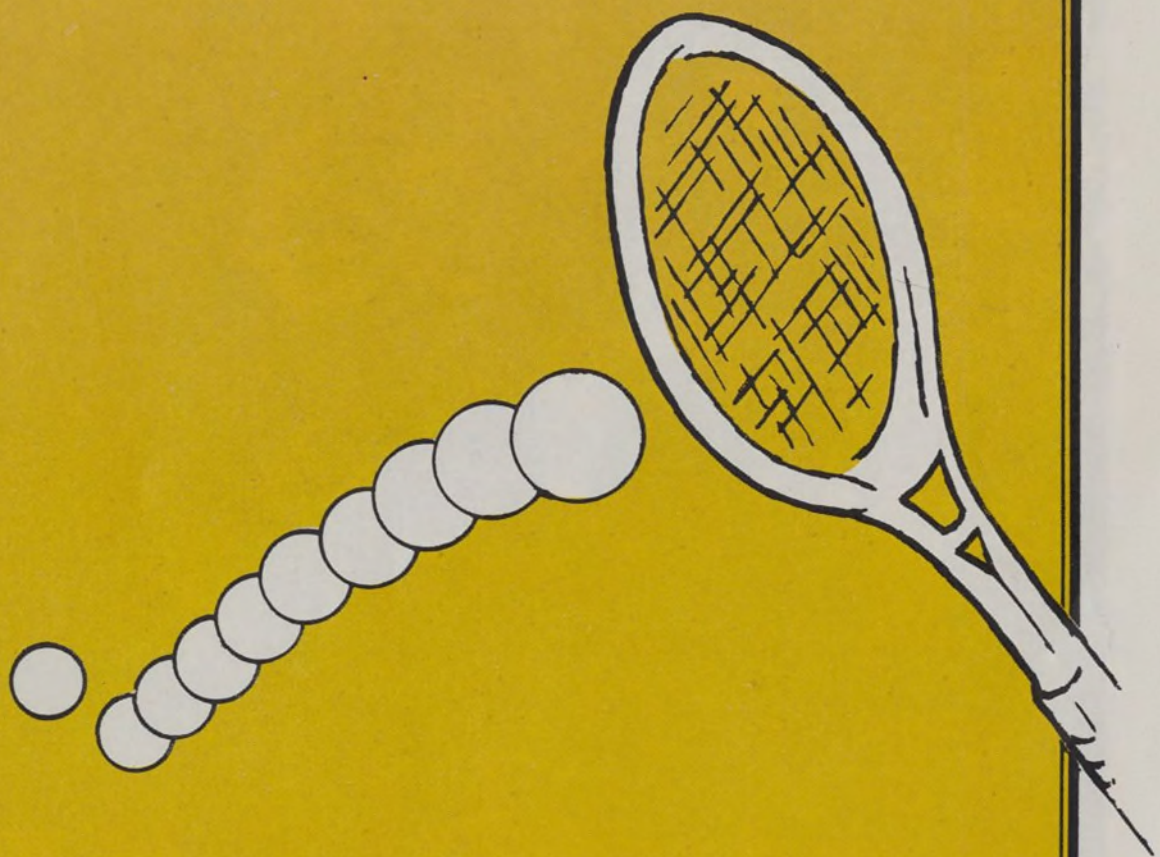

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University—the home of more than 22,000 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

From the Gothic towers of Wescott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million.

1982 SEASON OUTLOOK

"It could be an awfully good year," said FSU coach Anne Davis. "Last season we gained a lot of respect and recognition for our tennis program at Florida State due to the performances of the players. We're hoping for bigger and better in 1982."

Davis has every right to be optimistic about the coming season. Lost from the Lady Seminoles is only one member of last season's 24-15 team, while returning are seven veteran players and joining the squad are three outstanding recruits.

