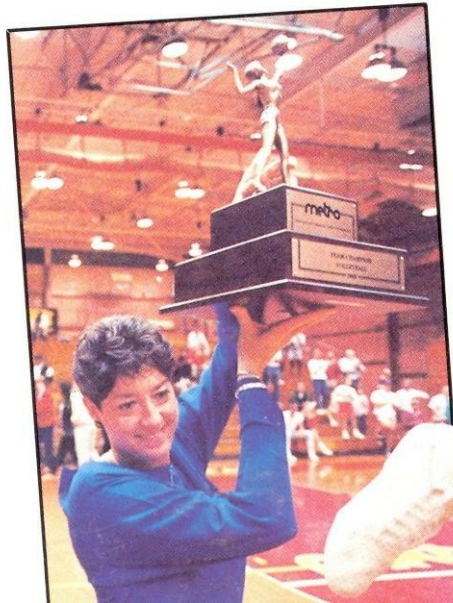
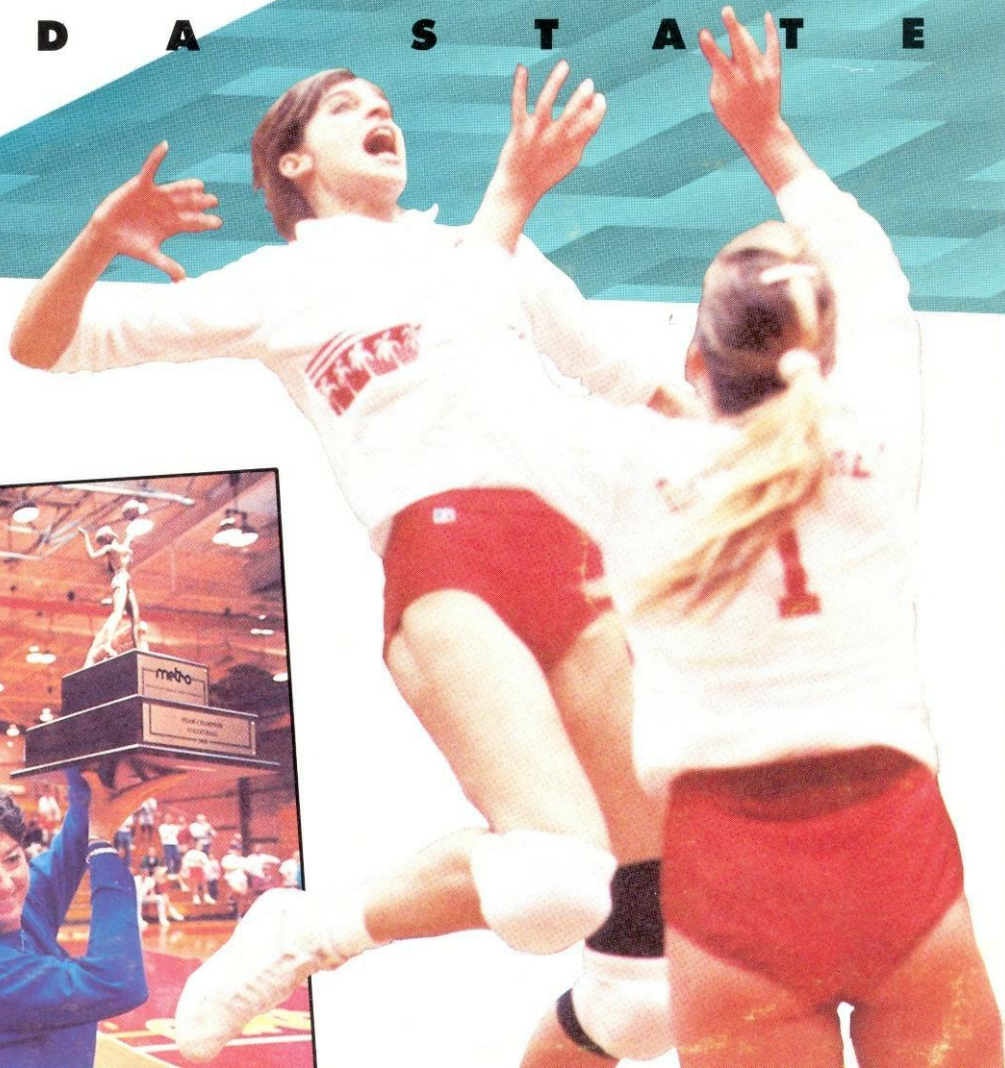

