TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

- The Noles have had athletes captures All-ACC Honors 40 times amongst 19 different athletes including Gabriella Castaneda's third team All-ACC honors in 2017.
- Florida State has had one four time All-ACC member since joining the conference in 1992 (Daneika Borthwick 2013-2016).
- Since FSU began playing tennis in 1982, they have garnered eight National or Regional Honors amongst six different athletes.
- The Noles have had four different student athletes earn ITA All-American Honors (Audra Brannon, Laura Randmaa, Lorie Sowell and Mihaela Moldovan) and a pair of two time All-Americans (Audra Brannon & Lori Sowell)
- The Seminoles had the ITA Southeast Region Most Improved Senior in two of the last three seasons (Daneika Borthwick, 2015 & Daniela Schippers, 2017)
- There are four members of the FSU Athletics

Hall of Fame that have come through the FSU Tennis program. (Patti Henderson, 1992, Buffy Baker, 1997, Lori Sowell, 2003, Audra Brannon, 2007)

NOLES IN THE ACC

- Florida State joined the ACC in Women's Tennis prior to the start of the 1992 season.
- Since joining the ACC the Noles have finished in the Top-3 seven out of 26 seasons with their best finish being a tie for second in 1994.
- The Seminoles have earned two ACC Rookie of the Years (Lori Sowell & Francesca Segarelli), one ACC Player of the Year (Audra Brannon), 39 All-ACC Honors and 26 All-ACC Academic team Honors.

COACHING EXPERIENCE

- The Noles have been under the tutelage of head coach Jennifer Hyde for the past 13 season. Hyde returned to her alma mater in 2004 to lead the Seminoles of which she was a captain of the

1994 team that finished as No. 17 in the nation. She is only the second alum to return to coach at Florida State and is the longest tenured head coach in FSU women's tennis history.

- During her time with Florida State, coach Hyde has led the Seminoles to a 196-139 record, the most wins in school history, and 10 post-season appearances including a NCAA round of 16 appearance in 2010.
- Coach Hyde was named the 2007 & 2011 ITA South Region Coach of the Year.
- Hyde had one of the most successful seasons in school history in 2010-2011 by taking the Seminoles to the ACC title match for just the second time ever and garnered a No. 11 ranking during the season, which is the highest in FSU history.
- She led Florida State to its third-ever ACC Title match in 2013, defeating two Top-15 teams en route to the final.

With the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament and immediately earned national attention. The United States Tennis Association (USTA) presented the facility with its prestigious "Top Notch" award" in 1994. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships and 2007-2010 NCAA Regionals have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Scott Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 20 varsity athletic programs.

The Scott Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court-level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. In 2015, the complex added booster seating over Courts 1 & 2 with new black awnings to cover fans. Underneath the grandstands, a new paint job and signage welcomes players and fans to the complex.

In 2016, the courts were repainted in Florida State's patented Garnet and Gold, the first major renovations to the courts since they opened in 1993.

The Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the U.S. government as missing in action in 2001 and missing or captured a year later. However, in 2009 Speicher's remains were found in the Anbar province of Iraq after a nearly 20-year search. The Scott Speicher family was later honored by Florida State at a home football game with a missing man formation flyover from the Navy. By presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. The varsity tennis courts were named for Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of men from 1957-1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes.

The Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.

Through its 25-year existence, the Donald Loucks Courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center has served as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home dual matches, Seminole Fall Classics, City of Tallahassee tennis championships, various USTA regional and zonal tournaments, the 1994 and 1995 Men's Intercollegiate tournament and the annual Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational benefiting Shands Hospital in Gainesville. The tennis center has also been the site for the ITA Summer Circuit for men's and women's tennis in which high school and collegiate athletes participate in singles and doubles matches.





After breaking ground on construction in January of 2010, the Indoor Tennis Facility was completed in April of 2011. The multimillion dollar Indoor Tennis Facility serves as an additional playing arena for the Florida State tennis teams. Since the completion in spring of 2011, the facility has served as both a site for training and competition.

The building hosts six regulation courts, locker rooms, athletic training room, equipment room, office and lobby. With this newest facility, both Seminole Tennis teams are equipped with the tools to host both regional and national championships now and in the future. For the next phase, plans are in place to add spectator seating, team lounges, extended locker rooms, offices and a press box.