Attempting to defend her final season No. 1 position is junior Suzanne Doumar. Doumar, a No. 1 singles and No. 2 doubles Metro winner and the Conference MVP, will join the Tribe in her first full season after transferring from SMU in the spring. Also returning are top players Laurie Mueller and Penne Nieporte, the No. 2 player last season and a winner of over 20 individual matches. Joining the veteran group is sophomore Lisa Ehr Gott, the top singles winner (27) for the Tribe last year as a freshman, and Susan Mueller who added much depth to the squad. The final returnees are Kristin Getz, a player guaranteed to give 110% and Gigi Boesch, a member of the 1981 Lady Seminole Invitational and Metro Conference doubles championship team. The tandem of Boesch and graduated senior Cheryl Cordes also qualified for AIAW national competition.

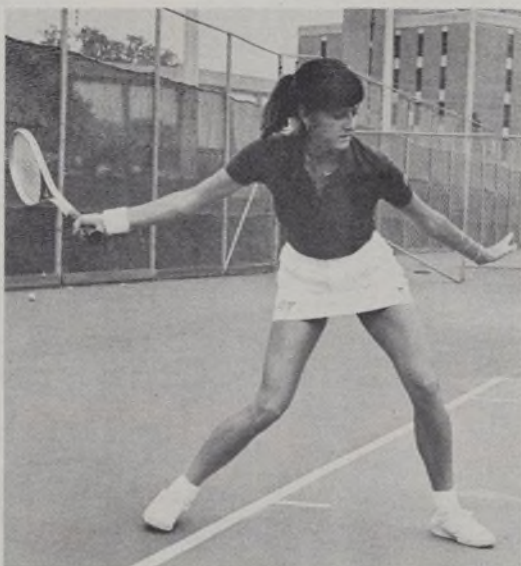
Joining the team for their first season in garnet and gold are Lee McGuire, Debbie Pollock and Jaime Kaplan. McGuire, ranked No. 2 in Kentucky, No. 6 in the South and No. 45 in the nation in the 18 and under division competed last season at Henry Clay High School where she captured the state crown. Pollock, also a freshman, played her prep tennis in Pittsburgh earning a Top 50 ranking in the 16 and under division two years ago. Last year Pollock was the No. 6 player in the middle states. McGuire and Pollock will join Kaplan who completed two seasons at Georgia where she was the No. 2 singles player and a member of the No. 2 doubles team.

"We're going to be even stronger in the middle and the bottom of our lineup," Davis said. "Doubles will continue to be a strong point and I'm also expecting improvement at the top of the order. We will now have better players at lower positions and the depth we need in case of injuries."

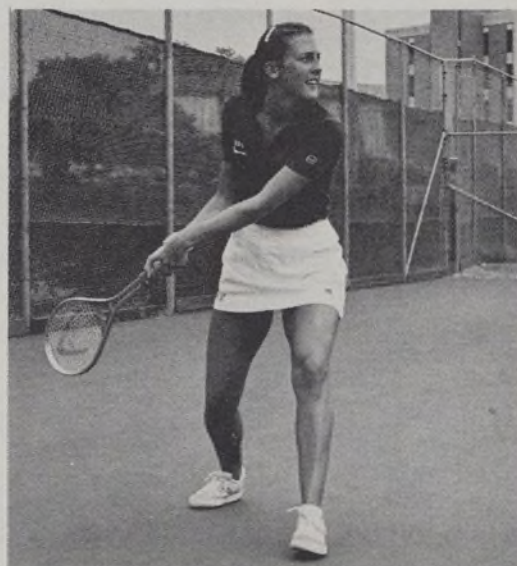
While the netters certainly have the players to make it the best year ever, the team is also up against the most difficult schedule in Lady Seminole tennis history. The squad will square off against Top 20 teams Texas, North Carolina, Clemson, Indiana and South Carolina, and Florida foes Miami, Rollins, Florida and South Florida.

"We'll be gearing this season towards AIAW nationals," Davis said. "The girls gained confidence in themselves this past year and had many close matches with outstanding teams. We hope to reverse the matches we lost and continue our steady pace to the top."

