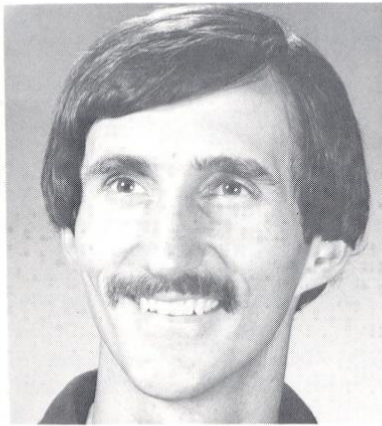

## Gary Winckler

Head Track and Field Coach

Since Gary Winckler joined the Florida State staff in the fall of 1980, the Seminole program has been in the national spotlight. After a year as an assistant coach where Florida State finished third in the country, Winckler led the Seminoles to third and second place finishes, respectively. Before Winckler arrived in Tallahassee, no track and field team from FSU had finished in the nation's top 50 teams.

Winckler was assistant women's track and field coach at Oregon State prior to joining in the Seminole staff. Over three seasons, he helped build the program from 10 athletes to a roster of 45 when he left. During that period, the track and field team climbed from the bottom of its 37-school region to a second place finish in 1980.

Winckler has other coaching experience at Lynnwood (Wash.) High School and Seattle Pacific University. He also attended the latter as an undergraduate student and competed in the high jump in the 1974 NCAA finals. While he was at Pacific, the program was consistently ranked among the nation's top five teams. Winckler held the school's high jump record (6-10).

Also an accomplished writer, he has had several articles published, including *Perspective on the Back-Layout High Jump* which appeared in the 1980 May/June issue of *Scholastic Coach Magazine*.

Winckler received his master's degree in mathematics from Oregon State in 1980.

In the summer of 1981, Winckler was co-director of the U.S. Southeastern Olympic Development Track and Field camp hosted by Florida State. He is the Southeast region hurdles coordinator for the Olympic Development program.

The 31-year old coach also finds time for his position as Associate Director of the TAC National Coaching Certification program.

## Al Schmidt

Assistant Track & Field Coach  
Cross Country Coach

Returning to the Florida State staff for his second season as cross country coach and assistant track and field coach is Al Schmidt. Schmidt had come to the Seminole program in August of 1982 from the University of Kansas.

Since his arrival, good things have happened to Florida State. First, the track and field team finished second in the nation last spring. Secondly,

Florida State signed three freshmen distance runners with outstanding credentials to complement its fine sprinting corps.

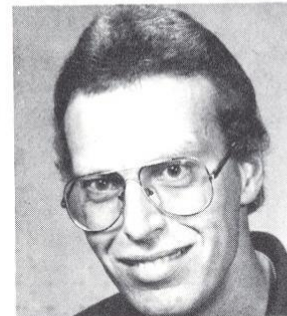
During his one-year stay at Kansas where he served as assistant men's track and field coach, Schmidt coached the distance runners in both cross country and track. The Jayhawks were indoor and outdoor Big Eight Champs that year.

Prior to his tenure at KU, Schmidt was the head coach of the men's track and field program at St. Louis University for five seasons. His cross country team was Metro Conference champion in 1977 and earned the runner-up position to Florida State in 1978 while St. Louis was still a member of the conference.

Before receiving his bachelor's degree from St. Louis in 1973, Schmidt had attended the University of Missouri for two years where he ran on the Tiger cross country track teams. After transferring back to his native St. Louis, he served as an assistant track coach at the University of Missouri-St. Louis his senior year.

Schmidt represented the United States on a Brazilian tour in 1979 where he helped conduct coaching clinics for the State Department.

In addition to his coaching duties in the cross country and distance areas, Schmidt serves as FSU's recruiting coordinator.



## Malcolm Coomber

Assistant Coach

Malcolm Coomber is entering his third season on the Florida State track and field and cross country staff.

He coaches the throwing events, the multi-events and some of the FSU relays in the track and field program.

