

Head Coach Cecile Reynaud

Cecile Reynaud's talents as a volleyball coach were nationally recognized this summer when she was selected as an assistant coach of the United States team at the World University Games.

But those close to the southern collegiate volleyball scene have long known Reynaud to be one of the top coaches in this section of the country.

The evidence is undeniable. Playing a top notch schedule, Reynaud's seven season coaching record at FSU stands at an incredible 230 wins with only 99 losses.

In that time, her team qualified for regional play five times, went to nationals three times, won five state championships and finished fourth at the 1981 AIAW National Championship.

Reynaud's success as a coach was expected. From the time she took over the Seminole volleyball program as a graduate assistant-head coach in 1976, the FSU program has always been associated with winning.

The 1981 Florida Coach of the Year came to FSU following a standout athletic career at Southwest Missouri State University. At SMSU, Reynaud lettered four times and led the Bears to the AIAW National Tournament every year. One of those squads finished sixth in the nation. In addition to her volleyball career, Reynaud lettered twice in field hockey and was named recipient of the prestigious "Outstanding Athlete of America" award and this May she was inducted into the SMSU Women's Athletic Hall of Fame.

Following graduation with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1975, Reynaud taught physical education and coached four sports at Steelville High School in Missouri.

One year later she was named head volleyball coach at Florida State as a graduate assistant and became FSU's first full-time coach in 1978. She received her master's degree in 1979.

A popular speaker at many volleyball clinics, Reynaud has served on the staff of several camps. She holds the Florida State University Volleyball Camp yearly, with last season's camp drawing over 300 participants from the southeast region.

A holder of a USVBA Level 1 coaching certificate, Reynaud was selected as technical consultant for two volleyball instructional films made by the Athletic Institute. She also serves on the NCAA South Regional Volleyball Committee and is currently helping to edit a book on Power Volleyball.



Assistant Coach Joanie French

Joanie French is in her second season with the volleyball program at FSU. As assistant coach, French is in charge of the overall conditioning program for the players. In addition, French serves as a technique specialist and also handles various administrative duties.

Appointed assistant coach in August of 1982, French brought a wealth of athletic and teaching experience to FSU. French also attended Southwest Missouri State University and was a teammate of Reynaud's in 1974.

While at SMSU, French lettered in volleyball four times and led the Bears to four straight regional championships. On two occasions, SMSU finished seventh in the country. She also participated in basketball, softball and track.

Following graduation in 1978, French earned a position on the US Olympic volleyball team and trained at the US Olympic Center in Colorado for one year.

In 1980, French joined the Dallas Diamonds of the Women's Professional Basketball League. Her teaching and coaching credentials include one year at Central High School in Missouri and one year at the American School of London.

Joan was selected the Outstanding Young Woman of Missouri in 1981.



Administrative Assistant Barbara Burke

Barbara Burke is the newest member of the Florida State volleyball staff, joining the Seminole athletic staff just prior to the start of the 1983 season.

As administrative assistant, Burke is in charge of handling the day-to-day office duties associated with an intercollegiate athletic program.

Team travel arrangements, correspondence with potential recruits, equipment orders and player files are just several of the many duties Burke performs.

The St. Petersburg native came to Florida State after receiving a bachelor's degree in psychology and music from Vanderbilt University in 1978.

Burke completed a master's degree in communication science at FSU in 1979 and received a doctorate from FSU in the same field in 1981.

1983 Outlook: Lady Seminoles Hope to Rebound

With five starters returning from a 43-8 team in 1981, Florida State was looking for another banner year last season. Instead, the Lady Seminoles were treated to a barrage of injuries that resulted in a disappointing 27-17 season.

"After finishing fourth in the AIAW nationals the season before, we thought we were going to do even better last season," FSU Head Coach Cecile Reynaud said. "Instead we had a rash of injuries and lost Julie Brown for the entire year. The end result was that we lost a lot of close matches that we had won the year before."

Going into the current season, Reynaud is optimistic about her team's chances of returning to 1981 form, despite a different complexion of the squad. "Last year we had a lot of veterans and thought we were set," Reynaud added. "This time around we have some veterans but we also have a lot of newcomers who will have to be able to come in here and help us immediately."

