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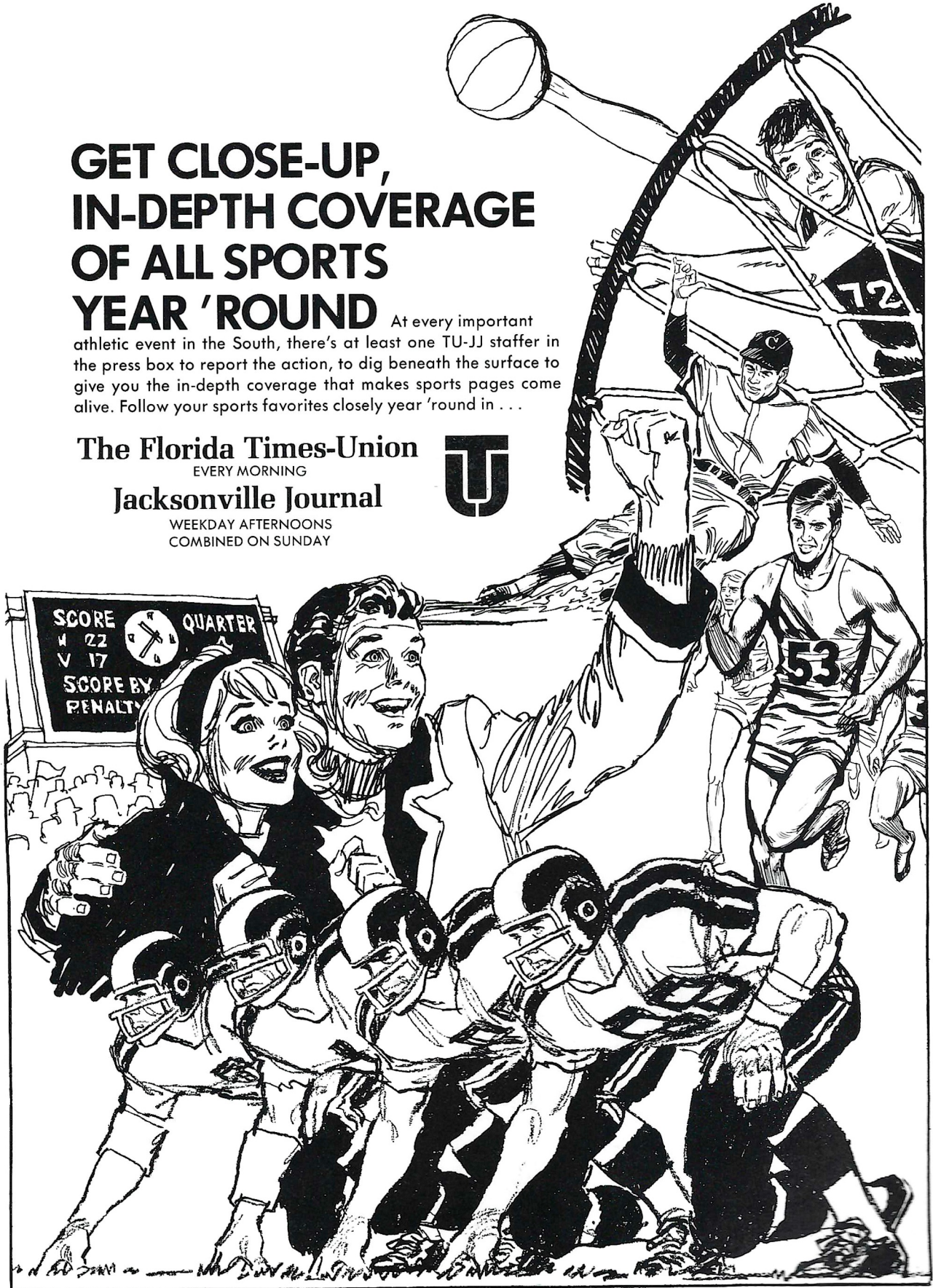
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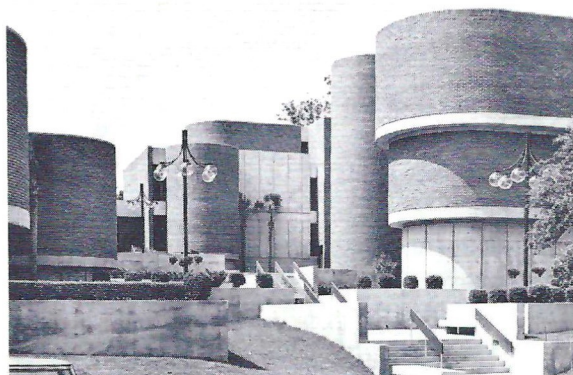




