1998 OUTLOOK

GREAT EXPECTATIONS

A team with five seniors, a team with all starters returning (except defensive specialist Christy Minko) ...there is no question that there are great expectations for the 1998 Florida State volleyball season. But along with great expectation, must come perspective and that's exactly what Head Coach Dr. Cecile Reynaud and the Lady Seminoles intend to keep in 1998.

There will be no looking ahead to the Atlantic Coast Conference season, the ACC Tournament or NCAA postseason play. Rather, Florida State will take the season one day at a time, one match at a time.

"What's so exciting this season is the potential of this team and the fact that there is a large number of upperclassmen who contribute and have started in the past," Reynaud said. "This is the first team that I remember having all of the starters returning. This group has paid its dues and should come into this 1998 season expecting a lot from themselves. We have good height, good ball control, and both of our setters are outstanding. This team can go as far as they want to - potentially."

Leadership will be a key in the success of this year's squad. Five Florida State seniors highlight a group of 10 returning letterwinners.

Although all 10 returnees have had an opportunity to contribute at Florida State, it will be the five seniors who will provide the wisdom on and off the court.

"A team with five seniorsit's really their team," Reynaud said. "I think we have five people who will contribute in a leadership role and that's always enjoyable as a coach. You don't really sit back, but you know that they will handle some things for you. Competitively, we hope we've trained them to have the opportunity to be as successful as they want to be."

After finishing second in the Atlantic Coast Conference race and returning to NCAA postseason play, the Lady Seminoles will once again focus on achieving such status.

"The fact that we were very successful last year is a motivating factor for this team in the respect that they just

set their goals a bit higher," Reynaud said. "Our schedule is going to be very competitive. We are going to play quite a few teams that will be very challenging."

OUTSIDES

Probably the Lady Seminoles' strongest area, the outside hitter position will showcase a wealth of talent. Headlining this position will be seniors Holly Schneider and LaToya (Presberry) Washington. Last season, Schneider, a three-year starter, led the team with 400 kills, 401 digs and 57 services aces and earned second team All-ACC and All-ACC Tournament honors.

"Holly has started her entire career and has turned it up as she's gotten older," Reynaud said. "We look for her to be one of our primary passers. Her blocking has improved tremendously and defensively, she's certainly one of our strongest players."

Washington had recorded 12 matches of double-digit kills and six double-doubles before being sidelined for the season after 15 matches.

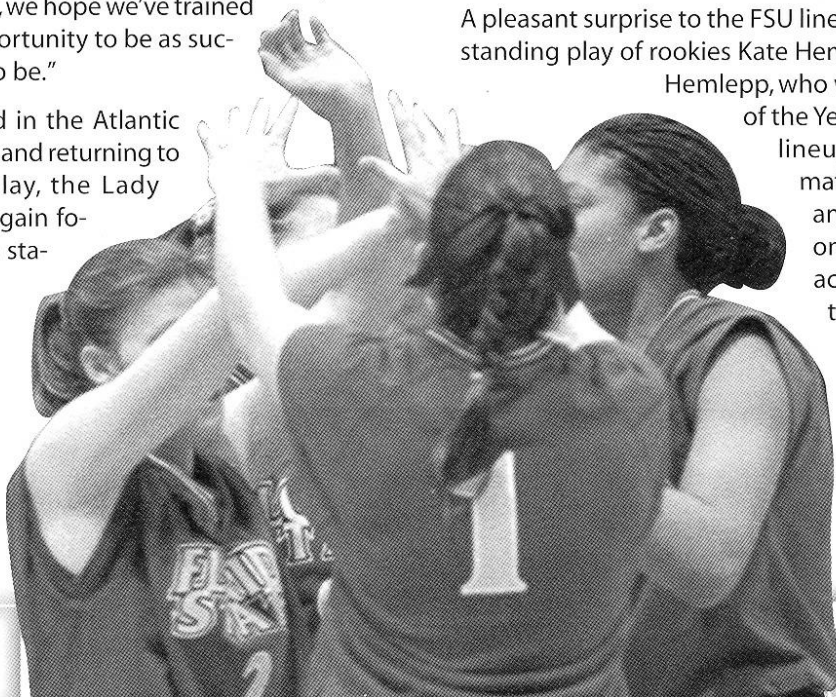
"LaToya has certainly had a successful career," Reynaud said. "She will go out with a lot of intensity and enthusiasm. She's a real strong leader on the floor. The team reponds to her and respects her as a player."

Also providing senior leadership is Sarah Rickertsen. A valuable member of the team, Rickertsen saw significant action late in the season and played in 21 matches.

"Sarah is absolutely one of the finest people I've ever had the chance to coach," Reynaud said. "She's a role player and is ready to go in any situation."

A pleasant surprise to the FSU lineup last season was the outstanding play of rookies Kate Hemlepp and Jennifer Werrick.

Hemlepp, who was named the ACC Rookie of the Year, cracked the FSU starting lineup early. She recorded six matches with double-digit digs and had four double-doubles on the year. Werrick didn't see action until mid-October due to an attempt to redshirt her. She made up for lost time, tallying double-digit kills in 12 of 13 matches played, including nine double-doubles. She



earned ACC All-Freshman team honors. Hemlepp and Werrick were each named the ACC Rookie of the Week three times during the season.

"Kate had an outstanding freshman season and had the opponents' attention every time she was on the floor," Reynaud said. "She will be very hard to stop as she continues to get more experience. Jennifer sacrificed half of her freshman year, but had to come in and take a starting position and had a remarkable performance her first time on the floor. She's a very good all-around player."

Newcomer Luana Ruiz Azevedo is a strong passer and will benefit from playing behind the veterans while gaining experience at the collegiate level.

MIDDLES

Perhaps the most dominating returning middle hitters in the ACC, senior Susan Hawks and junior Aisha Thornton will continue to tower over the competition. Thornton's .358 hitting percentage led the ACC, while Hawks ranked among the league's top four in both hitting (.339) and blocking (1.13 per game). Hawks, a second team all-ACC selection, hit .412 or better in 16 matches while ranking first on the team with 31 solo blocks and 135 total blocks. She also had double-digit kills in 13 matches.

"Susan is the mainstay on our team," Reynaud said. "She made an impact as a freshman and is still making an impact. She is sincere, dedicated, competitive and a no-nonsense kind of player who likes to have fun, but still gets the job done. We look for her to lead the younger middles and be a good role model for them."

Thornton tallied double-digit kills in 22 matches and was second on the team with 26 solo blocks and 123 total blocks.

"Aisha led the conference most of the year in hitting and continued with a great spring season," Reynaud said. "She has gained even more confidence and should be very dominating this year."

Rounding out the middle hitters are freshmen Norisha Campbell and Elizabeth Pound. Both players possess solid athletic skills and with experience should provide depth to the position.

SETTERS

For the second straight season, the setting duties for Florida State will fall on the hands of two very capable players in senior Fiona Bolten and junior Kensy Zulueta.