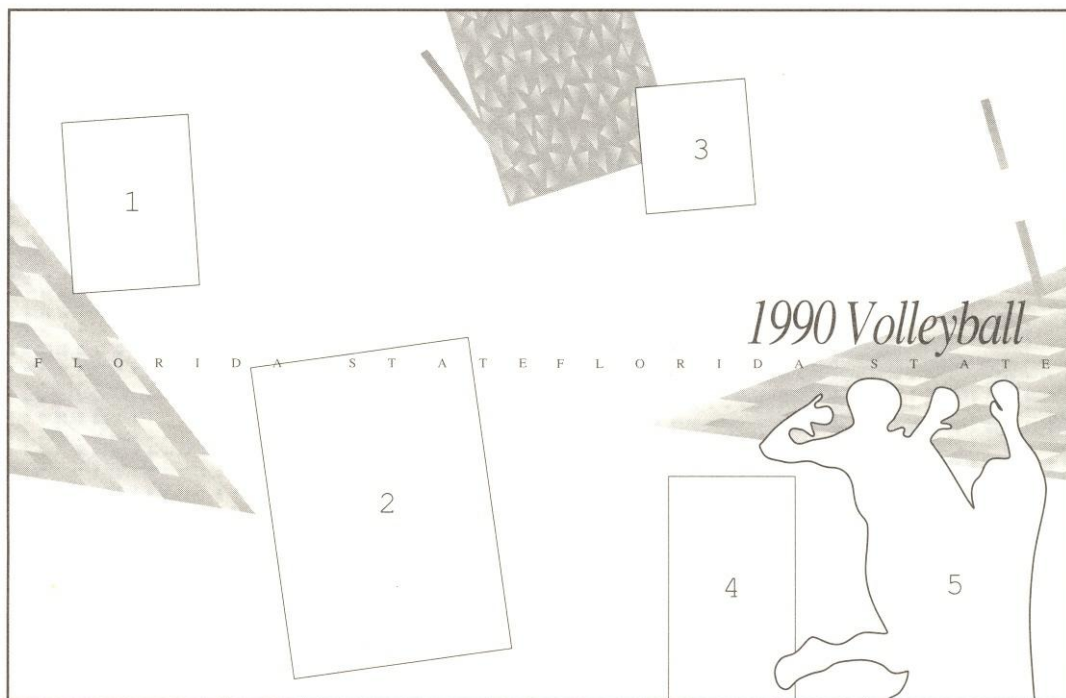

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The OUTLOOK

1990 LADY SEMINOLES CREATE AN INTERESTING MIX

Talent breeds creativity.

With an interesting mix of veterans and newcomers, leaders and followers, upper- and underclassmen, head coach Cecile Reynaud enters her 15th season of Florida State volleyball with a chance to experiment.

"I'm looking at many options," she said. "There's an interesting group that will be on the floor this season. I want to look at everyone at two positions. Become more creative."

At first look, it may seem the loss of four seniors from the 1989 team which finished 30-5, would strike a blow to the Lady Seminole lineup. But consider the five seniors-to-be have chalked up three years of experience and compiled an 80-24 record for a .769 winning percentage — the best three-year mark during Reynaud's career.

Among the five seniors are a setter, Jennifer Marraffino; two position players, Debbie Meyer and Marybeth Sutcliffe and two 1989 AVCA South region selections that each pose an offensive and defensive threat, Maggie Philgence and Gabrielle Reece.

With Philgence, who enters the season as the Division I active kill leader with 1,531 and Reece, who is closing in on the 1,000 kill mark with 851, there's plenty of offensive firepower.

