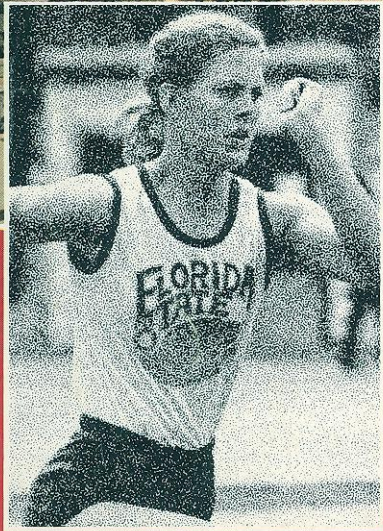
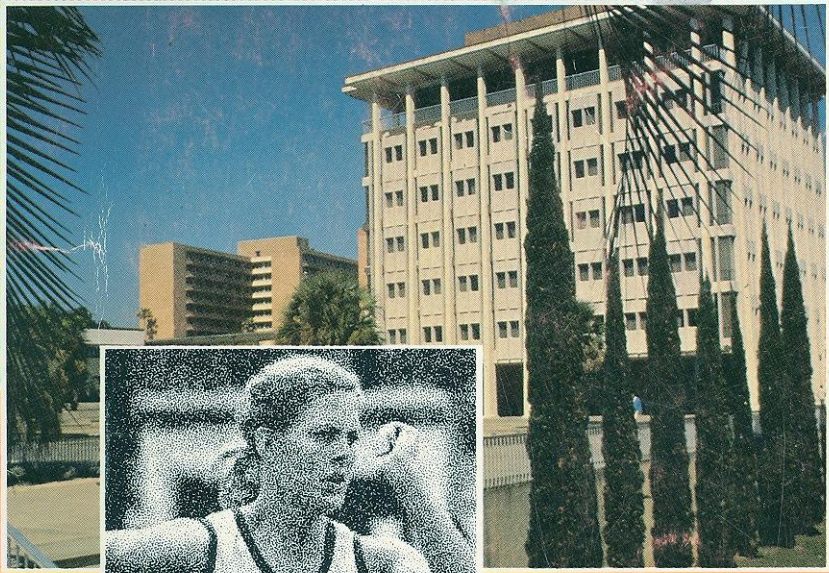
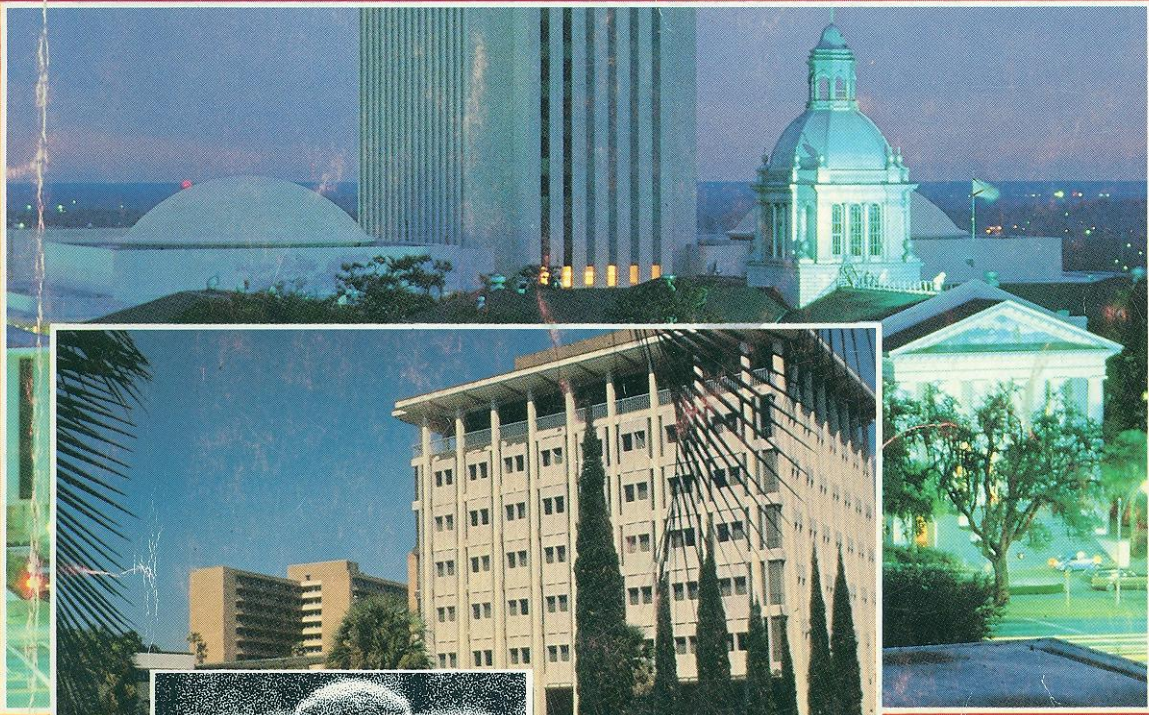

