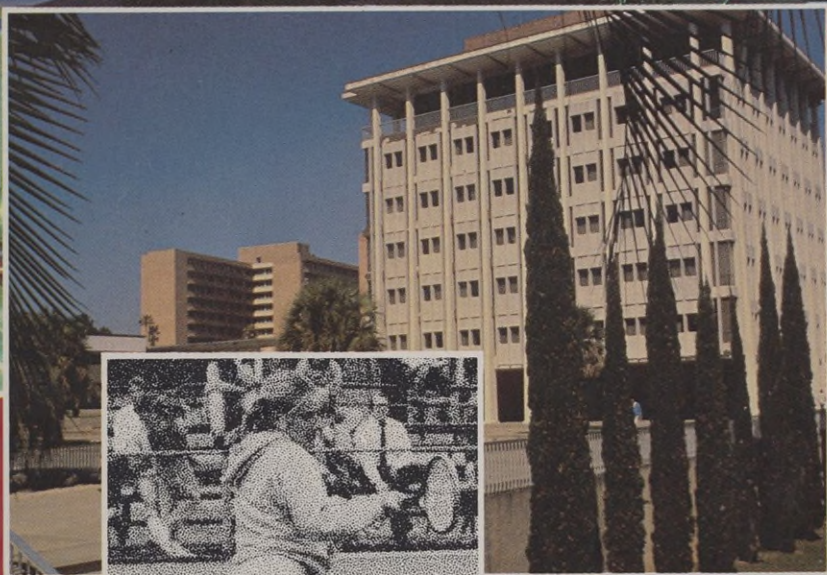
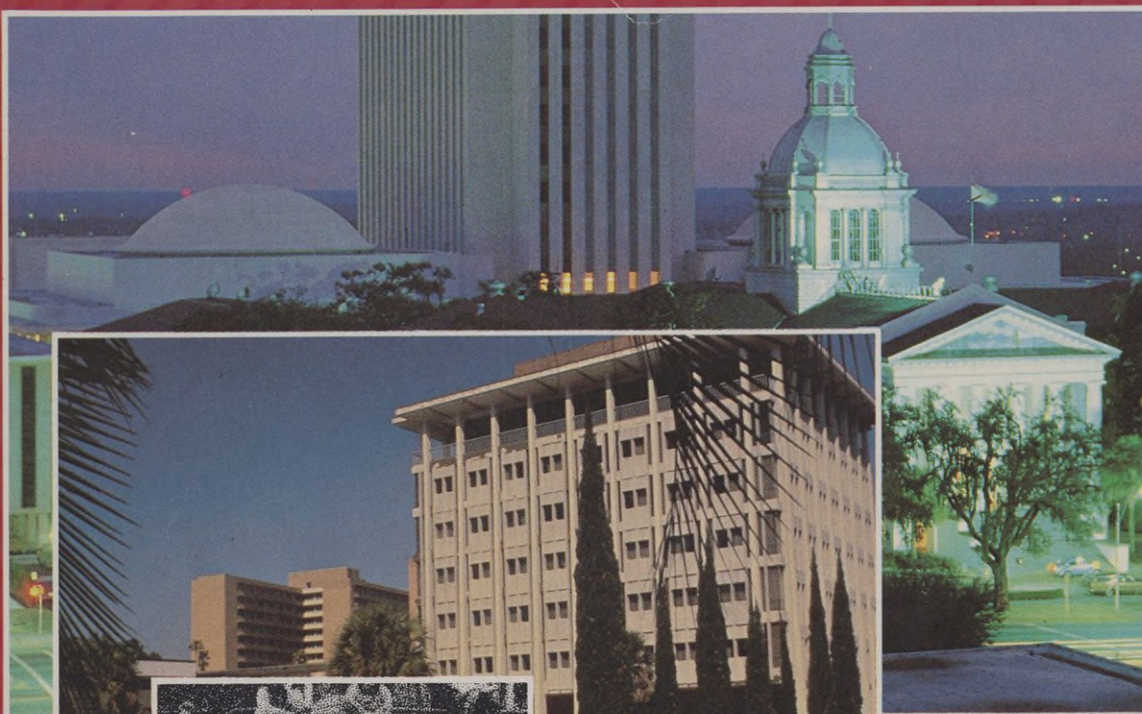

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

Telephones

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. For baseball, Seminole Flagship Station WTNT radio has installed a visitor's radio line that may be used free of charge on a reciprocal basis. Call (904) 386-6143 for more information.