Last season, Bolten emerged as the squad's primary setter totaling 1235 assists in starting 28 matches. A second team All-ACC and AVCA All-District selection, Bolten set a new FSU record for assists in a game with 81 against Virginia.

"Fiona is quite athletic as a setter. I think she's ready to take the team as far as they want to go," Reynaud said. "She's very quick and is a highly-motivated person. We look for her to have a great year."

Zulueta saw action in 11 matches last season, including six matches as the starter in place of the injured Bolten. A strong server, Zulueta can also play solid back row defense.

"Kensy has been a contributor and last year led the team when Fiona was hurt," Reynaud said. "She trains hard and is very competitive. She wants to do whatever she can to help this team be successful."

DEFENSE

Junior Courtney Dipert will assume the defensive specialist duties for the Lady Seminoles. Dipert played in 15 matches, including 12 ACC contests in 1997.

"Courtney has been a reliable defensive player for us in a reserve role the past two seasons," Reynaud said. "We will again look to her for help in the back row."

Freshman Melissa Crews, a solid passer and server, will also help in this aspect of the game.

SCHEDULE

The strength of Florida State's schedule will present a great challenge for the Lady Seminoles. Aside from the always rigorous ACC slate, FSU will face six other teams who made NCAA appearances last season. In all, the Lady Seminoles will play 11 matches against eight NCAA teams. Three tournaments, including the Santa Barbara Tournament, featuring 1997 NCAA Tournament teams Long Beach State, Pepperdine and Santa Barbara, highlight the 1998 schedule.

Along with Florida State, Maryland and Clemson also made NCAA tournament appearances last season. This season, FSU was unanimously selected to finish first in the ACC race, according to the ACC preseason coaches poll.

"It is important we start out strong," Reynaud said. "While it is always our goal to win the ACC, we have to remember that we play a lot of matches before that. We'll take it one match at a time. Our schedule is set up so that we can get some good competition before we start conference play."

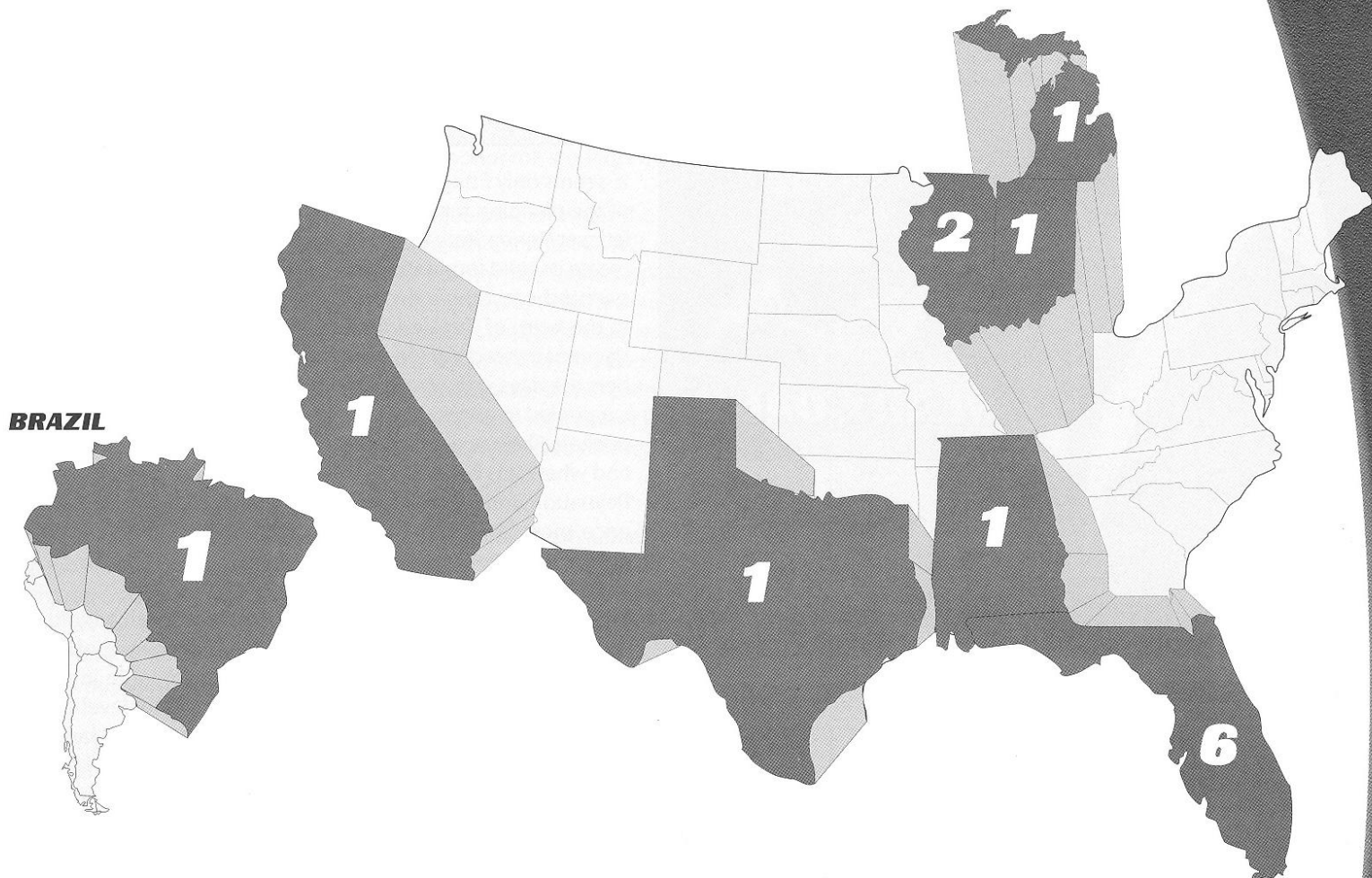

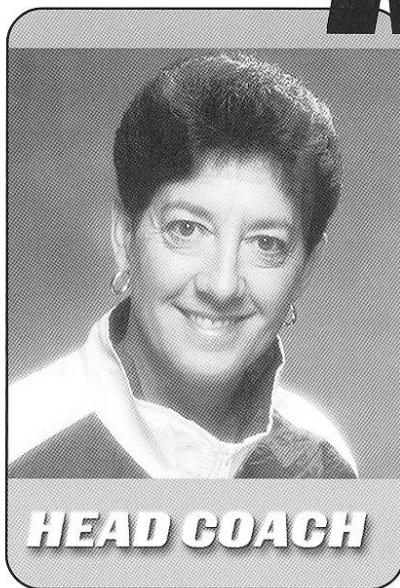

HEAD COACH CECILE**REYNAUD****23rd Season****Southwest
Missouri State '75**

It seems only fitting that head coach Cecile Reynaud be a part of the planning for the 30th year celebration of women's athletics at Florida State University, because it is she who has helped create its solid foundation and lasting memories for the better part of the last three decades. Having spent the past 22 years at the helm of the Florida State volleyball program, Reynaud has experienced the growth of athletics firsthand. She remembers the days when team members packed their own lunches, car pooled to games and paid travel expenses out of their own pockets. She has seen where athletics has been, where it is now and where it is headed. It is this unique perspective that keeps Reynaud coming back for more. More growth, more experience, more chills, more thrills ... each season is a new experience, a new challenge.

