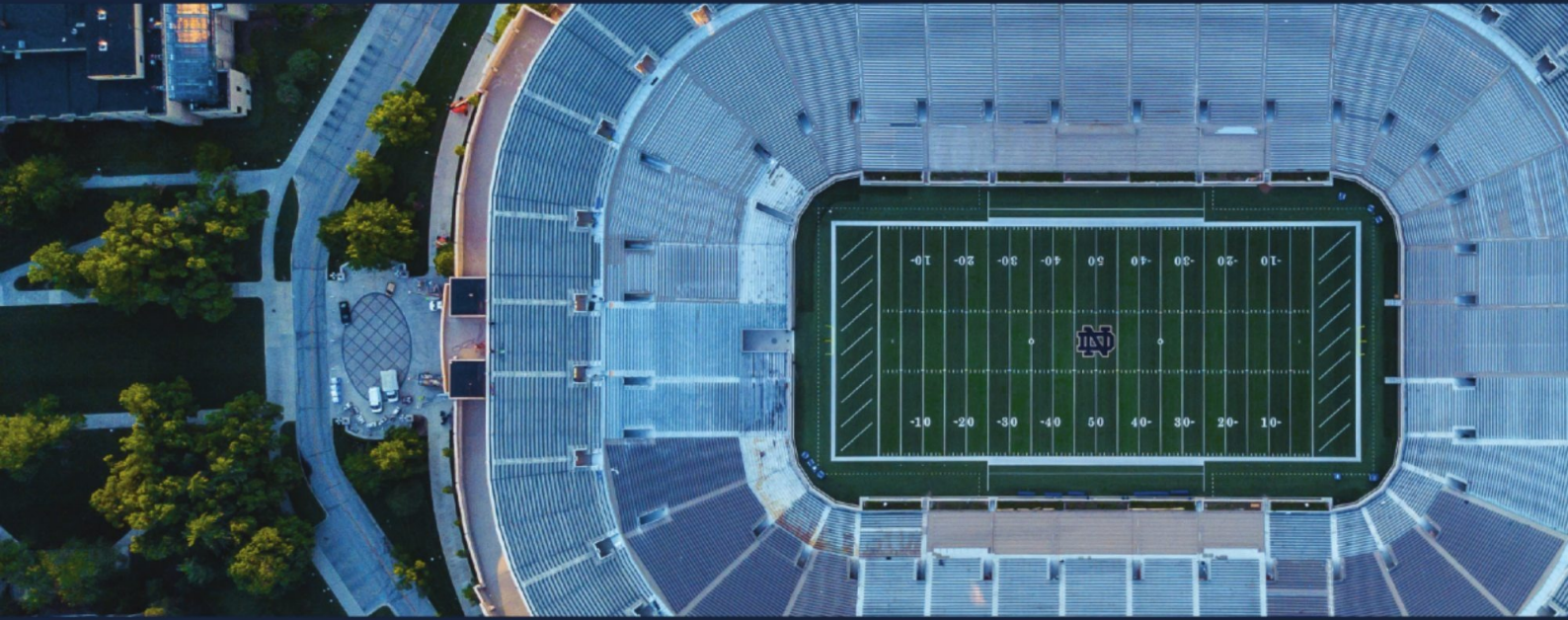

IN MEMORIAM SGT. TIM MCCARTHY

The University of Notre Dame football family was saddened to report the loss of former Indiana State Police Sergeant Tim McCarthy on October 2, 2020, after battling a long illness. McCarthy was an indelible part of the Notre Dame football game day tradition, providing traffic safety messages that began with "May I have your attention please?"

To honor his legacy as part of the Notre Dame experience, we are re-running a feature on McCarthy which was written in 2015, the season he made his final in-person appearance in Notre Dame Stadium.

"YOU WON'T BE TAKEN TO THE CLEANERS...IF YOUR DRIVING IS SPOTLESS."

A University of Notre Dame legend has departed after 55 seasons of leaving fans laughing, groaning or grimacing at Irish home football games.

Former Indiana State Police Sgt. Tim McCarthy, who had been offering his late-game traffic safety messages (and generally an accompanying pun) at Irish home football contests since late in the 1960 campaign, announced in April he was retiring from that role.

McCarthy also helped direct traffic at Irish games for many years until his retirement from that job in 1979.

"It's hard work keeping vehicles from crashing into each other and from crashing into you," he says.

Born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, McCarthy also served until 1987 as Porter County sheriff and still lives in the Valparaiso, Indiana, area. His wife, Carole, also worked for the sheriff's department, and his father was a career police officer in Fort Wayne.

Yet it's been McCarthy's end-of-the-third-period messages over the Notre Dame Stadium public address system that—like the "Play Like A Champion Today" sign, the Hesburgh Library mural (dubbed "Touchdown Jesus") and the "Win One for the Gipper" saga—turned him into an iconic figure relative to the Notre Dame football experience.

Ironically, the first two messages McCarthy offered at the end of that 1960 season were delivered with a serious tone. In the offseason he made a decision to add a quip at the end of each safety tip, and he began that with the 1961 season in hopes

of increasing the effectiveness of his remarks.

"When I began using the quips, it resulted in a barrage of loud reactions from the crowd," says McCarthy. "Then it graduated to where the fans began listening for it and it would be quiet enough to hear the entire message."

And he's forever thankful that he never took his wife's advice to drop the humor.

"My wife asked me if there were many boos and groans, and I told her there were a few. She suggested stopping the quips. I told her absolutely not because at least now the fans are listening to the entire message just to hear how corny the quip will be."

The end result? McCarthy became an integral part of the fabric of a Notre Dame football weekend—and his opening line, "May I have your attention please? This is Tim McCarthy with the Indiana State Police," became one of the institutions of a home football Saturday.

While timeouts and other breaks in the action are now scripted, veteran Notre Dame Stadium public-address announcer Mike Collins remembers not so long ago when he and McCarthy at times struggled to fit the message into the game.

"The tradition lately has been for Tim to read his message at the end of the third period. But, not that long ago, we were not connected to the bands by headsets the way we are now. It wasn't uncommon for one of the bands to launch into a song at a timeout, and so it might take four or five or six breaks before we could fit him in somewhere in the second half."

In fact, Collins, who worked his 200th Irish home game in the 2015 season opener versus Texas, became fast friends with

McCarthy. They even collaborated on a 2009 book, "May I Have Your Attention Please ... Wit & Wisdom from the Notre Dame Press Box." They still have breakfast or lunch together about once per month.

After 55 years on the job, McCarthy had more than his share of stories:

"In the old (Notre Dame Stadium) press box I generally watched the game from the outside balcony where the television cameras were set up. State troopers wear a 'campaign' style hat with a metal badge on the front. It was a close game, and when the Irish scored the winning touchdown I jumped up to cheer. The top of my head hit an overhead steel beam, and I soon realized my head was bleeding. The hat badge had scraped through my scalp. I pulled the hat down tight to keep the blood from leaking out and drove to the hospital emergency room and required six stitches."

"From the balcony of that same old press box was a view of what was then a fans' parking lot. During one game I noticed some youths breaking into cars. I pointed this out to longtime South Bend Tribune photographer Dutch Henning. I had him take a close-up photo. Dutch developed it and gave it to the sheriff's department who used it to identify and arrest the youths."

"It's not unusual to see a well-known celebrity in the press box. Prior to game time the elevator to the press box is always busy. One day I noticed former world boxing champion Muhammad Ali crowded in with me. By accident, Ali stepped on my shoe. As he turned to excuse himself, I said, 'Perfectly okay, Champ, no problem whatsoever.' Later he was seen patiently signing autographs for his fans. I wondered if he would sign the top of my shoe, but I didn't ask."

"At another game former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and some friends boarded the elevator. I never saw a person so happy and so bubbly as her."

I later learned the reason she likely was so happy is because she hit a hole-in-one on the Notre Dame Golf Course that morning."

Collins has a few stories, too:

"My first game doing the PA was the first night game at Notre Dame Stadium against Michigan in 1982. Even with the temporary lighting at the stadium, it was so dark in the PA booth I had to hold up a lighter so Tim could see."

"I can't tell you how many times I'll be in the booth and I'll sense there's someone behind me and I'll turn around. And they'll say, 'Where's Tim McCarthy?' None of these people know what he looks like, and yet he's like some kind of a rock star."

For years, McCarthy was simply the voice in the wilderness at Irish games. Slowly but surely that changed. In 1992, the University published a book titled "Notre Dame Football Today" that included a feature piece and full-page photo of McCarthy at the stadium. McCarthy earned more and more invitations to more and more events, often related to delivering some sort of message akin to his safety puns. He had—somewhat grudgingly—become a celebrity in his own right.

The Notre Dame Monogram Club presented him with an honorary monogram in 2013.

"For years the Stadium crowd never saw my face. After I began appearing at some University and student events is when I became recognized. Students saying hello while walking through campus is really a happy experience for me. I appeared at a few pre-game rallies, some of the student hall rallies and always at the Dillon Hall rally. It was always enjoyable to be at student events because those young men and women are the very best. Always number one in my book," says McCarthy.

Little did McCarthy know when he accepted the job as safety education officer for the Indiana State Police what a career it would become. When he retired from the state police in 1979 he thought that might be the end of his role at Notre Dame Stadium, but then-athletics director Moose Krause invited him to continue.

The rest is history, all based on a series of three-inch-by-five-inch index cards on which McCarthy typed each message—and he saved them all.

"It's been a long run, and it's something I've particularly enjoyed," he says.

For someone who never coached, carried, threw or kicked a football at Notre Dame Stadium, McCarthy left an indelible mark on the football program at the University of Notre Dame.

Even if most fans still have no idea what he looks like.

"The trip home will be heavenly ... if you drive like an angel."

WOMEN'S SOCCER

At the halfway point of the fall season, the Notre Dame Women's Soccer Team sits at 3-1 and riding a three-game winning streak. The Irish have pitched shutouts in each of the three wins over Miami FL (6-0), Boston College (2-0) and Syracuse (2-0).

The win over Miami was the largest conference win by the Irish since joining the ACC in 2013. The streak has been propelled by senior Sammi Fisher and sophomore Kiki Van Zanten. Van Zanten leads the ACC with goals in conference games with six and they have all come in the previous three games. She recorded her first career hat trick in the win over Miami, the 70th hat-trick all-time in Notre Dame history. Fisher is second on the squad with three goals on the year after leading the team last season with five goals.



VOLLEYBALL

The Irish volleyball team has vaulted into the top-10 of the AVCA Fall Coaches Poll after a 3-0 start. Notre Dame opened with a road sweep of Louisville before taking down fifth-ranked Syracuse in consecutive matches inside Purcell Pavilion.

Freshman libero Hattie Monson was named the ACC's Freshman of the Week on September 29 while classmate Lindsey Miller leads the conference with a hitting percentage of .532.

The Irish will be in action four more times this fall, including a pair of nationally-televised home matches against Pittsburgh on October 16 & 18 via ESPNU and ACC Network.

Sophomore Michael Pellegrino tallied Notre Dame's goal against No. 4 Pittsburgh on September 26.



MEN'S SOCCER

The Notre Dame men's soccer team is 1-2 on the young season, facing a battle through an Atlantic Coast Conference schedule that features three teams ranked in the nation's top five.

A season-opening win over No. 4 Kentucky (1-0) was followed by close battles with No. 4 Pittsburgh (1-3) and No. 20 Louisville (1-2).

All eight of Notre Dame's scheduled fall contests in 2020 feature teams that competed in last season's NCAA Championship tournament.



The Irish women's cross country team has two meet titles so far in 2020 and will be one of the teams to beat at the ACC Championship.

CROSS COUNTRY

The Irish men's and women's cross country teams are facing a limited fall schedule this season due to the national COVID-19 pandemic, but both squads have flashed the potential to capture the ACC Championship.

Notre Dame swept Louisville at the Irish Classic on September 19, with the men's team led by first-place finisher senior Yared Nuguse and the women by sophomore Jessica Schneider – also in first place.

The women's team then earned the title at the Louisville Classic on October 3, led again by Schneider in sixth place.

The ACC Championship will be competed in Cary, North Carolina, on October 30.

The University of Notre Dame football team improved its home field win streak to 20 games on Saturday, September 19, 2020, with a 52-0 win over USF. Scoring four rushing touchdowns on their first four possessions, the Irish never looked back and earned the fourth defensive shutout of the Brian Kelly era at Notre Dame.



Focused on getting off to a fast start against the Bulls, the Irish scored in seven plays on the first drive of the game when quarterback Ian Book (No. 12) galloped around the right side of the line for a four-yard touchdown run.



Notified that he would be a starter at linebacker the morning of the game against USF, sophomore Jack Kiser (No. 24) ended up recording one of the most noteworthy starting debuts in Notre Dame history. Recording a tackle for loss on the second defensive play of the game, Kiser would eventually lead the team with eight tackles and earn the game ball from head coach Brian Kelly.



Another quick drive for the Irish on their second possession - another seven plays - led to freshman Chris Tyree's (No. 23) one-yard plunge to put the Irish ahead 14-0.

Ian Book (No. 12), helped by the Irish offensive line and center Jarrett Patterson (No. 55), finished off another touchdown drive in the second quarter with a one-yard run to provide a 21-0 lead.



Jack Kiser was not the only Irish player pressed into a starting role against South Florida. Freshman cornerback Clarence Lewis (No. 26) stepped up in the defensive backfield to log five tackles and three passes broken up.



Notre Dame's fourth rushing touchdown of the first half showed the team's depth of talent at the running back position. Junior C'Bo Flemister (No. 20) breaks into the open and dashes 26 yards for the score. Flemister recorded his first career 100-yard rushing game against USF with 127 yards on 13 carries.

Tremble's catch was initially called out-of-bounds, but it ended up - under further replay review - to be the early-season candidate for 'Catch of the Year.' Tremble (pictured) battles with USF's Jason Vaughn for control of the ball while also getting his foot down in the field of play.



