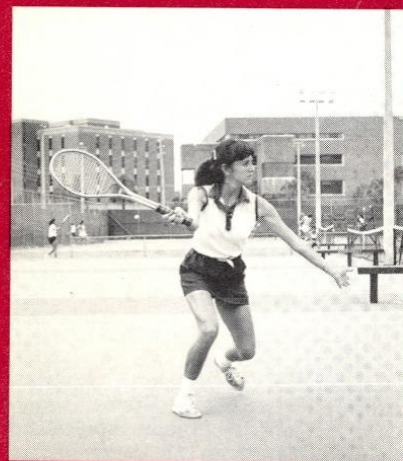

**ANNE DAVIS
Head Coach**



In three seasons as head coach of the Lady Seminoles tennis program, Anne Davis' teams have attained almost every goal she has set for them.

In 1981, Florida State won its first Metro Conference women's tennis championship which earned Davis Metro Coach of the Year honors. Last year her goals became a reality with a pre-season Top 20 ranking, a 23-18 dual match record and finally a sixth place finish at the AIAW National Championships.

Davis' success is not surprising; she has a history of accomplishing what she sets out to do. As a former varsity tennis player for the University of South Florida, she played in the top four slots all four years and teamed up to form USF's no. 1 doubles unit. In her junior year, the Brahms finished 11th in the nation and 13th in her senior season. After earning a bachelor's degree in marketing, Davis remained on campus and became assistant coach at USF. She helped guide the team to an 11th place showing nationally.

Davis has also served as AIAW Region III tennis chairperson and was responsible for organizing region III's tennis activities. Breaking away from her busy schedule, she also managed time to complete her master's degree in guidance and counseling from South Florida.

"I believe we have definitely made progress toward our goal of re-establishing FSU as a national tennis power," said Davis. "In the past our goals were to make the Top 20 rankings; but now that's not sufficient. We want to continue on until we reach the top."

1983 Women's Tennis Season Outlook

Optimistic. If there is one adjective to describe the attitude of head coach Anne Davis as her tennis team approaches the 1983 season, "optimistic" is the word. Davis feels that Florida State's 1983 squad possesses the perfect blend of experience and youth which will enable it to surpass the accomplishments of past teams.

Surpassing or even matching the accomplishments of last year will be no small feat. In 1982, Florida State established itself as a legitimate Top 20 team by compiling a 20-16 dual match record during the regular season and exceeding everyone's expectations at the AIAW National Championships with a sixth place finish. That was the first appearance by an FSU women's tennis team at a national championship tournament, but Davis would definitely like to see such appearances become routine, beginning in 1983.

"Last year we established Florida State as a team that had the ability to win the big matches," said Davis. "This year we want to improve our winning consistency in important matches with the ultimate goal being to qualify the team and as many individuals as possible for the NCAAs. I believe we can do that with the group of people that we have on the team this year."

Seniors Jaime Kaplan and Suzanne Doumar, who ended the season as the number one and number three singles players, respectively, for the Tribe in 1982, will be counted on to provide leadership for the 1983 team. While excelling in their individual singles positions last season, Kaplan and Doumar were also successful as the number one doubles unit for FSU, qualifying for a berth in the AIAW National Championships.

Also returning after outstanding freshman years are sophomores Lee McGuire and Debbie Pollack. McGuire, who led the team in wins last year, was named MVP of the 1982 squad for her play at the number two singles position. Pollack had the highest winning percentage on the team and came through with many big wins in crucial situations.

Other returnees are juniors Lisa Ehrgott and Beth Clay. Both players should be in the fight for starting positions after playing well for Florida State at nationals. Ehrgott especially sparked the team with her play at the number five singles and number three doubles slots. Rounding out the veteran group is senior Susan Mueller, a three year letterwinner who will add depth to the squad.

Joining the team for the first time in 1983 is a talented and enthusiastic group of newcomers, anyone of whom could break into the starting lineup. Heading the list of five freshmen are Claudia Gaughf, Patti Henderson and Jenny Cerino. Gaughf, a native of Macon, Ga. along with FSU teammate Jaime Kaplan, is a former number one-ranked player in the South and in Georgia who captured the Georgia state high school crown two consecutive years. Henderson, a southpaw, was recently ranked first in Ontario and sixth in Canada in the girls 18-and-under division. Cerino, the MVP on her high school team two years ago, is presently one of the top 30 18-and-under players in Florida. Two other freshmen who will begin their collegiate tennis careers in 1983 are walkons Paula Whitebrook and Dana Medalie. Whitebrook played her prep tennis at Miami Beach Senior High School and was voted the Most Athletic Female of 1982 there. She is an excellent doubles player who could provide immediate help in that area. A four year letterwinner in high school, Medalie is ranked in the top 30 girls 18-and-under players in Florida and was the MVP of her tennis team during her senior year of high school.