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

Interviews

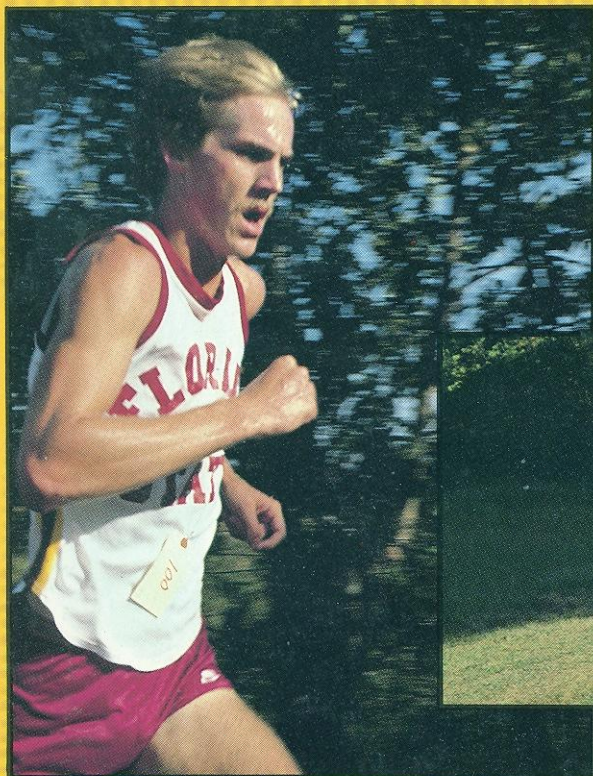

1985 OUTLOOK



Garcia, a seven-time All-American in 1981, has returned to FSU with outstanding credentials in the sprints.

Life after Randy Givens and Marita Payne has begun. For the FSU track and field program, a rebuilding plan is in the works.

The main dilemma facing fourth-year head coach Gary Winckler is how to replace those two, and four other athletes who as a group won 62 All-American awards. Givens and Payne accounted for 39 of those awards, including four individual and six relay national championships. Brenda Cliette, who ran on four national champion relays, accounts for another nine of the All-American titles.

"We certainly lost some good people," says Winckler, who doesn't bat an eye at such pressure. "We won't be able to reload in one year. Still, we have some very good people."

One surprise for Winckler is the return of Esmeralda Garcia, a seven-time All-American as a freshman in 1981 who returned to her native Brazil soon after that year. She is back to shore up the sprinting area where FSU lost so many national points.

Also back are sophomores Michelle Finn and Janet Davis, both who scored at the NCAA Championships in individual events as well as relays.

The freshman class will also be counted on to fill some of the voids in the lineup, especially in the field events.

THE SPRINTS - In the sprints, where Florida State was traditionally strong, depth will not be as strong as in the past. Givens, who won the NCAA 100 and 200 titles, and Payne, who won the 400, graduated while Cliette is sitting out the year.

Back to lead the way will be Finn, a fourth place NCAA finisher in the 100 and ninth in the 200. She also ran on the national championship 400 meter relay and returns as the lone performer in that event.

Fellow sophomore Janet Davis was sixth in the 200 meters and although she didn't make the finals in her specialty, the 400, she did run on the national championship mile relay.

A boost will be added by Garcia, who was fifth in the AIAW National Championships in 1981 in the 100 meters as well as running the leadoff leg on the winning 400 meter relay. Since then, she's won the 1983 Pan American Games 100 meter title as well as making it through the second round of the Olympics.