With a career record of 564-269, Reynaud ranks 11th nationally in career victories among active Division I coaches. Highly respected among her peers, Reynaud's involvement in international competition was elevated to an even higher level when she was chosen to serve as the Deputy Competition Manager for the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games. Years of volleyball experience paid off as she coordinated the activities of the Athens, Ga., venue for 10 days of competition.

As a coach, Reynaud has surpassed many milestones in her 22 year tenure at Florida State. Coach Reynaud notched her 500th career victory in the first match of the 1994 season against Southern Illinois, placing her among an elite list of coaches in the 500 win club. She reached win number 550 in a three-set win at Florida Atlantic last season as she led the Lady Seminoles to the program's best ever start at 12-0.

Looking back over 22 seasons of volleyball, post season play has become familiar to the Lady Seminoles. Florida State has made nine NCAA post-season appearances, seven of which have been in the last 11 years and two appearances in the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship game in seven years of ACC competition.

A two-time Metro Conference Coach of the Year, Reynaud was also honored as Coach of the Year by the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1992. She was also named Florida Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Coach of the Year in 1982 and in 1989 she garnered AVCA South Region Coach of the Year accolades.

In May of 1996, Reynaud received the George J. Fischer Leader in Volleyball Award, presented at the USA Volleyball National Meetings in Dallas, Texas. This award recognizes long-time-significant contributions to volleyball programs and activities in the United States.

Reynaud's success directly correlates with the type of individuals she attracts to Florida State. This is evident on the court as well as in the classroom as reflected by the graduation rate of the student-athletes who have played for her. Among four-year volleyball letterwinners, all but two have earned their college degree, which is nearly a 98 percent graduation rate. These graduates have included four Academic All-Americans and numerous honor roll students over the years.

In 1983, Reynaud first experienced the international level when she served as the assistant coach at the World University Games in Canada. In 1985, she was head coach for the United States Junior National Team which toured Japan and China. She has been on the AVCA All-America Committee and was the Zone Coordinator for 1986 and 1987 Olympic Festivals. She served as the commissioner for the Olympic Festival from 1988-1992. Reynaud participated in the 1990 Goodwill Games as the technical secretary and is past-president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association. Reynaud is a current member of the Volleyball Hall of Fame selection committee and served 12 years on the USA Volleyball Board of Directors and three years on the Executive Committee.

As an expert of the game, Reynaud has been a technical consultant for two Power Volleyball films and the third edition of the book "Power Volleyball." She has co-authored numerous articles pertaining to women's athletics and continues to be active on the speaking circuit. Reynaud has been an instructor at more than 50 camps and clinics across the country and hosts her own camp each year which attracts hundreds of young volleyball players.

A 1975 graduate of Southwest Missouri State, Reynaud enjoyed an outstanding athletic career on the volleyball team and was twice named among the Outstanding College Athletes in America. In 1983, she was inducted into the school's Women's Athletics Hall of Fame.

Reynaud also has administrative experience at Florida State. She served as the interim Assistant Athletics Director/Senior Women's Administrator for the 1994-95 school year.

Reynaud added "Dr." to her name last spring after completing her doctorate degree in athletic administration at FSU.



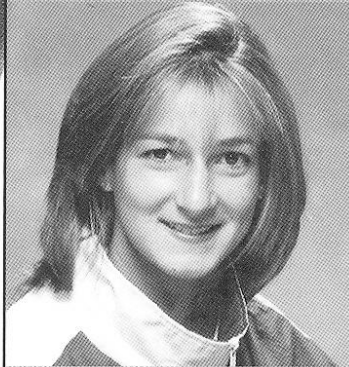

THIS IS TALLAHASSEE



Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as “The Other Florida” with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida’s capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neometropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more



than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents. Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs, site of America’s first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee’s spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee’s Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five “official” canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called “tallahassee” — derived from the words “talwa” meaning town and “ahasee” meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida’s capital.

The “old town” has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee’s perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite





towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for *free* — unheard of even 100 years ago.

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

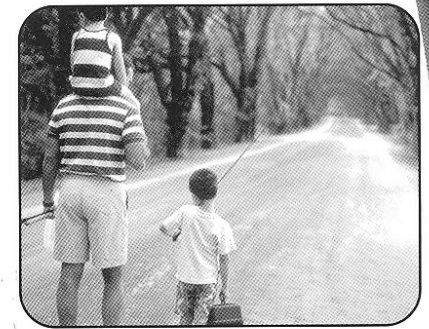
Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House

that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest fresh water springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.



A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

Florida State University, recently celebrating its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

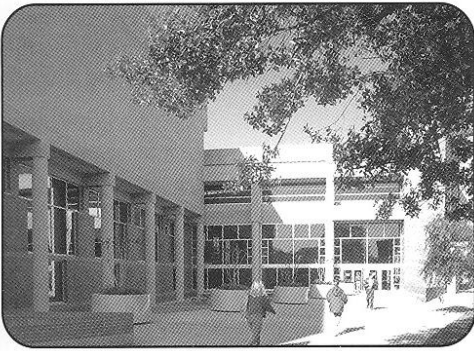
Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a **"Research University I"** by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.
- In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 — with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale — of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."
- Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the **National High Magnetic Field Laboratory** at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The **world's largest magnet** — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the **off-campus research complex**, Innovation Park.

In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The **Card Application Technology Center** is a national leader in "smart card" systems.
- At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired **two supercomputers**, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.
- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million **University Center**, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.
- In 1990, Florida State **ranked second in popularity nationwide** among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.
- FSU's high-tech program in **structural biology** in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million.
- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed **"Seminoles,"** joined the **Atlantic Coast Conference** as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the **1993 National Championship** and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first **Heisman Trophy**.
- The **Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center**, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.
- **FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates.** Over the five





years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African Americans.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is excelling in the 1990s with excep-

tional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, **Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte**, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member **State University System**, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is **\$474.3 million**. Faculty and administrators generate more than **\$102 million** annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: **FSU Foundation**, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, **Seminole Boosters** and **FSU Alumni Association**.

The main campus is spread over **451.6 acres in Tallahassee**; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its **25-acre campus in Panama City**, its **Marine Laboratory** on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The **Center for Professional Development and Public Service**, housed in the **Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center** on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers **286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs** through its **eight colleges** — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and **eight schools** — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included **nine National Academy of Sciences elected members**, **nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows** and **five**

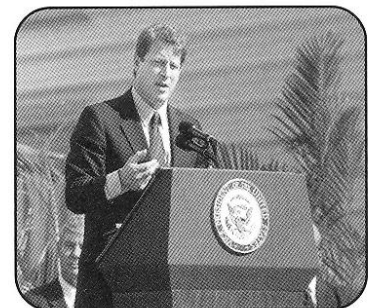
Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include **2.1 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.5 million microforms**. The main library facility, the **Robert M. Strozier Library**, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The **Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library** is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its **30,519 students** and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students). The **University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus** and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — **Florida State University** is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.