Besides use from the tennis programs, the Multi-Purpose Educational Facility is used for academic classes, clinics and camps. The facility was the first indoor tennis facility approved for college competition in the state of Florida and is still one of just a few in the southeast.

The women's tennis team had its first practice on April 6, 2011 while the men practiced the next day on April 7. At the men's Seminole Invitational during September 2011, the back draws were played there for the facilities first competition. The first women's dual match was played on January 21, 2012 against UCF where Florida State won 6-1. The men's team played Furman on January 22, 2012 and came off the courts with a 7-0 victory.

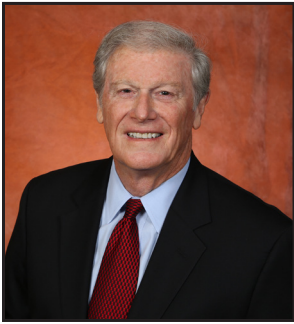
The building was designed by Architects: Lewis + Whitlock while construction was completed by Rippee Construction of Tallahassee.

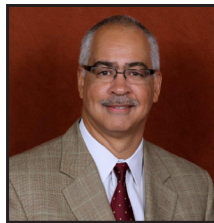

2018 Season Preview

Coming off their first NCAA tournament appearance in three years and a 17-12 record ending in a second-round appearance in the NCAA tournament, the Florida State women's tennis team has high expectations for this upcoming season.

"Everyone on this team appreciates the fact that we have a really special group of people this year," said head coach Jennifer Hyde. "There is a very subtle flame burning under this team and this team could end up surprising themselves this season. Big things are ahead and I look forward to putting them in situations that give us opportunities to be one of the best teams that have been here at Florida State."

The Seminoles return seven letterwinners from a squad that finished 17-12 in 2017 under head coach Jennifer Hyde in her 13th season.

The Garnet and Gold open their 2018 fall season in Hawaii on January 13 against The University of Hawaii. The Noles remain



in Hawaii to compete in the Hawaii/Utah tournament the next day - this is the start of an intense three-month competition schedule that culminates with a NCAA Championships beginning on May 10th.

"Every season is different," said Hyde. "Every year things change. There are no two seasons that are alike. There are some fundamental things that are always in place, but I don't think you can compare one season to the next. What I am most looking forward to is finally having the full lineup in play, with Carla (Touly) being able to play for her first time. I am excited to sort out our doubles teams and put our strongest lineup out there every day because I feel like this team has the depth that we have never had."

The Noles come home for the first time on Feb. 10 as they host the both Mercer and FAU at Scott Speicher Tennis Center. Those matches are followed up by another doubleheader and the annual Military appreciation match against Air Force on Feb. 17.

The Seminoles' schedule is highlighted by two trips to the USTA National Tennis Center in Lake Nona, Fla. The Noles head to Lake

Nona for the first time on Feb. 3 as they take on Florida in the College Match Day event. Florida State goes back down to Lake Nona about a month later to take on Miami on March 9.

FSU loses just one member from their 2017 NCAA second round campaign, but brings in two freshmen that look to make an immediate impact for the Noles.

"We had a really exciting season last year and I feel like we are building off of that

because we only lost one person out of the lineup and gained three or four people into the lineup," said Hyde. "The experiences we had last season have made us better for what is ahead of us this season. The expectations are very high and the girls got a taste of some pretty great things last year. They want more than a taste this season."

The 2018 Seminoles women's tennis is led by senior Gabby Castaneda, who earned third-team All-ACC honors for the second time a season ago. Castaneda led the team in doubles wins with an 18-6 overall record.

The Noles also have two juniors returning from a young team a season ago. Juniors Julia Mikulski and Ariana Rahmanparast look to build off what they did a season ago. Mikulski was a consistent starter for the Garnet and Gold in 2017, spending most of her time on court three. Rahmanparast led the Seminoles in wins a season ago, earning a 17-9 dual singles record with most of her wins coming on court six.