"Those three will be solid for us in the sprints and will form a pretty decent 400 meter relay," says Winckler of Finn, Davis and Garcia. A possibility to take up the fourth slot would be sophomore Janet Levy, who may switch over after a year of running the 400, or freshman 100 meter hurdler Andrea Thompson.

Davis, of course, will be the leader in the 400 with freshman Pam Hawkins of Gainesville (Fla.) High School a promising newcomer. Hawkins has battled an injured foot since running in the Junior Olympics but has ability. Also new to the FSU campus is Carol Samuels who arrived in January from Canada. She also has untapped potential.

The 1,600 meter relay will be weaker in depth than in the past. Davis, Levy and Hawkins are the forerunners for positions while Levy, Samuels and Finn could also run here. "It's a bit of a question mark," admits Winckler, who was NCAA Coach of the Year in 1984.

THE HURDLES - The 100 meter hurdles have the freshman Thompson, a teammate of Finn's and Levy's two years ago at Oak Ridge High School in Orlando and the state's hurdle champion as a junior. Illness prevented her from competing as a senior. Big things are also expected from Joann Brown, a surprise in 1984 as a walkon. She finished ninth at the NCAA meet last June and picked up a scholarship along the way. Also running the event are sophomores Mary Hawkins and Anita Byrd.

In the 400 hurdles, NCAA qualifier Chris McKay returns for her senior season and in addition may run the 800. Thompson could move into the 400 hurdles eventually but that isn't likely this season.

MIDDLE DISTANCE - The 800 meters is as strong as it's ever been at FSU. Sophomore Samantha Green has improved and may be ready to meet NCAA qualifying standards. Junior Kelley Hackler has continued to come on and picked up 12th place points at the NCAA meet last season. As mentioned, McKay may try this event as may senior Nancy Rettie, who primarily is a 1,500 meter competitor.

The freshman candidate for the 800 is Brenda Moore, the state mile champ in Texas as a high schooler last spring. She will also make her presence known in the 1,500.

DISTANCE - The 3,000 to 10,000 distances will be handled by a group of cross country runners that includes Barbara Matthews, Sue Pockell, Karen and Sharon Parrish and newcomers Janie Regis and Anita Cicanese.

Matthews leads this group and continues to improve at a fast pace. In a 20 kilometer race last fall, she beat former FSU All-American Margaret Coomber.

Regis, who will run the 3,000 and 5,000, is the most exciting newcomer. She was the NJCAA champion in the 3,000 and 5,000 last year.

Florida State's main area of improvement is the field events, especially the horizontal jumps and the javelin.

THE JUMPS - The high jump remains stable with senior Wendy Markham at the controls. After finishing in a tie for fifth place at the NCAA Championships as a freshman and second as a sophomore, Markham was 10th in '84. She's fought a bout of mononucleosis recently and is looking to restore her strength.

The long jump and triple jump, virtually areas of non-existence last year, will probably be the most improved events.

The return of Garcia, who finished second in the nation in the long jump in 1981 and holds the school record at 21-6½, is the main reason for the optimism. Winckler also describes her as "one of the best women triple jumpers I'd ever seen when she left in 1981." At that time, the triple jump was not an event for women in competition.

If she can take on the extra event, she could score points there too. Also participating in the triple jump will be school record holder Marie Roberts and freshman Jametta Jackson. Jackson also plays volleyball and has outstanding potential as a triple jumper.

THE THROWS - Also improved are the throwing events. Cheryl Coker, the national junior javelin record holder from Canada, is one of the main reasons. Coker has thrown 170 feet, some 15 feet further than the existing FSU school record. Coker was 3rd in the '84 Pan American Junior Championships.

A healthy Rena Antanelis returns in the javelin, too. A good season for the junior would give FSU an excellent one-two punch in the event. Antanelis is also the team's most accomplished discus thrower.

Two freshmen will handle the shot - Beth Sherman, a walkon from Michigan, and Venecia Williams, from Oak Ridge High School. The two will also work in the discus with Antanelis.

"We think the sprints, jumps and hurdles could all be strong events for us," says Winckler, "but the javelin could be our best event.

"We're young this year but we will still have NCAA qualifiers. I'm looking at Michelle Finn, Janet Davis, Janet Levy, Esmeralda Garcia and Pamela Hawkins to have good seasons in the sprints."