With the sunny skies and beautiful beaches of Florida as well as the opportunity to travel throughout the nation, being a member of the Lady Seminole volleyball team is indeed an exciting experience for a collegiate athlete. In recent years, the team has traveled the friendly skies from California, Texas and Colorado to Minnesota and Michigan. This season, the Lady Seminoles will once again go west when they compete in the UC-Santa Barbara Tournament.

Even while on their home court of Tully Gymnasium, the Lady Seminoles have the opportunity to be seen throughout the southeast on Sunshine Network. The Central Florida, Maryland, and Georgia Tech home matches will be seen on Sunshine this season.

Florida State alum and local television sports director Tom Block along with former FSU volleyball player Lisa Gunning bring you all of the action from Tallahassee.



While not competing, the volleyball team continues to remain active within the athletic department. Appearances and speaking engagements at area schools and organizations are part of everyday life for a Lady Seminole.

Amongst their many appearances, senior Sarah Rickertsen dressed up like the Easter bunny last April and the Lady Seminoles had an Easter egg hunt with children at a local day care.

Another link to the Tallahassee community is the Lady Seminoles' relationship with their younger volleyball



fans. The FSU volleyball ball girls are provided by the Tallahassee Sports and Rec Department and the Lady Seminoles make sure these young ladies become and instant part of the team. Following home matches, the players are available for autographs and to talk volleyball with their fans.

Along with success on the court, the Florida State volleyball program is also tops when its comes to academics. Seven Lady Seminoles earned academic All-ACC accolades last season while the volleyball team placed fourth among FSU's 17 athletics teams in team GPA in 1997-98. The volleyball program also boasts one of the highest graduation rates within the athletic department. Among four-year letterwinners, all but two have earned their college degree in Coach Cecile Reynaud's tenure. This accounts for nearly 98 percent of all volleyball student-athletes over the past 22 years.

FSU HALL OF FAME

The Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame enjoys a rich 20 year tradition as its first and largest class (15) was inducted in 1977. At least six individuals have been selected each year since, with the exception of 1996 when no class was inducted as Florida State celebrated its 50th Year Anniversary of Athletics. There are a total of 167 members in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame with the 1998 class to be inducted on September 18th. Margie Wessel Scott was the first volleyball player to attain such status as she was inducted in 1988. In 1997, former volleyball standout Gabrielle Reece became the second volleyball player inducted. Maggie Philgence and former head coach Dr. Billie Jones will be members of the 1998 class.



Named team MVP the last three years of her college career, Margie Wessel led the Lady Seminole volleyball team to a 127-60 record during her four years at Florida State. Twice during her career, the Lady Seminoles advanced to the AIAW National Tournament. The Miami native was co-captain of the Florida State squad as a senior and was named to the AIAW Region III all-star team in 1979 and 1980.



The most famous alumni of Florida State volleyball, Gabrielle Reece has gone on to pursue a career in the sport she loves.

A Lady Seminole from 1987-90, Reece quickly established herself as a force on the volleyball court. She holds the FSU career and single-season records for solo blocks (240 and 69) as well as the career record for total blocks (747). She garnered AVCA All-Region honors in 1989 and was a Metro All-Conference selection in 1989 and 1990. As a junior, Reece was named to the Metro All Tournament Team after helping to lead Florida State to the Metro Conference Championship.

Reece did not go unnoticed nationally either. She was pegged the 1989 Dodge National Athletic Awards Most Inspiring Collegiate Athlete and was among Rolling Stone Magazine's Wonder Women of Sport that same year.

Reece went on to play professional volleyball as the captain of Team Nike for the Bud Light four-woman beach volleyball tour. In addition to her playing career, Reece is also a supermodel, Nike spokesperson and television celebrity.

She recently added "author" to her resumé, when she co-authored her first book, "Big Girl in the Middle," which was released in the summer of 1997.



As head coach of the Lady Seminole volleyball (1970, 1972-75) and softball (1971, 1972-74) programs, Dr. Billie Jones played a major role in paving the way for the success of women's athletics at Florida State University. Dr. Jones earned her PhD from Florida State in 1972 and began serving as an Associate Professor in the Department of Movement Science and Physical Education in addition to her coaching duties. Under Dr. Jones' direction, the volleyball program

compiled a remarkable 107-22 record and made appearances at the AIAW National Championship Tournament in 1973, 1974 and 1975 while competing for state and regional championships along the way. Dr. Jones also coached the 1971 softball team to the state championship and the 1974 squad to a runner-up finish. Dr. Jones devoted her time to teaching fulltime in 1975, but continued to be instrumental in the advancement of women's athletics at Florida State. She was recognized for service and dedication to FSU's women's athletics when she was given the Herb Morgan Award in 1982. In 1985, Dr. Jones became a Service Professor in the Department of Movement Science and Physical Education and in 1989, she was honored with the distinction of Professor Emerita. Among her many accomplishments, Dr. Jones has also co-authored four books on coaching and fitness. A scholarship by an anonymous donor, given in the name of Dr. Jones, is awarded annually in the College of Education to a female student who intends to coach.



A member of the Florida State volleyball team from 1987-90, Maggie Philgence made a name for herself not only at FSU, but at the conference and national levels as well.

Philgence broke six school records during her senior season, three of which still stand, and earned All-Metro Conference and AVCA All-South Region team honors.

A powerful hitter, she still ranks among FSU's Top 10 in 14 statistical categories and remains the FSU leader in career kills (2,110) and kill attempts (4,793) as well as single-season kills with 579 in 1990. Upon graduation, Philgence was drafted to the South Team for the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles and helped lead her team to a gold medal. She went on to play professionally with the international league in France.

Tully Gymnasium has been the home to Florida State volleyball over the years. The years have been good ones for the Lady Seminoles as they have accumulated a 220-72 record on its home court for a winning percentage of .753 in the past 22 years in the facility.

The facility, which was constructed in 1956, was named for the late Robert Henry (Bobby) Tully, a 1952 FSU graduate who played football. Active on campus, Tully was a member of the Gold Key, ODK, the Arnold Air Society and Alpha Tau Omega fraternity. He died in May 1954 after battling a long illness.

The 2,500 capacity gymnasium has undergone several renovations in recent years. Over the past year, the playing floor was resurfaced and repainted and new lighting was added. Prior to the 1993 season, \$250,000 worth of improvements were completed. New bleachers with pull out arena-style padded seating with armrests were installed to create a movie theater experience while watching the Lady Seminoles.

In addition to the always exciting Atlantic Coast Conference action, the 1998 Florida State home schedule is highlighted by the Florida State Classic, a four-team tournament featuring FSU, Florida International, Northern Iowa and Southeast Louisiana. As always, rival-Florida will make its annual trip to Tallahassee.

SUPPORT SERVICES

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal, FSU has developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs.

