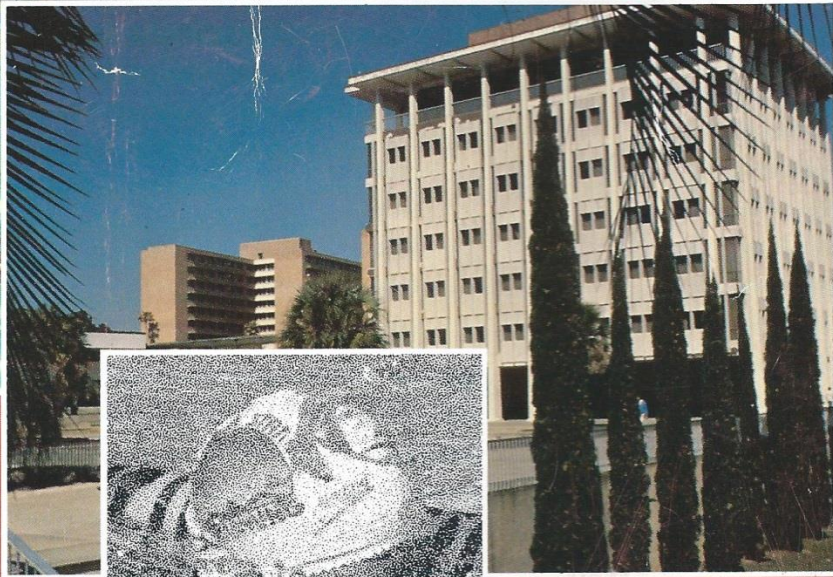
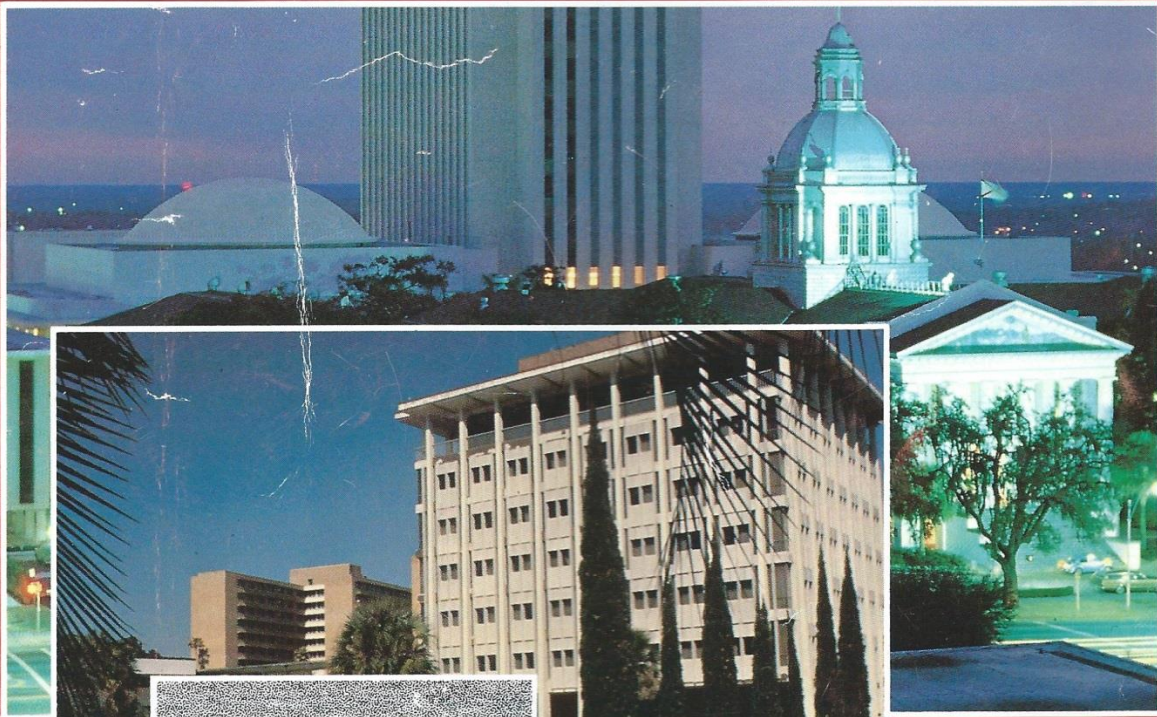