Florida State's schedule is somewhat similar to last year's. One change is a switch from the Penn Relays to the Texas Relays in Austin the site of the 1985 national championship.

The same people who were telling Gary Winckler last year that he couldn't win the national championship with his heavy lineup of sprinters better not count out this Florida State team yet!



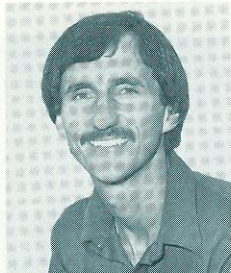
Although Markham finished 10th at the NCAA meet, she's counted on to reach the potential that had her second in 1983.

COACHING STAFF



Gary Winckler
Head Track Coach

In just three years as head coach of the Florida State women's track and field program, Gary Winckler has already led his team to a national championship as well as second and third place finishes in the country.

The national championship came last year, in 1984, and earned Winckler NCAA Coach of the Year honors as voted on by his peers. With a senior dominated squad, the Oregon native led his team to a 21-point victory over second place Tennessee.

But really, track and field experts had predicted the success of Winckler's 1984 team by looking at the finishes of his 1983 second-place squad and his 1982 third-place team. During his three years as head coach, FSU athletes have received 80 All-American awards and won five individual and four relay national championships.

Winckler came to Florida State in the fall of 1980 as assistant track and field coach under the late Roger Smith. In a few short months, Smith and Winckler put together a team that took third place in the nation when no previous FSU women's track and field team had finished among the nation's top 50 teams.

Winckler first took the reins of the Seminole program in 1982 on an interim basis when Smith took a leave of absence with health problems. Winckler was named to the head coaching position soon after the 1982 season.

Prior to joining the Seminole staff, Winckler was assistant women's track and field coach at Oregon State. Over three seasons, he helped the program move from the bottom of its 37-school region to a second place ALAW region finish in 1980.

Winckler's other coaching experience came at Lynnwood (Wash.) High School and Seattle Pacific University. He also attended Seattle Pacific as an undergraduate student and competed in the high jump, reaching the NCAA finals in 1974. At Pacific, teams he competed on were consistently ranked among the nation's top five while he held the school's high jump record at 6-10.

Also an accomplished writer, Winckler had several of his articles published in 1980, including "Perspective on the Back-Layout High Jump" which appeared in *Scholastic Coach Magazine*.

Winckler, in addition to holding a bachelor's degree from Seattle Pacific, owns a 1980 master's degree in mathematics from Oregon State.

In the summer of 1981, Winckler was co-director of the U.S. Southeastern Olympic Development Track and Field camp hosted by Florida State. He also serves as the Southeast region hurdles coordinator for the Olympic development program and the Associate Director of the T.A.C. National Coaching Certificate program.

Several of Winckler's Florida State athletes went on to participate in the 1984 Olympics, including 1983 graduate Angela Wright-Scott and 1984 graduates Randy Givens, Marita Payne and Ovrill Dwyer-Brown. Brenda Cliette, another former FSU athlete, was also on the Olympic team. Winckler continues to coach Givens, Cliette, Payne and Wright-Scott.

In two seasons as head coach Gary Winckler's right hand man, Schmidt has helped the Florida State program to a national championship in 1984 and a runnerup position in 1983.

Schmidt, who arrived in August of 1982 from the University of Kansas, concentrates his coaching on the distance events as well as serving as FSU's recruiting coordinator. In the fall, Schmidt coaches the cross country team.

In his one-year stay at Kansas where he was a men's assistant track and field coach, Schmidt coached both the cross country and distance runners. The Jayhawks were indoor and outdoor Big Eight champions that year.

Prior to his tenure at KU, Schmidt was the head coach of the men's track and field program at St. Louis University for five seasons. His cross country team was the Metro Conference champion in 1977 and earned the runner-up position to Florida State in 1978 when St. Louis was still a member of the Conference.

Before receiving a bachelor's degree from St. Louis in 1973, Schmidt had attended the University of Missouri for two years where he ran on the cross country and track teams. After transferring back to his native St. Louis, he served as an assistant track coach at the University of Missouri-St. Louis his senior year.

Schmidt represented the United States on a Brazilian tour in 1979 where he helped conduct clinics for the State Department. Recently, he conducted clinics for the Florida High School Coaches Association in Orlando.