RALLY

Tremble rips the ball away from Vaughn to complete a 27-yard catch. The junior from Johns Creek, Georgia, is quickly establishing himself as one of the best tight ends in the nation.

The special teams also contributed to the scoring against USF. Sophomore Osita Ekwonu (No. 34) blocks a USF punt in the third quarter...



... which is scooped up for the touchdown by freshman Jordan Botelho (No. 17).



With the game firmly in Notre Dame's control, freshman quarterback Drew Pyne (No. 10) made his Notre Dame debut in the third quarter. He only threw the ball twice, but led the Irish on their final scoring drive of the day to provide the 52-0 final score.



Including Pyne, a number of Notre Dame players were able to make their Notre Dame debuts and Alex Ehrensberger (No. 98) will not soon forget his first play in an Irish uniform. The freshman defensive end sacked the quarterback to punctuate a stellar defensive team performance for Notre Dame.

FOCUS: Just as our Student-Athlete Advisory Council did such an effective job during the past school year in drawing attention to the mental health challenges of our students, we are asking our student-athletes to help us make issues relating to social justice our focus during the coming academic year.

DIVERSIFY: We will build a more diverse professional staff and better educate our current staff in order to more effectively serve all of our student-athletes.

ENGAGE: We will increase and improve the quality of our engagement with all segments of the communities that surround our university. We recognize the positive impact that many of the efforts in which our student-athletes are already involved have produced, but if we are to maximize our reach and our impact, we need to take a more centralized and sustained approach.

VOTE: In this, a national election year that will play such an important role in defining the future direction of the country, we will make voter education and participation a priority for students and staff.

While each of the foregoing represent a firm commitment, they are also only a starting point for our efforts. The way forward will ultimately depend on the ideas each of us contributes and the commitments we make.

We look forward to working with our student-athletes, coaches, staff, faculty and community to bring this plan to life.

DEAR AMERICA,

As a mixed man and someone who identifies as black, I want you to know, I'm in pain. For years this pain has grown within me, but I can no longer stay silent. None of us can. Look around the world, look outside, or look at social media. Is this what we want?

Are we so blind as a nation to neglect such a large portion of our country we claim is "the home of the free," that we won't admit that everyone isn't free?

As I woke up today, I felt the need to truly speak up. The nation I grew up loving is failing, and justice has yet to be served. George Floyd's tragic death struck the hearts of all black men and women around the world, and it forced us to take action.

I beg of you, please do not look at the riots and looting as an issue for this country. For so long the issues and crimes that Black men and women have endured have been overlooked by White America. Look at these actions as a cry for help. We are drowning in a sea of neglect and are desperately trying to swim. We demand justice.

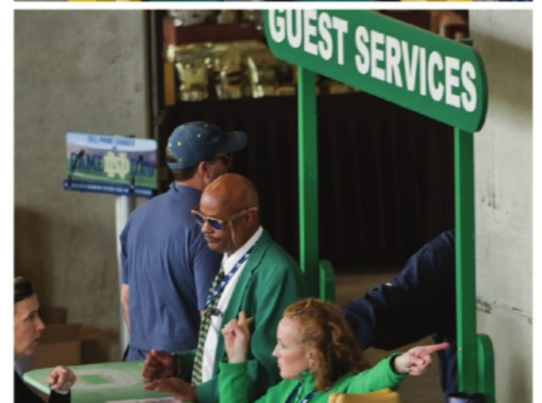

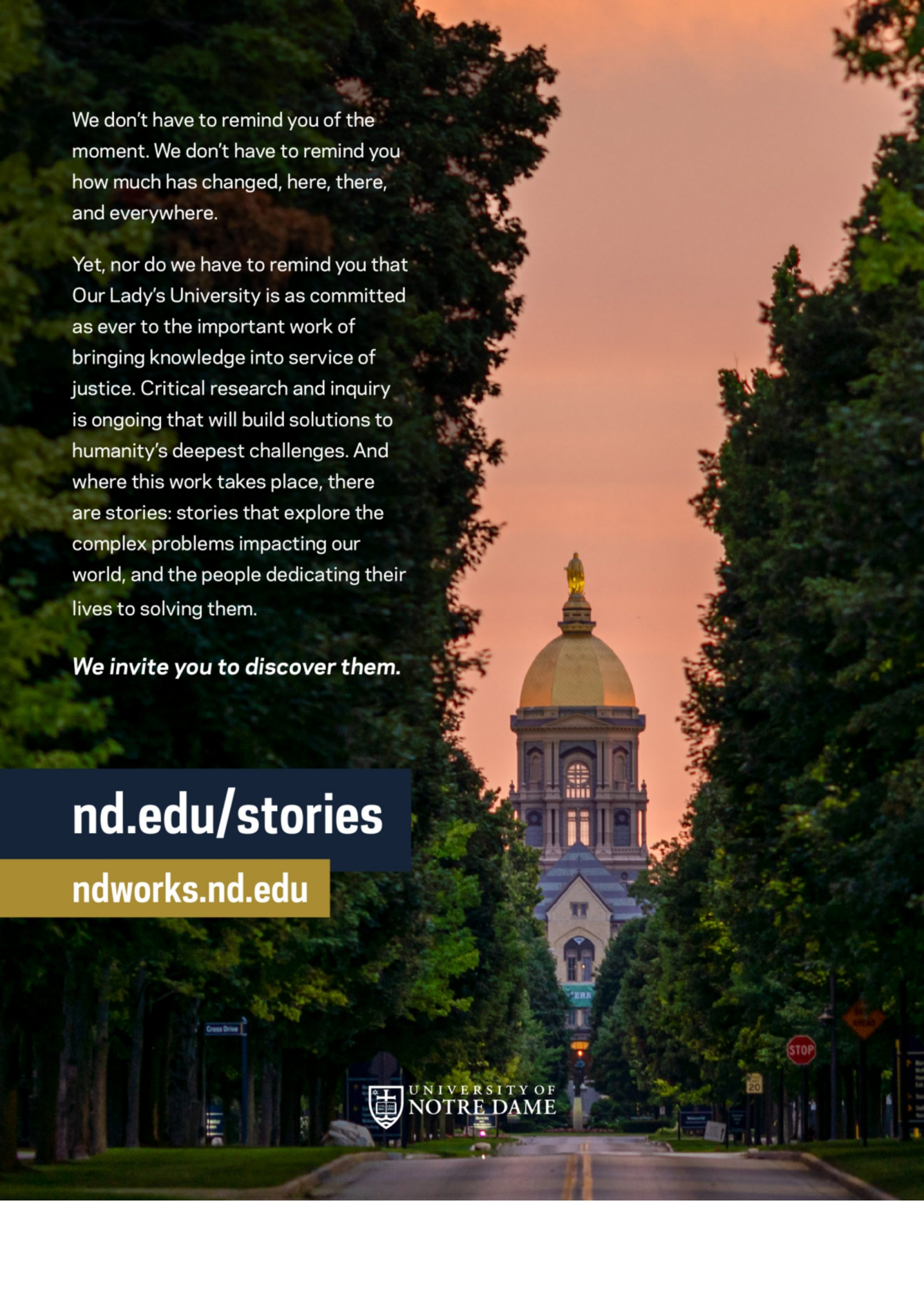

**REV. JOHN

Elected in 2005 as the University of Notre Dame's 17th president, Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., was re-elected by the Board of Trustees to a fourth five-year term, effective July 1, 2020.

As president, he has devoted himself to fostering the University's unique place in academia, the Church, our nation, and the world.

Father Jenkins has been committed to combining teaching and research excellence with a cultivation of the deeper purposes of Catholic higher education. While pursuing academic distinction, he has brought renewed emphasis to Notre Dame's distinctive mission, rooted in the tradition of the Congregation of Holy Cross, the University's founding community, to educate the whole person—mind, body, and spirit—to do good in the world.

These commitments have been made manifest in the University's dedication to excellence in undergraduate education in the classroom and beyond, while simultaneously building a reputation as a preeminent research institution—all in the context of Notre Dame's Catholic identity.

In June 2019, the University and the Vatican co-sponsored a conference in Rome titled "The Energy Transition and Care for Our Common Home." Pope Francis and Cardinal Peter Turkson, prefect of the Vatican's Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development, addressed conference attendees, as did Father Jenkins. At the conclusion of the conference, most of the executives from among the world's leading energy producers and investors signed statements in support of carbon pricing and disclosures on climate change risk.

Most recently, Fr. Jenkins has directed the University's ongoing efforts to protect the health and safety of the University community amid the challenges of the coronavirus pandemic while carrying forward the University's mission of scholarship and discovery. Among many decisions, he suspended in-person classes in March 2020, then announced the resumption of primarily in-person instruction on campus for the 2020-21 academic year.

Construction of new academic buildings and residence halls as well as other investments in the University's infrastructure, scholarly programs, and international reach during Father Jenkins's tenure have helped Notre Dame to solidify its stature as one of the nation's leading universities, and to advance his vision of making it "one of the preeminent research institutions in the world, a center for learning whose intellectual and religious traditions converge to make it a healing, unifying, enlightening force for a world deeply in need."

As a result of these efforts, Notre Dame has been highly competitive in recruiting the best students, faculty, and staff and in attracting more than \$180 million in fiscal year 2019 in outside research funding. Recent research initiatives include the completion of the country's largest quiet Mach 6 hypersonic

wind tunnel; the development of the Notre Dame Turbomachinery Laboratory, a public-private partnership that studies and tests new gas turbine engine technologies; the use of nanotechnology to address climate change and post-silicon computer technology; and nuclear physics research on the evolution of our cosmos. On a global scale, two Notre Dame biologists are leaders of a \$23 million grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in the fight against malaria and dengue fever.

In the 2017-18 academic year, Notre Dame completed the largest construction project in its history with the opening of the 770,000-square-foot Campus Crossroads Project, in which leading-edge teaching, research, student life, hospitality, performance, and digital technology buildings were built around the exterior of Notre Dame's iconic football stadium. The additions have brought students, faculty, and others engaged in scholarly, artistic, and athletic pursuits in close proximity while optimizing underused space to preserve the pedestrian character of the Notre Dame campus. Among many other campus construction projects, Notre Dame in the winter of 2019 opened the Walsh Family Hall of Architecture and in the fall of 2017 opened Jenkins and Nanovic Halls, the new home to the Keough School of Global Affairs and the Departments of Sociology, Political Science, and Economics.

Father Jenkins has also strengthened Notre Dame's relationship with the South Bend community in tangible ways, including leadership in the Indiana Regional Cities Initiative, which brought \$42 million to the three-county region for economic development projects; formation of the Labs for Industry Futures and Transformation, which will enhance and link cutting-edge expertise, technologies, workforce development programs, and innovation-based facilities through the surrounding communities with a \$42.4 million award from Lilly Endowment Inc.; support and staffing of the Robinson Community Learning Center, a learning center and gathering space for the community now in new quarters just south of the campus; construction of the mixed-use commercial and residential Eddy Street Commons project; and the expansion of the IDEA Center at Innovation Park where technology-driven research helps to create jobs locally. Notre Dame's local economic impact amounts to approximately \$2.5 billion annually and the direct and indirect employment of some 16,700 people.

All of these advances, Father Jenkins said, "would not be possible without outstanding students and faculty, the skill and dedication of our executive team, the guidance of our Trustees along with their generosity and that of alumni and other friends, as well as the careful stewardship of our resources."

Recognizing the high cost of education, the University under Father Jenkins' leadership has continued to increase financial aid, providing assistance to students with demonstrated need. The University provides more than \$150 million in aid for undergraduates, a total that has more than doubled in the past decade and will increase dramatically in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic. Nearly half of all students receive

such aid, which does not require repayment, and the median grant for first-year students is more than \$42,000.

Under Father Jenkins's leadership, Notre Dame has increased the diversity of its student population, achieving the highest percentage of students from underrepresented groups in the University's history. He leads the President's Oversight Committee on Diversity and Inclusion to sustain focus on this important issue across the University.

Within the University and beyond, Father Jenkins has called for civil discourse—grounded in the Christian view of others as equally made in the image of God—as a way to find common ground rather than demonize those with different opinions. In a speech at Emory University in 2011, he said: "If we choose to attack our opponents before we have taken the time to understand them, if we prefer denunciations to genuine dialogue, if we seek political victory rather than constructive compromise ... we will not be able to find solutions to the problems before us."

The Commission on Presidential Debates, a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that sponsors and produces all U.S. presidential and vice presidential debates, cited his leadership on this issue in electing Father Jenkins to its board of directors in 2011.

A philosopher trained in theology and a member of Notre Dame's Department of Philosophy since 1990, Father Jenkins earned undergraduate and advanced degrees from Notre Dame, a doctorate of philosophy from Oxford University, and a master of divinity and licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology.

Prior to assuming the presidency, Father Jenkins was vice president and associate provost of Notre Dame. A recipient of a Lilly Teaching Fellowship in 1991-92, he is the author of the book *Knowledge and Faith in Thomas Aquinas*, and of numerous scholarly articles published in *The Journal of Philosophy*, *Medieval Philosophy and Theology*, and the *Journal of Religious Ethics*.

Father Jenkins was elected a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2010, and a year later appointed to the academy's Commission on the Humanities and Social Sciences, which is dedicated to the advancement of teaching and research in these disciplines. A popular teacher, he has taught courses on ancient and medieval philosophy, faith and reason, and Thomas Aquinas.

Fr. Jenkins was appointed to the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities board of directors in February 2006 and served through January 2012, when his term ended. He is a recipient of the Ellis Island Medal of Honor, awarded to those demonstrating outstanding qualities in their personal and professional lives, while maintaining the richness of their ethnic heritage. He was also the 2009 recipient of the American Irish Historical Society's Gold Medal, and in 2015 he received the Spirit of Francis National Award from Catholic Extension for supporting and encouraging future leaders of the Catholic Church throughout his career.