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

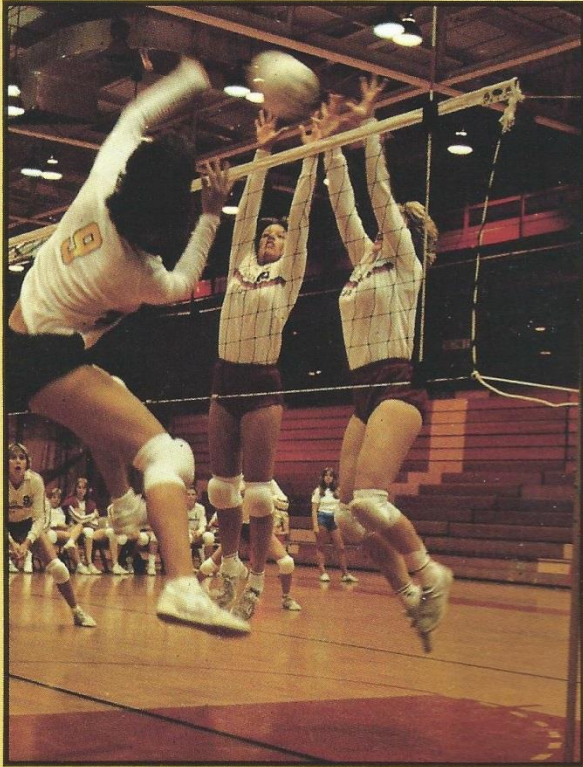
Interviews

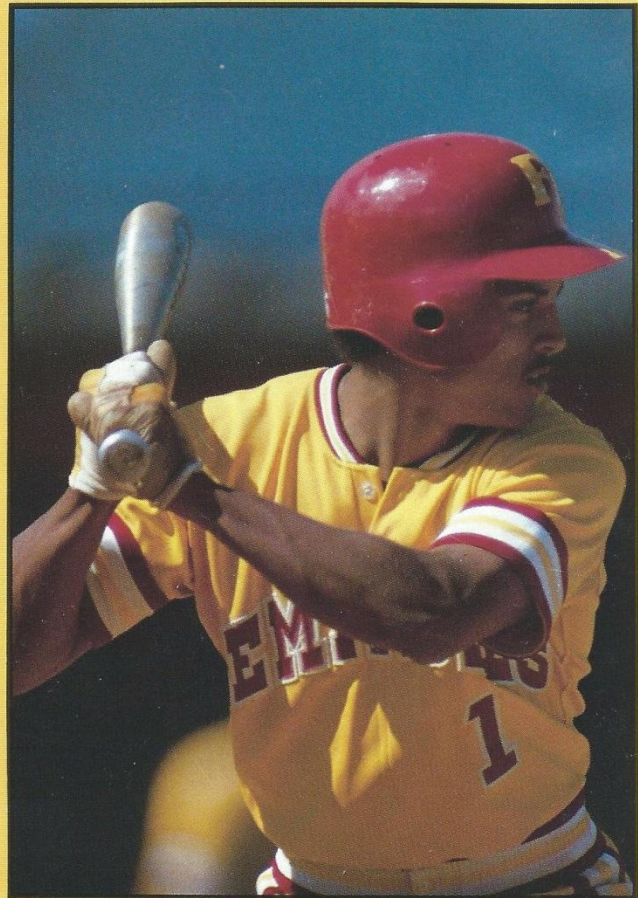

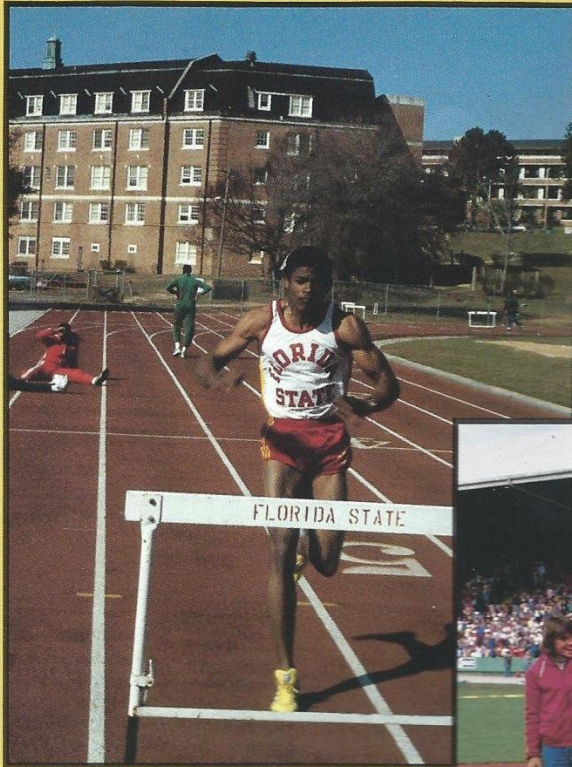

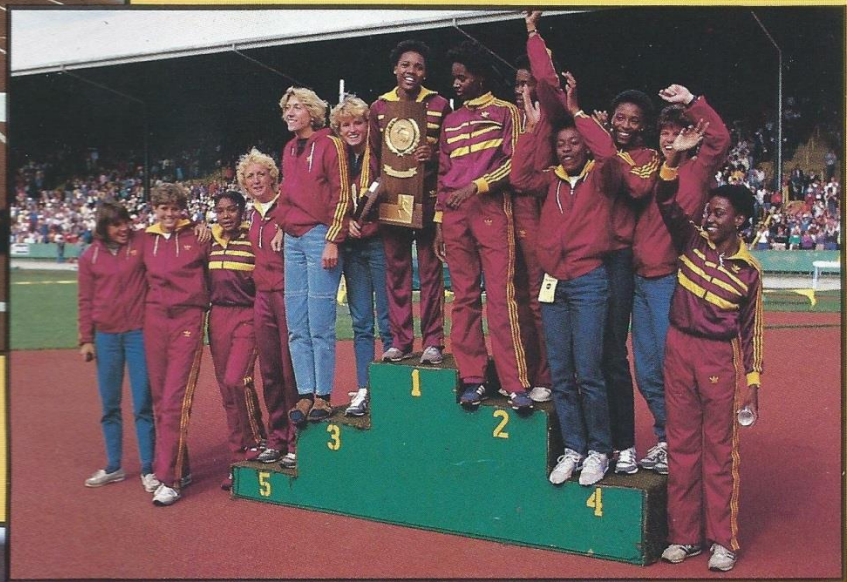
When the Lady Seminoles play Volleyball, Tully Gym is electric. This sport has come so far in capturing the sports fans of this capital city that the seating capacity has been expanded. This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. Such a showcase of the sport it is, that Florida State plays its games in a shining million dollar baseball park, unmatched in this part of the country. A Seminole baseball player spends 11 months a year playing the game, with fall, summer and spring programs affording him the opportunity to play an incredible 150 games a year.





What a proud tradition there is in track and field at Florida State. The Lady Seminoles recently added the latest of the national titles to the heritage by winning the 1984 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore. Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. That is about as close to domination of a sport as you'll find. The mens' track team continues to uphold its own proud tradition. Not only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Conference title for eight consecutive years. And Florida State's prowess in this sport, too is aided by a newly renovated and upgraded track and field stadium. Utilizing the annual site of the prestigious Domino's Pizza relays, no other track athletes in the area have the advantages that these Seminoles do in terms of training facilities and coaching.