The Seminoles return a strong freshman

class from a season ago as well. Sophomore Nandini Das earned 17 singles wins and 21 doubles wins in her freshman campaign. Fellow Sophomore Andrea Garcia, too won 17 singles matches in 2017. Florida State looks to get help from sophomores Gabby Goldin and Carla Touly as well.

"Through the fall season we have had a pretty good look at the depth and

talent that we have," said Hyde. "We have changed some things in our training that has been very exciting as well and they have responded to those changes very professionally and with open minds."

Florida State adds two talented newcomers, freshmen Petra Hule and Lucie Prochazkova. Hule led the team in total wins during the fall with eight singles wins and 11 doubles wins. Prochazkova was not far behind as she amassed 10 wins of her own.

"I expect big things from our freshman," said Hyde. "Petra (Hule) has already established herself as a force to be reckoned with throughout the fall. She had the best record on the team and I know she's not even close to being satisfied with where she is now. That hunger is going to drive her to do some great things. Lucie (Prochazkova) is continuing to improve and is becoming better and smarter. We are really excited about her ceiling and having the opportunity to reach her potential."

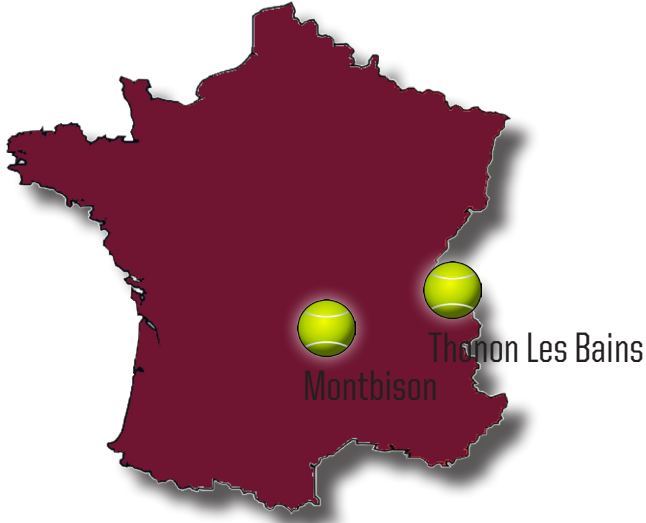

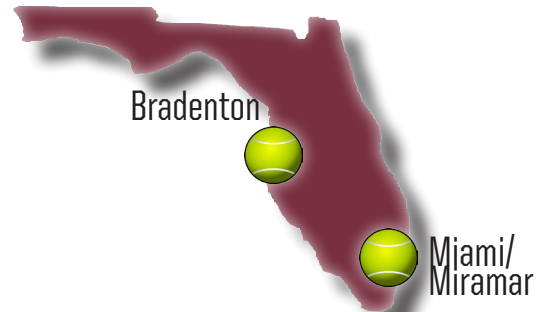

Spring 2017: Named to All-ACC third team after leading the Seminoles from the top spot for the entire season... All-ACC Academic team...won matches early in the season against Columbia and Harvard...defeated No. 58 Michelle Valdez of North Florida 6-1, 6-3 for highest-ranked win of the regular season...was first off the court in 4-0 route at Louisville, a 6-0, 6-2 win over Aleksandra Mally...in NCAA First Round upset over No. 26 Arizona State, defeated No. 50 Cassidy Jump for 50th-career singles victory to led the Florida State comeback...won the first set and was in the third with Auburn's No. 17 Alizee Michaud when the Tigers clinched the match...battled through ankle injury for much of the season, sometimes limiting her to only doubles play...with Daniela Schippers, began the season 13-0 on court three doubles...did not suffer a loss until the last week of the regular season at Virginia Tech...finished the year 16-2...against No. 11 Auburn in the NCAA Second Round, defeated No. 64 Georgia Axon/Caroline Turner 7-5 to help FSU win the doubles point...the upperclassmen pair led the Seminoles to win 20 doubles points on the year, the most in program history...ended the season ranked No. 81 in the ITA doubles poll, one of three FSU pairs to finish in the final rankings

Fall 2016: Finished the fall season 2-6 in doubles and 0-3 in singles...went 1-5 at the Furman Classic in September, defeating Furman's Katty Weymouth/Ansley Speaks 8-6 in doubles with Julia Mikulski...at the ITA Southeast Regional Championship in Gainesville, competed only in doubles, contributing to an undefeated first day by defeating Georgia Southern 8-0 with Mikulski...fell to Maryna Vekslar/Ulyana Grib of Florida International twice to finish with a 1-2 record in the tournament.

