# COACHING STAFF

## CECILE REYNAUD—HEAD COACH

One of the top teachers in the game, Florida State's Cecile Reynaud enters her 11th year as coach of the Lady Seminole volleyball program. During that time, she has compiled an outstanding overall record of 303 wins and just 123 losses — good for a winning percentage of .711.

In addition, Reynaud has led Florida State to five appearances in national championship tournaments. While under the jurisdiction of the AIAW, Reynaud led the Lady Seminoles to five straight regional appearances and three trips to the AIAW national tournament. FSU's top finish in that event came in 1981, when FSU finished the year with a 43-8 record and placed fourth in the national tournament. That led to Reynaud being named Florida Coach of the Year.

After FSU changed over to the current NCAA format in 1982, it took Reynaud just one season to get her team into that national tournament as the 1983 Lady Seminole team finished at 31-6 and won the Metro Conference Tournament. An off year in 1984 was followed by perhaps Reynaud's finest coaching job last season. Taking a team comprised mainly of freshmen, Reynaud led FSU to a 22-10 mark and a second Metro Conference Championship in three years.

But Reynaud's coaching career has stretched beyond the college arena. In addition to her success at FSU, she has coached teams at both the national and international levels. In 1986 she was East Zone Coordinator at the United States Sports Olympic Festival. Last summer, Reynaud served as head coach of the Junior National Team that traveled to Japan and China. In 1983, she was an assistant coach with the United States entry into the World University Games. An authority on the game, she has served as technical consultant for several volleyball films and also edited a book on power volleyball. Reynaud has appeared as a guest speaker at clinics around the nation.

She hosts the Cecile Reynaud Volleyball Camp each summer on campus. It annually attracts 300 participants from around the southeast. Cecile appears on the staff of several other camps on a yearly basis.

A holder of a USVBA Level I coaching certificate, Reynaud arrived at Florida State in 1976 following a stand-out athletic career at Southwest Missouri State University. She lettered four years in volleyball and helped the Lady Bears to four appearances in the AIAW national tournament. She also lettered twice in field hockey. She received the prestigious "Outstanding Athlete of America" award twice during her college career.

Her outstanding playing and coaching career led to Cecile's induction into the Southwest Missouri State University's Hall of Fame in 1983.

She graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1975 and spent one year at Steelville High School (MO) as a teacher/coach, before moving to Tallahassee as FSU's head volleyball coach in a graduate assistant position.

In 1978, Reynaud was named the first full time head coach in the school's history. She completed requirements for her master's degree in 1979.

Cecile is a member of the USVBA board of directors, as well as the CVCA board. She is awards chairperson respon-



sible for the All-America, All-Region, and Coach of The Year selection for all divisions.

## SHELLY BIRKHOLZ

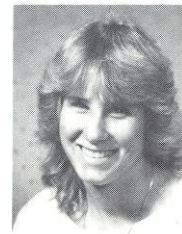
### Assistant Coach

A former Florida State player, Shelly Birkholz is in her first year as assistant coach at FSU — joining Cecile Reynaud's staff in August of 1986.

Birkholz, 22, played two seasons with Florida State — lettering as both a freshman and sophomore. A knee injury during her sophomore year ended her playing career, but Birkholz returned as a student manager during the 1985 season.

As an assistant coach, Birkholz will work closely with head coach Cecile Reynaud during practices and matches while also helping out in the recruiting process.

A native of Roscoe, IL, Birkholz graduated from Florida State with a degree in leisure services in May, 1986.



## DONNA KRAI

### Graduate Assistant

A native of Broadview Heights, Ohio, Donna Krai is in her first year as graduate assistant coach at Florida State. Krai, 22, lettered four years at FSU under head coach Cecile Reynaud. One of the most versatile players ever at FSU, she started at both setter and outside hitter during her career.

As a junior, Krai's .490 attack percentage placed her among the nation's leaders. She ranks high in several FSU career record categories, including games played, consecutive games played and total assists.

A former all-conference selection at Brecksville High, Krai graduated from FSU with a degree in business in May, 1986. She was selected to the Metro Conference Commissioner's list for academic excellence on numerous occasions and won the Conference Médallion award — a highly prestigious award given to a graduated senior that excelled in both academics and athletics at each member institution. Krai was named to both the all-conference and all-conference tournament teams as a senior.



## BARBARA BURKE

### Administrative Assistant

Barbara Burke rejoins the Lady Seminole coaching staff after a two year absence. Burke, a native of St. Petersburg, FL, is in charge of handling the day-to-day office duties associated with an intercollegiate athletic program.

Team travel arrangements, correspondence, and equipment orders are just a few of many duties Burke performs.

Burke arrived in Tallahassee after graduation from Vanderbilt with a degree in psychology and music in 1978. She completed a master's degree in communication from Florida State in 1979 and received a doctorate in the same field in 1981. She is currently finishing law school at FSU.



# 1986 OUTLOOK: FLORIDA STATE SEEKS TO DEFEND METRO TITLE

Last season, Florida State volleyball coach Cecile Reynaud was faced with the prospect of taking a talented but inexperienced team and transforming them into a championship unit. After an 0-2 start, the Lady Seminoles came together to finish with a 22-10 mark, a Metro Conference Championship and a spot in the NCAA National Championship Tournament.

