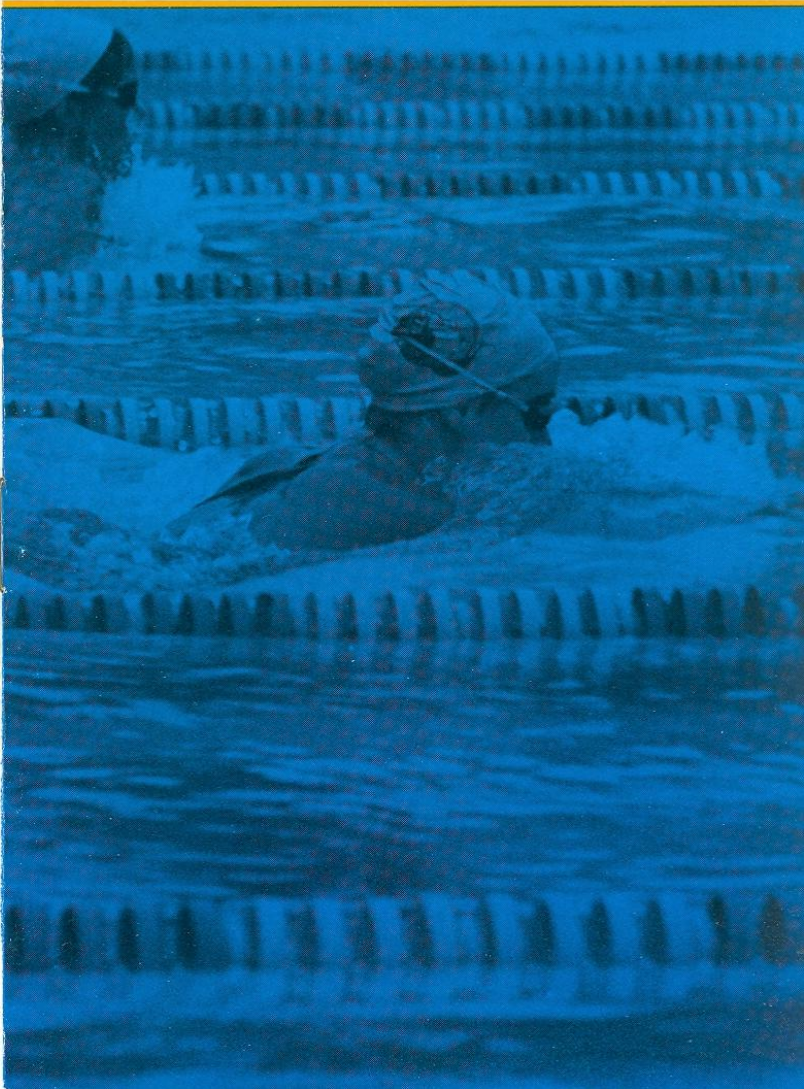

Why FSU?

For years, parents, coaches and educators have praised sports and athletics as a means for improving physical abilities and developing character. There is little argument against the fact that participation in a regularly scheduled athletic training program will improve the physical status of those involved. But what of sports as a character builder? Do individuals involved in athletics develop into more self-confident, understanding, humane, moral, achievement-oriented individuals? Does the experience give the participant a clearer understanding of her environment, herself, her peers, her lifestyle, the lifestyle of others, and the value of such things as dedication, positive thinking, perseverance, humility, etc.? Unfortunately, in today's society these questions may not always be answered affirmatively.

With the extensive involvement of our society in the sports world of today, the emphasis on winning and being number one has emerged as the priority in most athletic programs. This fact, plus the close economic ties to the production of winners has caused many athletic organizations to become so totally involved in winning that they lost sight of the potential of their sport as a means for character development.

WINNING IS IMPORTANT! Yet there is also an opportunity to learn through sport experiences. The potential does in fact exist. Many researchers and extremely knowledgeable men and women will agree that the athletic experience can aid in the development of the values mentioned earlier, IF DIRECTED TO THAT END.

Herein lies the philosophy of coaching in the Florida State program. The F.S.U. program is set up to develop the whole individual, not only physically, but mentally as well. Character traits such as perseverance, dedication, self-confidence, caring for others, "sportsmanship" and basic understanding of one's capabilities and limitations receive an equal amount of attention as do stroke work, interval training and meet performance.

