

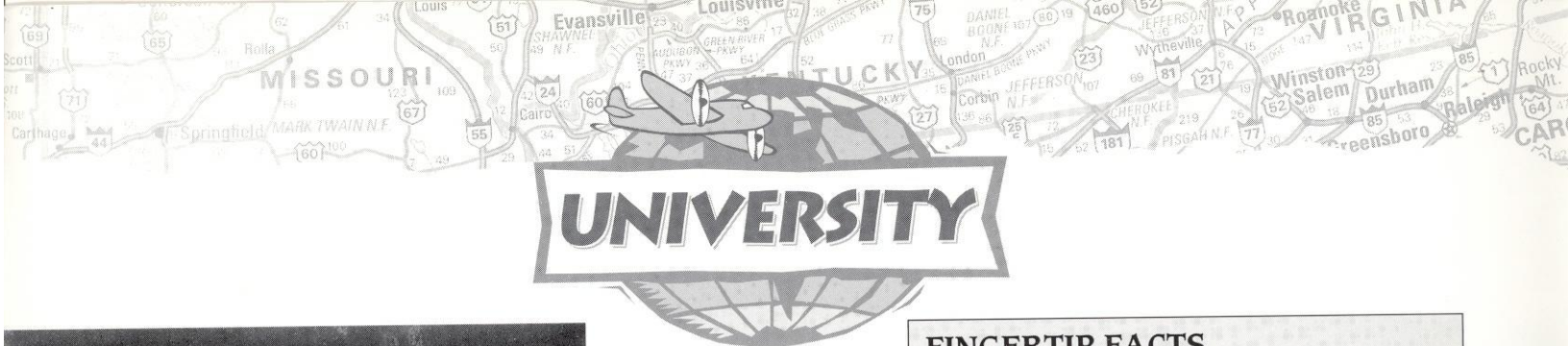

From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thousands of degree-seeking ex-GI's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The university's expanse and complexity today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 28,300 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,300 faculty and 2,600 staff members. About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.

In the past several years, the University has joined an elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State University also offers young people ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than 200 other registered student organizations active on campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.

Being a student at Florida State University means stepping into a tradition of more than 130 years of higher education. From its Flying High Circus to its Supercomputer Computations Research, Florida State provides a panorama of excitement, blending the educational and social sides of campus life.

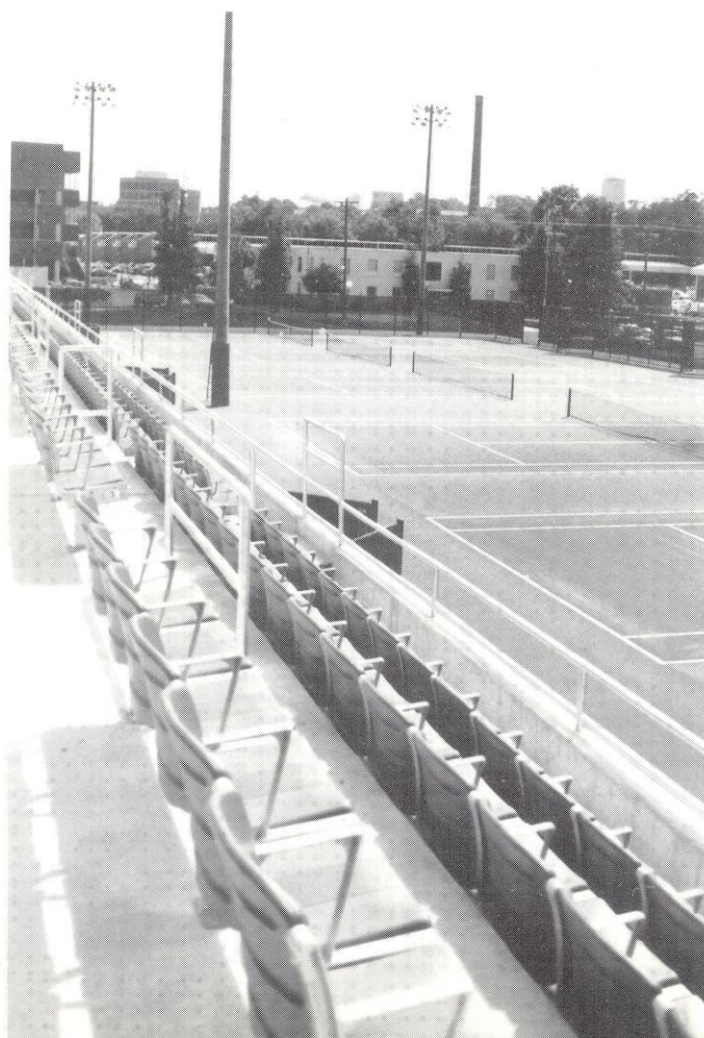
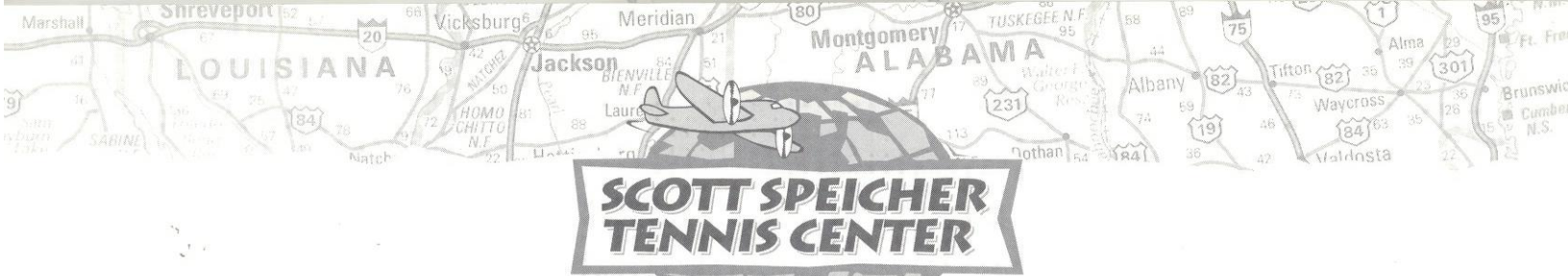

