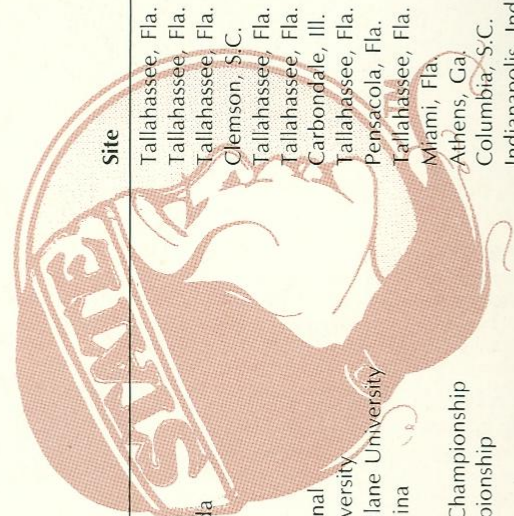
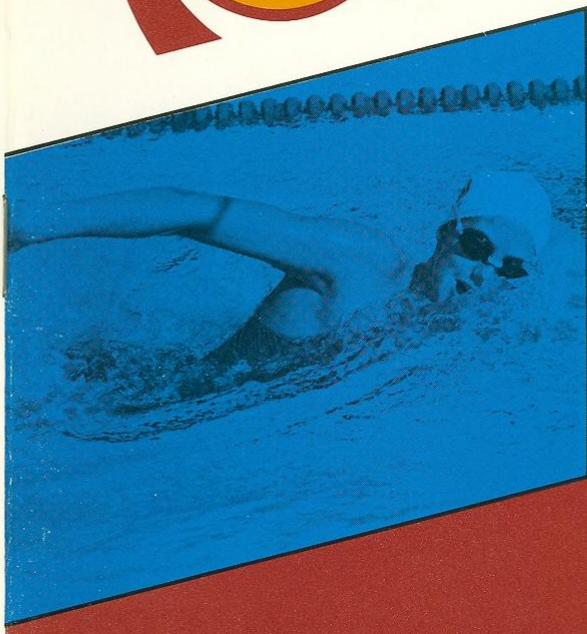
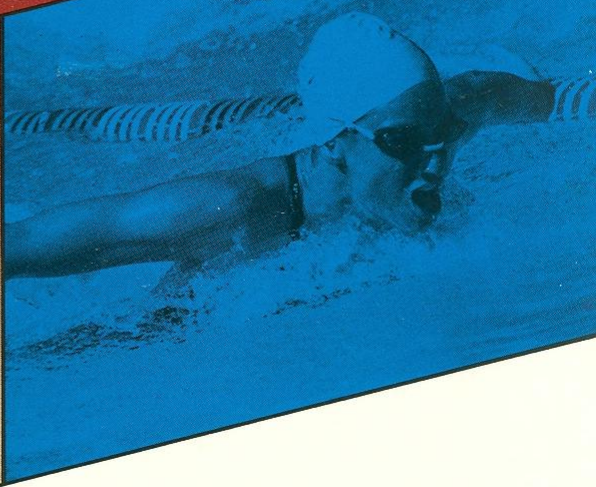

Why FSU?


For years, parents, coaches and educators have praised sports and athletics as a means for improving physical abilities and developing character. There is little argument against the fact that participation in a regularly scheduled athletic training program will improve the physical status of those involved. But what of sports as a character builder? Do individuals involved in athletics develop into more self-confident, understanding, humane, moral, achievement-oriented individuals? Does the experience give the participant a clearer understanding of her environment, herself, her peers, her lifestyle, the lifestyle of others, and the value of such things as dedication, positive thinking, perseverance, humility, etc.? Unfortunately, in today's society these questions may not always be answered affirmatively.

With the extensive involvement of our society in the sports world of today, the emphasis on winning and being number one has emerged as the priority in most athletic programs. This fact, plus the close economic ties to the production of winners has caused many athletic organizations to become so totally involved in winning that they lost sight of the potential of their sport as a means for character development.

WINNING IS IMPORTANT! Yet there is also an opportunity to learn through sport experiences. The potential does in fact exist. Many researchers and extremely knowledgeable men and women will agree that the athletic experience can aid in the development of the values mentioned earlier, IF DIRECTED TO THAT END.