Interviews

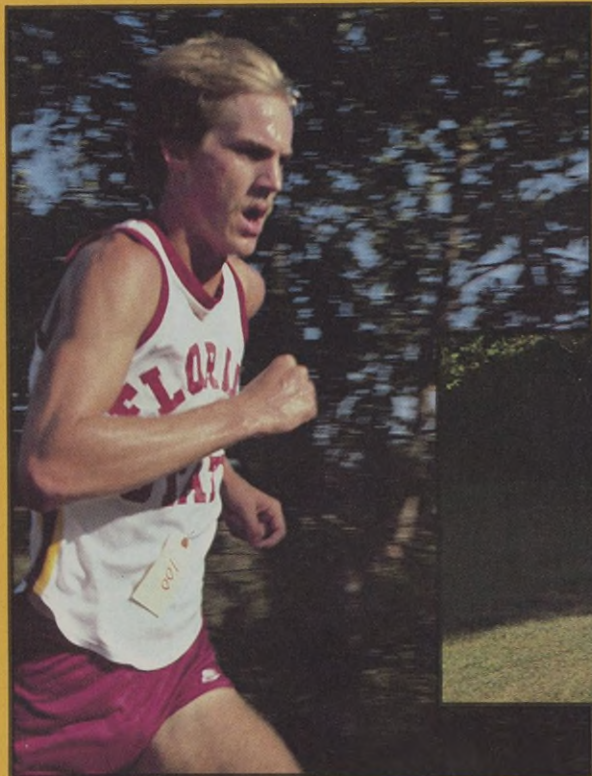

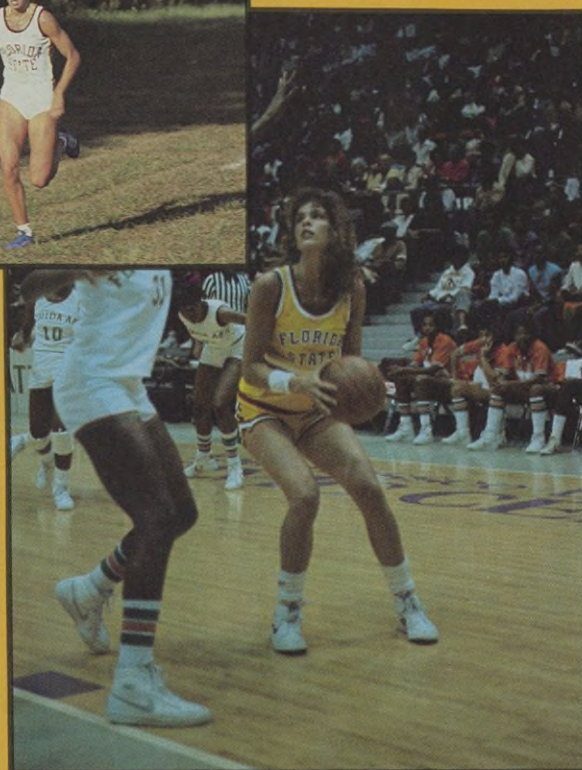
Sports At Florida State

Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. That is about as close to domination of a sport as you'll find. The mens' track team continues to uphold its own proud tradition. Not only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Conference title for eight consecutive years. And Florida State's prowess in this sport, too is aided by a newly renovated and upgraded track and field stadium. Utilizing the annual site of the prestigious Domino's Pizza relays, no other track athletes in the area have the advantages that these Seminoles do in terms of training facilities and coaching.

1984-85 Outlook

On paper, the 1984-85 edition of the Florida State women's tennis team doesn't look too impressive. FSU lost the number one and number three players off a team that went 15-13 in 1984. Head coach Anne Davis added only one newcomer to this year's roster. Yet Davis has nothing but positive things to say about the coming season.

"Sure the loss of Lee (McGuire, last year's number one player) and Lisa (Ehrgott, number three) hurts, but I feel we're in very good shape for this year," said Davis, who begins her sixth season as tennis coach this year. "We have a veteran team that knows what it has to do to have a successful year. More than that, everyone is willing to put in the time and effort that it's gonna take for us to win."

Davis' 1984-85 team definitely has the experience it will take to win. Of the seven returning players, one enters her senior season, three are juniors and two begin their second campaign for FSU. Even the lone newcomer is no newcomer to collegiate tennis. Junior Kim Temples transferred to FSU from Virginia Tech.

With every player bringing at least one year of experience to the 1984-85 season, Davis expects a lot from the Seminoles.

"We want to repeat as Metro Conference champs and hopefully work our way back into the top 20," said Davis. "I think we will surprise some people. In the middle and bottom of our singles line-up, we are as strong and maybe even stronger than we have ever been."

The question mark for the 1984-85 squad is at the top. Lee McGuire held the number one position for two years and replacing her won't be easy. But Davis thinks she has the player who can do it in sophomore Sue Hatch. Hatch played at the second and third singles spots as a freshman and recorded a 15-14 record. After playing well all summer in Canada, Davis feels Hatch is ready to make the jump to number one.

"Right now Sue is the favorite to take over Lee's position," said Davis. "She is playing very well, but if she runs into trouble, we'll still be all right because we have several other players capable of handling that spot."