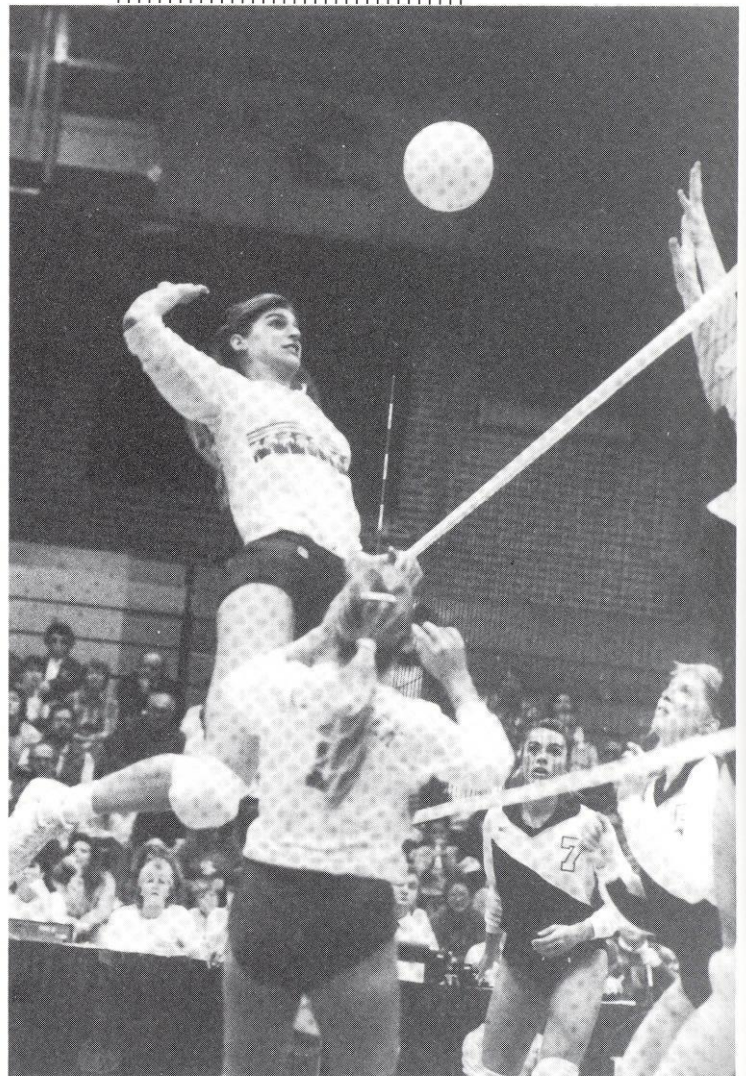
"Two-thirds of our offense goes to them," Reynaud said. "Both Maggie and Gabby have great jumps and are hard to block. What's different about them is that Gabby is more intimidating as a blocker and Maggie's bread and butter is her hitting."

Reece set a single season record with 69 solo blocks in 1989 and ranked among national leaders with an average of 1.65 blocks per game. Also making her presence known on the defensive side of the net last season was sophomore Vicki Zinkil, who averaged 1.68 blocks per game to rank nationally.

Zinkil, who tallied 157 kills as a freshman, is an offensive threat along with junior Amy Bronson, who finished the season with 177 kills.

"Amy and Vicki are two of our most versatile players," Reynaud said. "Either one of them could pick up where Twanna Walker (a senior on last year's team), who was a great right side player, left off."

Also competing for the outside hitter position are

returning 6-1 sophomore Bianca Stevens, 5-11 freshman Jennifer Cichy, 5-11 freshman Jennifer McCall and 5-9 junior Kristine Cousins, the NJCAA Player of the Year. With those four youngsters the possibilities of creativity are dazzling.

The question of who will handle the setting chores looms large heading into the season. With the loss of Nancy Gaspadarek, the only player in Metro Conference history to be named All-Metro and All-South region for three years, Reynaud says it's a three-player race.

Marraffino, with three years of collegiate volleyball in her favor, appears to be the leading candidate. Freshman Brandi Cumin, of San Clemente, CA, will also get a shot at the vacated position. Colorado native Jennifer McCall also could see action in a two-setter offense, according to Reynaud.

"We've got experience at every position except setter," Reynaud said. "I have no idea who will be at that position. I'm looking at all three. We'll put them out there and see who's best. We might even use two."