When Coomber joined the staff two years ago, he brought with him 10 years of coaching experience. The England native has coached international teams and Olympians of many nationalities. He has served on the British Amateur Athletic Board (B.A.A.B.) and has coached the sprinting events for the British and English national teams.

Coomber has lectured throughout Britain and Europe on the physical development of the young athlete and his work has been published by many leading track and field journals. As a B.A.A.B. senior coach, he has lectured at all levels of British coaching certification.

Coomber, whose wife Margaret has been a three-time national qualifier in the 1,500 at FSU, holds a teaching diploma and advanced certificate in Physical Education from the University of London. He taught physical education in Britain high schools for 12 years.

He is presently pursuing a master's degree in motor behavior at Florida State.



## 1984 Outlook: Reaching For The Top

Is there any question but that Florida State's 1984 track and field team will be trying to win its first national championship? After finishing third in the country in 1981 and 82 and second a year ago, it seems that the Tribe has as good a chance as any team.

"I don't know a lot about the other teams," said head coach Gary Winckler, "but we had a good recruiting year. Also, it seems that we lost less talent than any of the other teams."

By the "other" teams, Winckler is generally referring to the UCLAs, the Nebraskas, the Tennessees and the Oregons. Perhaps he is most concerned about the latter team, Oregon, who will host the 1984 NCAA Championship meet. "Oregon will be tough," he says. "On their own track they will really be tough."

It is much a characteristic of the 31-year-old Winckler to worry about his own team first though. "We're not putting emphasis on the indoor season," he says. "Then again, we'll evaluate as we go. We really want to make training the emphasis during the early part of the year. It's an important year and we'll have to be careful."

Florida State's bread and butter, its sprinting corps, was responsible for most of its points at the NCAA meet in Houston last June. Guess what? It's even stronger this year. That sprinting team, holder of both NCAA meet and collegiate records in both relays, could break both records this season, according to its coach.

In the 100 meters, the Seminoles return the dynamic veteran duo of Randy Givens and Brenda Cliette, both who scored at the '83 NCAA meet. Givens, a three time scorer and now a senior, was sixth a year ago. Sophomore Cliette was a surprise third place finisher in Houston last June.

There is more. Senior Marita Payne, who along with Givens must be considered one of the greatest athletes in FSU history, usually won't run this event in a national championship because her great versatility makes her more valuable in other areas. But with a PR of 11.43, she's of national caliber. Two freshmen, Janet Davis and Michelle Finn, are described by Winckler as being "dead even" in practice performances so far. Davis set the junior national meet record last year (11.52) while Finn won the Florida state high school championship and the Junior Olympics title.

The 200 meters could also see the same five runners qualify without any problem. This event is where Florida State picked up most of its points at last year's championship with Givens finishing third, Cliette fourth and Payne sixth.

The 200 is Givens' best event. She was fourth at the TAC meet last June and then came back to win the gold medal at the World University and Pan American Games. Payne was also impressive in summer meets, running a 22.62 PR in the World University Games to finish second. Again, Cliette, Davis and Finn will all add the depth that has been synonymous with the FSU sprinters over the past four years.

Payne's main event is the 400 meters. After winning the event in 1982, she finished fifth in 1983. Her summer proved, however, that she isn't losing ground



in the event. At the World Championships in Helsinki, Payne turned in the top time ever by a Western Hemisphere runner with a fifth place finish in 50.06.

While Givens and Cliette may run an occasional open 400, FSU's depth here will come from freshmen Janet Levy and Samantha Green as well as sophomore Jenny White.

The 400 and 1,600 meter relays will be chosen from the athletes listed above plus 400 meter hurdler Ovrill Dwyer-Brown. The only non-returner from last year's record setting relays is Angela Wright; with Givens, Payne and Cliette all back.