As with most successful teams, a solid group of veterans are usually present. FSU will have a strong nucleus of veterans for the 1983 campaign. Leading the way will be seniors Sally Summer and Julie Brown. A three-year letter winner, Summer started all 44 matches last season. Brown, one of the leading power players in the region in 1981, returns for her fifth season after receiving a medical redshirt last year for back problems.

"Julie makes us a better team," Reynaud said. "She's not 100 percent recovered yet but we hope she will be ready to go by the opening of the season."

Carol Forsten and Karyn Palgut, a pair of juniors, have both been starters for the past two seasons and give FSU strength at the outside attack positions. Marie Sanders, a senior, has been a two-year starter at the setter position and appears to have locked up the starting position for the third time.

Seniors Mary Williams and Shannon Lages, junior Jackie Young and sophomores Donna Krai and Shelly Birkholz are all experienced players who will challenge for starting positions.

Newcomer Stacy MoneyMaker, FSU's tallest player ever at 6-3 and a member of the Lady Seminole basketball team, will be counted on to help strengthen the middle position--left open by the departure of senior kill leader Alicia Cross.

JC transfer Lisa Smith and incoming freshmen Joan Morris and Colette Housh will provide quality depth on the outside attack positions. In addition, Housh may compete with Sanders for playing time at the setter position.

As has been the case in the past, FSU will face a tough schedule with increased emphasis on Metro Conference play. The Seminoles open play by defending their championship in the LSU Invitational before playing in several other prestigious tournaments--including the Pitt Classic (Sept. 16-17), Texas Invitational (Oct. 28-29) and the North Carolina Invitational (Nov. 11-12). FSU will host its own invitational on Oct. 7-8.

The winner of the Metro Tournament (Nov. 18-20) earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. "We will play fewer matches this season due to an increase in the required dual meet matches within our conference and because of new formats used in many tournaments (best three of five game matches instead of two of three in preliminary matches)," Reynaud said. "Although we have a lot of question marks going into the season, I think we will have an exciting team and I'm looking forward to the challenge."



Playing in her fifth season, after receiving medical redshirt last year with a back injury...had outstanding junior season in 1981 with a team leading 131 block assists and 318 kills...holds schools record for block assists in one match (10) and most solo blocks in one match (5)...earned all-state and all-region honors in 1981...selected all-county in both basketball and vol-

leyball at Wright High School...team's MVP in volleyball during senior year at Wright...majoring in food and nutrition.



#5 Karyn Palgut
Outside Hitter, 5-8, Jr.
Broadview Heights, Ohio

Two-year starter at Florida State...earned MVP honors at conclusion of 1982 season...selected to the all-tournament teams at the Lady Seminole, Morehead State and the LSU Invitationals, as well as the Metro Conference tournament...led the team in kills (394) and service aces (54) during the past season...gained national experience as a member of the East squad

during the 1982 National Sports Festival...turned in one of the top matches in Florida State history last season against Texas--recording school records in the kill department (24) and the defensive saves category (17)...set a school record in 1981 by recording 26 consecutive perfect passes from the Alabama-Birmingham match to the Alabama match...played and lettered in basketball at FSU her freshman season...majoring in physical education.

One of Florida State's most consistent performers during the past two years, Forsten started as both a freshman and sophomore...had 112 kills last season...one of top servers on team, with 31 aces last season...holds school record in that category with six against Baylor in 1981...has gained international experience by touring Japan with Athletes in Action in 1982 and touring Latin

America with the same group this past summer...has also played for the Australian National team in World Cup competition...captained her high school team to a national championship her senior year and also served as captain for the national high school all-star team...majoring in leisure studies.



#3 Marie Sanders
Setter, 5-4, Sr.
LaPorte, Ind.