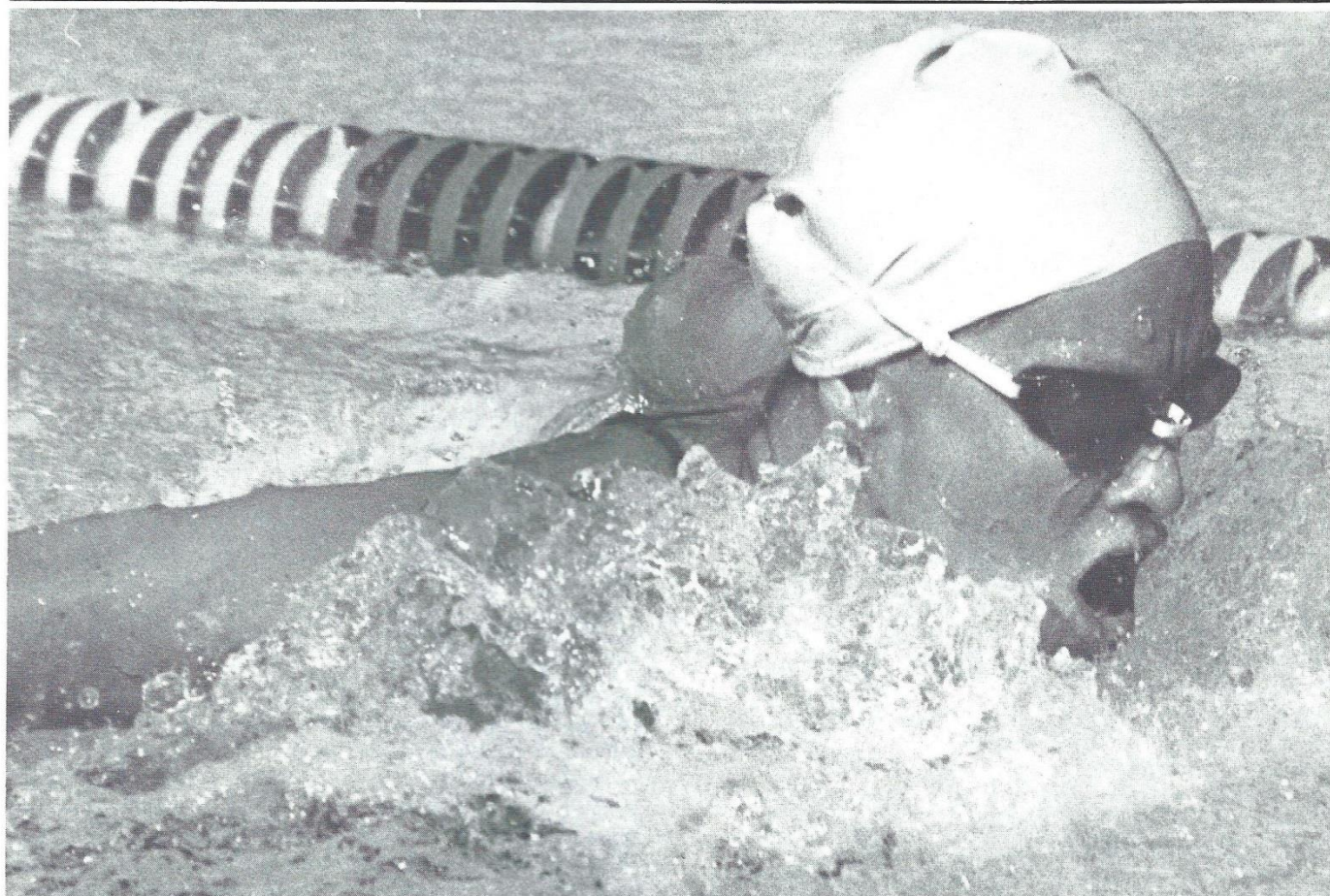

1984-85 OUTLOOK

GENERALLY SPEAKING

In any program that is generally recognized as solid year in and year out, a rebuilding year is only to be expected every now and then. Florida State head coach Terry Maul believes that year is now for his 1984-85 Lady Seminole swim team. Departed are eight letter winners from last year's squad which dropped matches to only Florida and Clemson and posted an outstanding 7-2-1 dual meet record and a second place finish in the Metro Conference Championships. What remains for the veteran head coach is a severe lack of depth throughout many events. Uncommon for FSU, the dilemma will arise when the team can capture only one of the three point-scoring places in a race. As the season progresses, the success of the Lady Seminoles will depend on their ability to win those "quality points" which often prove the difference in a competition. Leading the way for Florida State this season will be junior breaststroker Joanne Bedard and perhaps the strongest corps of divers in FSU history with last year's Metro three-meter champion Patsy O'Toole. With only four seniors, Maul expects his young Lady Seminoles to mature as the season continues as they prepare to challenge for the Metro Conference Championship.

SPRINTS (50/100 Free) - Last year was disappointing in these events, especially considering FSU's dominance of the sprint relays in 1982. Maul hopes an adjustment in training will correct the problem. Tina Gallivan returns from last season as does Kelly Holmes. Sophomores Jill Bajus and Jennifer Tankersley will also help here.