Father Jenkins holds honorary degrees from Benedictine College, the University of San Francisco, and Aquinas College.

Marie Lynn Miranda began her tenure as Charles and Jill Fischer Provost of the University of Notre Dame on July 1, 2020, the fifth provost at Notre Dame since the position was established in 1970. The University's second-ranking officer, the provost is elected by the Board of Trustees and, at the direction of the president, exercises overall responsibility for the academic enterprise.

A distinguished scholar in the field of children's environmental health, Miranda is especially well-known for her research on childhood lead exposure. She served as provost at Rice University from 2015-19 and as dean of the University of Michigan's School of Natural Resources and Environment for the four years prior to that.

"As the first American-born member of an immigrant family, I have benefited tremendously from the transformative power of education," Miranda said when her appointment as Charles and Jill Fischer Provost was announced. "I am grateful on a daily basis for the opportunity that Notre Dame made available to my father, and consequently to my entire family, when he was invited to undertake graduate studies at the University many years ago. I am

both deeply honored and excited to serve the Notre Dame community."

In addition to her responsibilities as provost, Miranda is a professor of applied and computational mathematics and statistics at Notre Dame, maintaining an active research portfolio. She is a leader in the rapidly evolving field of geospatial health informatics and is the founding director of the Children's Environmental Health Initiative (CEHI), a research, education, and outreach program committed to fostering environments where all people can prosper. Her interest in the joint effects of social and environmental exposures has led her to study the impact on health of racial residential segregation in particular.

Miranda's research has generated more than \$60 million in funding from federal, state and foundation sources, including the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the National Association of Chronic Disease Directors, the United States Department of Agriculture, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the Environmental Defense Fund, among others. Her research group at CEHI was among the inaugural winners of the EPA's Environmental Justice Achievement Award in 2008.

As the provost at Rice, Miranda was responsible for developing and implementing plans for \$230 million in strategic programmatic investments

as well as over \$250 million in major renovations of university facilities. She placed an emphasis on the success of first-generation students and those from lower socioeconomic backgrounds, a focus that helped narrow the disparities in graduation rates and time to degree. She also prioritized increasing the gender and racial diversity of the faculty and academic leaders, resulting in substantial increases in underrepresented minority and women faculty.

Miranda spent the first 21 years of her academic career on the faculty at Duke University, her alma mater, during which time she won the university's top teaching award and founded CEHI.

An elected fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and a member of Sigma Xi, she is an adjunct professor of pediatrics at Duke as well as Baylor College of Medicine. She sits on the boards of the Environmental Defense Fund and the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation and has provided extensive service to the NIH.

Miranda graduated Phi Beta Kappa, summa cum laude from Duke with a bachelor's degree in mathematics and economics and was named a Truman Scholar. She received her master's and doctorate from Harvard University, where she held a National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowship. Her father, Constancio Miranda, earned his master's in civil engineering from Notre Dame in 1962.

Miranda and her husband, Chris Geron, have three children.

Shannon Cullinan was elected executive vice president of the University of Notre Dame effective July 1, 2019, by the University's Board of Trustees. In this role, Cullinan oversees the University's \$1.6 billion operating budget and leads the divisions that are responsible for operating the University including Campus Safety and Operations, Economic Development, Facilities Design and Operations, Finance, Human Resources, the Office of Information Technologies, the Investment Office and University Enterprises and Events.

Most recently, Cullinan served as the

vice president for finance at the University since January 2017, a role in which he was responsible for the University budgets, capital planning, treasury management, procurement, real estate acquisitions and development, financial reporting and analysis, and accounting and financial services. Prior to that, he was the associate vice president for University Relations, a role in which he worked closely with Trustee leadership, executive leadership, deans, and the University Relations team to oversee Notre Dame's advancement and campaign efforts.

Cullinan graduated from Notre Dame in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in accountancy. He returned to his alma mater in 2000, serving first as assistant vice president for Public Affairs and Communications. He went on to serve as assistant vice president for development, and associate vice president for Continuous Improvement and Campus

Services, with oversight for more than a dozen departments and 400 employees.

For four years prior to joining the University, Cullinan served as the associate executive director of the Center for the Homeless in South Bend, establishing it as a national model. During his tenure at the center, he served as the controller and created a commercial landscape business employing homeless men and women. He also owned and operated an advertising company before working at the center.

Cullinan serves on the board of directors of the Community Foundation of St. Joseph County, and enjoys contributing his time to the local community through events like the YMCA's Greatest Chef.

He earned his master of business administration degree with highest honors from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School. Cullinan and his wife Sarah (ND '95) have four children.

John J. Brennan, chairman emeritus and former chief executive officer of the Vanguard Group, became the seventh chair of Notre Dame's Board of Trustees on July 1, 2016.

Brennan joined Vanguard in July 1982. Headquartered in Malvern, Pennsylvania, Vanguard is one of the leading investment firms in the world, with current global assets of more than \$3 trillion. Brennan was elected president in 1989, served as chief executive officer from 1996 to 2008, and as chairman of the board from 1998 to 2009.

Brennan has served on numerous boards for both for-profit and not-for-profit organizations, including General Electric Co. and the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority.

A graduate of Dartmouth College, Brennan earned a master's degree in business administration from the Harvard Business School. He and his wife, Cathy, have three children—William, Kara and Conor—all of whom are Notre Dame graduates.

Patricia Bellia, O'Neill Professor of Law in the Notre Dame Law School, was appointed chair of the University's Faculty Board on Athletics and its NCAA faculty athletic representative by Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., Notre Dame's president, effective Aug. 1, 2009. A member of the Notre Dame faculty since 2000, Bellia teaches and conducts research in the areas of constitutional law, administrative law, cyberlaw, electronic surveillance law and copyright law. She is a co-author of a leading cyberlaw casebook and has published several articles on Internet law and separation of powers.

Bellia graduated summa cum laude from Harvard University with a bachelor's degree in government. As a Harvard undergraduate, she played varsity tennis and served on the executive committee of the Harvard-Radcliffe Foundation for Women's Athletics.

Before attending the Yale Law School, she worked at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, serving as an editor for Foreign Policy magazine and co-authoring a book on self-determination movements. At Yale, she served as editor-in-chief of the Yale Law Journal, executive editor of the Yale Journal of International Law and student director of the Immigration Legal Services Clinic.

Upon graduation in 1995, Bellia clerked for Judge José A. Cabranes of the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit and Associate Justice Sandra Day O'Connor of the Supreme Court of the United States. Before joining the Notre Dame faculty, she worked for three years as an attorney-advisor in the Office of Legal Counsel of the U.S. Department of Justice.

EXTRA YARD FOR TEACHERS



The 2020 season marks the sixth consecutive year that the Notre Dame Athletics Department has partnered with the College Football Playoff Foundation in the Extra Yard for Teachers initiative.

Last year, the department brought in 674 gifts that garnered \$584,273, directly benefiting Notre Dame's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) program. Those donations, coupled with a donation secured through the Donors Choose website, and a generous \$150,000 match provided by the College Football Playoff Foundation, resulted in a grand total of \$734,273 raised for the 2019 campaign. Each year, the Fighting Irish have finished number one in dollars raised among the 100 institutions participating nationwide.

In its first five years, this partnership raised \$2,893,195 to support the work of ACE, on behalf of thousands of students in 35 cities from New York to Los Angeles. In addition to helping ACE grow and improve its formation efforts through its Master of Education program, these gifts also support a competitive grant process which offers ACE teachers much-needed funding for projects that enhance their classrooms, schools, and educational opportunities for their students.

This fall, the Extra Yard for Teachers activation weekend will coincide with the USF football game, September 19.

Between August 1 and December 31 all donations made to ACE will be matched (minimum of a \$50,000 gift) courtesy of the College Football Playoff Foundation.

KELLY'S HEAD COACHING RESUME

- Second-youngest and fifth-fastest coach (23rd all-time) to ever reach 200 career victories with at least five years of service or 50 victories at a school that was classified as a major college at the time
- With 10-plus wins in 2012*, 2015, 2017, 2018 and 2019, Kelly joins Lou Holtz as the only Notre Dame coaches to hit the double-digit mark in wins five times
- With 10-win seasons in four of the last five years, Kelly is the first Irish coach to have four seasons of double-digit wins in a five-year stretch since Lou Holtz from 1988-93
- Kelly is 25-19 (.568)* in his career against Associated Press Top-25 teams, which ranks fifth among active FBS coaches with at least 25 such games
- Ranks first among active FBS coaches with 263 wins*, as well as seventh among active FBS coaches in winning percentage (.735)*
- Captured four coach of the year awards in 2018 — Home Depot, Associated Press, Bobby Dodd and Stallings
- Swept just about every possible coach of the year award in 2012 — Home Depot, Associated Press, Walter Camp Football Foundation, Sporting News, Liberty Mutual and American Football Coaches Association
- Continued focus on academics as Notre Dame won the 2014 American Football Coaches Association Academic Achievement Award with a 100 percent graduation rate for the freshman football student-athlete class of 2007
- Thirteen of Kelly's last 14 teams have finished the year with a winning record
- Every team of Kelly's head coaching tenure, except for his first Central Michigan team that went 4-7 in 2004 and Notre Dame in 2016 (4-8), has finished at .500 or better (27 out of 29 years)
- Kelly is one of five active FBS coaches that have guided their respective schools to multiple undefeated regular seasons since 2009

COACHING ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- » Fourth season as the Irish wide receivers coach in 2020
- » Critical in the development of 2020 second-round pick Chase Claypool (Pittsburgh), 2019 third-round pick Miles Boykin (Baltimore) and former San Francisco 49ers signee Chris Finke
- » Claypool led the Irish and recorded career-highs in receptions (66), receiving yards (1037) and receiving TDs (13) in his final season in 2019
- » Boykin, who entered 2018 with 18 career receptions for 334 yards and three TDs, hauled in 59 passes for 872 yards and eight TDs - all team-highs - in his final season in 2018
- » Finke, a former walk-on, hauled in 90 catches for 1,032 yards and six TDs in his final two seasons
- » Spent five years at Arizona State (2012-16), including four as the passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach and one as the tight ends coach
- » Helped the 2015 Sun Devil aerial attack continue to operate at a high rate of efficiency (299.1 yards/game)
- » Mentored graduate transfer wideout Devin Lucien in his only season at Arizona State, where Lucien led the Sun Devils with 1,075 receiving yards and eight TDs on 66 catches (Lucien had caught 58 passes for 752 yards and four TDs in his three previous seasons at UCLA)
- » In 2014, Alexander's wide receivers accounted for 57 percent of the Sun Devils TDs and 61 percent of their total yardage
- » Under his tutelage, Jaelen Strong, Gary Chambers and Cameron Smith all recorded career seasons
- » Arizona State averaged 36.9 points/game (16th in the nation) and registered 34 receiving TDs (13th in the nation)
- » The Sun Devils' passing game thrived in '12 as ASU pass catchers caught 33 TDs (second-most in school history) and helped (then) first-year quarterback Taylor Kelly establish a single-season school record for completion percentage
- » Before joining the Arizona State staff, Alexander spent five seasons at Wisconsin as the wide receivers coach (2007-11)
- » Part of two Big Ten championships and five bowl appearances at Wisconsin, including back-to-back Rose Bowls in 2010 and 2011
- » In 2011, Wisconsin passed for 3,280 yards - the highest total in school history
- » Mentored All-Big Ten wide receiver Nick Toon, who led the team with 64 catches for 926 yards and 10 TDs
- » Toon finished with the third-most receiving yards in school history and the fifth-most TD catches
- » Prior to his tenure at Wisconsin, Alexander served as the running backs coach, assistant travel coordinator, assistant special teams coordinator and NCAA rules representative at the University of San Diego (2005-06) under then-coach Jim Harbaugh
- » The Toreros, who led the nation in offense in 2005, won conference championships in both 2005 and 2006
- » Served as the recruiting coordinator and wide receivers coach at Oregon State for two years (2003-04)
- » Beavers placed wide receivers on the All-Pac-10 first team during each of his two seasons
- » Coached wide receivers and quarterbacks at UNLV for three seasons (2000-02)
- » Also served as the passing game coordinator for the Rebels in 2000-01
- » Coached players earned first-team All-Mountain West accolades in each of his three years
- » Worked for the San Diego Chargers in 1999 as a senior offensive assistant (running backs) and also had responsibilities with quality control, video analysis, opponent summaries and self scout
- » Coached wideouts at UNLV in 1998
- » Began coaching career in 1995 at USC as an assistant video coordinator
- » Spent two years (1996-97) as a graduate assistant for the Trojans working with the tight ends

- » Held responsibilities of assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator, special teams coordinator, tight ends coach and defensive line coach over three years at Cincinnati (2007-09)
- » Helped implement a new scheme in 2009 with three first-year starters on a Bearcats' defensive line that limited their opponents to 3.6 rushing yards per carry
- » Coached a Cincinnati defensive line in 2009 that played a major role as the Bearcats registered the third-most tackles for loss and 10th-most sacks in the FBS
- » Coached a Bearcats' kickoff return unit that ranked second in the nation in 2009, averaging 28.5 yards per kickoff return

- » Previously an assistant coach at Tennessee, Nebraska, Texas A&M and North Carolina
- » Tutored North Carolina cornerback M.J. Stewart, who was selected in the second round (53rd overall pick) of the 2018 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers
- » A two-time All-ACC honorable mention selection, Stewart registered 45 tackles, 12 pass breakups, 5.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks in 2017
- » Prior to his tenure in Chapel Hill, Joseph served as the defensive backs coach at Texas A&M for three seasons (2014-16)
- » Coached an Aggies pass defense in 2015 that ranked fourth nationally in passing yards allowed per game and 18th in pass efficiency defense
- » Spent two seasons at Nebraska as its secondary coach (2012-13)
- » Despite the loss of two returning starters, Cornhuskers' 2012 secondary led the nation in opponent completion percentage (47.1 percent), ranked fourth in pass defense (168.2 yards allowed per game) and ninth in pass efficiency defense (105.32)
- » The 168.2 passing yards per game NU allowed in 2012 was the second-fewest by a Husker defense since 1993, while the 47.1 completion percentage was the lowest for Nebraska since 2001