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ON THE COVER: SENIOR TOUR

Seniors Jennifer Hyde, Laura Randmaa, Jenny Graf and Audra Brannon will lead FSU this year.



Completed this summer, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Donald Loucks Courts is one of the premier tennis facilities in the country. Costing over 1.2 million dollars to build, the Center has become the newest focal point in Florida State's commitment to providing top-knotch facilities for its athletes.

The Center houses 12 lighted tennis courts and over 1,000 court level seats. It sits adjacent to the tennis offices, lockerrooms and weight room in Tully Gym.

The center was named in the honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University, and the first American casualty of the Operation Desert Storm. By Presidential Directive, the Facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

The facility was designed by Emo/Architects, Inc, a Tallahassee based Architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc. an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by a private source and the State University System of Florida.



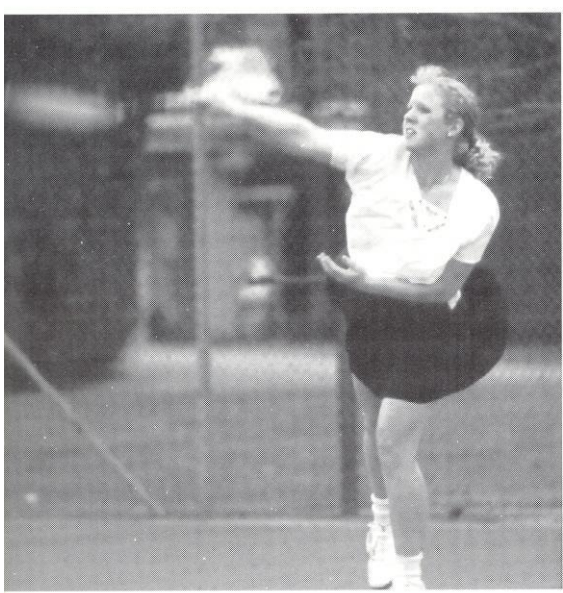


OUTLOOK

What factors would make a coach excited about an upcoming season? A crop of returning players? A team full of senior leadership? Top recruits entering the program? A brand new facility to play in?

In 1993-94, Florida State Head Coach Alice Reen will have all of these factors working to her advantage.

First, the entire starting lineup from a year ago returns this season. That means that the team that finished 13-9, third in the ACC and 26th in the ITA rankings is back. And that doesn't even mention the individual honors that FSU members reaped last year. Two players, Audra Brannon and Laura Randmaa, were All-Americans and All-ACC selections.



Elke Juul and Sandi Ecclestone were ACC Flight Champions at #3 doubles. Jenny Graf and Jen Hyde were runner-up ACC flight champions at number two doubles. Every single one of the starting lineup was recognized in one way or another last season.

There will be plenty of leadership on this year's team as four of the players are seniors. Two, Audra Brannon and Jennifer Hyde, have played their entire careers at Florida State. Jenny Graf is entering her third year while Laura Randmaa is in her second as a Lady Seminole. All four have been instrumental in Florida State's rise in the national tennis rankings.