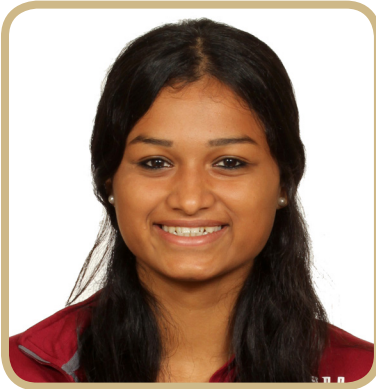

Jennifer Hyde enters her 14th season at the helm of the Florida State program as FSU's winningest women's tennis coach. Hyde surpassed Anne Davis (1980-86) with her 142nd career win on March 22, 2014, against NC State. Hyde has led the Seminoles to NCAA appearances in 10 of 13 seasons, leading the program back to the NCAA Championship and into the NCAA second round in 2017. With an exceptional list of accomplishments and milestones from her career at FSU, including an honor of ITA South Region Coach of the Year in both 2007 and 2011, Hyde looks to again guide the Seminoles deep into the NCAA Tournament in 2018, after recording a Top-15 recruiting class the last two seasons.

In 2017, Florida State reestablished the program as contenders in the Atlantic Coast Conference en route to a 17-win season, the most since 2009. The Seminoles had the best season ever in doubles play, winning 20 team doubles points, the most in program history. All three doubles pairs finished the season ranked in the final ITA poll.

The Seminoles earned a host of individual honors after a resurgent year. Junior Gabriella Castaneda was named All-ACC third team, while both Castaneda and senior Daniela Schippers made the All-ACC Academic team. After leading the team all season long, Schippers was named the ITA Southeast Region Most Improved Senior.

Hyde has served on the ITA Southeast Region Committee for the past eight years and most recently served as Regional Chair for three years. Hyde was also selected to coach the USTA U18 Florida Section team, representing at the U18 National Team Championships. In July 2016, Hyde led Team Florida to a fourth-place finish in the prestigious event that regularly includes the top junior players in the United States.

Last season, Florida State battled through an injury-plagued

season to finish with a 14-13 record and a second-round finish in the ACC Tournament. Fifth-year senior Daneika Borthwick, one of the great players in school history, was named All-ACC for a fourth time, just the third Seminole to reach that feat of sustained excellence. Borthwick also was ranked as high as No. 31 in the country after a string of victories midseason against Top 50 competition. Borthwick also earned a trip to the NCAA Tournament singles draw for the first time in her career.

In the classroom, the Noles won the Golden Torch for highest team GPA on campus.

In 2015, the Seminoles posted a 16-11 record and reached the ACC Semifinals. During the year, the Noles defeated five ranked teams, including No. 36 Notre Dame and No. 15 Miami in the ACC Tournament in Cary, N.C. In reaching the semifinals, the Seminoles reached at least the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament for the ninth consecutive season. While the team was the first team left on the bubble for the NCAA Tournament, Hyde oversaw the continued development of Borthwick, who was named the ITA Southeast Region Most Improved Senior of the Year, and Gabriella Castaneda, who as a freshman led the Seminoles with 26 wins on the season.

The Seminoles posted a solid 16-13 season in 2013-14 with ranked wins over five opponents, including an exciting 4-3 upset victory over No. 27 Arizona in the first round of the 2014 NCAA Championships. FSU finished eighth in the ACC regular season and opened the ACC Tournament with a 4-1 win over No. 64 Syracuse.

FSU placed two players on the All-ACC team as Kerrie Cartwright earned second-team honors while Borthwick was named to the third team. The pair of Seminoles were an impressive doubles duo late in the season, winning nine straight matches from March 17 to May 9, with victories over No. 26 Yana Koroleva and



Beatrice Gumulya of Clemson and No. 11 Julia Elbaba and Rachel Pierson of Virginia. Cartwright and Borthwick qualified for the 2014 NCAA Doubles Championships and were the first Seminole pairing to compete in the postseason since 2007.

