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
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Since first pressed into service in 1946 as a complete education center for 500 freshmen, the South Campus has been a picturesque adjunct to a continually growing University.

As other facilities of the UM have expanded, the unique campus at SW 152nd Street has developed as an ideal location for research requiring isolation.



The southland's latest and most intense football rivalry unfolds for another chapter here tonight as Coach Bill Peterson brings his upsetminded Florida State Seminoles into the Orange Bowl.

This meeting between the Seminoles and Hurricanes is the eighth game of a series that has produced thrilling football.

While Miami and FSU clashed as far back as 1951, real tense rivalry between the schools did not actually commence until 1958, when the Seminoles, bidding to get into the big time, knocked off Miami 17 to 6 on this same Orange Bowl turf.



Last year, Miami moved into Tallahassee land, and when the smoke of battle had cleared, the Hurricanes were happy to still have their scalps. An extra point — booted by Miami's place-kicking specialist Al Dangel — was the margin of victory in a 7 to 6 thriller.

Tonight, the Seminoles are after us again. They have their tomahawks aimed at an upset

and could be potent. The FSU team which Peterson has brought to Miami is a better ball club than the Seminoles of last year—and there's every reason to believe they'll be shooting at the moon with everything they have, seeking to skyrocket once again into the national spotlight.

Florida had a tough time whipping FSU by the skimpy margin of a field goal in a 3 to 0 game. And it must be remembered, the Gators knocked off LSU, Georgia Tech and up to last week, shared leadership in the Southeastern Conference.

Prior to its recent meeting with Kentucky, Florida State was second in the nation in defense against scoring — only three TDs having been scored against Coach Peterson's Seminoles in five ball games. These Seminoles fight right down to the final gun.

Miami trouble looms ahead for Miami tonight via the sky lanes. Against Kentucky, FSU had its most success through the air, accumulating 109 yards on nine completions. They heaved 25 forward passes.

Peterson said after the game the Seminoles "did not throw enough" against the Southeastern Conference Wildcats and that they'll pitch more against the Hurricanes. Also, up Tallahassee way, some say the key to a possible upset over Miami tonight is to flood the Orange Bowl with passes and stop Miami's Eddie Johns on offense.

Signal calling chunkers who will be heaving for the Seminoles are Eddie (The Fox) Feely (5-7, 159) and Ed (The Tiger) Trancygier, a 205 pounder. Trancygier is the ablest tosser as far as TD heaves are concerned, having chucked four sky touchdowns, although Feely actually has the better percentage of completions.

Feely specializes in the roll out pass and is a wiggly, elusive type of runner like Florida's mighty little mite, Larry Libatore. He was awarded Back Of The Week by the Florida Sports Writers Association following his performance against the Gators, while, after the Kentucky game, Coach Blanton Collier of the Southeastern Conference Wildcats said: "That Feely's like a ground squirrel to catch—we almost had him for a loss several times, only to lose him."

Collier called Trancygier a tough quarterback to handle, too.

Together, Feely and Trancygier have rushed and passed for 901 yards so far.

The Seminoles' top running threat is left half-back Bud Whitehead, an all-purpose senior who led the nation in pass interceptions last year and handles all of his team's punting.

Florida State uses a three-team system. Coach Peterson patterned his three-team attack of course, after that of LSU where he was an assistant coach under Paul Dietzel before joining the Seminoles. In this daring three-team system, the starting eleven is known as the Chiefs and plays both ways; the defensive specialty unit is known as the Renegades, and the special attack unit, made up of eight sophs, a junior and two seniors, is known as The War Party.

Feely directs the Chiefs and Trancygier the War Party.

The defense unit, the Renegades, is led by a Miami gridder named Roy Bickford.

## Famous Chridders

When University of Miami quarterbacks on the 1941, 1942 and 1946 teams wanted a few yards to insure a first down, they called on Fullback Bob McDougal and Bob almost invariably came through. So perhaps it was natural for Bob to turn to the insurance field when he ended his days as an active athlete. Bob now is with the State Farm Mutual Insurance Company, handling automobile, fire and life insurance accounts.