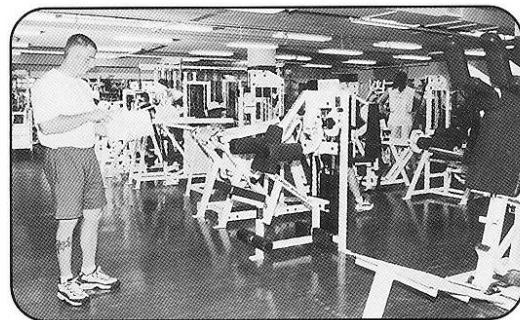
The program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, the academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. They gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. Coaches also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-of-the-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the

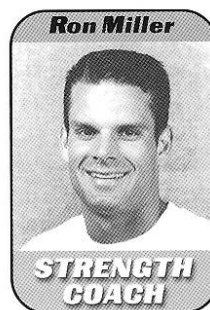

\$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.



FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



Strength training and conditioning are an important part of an athlete's performance on the court. At Florida State, a supervised program has been developed for volleyball, emphasizing the objectives of not building bodies, but strengthening and conditioning them. Strength coach Ron Miller, a former ACC Senior Scholarship Athlete of the Year

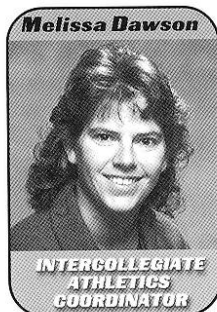
for the FSU men's basketball team, individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway. Miller, who is a member of both the National Strength and Conditioning Association and Aerobics and Fitness Association of



America, works with the players in sport specific training which includes conditioning the major muscle groups used in volleyball. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential. Miller married the former Cindy Milbuta in December, 1996.

EVENTS MANAGER

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1990, Melissa Dawson begins her eighth season with FSU Volleyball and second as Intercollegiate Athletic Coordinator which, among other things, includes home event management and equipment duties for the volleyball team.



A native of Hernando, Fla., Dawson attended Florida State earning her undergraduate degree in Physical Education in April of 1992 and her master's in Athletic Administration in April of 1996.

WEIGHT ROOM

The Tully Gymnasium weight room recently took on a whole new look following a complete renovation in the summer of 1996. The facility, which was expanded by 2,000 square feet, is now 3,500 square feet in size with a new stereo system, drop ceiling, lighting and mondo rubber flooring.

Over \$140,000 worth of new exercise equipment was added to the Lady Seminole weight room, including 16 cardiovascular pieces such as Life Fitness, Stairmaster and Textrix. All Florida State women athletes train in the state-of-the-art facility.

MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT

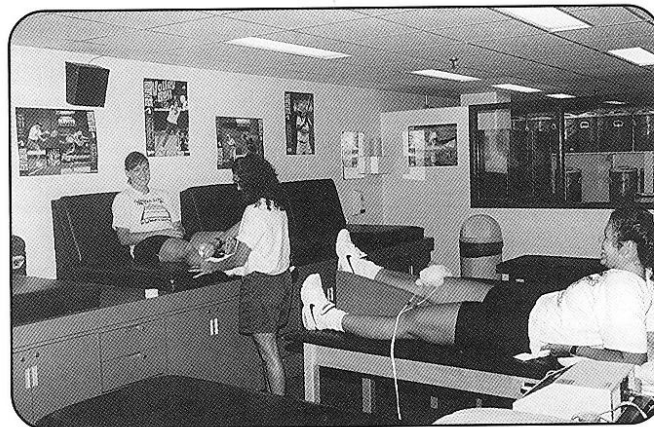
An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible with the athletic training team at Florida State University. Prior to competition, all FSU student-athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed on a prevention care



system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. Certified trainer Inga George will handle the athletic training duties for the Lady Seminole volleyball team again this season.

George, a 1995 graduate of the University of Florida, is in her second year on the Florida State athletic training staff. She spent a year serving as a physical education instructor and assistant athletic trainer at Mainland High School in Daytona and also worked as a staff trainer at the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta. This past summer she worked as an athletic trainer for Forever Sports, Inc. which puts on NFL sponsored football camps for youths around the country. George worked camps with the Greenbay Packers, Kansas City Chiefs and Denver Broncos.

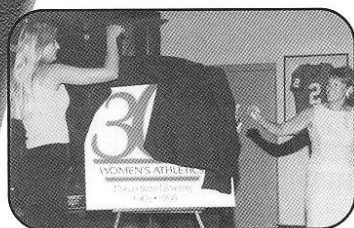
Though the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another component of the Florida State training room. The FSU



athletic training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehabilitate after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes after an injury.

Drug testing is also a responsibility of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.

30th YEAR CELEBRATION



Florida State kicked off the year celebration when volleyball's Gabrielle Reece returned to Tallahassee in July to help unveil the 30th Anniversary logo.

While women's athletics has held a rich tradition in Tallahassee since the early 1900's when Florida State was the Florida State College for Women, the 1998 season marks the 30th Anniversary for a continuous women's athletics program at Florida State University.



Through the years, a foundation of excellence, both athletically and academically, has been planted upon which a winning tradition continues to grow.

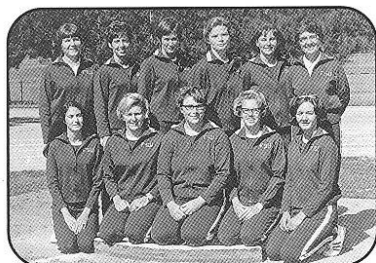

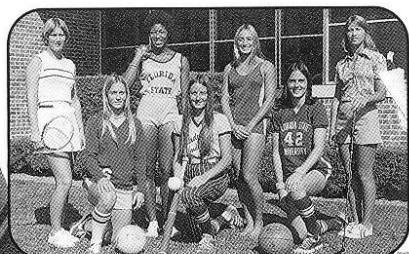

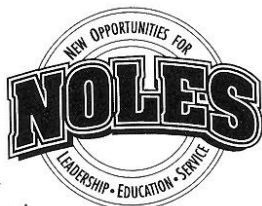


LIFE SKILLS

NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEADERSHIP, EDUCATION AND SERVICE

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

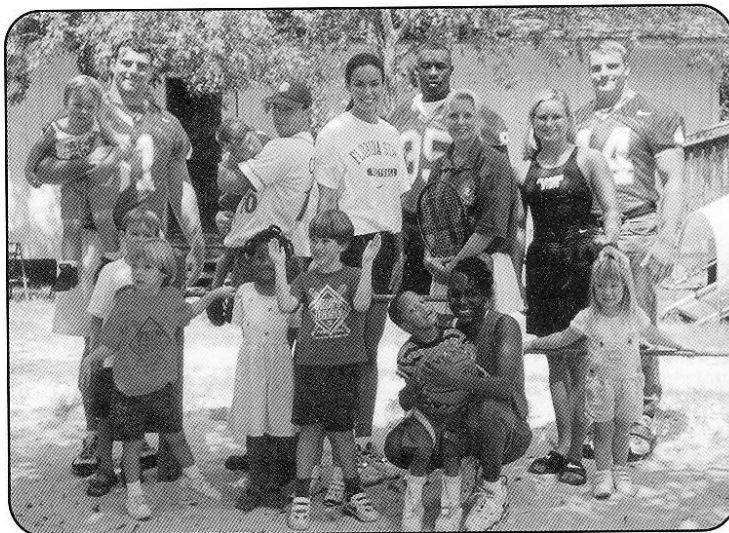

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program are the Seminole Leadership Institutes that are held four times a year. These Institutes offer student-athletes the opportunity to learn skills that will benefit them as students, as athletes, and as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. The Institutes are based on building communication skills. Students have the opportunity to use the values and work ethic taught by athletic participation as the framework for their leadership development. The Institutes attract outstanding guest speakers who challenge Seminole student-athletes to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC hosted the annual Golden Nole banquet and planned such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back-to-school picnic.