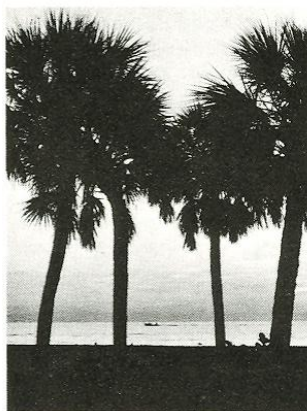

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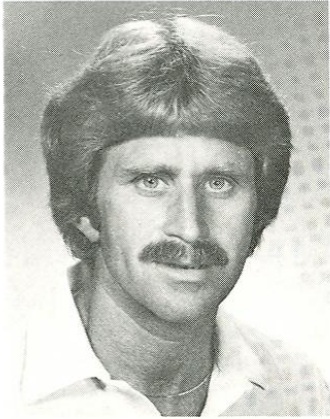

Terry Maul HEAD COACH

Entering his eighth year as head coach of the Lady Seminole swimming program, head coach Terry Maul has



built one of the finest programs in the country today.

Working from the philosophy that each individual should have the opportunity to develop to her fullest potential academically, educationally and athletically, Maul has built consistent winning teams at Florida State, while at the same time insuring the development of the individual in the college setting.

Proof of success of this philosophy comes from a quick glance at Maul's record. During the course of his tenure, Maul coached teams have racked up an impressive 52-19 record in dual meets. His 1982 team finished the year with a 6-2 record, a first place finish at the National Independent Championships and a second place finish at the AIAW National Championships. During this same time period, Maul has coached 27 swimmers to All-American status.

Despite the time required of his athletes to achieve these lofty athletic goals, Maul insists that academics come first with his team. Each year, an academic excellence award is presented by the women's athletic department to the squad with the highest grade point average on campus. Since the award's inception three years ago, Maul's squad has been the winner each time.



"We strive for excellence in both athletics and academics," Maul says. "Our academic goal is to have a team grade point average of at least 3.0. Athletically, we want each member to develop to her full potential."

A former Seminole swimmer, Maul graduated from Florida State with a bachelor's degree in 1968. He then earned a master's degree in sports psychology in 1975; and has completed all class work for a doctorate in the same area.

Maul's coaching career began during his undergraduate days at FSU, where he coached summer swimming teams in both Tallahassee and Wellington, Kansas.

In 1971, Maul became manager and coach of the Sheridan Swimming Club in Quincy, Ill. It is there that he developed Nicole Kramer, who would later become a member of the 1976 United States Olympic team. Other top swimmers that Maul has coached include Laurie Lehner, who last year became only the second female swimmer in history to break the 23 second barrier in the 50-free.

In addition to an outstanding coaching career, Maul has authored several articles on swimming and sports psychology that have been published in professional journals. He also serves as president for the National Collegiate Women's Swimming Coaches Association. Maul is responsible for developing and editing a research newsletter for that organization which circulates quarterly to over 400 coaches throughout the world.

Jodi Yambor ASSISTANT COACH

A former All-American swimmer at the University of Miami, Jodi Yambor enters her fourth season as assistant swimming coach at Florida State University. As Terry Maul's chief assistant, Yambor is in charge of coaching swimmers in the sprint events, as well as handling certain administrative tasks as assigned by Maul.



Yambor started her coaching duties in 1979, following graduation from Miami with a bachelor's degree the year before. While with the Lady Hurricanes, Yambor was a four year All-American. During her career,

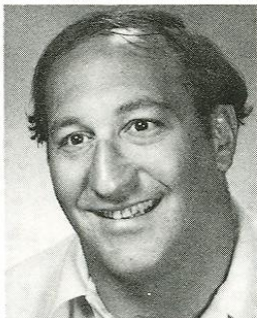
Yambor helped Miami win the AIAW National Championships twice. Yambor claimed three national championships during her career, as a member of the 1976-77-78 200-yard medley relay team at UM.

In addition to coaching at the collegiate level, Yambor has experience coaching at the club level. Coaching age group and senior swimmers, Yambor instructed at the Carrollwood Village Swimming Club in Tampa, and the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club.

Yambor received her master's degree in movement science from FSU in 1980, and is currently working on a doctorate in sports psychology.

Andrew Lehner ASSISTANT COACH

Andrew Lehner is in his second year as assistant coach to the Lady Seminoles. As an assistant to Terry Maul, Lehner is mainly concerned with coaching the distance events and overseeing the strength program.



A native of Caldwell, N.J., Lehner came to FSU after coaching several years on the club level. From 1980-81, Lehner served as age group coach with the Ft. Lauderdale Swimming Team. Prior to that period, he served in a similar capacity at the North Houston Dolphins Swim Club (Texas) from

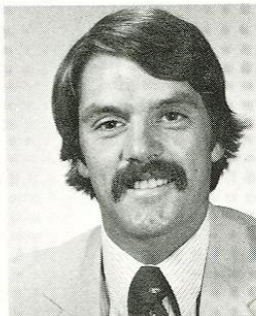
1979-80 and at the Somerset Hill YMCA Club (New Jersey) from 1978-79. Lehner is presently also head senior coach with the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club.