Bob had his football service interrupted by World War II and after enlisting in the U.S. Marines, he was sent to Duke University in 1943 in the V-12 program.

From there he was sent into the South Pacific area where he was on duty until the end of the war.

McDougal fullbacked on three great University of Miami teams coached by Jack Harding—and playing under Coach Harding's direction is what McDougal terms his greatest athletic thrill at the University of Miami.

In McDougal's first year, 1941, Miami had an 8-2 record. A 6-0 victory over Texas Tech that year ranks with Miami's great football victories of all time. The 1942 team won 7 of nine, missed going to the Orange Bowl because of a 2-0 loss to North Carolina State on a sodden field. Bob came back to school for 1946 and Miami lost only two of 10 games, whipping Florida and Texas Christian among others.

McDougal was a pile driving type of fullback who had plenty of speed when in the open. In his three years, he carried the ball 265 times for 1098 yards, a figure topped only six times in UM history. He scored 11 touchdowns, tying for seventh place in the UM all time annals.

Following his graduation at University of Miami, Bob took a fling at professional football. He spent the 1947 season with the Green Bay Packers and the following campaign he divided his time between the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Richmond Rebels.

Bob married Eileen Ruzomberka. She is the sister of Eddie Ruzomberka, the quarterback who led

the blocking for McDougal under the single wing attack used by Miami in those days.

They have three children—all future fullbacks: Bobby, nine; Edward, eight, and Thomas, five.

Bob was a member of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity at the University of Miami. He is a member of the Coral Gables Elks Club, of the South Miami Junior Chamber of Commerce and is a member of the board of directors of the University of Miami Alumni Gridders.



## The Modern Revolution Of College Football

THE CHANGING FACE OF FOOTBALL! ⚠ Once it was a simple game . . . now it is ultracomplicated.

When James G. (Jimmy) Conzelman, former coach who now is a St. Louis advertising executive. was here last spring to address the University of Miami's Eaton Foundation members, he emphasized the game's amazing development and refine-

"Back in the old days, all a football coach needed to get the job done was a journeyman's knowl-



edge of the off-tackle play and a ven to kick anyone who happened to be in a crouching position."

Few universities have men who have bridged the gap between the bygone era and the new with the success and distinction of Miami's Athletic Director, Jack Harding,

and Hurricane head coach, Andy Gustafson.

In the days when Harding and Gustafson played under Glenn S. (Pop) Warner and John Bain (Jock) Sutherland at Pittsburgh, they were in the forefront as exponents of one of the three basic football systems then in use.

Teams played Warner's Double Wing; the Single Wing, which had been advanced by Dr. Henry L. Williams of Minnesota; or the Notre Dame system of the immortal Knute Rockne.

And the play patterns hardly varied from school to school, or season to season.

Football was a simple game then, indeed.

To combat those three standard offenses, there were two stock defenses . . . always a seven man front line with the secondary either in a diamond or a box.

That was it . . . nothing else.

A germ of a new idea and a slight change here or there . . . then the fertile football minds like Rockne, Fielding H. Yost, Bob Zuppke, Lou Little, Walter P. Steffen, Wallace Wade, Robert Neyland, John Heisman, Bill Alexander, Nibs Price, Howard Jones, Percy Haughton, Bill Roper and Tad Jones

nursed and nurtured them through the years.

The Modern Revolution of football however, dates from the 1940's when Clark Shaughnessy with his "Vow Boys" of Stanford . . . Frankie Albert, Pete Kmetovic, Hugh Gallarneau and Norm Standlee . . . put the fire to the torch which spread the "T Formation" around the nation.

Then a few years later came Don Faurot of the University of Missouri, with a modification which brought the "Split T" into existence with youthful disciples like Bud Wilkinson and the late Jim Tatum.

The Changing Face of Football!