NCAA INFORMATION

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests **may not** make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a **prospective student-athlete** if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A **contact** is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An **evaluation** is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid **official visit** to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to **one telephone call per week** except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards

- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect **only** if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

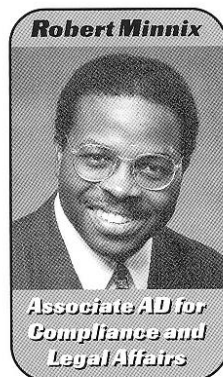
You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide **anything** to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.



1997 SEASON REVIEW

One of the goals of the Florida State volleyball program in 1997 was to finish among the top teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Head Coach Cecile Reynaud felt that this Lady Seminole squad had the talent, determination and heart to attain such status. She was right and they used each one of those characteristics to do just that. The squad overcame numerous injuries and obstacles but with a true team effort produced an outstanding season. The Lady Seminoles' achievements included a 25-9 overall record, a second place regular-season finish in the ACC with an 11-5 mark in conference play, and numerous individual accolades. Florida State's regular season success was rewarded with an invitation to the NCAA Tournament.

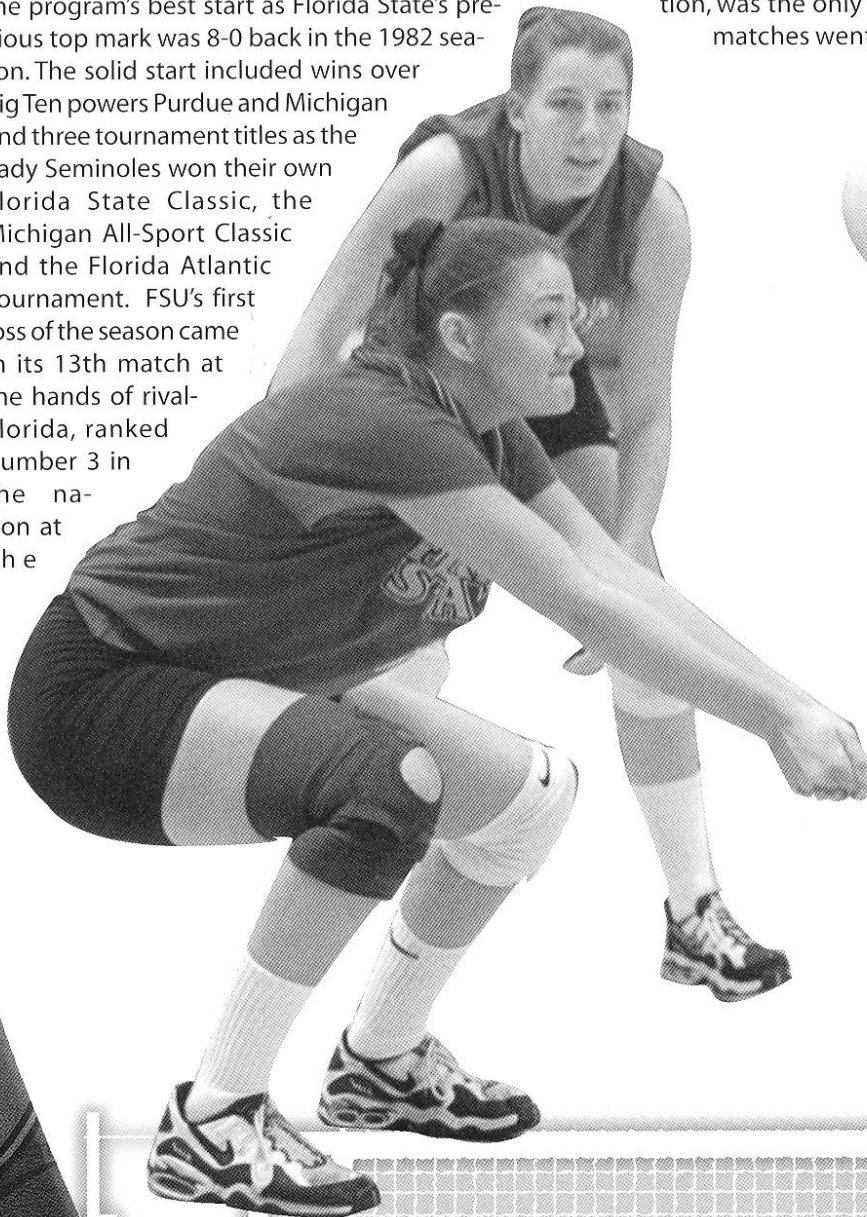
The season started with a bang as the Lady Seminoles won their first 12 matches, breaking a 15-year record for the program's best start as Florida State's previous top mark was 8-0 back in the 1982 season. The solid start included wins over Big Ten powers Purdue and Michigan and three tournament titles as the Lady Seminoles won their own Florida State Classic, the Michigan All-Sport Classic and the Florida Atlantic Tournament. FSU's first loss of the season came in its 13th match at the hands of rival-Florida, ranked number 3 in the nation at the

time. Though disappointed with the three-set loss, the match, played at Tully Gymnasium still set records — attendance records that is. Nearly 2,800 fans completely filled the seating areas and crowded the corners in standing-room only fashion to see the in-state showdown.

The ACC slate started on the road for the Lady Seminoles with a weekend series at North Carolina and NC State. The team fell to the Tar Heels in three games, but responded with a strong, three-set victory over the Wolfpack the next day and went on to win its next three matches. The Lady Seminoles recorded sweeps over four ACC schools during the season, including NC State, Clemson, Virginia and Wake Forest and split with Duke, Georgia Tech and North Carolina. Maryland, the only remaining undefeated Division I volleyball team in the nation, was the only team the Tribe did not beat, but both matches went to four games. The Tribe finished the

regular-season strong with three victories over Virginia, Wake Forest and Duke, the latter two on the road. The match with Duke was the first five-set match for FSU this season and the victory was the program's first over the Blue Devils since joining the ACC in 1992.

