for a repeat and the Seminoles were on a mission having won 21 of their last 23 games. The first three games were a breeze as FSU outscored its opponents 46-6 with wins over Georgia Southern, South Florida and UNC-Charlotte. All that stood between FSU and its second national championships were the Florida Gators.

While Florida State held an 8-6 lead in the season series, Florida was the only team that had been close to FSU over the last five years and handed the Seminoles their worst loss in school history at the time, a 14-0 defeat during the middle of the season. With the championship on the line the Seminoles were at their best and they prevailed 9-4 to claim their second-straight national championship.

The accolades poured in for the Seminoles again, headed by Cottle who was named the Broderick Award winner as the AIAW Player of the Year. She was joined on the All-America squad by Natalie Drouin, Painter, Toni Robinette and Sikes.
"We were like a big family, I don't even remember anyone not getting along," Drouin said. "We had two great teams and I don't know which one was better. They were pretty equal. At the time none of us really knew what we had accomplished, we just wanted to do our best and have fun, but afterwards it was thrilling."

The Seminoles won 110 games those two years with a 54-7 record in 1981 and a 56-10 mark the year after. Florida State was an offensive juggernaut those two seasons, scoring an average of 9.2 runs per game. What might be even more impressive was the Seminoles' pitching and defense. Behind Painter, the team's lone pitcher, FSU gave up only 2.7 runs per game, a number that is unfathomable in slow pitch.
"I remember a lot of team unity and enthusiasm," Cottle said. "We were a group of winners, that's for sure, and we were a team that was willing to do whatever it took to get to the top. I'm just proud to have been part of the teams that started a tradition of winning."

While the AIAW was disbanded one year later and FSU went to NCAA competition in 1984, the players on those teams were the founders of a legacy that continues today.

## DR. JOANNE GRAF

Dr. JoAnne Graf spent 30 successful seasons at the helm of the Florida State softball program. With 1,437 victories under her belt, Graf retired on June 15, 2008, with more wins than any other head coach in collegiate softball.

The first collegiate softball coach to earn 1,400 victories, Graf's numerous achievements with Florida State softball include AIAW slowpitch national championships in 1981 and 1982, seven trips to the Women's College World Series, with the first coming in 1986 (just four years after FSU went to NCAA fastpitch softball), 21 NCAA Regional appearances and 10 Atlantic Coast Conference titles.

On April 2, 2005, then-Florida State University President Dr. T.K. Wetherell officially renamed the softball stadium "JoAnne Graf Field at the Seminole


Softball Complex," making her among only two active softball coaches with fields named after them. On September 13, 2013, Graf was inducted into the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame

One of the most prolific coaches in collegiate softball, Graf concluded her career having won 75 percent of her games (1,437-478-6), including a 1,218-425-6 (.740) mark in NCAA Division I play. Her NCAA career win total is currently 11th all-time. Florida State averaged 50.75 wins per year under her guidance since beginning NCAA play ranked No. 1 during that span.

Graf is a 1975 graduate of Florida State. In 1992, she earned her doctorate degree in athletic administration at FSU, and taught at her alma mater until her retirement in 2013.