Schmidt is married to the former Jessie Garfield.

In four seasons as one of Gary Winckler's right hand men, Malcolm Coomber has helped the Lady Seminole program to a national championship in 1984 as well as a second place finish in 1983 and third in '82.

Coomber has been on the Florida State staff since former head coach Roger Smith brought him in as a graduate assistant in 1981. As an assistant coach, his areas of specialty include the throwing events, the multi-events, horizontal jumps, endurance events and relays.

When Coomber joined the staff four years ago, he brought along 10 years of coaching experience with him. The England native's calling card as a coach included international and Olympic experience with athletes of many nationalities.

Coomber has served on the British Amateur Athletic Board (B.A.A.B.) and has coached the sprinting events for the British and English national teams. He completed a master's degree in motor behavior at Florida State last year.

His wife, Margaret, graduated in 1984 and was a five-time All-American at Florida State while running the 800, 1,500 and 3,000 meters.

Event-By-Event

100 Meter Dash - Florida State occupied lanes 4-5-6 with Michelle Finn, Brenda Cliette and Randy Givens. Cliette led for much of the race but Givens got in gear at about the 40 meter mark and shot ahead at the 80 meter mark to win going away. Cliette finished second, holding off Houston's Jackie Washington. Finn finished fourth to clearly prove her the outstanding freshman sprinter of '84.

200 Meter Dash - This event was run close to the end of the meet. Florida State went into the event behind Tennessee in the team scoring and came out way ahead. The Lady Seminoles copped 48 points on a 1-2-3-6-9 finish by Givens, Cliette, Payne, Finn and Janet Davis. Givens' time was a 1984 collegiate season leading 22.87. It was one of four titles that Givens would win as a senior.

400 Meter Dash - Payne had won the 400 meters as a sophomore but as a junior she had fallen to fifth place in the NCAA meet. Her goal was clearly to win this race. In almost a carbon copy of her 1982 win, Payne came from behind off the curve to beat fellow Canadian Charmine Crooks at the tape.

800 Meter Run - Sophomore Kelley Hackler didn't qualify for the finals, but her third place heat time was good enough to pick up 12th place under the scoring system.

1,500 Meter Run - Both Nancy Rettie and Carla Borovicka qualified for the finals. Rettie finished 12th and Borovicka 14th and Rettie's finish picked up a point for the Seminoles.

3,000 Meter Run - Margaret Coomber finished 13th, just one place out from scoring points.

100 Meter Hurdles - Florida State wasn't suppose to score any points in this event but the nation hadn't counted on unheralded freshman walkon JoAnn Brown to run the best race of her career in the semi-finals. Although it wasn't quite good enough for the finals, it did get her a ninth place finish and some unexpected points.

400 Meter Hurdles - Ovrill-Dwyer Brown didn't run anywhere near her best time but she did finish in sixth place, scoring a bunch of points for the team total.

400 Meter Relay - The Seminoles had won this won in 1983 and were looking to repeat '84. Although the foursome of Finn, Payne, Cliette and Givens didn't better FSU's collegiate record, they had little problems with second place Tennessee. The race closed down the FSU scoring and the great careers of Payne and Givens.

1,600 Meter Relay - Like the 400 relay, FSU won this won in 1983 and successfully defended the national championship. After a leadoff leg by Davis, Cliette turned in a blistering second leg to give FSU an easy lead. Givens and Payne ran fast legs to secure an easy victory over Tennessee, who was four seconds slower than the FSU foursome.

High Jump - It would be a disappointing meet for junior Wendy Markham, after finishing second in 1983. But she did pick up a couple of points on a 10th place finish.

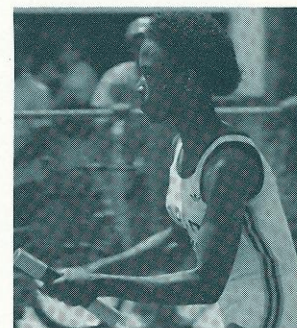

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram
Athletic Director



Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.

Bob Goin
Associate Athletic Director



A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin recieved his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.

Charles W. Ehrhardt
Faculty Athletic
Committee Chairman



A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

Barbara Palmer
Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic recieves each year.

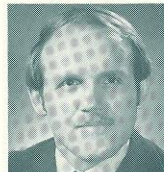