Herein lies the philosophy of coaching in the Florida State program. The FSU program is set up to develop the whole individual, not only physically, but mentally as well. Character traits such as perseverance, dedication, self-confidence, caring for others, "sportsmanship" and basic understanding of one's capabilities and limitations receive an equal amount of attention as do stroke work, interval training and meet performance.

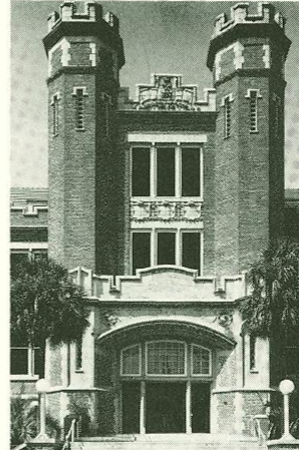

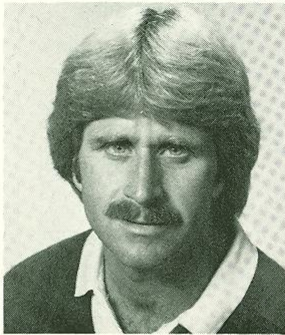

Terry Maul HEAD COACH



In nine years, Terry Maul has built Lady Seminole swimming into one of the truly great collegiate programs in America today.

Working from the philosophy that each individual should have the opportunity to develop to her fullest potential academically, educationally and athletically, Maul has built consistent winning teams at Florida State, while at the same time insuring the development of the individual in the college setting.

Proof of success of this philosophy comes from a quick glance at Maul's record. During the course of his tenure, Maul-coached teams have racked up an impressive 58-21 record in dual meet competition, for a winning percentage of .734. His 1982 team won the National Independent Championships (NIC) and placed second at the AIAW National Championships. During his tenure at Florida State, Maul has coached 28 swimmers to All-American status.

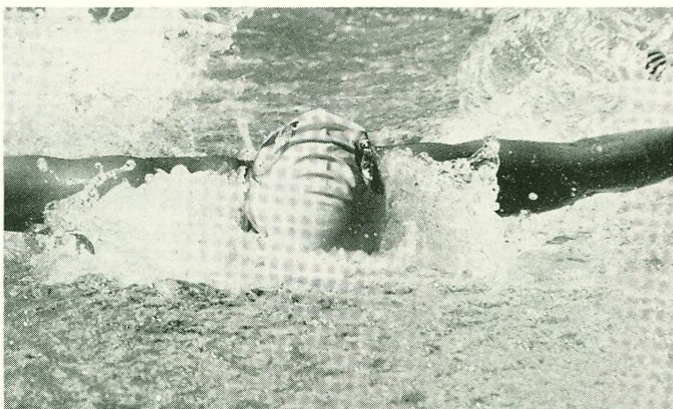
Despite the time required of his athletes to achieve these lofty athletic goals, Maul insists that academics come first with his team. Each year, an academic excellence award is presented by the women's athletic department to the squad with the highest grade point average on campus. Since the award's inception four years ago, Maul's squad has been the winner each time.

"We strive for excellence in both athletics and academics," Maul says. "Our academic goal is to have a team grade point average of at least 3.0. Athletically, we want each member to develop to her full potential."

A former Seminole swimmer, Maul graduated from Florida State with a bachelor's degree in biology in 1968. He then earned a master's degree in sports psychology in 1975; and has completed all class work for a doctorate in the same area.

Maul's coaching career began during his undergraduate days at FSU, where he coached summer swimming teams in both Tallahassee and Wellington, Kansas.

In 1971, Maul became manager and coach of the Sheridan Swimming Club in Quincy, Ill. It was there that he developed Nicole Kramer, who would later become a member of the 1976 United States Olympic Team. Other top swimmers that Maul has



coached include former FSU star Laurie Lehner, who won the 100 meter butterfly at both the Pan American and Pan Pacific Games this past summer. She posted the fastest 100 meter butterfly time in the world during the summer as well (59.54).

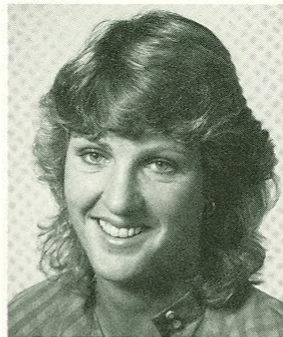
In addition to an outstanding coaching career, Maul has authored several articles on swimming and sports psychology that have been published in professional journals. He has also served as president of the National Collegiate Women's Swimming Coaches Association. Maul is responsible for developing and editing a research newsletter for that organization which circulates quarterly to over 400 coaches throughout the world.