The two other returning players, both sophomores, are already match experienced after just one year at FSU. Elke Juul had one of the best springs for a first year player in recent memory. The native of Australia looks to return to the same form this year after finishing 18-3 in singles last season. The other sophomore, Sandi Ecclestone, will compete for playing time in both singles and doubles this season.

Entering the mix will be two of the top junior players in Florida last year. Freshmen Ashley Delaney of Lake City and Lori Sowell of Ft. Lauderdale are expected to adapt quickly to the level of play in college and will see plenty of playing time in their first year at Florida State.

Alice Reen, entering her third year at the helm of the program, is obviously optimistic about the upcoming season, "This is the year that we should break into the top 25. We've got the talent and experience to be one of the top teams in the country this season."

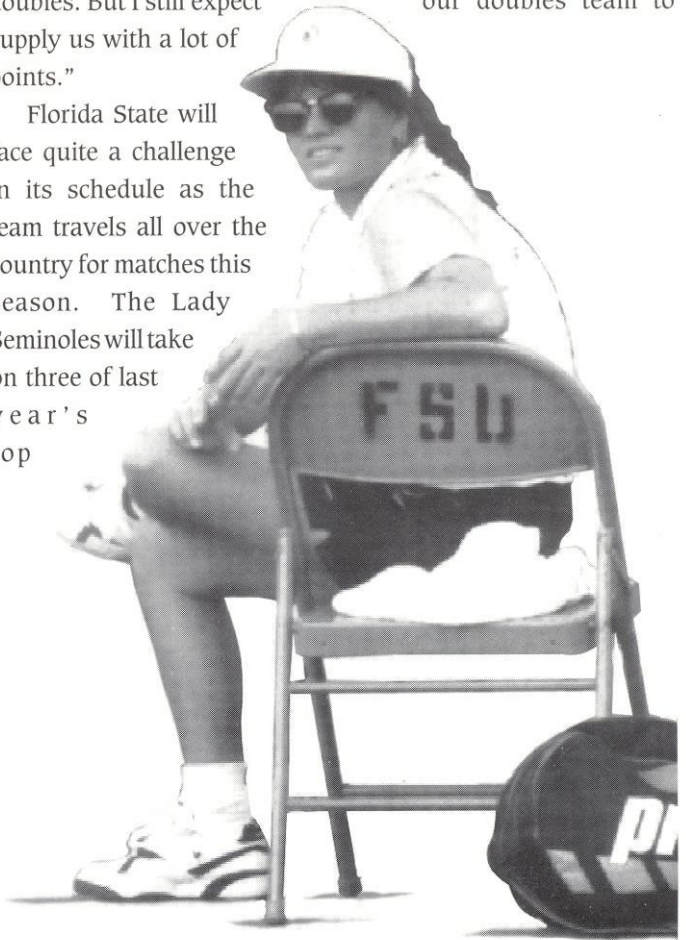
The head coach adds, "In the past we focused on individual improvement. Now, as a team, we have the potential to make great strides. This year whatever we accomplish will be a total team effort."

Reen will once again be assisted by Jenny Mainz. With the coaching staff and team intact, it is easy to see that the 1993-94 squad will be a cohesive unit.

For the second consecutive year, one of Florida State's major strengths will be doubles play. Last season, all three doubles teams were either ACC Flight Champions or runner-up ACC Flight Champions. The FSU number one doubles team of Brannon and Randmaa tied for 25th in the final polls and made it into the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament.

Reen adds, "Last year we played in a lot of matches that were tied after singles play. We always expect to win going into doubles. This year, I expect our singles lineup to be even stronger so there shouldn't be as much pressure put on our doubles. But I still expect our doubles team to supply us with a lot of points."

Florida State will face quite a challenge in its schedule as the team travels all over the country for matches this season. The Lady Seminoles will take on three of last year's top

five (#1 Texas, #2 Florida and #5 Duke) on the road. FSU will meet four other top 25 teams on foreign ground when they face Miami, Tennessee, Clemson and Georgia.

“We believe we can compete and beat any team we face. It’s a philosophy we instil in the players,” explains Reen.

After playing last year at Tom Brown Park, the Lady Seminoles will return to campus to play its home schedule at the brand new Scott Speicher Center at Donald Loucks Courts. Called one of the premier tennis facilities in the country, the center sports 12 lighted tennis courts and over 1,000 court-level seats. This fall, FSU will open play at their new home at the Lady Seminole Classic on October 1-3. During the spring, Georgia Tech, South Florida, Wake Forest, N.C. State, Virginia, Mississippi State, Florida International, and South Alabama all travel to Tallahassee.