WELCOME TO FLORIDA STATE

THE 21st CENTURY'S GOALPOST: FLORIDA STATE

Florida State's position on the 30-yard-line of the 21st Century, in terms of academic research and instruction, places the University within field-goal distance of international distinction in 1970.



Already nationally recognized as a center of excellence in vital areas of scientific and technological progress, Florida State enters the decade of the 1970's with a momentum gained in more than a century of service to the state and nation. Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, and elevated to coeducational university status in 1947, the University has a current enrollment approaching 18,000 students in its 10 schools and colleges.



Its \$100 million physical plant creates a skyline of research towers on the western quadrangle of the campus —visible from the west stands of Campbell Stadium —and reaches eastward to a stone's-throw of the State Supreme Court, where the new College of Law Building is under construction. Now graduating some 5,000 students each year, Florida State is one of only two dozen universities in the country annually producing more than 100 doctorates.

The University's role as a senior leader among the State's nine-institution University System is one in which it takes great pride. More than 100 specialized fields of study are represented in the University's schools and colleges of arts and sciences, business, education, engineering science, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing and social welfare.

A SALUTE TO THE FRIENDS OF THE SEMINOLES

There are many reasons for the outstanding record of growth and achievement of the Florida State University in intercollegiate athletics during the past 23 years. Paramount among these are the loyal Seminole fans who fill the stands of Campbell Stadium for our home football games. The University is deeply grateful for the strong support our athletic programs have enjoyed through the years.