Jodi Yambor ASSISTANT COACH



A 16-time All-American at the University of Miami, Jodi Yambor is now in her fifth season as an assistant on the Florida State women's swimming staff.

As Terry Maul's chief assistant, Yambor is handling certain administrative tasks as assigned, as well as utilizing her talents in the area of sports psychology to direct the team's mental preparation.

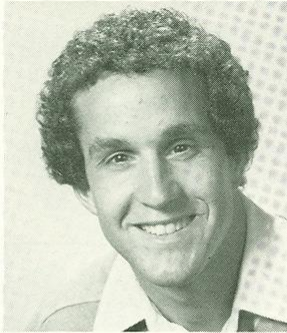
Yambor began her coaching career in 1979, after graduating with honors in psychology from Miami.

While with the Lady Hurricanes, she was a four year All-American and twice helped Miami to the AIAW National Championship. Yambor claimed three national championships during her career, as a member of the 1976-77-78 200-yard medley relay team at UM.

In addition to coaching at the collegiate level, Yambor has experience coaching at the club level. Coaching age group and senior swimmers, Yambor has instructed at the Carrollwood Village Swimming Club in Tampa, the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club, and the Pine Crest Swim Club.

Yambor received her master's degree in movement science from FSU in 1980, and is currently working on a doctorate in sports psychology.

Greg Dietrich ASSISTANT COACH



Greg Dietrich, a native of Lancaster, Pa., begins his first year as an assistant to Terry Maul.

"Greg has an extensive background in stroke mechanics and will work primarily in that area," Maul says.

Prior to accepting the FSU assignment, Dietrich spent the past two years as an adult conditioning instructor in Tallahassee. Before that he gained valuable experience as a coach at the Tallahassee Area Aquatic Club (ATAC), working with

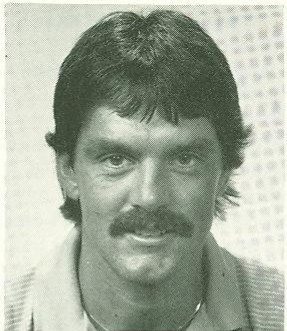
every age group level.

While at ATAC, one of his girl swimmers went on to qualify in all 11 events offered at the Florida Junior Olympics. Other coaching assignments include three years of work at the Pompano Beach (Fla.) Swim Club and a summer as head coach for the East Hill Baptist Church swim team.

Currently pursuing his masters degree in math, Dietrich already has graduated from FSU with a Bachelor of Science degree in math education and is serving as a teaching assistant for the Department of Math at FSU.

The 23-year old Dietrich was a breaststroke specialist during his AAU and high school swimming days in Pennsylvania. In addition to his coaching duties with the women's squad, he will also handle administrative duties for the squad as assigned by Maul.

Gary Cole DIVING COACH



Gary Cole is in his second year as diving coach for both the men's and women's programs at Florida State. Last season he won NIC Women's Coach of the Year honors in his initial campaign. A graduate of Bowling Green University, Cole came to Florida State from Auburn University where he served as head diving coach for both men's and women's teams for three and one-half years.

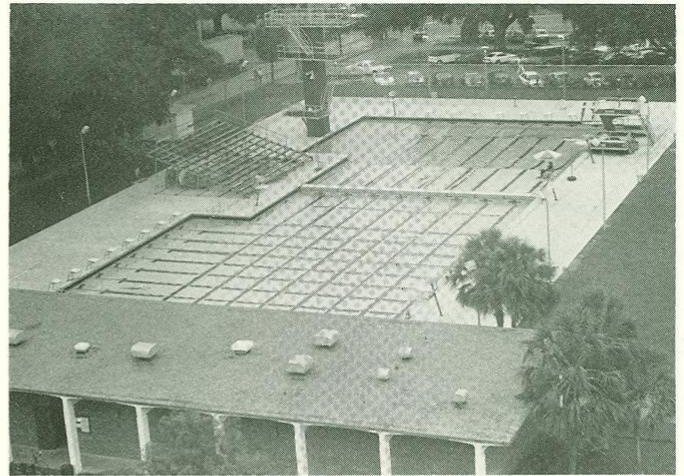
Prior to the Auburn assignment, Cole worked one year as assistant

diving coach at Michigan State University, as well as coaching for three additional years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Mich.