Reen explains, “Playing all the matches against ranked opponents on the road will be tough but it will also prepare us for post-season play when we travel to Charlotte, NC for the ACC Championships, and to Athens, GA for the NCAAs hopefully. Our home matches being right on campus will really work to our advantage. The courts are more accessible to students and we should attract a lot of fans.”

Reen’s squad will prepare for its tough spring with four tournaments in the fall plus a trip to South Bend, Indiana for a exhibition match against Notre Dame. The Gator Fall Classic, the

Riviera All-American and the ITA Regionals will feature some of the top players in the nation. How well the Lady Seminoles do in the fall will give Reen a clue of what to expect in the spring.

“If the returning players have as good of seasons as they did last year and the newcomers fill our holes and play up to their potential,” Reen said, “I think we will have a great season.”

Alice Reen

In 1993-94 Head Coach Alice Reen will be charged with the task of improving on one of the most successful years in Florida State tennis history. Last season, Reen's team finished third in the ACC, and received votes in the final ITA rankings. Two players were named All-Americans, the first in FSU history. In only her third year at the helm of the program, Reen has already put FSU on the national collegiate tennis map.

For a program to be successful on the national level, coaches must bring in top-notch players every year. Reen has committed Florida State to recruiting top players who are both academically and athletically gifted. This season, the trend continues as FSU's two incoming freshmen are both talented scholar-athletes.

The reason for Reen's success in recruiting is based on her philosophy. She believes that the main aim of the program is for a player to improve as a person while they're at Florida State. As a result, Reen keeps an open-door policy with her team that allows players to discuss anything that is on their minds at anytime during the day.

A native of Orlando, Reen played collegiate tennis for the University of Georgia. When she arrived in Athens, the Lady Bulldogs were by no means a perennial powerhouse. Four years later, Reen was Georgia's number one player and captain of the team that was runner-up at the 1987 NCAA Tournament in Los Angeles.

Upon graduation, Reen stayed on with the Lady Bulldogs as an assistant before moving on to the University of Tennessee. Today it would be difficult to say that both schools didn't benefit immensely from Reen, as both are continually ranked in the top 20 and belong to the nation's elite in women's tennis.

In 1990, Alice Reen earned her first head coaching position at the University of Arkansas. Unsurprisingly, Reen enjoyed a successful season in Fayetteville before accepting the head job at Florida State.

Reen has conducted seminars throughout the state on aspects surrounding college tennis. For the past two summers, Reen coached the 18-year-old Florida Intersectionship in the USTA's National Tournament.

Alice Reen is a fine overall athlete which should come as no surprise when considering her lineage. Her father played football for the University of Florida and her brother is the general manager of the Cleveland Indians. Currently, Alice is working on her Master's Degree in Athletic Administration.

University of Houston

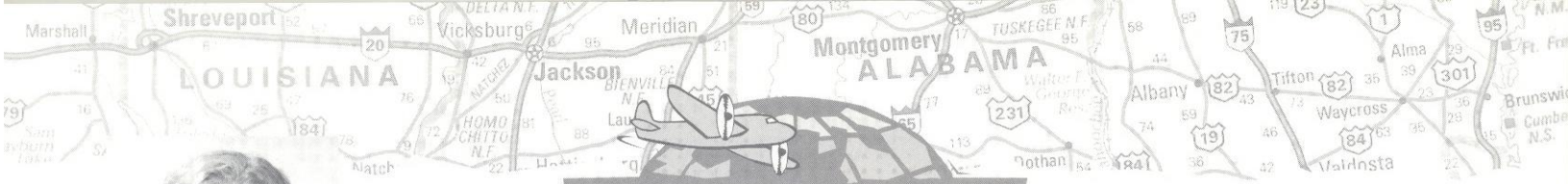
Entering her second season as the Florida State Women's Tennis Assistant Coach, Jenny Mainz will be concerned with all types of administrative and coaching responsibilities. Besides office duties such as handling team travel and the organization of Booster Play Day, Mainz will also work closely with the team in practices and matches. She has also been heavily involved in recruiting and spent the summer travelling to a number of national junior tournaments.

A former player for the University of Houston, Mainz won a number of awards during her career including being named a GTE Academic All-American. In addition she was voted captain of her team three years and was tabbed a member of the All Southwest Conference team two years. Mainz ranked as high as 12th in the nation in doubles in 1990.