Watch the Hurricane offense tonight and you will appreciate how the game has progressed and how a shrewd tactician like Gustafson has "gone modern" with it.

Veteran Miami fans readily will appreciate the Hurricane offense now bears no resemblance to that Jack Harding brought here in 1937 or even to the patterns used by Gustafson when he succeeded him in 1948.

And with change have come improvements . . . greater speed, increased mobility and a more open game to delight the fans.

I don't think anyone would want to retract the football steps to the offense of bygone seasons.

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## University of MIAMI COACHING STAFF



#### WALTER KICHEFSKI

For two decades, Walter Kichefski has been associated with University of Miami as a player and coach. He played varsity football on the 1936-1938-1939 Hurricane elevens, and won himself a place among all-time Miami end greats. He played with the Pitt Steelers 1940 through 1942, and has developed many great ends for Miami.

#### BILL CRUTCHFIELD

This fall marks Bill Crutchfield's first with the Hurricanes. He's defensive backfield coach. Bill came to Miami last spring after serving in various coaching capacities at Wake Forest, Furman, Presbyterian, Atlantic Christian College and North Carolina, where he also played fullback for the Tar Heels in 1947.



#### TOM BOYLE

Iom came to Miami two seasons ago as line coach, moving from Duke University where he served in the some capacity since 1951. His college playing days were at Tulane as a guard. He made All-Southern on the powerful undefeated Green Wave Sugar Bowl team of 1939, served as co-captain of the club in 1940 and achieved All-America both years.



#### TOM PRATT

This season marks Tom's fourth campaign as a member of the University of Miami coaching staff. Pratt is a former University of Miami guard great and made honorable mention All-America in his senior year in 1956. During his playing days with Miami, Pratt was rated one of the best guards to come out of Miami in the past decade.



#### JIM ROOT

Jim is a new addition to the University of Miami coaching staff, coming to the Hurricanes from Tulane. The 28-year-old Root starred as a quarterback 1949 through 1952 at Miami U. of Ohio. Jim quarterbacked the Chicago Cardinals in 1953, 19-56 and 1957, and played with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Proleague in 1954.



#### ARMAND VARI

Back in the early fifties, "Stitch" was offensive center on Andy Gustafson's great team of 1950, which upset Purdue of the Big Ten, after the Boiler Makers had beaten N.D. In 1958 he returned to his alma mater as a member of the UM varsity coaching staff and has been working with linemen since.



#### WHITIE CAMPBELL

Now entering his fourth year as a member of the University of Miami athletic staff, Campbell this fall takes over as freshman coach. Rated as one of the outstanding allround athletes in 35 years of UM sports, Whitie won 12 letters in the combined sports of football, basketball and baseball during an incredible four-year career.



#### DAVE WIKE

The job of keeping Hurricane athletes fit and ready for action is in the hands of Dave Wike, rated one of America's foremost trainers and a registered physical therapist. He was backfield star with the Hurricanes in 1939 and 1940, and in the former year set a Miami-Florida game punting record of 54.6 yards.



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
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

OF MIAMI launches the last half of its 1960 football schedule against the Florida State Seminoles tonight and its 3-2 record is better than the consensus of experts had believed possible. Many of them did not think the team would win three games this year, four was the average.

Win No. 4 won't come easy, though the chance is there tonight. The Seminoles have been very

tough the last two years and the Tallahassee outfit has many of the stars of those teams plus some talented sophomores including two fine quarterbacks.

And next week's Notre Dame tilt looms as a real tough battle all the way. The Irish, rebuilding this year, panicked during a second quarter against Pur-

due in their second game of the season and never showed any real signs of recovery until the last half of the Northwestern game two weeks back.

Last Saturday against Navy, Notre Dame showed that it had once more become a football team as it battled the unbeaten Middies to the final seconds before bowing 14-7. The quarterback spot, a headache all year, seems to have resolved itself with Passer George Haffner finally acquiring the poise needed to go with his other football talents.