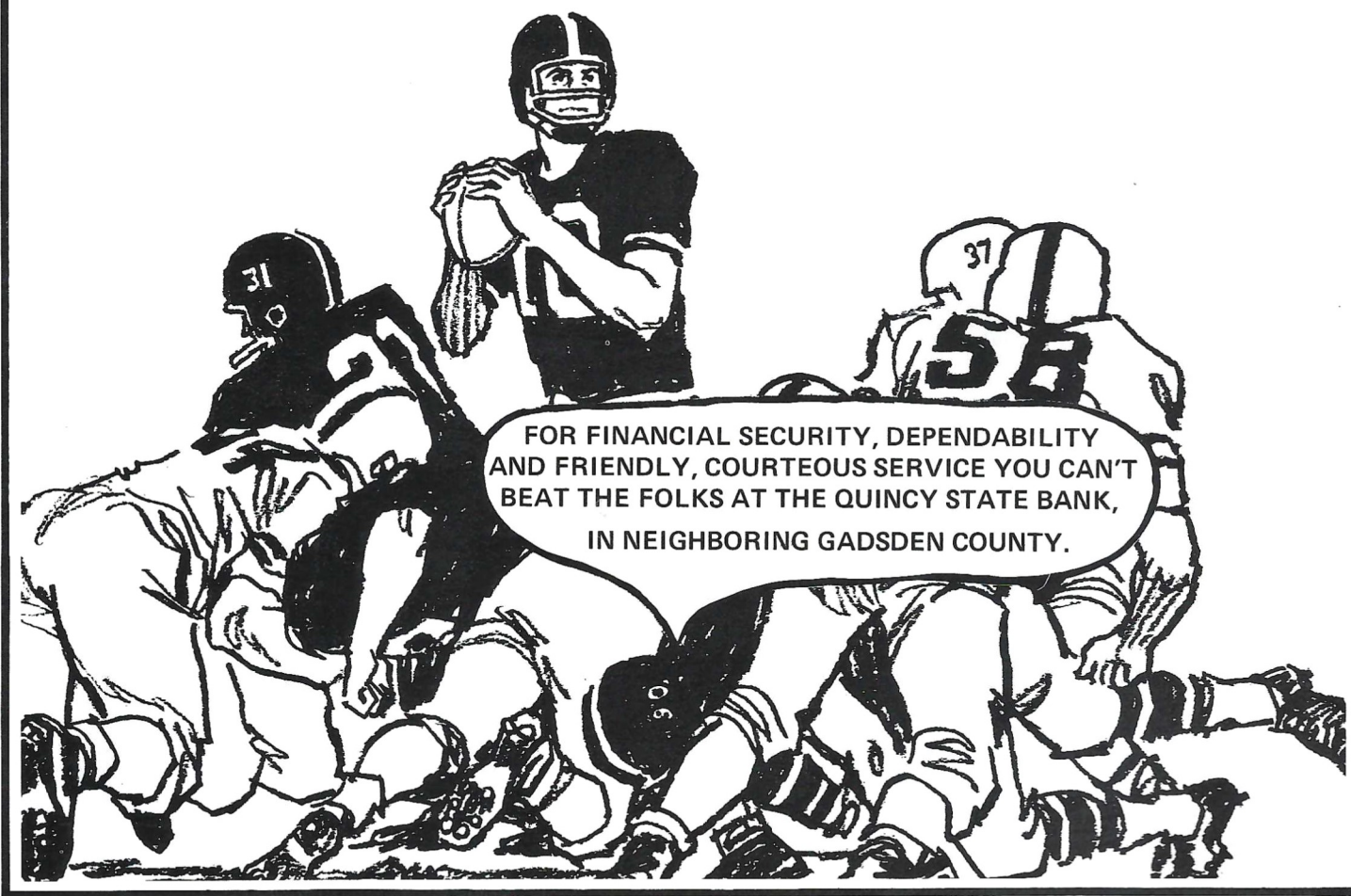

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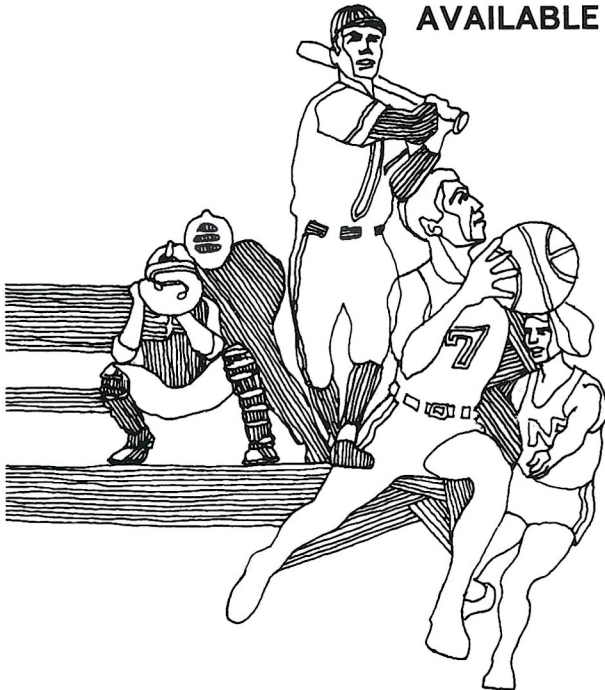
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TODAY'S GAME

This will be Florida State's third game against a Big 8 Conference foe, the other two have been in bowl contests.

The Seminoles lost to Oklahoma State 15-6 in the 1958 Bluegrass Bowl and defeated Oklahoma 36-19 in the 1965 Gator Bowl.

Kansas State, today's opponent, comes into their 1970 finale with a 6-4 record and was beaten by powerhouse Nebraska last week for the Big 8 crown.

Quarterback Lynn Dickey was a pre-season All-America pick and has broken every Big 8 Conference passing record. The 6-4, 213-pound senior was hampered early by a rib injury and this caused the Wildcats some trouble. He played just a little more than half the game when Kentucky downed K.S. 16-3 and missed the entire Arizona State contest as the Wildcats fell 35-13.

However, when Dickey became healthy, so did the Wildcats. Coach Vince Gibson's club went on to win four straight conference games and set up last week's league showdown against Nebraska. Included in that victory string were triumphs over Oklahoma (first at Norman since 1934) and Missouri (first at Manhattan since 1938).

The Wildcat running backs are Mike Montgomery and Bill Butler, a Tampa native. Montgomery is the son of offensive line coach Leroy Montgomery. Young Montgomery is also the Wildcats' leading pass receiver with 46 catches for 353 yards.