MIDDLE DISTANCE (200/500 Free) - The retirement of four-time All-American and school record holder Sara Linke makes this an unexpected question mark. Several returnees, including Karen Acre and Ann Belew, will handle the load in these events with newcomers Mary Gorham and Kathy Cullen providing the depth.

DISTANCE (1,000/1,650 Free) - With the addition of Leslie McGregor to an already strong set of distance freestylers, depth won't be a problem in this area. Senior Kelly Hillencamp provides more strength as do returnees Acre and Belew and recruit Chantel Martineau. At least one conference finalist will emerge from this pack.

BACKSTROKE (100/200) - NCAA qualifier Lori Skrobiak still carries much of the load, but she's no longer alone. The addition of freshmen Anna Prozillo and Kay Sterrett will add some much-needed depth in these events.

BREASTSTROKE (100/200) - The breaststroke is a capsule look at the Lady Seminoles overall. In Joanne Bedard, Maul has a school record holder, a conference champion and two-time NCAA qualifier. Beyond that, he has nothing - at least not in the breaststroke. No depth here will hurt FSU in dual meets and in the conference.

BUTTERFLY (100/200) - Quality depth all-around makes the fly one of FSU's strongest events, even with the loss of Linke and Natalie Deschamps. Conference finalist in the 200 last year, Karen Keller returns. The addition of Martineau, one of Canada's most outstanding flyers, almost assures the Lady Seminoles another conference finalist. Look for loads of power and depth from returning letter winners Jane Hayes and Cheryl Kupan and newcomers Cullen and former Florida state champion Stacey Russell.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY (200/400) - The weakness here is that the Lady Seminoles have no pure IMer on the roster. For these races, Maul will have to pull his talent from other races. McGregor, Martineau, Prozillo and Bedard are all expected to contribute heavily. Cullen, Hayes and Kupan can also help.

RELAYS (400 Medley/400 and 800 Free) - With the return of Skrobiak and Bedard, the medley team looks to be just as strong as ever. In the 400, the group is untested but Maul is optimistic of its chances as the season progresses. In the 800, only Acre returns from last year's foursome that set a new school record (7:32.26). However, sprint freestyle depth not previously available could make both relays an unexpected team strength.

DIVING (One and Three Meter) - Without a doubt, this is the strongest group of divers in FSU history. Last year coach Gary Cole took five divers to the conference championships. All five scored. This year he expects to take six and believes all six will make it to the finals. Three of the team's four seniors are divers (Jane Alexander, Suzanne Bishop, Susan Hahn). To that experience, add conference champion Patsy O'Toole and five-time Canadian champion Wendy Fuller. Complete the picture with depth in freshmen Maria O'Hern and Sharon Warning. The result should be at least four NCAA qualifiers and a strong chance of champions on both boards at Metro.

WHY FSU?

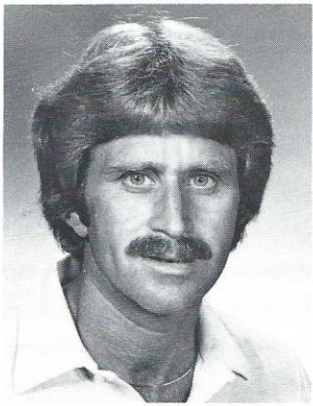
For years, parents, coaches and educators have praised sports and athletics as a means for improving physical abilities and developing character. There is little argument against the fact that participation in a regularly scheduled athletic training program will improve the physical status of those involved. But what of sports as a character builder? Do individuals involved in athletics develop into more self-confident, understanding, humane, moral, achievement-oriented individuals? Does the experience give the participant a clearer understanding of her environment, herself, her peers, her lifestyle, the lifestyle of others, and the value of such things as dedication, positive thinking, perseverance, humility, etc.? Unfortunately, in today's society these questions may not always be answered affirmatively.

With the extensive involvement of our society in the sports world of today, the emphasis on winning and being number one has emerged as the priority in most athletic programs. This fact, plus the close economic ties to the production of winners, has caused many athletic organizations to become so totally involved in winning that they lost sight of the potential of their sport as a means for character development.