Notre Dame has plenty of size, no longer will be pushed around this year. Untried sophomores of September are now playing like veterans and this Notre Dame losing streak isn't going to go on forever. Pitt, likely to be somewhat off its peak this week after the heady victory over Syracuse, may not be up for a mauling, smashing game against the Irish. Pitt is an up and down ball club —and from now on in, no foe can afford to be down against Notre Dame and still expect to win.

Syracuse is not the ball club it was in 1959 but the Orange will be more than a handful for most opponents any week. The Army meets Syracuse in New York City this week and the Army is likely

to feel the full fury of a rebounding Orange eleven. Army is 5-2 in a weak schedule, has lost to a far from great Nebraska club and to Penn State which has been bounced three times in six tries.

Syracuse does a fair amount of passing — the Orange completed 8 in 15 tries against Pittsburgh —but doesn't have the all around devastating attack —and possibly desire — which made it great in

Florida's Gators continue to get rave notices even in defeat. Injuries seem to make little difference as a new winning spirit has been instilled around Gainesville. Coach Ray Graves in his first year continues to come up with offensive maneuvers capable of confusing foes which seem unable to depart from the pattern of expecting conservative football from Florida.


Only Rice has made Florida look like a bad football team this year.

The annual Florida-Georgia dog fight is on the Saturday afternoon program in Jacksonville. The Bulldogs have not been impressive even though their won and lost record of 5-2 is identical with that of the Gators. Against their only mutual foe, Vanderbilt, Georgia won 18-7 and Florida won 12-0. This is a real showdown fight with the rivals boasting identical 3-1 marks in Southeastern conference play and each in a spot to receive a bowl bid by going on to victory in its remaining games. Georgia seems to have a shade more offense, Florida a more rugged defense.

Disaster has struck for the Air Force Academy which has not yet recovered from successive mid-October batterings from Missouri and the Navy. This week, the Falcons tangle with neighboring Denver and if they are going to do any winning before coming down to Miami, this seems to be the time.

Past Hurricane foes got a standoff — Auburn continued the tradition of getting a victory after meeting Miami. Pitt downed Syracuse in the big upset of the day but North and South Carolina lost. The Tarheels gave rugged Tennessee a real fight before bowing 27-14. No previous Tennessee foe had scored more than one TD and the Vols went into the game with 17 points scored against them in five games.



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#### ROBERT EGGERT

Guard from Appleton, Wis. . . . Junior . . . majors in Business . . . letters earned, 1 . . . Counted on for little service due to inexperience, Eggert came up with some of the most surprising offensive line plays of the year last fall and wound up taking over the alternate right guard post. He played enough to earn a letter as a sophomore. While not as big as most college guards go, Bob makes up for this in speed and football smartness. His tremendous blocking will keep him in there a lot when the Hurricanes go on offense this fall. Eggert played center in high school and during his stint as a freshman. He was moved to guard in the spring preceding 1959. He intends to go into the marketing field upon graduation.

#### WILLIAM DIAMOND

Guard from Miami, Fla. . . . Junior . . . majors in Physical Education . . . nickname, Bill . . . Switched from fullback to guard at the outset of 1959. Diamond played enough to earn a letter as a sophomore. He was a line stalwart until the Kentucky game when an injury shelved him for three games and allowed him only a token appearance in the finale against Florida. Bill was the only interior lineman to intercept a pass last fall, making the steal against LSU, his lone starting assignment. Diamond came to the Hurricanes from Miami's Archbishop Curley High, the school which produced All-America quarterback Fran Curci. He played fullback and tackle at Curley and was voted the school's most valuable player as a senior. He won three prep letters in football and track. For his hobbies, he goes in for hunting and fishing.