A native of San Antonio, Texas, Mainz received her undergraduate degree from the University of Houston in Kinesiology. Currently she is working on a Masters Degree in Athletic Administration.

One of the most successful players in the history of Lady Seminole tennis...a team leader who leads by example...maintains a strong work ethic and a competitive drive...has been one of main reasons for Florida State's rise in the national tennis picture...nominated by Florida State for the Garber Award for the ACC's top female athlete...**1992-93:** earned All-American honors after reaching the quarterfinals in doubles of the NCAA tournament with partner, Laura Randmaa...pair became the first players to be named All-Americans in the history of Florida State women's tennis...duo defeated Paradine and Yin of Indiana and Mazzotta and Valls of Miami in the first two rounds of the National Tournament...was defeated in the quarterfinals by the country's number two team, Poruri and Willens of Stanford, 7-6, 6-3...also competed in the singles portion of the NCAA tournament...lost in the first round to 28th ranked Suzi Italiano of Southern Cal...honored with the Regional Arthur Ashe award for her sportsmanship and character...named to the All-ACC team...finished with a 15-8 singles record this spring...one of two team members to accumulate over 20 wins over the fall and spring...won the team's MVP award... broke into the nation's top fifty in the fall, ranking 43rd in collegiate singles...was the runner-up of the Lady Seminole Fall Classic...also competed in the Riviera Qualifying tournament in the fall...finished the season ranked 56th in singles...also ranked in doubles, with Randmaa...pair ranked as high as 17th in the nation...started the fall off by advancing into the main draw of the prestigious Riviera All-American Tennis Championships...in spring,

duo was runner-up ACC flight champions at the number one position...top doubles win was over the country's number one doubles team, Gurney and Portnoy of North Carolina...completed the spring tying for 25th in the doubles rankings...**1991-92:** capped off a successful year with a final Volvo ranking of 55th...one of four unanimous selections to the All-ACC team...compiled a 16-7 record in the spring which included a span of nine consecutive victories...became the ACC runner-up flight champion at No. 1 singles...defeated ranked players such as Claire Sessions of Southern Methodist, Julie Exum of Duke, Rachel Viollet of Miami and Michelle Oldham of Mississippi State...finished the Spring on a four-match win streak...teamed up in doubles with Chrissie Tee and put together an 11-9 record at No. 1...**1990-91:** as a freshman competed in the number two singles position...amassed a remarkable 17-7 record including a 10 match win streak...was crowned Metro Conference Champion at No. 2...also won the Metro title at #1 doubles with partner Buffy Baker...won seventeen doubles matches while only losing six...named to the All-Metro Conference Tennis Team...**High School:** named All-American at Hixson High School in Tennessee...considered Tennessee's #1 singles player...as a senior ranked 7th in the South and 70th in the nation...**Personal:** born June 5, 1972...comes from a tennis rich background...majoring in Nutrition and Fitness...is right-handed.

Academics

In her definition of the student-athlete, Head Coach Alice Reen believes that each part- the student and the athlete- is equally important. While Reen is concerned with her player's competitive edge on the courts, she keeps a keen eye on their progress in the classroom as well.

"One of the first priorities I try to instill when an athlete comes to FSU is the need to strive for academic excellence. Their accomplishments in the classroom is a genuine concern for me and a responsibility that I gladly accept," says Reen

The women's tennis team always has one of the highest team grade point averages of all of the FSU sports. With a team g.p.a hovering around 3.0, the Lady Netters finished second in the fall and fourth in the spring among the Seminole athletic programs. In addition, three players made the Dean's List last season and one, Amy Hanby, was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll.

The Lady Seminole tennis team is just one example of Florida State's overall commitment to academic excellence. Last season, 46 athletes that competed for FSU in 1992-93 received undergraduate degrees. Seventy student-athletes were named to the ACC's Academic Honor Roll. These athletes maintained a grade point average of 3.0 and above for both the fall and spring semesters.

To support Seminole student-athletes as the strive to meet their fullest potential both on and off the field, the athletic department has undertaken several projects to upgrade both their academic support services and facilities. The physical plant expansion of the Moore Athletic Center as part of the University Center project, means FSU student-athletes will have access to a state-of-the-art learning environment, which will include individual study areas, the latest in computer technology, and a study hall and research area.

Florida State student-athletes also benefit from one of the nation's premier academic support systems. A full-time staff assists all incoming students-athletes adjust to their new campus environment and works with them throughout their academic careers at FSU.

Athletic Director Bob Goin adds, "We want to provide the best opportunity for our student-athletes to achieve academic and athletic success. Doing that, we'll be setting a precedent for excellence."