- » Mentored All-American linebacker Te'von Coney, who in 2018 became the first Irish player to post back-to-back 100-tackle seasons since Jaylon Smith (2014, 2015)
- » Coney's two-season total of 239 tackles in 2017 and 2018 were the most tackles by an Irish player in back-to-back seasons since Manti Te'o recorded 261 stops in 2011 and 2012
- » Also mentored linebacker Drue Tranquill, who was the only FBS player over the 2018 and 2017 seasons to register at least 170 tackles, 15 tackles for loss, five passes defended and four fumbles recovered
- » Notre Dame was the last team in the FBS to surrender more than 20 points in a game in 2017 (the Irish allowed 20 points or less over each of their first eight games)
- » Notre Dame allowed only one play of 50 yards or longer in 2017 - the second-fewest of any team in the FBS
- » Notre Dame's 2017 linebacker unit (which included Te'von Coney, Drue Tranquill, Nyles Morgan and Greer Martini) all registered at least 75 tackles - a first in school history
- » Morgan and Martini registered 92 and 75 stops, respectively, and Morgan collected 7.0 tackles for loss
- » Served as the Wake Forest linebackers coach in 2016
- » In 2016, the Demon Deacons' defense ranked in the top-20 of the FBS in fumbles recovered (third), turnovers forced (10th), sacks (12th), defensive TDs (17th), red zone defense (17th) and scoring defense (20th)
- » Wake Forest was one of four schools in the FBS to rank in the top-20 in turnovers forced, sacks and scoring defense in 2016 (the other three schools - Alabama, Clemson and Washington - qualified for the College Football Playoff)
- » Spent three seasons (2013-15) as the linebackers coach at Syracuse

- » In 2013, Syracuse ranked nationally in multiple categories, including third-down defense (15th), rush defense (24th), sacks (18th) and tackles for loss (18th)
- » Helped assemble a unit at Bowling Green that ranked sixth in the country in total defense (296.6) and 10th in scoring defense (16.7)
- » Bowling Green ranked fourth in the nation in third-down defense, fifth in first downs allowed (15.1), 11th in sacks (38), 12th in rushing defense (106.5) and 13th in pass defense (190.1)
- » Finalist for Linebackers Coach of the Year by FootballScoop.com in 2012

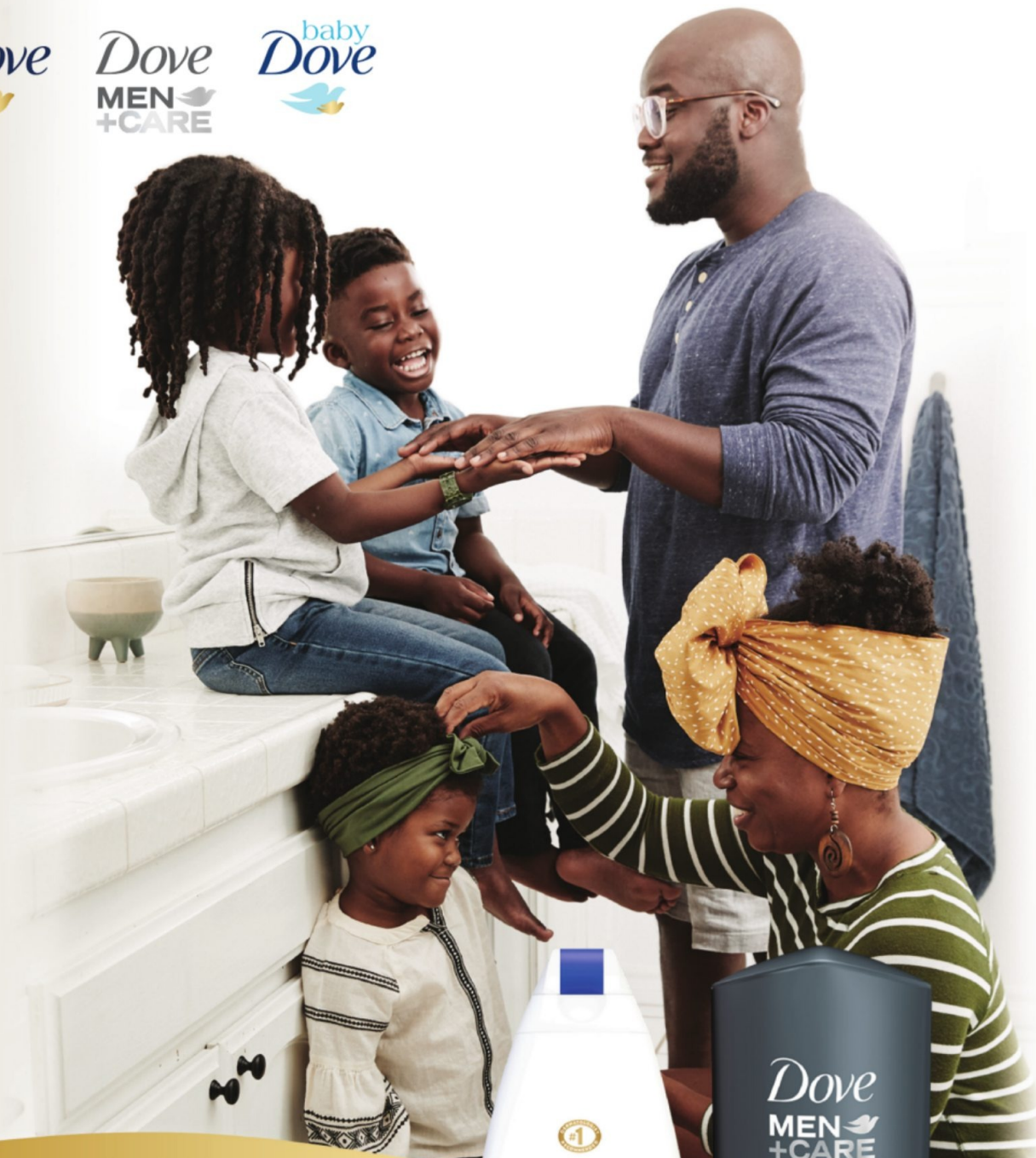

COACHING ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- » First season as the Notre Dame offensive coordinator in 2020 after being the quarterbacks coach from 2017-2019
- » Coached starting signal caller Ian Book in 2018 and 2019
- » Book, who opened his starting career with nine consecutive victories, was the first Notre Dame quarterback to win at least eight consecutive games as the starter to open a season since Terry Hanratty was the Irish quarterback in eight straight victories in the 1966 national championship season
- » Book started all 13 games at QB in 2019, finishing the year 240-for-399 for 3,034 yards and 34 TDs to just six interceptions while being named a top-20 finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award
- » Book became the first QB in Notre Dame history with at least 2,500 passing yards, 500 rushing yards and 30 TD passes in a season (Oklahoma's Jalen Hurts was the only other FBS QB to reach those milestones in 2019)
- » His 34 passing TDs on the year marked the second-most in a season by an Irish QB, trailing only Brady Quinn's 37 in 2006
- » Book had five games in 2019 with four or more passing TDs, the most in a Notre Dame football season
- » Book ranked eighth in the FBS with a 68.2 completion percentage in 2018, and ranked 17th in passing efficiency with a 154.0 rating
- » Book set a school record in completion percentage in 2018 (68.2) -- besting Jimmy Clausen's mark in 2009 (68.0)
- » Book threw for 2,628 yards and 19 TDs with only seven interceptions in 2018, and was named a semifinalist for both the Maxwell Award and the Davey O'Brien Award and a finalist for the Manning Award
- » Book became the first FBS quarterback to win his first five starts of a season while completing 70.0-plus percent of his passes in each game since Russell Wilson at Wisconsin in 2011
- » Mentored Brandon Wimbush to a 4-0 record as a starting quarterback in 2018
- » Wimbush, who went 13-3 as a starter at Notre Dame, ranks eighth in school history for best winning percentage as a starter
- » Coached Wimbush, who was the only starting signal caller in college football to defeat four teams that finished 2017 ranked in the Associated Press Top 25
- » The four victories over teams that finished 2017 ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 were the most by an Irish quarterback since 1990 - when Rick Mirer registered five
- » Wimbush was the third QB in school history to eclipse both 500 rushing yards and 1,000 passing yards in the same season, joining Tony Rice (1988 and '89) and DeShone Kizer (2015)
- » Guided Book, who started in Notre Dame's 33-10 victory at North Carolina and came off the bench to help the Irish rally past No. 16 LSU, 21-17, in the 2018 Citrus Bowl
- » Returned to his alma mater following one season as an offensive assistant with the San Diego Chargers where he worked with an offense that ranked tied for seventh in the NFL in passing (262.4), ninth in scoring (25.6), 12th in yards/play (5.6) and 14th in total offense (356.8)
- » San Diego quarterback Philip Rivers threw for 4,386 yards and 33 TDs, which ranked fourth and fifth, respectively, in the NFL in 2016
- » Broke into the coaching ranks in 2015 at Northwestern, where he served as an offensive graduate assistant
- » The Wildcats went 10-3 and finished the year ranked No. 23 in the final Associated Press poll
- » Aided Northwestern redshirt freshman quarterback Clayton Thorson, who became the first quarterback in school history to lead the Wildcats to 10 wins in his first season as a starter

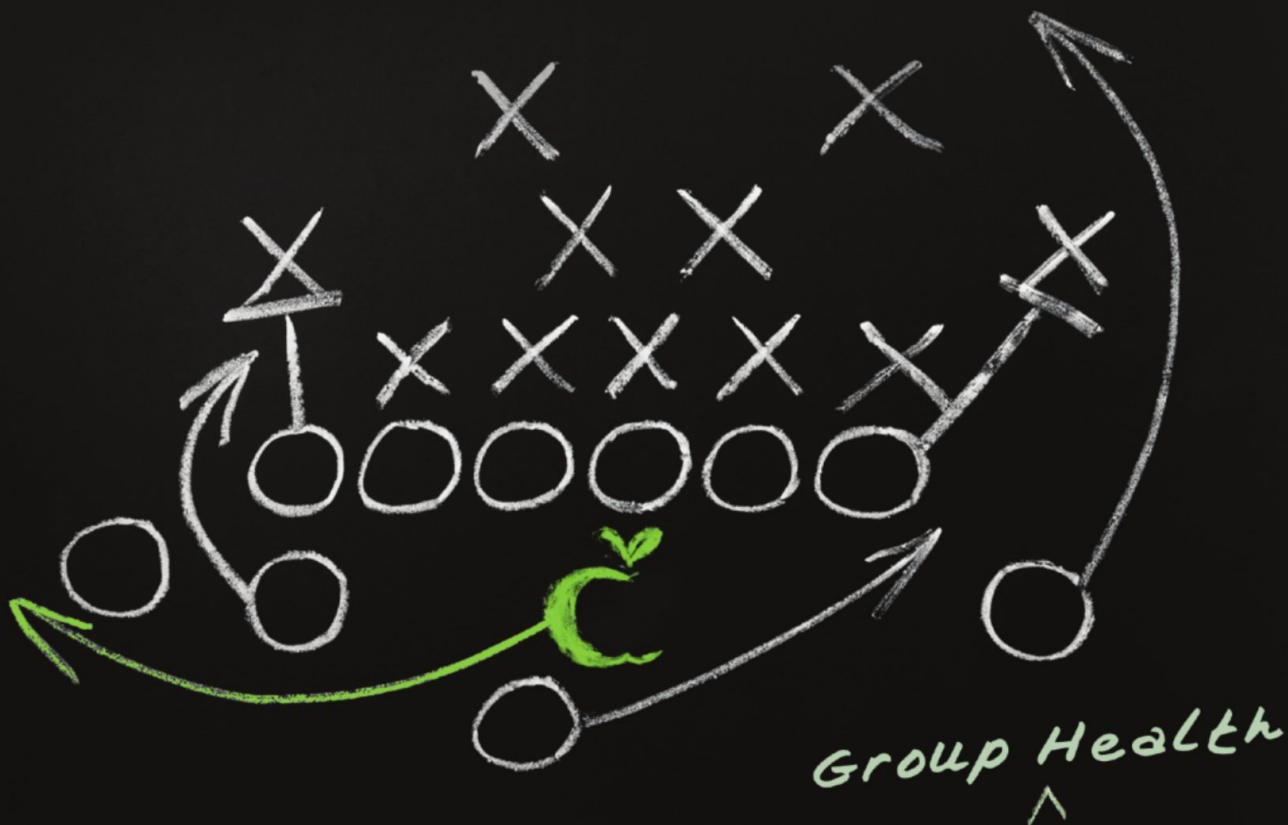

- » Second season as the Irish running backs coach in 2020, promoted in early 2020 to Run Game Coordinator
- » Mentored Tony Jones Jr. in 2019, a season in which he totaled career-highs with 878 rushing yards and 7 TDs
- » Jones Jr. ranked 24th in the FBS with an average of 5.95 yards per carry
- » Two of Taylor's disciples -- Christian McCaffrey and Bryce Love -- hold three of the top five rushing seasons in Stanford history, and each of the four highest single-game rushing totals
- » Coached running backs at Stanford for three seasons (2014-16)
- » Named the 2015 FootballScoop.com Running Backs Coach of the Year
- » Played key role in the development of 2015 Heisman Trophy runner-up McCaffrey, who set the school record for single-game rushing yards (243) against UCLA and became the first Cardinal to eclipse the 2,000-yard rushing mark in a season (2,019)
- » McCaffrey ultimately was chosen with the eighth pick of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Carolina Panthers
- » McCaffrey, who was second among all FBS running backs in rushing yards, registered 11 100-yard rushing games, including a school-record nine straight
- » McCaffrey earned Associated Press Player of the Year honors in 2015
- » Stanford set a school record in 2015 in rushing yards (3,132) under Taylor, and two of the other 13 best rushing seasons in Stanford history came under his guidance
- » In 2016, Stanford's rushing offense averaged 223.7 yards/game, 19th best nationally and second among Pac-12 programs
- » Served as the wide receivers coach for the Carolina Panthers in 2017 and 2018
- » In 2018, oversaw the development of both rookie D.J. Moore and second-year Curtis Samuel
- » The Moore and Samuel tandem registered 94 catches for 1,282 yards and seven touchdowns
- » In 2017, coached a wide receiver corps that saw 14 different players make a reception, one shy of the franchise record, and nine different players hauled in a receiving touchdown, tying the franchise record
- » Prior to his time at Carolina, spent three seasons with the New York Jets from 2010-12, serving as a coaching intern in 2010, offensive quality control coach in 2011 and assistant tight ends/quality control coach in 2012
- » During time with the Jets' tight ends, Jeff Cumberland (29) and Dustin Keller (28) ranked second and third on the team, respectively, in receptions
- » Before his stint in the NFL, coached wide receivers at Appalachian State in 2009
- » Under his tutelage, the Mountaineers set school records with 284 receptions and 3,621 receiving yards
- » Appalachian State finished 11-3, won the Southern Conference title and advanced to the Football Championship Subdivision semifinals
- » Began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for Nick Saban at, Alabama, from 2007-08

When Rev. Edward F. Sorin, C.S.C., arrived in the northern Indiana wilderness, he had only \$310, three log buildings badly in need of repair and a far-sighted vision of establishing a liberal arts school to meet the growing educational needs of the frontier. He dreamed of building a great university, and in 1842, he founded the University of Notre Dame du Lac.