#### LARRY DIGIAMMARINO

Halfback from Malden, Mass. . . . Senior . . . majors in Physical Education . . . nickname, Digi . . . Larry was one of Miami's top sophomore backs in 1958, but suffered a leg injury during the FSU game last October and was out for remainder of the season. Digi was a real ball of fire the final half of '58, catching eight passes in the last three games (three came in a nationally televised win against Oregon), tied for the team's scoring lead and tallied TDs on passes against Houston and Florida, and on the ground against Houston. On defense in '58, his brilliance as a ball hawk helped shutout Oregon — he intercepted three passes against the Ducks, equaling Miami's all-time one-

game mark. Digi picked off two more enemy passes in a starting role against Tulane last fall, but his injury against FSU in the second game prevented him from earning a second letter. Larry is an infielder on the baseball team. He hopes to teach and coach after graduation. His recreation when away from football and baseball are tennis and handball.

#### GERALD REYNOLDS

Guard from Tampa, Fla. . . . Sophomore . . . majors in Physical Education . . . A so-called hard-nosed footballer, Reynolds was one of the men coming off the freshman team and displaying real line potentials in spring practice. Coaches are looking ahead to help from this Tampan whose talents lean more toward offense than defense. Jerry played for Chamberlain High in Tampa where he gained three letters in football and made the All-City, All-Western Conference and fourth team All-State. Fishing is his hobby, coaching is his ambition.

#### JAMES O'MAHONY

Guard from Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . Sophomore . . . majors in Business Administration . . . age 19, hgt. 6-1, wgt. 200 . . . Jim was guard and linebacker at Schenley High three years, making All-City, All-State and receiving the most valuable player award. A first stringer with the frosh last fall, O'Mahony continued his move forward in the spring and displayed a real potential for two-way football—enough so that he could wind up on the alternate team in his sophomore year. Jim earned three grid letters as a guard in high school, plus one in baseball as a left fielder. Fishing and hunting are his hobbies.

#### **WILLIAM WATTS**



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








### James Vollenweider


Halfback from Schofield, Wis. . . . Junior . . . majors in Industrial Arts . . . nickname, Volly . . . Almost lost in the shuffle as a freshman, Vollenweider caught fire in spring drills preceding 1959 and wound up making AP and UPI All-America honorable mention. He was the iron man of the '59 Hurricanes, playing all but one minute of the North Carolina game, 55 minutes against Michigan State and South Carolina, and in most other battles, 50 minutes or more. For his brilliance in leading Miami to victory over Michigan State, Jim was voted "Back of the Week" by the Florida Sports Writers Association (he scored one touchdown, gained 67 yards in 10 carries, recovered a fumble on the Miami 18 to stop a Spartan drive, intercepted a Michigan State pass with two minutes to go in the game to insure a Hurricane victory, and, on defense, made eight tackles). His terrific hitting both on offense and defense is just the cornerstone of his many abilities. He's an excellent pass receiver, topnotch blocker, has the drive to add extra yards every time he carries the ball—and has that extra knowledge which puts him at the right spot at the right time on defense. Here in chart are corner of Jerric's Livia, 1050. defense. Here in short are some of Jarrin' Jim's 1959 offensive feats: Was second in yards gained from scrimmage but had the highest average per carry among players carrying the ball 30 time or more (4.5)
. . . was second among backs in pass catching and pass interceptions . . . was No. 1 on kickoff returns . . . broke around end to score the winning TD against North Carolina . . . gained 77 yards against Florida . . . snagged four passes for 49 yards against Kentucky for his top pass catching night. A great ball hawk, Volly topped the Hurricanes in enemy fumble recoveries with three. On defense, he topped the corner backs with 41 tackles and assists (made six tackles in each of the Tulane, FSU and Navy games). Hard-hitting Jim can play three positions in the backfield, both halfbacks and full. While used at right half last fall, 1960 spring drills found him running at left half. On defense, he's corner linebacker. In golf, he was a 70 shooter. Jim made All-Conference and honorable mention All-State in prep football. During his prep career, he averaged 10 yards a carry and scored 35 touchdowns. He was junior class treasurer at D. C. Everest High. Jim plans a coaching and teaching career when finishing college.



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
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




### John Mayhew

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

#### ALVIN MIKEAL




#### **RAY TIMMONS**