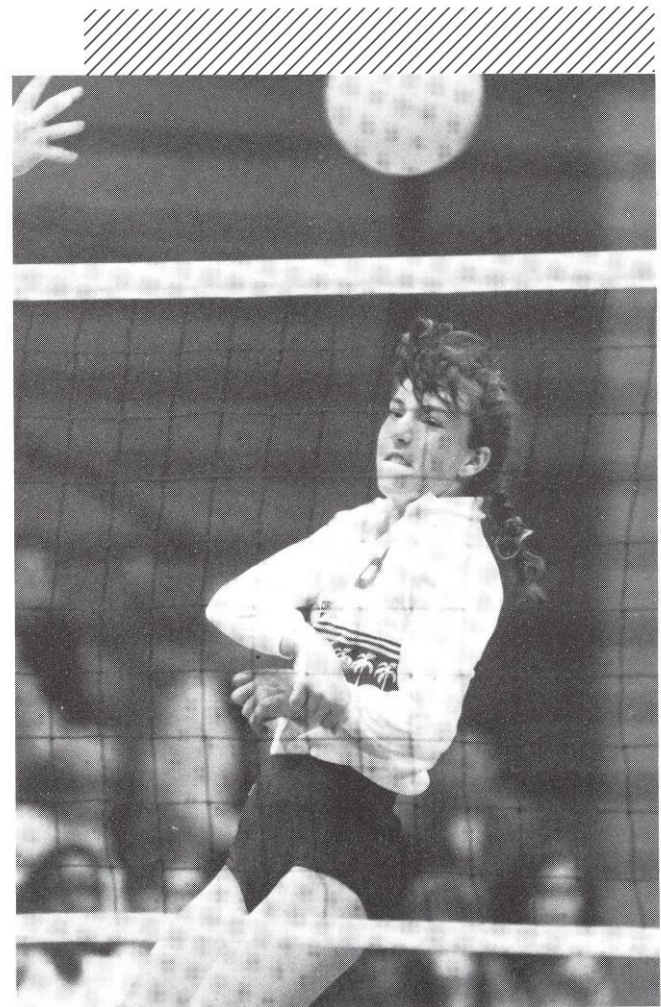
An interesting insight to the 1990 team is how Reynaud ended up filling the void left by outside hitter Sonia Trevino, who contributed 300 kills to the 1989 team.

Gone is one junior college transfer in Trevino, enter Kristine Cousins. In contrast, both came to FSU after winning the NJCAA National Championship. With two years of winning volleyball behind her, Cousins could step into Trevino's vacated spot.

"I look at the situation as a trade," Reynaud said. "Trevino for Cousins."

All of this assembled talent will be needed for the 1990 schedule which features four tournaments and at least 30 matches. FSU will travel to the season-opening University of Georgia Tournament, the Florida Eight Classic to defend its title and the Colorado Classic. The weekend of November 9-10, Florida State will host the FSU Classic featuring Fresno State, George Washington and the University of Houston. In all, Florida State will play 16 home matches and face premier opponents such as Georgia, Colorado, Wyoming, Eastern Washington and two-time national champion Texas. To close the season, Florida State will travel to Louisville, KY to attempt its sixth consecutive Metro Conference Championship.

With creative use of the talent offered, a fourth consecutive appearance in NCAA Tournament play could create the 1990 Lady Seminoles into a national contender.

One of the highlights of Cecile Reynaud's 1989 season certainly must have been winning the 400th match of her 14 year career.

Not just the win, mind you, but the way the Lady Seminoles won it.

After dropping the first two games of the match, FSU found itself down by an 11-6 margin to the Memphis State Lady Tigers in Memphis. With sole possession of first place in the Metro Conference on the line, the Lady Seminoles rebounded to score the next nine points of the match to win game three 15-11. Florida State then took games four and five of the match for win number 400 for Reynaud and another step toward an undefeated Metro Conference schedule in 1989.

During her 14 years at Florida State, Reynaud has seen many matches such as the one in Memphis. In fact, most of them have come out with FSU on the winning side. In 1990, she aims for her 15th consecutive winning season in Tallahassee. Since her arrival in 1976, Florida State volleyball has not encountered a losing season.