WINNING IS IMPORTANT! Yet there is also an opportunity to learn through sport experiences. The potential does in fact exist. Many researchers and extremely knowledgeable men and women will agree that the athletic experience can aid in the development of the values mentioned earlier, IF DIRECTED TO THAT END.

Herein lies the philosophy of coaching in the Florida State program. The FSU program is set up to develop the whole individual, not only physically, but mentally as well. Character traits such as perseverance, dedication, self-confidence, caring for others, "sportsmanship" and basic understanding of one's capabilities and limitations receive an equal amount of attention as do stroke work, interval training and meet performance.

Don't get us wrong. We work hard! We strive to win! We hold very strenuous workouts and we develop quality athletes. Yet their quality, when their participation is over, will hopefully not be just a memory in a scrapbook, but will be in the type of human being who will have a great deal of positive input to her environment.



TERRY MAUL
Head Coach

Now in his tenth year as head coach at Florida State, Terry Maul has built Lady Seminole swimming into one of the truly great collegiate programs in America today.

Working from the philosophy that each individual should have the opportunity to develop to her fullest potential academically, educationally and athletically, Maul has built consistent winning teams at Florida State, while at the same time insuring the development of the individual in the college setting.

Proof of the success of this philosophy comes from a quick glance at Maul's record. During the course of his tenure, Maul-coached teams have racked up an impressive 65-23-1 record in dual meet competition, for a winning percentage of .753. His 1982 team won the National Independent Championships (NIC) and placed second at the AIAW National Championships. During his tenure at Florida State, Maul has coached 28 swimmers to All-American status. In October, his peers recognized his outstanding coaching ability by choosing him to head the USA National Team that traveled to Rio de Janeiro for the First South American Cup.

Despite the time required of his athletes to achieve the lofty athletic goals, Maul insists that academics come first with his team. Each year, an academic excellence award is presented by the women's athletic department to the squad with the highest grade point average on campus. Since the award's inception five years ago, Maul's squad has been the winner each time.

"We strive for excellence in both athletics and academics," Maul said. "Our academic goal is to have a team grade point average of at least 3.0. Athletically, we want each member to develop to her full potential."

A former Seminole swimmer, Maul graduated from Florida State with a bachelor's degree in biology in 1968. He then earned a master's degree in sports psychology in 1975; he has now completed all class work for a doctorate in the same area.

Maul's coaching career began during his undergraduate days at FSU, when he coached summer swimming teams in both Tallahassee and Wellington, Kansas.

In 1971, Maul became manager and coach of the Sheridan Swimming Club in Quincy, Illinois. It was there that he developed Nicole Kramer, who would later become a member of the 1976 United States Olympic Team. Other top swimmers that Maul has coached include former FSU star Laurie Lehner, who won the 100 meter butterfly at both the Pan American and Pan Am Games in 1983. She posted the fastest 100 meter butterfly time in the world during that summer as well (59.54).

In addition to an outstanding coaching career, Maul has authored several articles on swimming and sports psychology that have been published in professional journals. He has also served as president of the National Collegiate Women's Swimming Coaches Association. Maul is responsible for developing and editing a research newsletter for that organization which circulates quarterly to over 400 coaches throughout the world.



JULIE DAY
Assistant Coach

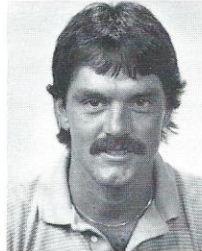
A former four-year letter winner at Florida State, Julie Day enters her first year as an assistant coach at her alma mater.

As a former swimmer under Maul at FSU, her vast knowledge of his coaching system has made Day an extremely valuable asset to the staff of the women's swimming program. As Maul's assistant coach, she is involved in all phases of the program and is also responsible for many of the team's administrative duties.

Before returning to Florida State, Day served for one year as assistant coach of the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club. In addition to her club coaching experience, she also held the head coaching position of both the boy's and girl's squads at Leon High School for two years. During her stint at the Tallahassee high school, Day coached two All-Americans and one of her team members, Collier Woolard, swam for the 1984 Virgin Islands Olympic Team.

Her credentials from her years inside the pool are just as impressive. A member of the 1982 Florida State team that finished second in the nation, Day swam competitively for 18 years. In 1979 she was the Junior National Champion in the 200 backstroke and one year later qualified for the Olympic Trials in the same event.