Kansas State's defense is led by tackle Ron Yankowski, considered one of the Big 8's best. End Mike Kuhn is another standout, having blocked his fourth punt of the season last week against Nebraska.

The Wildcat secondary, paced by halfback Clarence Scott and safety Mike Kolich, have played for three years.

Returning to Tallahassee will be like old home week for most of the Kansas State coaching staff. Gibson played and coached at Florida State, as did Don Powell, Gene McDowell and Y. C. McNeese. Bobby Jackson is a former Seminole assistant.

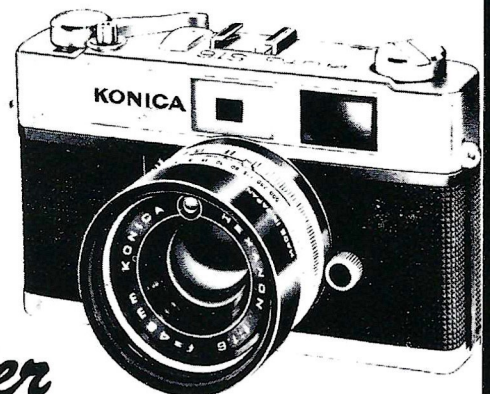
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Coaching Education . . .

A New Minor

For A Major Profession

When Tom Bailey swaps his football jersey for a sheepskin this year, will he be qualified to be a high school coach?

He will, as a matter of fact, but not just because he has been a star running back for the Seminoles.

Along with his B.S. degree, he will have a handsomely embossed "Coaching Education Certificate" earned by participating in the unique coaching minor program offered at Florida State University.

He is one of many Florida State athletes going well-prepared into a coaching career because of his studies in coaching education.

The University was the first in the nation to include this novel and practical curriculum in its Department of Physical Education. It still is one of a select few.

The man largely responsible for the addition of this program at Florida State is Dr. Don Veller. His "Chairman of Coaching Curriculum" hat is only one of many he wears as he divides his time between teaching, writing and serving as chairman of the Southern Scholarship, and Research Foundation.

Several years ago he almost singlehandedly started the coaching minor at Florida State, after surveying Florida high schools and learning that the number of coaching positions available exceeds the number of physical education teachers by more than two to one.

Twenty-five years ago Everybody's High School Athletic Hero easily had room on his varsity sweater for the three letters he'd won — in football, basketball and track.

Today, any athlete agile enough to letter in every sport offered by his high school couldn't find room to hang pins for each of his achievements.

Baseball, golf, tennis, track, swimming, wrestling, and gymnastics are considered major sports in some schools. Others offer competition in such activities as archery, rifle marksmanship, soccer, bowling and fencing.

Not only is there a greater range of sports activities today in our nation's high schools, but there is a greater number of teams for each activity. Result: a greater demand for coaches in each school system.

The implications of this coaching shortage were obvious to Dr. Veller, who concluded, "Our universities have an obligation to provide a curriculum to train students who wish to teach an academic subject, but who also want to coach."

Such a program, now in its fourth year at Florida State, provides 15 hours of coaching subjects, plus three hours of speech.

After all, even the best coach has to be able to communicate verbally.

The subjects include: care and prevention of injuries, administration of inter-scholastic athletics, principles and problems of coaching (mainly the psychology of coaching), and sports officiating.

In addition, the student must choose at least two coaching methods courses from the following sports: football, basketball, baseball, track, wrestling, gymnastics and swimming.

No claim is made that this, or any other combination of courses, will completely prepare a person for coaching athletics; but it definitely promises to give such students a head start.

Dr. Mode Stone, who was dean of the College of Education at the time the coaching minor program was begun, called it "absolutely essential that those planning to coach have the opportunity to study the thing they are going to be doing."

Old-timers will remember when the "coach" was frequently a former college athlete in the community who was called in to coach the high school team following his daily duties as doctor, lawyer or Indian chief.

As an example of what can and does happen, Dr. Veller cites two young men who go to the same Florida college and who both major in math.

One is a football hero, the other a drummer in the marching band. After graduation the athlete is hired, and considered qualified, as a coach. Would the drummer as easily get a job teaching music? Not likely.

"The impact of the coach on the lives of young people, both participants and student body (as well as adults in the community), is a vital one," Dr. Veller believes.