"It will all come down to how we come together as a team. We need to gain the consistency that a good team has and with that we will realize our goal of qualifying for nationals and breaking into the Top 20. Everyone is eager and excited to meet the challenge."

ANNE DAVIS Head Tennis Coach



In only her third season at the helm of the Florida State women's tennis program, Anne Davis has already accomplished a goal—to make FSU tennis a winner. A 24-15 record last season, a second place finish in the 12-team Lady Seminole Invitational and a Metro Conference championship are examples of the direction Davis has taken the program.

After all, Davis has always been a winner. As a former varsity player for the University of South Florida, she played in the top four slots all four years and teamed up to form the No. 1 doubles unit. In her junior year, the Brahms were No. 11 in the nation and No. 13 in her senior season. After earning a B.A. in Marketing, Davis remained on campus and became assistant coach at USF. Repeating her collegiate performance, she helped guide the team to an 11th place showing nationally.

Associated with many top tennis coaches, Davis entered the elite group last season earning Metro Coach of the Year. Davis' expertise has led her to be named the Region III Tennis Chairperson with responsibilities in organizing the Region III tennis activities. Davis is also a member of the Women's Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association which is associated with bridging the gap between the AIAW and NCAA, naming All-America teams, Coach of the Year and national rankings. Breaking away from her busy schedule, Davis managed time to complete her master's degree in guidance and counseling from South Florida.

"Florida State at one time had a very strong tennis tradition," Davis said. "Last year we took a giant step to re-establishing FSU as a national threat. Our immediate goals are to firmly establish ourselves as a Top 20 program and continue on until we reach the top."

SEASON IN REVIEW

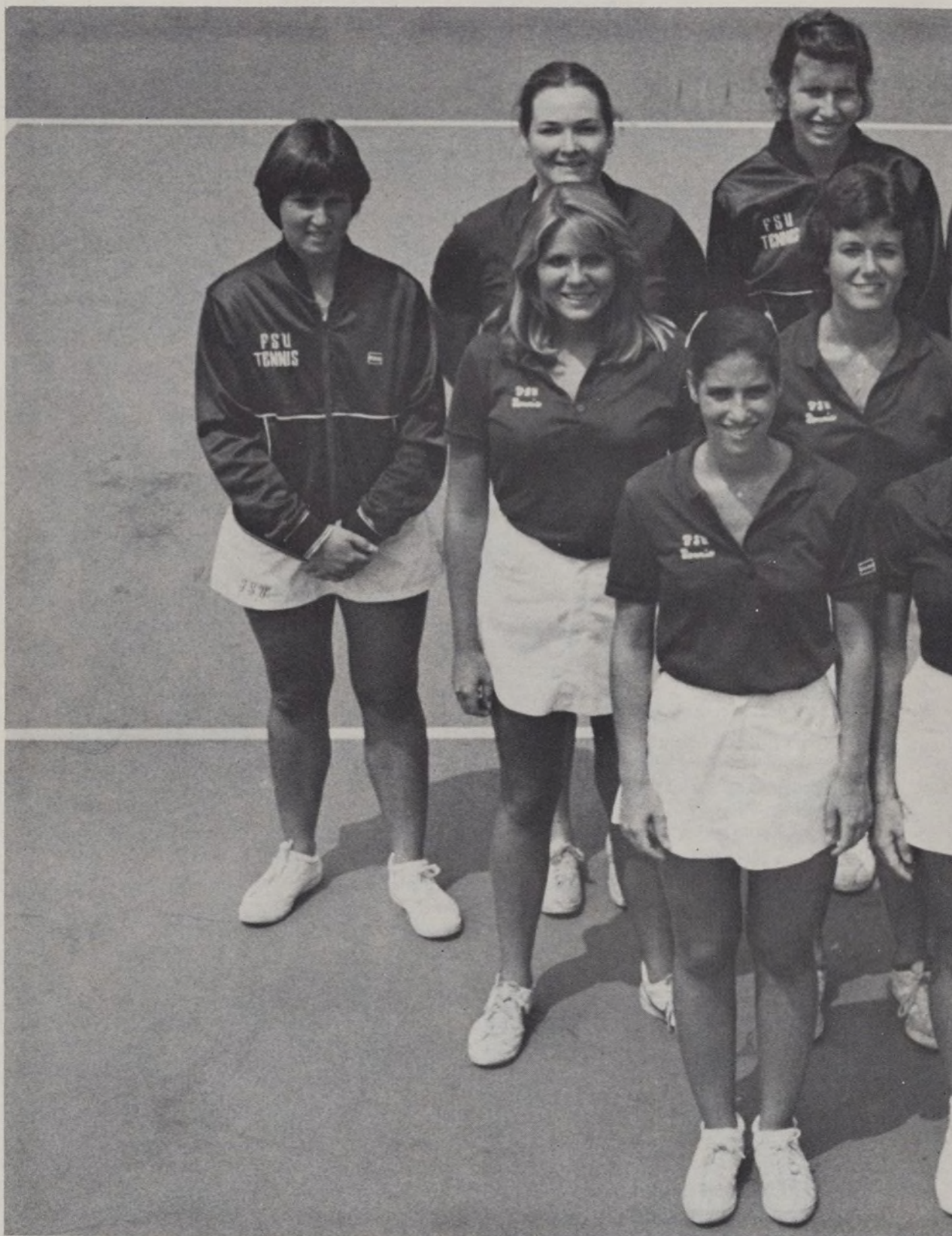
When Florida State head coach Anne Davis saw her squad jump off to a 6-0 season start, she thought it might indeed be a successful year. And, in many ways the teams accomplishments surpassed even Davis' expectations.