Day is a 1983 graduate of Florida State with a degree in physical education and is currently working towards being certified as an athletic trainer.



GARY COLE
Diving Coach

Gary Cole enters his third season as diving coach for both the men's and women's programs at Florida State. In his initial campaign, he was named NIC Diving Coach of the Year. A graduate of Bowling Green University, Cole has been involved in coaching for 12 years.

Before coming to FSU, Cole was head diving coach at Auburn University for three and a half years. Prior to the Auburn assignment, Cole worked one year as assistant coach at Michigan State University, as well as coaching for three additional years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Michigan.

In his dozen years in the coaching field, he has developed both outstanding individuals and programs. He has coached six high school All-Americans and has had finalists at every level of age group on up to U.S. Nationals. Cole had three former pupils participate in the 1984 Canadian Olympic Trials, all finishing in the top eight. In addition, he has coached two age group champions, the most recent a three-time champion this past summer.

Distinguished among his peers, Cole is a member of the NCAA Rules Committee for Diving as well as the U.S. Professional Diving Coaches Association. He has also traveled as a coach to several International meets.

A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien, the U.S. Olympic coach since 1972.

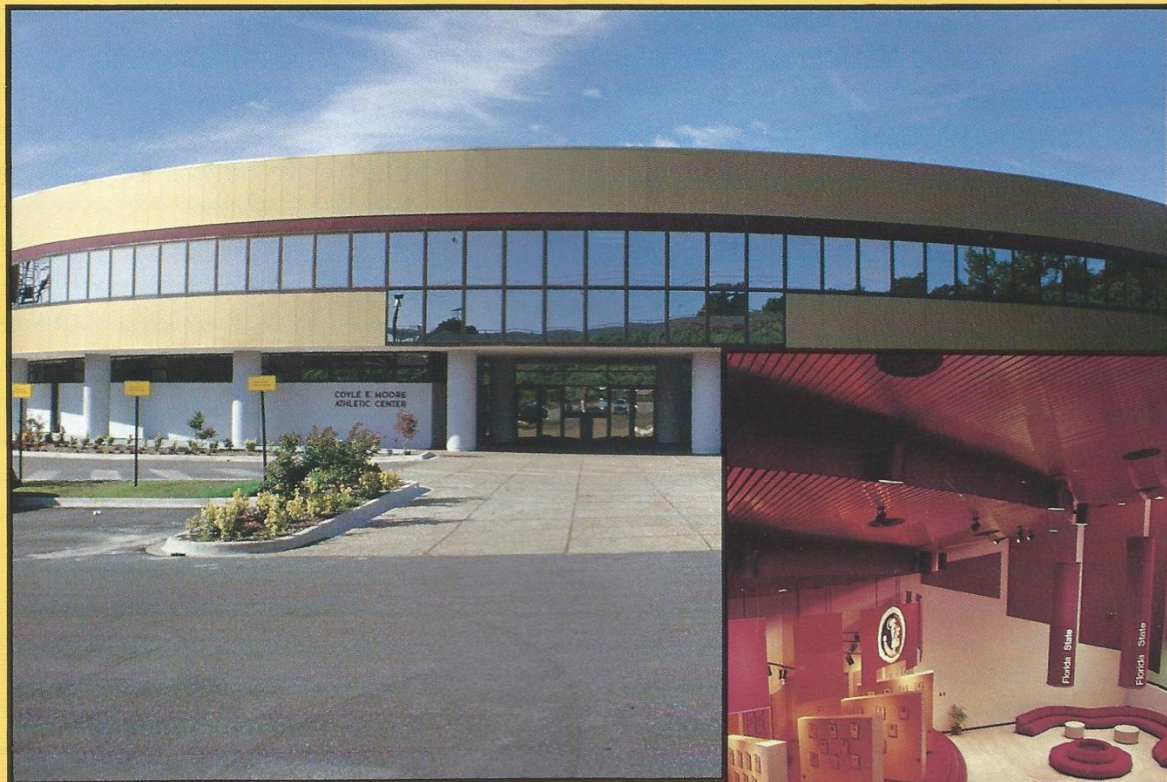

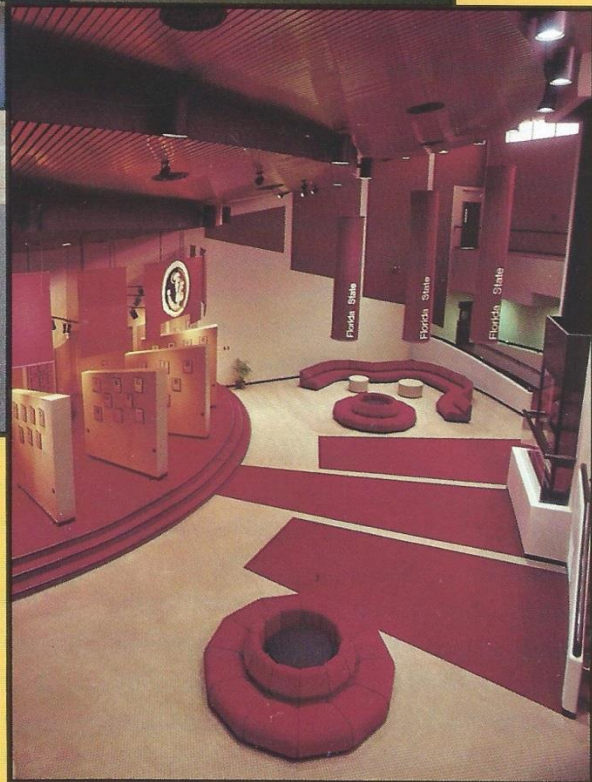

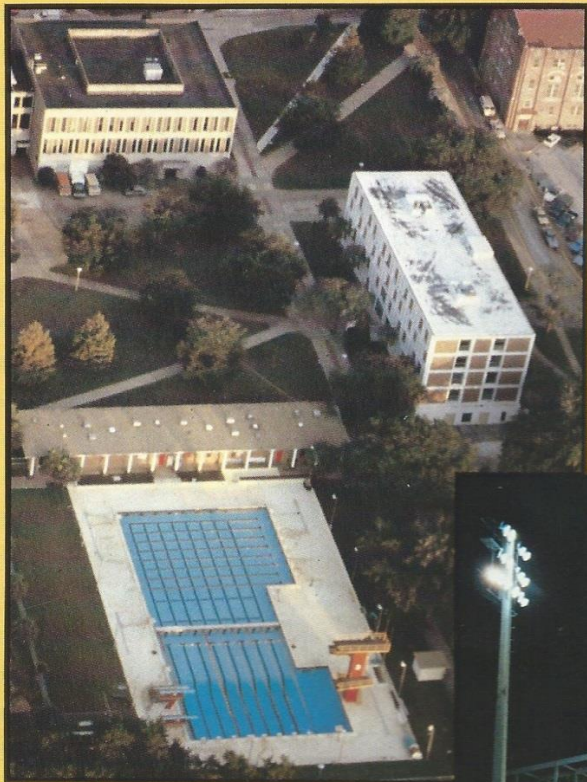