"Our strength has traditionally been our depth," said Davis. "This year we have that. Plus, I feel that we will be as strong at the top of our lineup as any team we face. One of the keys to the season's success will be our doubles teams and how they develop. Our new players will help us a lot in that area. Overall, I feel that this is the best women's tennis team that FSU has ever had."

It will have to be, as the netters once again play one of their toughest schedules in recent years. The highlight of the fall season will be two invitational team tournaments hosted by South Carolina and Louisiana State. Also on tap early in the year are dual matches against Alabama and Tulane.

The main event of the spring for Florida State will once again be the Lady Seminole Invitational, which Davis says has come to be recognized as one of the strongest tournaments in the East. The season will come to a close with the Metro Conference Tournament, which FSU won in 1981, and possibly a trip to the NCAA tournament.

"We have a competitive schedule again this year. Since we have established ourselves as a top 20 team, every team we face will be out to beat us," said Davis.

"Last year we were encouraged by our regular season wins over Oklahoma State, Clemson, North Carolina, Southern Methodist and Texas Christian. We realize what it will take to reach our goals. I think that the 1983 team will be characterized by the fact that as a team, we're not going to lose any matches. We're going to have to be beaten."

Barbara Palmer
Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with the Florida State athletic program since 1977. As associate athletic director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program.

Since her arrival on campus, the FSU women's program has grown to the point where it is now considered among the top five programs in the country.

All eight women's sports have turned in winning records over the past three years. There have been three national championships won, including back-to-back titles by the softball team in 1981 and 1982. And finally, last season Florida State sent every team to a national tournament, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the nation.

Simply put, Barbara Palmer has been the energy behind that climb toward national excellence. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

So great has been Palmer's impact on the growth of women's athletics in the state of Florida that she was chosen to the inaugural Women's Florida Hall of Fame by Governor Bob Graham last summer. She was one of just six women elected from a field of 226 candidates.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

On the scholastic side of college life, the student-athlete at Florida State can always obtain assistance from Trudy Raybun, the Coordinator of Student Affairs for the Lady Seminoles. Raybun, a 1977 FSU graduate, assists the student-athlete through registration and admissions procedures. Once school has begun, she provides academic counseling and arranges study hall and tutorial service. Raybun is also responsible for scholarship renewal, NCAA rules and interpretations and insuring the student-athlete is making satisfactory progress towards obtaining her academic goals.

Donna Murdock Strength Coach

Strength coach Donna Murdock joined Florida State's women's athletic staff in 1982. Murdock is responsible for designing individual strength training for the athlete and assisting the coaches with any strength questions that may arise. She is currently a doctoral student majoring in exercise and physiology and has already achieved a master's in exercise physiology from Florida ('78) and a bachelor's from Florida Technological University ('77) in physical education. Prior to joining the staff, Murdock served as an instructor in the Marion County school system teaching physical education to special students.



Nancy Watson Head Trainer

During an athlete's conditioning, and in the event of an injury, FSU athletes have the assistance of trainer Nancy Watson. Watson, in her second season with the Seminole program, is the head women's trainer and is responsible for the prevention, care and rehabilitation of injuries. Working out of the fully-equipped Tully Gym training center, Watson oversees the pre-season conditioning programs, assists in planning the weight programs and travels with several of the teams. Watson received her bachelor's and master's degrees in sports medicine from Indiana University.

This is Florida State

Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks from the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of campus to the contemporary science complex on the west. FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW—Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also, the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering began this fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

In terms of scientific research, FSU excels as a basic research-oriented university. The nuclear physics laboratory is ranked by the National Science Foundation as one of the top four in the nation. FSU also maintains a large marine laboratory on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Florida State counts among its faculty six members of the National Academy of Sciences, including Paul Dirac, a Nobel Prize winner in physics. Kurt Waldheim, former secretary general of the United Nations, recently joined the university faculty as a distinguished visiting lecturer in international relations and law.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

But it's not just good programs that make the university great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it's the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. And he takes special pride in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who are Florida State University.