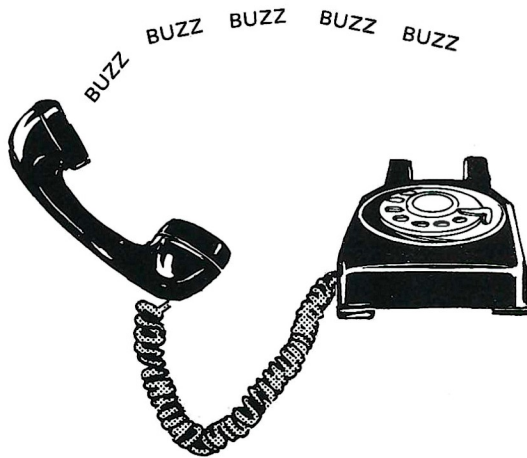


"Preparing and keeping the right kind of people in public school coaching jobs is a great responsibility, but it must be accomplished. We believe we have made a wholesome start toward this at Florida State University with the coaching education minor," he added.

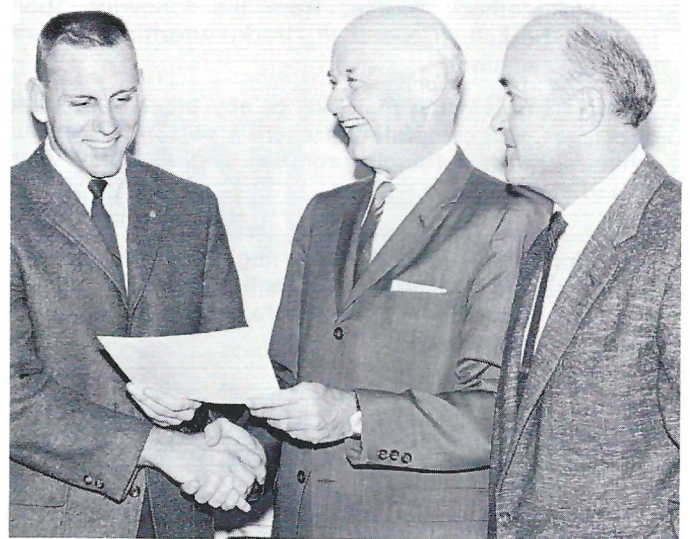


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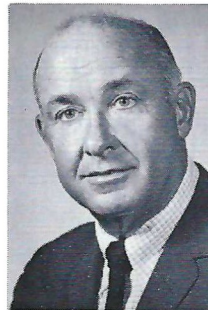

DR. VELLER

Dr. Don Veller is coaching curriculum chairman in the Department of Physical Education and Recreation at Florida State. He also is golf coach and executive director of the Southern Scholarship and Research Foundation (SSRF).

His 22 years at Florida State have included being head football coach. He came here in that capacity in 1948 and served until 1952, compiling a 30-win, 12-loss record.

He is a graduate of Indiana University, where, as a member of the varsity football team, he was honored twice as the most valuable player. For 10 years he was a high school and college basketball official in Indiana. He also coached high school football for seven years and was director of athletics, head football coach and track coach at Hanover College. Veller served as assistant football coach to Bo McMillin at Indiana University, where he received his B.S., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees.

His high scholastic average throughout his academic career gives little indication of his full participation in extra-curricular activities, as well as a variety of jobs. While in college, he worked in an auto plant foundry, on the Corn Borer Control Staff for the State of Indiana, in a garage, as a state highway laborer, as a fraternity steward and kitchen helper and as a writer and student assistant in the Indiana University News Bureau.

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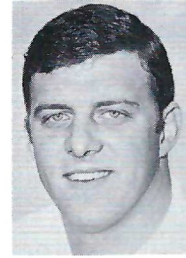
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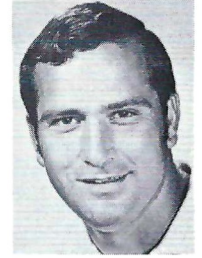

Don and wife Patty have three children.