More than six million dollars have been invested in athletic improvements, renovations and additions in just the last two years. There may be no other institution that can claim such a feat. Florida State's facilities are in a word... AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 1 1/2 basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms, locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.



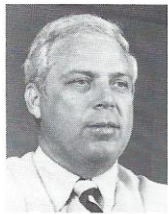


One advantage for a Florida State athlete is that his or her sport is always played just a stone's throw from the middle of campus. The glistening heated swimming pool is in the shadows of academia and right next door to the Student Union Building. This set-up, like that of most of the athletic facilities at FSU, makes students and townspeople alike feel close to the program and like Seminole sports, are a part of campus life.

The new baseball stadium is really a monument to the tradition of the sport at Florida State.

Again, it is easy to see that residence halls and classrooms are the backdrop for the beautiful Mike Long Track and Donald Loucks Tennis Courts. Tully Gym, newly renovated itself, is nearby and houses all of Florida State's women's athletic personnel.





C.W. "Hootie" Ingram
Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.

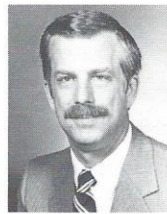


Bob Goin
Associate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



Charles W. Ehrhardt
Faculty Athletic
Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.



Barbara Palmer
Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic receives each year.

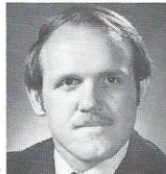