For the third time in school history and the second time while leading the Seminoles, Hyde led FSU into the 2013 ACC Championship match after defeating Wake Forest, Clemson and Virginia en route to the final against Miami. During that run, the Seminoles defeated the Tigers for the first time since 2001 in a match that saw over five hours of play. In addition, Borthwick earned All-ACC honors while helping the team to a 16-10 overall record.

At the start of the 2012-13 season, Hyde led five Seminoles to the Riviera/ITA-All-American Championships - the most to ever qualify for the Malibu event in FSU history.

The Seminoles concluded the 2011 season with an eight-match winning streak, landing the Seminoles back to the ACC title match for just the second time in program history. The first time occurred in 1994 when Hyde was an athlete on the team. During that span, FSU recorded the most successful weekend of play in program history by beating No. 3 Duke and No. 4 UNC in back-to-back matches to close out the regular season. Taking that momentum into the ACC Tournament, the Seminoles knocked off Wake Forest, No. 8 Virginia and No. 3 Duke for a second time as Hyde earned her 100th career victory in the process.

In addition, the Seminoles jumped to No. 11 in the ITA National Rankings, breaking the previous high mark of No. 12 set by the 2007-08 team.

Just one season earlier, Hyde led the Seminoles to perhaps the most successful season in Florida State history taking her team to its first-ever NCAA Round of 16. After being selected to host the first and second rounds of the NCAA Championship for just the second time in program history, both under Hyde, the Seminoles dominated North Florida and No. 17 South Carolina to punch their ticket to Athens, Ga., and to the highly coveted

Round of 16. Hyde also watched her first 'Nole earn ACC Freshman of the Year when Francesca Segarelli captured the honor in 2010.

The 2007-08 season welcomed several firsts for the program with Florida State hosting the first and second round of the NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles reached a No. 12 national ranking, the highest ranking in women tennis program history at the time. With the help of big wins against top-ranked programs during the 2008 season, the Seminoles finished the year with an overall record of 19-7, the winningest season since 1999, ranking second on the all-time list at Florida State. Also, Hyde coached freshman Katie Rybakova to a top 20 national ranking in which Rybakova also received a bid to participate in the NCAA Singles Championships as a freshman.

Hyde's players have made seven appearances at the NCAA Championships in singles as well as three doubles pairs. Rybakova is one of two players in FSU history to qualify for the NCAA Championships three out of her four years (2008, 2009, 2011) in singles.

Off the court, Hyde's student-athletes have continued their brilliance in the classroom by securing the Golden Torch Award nine times since her arrival, which is given to the Florida State athletic team with the highest GPA. In addition, numerous Seminoles have landed spots on the All-ACC Academic team, All-ACC Honor Roll and ITA Scholar-Athletes list in Hyde's 11 years as head coach.

Both Federica Suess and Rybakova earned ACC postgraduate scholarships. Suess was awarded the scholarship in 2009 during her senior year, while Rybakova earned the honor for her fifth year in 2011.

Hyde has gone on to coach six players that are currently playing professionally and three that are now college coaches.

In addition to building the tennis program, Hyde has spearheaded a unique partnership with FSU Women's Tennis and the FSU Student Veteran and military community with quarterly



clinics and hit arounds with the tennis team and the Student Veterans on campus. This relationship is unique from any across the nation, and this outreach culminates with a competition every February against one of our nations Service Academies. This collaboration is unique to FSU Tennis and college athletics across the nation.

Hyde and the FSU tennis team also adopted Tallahassee native, Grace Kerwin. In June of 2013, Grace was diagnosed with Juvenile Dermatomyositis (JDM), a rare autoimmune disease, resulting in muscle weakness. Grace joined the Florida State team through a program called Team Impact, which places young kids with sports teams in an effort to 'improve the quality of life for children facing life-threatening and chronic illnesses through the power of team'.

After graduating from FSU in 1995, Hyde began her coaching career as an assistant for the Seminoles prior to heading north to the University of Iowa in 1995. Hyde spent two years in the Midwest before returning to the south with an assistant coaching stint at the University of Alabama (1997-98).