The final ledger read 24-15, but the Lady Seminoles saved their best performance for tournament play. At the Florida State hosted Lady Seminole Invitational, the netters finished second having never ended higher than fourth prior to last season. At the Lady Tiger Invitational held at Clemson, S.C., the squad finished third behind two teams that ended the season in the Top 12. The biggest tournament victory occurred in Tallahassee when the netters captured the inaugural Metro Conference tennis crown topping six conference foes. The Davis led squad so dominated competition that the team lost only two sets in singles and doubles combined.

In team competition, the Tribe also showed their strength. The Lady Seminoles swept home-and-home matches against Southeastern Conference foe Georgia, state rival and Davis' alma mater South Florida and single matches vs. Jacksonville and Alabama. Impressive victories were also posted against South Alabama, Auburn, Mississippi, Texas Tech and Purdue.

While the team continued to improve throughout the season, so did the individuals. The doubles tandem of Gigi Boesch and graduated senior Cheryl Cordes won the doubles title at the Lady Seminole Invitational and ended the season qualifying for AIAW nationals. Proving to be no slouch in singles, Boesch had over 20 wins at the No. 3 position. Suzanne Doumar, an early season SMU transfer, played brilliantly in spots and finished the year in the No. 1 position. Last season's most pleasant surprise was freshman Lisa Ehrgott whose steady improvement and consistent play resulted in a 27-17 record -- best on the squad. Also chalking up important singles and doubles win was No. 2 singles player Penne Nieporte. Playing well last season was southpaw Kristin Getz who started slowly but ended the season as a very important part of the squad as did four year player Laurie Mueller.

"I was certainly happy with our performances in the Lady Seminole and the Metro, but there's always room for improvement," Davis said. "I'd like to see the team reverse some of our close matches and come up with some big wins this year. Last year was encouraging, but we still have a ways to go."