FSU and the Atlantic Coast Conference

The Atlantic Coast Conference has long been known for the success of its athletic programs and tennis is further proof of this fact. Last year the conference ranked five teams in the nation's top 25 at one time or another during the season. Duke, Clemson, Virginia, Wake Forest and North Carolina all were ranked and Florida State received votes twice during the season.

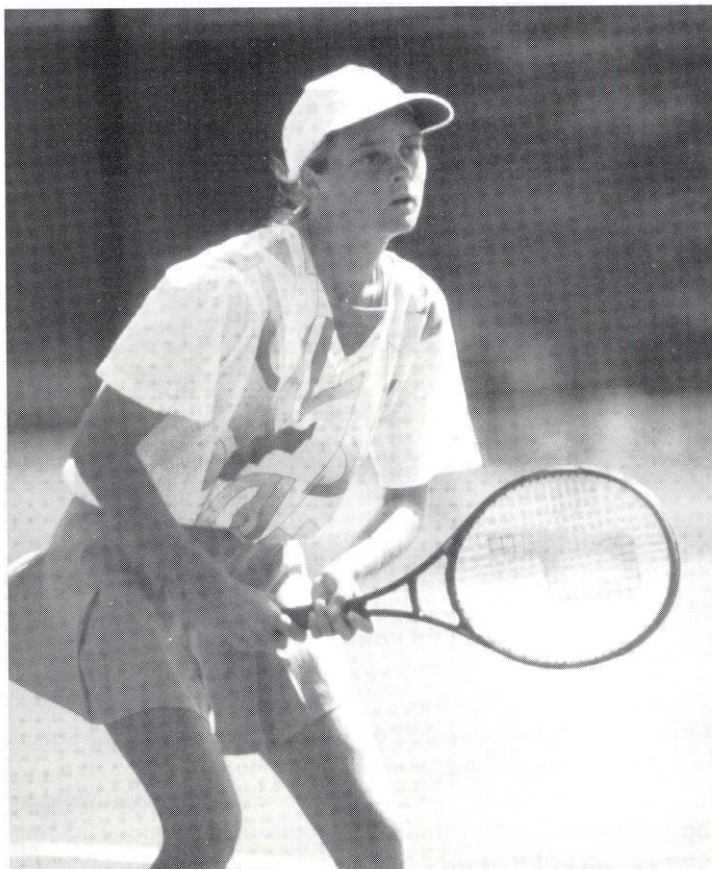
For the second consecutive year, Florida State finished third in the conference. The Lady Seminoles defeated North Carolina in the quarterfinals of the ACC tournament before falling to Clemson in the semifinals.

Duke won the conference crown for the sixth year in a row last season. The Blue Devils defeated Clemson 5-2 in the Championship match.

Although Duke has been the team to beat in recent years, the ACC has witnessed streaks of champions. North Carolina had the most success in early years, winning the championship from 1977-1980. From 1981-1987 Clemson put together a string of victories. Duke snapped their streak in 1988 and have been on cruise control ever since.

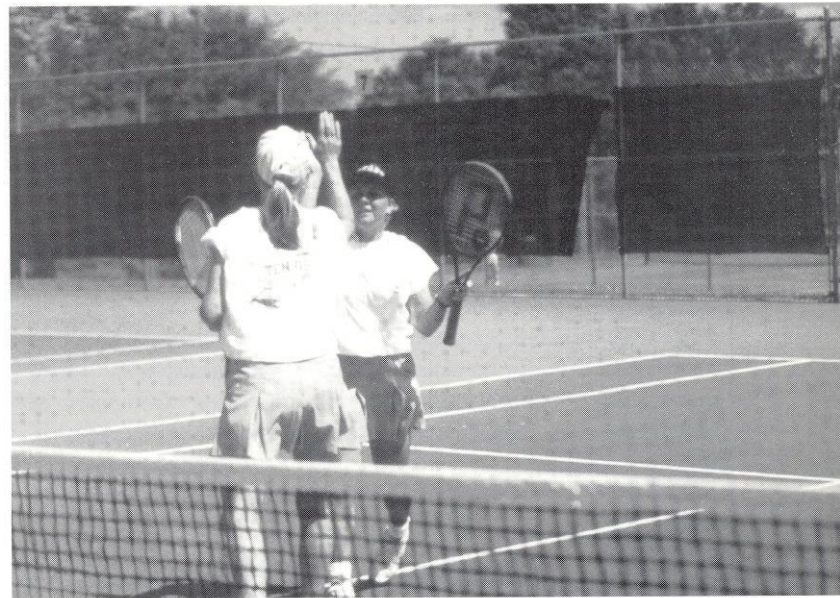
The 1994 season will be the 17th year of women's tennis competition in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Beginning in 1977, the ACC started crowning a conference champion. This process has gone through many changes throughout the years. In 1982 the tournament was held in the spring for the first time. In 1990, the tournament determined the ACC team champion while the singles and doubles champions were determined in regular-season play. For the first time this season the ACC will host an indoor event as well as the outdoor tournament in April.