Over the years, Notre Dame would evolve into a preeminent place for Catholic thought. While becoming one of the top undergraduate institutions in the country, Notre Dame also has been at the cutting edge of research, including such innovations as the transmission of wireless messages and the development of synthetic rubber. Today researchers are achieving breakthroughs in astrophysics, radiation chemistry, environmental sciences, tropical disease transmission, cancer treatment, robotics, and nanoelectronics.

The University also has stressed residential life, with four of five students living on campus in 31 residence halls that serve as the focal point of social, spiritual and athletic activities. Notre Dame is one of a handful of universities with a truly

national and international student body composed of young men and women who come from more than 100 nations and all 50 states. They attend Notre Dame not only to learn how to think, but to learn how to live, keeping faith with the vision of Father Sorin.

Notre Dame is one of the few universities to regularly rank in the top 25 in the *U.S. News & World Report* survey of America's

best colleges and the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings of the best overall athletics programs. The University is second only to KU Leuven of Belgium among all Catholic universities worldwide, according to the *Times Higher Education* survey.

The University is organized into four undergraduate colleges—Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering, and the Mendoza College of Business—the School of Architecture, the Law School, the Graduate School, the Keough School of Global Affairs, 19 major research institutes, more than two dozen centers and special programs, and the University Library system.

One indicator of the quality of Notre Dame's undergraduate programs is the success of its students in postbaccalaureate

studies. The medical school acceptance rate of the University's preprofessional studies graduates is 70 percent.

The Graduate School, established in 1918, encompasses nine terminal master's degree programs, four professional master's degree programs and 32 doctoral degree programs in and among 34 University departments and institutes.

The source of the University's academic strength is its faculty, which since 1988 has seen the addition of more than 500 new members and the establishment of more than 200 endowed professorships. Notre Dame faculty members have won 65 fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities since 1999, more than any other university in the nation.

At Notre Dame, education always has been linked to values, among them living in community and volunteering in community service. Residence hall life is both the hallmark of the Notre Dame experience and the wellspring of the University's rich tradition. A younger tradition, the University's Center for Social Concerns, serves as a catalyst for student voluntarism. About 80 percent of Notre Dame students engage in some form of voluntary service-learning during their years at the University, and at least 10 percent devote a year or more after graduation to serving the less fortunate in the U.S. and around the world.

With 1,250 acres containing two lakes and 180 buildings and a total property replacement value of \$4 billion, Notre Dame is well known for the quality of its physical plant and the beauty of its campus. The Basilica of the Sacred Heart, the 14-story Hesburgh Library with its 132-foot-high mural depicting Christ the Teacher, and the University's historic Main Building with its famed Golden Dome are among the most widely known university landmarks in the world.

NOTRE DAME RESEARCH FUNDING TOPS \$172 MILLION

The University of Notre Dame received \$172.5 million in new research funding awards for fiscal year 2020 — the second highest in its history.

The awards received throughout fiscal year 2020 support an array of research, scholarship and creative endeavors, with many researchers working to address globally significant issues, including climate change, drug development, epidemiology and technology ethics. Toward the end of the fiscal year, a call to focus on understanding and combating COVID-19 led to several new research funding opportunities.

“This year’s awards highlight how the University’s research programs are able to be flexible in the face of new and unforeseen challenges,” said Robert J. Bernhard, vice president for research and professor in the Department of Aerospace and Mechanical Engineering. “At Notre Dame, we are fortunate to have faculty who are driven by the University’s mission of being a powerful means for doing good in the world and are willing to pivot their research in order to address the most pressing issues of the day.”

When the University’s laboratory and research operations went into hibernation in March 2020 due to the ongoing pandemic, some researchers had already begun to change their focus toward understanding and combating the novel coronavirus. Some of the new research awards that support coronavirus-related studies — all of which were funded by the National Science Foundation to date — include:

Funding to Kyle Bibby, associate professor and the Wanzek Collegiate Chair in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering and Earth Sciences, for wastewater-informed epidemiological monitoring. Bibby and his research team have been monitoring wastewater via samples throughout the Great Lakes region to develop methods of virus detection. They are working with Alex Perkins, associate professor in the Department of Biological Sciences, to connect their measurements to epidemiological models in order to compare rates of exposure, the onset of symptoms, transmission and detection.

An award to Vijay Gupta, professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering, for the development of a meta-population level model that simulates the spread of the coronavirus and for utilizing reinforcement learning to design optimal congregation restriction policies for physical distancing. The goal of this research is to answer questions such as what are appropriate congregation restriction policies for social and physical distancing; and when should they be appropriately implemented.

Funding for Jeff Harden, the Andrew J. McKenna Family Associate Professor in the Department of Political Science, for the study of varying state policy responses to the coronavirus. The research team is collecting data on state and local



government reactions to ever-evolving information about the virus and on cases, fatalities and recoveries. The goal is to understand how those responses may have affected how the disease spreads.

An award for Nosang Myung, the Keating Crawford Endowed Professor in the Department of Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering, to create a new material for antimicrobial masks. Through a collaboration with the University of Iowa, Myung will translate his existing water filtration technology to create a new fabric that will not only capture viruses, like the coronavirus, but also deactivate them.

Funding to Alex Perkins to develop agent-based models, which simulates individuals and their movement patterns, for short-term projections. Perkins and his research team are aiming to build more accurate projections of how the coronavirus could spread based on how people live, work, and move, especially as various interventions such as shelter-in-place, school closures, and social distancing, are implemented and lifted.

Of the University’s 739 awards received in fiscal year 2020, approximately 77 percent came from federal funding, while 14 percent came from foundations and other sources and nine percent came from industry. Overall, Notre Dame’s externally funded research had a global footprint of 50 grants in 41 countries, totaling \$20.6 million. Researchers from the Colleges of Arts and Letters, Engineering, Science and Mendoza College of Business, as well as the Graduate School, Keough School of Global Affairs and Law School, were among the recipients of these awards.

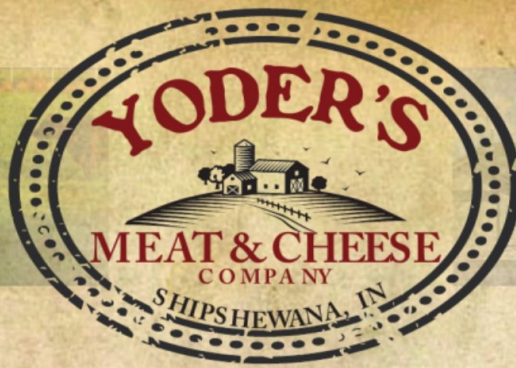
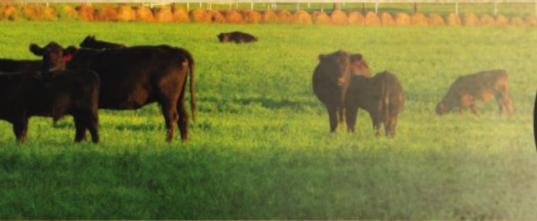

NOTRE DAME STADIUM



When the Knute Rockne-designed Notre Dame Stadium opened for business in the autumn of 1930, it was described as “a monument to sportsmanship, a tribute to fighting youth, and an amphitheater devoted to modern athletics.”

Ninety-one years later, the newest version of the University of Notre Dame’s home for football qualifies as all that and a whole lot more.

Long considered one of the most iconic athletic facilities in the world, Notre Dame Stadium in 2017 took on a new role — not only as a centerpiece of the University’s campus and physical plant but also as one of the most effective combinations and commitments to athletics, academics and student life anywhere in major college sports. The stadium location now becomes a day-to-day destination for University students, faculty and staff, representing a perfect

melding of old and new.

For nine decades Notre Dame Stadium has been home to national championship football teams, Heisman Trophy winners and All-Americans — and, in recent years, to the University’s Commencement ceremony. In 1997, it added 20,000 new seats to its resume. In 2017, the stadium location added three new structures on the east, west and south sides, as well as extensive renovations on the north end and major game day improvements for fans throughout the venue.

Those upgrades include new wider seats in the lower bowl, upgraded concession and restroom facilities, a 1930s art deco look to the main concourse, nearly 150 television monitors in the concourses, new displays at Gate C honoring Irish football award winners, improved Wi-Fi and connectivity, plus a new video board at the south end of the stadium.

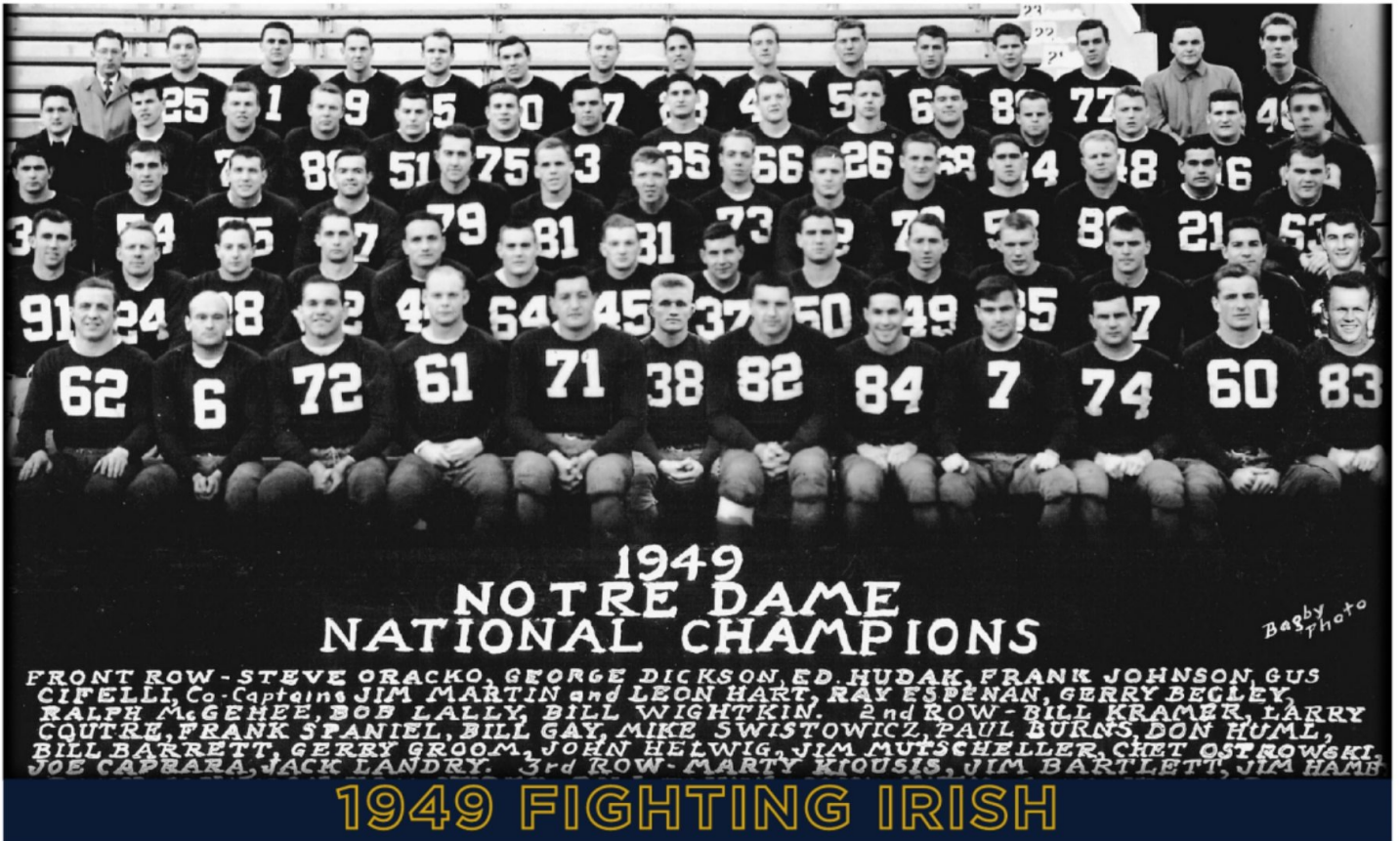

The University of Notre Dame's 11 consensus national championships span six different decades. The Irish title tradition dates back to Knute Rockne and the Four Horsemen who collaborated on Notre Dame's first consensus crown in 1924.