Selected to the Tournament team at the 1982 Metro Conference Tournament...returning starter at the setter position...has lettered three times and started for the majority of her career...holds Florida State career records for most set assists in game (46), season (1112) and career (1977)...proficient server, Marie was credited with 51 aces last season--third highest on team

...injury riddled sophomore season prevented Sanders from becoming one of Florida State's few four year starters...won six letters at LaPorte High School...two-time all-conference selection and co-captain in high school...majoring in fashion merchandising.



#14 Sally Summer
Outside Hitter, 5-8, Sr.
North Miami, Fla.

Excellent all-around player that can fill in at several positions when needed...credited with 340 kills last year, third highest on team...three-year starter and letterman...50 total blocks was second best among outside hitters last season...holds two school records including most consecutive perfect passes in a match (15 vs. Kentucky in 1981) and most consecutive kills in a

match (10 vs. Alabama in 1980)...853 career kills ranks among tops in FSU history ...teamed with former FSU volleyball player Camy Davies to win several intramural tennis, badminton and racquetball championships ...former high school All-American in volleyball at North Miami High...earned 15 varsity letters at high school level as well as scholar-athlete of the year honors...was co-captain this past year...majoring in social studies education and political science.



#13 Shannon Lages
Outside Hitter, 5-11, Sr.
Foster City, Calif.

Stepped into a starting role after Julie Brown was lost to back injury at the beginning of 1983 season...performed well, being credited with 313 kills and only 124 errors in 679 attack opportunities...27.8 percentage in attack situations topped all front-line players...selected to the All-Metro team as a freshman...helped Osborne High to three all-district championships during high school career...majoring in criminology.

Appeared in 29 matches last season, earning letter in first season...credited with 53 kills--highest total of non-starters...may challenge for starting position...spent summer of 1982 playing for Sports Performance, an outstanding open division team in Illinois...three-time letterwinner and all-conference selection at Hononegah High School...team's MVP twice...major is undecided.

Lisle, Ill.

Comes to FSU from Lisle High where she lettered three times...exceptional all-around player...earned all-county and all-conference honors both junior and senior seasons...major is undecided.

Broadview Heights, Ohio

Lettered as a freshman after appearing in 34 matches last year...may provide quality depth at the setter position for Florida State this season...credited with 34 kills and 14 service aces during freshman campaign...teammate Karyn Palgut attended same high school...earned 11 letters in three sports at Brecksville High...all-conference three times and conference MVP both junior and senior years in high school...selected to the all-northern Ohio team in 1981...majoring in interior design.



Statistics Explanation

PASSING: Each athlete is rated on a four-point scale (4 is the highest score) for each pass she makes throughout the match (see chart).



SERVING: Efficiency is based on the difficulty of the opponents being able to pass the serve. An athlete is rated on a four-point scale (4 is the highest score) for the effectiveness of each serve (see chart).

PASSING: Efficiency
 4 = ball passed over net for side out
 3 = ball passed to shaded area #3
 2 = ball passed to #2 area
 1 = pass setter can't get to but a teammate sets
 0 = pass resulting in a point for opponent
 *Formula: total points/attempts ÷ 4 = efficiency percentage

SERVING: Efficiency
 4 = ace or directly resulting in point
 3 = opponent passes it but setter is unable to set it
 2 = opponent passes it to #2 area
 1 = opponent passes it to #3 area
 0 = illegal serve
 *Formula: total points/average ÷ 4 = efficiency percentage

Definitions

Kill: A spike that directly results in a point or side out for the player's own team.

Attack: A spike that went into the court, but was not a kill.

DIG: Saving a hard spike or dink which should have otherwise hit the floor.

Ball Possession Error (BPE): Any play after the initial serve reception where the player is called for an illegal set, pass, double hit or illegal hit.

Block Solo: A block at the net by one person on a spiking attempt that results directly in a point or side out for the blocker's team.

Block Assist: When two or three people combine to block a ball for a point or side out.

Block Error: A violation during the course of a blocking action that causes a point or sideout.

Set Assist: A set for an attacker which directly results in a point or side out for the player's own team.



The Department of Dance is ranked as one of the top five in the country. The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country, the Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. The athletic program, including both men's and women's athletics, is among the top 20 in the nation.