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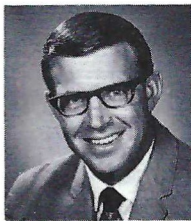

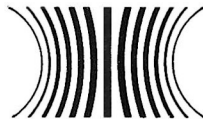

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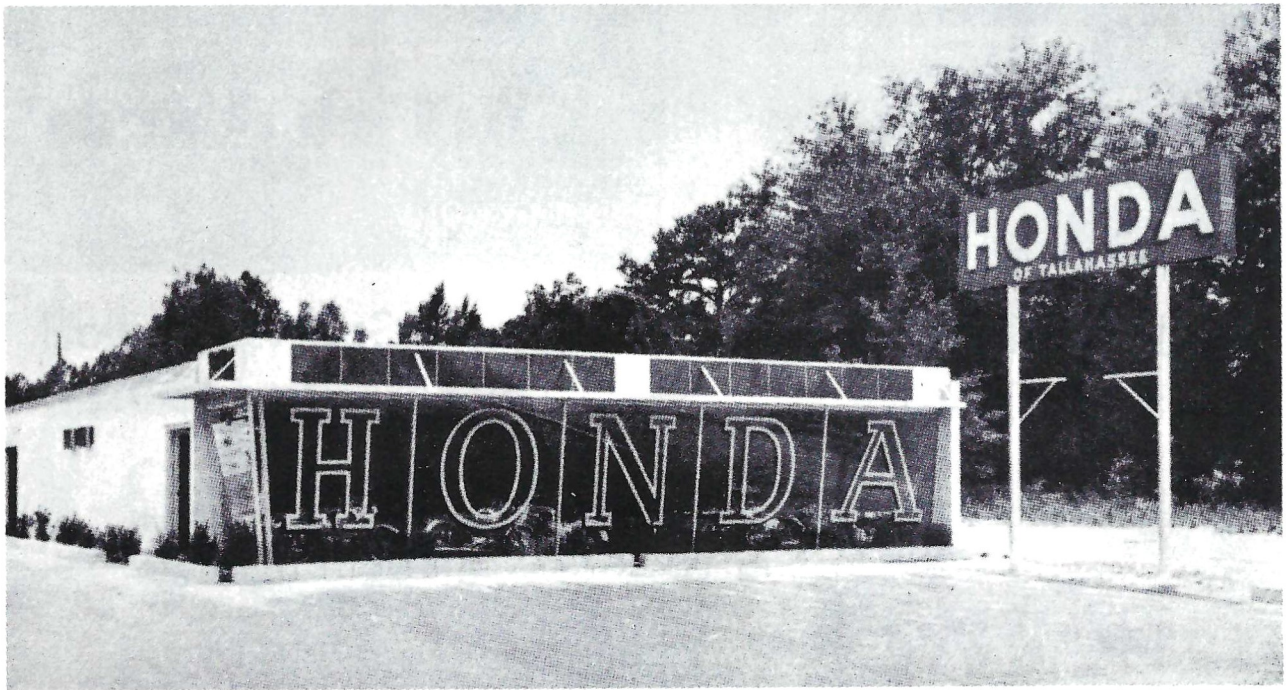
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THE VIKING BLOOD BANK

Meet the man who has given away more than 10,000 pints of blood. He personally has contributed no less than 62 pints, or close to eight gallons of his own. His name is Paul Schwegler. Four decades ago he was an All-America tackle at the University of Washington. In 1968, he was inducted into the National Football Hall of Fame.

Meet also some of the 220 football-oriented men who twice each year, if they are in Los Angeles, donate a pint of their blood to help those in dire need. Virile men all, most of them have a prominent football past, though some are standouts of other sports.

Over all, the personable, booming Schwegler, who has a heart THIS big, constantly stands as the prodding chief and cheerleader. When he grabs a fellow's lapels or buttonholes him, things happen. What has emerged is perhaps the most unique life-saving fraternity of its kind extant—The Viking Blood Bank.

It is quite a story, something different, something fine, something inspirational. It also is something that tugs at

you, and makes one glad to know such considerate and unselfish people are around.

The story was born in 1951. Schwegler, now a sales executive at 20th Century-Fox, was determined to help a friend in need, Robert Welch. Welch, who had produced NBC's "The Comedy Hour" television show, was suffering from a bleeding ulcer. Blood transfusions were desperately needed. Responding to Schwegler's hurried calls were 10 football pals. Over a period of months, no less than 124 pints of blood were donated for Welch. It kept him alive—for ten more years, in fact.