Since the Associated Press began certifying the winner of the national crown in 1936, Notre Dame has won eight national championships (1943, '46, '47, '49, '66, '73, '77 and '88), second to only Alabama (10).

The coaches' poll (United Press International through 1990, USA Today since 1991) has selected a national champion since 1950, including the winner of the Bowl Championship Series and College Football Playoff title games. Notre Dame has won three coaches' titles (1966, '77 and '88 — all UPI crowns) during that period.

The NCAA also recognizes national championships awarded by the Football Writers Association of Association of America (FWAA) and the National Football Foundation.

The FWAA has presented the Grantland Rice Award to the national champion since 1954, with Notre Dame teams earning

the trophy four times (1966, '73, '77 and '88). The National Football Foundation has presented the MacArthur Bowl to the national champion since 1959, with Notre Dame winning this honor five times (1964, '66 — tie with Michigan State, '73, '77 and '88).

The NCAA recognizes members of a consensus All-America team each season. On 102 occasions, 86 different Notre Dame players have earned consensus All-America designation. The Fighting Irish boast 34 unanimous first-team All-America selections, the most by any other university.

Gus Dorais became the first Fighting Irish student-athlete to garner first-team All-America recognition in 1913 and, since that time, Notre Dame has had first-team All-America honorees on 192 occasions.

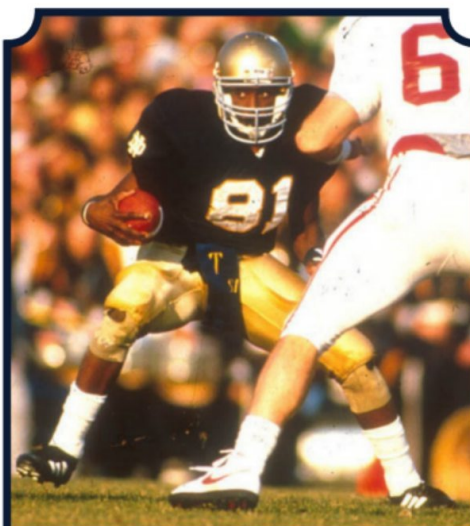

Fighting Irish football players have garnered first-team recognition on 43 occasions with safety Drue Tranquill being the program's most recent first-team honoree in 2016.

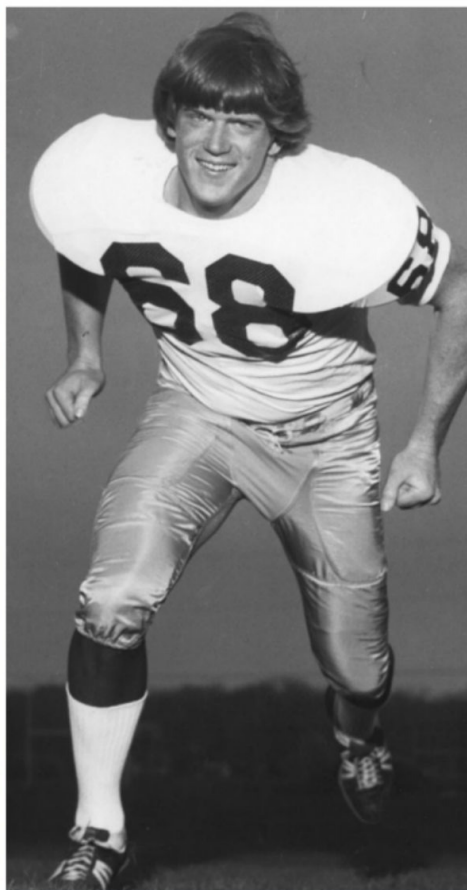

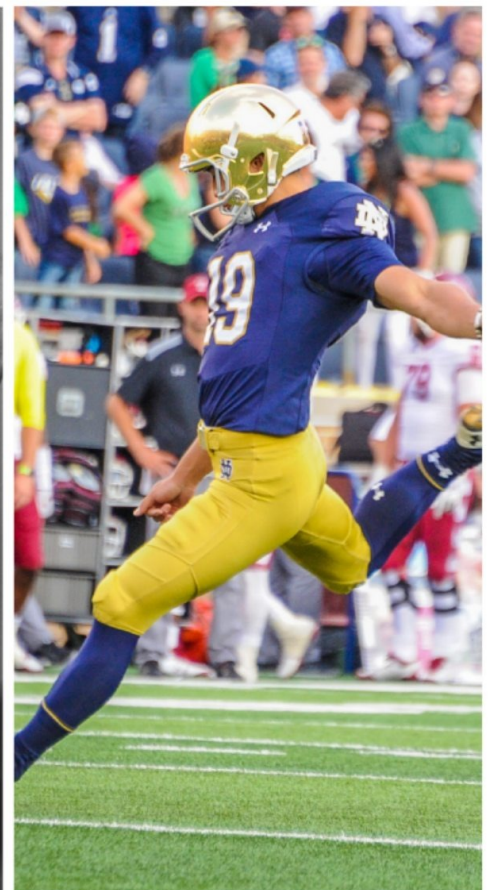

The University of Notre Dame has produced seven Heisman Trophy winners — and no college football program in the country can claim more.

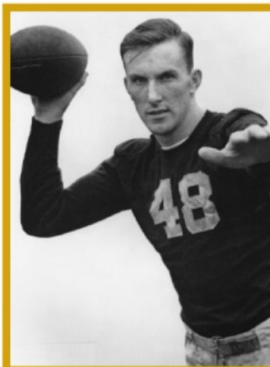
Since the inception of the award in 1935, Angelo Bertelli (1943), John Lujack (1947), Leon Hart (1949), John Lattner (1953), Paul Hornung (1956), John Huarte (1964) and Tim Brown (1987) have stamped their names in college football history as Heisman Trophy winners.

Notre Dame also has had a player finish among the top five in the Heisman voting in 21 of the 85 years the award has been presented.

Officially known as the John W. Heisman Memorial Trophy Award, it is presented annually to the top college football player by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York. First known as the D.A.C. Trophy, the award was renamed in 1936 for John W. Heisman, the first athletic director of the Downtown Athletic Club, as well as a football player at Pennsylvania and Brown, and a coach for 36 years.

- Notre Dame's first Heisman Trophy winner during his senior season in 1943 despite playing in just six of 10 games (before the Marine Corps called him into service)

- Threw 10 touchdown passes as Notre Dame averaged 43.5 points per game in those first six outings en route to the national title
- Prior to winning the Heisman Trophy, he finished second in 1941 and sixth in 1942
- Began his Fighting Irish career as a single-wing tailback in 1941 and threw for 1,027 passing yards with a completion percentage of .569 that led the nation and propelled Notre Dame to a 9-0-1 mark
- Made the switch to quarterback as a junior in 1942 and finished the season with 10 touchdown passes and 1,039 yards
- During his career, he threw for 2,582 yards (160 of 324) and 29 touchdowns
- Inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1972
- Bertelli passed away on June 26, 1999

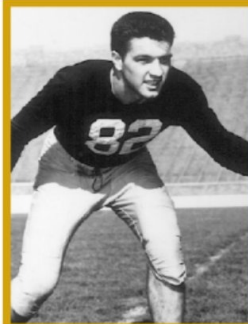

QUARTERBACK — 1943 AND
1946-47

CONNELLSVILLE, PENNSYLVANIA

- Notre Dame's oldest living Heisman Trophy winner led Notre Dame to three national championships (1943, '46 and '47)
- Established himself as one of the great T-formation quarterbacks in college football history
- Took over at quarterback for Notre Dame as a sophomore in 1943 when Angelo Bertelli joined the Marines
- Served a three-year stint of his own in the Navy
- A two-time consensus All-American in 1946 and 1947 on Notre Dame squads that went undefeated
- As a senior, he completed 61-of-109 passes for 777 yards and nine touchdowns
- Threw for 2,080 yards (144 of 280) and 19 touchdowns during his career
- Named Associated Press Male Athlete of the Year in 1947

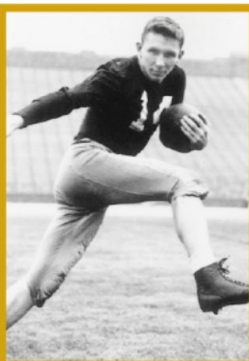


LEON HART 1949

LINEMAN — 1946-49

TURTLE CREEK, PENNSYLVANIA

- Notre Dame's third Heisman Trophy winner and one of just two linemen ever (joining Larry Kelly of Yale in 1936) to capture the award
- One of the last two-way players following the advent of two-platoon football
- Earned his reputation as an outstanding blocker and superb rusher on defense, in addition to his strong receiving skills
- Played on Fighting Irish teams that combined for a 36-0-2 record and claimed three national titles
- Caught 49 pass receptions for 751 yards and 23 touchdowns
- Played eight seasons in the National Football League from 1950-57 with the Detroit Lions
- Elected into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1979
- Hart died on Sept. 25, 2002

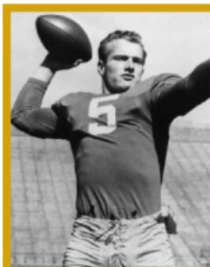


JOHN LATTNER 1953

RIGHT HALFBACK — 1951-53

CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

- Became Notre Dame's fourth Heisman Trophy winner in the fourth-closest balloting in history despite not leading the Irish in rushing, passing, receiving or scoring
- Led Notre Dame to a 9-0-1 record in 1953
- Received the Maxwell Award as the top collegiate player during both his junior and senior seasons in 1952 and '53
- Made his mark by running, catching and punting while also returning punts and kickoffs
- Intercepted 13 passes during his career
- Held Notre Dame record for all-purpose yards — from rushing, receiving and runbacks — until Vagas Ferguson eclipsed the mark in 1979
- Elected into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in '79
- Lattner passed away on February 13, 2016



PAUL HORNUNG 1956

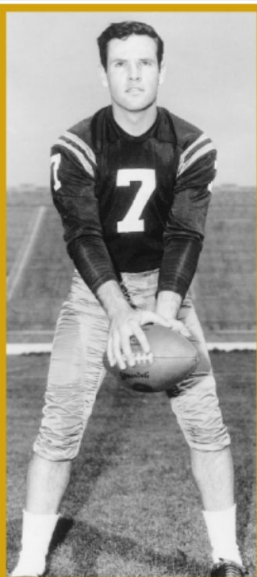
QUARTERBACK — 1954-1956

LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY

- Outstanding all-around athlete who played quarterback, left halfback, fullback and safety
- Nicknamed the "Golden Boy," he remains the only player to capture the Heisman Trophy and play for a losing team after the Irish finished 2-8 in 1956
- As a junior in 1955, ran for one score, threw for another and intercepted two passes in a victory over fourth-ranked Navy
- Rallied the Irish that same season to a come-from-behind victory against Iowa with a touchdown pass and game-winning field goal in the final minutes
- In a loss to USC, he threw and ran for 354 yards, an NCAA high in 1955
- As a senior, led Notre Dame in passing, rushing, scoring, kickoff and punt returns and punting
- Ranked third nationally in total offense in 1956 (1,337 yards) and accounted for more than half of the Irish scoring
- First overall selection in the 1957 National Football League Draft by the Green Bay Packers
- Elected into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1985 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1986

JOHN HUARTE 1964

QUARTERBACK — 1962-64
SANTA ANA, CALIFORNIA

- Huarte became Notre Dame's sixth Heisman Trophy honoree in one of the biggest upsets in the award's history
- Missed most of his sophomore season due to a neck injury and didn't play enough as a junior to win a monogram
- Helped first-year head coach Ara Parseghian turn the Irish from a 2-7 team in 1963 to a 9-1 squad in 1964 that nearly claimed the national title

- His favorite receiving target, Jack Snow, caught 60 passes for 1,114 yards and a then-school record nine touchdowns in '64
- Set 12 Irish records during his senior season that year as he completed 114-of-205 passes for 2,062 yards and 16 touchdowns
- Finished his senior year ranked third nationally in total offense
- Enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame in 2006



TIM BROWN 1987

WIDE RECEIVER — 1984-87
DALLAS, TEXAS

- Notre Dame's seventh Heisman Trophy honoree and first wide receiver to earn the award
- Used back-to-back punt returns for touchdowns in an early-season game against Michigan State in 1987 to cement his Heisman bid

- Ranked third nationally in all-purpose yardage as a junior and finished sixth as a senior
- Set 19 different school records during his Fighting Irish career
- Two-time All-American in both 1986 and 1987
- 1987 Walter Camp Player of the Year honoree
- Sixth overall pick in the 1988 National Football League Draft
- Enjoyed a stellar professional career with the Oakland/Los Angeles Raiders (16 seasons) and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (one season) and was an NFL Pro Bowl selection on 11 occasions
- At the time of his retirement, his 14,934 receiving yards were the second highest in NFL history, 1,094 receptions were third and 100 touchdown catches were tied for third
- Played in the 2004 Super Bowl
- Member of the College Football Hall of Fame Class of 2009 and Pro Football Hall of Fame Class of 2015
- Recipient of NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in 2012