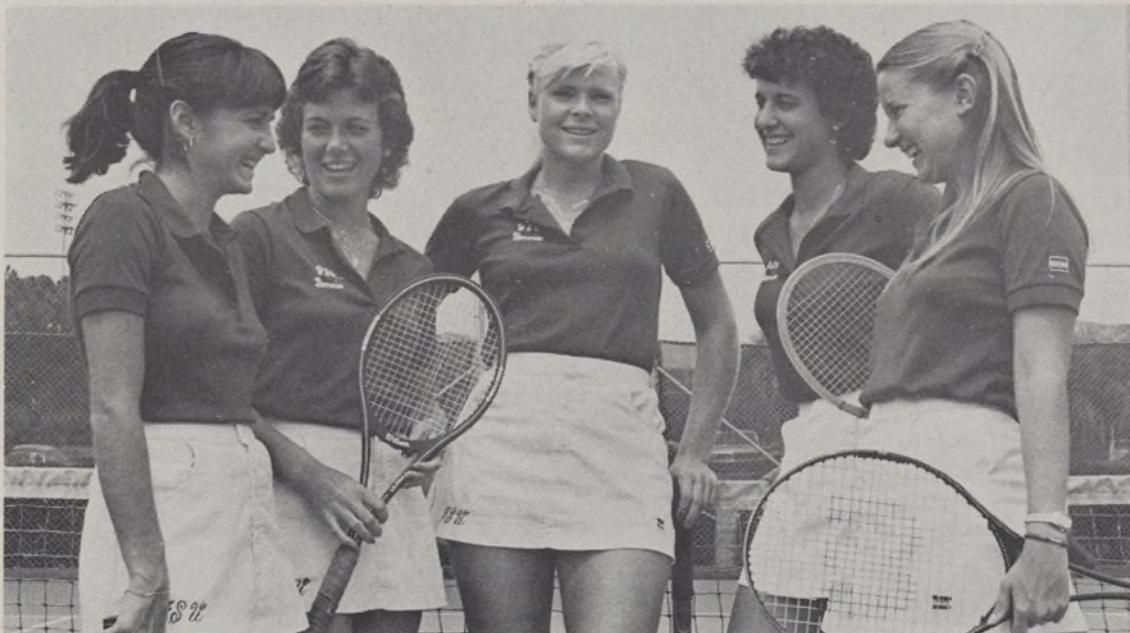

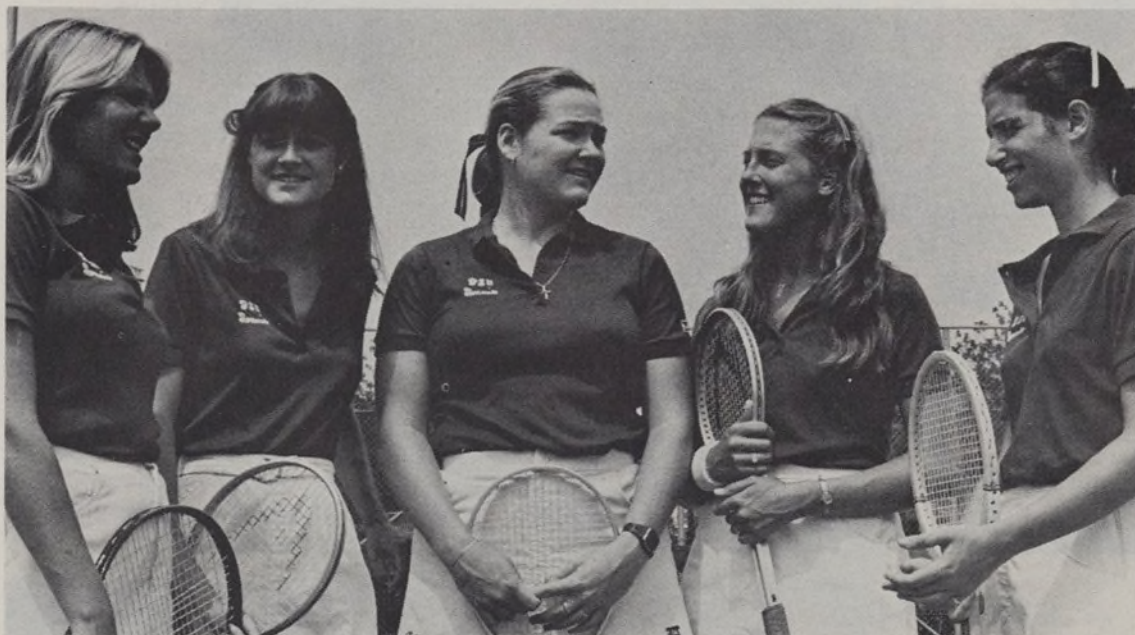

In the scholastic side of college life, the student-athlete at Florida State can always obtain assistance from Trudy Raybun, the Coordinator of Student Affairs for the Lady Seminoles. Raybun, a 1977 FSU graduate, assists the student-athlete through registration and admissions procedures. Once school has begun, she provides academic counseling and arranges study hall and tutorial service. Raybun is also responsible for scholarship renewal, AIAW rules and interpretations, and insuring the student-athlete is making satisfactory progress towards obtaining her academic goals.

DONNA MURDOCK Strength Coach

The newest member of the Florida State women's athletic team, Donna Murdock joins the Lady Seminoles as strength coach. Murdock will be charged with designing individual strength training for the athlete and assisting the coaches with any strength questions that may arise. She is currently a doctoral student majoring in exercise physiology and has already achieved a master's in exercise physiology from Florida ('78) and a B.A. from Florida Technological University ('77) in physical education. Prior to joining the Lady Seminole staff, Murdock served as an instructor in the Marion Co. school system teaching physical education to special students.



NANCY WATSON Head Trainer

During an athlete's conditioning, and in the event of an injury, the women have the assistance of head trainer Nancy Watson. Watson, in her first full season with the Seminole players, is the head women's trainer and is responsible for the prevention, care and rehabilitation of injuries. Working out of the fully equipped Tully Gym training center, Watson oversees the pre-season conditioning program, assists in the planning of a weight program and travels with several of the Lady Seminole teams. If an athlete is injured, Watson will assist the player in returning to her sport as quickly and safely as possible. Watson received her B.A. and master's degree in sports medicine from Indiana University.



WOMEN'S ATHLETIC DIRECTOR BARBARA PALMER