While at Tulip, six of Cole's pupils earned high school All-American acclaim; with one winning a national title. At Auburn, six of Cole's divers made it to the finals of the U.S. Senior National Championships.

Distinguished among his peers, Cole is a member of the NCAA Rules Committee for Diving as well as the U.S. Diving Law Legislation Committee. He is also in charge of all clinics for the U.S. Diving Coaches Association.

A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien, U.S. Olympic diving coach since 1972.



N. B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

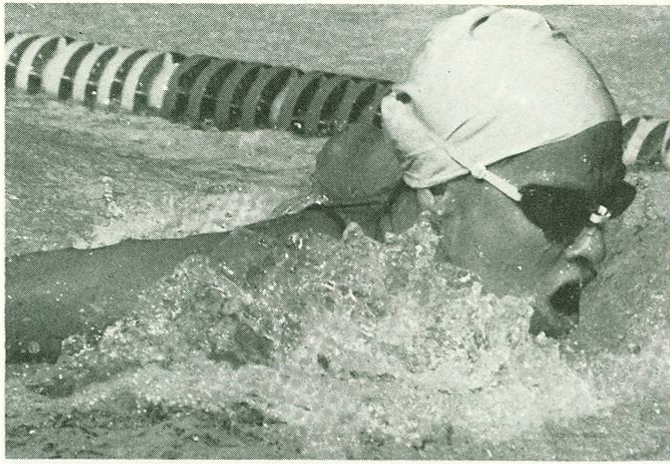
Count Florida State's N. B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center among the best in America, following a massive \$1 million renovation this past year which refurbished both the pool and locker room facilities.

The construction of a moveable bulkhead, which allows almost total water flow-through, has created a competition area which ranges in depth from five to 16 feet — making it one of the fastest in the South. Heated between 80 and 82 degrees year-round, the pool itself sports two standard 25-yard collegiate courses which have eight lanes set in a 60-foot wide area. With outside lanes two feet from the wall they are as fast as the middle lanes. The same holds true for the 50-meter "long course".

In addition, the pool is equipped with Keefer lane lines at both the 25-yard and 50-meter distances. Three underwater windows are available for stroke analysis and filming. The recently installed stainless steel gutters are extremely deep.

The diving areas at the center meet or exceed published specifications as outlined by the NCAA. FSU's diving areas include a pair of one meter boards, one three meter board and a 10-meter tower. All three boards are mounted on Durafirm fulcrums and the tower possesses platforms at five, seven and a half, and ten meters — each with new coco matting. The diving facilities also include a new porta pit/trampoline practice area located just a few feet from the competition boards.

Located conveniently on the FSU campus, the entire facility is named after legendary former Florida State swimming coach N. B. "Bim" Stults, and is home to both FSU swimming teams, as well as being the center for many physical education and recreational activities.



1983-84 Outlook

Generally Speaking — Rather than tab 1983-84 as a rebuilding campaign, Head Coach Terry Maul suggests that this season will bring a "new beginning" for Lady Seminole swimming. Gone are eight seniors from last season, a group which helped FSU to a second place AIAW National finish two years ago. Spearheading the drive to regain the magic of 1982 are Sara Linke and Natalie Deschamps, a pair of NCAA qualifiers from last season. Linke was high point winner at the 1983 USS International meet while Deschamps recently competed for the Canadian Pan Pacific team. Working on the 1983-84 Lady Seminole motto, "Up Where We Belong," Maul has developed a coaching style which requires the athlete to take the responsibility to make the commitment to strive for excellence. Such a philosophy will be most important for the 14 incoming freshman who must grasp the idea in a hurry if this year's edition of Lady Seminole swimming is to reach its full potential.

Sprints — 50/100 Freestyle — Sweeping both sprint relays at the '82 AIAW Championships served notice to FSU's power in these events. This year's field is wide open as several freshman of equal caliber were recruited. Newcomers Missy Proctor and Tina Gallivan will be in the spotlight, while Sara Linke returns as a factor in the 100 free. Simone Kusseling, the lone senior here, was the anchor on both of those national championship relays.

Middle Distance — 200/500 Freestyle — Linke will dominate both events as a returning All-American and school record holder (1:49.39; 4:49.43). Maul will look for added strength from freshman Karen Acre, Ann Belew and Proctor.