Florida State plays in the ACC Indoor in Chapel Hill, NC on January 28-30. The Lady Seminoles will travel to Charlotte, NC on April 22 to compete in the ACC Championships.

Strength and Training

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance on the court. At Florida State, a specially designed program is developed for tennis, emphasizing the objectives of strengthening and conditioning the athletes. Strength coach Matt Hamparian individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway.

Hamparian works with the players in sport specific training which includes conditioning the major muscle groups used in tennis.

Last year, Hamparian customized a sand workout for the women's tennis team. The workout, which the squad will participate in again this year, was instrumental in improving quickness and cardiovascular conditioning on the court. The coaches believe so strongly in the program that they even participate themselves. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

Being an athlete at Florida State University means receiving the best care and treatment possible. All of the student-athletes undergo a pre-season examination so a certified trainer can detect any potential injuries an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. The program is closely monitored by Head Trainer Robin Gibson or one of her nine staff members.

Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room. Though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are sometimes a part of participating in athletics. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.



Going into 1993, the Lady Seminoles knew that they had quite a challenge ahead of them. Lurking in every corner of the schedule was a top 25 team. By the end of the season, Florida State had faced nine ranked teams and had proved that they too were a force to be reckoned with on the court.

YEAR IN REVIEW

a straight set victory by Brannon and Randmaa over the nation's number one ranked doubles team of Cinda Gurney and Alisha Portnoy.

The Lady Seminoles fell victims once again to a 5-4 loss as number 19 Wake Forest handed FSU the defeat. As in the Clemson match, FSU fell short of pulling out the win when they won only two of three of the doubles matches.

Starting the season with the first six matches on the road, the Lady Seminoles logged over 2,500 miles in three weeks. Florida State opened up against Georgia Tech in Atlanta and handed the Yellow Jackets a 8-1 loss. Five days later FSU travelled to Arizona to take on three teams.

With their record hovering around the .500 mark, Florida State went on a three match win streak that increased their record to 9-6. Oklahoma, N.C. State and Maryland could only manage four total points in the FSU victories.

Due partially to early injuries, FSU took a pair of 5-4 losses in their first two matches. In both contests the score was knotted up 3-3 following singles play but FSU could not capitalize, losing two of the doubles matches. Although it appeared after these matches that FSU's doubles play might be its Achilles heal, this was not the case. The Lady Seminoles played in seven other matches over the course of the season where they went into doubles tied 3-3. In those matches, FSU stood at 7-0 and even swept the doubles matches three times.

After falling 6-3 to 15th ranked Tennessee, FSU travelled to Virginia and came away with their biggest win of the season. Florida State won three singles and two doubles matches en route to a 5-4 upset of the 17th ranked Cavaliers.

The Lady Seminoles finished their regular season at home and took two of three matches. FSU defeated Southwestern Louisiana and South Alabama but fell to number nine ranked, Georgia.

In the first round of the ACC Championships in Charlotte, NC, third seeded FSU faced six seeded North Carolina. The Lady Seminoles clinched the 5-4 victory when Sandi Ecclestone and Elke Juul defeated Bradford and Cervenka in the number three doubles match, 7-5, 6-2.

In the semifinals, Clemson managed a feat that had not been accomplished against FSU all season—they swept the doubles matches. Randmaa and Elke Juul both won their singles matches to give FSU their two points in the 7-2 loss.

Florida State finished the year with a 13-9 overall record and a third place finish in the conference. Two players, Audra Brannon and Laura Randmaa were named to the All-ACC team. Elke Juul and Sandi Ecclestone were crowned the #3 doubles flight champions. In addition, FSU received votes in the final ITA rankings.



Florida State ended its western road trip by losing its third consecutive match. Facing their first top 25 opponent, FSU was upended by 12th ranked Arizona 7-2.

The Lady Seminoles received a much needed two week break before travelling to Miami. Getting back on track, Florida State demolished Florida International 8-1, sweeping the singles matches. Audra Brannon and Elke Juul earned the only FSU points in a close 7-2 loss to 14th ranked Miami the next day.