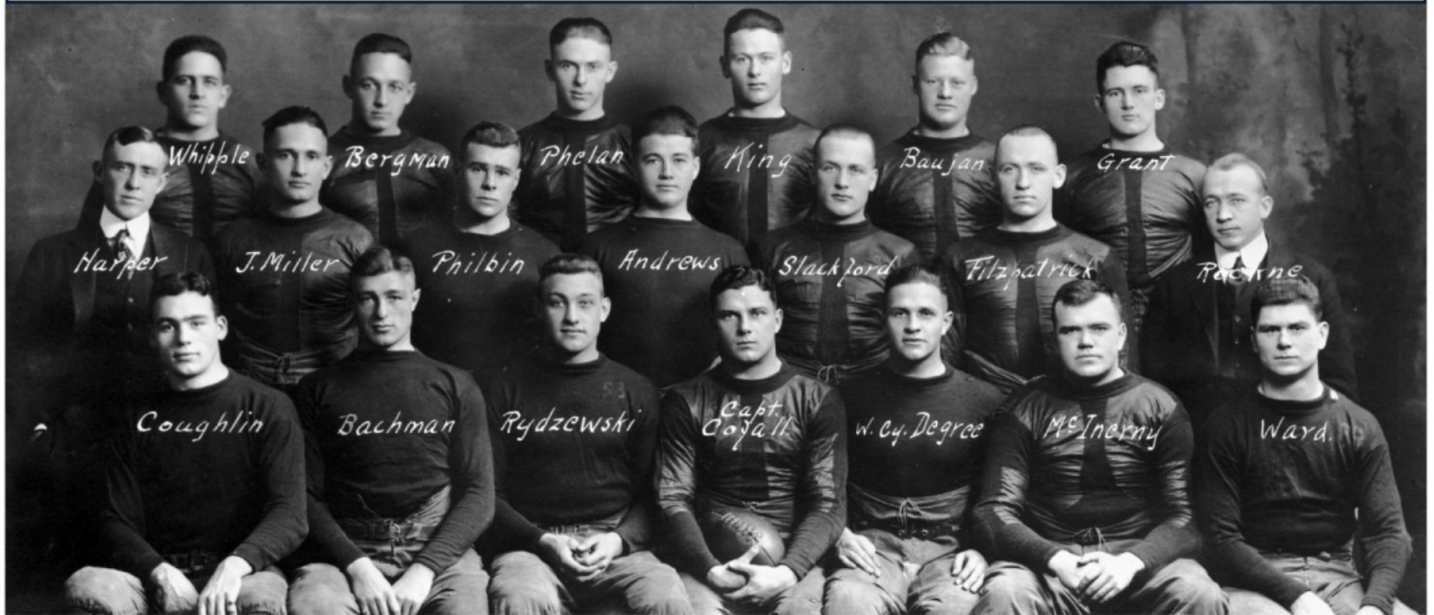

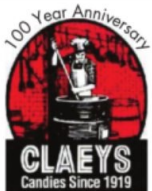

IRISH IN THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

The University of Notre Dame stands alone in its ability to produce NFL talent, both on the field and in the boardroom. Since the Pro Football Hall of Fame was opened in 1963, Notre Dame has had 13 representatives enshrined. No other college or university can boast more.

Edward DeBartolo Jr. became the latest Hall of Famer with Notre Dame ties, earning a spot in the Class of 2017. The former San Francisco 49ers owner (1977-2000) earned his degree in Business Management from Notre Dame in 1968 and became the first non-player from Notre Dame to earn entry to the hall.

In 2015, fullback Jerome Bettis and 1987 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Brown earned their own inductions, marking just the second time that two Irish players were enshrined in the same year. The last time that happened, Curly Lambeau and John (Blood) McNally were featured in the opening class of 1963.

In between, Irish-tied inductees included George Grafton (1964), Wayne Millner (1968), George Connor (1975), Paul Hornung (1986), Alan Page (1988), Joe Montana (2000), Nick Buoniconti (2001) and Dave Casper (2002).

IRISH IN THE NFL DRAFT

Since the National Football League began drafting players — starting with the initial draft on Feb. 8, 1936, at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in Philadelphia — Notre Dame football players have been selected by NFL teams on 511 occasions. The total rises to 572 selections to the professional ranks when you include the AFL (37) and AAFC (24) drafts. Based on the statistics provided by the NFL,

Notre Dame has had 69 first-round draft picks, beginning with Bill Shakespeare by Pittsburgh in 1936. Overall, the Irish have had five players (tied with USC and Auburn for most) chosen as the first pick in the entire draft — QB Angelo Bertelli by Boston in 1944, QB Frank Dancewicz by Boston in 1946, E Leon Hart by Detroit in 1950, B Paul Hornung by Green Bay in 1957 and DT Walt Patulski by Buffalo in 1972.

BOWL APPEARANCES



The University of Notre Dame's long postseason football history features five victories over top-ranked opponents and appearances in 17 different bowl games. Notre Dame made its bowl debut in 1925 when it defeated Stanford, 27-10, in the Rose Bowl. School policy kept the Irish out of the bowl scene for 45 years after that appearance in Pasadena, but revision of the protocol came in November 1969 from Reverend Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C., who was then Notre Dame's executive vice president. He noted that many Notre Dame athletes had engaged in NCAA

playoffs in other sports, and that there was a need to finance minority student academic

programs and scholarships, so the Irish began playing in bowl games again.

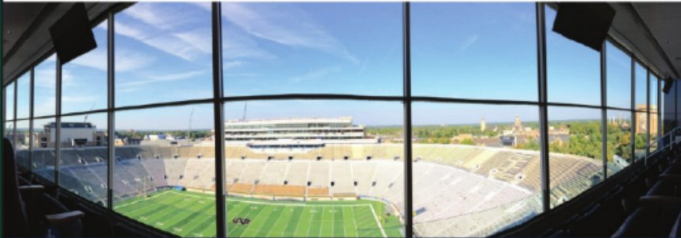

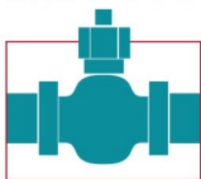

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

EVERY GAME COUNTS

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a four-team event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

FOUR TEAMS

The selection committee ranks the teams based on the members' evaluation of the teams' performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents to decide among teams that are comparable.

TRADITION

The New Year's holiday period belongs to college football, with two semifinal games rotating annually among the Cotton Bowl, Fiesta Bowl, Orange Bowl, Peach Bowl, Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl.

CHAMPIONSHIP MONDAY

The two winning teams from the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance. No team automatically qualifies.

GOVERNANCE

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the playoff office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

A talented group of high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee. Members of the committee are Gary Barta (chair), Paola Boivin, Tom Burman, Joe Castiglione, Rick George, Ken Hatfield, Ronnie Lott, Terry Mohajir, Ray Odierno, R.C. Slocum, Todd Stansbury, Scott Stricklin and John Urschel.





COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

SELECTION COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

- Rank the top 25 teams and assign the top four to semifinals sites.
- Assign teams to New Year's bowls.
 - Create competitive matchups.
 - Attempt to avoid rematches of regular-season games and repeat appearances in specific bowls.
 - Consider geography.

PARTICIPANTS IN THE NEW YEAR'S BOWLS

Both participants in the Orange, Rose and Sugar Bowls are contracted outside the playoff arrangement (Big Ten and Pac-12 to Rose Bowl; SEC and Big 12 to Sugar Bowl; ACC to Orange Bowl against the highest-ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten and Notre Dame). If a conference champion qualifies for the playoff, then the bowl will choose a replacement from that conference. When those bowls host the semifinals and their contracted conference champions do not qualify, then the displaced champion(s) will play in one of the other New Year's bowls.

When not hosting semifinals, the Cotton, Fiesta and Peach Bowls will welcome the highest-ranked teams, any displaced conference champions, and the top-ranked champion from a non-contract conference. The highest-ranked available teams will fill any other berths. The selection committee will make the pairings.

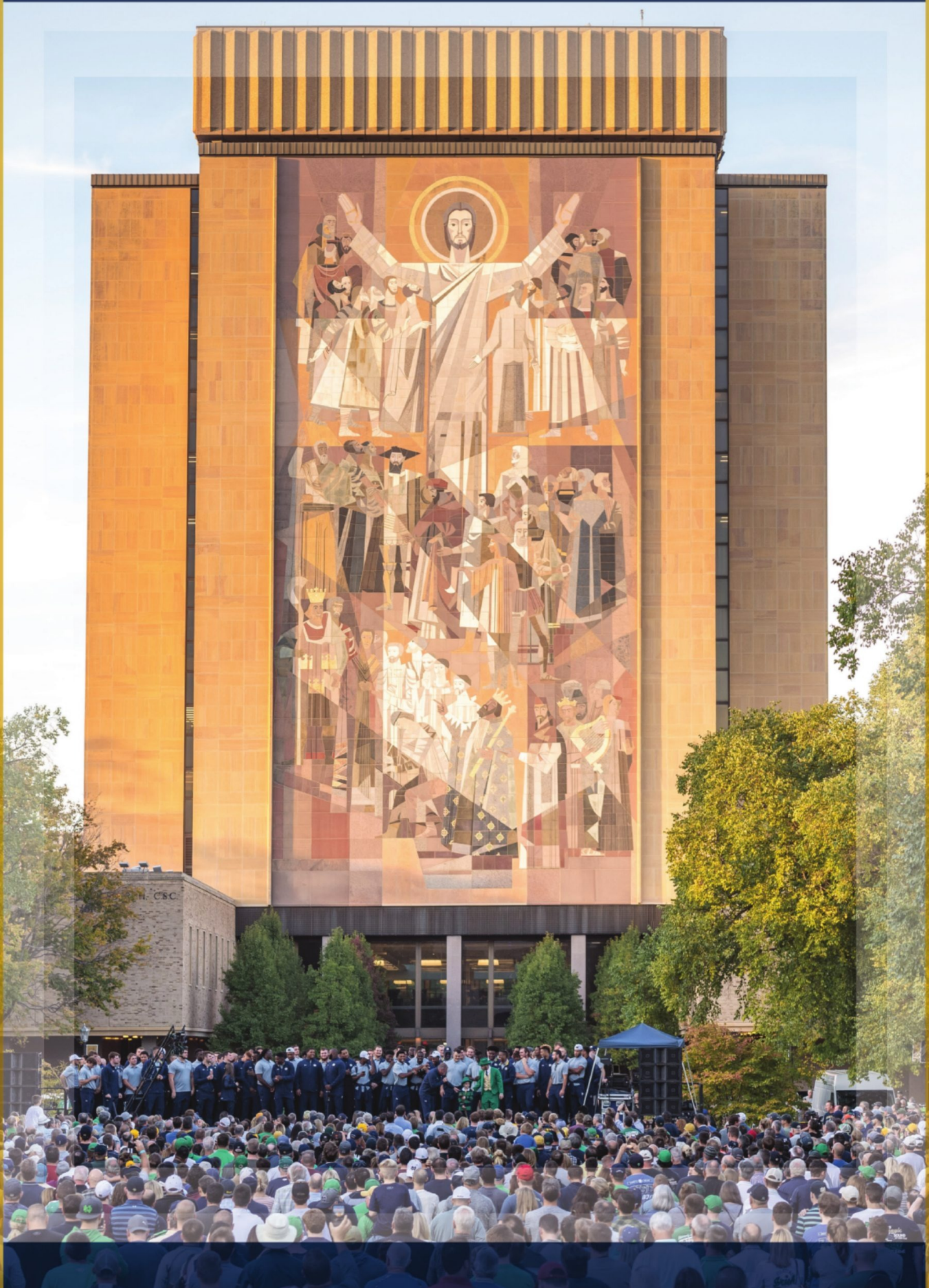

UNIVERSITY VICE PRESIDENT AND JAMES E. ROHR DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

John B. "Jack" Swarbrick Jr., a University of Notre Dame graduate now in his 13th year in 2020-21 as Vice President and James E. Rohr Director of Athletics at his alma mater, has attached his signature to a variety of new initiatives during his tenure:

- Creating the STAND TOGETHER movement in conjunction with Notre Dame student-athletes, an equality initiative developed to create change locally and to be a catalyst for change nationally as it relates to social justice. Promoted Angie Torain to the newly created position of Senior Associate Athletics Director for Culture, Diversity and Engagement to lead the department in these initiatives.
- Launching of Fighting Irish Media — a major enterprise that delivers student-athlete-centric information about and access to Notre Dame and its athletic programs via expanded production and distribution of programming.
- Developing a plan for expanding Notre Dame Stadium in order to make it a year-round asset for the University, while also improving the gameday experience for student-athletes and fans.
- That initiative became reality with the 2014 announcement of the Campus Crossroads Project that added new structures to three sides of Notre Dame Stadium — creating new homes for student activities and recreation, career services, digital media, as well as academic disciplines anthropology, psychology, music and sacred music.
- Hosting of major events to generate revenue for the campus and community. Since 2018 Notre Dame has hosted a Garth Brooks' concert in Notre Dame Stadium (October 2018), the NHL Winter Classic in Notre Dame Stadium (January 2019), the 2019 U.S. Senior Open at the Warren Golf Course (June 2019) and an international soccer match between Liverpool and Dortmund in Notre Dame Stadium (July 2019).
- Building of student-athlete programs to develop leadership skills, increase community service and provide mentoring and career services resources.
- Meeting the performance needs of Notre Dame student-athletes through establishment of a sports performance division to support and improve athletic performance through the application of science, medicine and technology.
- Creating systems and structures to maximize the impact of technical expertise, environments, technology and service delivery on an athlete's ability to optimize performance.

Over the past several years, Swarbrick played a major role in significant announcements that positively impacted Notre Dame on the national collegiate scene:

- The 2019 launch of the ACC Network on ESPN - a comprehensive linear and digital network that gives fans access to more than 600 exclusive live events from across the conference via a linear channel within the ESPN family of networks and a digital live-events channel - ACC Network Extra.