Distance — 1,000/1,650 Freestyle — The Lady Seminoles haven't enjoyed as much depth at these spots in some time. Kelly Hillencamp is the only returner but new comers Acre and Belew enter with great promise.

Backstroke — 100/200 — Depth is a question mark but Lori Skrobiak returns off of a fine summer and will carry most of the load. Others to look for are freshman Jane Hayes and Missy Proctor.

Breaststroke — 100/200 — This should be one of the bright spots. Former Canadian Pan Am team member Joanne Bedard is back while freshman Lisa Goodman enters as a national qualifier. Another promising newcomer is Connie Price of Jacksonville.

Butterfly — 100-200 — Two strongest events. Linke, the school record holder in the 200-yard event (2:05.54), and Deschamps, were both NCAA qualifiers a year ago. Incoming freshman Karen Keller was a Junior National finalist, and should add depth with Jane Hayes and Lisa Goodman.

Individual Medley — 200/400 — Deschamps, the school record holder in both events (2:04.97; 4:24.62) and Linke were both finalists at the USS International meet in January as well as NCAA qualifiers. Look to the freshman, Hayes and Goodman for back-up help.

Relays — 400 Medley/400 Freestyle/800 Freestyle — Each team here has the potential to reach NCAA finals but to do so, lifetime bests will be required of the newcomers. Everyone is back on the 400 medley team that qualified a year ago (Skrobiak, Bedard, Deschamps, Linke). The freestyle units must each showcase a pair of freshman. Linke is one of the top 200 freestylers in the country and similar performances may come from some of the top freshman. A top 10 finish in the 800 free relay is no pipe dream.

Diving — One and Three Meter — Expect good things from this year's corps of divers as four NIC finalists return, including school record holder Patsy O'Toole. A big addition will be freshman Chris Creutzinger, a four-time state finalist from Cincinnati, Ohio. Jane Alexander, a transfer from Iowa, placed 25th at the 1981 AIAW's and will become eligible in January. With Susan Hahn, Suzanne Bishop and Siobhan Morse, this could be the strongest group of divers at FSU in quite some time.

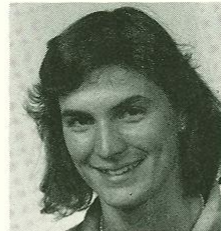

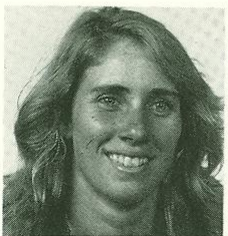

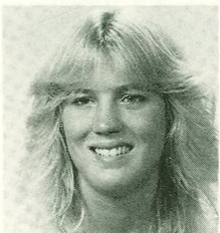

C. W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director



Cecil Ingram, known to his friends and associates as "Hootie", is in his third year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in January of 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for

athletic facilities. A new athletic administration building that houses all administration, coaches and ticket personnel opened this fall. Fully equipped with locker rooms, weight rooms and a cafeteria, the complex also serves as a home for the Seminole football team.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. The '53 Alabama team played in the Orange Bowl and the '54 squad in the Cotton Bowl. Ingram also lettered for the Tide as an infielder.

He later moved into college coaching and has assistant coaching assignments at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas. His only college football head coaching job began in 1970 at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.

Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with the Florida State athletic program since 1977. As associate athletic director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program.

Since her arrival on campus, the FSU women's program has grown to the point where it is now

considered among the top five programs in the country.

All eight women's sports have turned in winning records over the past three years. There have been three national championships won, including back-to-back titles by the softball team in 1981 and 1982.

Simply put, Barbara Palmer has been the energy behind that climb toward national excellence. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

So great has been Palmer's impact on the growth of women's athletics in the state of Florida that she was chosen to be the inaugural Women's Florida Hall of Fame by Governor Bob Graham. She was one of just six women elected from a field of 226 candidates.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.



This is Florida State

Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

When it comes to the performing arts, Florida State ranks among the best schools in the nation.

The School of Theatre is recognized nationally for its leadership and training of talented young people. Burt Reynolds, acclaimed for his work with aspiring theatre professionals at the Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter, Florida, is an adjunct professor of professional and regional theatre at FSU.

The Department of Dance is ranked as one of the top five in the country.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. The athletic program, including both men's and women's athletics, is among the top 20 in the nation.

But it's not just good programs that make the University great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it is the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. He takes pride in the people — students, faculty, administrators and staff — who are Florida State University.