The other players who could move up include Temples, junior Patti Henderson and sophomore Darlene Kennedy-Finnegan. Temples transferred to FSU last year and practiced with the team, but did not become eligible until this fall. Henderson had the most wins on the squad in 1984 with 21. She is also ready to make a move into one of the top three positions after a summer of competitive tennis in her native Canada. Kennedy-Finnegan will fight for one of the top slots as well: she recorded a 13-4 won-loss mark in 1984.

As the lone senior on the squad in 1985, Debbie Pollack serves as a "quiet leader" for the other players according to Davis. Over the past three years, the Pittsburgh native has tallied 46 singles wins and is looking to have her best season in 1985.

Last year's Most Valuable Player returns for her junior season. Jenny Cerino won 18 matches and lost only four at the number six singles spot. She has an excellent chance to move up this season.

Also suiting up for Florida State again are juniors Claudia Gaughf and Paula Whitebrook. Gaughf saw limited action as a sophomore, but won every match she participated in. Whitebrook is coming off of a redshirt season and a serious knee injury, but could contribute in the doubles area.

Doubles is one place where FSU must make strides if the team expects to improve on last season's record. In trying to come up with winning pairs last season, Davis tried sixteen different combinations. No duo won over 10 doubles matches for FSU although several teams had big wins.

This year will be a different story, Davis said. FSU's Canadian connection, featuring Sue Hatch and Patti Henderson, played together all summer long. They qualified for the Canadian Open doubles tournament and also picked up five computer points. Davis will also use Cerino, Temples and Kennedy-Finnegan in order to find two more strong teams.

"We feel as if our doubles will be much stronger than last year," said Davis. "This year, just because of the experience factor alone, our doubles may win some matches for us."

All facets of the team must come together in order to perform well against the schedule Davis has lined up for it this season. The schedule includes matches against 1984's fifth-ranked team, Miami, as well as top 20 schools Florida, Clemson, South Florida and Northwestern. What makes those matches even more difficult is their location. Only the Florida match will be played in Tallahassee.

"Our schedule is difficult this year because we'll be playing on the road a lot," Davis said. "But it is also difficult because there just aren't any easy matches on the schedule. We have to play the tough teams if we want to re-establish ourselves as one of those top 20 teams."

Establishing Florida State as one of the top 20 teams in the nation will be tough, but establishing FSU as one of the top 10 teams in the region may be just as difficult.

"There are probably about 10 to 12 teams in our region that are in the top 25 nationwide," Davis explained. "We are fortunate to have some of the toughest competition right in our backyard. That is fortunate, but it also makes it very difficult for us to get anywhere sometimes."

Even with the road schedule, the tough region and the loss of two top players, Davis feels the experience and attitude of her team will lead to nothing but good things in 1985.

Prior to Anne Davis' arrival at Florida State five years ago, the women's tennis program was little more than a seven woman team that played 15 matches a year. Last year, without the fanfare received by football and basketball coaches, Davis recorded her 100th victory as the FSU tennis coach. It's a milestone few coaches reach at one school, especially in less than five years. Davis' teams have averaged 20 victories a year, although last year's 15-13 record was short of that mark.

The Lady Seminoles did finish the 1984 season with their second consecutive - and third overall - Metro Conference crown. Davis earned Metro Coach-of-the-Year honors for the third time.

Under Davis, Florida State achieved its first top 20 ranking in 1983 (18th), and sent its first two players to the NCAA Championship tournament that same year.

Davis' success at FSU is not surprising. She has a history of tennis triumphs in all areas, from coaching to playing to administrating. A varsity tennis player for the always strong University of South Florida from 1975 to 1978, she played in the top four slots all four years and was one-half of USF's number one doubles unit. In her junior year the Brahms finished the season ranked 11th in the nation.

After her playing days at USF ended, Davis began her coaching career as the assistant coach for her old team. In that position she helped guide the Brahms to an 11th place showing nationally.

Davis has held numerous posts in different coaching associations. Currently she is a member of the Women's Operating Committee of the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association.

Davis received her bachelor's degree in marketing from USF in 1978 and then went on to complete her master's degree in guidance and counseling at the Tampa school. In addition to her coaching duties at Florida State, Davis serves as assistant academic counselor to FSU women athletes.



Assistant Coach

Lisa Ehr Gott

As a player, Lisa Ehr Gott helped Florida State's women's tennis team to 80 wins and three Metro Conference Championships over a four year period. As an assistant coach to Anne Davis in 1985, Ehr Gott will be contributing to the team in a different way. She will handle various duties for Davis, including some supervision of the fall conditioning program.

Ehr Gott completed her eligibility as a player in 1984. During her four-year career, she accumulated over 60 singles wins and two Metro Conference titles. Ehr Gott led the team in wins in 1983 with 21, and also recorded the team's highest winning percentage. Last season she won 10 singles matches and teamed with several different players to form the number three doubles pair for FSU. She finished her playing career by winning the Metro Conference singles crown at number four.