Before entering the coaching field, Lehner was a standout athlete at both Southern California (USC) and Monmouth College. At USC, Lehner finished 11th at the 1973 NCAA Championships in the 100-fly. After transferring to Monmouth, Lehner went on to set an NCAA record in the same event.

During his last season at USC, Lehner earned a spot on the USA senior national team.

Gary Cole DIVING COACH

The newest member of the Florida State coaching staff is diving coach Gary Cole. A graduate of Bowling Green



University, Cole brings seven years of coaching experience to his post.

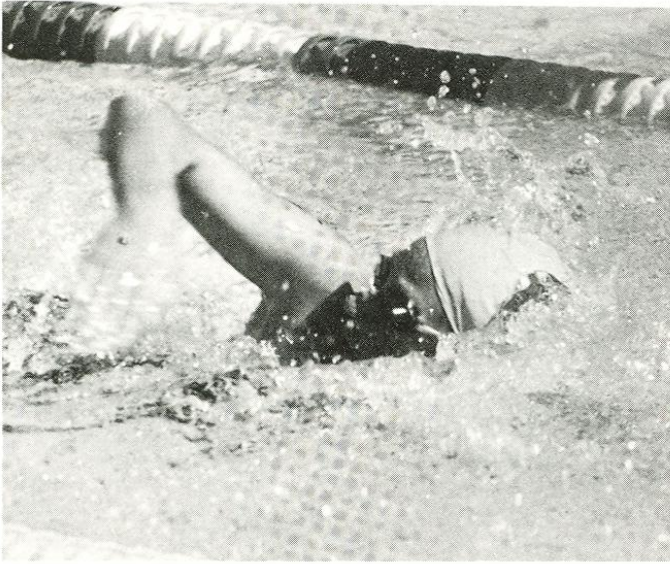
Cole comes to Florida State from Auburn University, where he served as head diving coach for both the men's and women's teams for the past three and one-half years.

Prior to coaching at Auburn, Cole worked one year as assistant diving coach at Michigan State University; as well as coaching for three additional years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Mich.

While at Tulip, six of Cole's pupils earned high school All-American honors; with one winning a national title. At Auburn, six of Cole's divers made it to the finals of the U.S. Senior National Championships.

A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien — U.S. Olympic diving coach from 1972-80.





1983 OUTLOOK: Striving Higher

"In prior years when asked about our goal for the coming year, I always replied that we wanted to finish in the top 10 nationally. I will not repeat that statement anymore because it sounds like we would be satisfied with 10th. I want this team to strive towards the best possible finish attainable."

With these words, FSU head coach Terry Maul summed up his goals for the 1982-83 season. Entering his eighth year at the helm, Maul carefully worded the statement because by using the words "top 10" he felt that he may be placing a limit on the possibilities for his Lady Seminoles.

Maul has reason to be optimistic. Despite losing one of the greatest swimmers in the country when Laurie Lehner decided not to return to school for her senior year of competition, FSU returns possibly its strongest team ever.

Fresh off a 6-2 season where the Lady Seminoles finished second at the AIAW National Championships, Maul returns 16 lettermen — including seven All-Americans. This core of returning lettermen was mostly responsible for FSU's first place finish at the National Independent Championships, as well as the lofty national finish.

"We return a solid group of veterans," Maul says. "Last year we finished second at the AIAW Nationals, but if you compare times from the AIAW and NCAA nationals and scored it as one meet, I'm sure we would have finished sixth or seventh overall."

In addition to the return of a solid group of veterans, Maul went out and signed a top recruiting class. Leading the list of signees is Sara Linke of Walnut Creek, Calif. Linke, a high school All-American several times over, was listed as one of the top three recruits in the country. Linke won a national title at the AAU Long Course Championships this summer, as well as earning a spot on the United States World Games team.

From event to event, FSU will field a solid group of individuals. In the butterfly events, the loss of Lehner will be a key one. Senior Lenore Gribble returns to lead FSU in the fly events. She was an AIAW finalist in this event a year ago. Linke, who competed in the 200-meters for the US at the World Game in Ecuador, will provide win potential at all distances. With the return of Kim Dunlop to the team, along with freshman Cheryl Kupan and veterans Amy Davis and Julie Day, the Lady Seminoles will be solid in this event.

Again the loss of Lehner will hurt FSU in the sprints. With Lehner only the second woman to break the 23 second barrier in the 50-free, both the individual events and sprint relay squads will need to find adequate replacements. With the return of Gribble, Sharon Spuler and Simone Kusseling, FSU will be solid but must receive help from either Linke, Stacey Deck or Kim Foster to shore up the relays.