A Call for More Blood

So the story started. Now, 10,000 pints later, who can tell where this selfless giving to the less fortunate will end? Spurred by the stimulating motivation of the Welch case, Schwegler moved on a much wider scale. First he was heeding a rising call for more blood which emanated mostly from friends of the original donors. Then the pleas from far and wide mounted as the Welch story spread.

Schwegler had but one course—get more blood and get additional men, particularly former football players, to participate.

He went to Ken Hansen, the owner of Scandia, a Los Angeles restaurant. It was there that the 10 original contributors had met at noon on Mondays, prior to visiting the blood bank. They were part of a frolicsome group, called The Vikings, which lunched monthly on the day the restaurant was normally closed. Their Chief was Schwegler.

"Look, Ken," Schwegler said, "this group has been meeting at Scandia for some time before going down to the Red Cross headquarters. Why can't we give our blood right here? Can't we bring a mobile unit to the restaurant, have our usual lunch, and make a kind of party of it?"

"I'll not only go along," Hansen quickly responded, "I'll do more. I'll provide the lunch and the libation for everyone who comes and gives a pint of blood."

500 Pints Annually

The Red Cross was agreeable if 100 pints could be guaranteed. That was no problem whatever. The program is now in its 19th year. The Vikings hold their blood-giving get-together twice each year, in the spring and in the fall. They "play" to Scandia's capacity. That means 220 donors at a time, served by two mobile units. What with other contributions between times, the total bank "deposits" come to around 500 annually.

Two Red Cross units are set up in Scandia's main dining room. In attendance are one physician and 20 nurses. It is a compelling sight.

Besides Schwegler, past football luminaries who have contributed their blood include Dixie Howell, Aaron Rosenberg, Crazylegs Hirsch, Les Horvath, Al Wistert, Les Richter, Buck Compton, Bob De Lauer, Tom Fears, Mac Speedie, Sam Tsagalakis, Doyle Nave, Leon Clarke, Jack Pardee, Dick Hoerner, Ray Frankowski, Ernie Pincert, Nick Pappas, Ernie Smith, Gus Shaver, Hobbs Adams, Nate Barrager, George Murphy (the ex-USC star, not the United States Senator) and Jack Banta.

Van Johnson of movie fame once called upon Schwegler for blood for Elsie Janis and was a regular donor thereafter. Other contributors are Evelle Younger, Los Angeles County District Attorney, Peter Pitchess, the county Sheriff, and Attorney Paul Caruso.

Thanks largely to eight pints of Viking blood, Keith Higgins is alive and living a normal life today. In 1957, when eight years old, Higgins underwent the first open-heart surgery ever performed anywhere, at the USC School of Medicine.

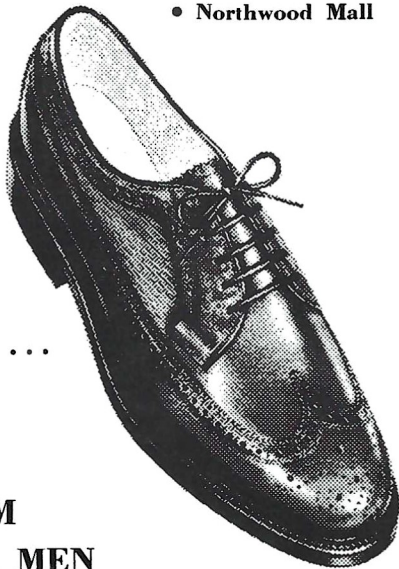

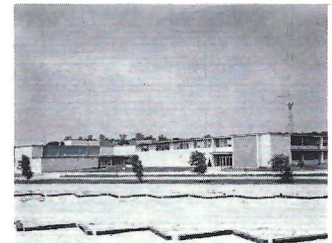
Kansas State University is proud of its heritage as a land-grant university. It was founded February 16, 1863, under the provisions of the Morrill Act, which has just recently been signed by President Abraham Lincoln.

In the hundred years since its founding the University has developed more than 50 departments integrated under Colleges of Agriculture, Architecture and Design, Arts and Sciences, Commerce, Education, Engineering, Home Economics, and Veterinary Medicine. The instruction offered has changed with the economy of Kansas, from primarily agricultural toward a more diversified and industrial society. In recent years course requirements have been broadened to supplement specialized vocational training with more liberal education.