With FSU's winning ways, the season usually is extended into post-season play. The Lady Seminoles have won five consecutive Metro Conference Tournament championships and six of the last seven. For the past three seasons, and five times total, Florida State has advanced into the 32-team NCAA Tournament. Prior to the 1983 season, Florida State competed in AIAW post-season five times and three times reached the national tournament. FSU had its highest AIAW finish in 1981, placing fourth.

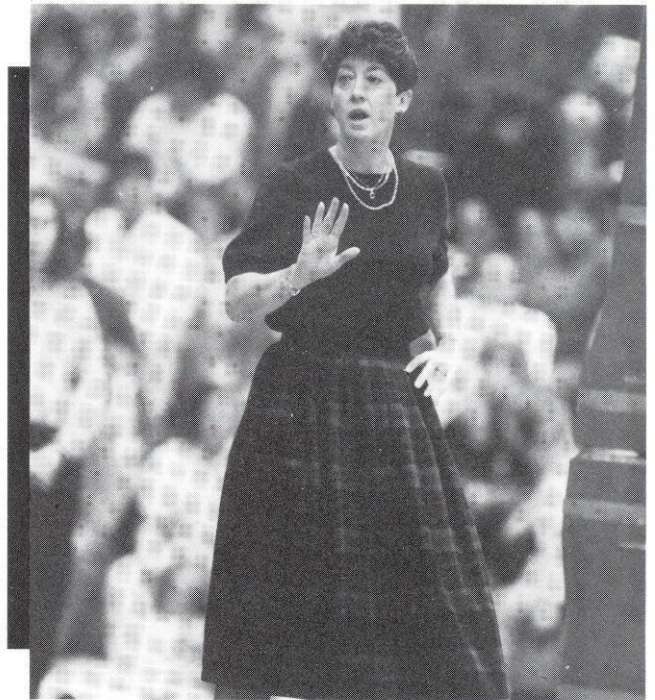
The success of the Lady Seminole team has earned Reynaud individual awards as well. Last season, she was voted Metro Conference Coach of the Year for the second year in a row. She was also named AVCA South Region Coach of the Year. The 36-year old Reynaud has also coached on the international level. In 1983, she served as

an assistant coach of the World University Games and took her biggest step in international coaching when she served as the head coach of the U.S. Junior National team which toured Japan and China in 1985.

Recently, she has served in an administrative capacity for the sport of volleyball. For the past two years, she has served as the co-commissioner for volleyball at the United States Olympic Festival and held the position of technical secretary for the Goodwill Games in Seattle this summer.

As an authority on the game, Reynaud has served as technical consultant for several volleyball films and also edited a book on power volleyball. She appears frequently as a guest speaker at various clinics across the nation. She is the current president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) and is a member of the United States Volleyball Association (USVBA) Board of Directors. Her yearly Cecile Reynaud Volleyball Camp attracts several hundred young volleyball players from the state of Florida and the nation.

Reynaud came to Florida State in 1976 following a standout athletic career at Southwest Missouri State in Springfield, Missouri. Her outstanding playing and coaching career led to her induction into Southwest Missouri State's Hall of Fame in 1983.

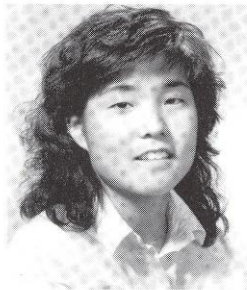

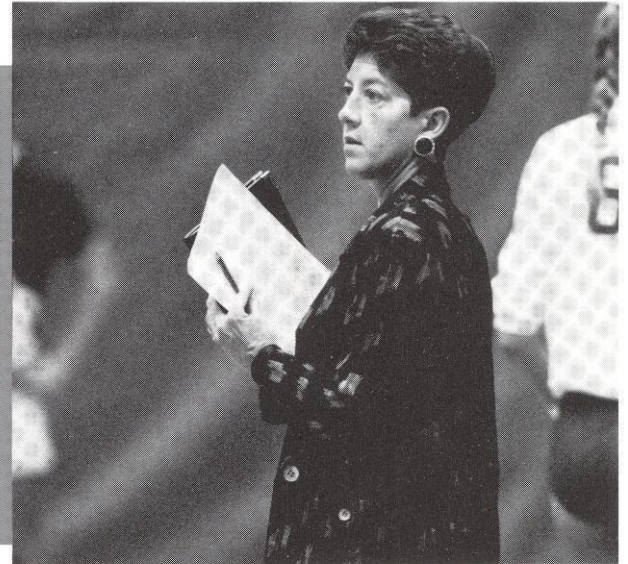
ASSISTANT COACH LORI NISHIKAWA (WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY, 1990) FIRST SEASON AT FSU



A new addition to the Lady Seminole volleyball coaching staff for her first season is two-time AVCA Division III Volleyball Player of the Year, Lori Nishikawa.