Although Reynaud should have been able to look forward to a veteran team returning this fall, she finds herself in the same boat as last year, as only three regulars from last season's starting lineup return. The 11th year coach found out over the summer that standout freshmen Lynne Fullhart and Marinanne Tobolski, both starters from last year, would not be returning to school.

Because of this, Reynaud again finds herself in the situation of having to count on first year players to step in and fill several important roles on this year's team. "No question about it," she says. "Our new players are going to have to contribute. Two years ago, we graduated several good players and we knew that last year's freshmen would have to do a great job for us. They did and we won the Metro. We are going to be in the same situation this year and I have confidence that we will again develop into a championship team by the end of the season."

Two outstanding recruits could come in and help the Lady Seminoles out early in the season. Nancy Gaspadarek is a 5'7" setter from Lansing, IL, who comes to Florida State with impressive credentials. The all-county, all-state and All-America selection has performed exceptionally well in highly competitive tournaments. Reynaud considers her one of the best high school players in the nation. "We really believe Nancy was one of the top, if not the top, setter in the country last year. She comes from a highly competitive junior program and has several years of national tournament experience. Her presence and leadership on the court are very obvious."

Outside hitter Julie Plattner should also contribute early. At 5'11", the Springfield, IL, native also comes from a strong high school program. She possesses excellent hitting ability and plays "taller than she really is," according to Reynaud.

Veterans will still play a key role on the 1986 edition of the Lady

Seminoles. Senior captain Joan Morris, the MVP of the 1985 Metro Tournament, had 329 kills last season and will provide offensive power from the outside hitter's position.

Inside help will come from sophomore Deanne Kaleta, who appeared in 117 games last season and contributed 158 kills and 56 total blocks. Sophomores Gina Muensterman and Twanna Walker will battle for the third starting position, as will freshman Maria Magoulas.

In the middle, Florida State returns sophomore Julie Todd. The 5'11" junior from Germantown, TN, has started two years and led the team with 361 kills last season. Her .278 attack percentage was also the highest among all FSU players. The all-conference player also gained additional experience in the 1985 National Sports Festival. Todd and Kaleta will provide strong support at the middle hitter position for FSU.

Florida State's other returning veteran is Kim Britt. A solid two year player, Britt had 155 assists last year and has been a valuable player as both a spot starter and key reserve to boost the team.

Reynaud's main concern entering the 1986 season may also be one of the team's strengths. "I see our main concern as a lack of depth. Our starting lineup looks strong on paper, but with only nine squad members we don't have a lot of players sitting on the bench. But I also see that as a positive thing. Everyone on this team is going to play and contribute. I also think a smaller group may make us a closer team and easier to coach. Unfortunately, it also means that if we

have any injuries, it will limit our ability to make good things happen."

Florida State will again face a strong schedule with top 20 teams Illinois, Brigham Young, and Cal State Berkeley all appearing on the schedule. In addition to powers LSU and Georgia the Seminoles will challenge instate rival Florida. Cincinnati, South Carolina and Louisville will present strong Metro Conference competition to the Lady Seminoles.

A big change occurred this year as the NCAA withdrew its automatic bid to the Metro Conference winner. Still Reynaud's goals are the same. "We want to win our conference championship and advance to the national tournament," Reynaud said. "It will be more difficult this year because the conference tournament champion is no longer automatically guaranteed a spot at the national tournament. What this means is that we are not only going to have to win the Metro Championship, but we are going to have to hold our own during the rest of our schedule."

Reynaud points to the LSU Invitational (Sept. 26-27) and the Mikasa Classic in Knoxville (Oct. 24-25) as two tournaments where the Lady Seminoles will run into tough national power competition. "To get to the NCAA's we are going to need to win our conference and then the selection committee will take a good hard look at how we've done in strong competition outside the Metro. We've scheduled several excellent tournaments and it is up to us to do well in these to help us secure an at-large bid."

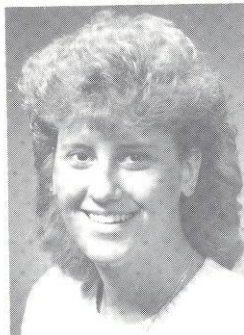

Florida State University has long been recognized as an outstanding educational institution, providing young men and women an opportunity to learn, develop and secure a degree in their chosen fields of interest. Indeed, the reason my staff and I are here is to assist our athletes in carrying out this objective.

There can be no greater accomplishment than for a student-athlete to complete her eligibility and obtain her degree simultaneously. That is our goal for every volleyball player at FSU. Twice in the past five years, an FSU volleyball player earned the Metro Conference Medallion award, the highest academic award a conference athlete can receive. It is awarded annually to the top athlete at each member school that completes their eligibility and graduates on time with 3.0 overall grade point average or higher. Graduate assistant coach Donna Krai was a four year letterwinner for us and the 1986 Medallion Winner.

I know it is possible for an athlete to be successful both on the court and in the classroom at Florida State. I know this because our best athletes have also been our best students. It is my personal objective to recruit student-athletes that have a personal goal of graduating with distinction in four years... because my greatest satisfaction is to see our players realize their potential as both athletes and productive members of society after graduation.