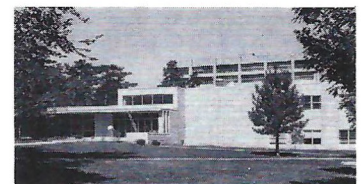

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SPOTLIGHT Basketball

In four years, Hugh Durham has taken the Seminole basketball program from mediocrity to one of the finest in the nation. During the last three seasons, Florida State basketball teams have won 60 of 79 games and ranks 15th in winning percentage over that period.

Last year the Seminoles' 23-3 mark was among the 10 best in the country. They were first in rebounding, fifth in average scoring margin (the difference between points scored and points given up per game) and eight in team offense.

Willie Williams led the nation in field goal percentage and Dave Cowens was fourth among the rebounders.

William and Cowens are gone this year, but Durham thinks the Seminoles still will be a team to be reckoned with. "It is not a question of whether we will be good or not," he says. "But if we will be as **good** as last year."

The team this season will not have the "muscle", especially on the boards, that Cowens and Williams supplied so effectively. That means there will be more finesse and emphasis on sounder fundamentals.

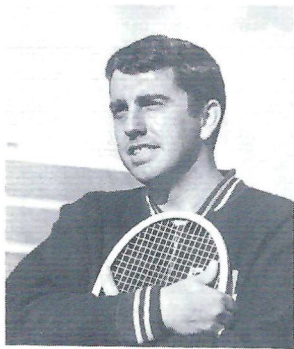
Quickness is the key to Florida State's 1970-71 team. "I don't think any team in the country can match our quickness down through 12 men," says Durham. "Maybe the first five, but not through 12."

That means a lot of pressing and fast breaking for the Seminoles hoping to wearing the opponents out. It also adds up to exciting basketball for the fans.

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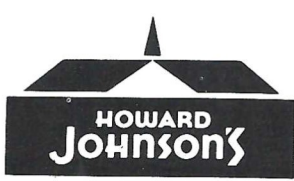
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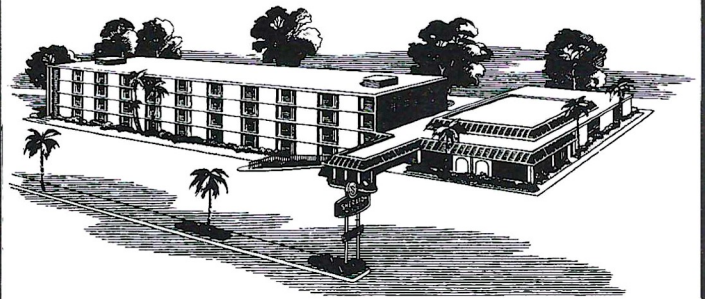
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STADIUM INFORMATION & CONCESSIONS

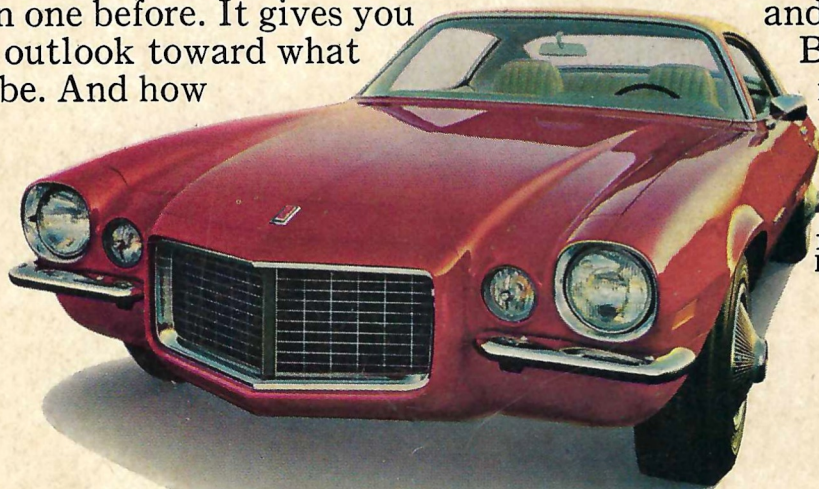