In her first collegiate coaching opportunity, Nishikawa comes to Florida State following a successful playing career at Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri. During her four-year career as a starting setter for Washington, the team compiled a 166-27 overall record and advanced into post-season play three times. She was part of the 1989 National Championship team which finished 39-7.

Individually, she was named first team Division III All-American three times, the University Athletic Association Player of the Year twice and was the AVCA Division III Player of the Year in 1988 and 1989 becoming the first player to repeat the honor on any level. She



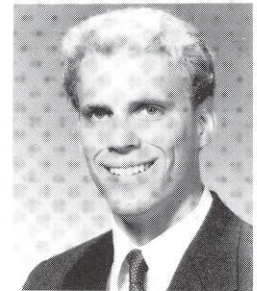

became the first Division III volleyball player to be nominated for the Honda Broderick award following her senior season.

A four-year starting setter at Washington University, Nishikawa holds career records with 4,310 set assists, 264 service aces and 1,376 digs. She graduated in the spring of 1990 with a degree in psychology.

The 22-year old Nishikawa will head up the Lady Seminole recruiting process as well as assist head coach Cecile Reynaud in day-to-day duties in the FSU volleyball office and daily practice sessions.

Although his volleyball experience is limited to intramural volleyball at his alma mater, Straw will assist Florida State volleyball with his computer expertise.

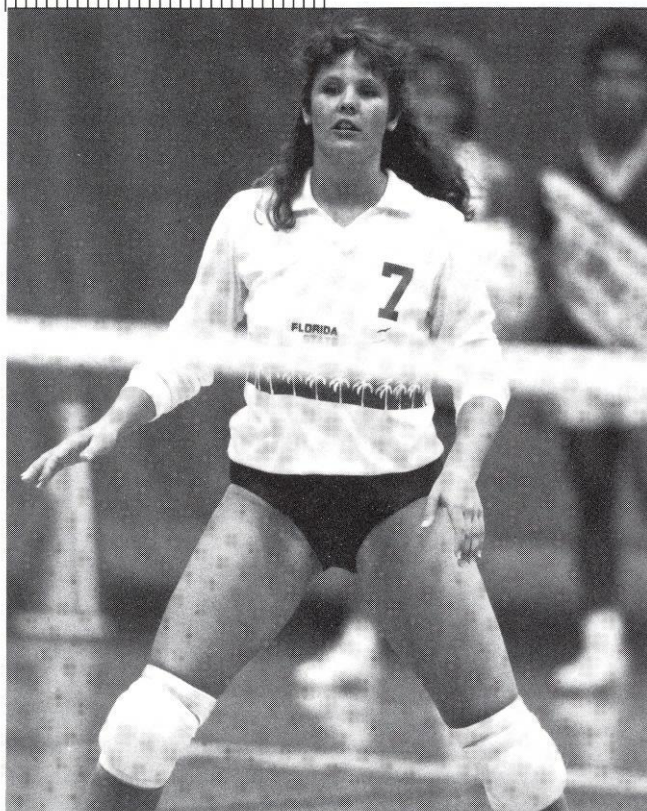

The YEAR IN REVIEW

For the Florida State Lady Seminole volleyball team, the 1989 season had its share of memorable moments.

It was a season of milestone reaching, records broken, win streaks and senior leadership.

Entering the season, the Lady Seminoles could finally boast a roster dotted with more than one senior, which had been the case in the previous three years.

In the season-opening George Washington Labor Day Festival, the Lady Seminoles dropped two of only four regular season losses on the year to the Minnesota Golden Gophers. Finishing second in our nation's capital, Florida State never seemed to put it all together that weekend. Leading attacker Maggie Philgence and her teammates sputtered as Minnesota took the championship match in three games.