Hyde moved on to coach at the University of North Carolina in 1998-99 where she established herself as one of the best young coaches in the sport. With her assistance, UNC enjoyed one of its best seasons in program history, moving from outside all the national polls to a top-25 ranking and the school's first NCAA tournament berth.

In 1999, Hyde accepted her first head coaching position at the University of Houston. Hyde spent five increasingly successful years with the Cougars before returning to Tallahassee, where she first started her collegiate tennis career.

The Alpharetta, Ga., native posted an impressive career with the Seminoles establishing herself as a four-year letterwinner, NCAA Tournament participant (1994) and ACC flight champion in doubles alongside teammate Jenny Graf. Hyde captained the 1994 Seminole squad whose No. 17 ranking previously stood for sixteen years as the highest year-end ranking until 2010's No. 14 finish. Hyde earned a Masters Degree from Florida State in sport management in 2011.

Rios helped lead the Cowgirls team to a 25-6 record in 2017, a year in which Oklahoma State reached the Big 12 Championship final as well as an Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Championship. Additionally, four Cowgirl players competed in the 2017 NCAA Individual Championships.

Rios was a standout during his time at Fresno Pacific, Oklahoma Christian and Embry-Riddle, earning ITA/NAIA All-America honors all four years, as well as the 2014 ITA/NAIA National doubles champion crown. He also led Fresno Pacific and Oklahoma Christian to NAIA National titles in 2011 and 2012, respectively, while leading Embry-Riddle to national runner-up performances in 2014 and 2015.

Rios reached as high as No. 1 in the ITA/NAIA national doubles rankings, while also earning a career-high No. 13 ranking in singles. He also paired up with Embry-Riddle teammate Deni Zmak to claim the USTA/ITA Super Bowl Doubles Championship in 2014.

Rios was named both NAIA Scholar Athlete and ITA Academic All-American in his career while maintaining a perfect 4.0 GPA as a student-athlete.

Prior to his time at the collegiate level, Rios spent nearly six years on the ATP and ITF pro circuits from 2004 to 2010.

After playing collegiately, Rios coached elite junior and professional players at Saviano High Performance Tennis in Plantation, Fla., including international standouts Eugenie Bouchard, Samantha Crawford and Amanda Anisimova.

A native of Albacete, Spain, Rios graduated from Embry-Riddle in 2015 with a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration, specializing in Accounting and Finance.

In her third season as volunteer assistant coach at Florida State, Pozzan helped guide the Seminoles back to the NCAA Championship for the first time in three seasons. Pozzan's ability to translate her strong playing background into coaching has been instrumental in the Seminoles' return to the national stage.

In 2012-13, Pozzan was a volunteer assistant coach at Houston. She helped lead the Cougars to a 21-6 record including trips to the NCAA Tournament and the Conference USA Championships.

After Houston, she spent a year as a teaching assistant at UH in the sociology department. During the summer she plays tennis in Italy in Serie B.

As a player at Houston, Pozzan led the Cougars both seasons in dual singles play. She finished her career with a record of 50-17, ranking third all-time in Houston school history with a 74.6 winning percentage. Pozzan also tallied a 48-21 overall doubles record in two seasons with the Cougars. She was named to the All C-USA

Second Team in 2012 and to the C-USA Commissioner's Honor Roll in 2011 and 2012. Before playing at Houston, Pozzan spent her first two years at Sam Houston State.

Pozzan graduated with a masters degree in sociology from the University of Houston. She is currently obtaining her Ph.D. in criminology at Florida State.

2017 SEASON IN REVIEW



The Florida State women's tennis entered the 2016-2017 season with a host of fresh faces and a number of young freshmen joining the fold. Though inexperienced, the Seminoles reached new heights as a team and individually en route to a ninth NCAA Championship appearance in 11 seasons and 10th overall under head coach Jennifer Hyde, capping the year with the team's first NCAA tournament victory in three years.

Senior Daniela Schippers led the Seminoles as one of two upperclassmen on the squad, and for her efforts was named the ITA Most Improved Senior in the Southeast Region following the season. On the year, Schippers racked up 11 singles victories while holding a staggering 18-3 record in doubles. Schippers' doubles performance allowed the Noles to win a program-record 20 doubles points in 2017, including six straight to end the season and advance in the NCAA Championship. The honor is the second in program history following Daneika Borthwick's award in 2015.