Davis and Finn are the main candidates to replace Wright on the 400 entry while Dwyer-Brown, Davis, Levy and Green will have the best shots at the 1,600 position. "I don't know that we'll ever have the same four runners on either relay," says Winckler. "That will give us flexibility. We have the potential, under the right conditions, to run faster than we did a year ago on both relays."

The Seminoles were without an entry in the 100 meter hurdles in 1983; not so, however, in 1984. Potential NCAA qualifiers as freshmen include Ohio state champ Mary Hawkins and New York native Joann Brown. Other candidates include walk-on Anita Byrd and heptathlete Jewel Dorman.

Dwyer-Brown, who found success at the 400 hurdles in her first year in the event, should be an NCAA qualifier once again and being looked at more seriously as a scorer this year. Complementing her will be Chris McKay, an '82 and '83 qualifier.

The middle distance events will show much more depth than in the past. Winckler is counting on her to lead all possible also mentions walk-on peting strongly. Others in the 800, although not Margaret Coomber or Carla Borovicka and

Winckler described situation". He's most ex-became eligible in Jan-time qualifier, and Borof-fer Jeanie Messinese and freshman Julie Leonard, are distance runners whose range begins at 1,500. Messinese will probably specialize in the 1,500 and 3,000 while Leonard, freshmen Barbara Matthews, Coomber and Borovicka could all see action in the 3,000.

The 5,000 and 10,000 have a host of competitors. They include Matthews and Leonard as well as sisters Karen and Sharon Parrish and freshman Susan Pockell.

In the jumping events, Florida State has some strengths and weaknesses. The high jump returns three-time NCAA scorer Wendy Markham. The junior finished in second place a year ago in Houston as well as taking fourth place at the TAC meet, jumping over 6-0 each time. Newcomer Dorman has gone 5-10 and back after sickness a year ago is sophomore Cathy Hill. Walk-on Marie Roberts has jumped over 5-6.

The long jump is a bit of a question mark with the graduation of three-time NCAA qualifier Alice Bennett. Dorman may also be called to action here while sprinter Finn may also give it a try. Don't count out the marvelously talented Cliette, although in this, an Olympic year, it probably wouldn't be a good injury risk.

1984 should be Florida State's brightest year ever in the throws. Newcomer Donna Williams has the most outstanding credentials to support this hope. The Florida state champ in the shot put and discus, Williams was ranked in the nation's top three prep putters in the nation by Track and Field News. Returning from last year's squad to add depth will be Carolyn Darville while walk-on Lisa Hicks and Alabama state runnerup Julie Moss will also compete.





The Seminoles will have a similar situation in the discus where Williams will be out front with Darville, Hicks and Moss adding depth. But giving Williams the most competition will be junior school record holder Rena Antanelis.

Antanelis, with the second longest throw in school history, will command the number one position in the javelin. New Jersey native Julieta Stack is a walk-on who will be beginning her javelin career and could surprise.

For the first time in Winckler's reign at Florida State, the heptathlon will have a competitor. Frosh Jewel Dorman will be entered in the seven-event competition.

Florida State's 1984 schedule is a heavyweight proposition. Outstanding meets with national competition include the Lady Gator Classic, the Sun Angel Classic, the Penn Relays, the Cavalier Classic, the Pepsi-UCLA Invitational, all leading up to the NCAA Championships. Florida State should have two outstanding meets at Mike Long Track also; the Tallahassee Tuneup on March 14 and the Florida State Invitational April 21.

"I'd have to say that we'll again be one of the top five battling for the NCAA Championship," says Winckler, who will be back for his third year as head coach at FSU. "It will be tough to top our performance of last year. We'll have to deal with the weather in Oregon."

But if talent can overcome those types of factors, it could be the Year of the Seminole in Eugene.