There were several factors that contributed to the success of the 1997 squad. The return and consistent play of many veterans along with the influx of talented newcomers resulted in one of Florida State's most balanced clubs. A healthy Susan Hawks and the continued dominance of Aisha Thornton allowed Florida State to have one of the most feared

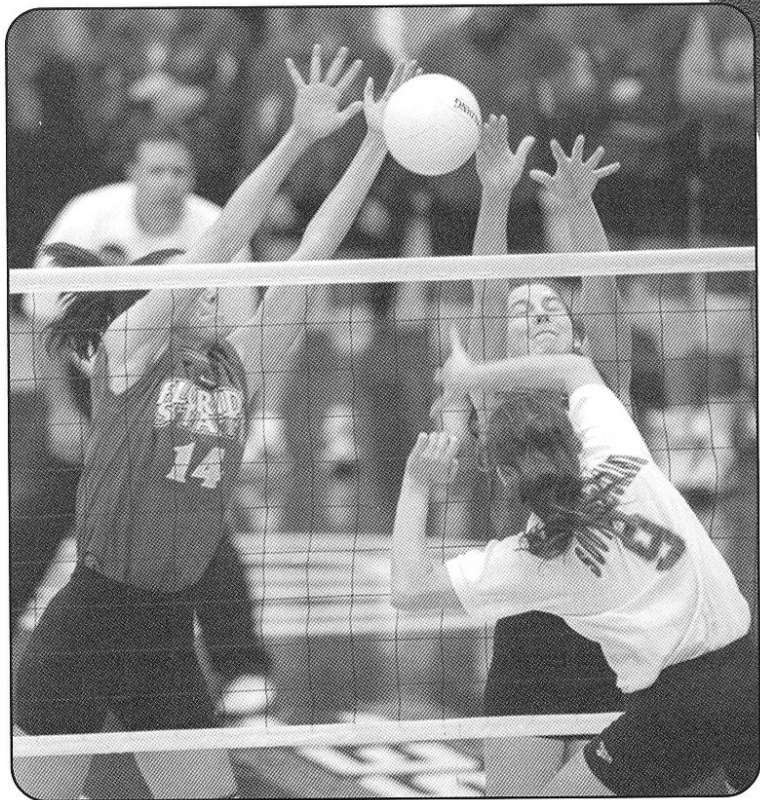
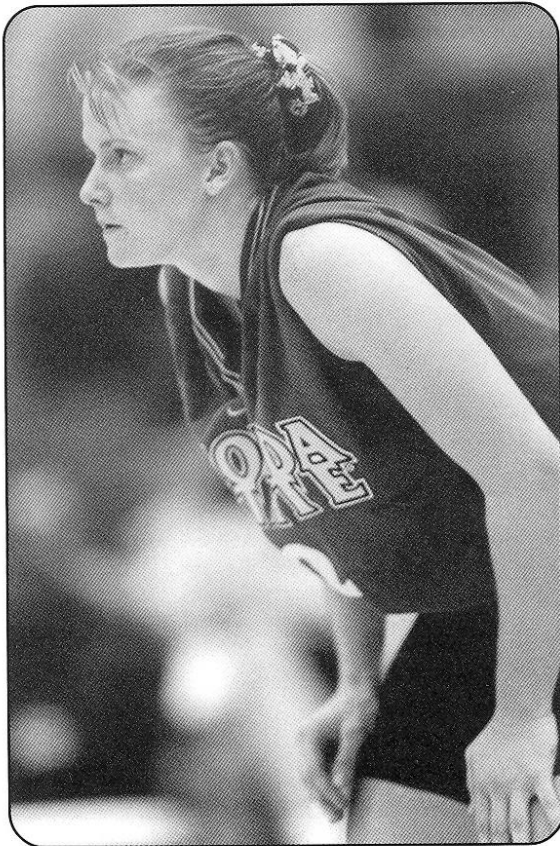


front lines in the conference. Thornton was the league leader in hitting while Hawks was among the top three in the ACC in hitting and blocking throughout the year.

Juniors Holly Schneider and LaToya Washington remained two of the most consistent players on the floor for the Tribe as they have throughout their careers. Schneider led the league and was among the nation's best most of the season in service aces per game. She finished the regular season leading the team in kills, digs and service aces. Washington had another solid season with 12 double-digit kill performances in 15 matches.

Freshmen outside hitters Kate Hemlepp and Jennifer Werrick established themselves as a pair of the best rookies to ever don the garnet and gold. The duo accounted for six of the 12 ACC Rookie of the Week honors. Despite missing 10 matches with various injuries, Hemlepp made an immediate impact in the FSU lineup and recorded three double-doubles. Werrick, who didn't see action until October 19th, played in FSU's final 10 regular-season matches with authority and recorded double-digit kills in all 10 contests.

Florida State did indeed have a solid hitting team and led the ACC in the category all season long, but the hitting wouldn't have been possible without the assistance of first-



year setter Fiona Bolten. Bolten, a junior transfer from Kentucky, has been the glue that has kept this team together. Despite missing six matches with injuries, Bolten's presence on the court has been an obvious advantage. Bolten finished the season averaging 12.96 assists per game and set a new FSU record for most assists in a single match with 81 in the Virginia win. She contributed in many ways, including FSU's only triple-double of the year with then career-highs of 10 kills, 65 assists and 20 digs at Clemson on October 26th.

Senior Christy Minko, FSU's veteran on defense, was one of just two players to play in every game. Kency Zulueta successfully replaced the injured Bolten at setter for six matches. Susan Johnson, Laura Arnold, Sarah Rickertsen, and Courtney Dipert each stepped up when called upon to help the team.

Honors came in abundance for the Lady Seminoles in 1997. Fiona Bolten, earned AVCA All-District Honors and was joined by Susan Hawks and Holly Schneider on the All-ACC Second Team. Kate Hemlepp and Jennifer Werrick were selected to the ACC All-Freshman Team, while Schneider was also selected to the ACC All-Tournament Team. Hemlepp also earned the ACC Rookie of the Year award. Florida State players also garnered eight ACC Player or Rookie of the Week honors as well as numerous all-tournament team accolades.

ACC BIOGRAPHY

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 46th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 72 national championships, including 37 in men's competition and 35 in women's. In addition, 108 men and 26 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

1997-98 IN REVIEW

The 1997-98 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and nine individual crowns. In all, the ACC has won 29 national team titles the last eight years.

The ACC's 1997-98 national champions were North Carolina in women's soccer and field hockey and Maryland in women's lacrosse. In addition, the ACC had five other teams participate in national title games — Florida State in football, Virginia in men's soccer and women's lacrosse, Maryland in men's lacrosse and Duke in women's tennis. Overall, ACC teams posted a 77-58 (.570) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 16 of the 24 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1997-98 season include 85 teams competing at NCAA Championships, four bowl teams and 19 Top 10 showings.

Eight ACC teams, in six different sports, representing five of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 11th straight year in 1996-97 as 1,410 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

THE HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

FSU VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

Since its beginning in 1968 with a group of physical education students and a volunteer coach, Florida State volleyball has shed its club team roots to become one of the nation's premiere programs.

In its infancy it was not uncommon for the group of aspiring athletes and teachers to pay their own way to tournaments and share warm-up suits with the other women's club teams. The club struggled to become established in those early years as team members were faced with having to find a new volunteer head coach each of the program's first five years.