The sputtering team soon turned into a fine-tuned machine and what followed was a 16-match win streak over the next two months. Beginning with a five-game win over Florida in front of 1,360 and the Sunshine Network cameras in Tully Gym on September 12, Florida State went from a 3-2 record to a 19-2 slate before dropping a four-game set to South Florida October 20.

During the 16-match win streak, the Lady Seminoles took the Florida Eight Classic Championship, defeated Kentucky in a thrilling, five-game, come-from-behind effort, saw Maggie Philgence chalk up a career-high 31 kills in a five-game win against Illinois State, and won eight matches away from Tully Gym.

Even though the win streak was snapped, there was plenty more to cheer about as 14th year head coach Cecile Reynaud picked up career win number 400 in a five-game victory at Memphis State October 25.

To warm up for the Metro Conference Tournament, FSU traveled to defend its championship in the Kentucky Wildcat Classic. Defeating Brigham Young and host Kentucky in a pair of five game matches, the Lady Seminoles played the role of spoiler to claim the championship for the second year in a row.

Entering the Metro Conference Tournament as the number one seed and host, FSU was a force. The Lady Seminoles did not lose a game in matches against Southern Miss, Louisville and Cincinnati. Maggie Philgence, Gabrielle Reece and Sonia Trevino earned All-Tournament honors. Playing on her fourth conference tournament championship team, Nancy Gaspadarek took the Most Outstanding Performer award as Florida State won its fifth consecutive Metro Conference Tournament and sixth in seven years.

With an automatic berth into the 32-team NCAA Tournament, Tallahassee was chosen as a first round site for the second year in a row as the California Golden Bears

paid a visit to Tully Gym. In a close and exciting match, the Golden Bears prevailed in four games 11-15, 15-11, 15-13, 15-13 as Florida State ended the season with a 30-5 record to mark the first 30-win season in five years. During the course of the NCAA Tournament match, junior Maggie Philgence surpassed Julie Todd's mark of 1,515 career kills to enter her senior campaign as the FSU kill leader as well as the active Division I kill leader.

In 1989, Florida State Volleyball enjoyed tremendous fan support. On five occasions during the season, more than 1,000 fans packed Tully Gym for volleyball action. All totalled, 11,577 fans passed through the gates to rank FSU 23rd in volleyball attendance in the nation.

This is FSU

At the dawn of a new decade, Florida State University is trailblazing toward a new century — exploring science through supercomputing, pioneering in Florida's growing film industry and scouting new avenues of cultural exchange in a world opening the paths to freedom.

Among the elite of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast computing in 1990 with the acquisition of two new supercomputers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP4/432. Both computers can be accessed from hundreds of locations in the United States and Europe.

For many years FSU has extended its reach far beyond Florida through international study programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. In 1990, the University embarked on a program requiring all of its students to take multicultural courses to expand their knowledge of the world and its variety of people and cultures.

Keeping pace with professional movie studios that have opened recently in Florida, Florida State is now the professional training ground for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, film production. FSU admitted its first film students to the new School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts in fall 1989.

These far-reaching programs are but a few of the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs offered through Florida State's eight colleges — Arts and Sciences, Business, Communication, Education, Engineering, Human Sciences, Law, and Social Sciences and eight schools — Criminology, Library and Information Studies, Music, Nursing, Social Work, Theatre, Visual Arts and Dance, and Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts.

Florida State is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System, founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

The main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee; the University owns a total of 1,167 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties. Within the state, FSU spreads west to its 20-acre campus in Panama City and south to its marine laboratory on the Gulf

of Mexico and its film and theater professional-training programs in Sarasota. In 1990, through a generous gift to the Foundation, the University acquired the Appleton Art Museum in Ocala, which will become a study center for the visual arts.

With 1,549 members, the FSU faculty currently includes four members of both the National Academy of Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included four Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,786 administrative, professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 1.76 million book titles, 18,650 serials and 3.25 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library places scientific resources close by the University's main science research complex.