In the backstroke, FSU again will have good depth. All-American Meg McCully, 57.71 in the 100-back, has graduated but Deck, Kim Foster and freshman Lori Skrobiak have all recorded times between 59.00 and 1:00 flat in the 100-back and should fill the void left by McCully.

The breast stroke may be one of FSU's best events. All-American Sharon Spuler placed in the finals in both the 50 and 100-breast last year to lead the group of returners. Although having a disappointing freshman year, second year team member Sonya Booth could provide the Lady Seminoles with a second national championship point scorer.

At the middle distance events, Linke will be an odds on favorite to place high in both the 200 and 500-free events. Linke is the first Florida State swimmer to ever win a Long Course Senior National Championship. Deck, Foster and sophomore transfer Patty Hoffman, a national Junior College All-American at Daytona Beach CC, will supply excellent depth.

In distance events, FSU will for the first time concentrate two swimmers in the mile event. Traditionally a concern of the Lady Seminoles, sophomore Kelly Hillencamp and Hoffman will try to shore this event up. Amy Davis may also swim the 1000 and 1650-free on occasion.

Based on past performances, Linke will help Florida State tremendously in the 200 and 400-IM. Linke's times in both events place her in the top six nationally. Former national qualifier Julie Day will compete in the IM events as well.

New diving coach Gary Cole has recruited several new divers for FSU, including all-state diver Patsy O'Toole from Louisville, Ky. With the return of Camille Cox and Susan Hahn, Florida State will field a much stronger diving contingent.

In the all important relays, the 400-free and 400-medley have top 10 potential. If a replacement for Lehner can be found, both the 200-free and 200-medley relay teams may also place among the nation's best. In the 800-free, national point scoring potential exists if the remaining 200-free swimmers blend well with Linke.

How high does Maul believe FSU will finish this season? "Well it's really hard to say now that we're competing in the NCAA instead of the AIAW. In the NCAA's they score the top 12 finishers, while the AIAW scored the top 16. Great depth was rewarded more in the AIAW's. We have several potential NCAA finalists and we will be a factor in the national meet."

N.B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

Long known as one of the most respected swimming programs in the country, Florida State's home facility is the spacious N.B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center, located conveniently on the FSU campus.

Named after the legendary former Florida State swimming coach, Stults Aquatic Center is the home of both FSU's swimming teams — as well as being the center for many physical education and recreational activities.

Heated for maximum comfort, the pool itself sports two standard 25-yard collegiate courses. With the outside lanes two feet from the wall, they are as fast as the middle lanes. The same holds true for the 50-meter "long course".

In addition, the pool is equipped with Keefer lane lines at both the 25-yard and 50-meter distances, has extremely deep gutters, and also has three underwater windows for stroke analysis and filming.

Diving areas at the center meet or exceed the published specifications as outlined by the NCAA and AAU. FSU's diving areas include a pair of one meter boards, a pair of three meter boards and a platform diving area. All four boards are mounted on Durafilm fulcrums and the tower possesses platforms at five, seven and a half, and ten meters.

Florida State's facilities offer fine dry practice facilities. A complete Nautilus weight system is available for strength training year round for FSU swimmers.

Florida State's facility is due to undergo a massive renovation. With over \$1 million committed, repairs and refurbishments scheduled will make the Bim Stults Aquatic Center one of the finest anywhere.

C. W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director



C. W. "Hootie" Ingram is in his second year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since coming to Florida State, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities that will include a new athletic administration building and

improvements to the football stadium, baseball complex and swimming pool area.

Ingram had been associated with the SEC office for eight years. He was first an assistant commissioner before being named associate commissioner (1978).

A native of Tuscaloosa, Al., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions.

After an Army stint, Ingram turned to coaching. He started as an assistant at Bradenton (Fl.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He later moved into college coaching and had stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas as an assistant. His only college football head coaching assignment began in 1970 when he succeeded the veteran Frank Howard as head coach at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.

Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with the Florida State athletic program since 1977. As associate athletic director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program.

Since her arrival on campus, the FSU women's program has grown to the point where it is now considered among the top five programs in the country.

All eight women's sports have turned in winning records over the past three years. There have been three national championships won, including back-to-back titles by the softball team in 1981 and 1982. And finally, last season Florida State sent every team to a national tournament, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the nation.

Simply put, Barbara Palmer has been the energy behind that climb toward national excellence. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

So great has been Palmer's impact on the growth of women's athletics in the state of Florida that she was chosen to the inaugural Women's Florida Hall of Fame by Governor Bob Graham last summer. She was one of just six women elected from a field of 226 candidates.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

This is Florida State

Florida State University — the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles — has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West

Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.



Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capitol City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million before the end of 1983.