Rollins College was the first team to play at FSU's displaced home at Tom Brown Park on February 20th. Florida State won the match as they had their other two victories, by an 8-1 score.

Building on the win, FSU took their next two matches, defeating Michigan 6-3 and South Florida 5-4. The Lady Seminoles stood at 5-4 and were about to face the toughest part of their schedule as the next three matches were against ranked teams.

Clemson, ranked 23rd, narrowly avoided an upset bid by FSU. Leading 4-2 going into doubles play, Clemson looked to have the match firmly in grasp. However, FSU rallied back, taking each of the doubles matches to three sets. The Tigers secured the win as the number one doubles team of Durden and King outlasted Brannon and Randmaa, 6-2, 2-6, 7-5.

FSU responded to the narrow loss by turning in a resounding 7-2 win over 24th ranked North Carolina. The highlight of the match was



But the 1993 season will most likely be remembered because of the accomplishments of FSU's number one doubles team of Audra Brannon and Laura Randmaa. The first Florida State players to be invited to compete in the NCAA tournament since 1983, the pair advanced into the quarterfinals and earned All-American honors. They became the first All-Americans in the history of FSU's women's tennis program. Brannon also participated in the singles portion of the NCAA tournament.

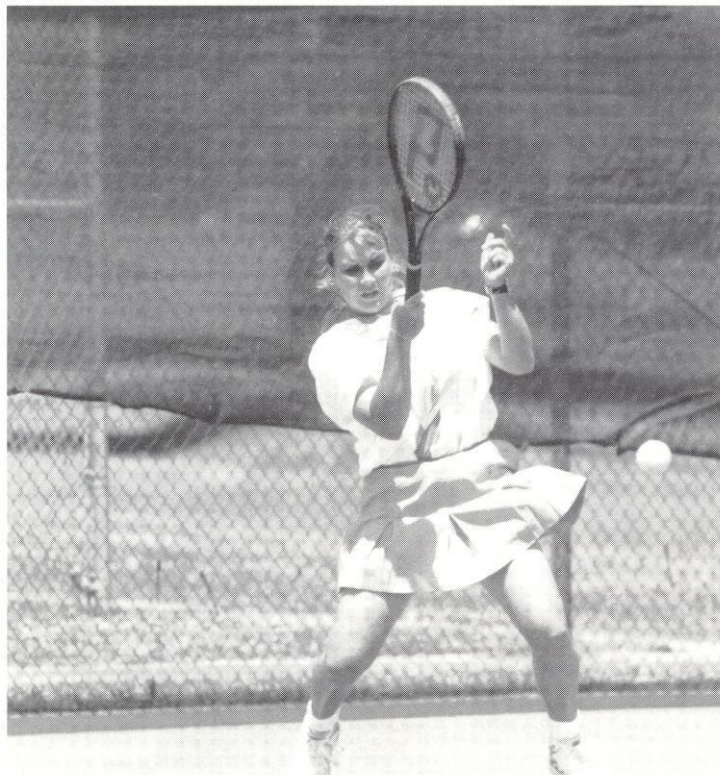

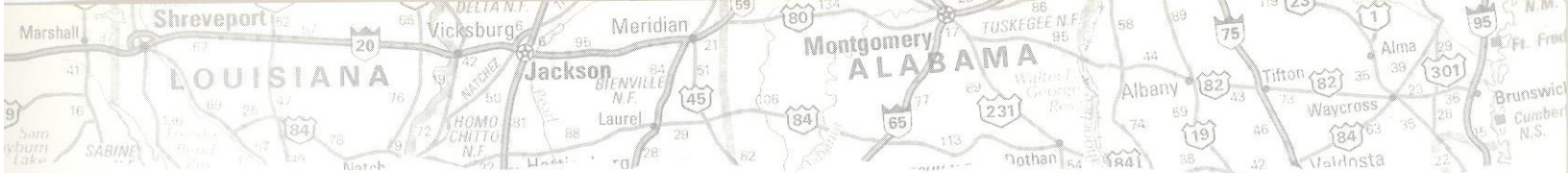

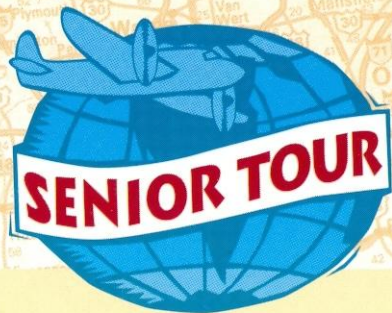