Schippers and junior Gabriella Castaneda combined to open the season 13-0 in doubles before finishing the season with an impressive 16-2 record as a pair. Despite missing a handful of matches due to injury, her performance and emotional leadership earned Castaneda third team All-ACC honors at the conclusion of the season. The award is the second for Castaneda after also claiming third team honors following her freshman season in 2015.

Road to NCAAs

After an up-and-down start that included a home victory over No. 26 NC State, the inexperienced Noles reeled off a midseason six-match winning streak to put themselves in position for a return to the NCAA Championship.

The streak began with a shutout victory at Louisville and included another impressive sweep against No. 28 Notre Dame, both broadcast nationally on ACC Network Extra. The Seminoles also took down Pittsburgh, Boston College, Syracuse, and Florida A&M during the winning stretch.

After splitting the final weekend of the regular season at Virginia and Virginia Tech, Florida State entered an ACC tournament rematch with the Cavaliers likely needing a win to ensure an NCAA invite the following week. The Noles went up 3-0 in the match, and freshman Andrea Garcia won 6-0, 3-6, 6-2 to clinch the match at 4-2 and seal NCAA tournament hopes for the Seminoles.

In the NCAA Championship, FSU entered the Auburn Regional as the three seed, facing No. 26 Arizona State in the opening round.

2017 SEASON IN REVIEW

The Seminoles defeated the No. 68-ranked doubles pair for the Sun Devils to take the doubles point, but fell down 2-1 in the match. Castaneda earned her first singles win in two months, downing the No. 50 player in the nation for her 50th-career singles win and help lead the Noles to the NCAA Second Round for the first time in three seasons.

In the second round matchup with host No. 11 Auburn, the Seminoles came up just short despite leading late in the match, but this season was one for the record books for such a young, promising team.

New Faces

In the fall season, freshmen Nandini Das and Andrea Garcia, who would start every match on the year, got their first taste of college tennis at the Furman Classic. The team played in an ITF tournament at Hilton Head, S.C. and in the prestigious Bedford Cup competition the following week, where Schippers and the pair of Das and sophomore Ariana Rahmanparast claimed consolation doubles titles in their respective flights.

In November, Florida State hosted the first-ever Seminole All-Conference Showdown, hosting schools from five major conferences from around the country. Schippers, Garcia, and Das claimed singles titles on the weekend to give the Noles three of four possible singles flight victories to wrap the fall season.

In the spring, two more freshmen entered the fold in French international Carla Touly and Gabrielle Goldin, a walk-on from Bradenton. Goldin saw action in six matches on the season, including a clinching victory over FAMU in her first career appearance in Garnet & Gold.

A fixture at the No. 2 spot and even playing at No. 1 at times throughout the year, Das figures to provide a strong one-two punch at the top of the lineup next season, while Garcia became a key player on court five, winning eight of nine matches to close out the regular season.

ITA Rankings

After an incredible showing in doubles, all three Seminole doubles teams appeared in the final ITA rankings - Garcia/Mikulski are ranked No. 65, Schippers/Castaneda come in at No. 81, and Das/Rahmaparast are tabbed at No. 82 in the nation. 2017 marks the first season in program history that all three doubles teams finish the season in the ITA poll.

As a team, the year-end ranking of 30 in the country is the highest final ranking since the 2013 season, when the Seminoles ended the season at No. 21 nationally.

Against North Carolina, sophomore Julia Mikulski took down the No. 4 player in the nation in three sets. The win catapulted the Essen, Germany native into the ITA singles rankings, where she stayed for the rest of the regular season and into the ACC tournament, topping out at No. 103 in the country.

Coming Out Strong

The Seminoles return all but one player from this year's NCAA tournament team and with the addition of another strong recruiting class, Coach Hyde has the Florida State program primed for future NCAA Championship success.

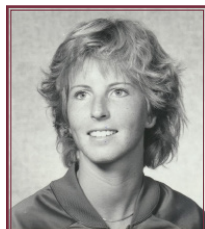