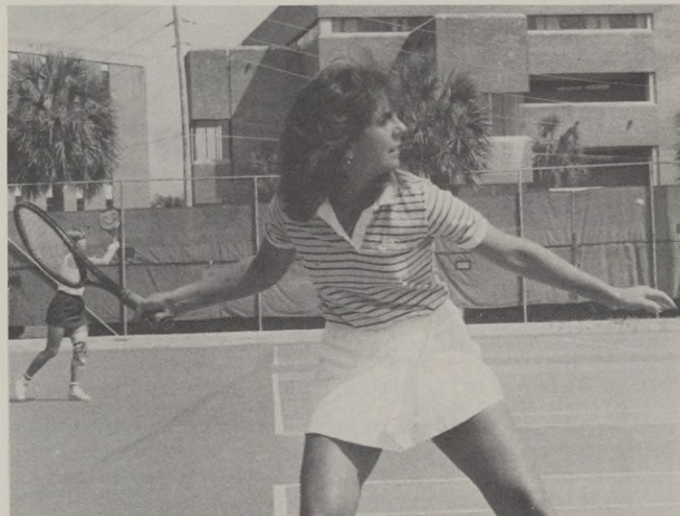

More than six million dollars have been invested in athletic improvements, renovations and additions in just the last two years. There may be no other institution that can claim such a feat. Florida State's facilities are in a word... AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 1½ basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms, locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.





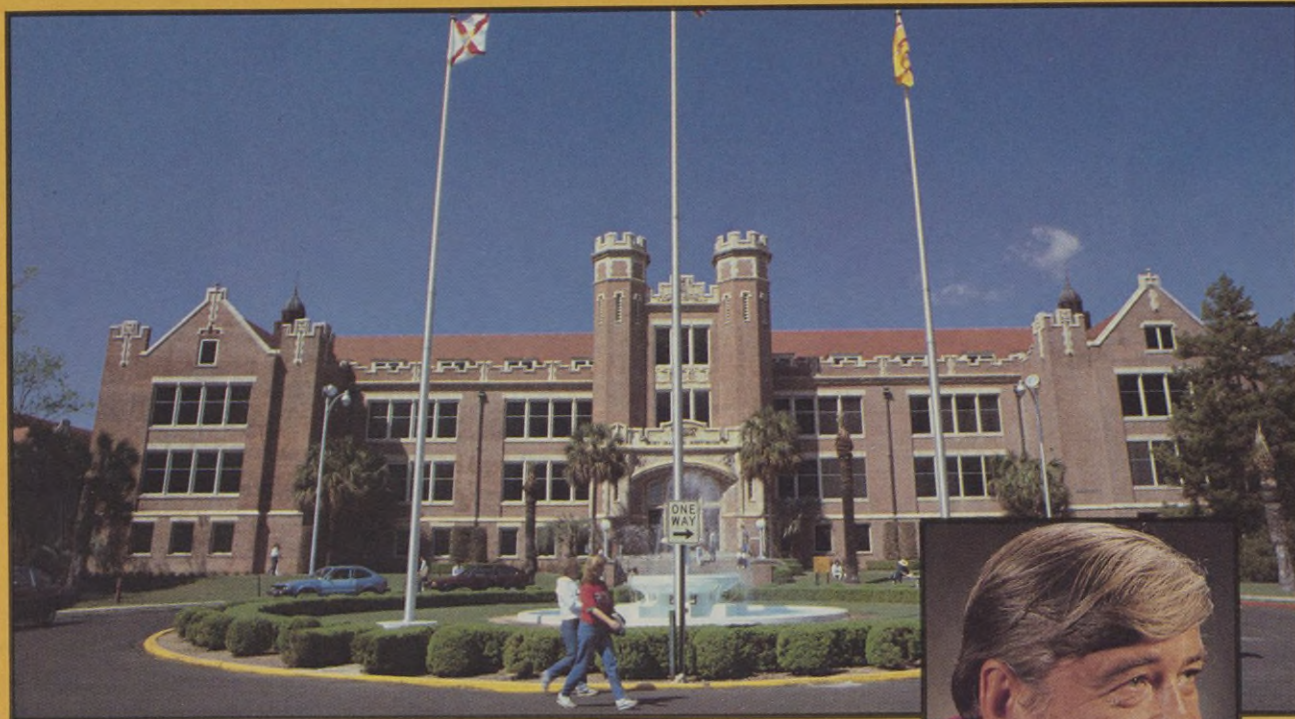

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram
Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



Charles W. Ehrhardt
Faculty Athletic
Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.



Bob Goin
Associate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



Barbara Palmer
Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic receives each year.