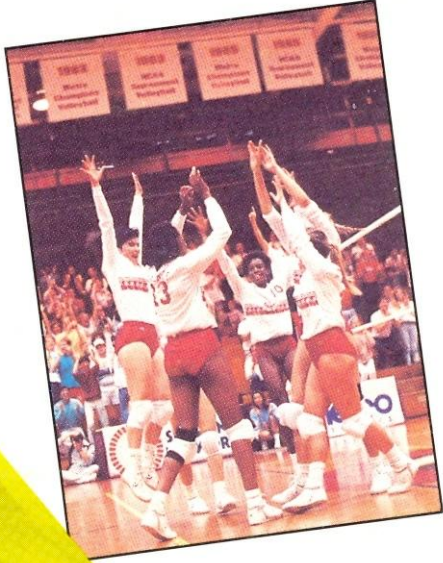
Recent growth during Dr. Bernard F. Sliger's 13-year presidency at FSU includes the student union expansion, the building for the joint Florida A&M University/Florida State University College of Engineering, the Dirac Library, the Village Green project at the College of Law and the FSU Panama City Campus. Currently under construction adjacent to Tully Gym is a \$12 million state-of-the-art student recreation center, which will include a multipurpose gymnasium and indoor pool. And Florida State is managing its growth through the planned University Center, an office-and-classroom complex to be built adjacent to Doak Campbell Stadium. The building is

expected to meet many of FSU's administrative and classroom needs and provide a centralized location for many student services.

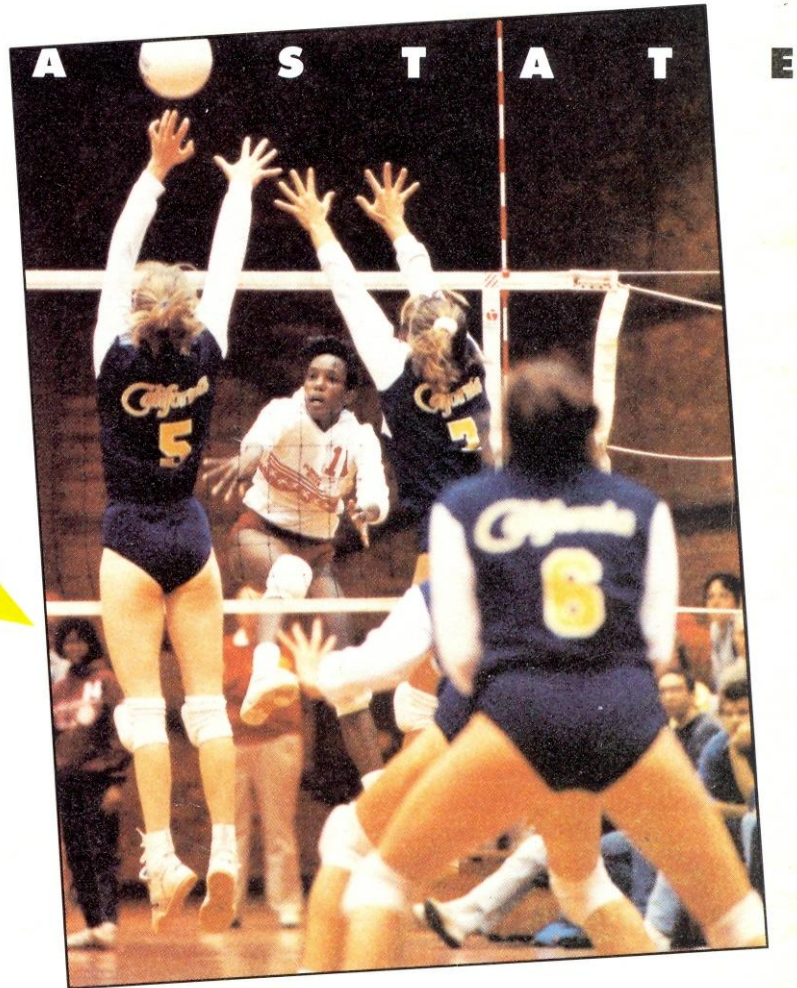
Florida State remains a growing institution — from its roots as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women and its coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts. In all areas of teaching, research and service, Florida State University continues to be a pathfinder into the 21st century.