Determination. Dedication. Enthusiasm. Each of these words has been used to describe Florida State women's athletic director Barbara Palmer at one time or another. Never has one individual had such a dynamic impact on a program in such a short period of time.

Since Palmer was hired in August of 1977, Florida State has developed one of the top programs in the nation. Last year two teams—softball and golf—won their respective national championships. The track team finished third in the nation, swimming finished 14th and cross country was 21st.

"It is and always has been our goal to build a national-caliber program here at Florida State," says Palmer. "We are committed to that goal and we will not accept anything short of it. But at the same time, we are concerned with the academic achievement of our athletes. We're building winners in all aspects of personal and professional growth."

The Lady Seminoles Booster Club is yet another area where Palmer has directed much of her energy. "The development of the Boosters Club has meant a great deal to our program," she says. "There are a lot of people out there interested in the Lady Seminoles and they let us know that. They're behind us 100 percent." Recently, the Boosters fund drive netted \$65,000 for women's athletics at Florida State.

Palmer is directly responsible for the funding Florida State will receive each year from the state for women's athletics, making Florida the first state in the nation to come into full compliance with Title IX. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed the bill through the 1980 Legislature to make it law.

Additionally, she was instrumental in the hiring of full-time coaches for each of FSU's eight women's sports. More recently, full-time assistant coaches have been added to the growing staff.

Palmer joined the Florida State staff after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure education and recreation services organization. Prior to that, she served as administrator of Camp Indian Springs, program director for Wakulla County and recreation supervisor of Merritt Island.

A long time Tallahassee, Fla., resident, Palmer received her bachelor's degree in recreation at FSU in 1970 and earned her master's degree in leisure services and studies in 1974.

Palmer is presently the president of the Southeast Region, Region III, of the AIAW.