**Marita Payne — Senior, Concord, Ontario, PRs — 100 (11.43), 200 (22.62), 400 (50.06)** — the fastest runner ever in the Western Hemisphere in the 400 meters . . . achieved that mark (50.06) at the World Track and Field Championships in Helsinki last August in finishing fifth . . . has won four national championships as part of relay teams at Florida State and has one individual NCAA championship . . . in 1983 NCAA meet, was fifth in the 400 after winning it in 1982 . . . however, she re-established the collegiate record with her Helsinki time . . . also scored for FSU in the 200 meters at the '83 NCAA meet with a sixth place finish as well as running on national title 400 and 1,600 meter relays that also hold collegiate records . . . besides World Championships, ran well in other summer meets, including TAC Summer Games where she was first in the 400 and the World University Games where she was second in the 200 meters as well as anchoring Canada's 400 and 1,600 meter relay teams to silver medals . . . final 1983 world rankings had her sixth in the 400 meters and she is ninth on the all-time world list . . . at FSU has scored more points in national outdoor meets than anyone in history . . . holds four individual FSU school records and co-holds 12 more as member of relay teams . . . owns the top 10 times ever run at the school in the 400 meters as well as top ten times as a member of the 400 and 1,600 meter relay teams . . . in 1981 ran on 400 and 800 meter national championship relays as a freshman . . . 1981 American World Cup team . . . 1982 Canadian National team member and Commonwealth Games team member . . . easily a 1984 Canadian Olympian . . . boyfriend is former FSU basketball star Mitchell Wiggins, now a rookie starter for the Chicago Bulls . . .

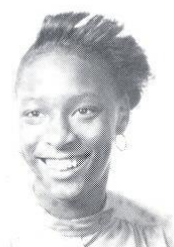

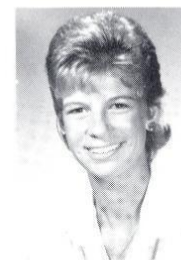

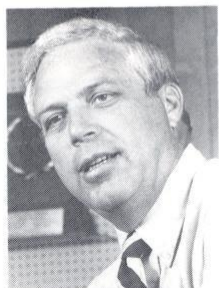

## C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to his friends and associates as "Hootie", is in his third year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in January of 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities. A new athletic administration building that houses all administration, coaches and ticket personnel opened this fall. Fully equipped with locker rooms, weight rooms and a cafeteria, the complex also serves as a home for the Seminole football team.

The brand new Seminole Baseball Stadium, second to none in the South, was completed in April while further improvements to Doak Campbell Stadium and Mike Long Track have also recently been completed. Renovations to the pool area are still in progress.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. The '53 Alabama team played in the Orange Bowl and the '54 squad in the Cotton Bowl. Ingram also lettered for the Tide as an infielder.

He later moved into college coaching and had assistant coaching assignments at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas. His only college football head coaching job began in 1970 at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.



## Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with the Florida State athletic program since 1977. As associate athletic director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program.

Since her arrival on campus, the FSU women's program has grown to the point where it is now considered among the top programs in the country.

All eight women's sports have turned in winning records over the past three years. There have been three national championships won, including back-to-back titles by the softball team in 1981 and 1982. In 1982 Florida State sent every team to a national tournament, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the nation.

Simply put, Barbara Palmer has been the energy behind that climb toward national excellence. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

So great has been Palmer's impact on the growth of women's athletics in the state of Florida that she was chosen to the inaugural Women's Florida Hall of Fame by Governor Bob Graham. She was one of just six women elected from a field of 226 candidates.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

## This is Florida State



Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,500 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks. From the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of the campus to the contemporary science complex on the west, FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW — Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also, the FAMU/FSU Institute of Engineering began last fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

In terms of scientific research, FSU excels as a basic research-oriented university. The nuclear physics laboratory is ranked by the National Science Foundation as one of the top four in the nation. FSU also maintains a large marine laboratory on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Florida State counts among its faculty six members of the National Academy of Sciences, including Paul Dirac, a Nobel Prize winner in physics. Kurt Waldheim, former secretary general of the United Nations, recently joined the university faculty as a distinguished visiting lecturer in international relations and law.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

But it's not just good programs that make the University great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it is the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. He takes special pride in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who are Florida State University.