After Florida State made its first ever appearance at the AIAW National Tournament in 1971, Dr. Billie Jones assumed the coaching duties on a permanent basis for the next four seasons. Under Jones' direction the Seminoles amassed a 107-22 record, and volleyball at Florida State became a mainstay.

Success continued for the program as it returned to the AIAW National Tournament in 1973, '74 and '75, while competing for state and regional championships along the way. Popularity for the sport began to grow. Former FSU

basketball head coach Hugh Durham and his wife Melinda were two of the team's biggest supporters, often attending home matches. In just a few short years, Florida State volleyball became recognized as one of the sport's up-and-coming programs.

Current head coach Cecile Reynaud continued to build on the foundation laid by her predecessors. Under Reynaud's guidance, FSU qualified for the AIAW National Tournament three more times. After its AIAW appearance in 1981, Florida State joined the NCAA and began competing in the Metro Conference in '82.

Before FSU joined the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1992, it had captured six Metro Conference titles. In six years of

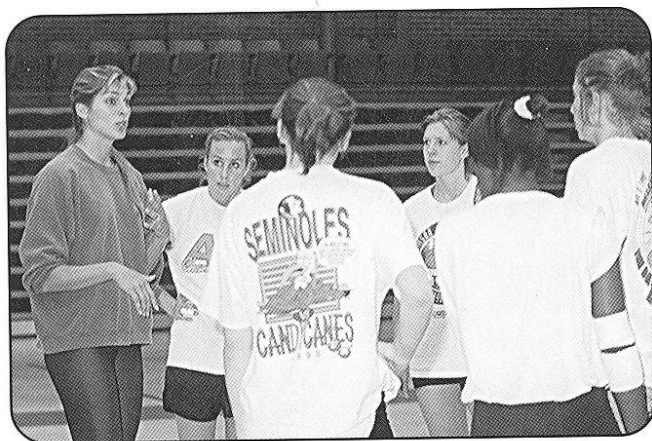
FAMOUS ALUMNAE

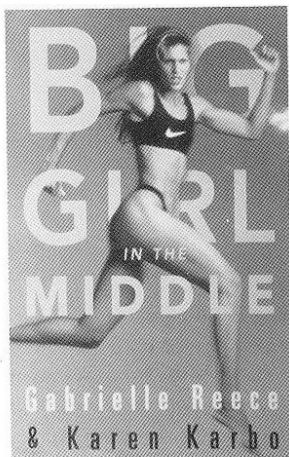

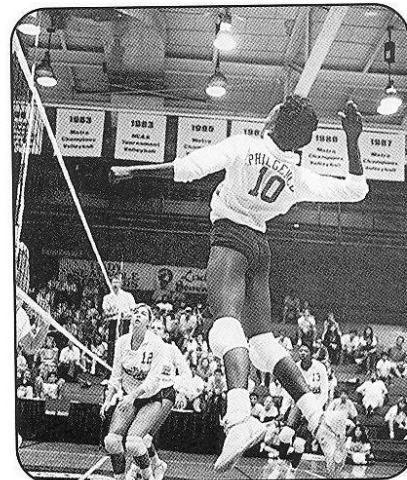

In July, Reece returned to Tallahassee to unveil Florida State's logo for the 30th anniversary of women's athletics. On a previous visit, she worked with the volleyball team in spring practice and offered words of advice to the team on success in the world of sports.

Reece was selected to the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1997.

MAGGIE PHILGENCE

In her senior season, Philgence was named to five all-tournament teams, selected Metro Conference Player of the Week twice, as well as being listed on the All-Metro Conference team and American Volleyball Coaches Association All-South Region team. Her statistics also ranked in the top around the nation. She has left her mark in the Florida State record books as well as with the NCAA. Philgence is ranked 17th in the NCAA for her career kills (2,110) and tops the FSU career charts. She also led the Metro in hitting percentage (.333) and kills per game (4.41) throughout her final season.

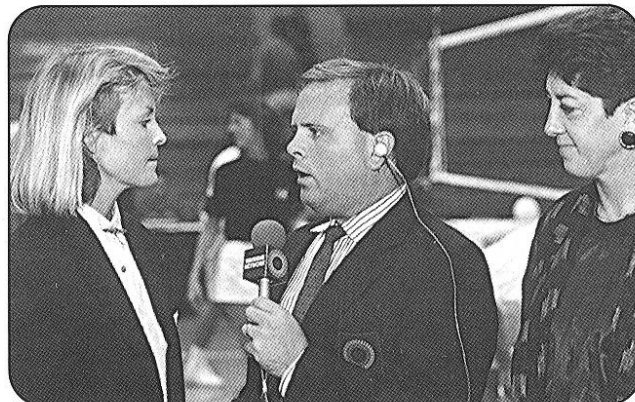
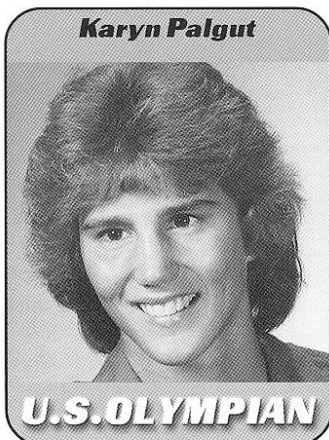


Upon graduation, Philgence traveled overseas to play professional volleyball with the international league in France. She will be inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame this fall.

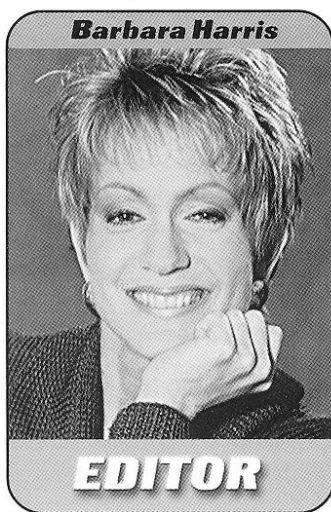
**LISA WARMAN GUNNING**

Harris will return to campus this fall when she is honored as a "Grad Made Good" during Homecoming Ceremonies.

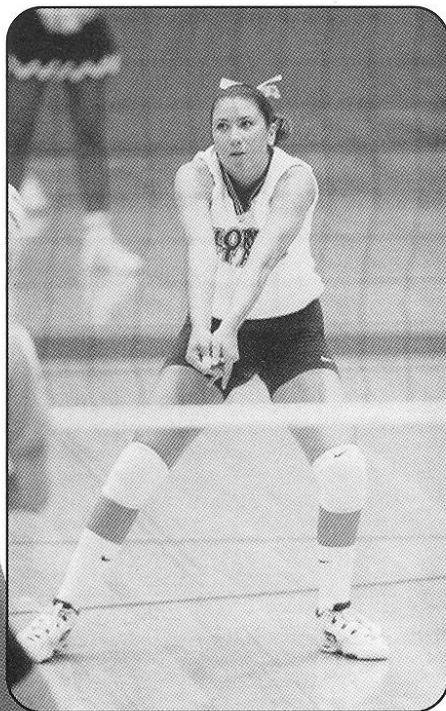