- Membership for Notre Dame's men's ice hockey program in the Big Ten Conference that began with the 2017-18 season. The Irish joined Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Ohio State, Penn State and Wisconsin to form a seven-team hockey conference. Notre Dame won Big Ten titles in each of its first two seasons in the league.
- Membership for Notre Dame's athletic teams (other than football and hockey) in the Atlantic Coast Conference that began with the 2013-14 athletic seasons. In football, Notre Dame plays five games per year against ACC opponents and has full access to the league's list of postseason bowl options.
- An extension of the University's relationship with NBC Sports through the 2025 football season.
- The 2014 announcement of an unmatched 10-year relationship with Under Armour that provides performance footwear, apparel and equipment for Irish athletic programs. In addition to being a shareholder in Under Armour, Notre Dame collaborates with Under Armour in the areas of sport technology, product development and athlete performance.
- Creation by the Bowl Championship Series of the four-team College Football Playoff, which started with the 2014 season, with Notre Dame maintaining viable access into that system.

- BCS National Championship selection in 2012 following an undefeated 12-0 regular season and a College Football Playoff semifinalist in 2018 after an undefeated 12-0 regular season.

THE BAND OF THE FIGHTING IRISH



The University of Notre Dame Band is the oldest collegiate band in continuous existence in the United States. Formed during the 1845-46 school year, it has performed at countless concerts, masses, parades, civic functions, commencements and athletic contests. The band presents a different halftime show for every home football game, performing music to entertain fellow students, faculty, alumni, and fans alike.

The band was on hand for Notre Dame's first football game in 1887 and every home game since. The band often performs at away games and accompanies the football team to major bowl games and to the Shamrock games at venues such as the Alamodome, Yankee Stadium, FedEx Field, Soldier Field, Lucas Oil Field and Fenway Park.

The University of Notre Dame Band was honored as the recipient of the 2011-12 Sudler Trophy, the "Heisman Trophy" of college bands, for "the highest of musical standards, innovative marching performances, and important contributions to the performance standards of college marching bands over a number of years."

Numbering approximately 400 students, Notre Dame has one of the largest college bands in the United States, all the more remarkable because the band members are all volunteers and receive no special scholarships for their service. Only a few band members are music majors. Students in the band represent all colleges and fields of study at the University, and include members from St. Mary's College and Holy Cross College. Marching band members are selected each August at auditions held the week before school begins. Many students who successfully audition for the band had never marched in high school, yet quickly learn Notre Dame's style of marching.

Two Notre Dame graduates, Rev. Michael Shea, C.S.C. and his brother John, wrote the greatest of all university fight songs, the *Notre Dame Victory March*, in 1908. First played on campus in 1909, the song achieved its great popularity in 1923 when Joseph Casasanta, band director 1923-1942, arranged it. Casasanta also wrote the music to the alma mater, *Notre Dame, Our Mother*. Robert O'Brien, band director 1952-1985, wrote *Damhsa Bua (Irish Victory Clog)*. Current director of bands Ken Dye composed *Celtic Chant*.

In addition to its marching band, Notre Dame is proud to have three concert bands, three jazz ensembles, three athletic bands and many section ensembles. The concert band tours annually to places as diverse as Scandinavia, New Zealand, Australia, Austria,

China, Japan, Canada, Brazil, England, Europe, South Africa and Carnegie Hall. Athletic bands play at home games and tournaments for men's and women's basketball and for hockey. Each year the jazz bands host Notre Dame's Collegiate Jazz Festival, begun in 1959 and the oldest college jazz event in the United States. Many Notre Dame band members play in marching band, concert band, jazz band, and an athletic band, with rehearsals and performances designed to fit the academic schedules of students in all majors and areas of study at the University.

H. Lee Hope, band director 1942-1951, formed the Irish Guard, precision marchers who lead the band in parades and onto the football field, in 1949. The Notre Dame plaid worn by the Guard and the band members was certified in 1970 to be an original Irish design.

Notre Dame Band members volunteer for various service projects in South Bend community centers, partnering with local Catholic Schools to provide area youth with the opportunity to learn a musical instrument. Band service also includes helping the less fortunate by serving at the Center for the Homeless and participating in the Adopt-A-Family program during the Holiday Season.

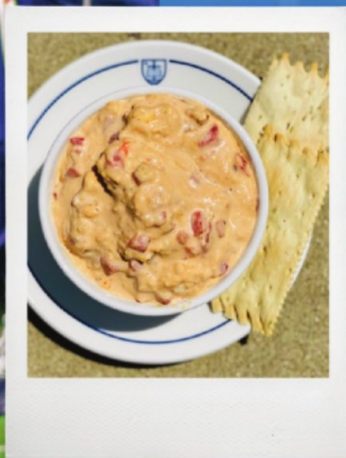

YEAR IN REVIEW



A balanced offense and disciplined defense left little doubt for the Notre Dame football team in the Camping World Bowl match-up with Iowa State, as the Irish registered their second straight 11-win season with a 33-9 victory at Camping World Stadium.



One of the finest point guards ever to wear the Notre Dame uniform, Niele Ivey was announced on April 22 as the fourth Karen & Kevin Keyes Family Head Women's Basketball Coach, just mere minutes after Muffet McGraw stepped down from her post after a Hall of Fame career of 33 seasons and two national championships.



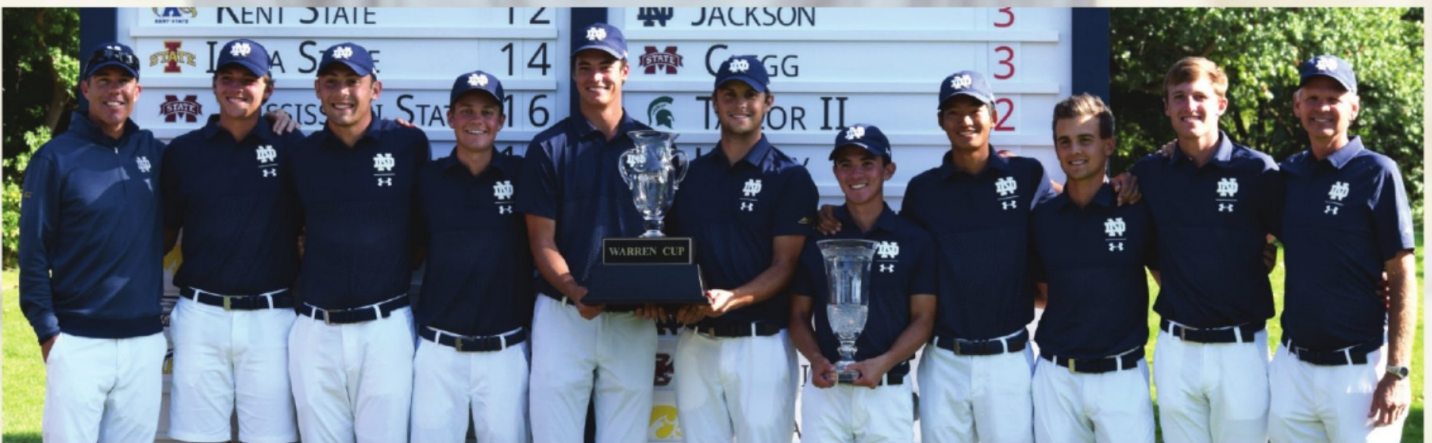
Irish men's basketball's John Mooney earned first-team all-ACC honors in 2019-20, leading the country in double-doubles (25) while pacing all major conference players with a 12.8 rebounds-per-game average.

The Notre Dame Fencing team won its fourth ACC Championship in the last five years for both the men and the women. The Irish swept all possible ACC Championships for the second straight year.



Not only did the 2019-20 men's golf team break the program record for tournaments won with four, but they also did so in the first five tournaments (all in the fall). The Irish also earned their first top-10 ranking in the modern era, reaching as high as No. 5 in the country.



The Irish Baseball team put together its best start to the season (11-2) since 2015. They finished 3-0 in ACC play and earned their first conference road sweep since 2016 before the season was cancelled due to COVID-19.



The Irish Women's Soccer program made its 26th NCAA Championship appearance in program history and advanced past the first round of the NCAA tournament for the 23rd time in school history.

At the 2020 ACC Championships, Jack Hoagland reached the podium in all three of his individual events, solidifying his place as the 2020 ACC Men's Swimming Freshman of the Year.



The Notre Dame Softball team traveled to Italy and Spain in the fall of 2019, visiting the sites and playing an exhibition game against a local Catalan softball team. It was the inaugural contest at the Camp de Softbol de Montjuic, pictured here, which stands overlooking the city of Barcelona.



On March 1, 2020, head coach Christine Halfpenny earned her 100th career victory as the head coach of Notre Dame women's lacrosse with a 13-9 triumph over Duke. The Irish finished the shortened 2020 season with a perfect 7-0 mark and a final national ranking of No. 2.



The Irish men's 2020 indoor DMR team set the second fastest time in NCAA history with a time of 9:25.80. Members of the team were Dylan Jacobs (1200), Edward Cheatham (400), Sam Voelz (800) and Yared Nuguse (1600).



For the second time in three seasons, Notre Dame volleyball clinched a berth in the NCAA Tournament after closing the regular season with a 19-9 record and a 12-6 mark in ACC play.

The Monogram Club, which was founded in 1916 by Jesse Harper and Knute Rockne, is comprised of student-athlete alumni from Notre Dame's 26 varsity sports, as well as the former field hockey and wrestling programs. Currently, there are over 8,500 Monogram winners living in all 50 U.S. states and over 35 countries around the world.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Notre Dame Monogram Club connects all Monogram winners by building community through fellowship and service towards enhancing the unique legacy of Notre Dame Athletics. The Monogram Club strives to deliver on the promise that joining the Notre Dame family is more than a four-year decision.

ROCKNE ATHLETICS FUND PARTNERSHIP

Annual Monogram Club member contributions to the Rockne Athletics Fund impact student-athletes through unique experiences like study abroad programs and team foreign trips. Additionally, Fighting Irish teams utilize the Rockne Athletics Fund to obtain essential day-to-day needs in areas such as training, nutrition and equipment. By contributing to the Rockne Athletics Fund, Monogram Club members can receive unique access to events and benefits, including the Club's football ticket application.

COMMUNITY

- The Monogram Club hosts fellowship, community service and career development opportunities for members throughout the year. These include on-campus receptions and regional events across the United States. Over the past few years, Monogram winners have connected at Club events in New York, Chicago, San Diego, Dallas, Atlanta, Tampa and Indianapolis.
- The Monogram Club is a resource for all Fighting Irish programs, especially when it comes to welcoming back the many different eras of Monogram winners for reunion festivities.

- Along with hosting Monogram jacket ceremonies for first time Monogram winners, the Club provides awards to student-athletes who earn additional Monograms throughout their Notre Dame careers.

LEGACY

- Since 1979, the Monogram Club has annually presented the Edward "Moose" Krause Distinguished Service Award to a member who has gone above and beyond in their commitment to the community and the ideals of Notre Dame.
- In 2016, the Monogram Club established the Jesse Harper Award to recognize members who have demonstrated a committed involvement with the Notre Dame Athletics Department and University.

SERVICE

- In June of 2020, the Monogram Club launched the *Era Extended* initiative series to deepen engagement with all of its members. A Monogram winner's connection and commitment to the University of Notre Dame extends well beyond their time on campus, and *Era Extended* will strive to deliver on the "four for forever" promise made to Fighting Irish student-athletes.
- The *Era Extended* series includes a podcast, networking/professional development resources, communications between alumni and their respective head coach/program, onboarding for recent graduates, young alumni honors and milestone anniversary recognitions.

ABBY HECK: DOING OUR PART

When the COVID-19 pandemic swept the nation, student-athletes across the country stopped competition and returned home. Many used their time to help their communities, including Abby Heck, now a senior on the women's golf team, who hails from Memphis, Tennessee.

Heck penned this account in April.

The spring season was set to be an exciting one for Notre Dame Women's Golf. We were chosen as a host site for NCAA Regionals, which was a big deal. We don't host a tournament at Notre Dame like our men's team, so nobody on our current roster has ever played an event at the Warren Golf Course. That was our goal: to play an NCAA Regional here in South Bend and to enjoy the home-course advantage. We had a lot of potential, and we were really looking forward to making it to regionals and possibly even advancing to nationals.

This year brought many changes as three amazing freshmen joined our team. In the fall, every single one of us shot our NCAA career-best round. Even though the season was cut short, we had a great year together. Our coaches were so supportive of all of us, and we got along really well.

To kick off our spring season, we took two training trips to Florida, where we stayed with Notre Dame alum Jimmy Dunne. Our first event was in Arizona, and we had one of our best tournaments of the year. Then-freshman Lauren Beaudreau even broke the program record for best individual tournament score and placed fifth overall.

Unfortunately, that was the only tournament we got to finish.

MAKING THE MOST

We spent most of Spring Break in Mesa, Arizona, getting ready for the Clover Cup, the tournament we host annually. During the official practice round on Thursday, conferences started canceling or postponing their seasons. The affected teams were required immediately to drop out and return home.

By the back nine, I think we all knew what was coming. The ACC was in the middle of a conference call. We didn't quite know that the whole season would be canceled, but I think each one of us suddenly realized that it might be senior Mia Ayer's last round of college golf.

We still prepared as if there'd be a tournament. With all six of us playing in the same group, though, we made it fun. We tried to put aside our anxiety about what was coming in order to make the most of our time playing together.

We were on the tee box of the last hole, and other groups started driving past us in golf carts. "You have to get off the course, now." We didn't play the last hole.

We had a team meeting at the clubhouse, and that's when we were told that the ACC had suspended the season and

that we needed to go home. My mom and my younger sister were in Arizona watching me; I never anticipated that I'd be going back to Memphis with them. That afternoon, we learned that the NCAA canceled Spring championships, which was really a shock. At that time, we still didn't realize just how bad this pandemic would become.

DO MY PART

Now, I'm back home in Tennessee with my parents and two sisters. We're a golfing family, and it's weird for all of us to be home for this extended time. Even in the summers, I'm usually on campus for summer school, or last year, I was studying in Spain.

On a typical day, I have my online classes, which begin at 7:20 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Once I'm done with class, I go to West Cancer Center, where I help screen patients for the coronavirus. I spend about twenty hours per week volunteering.

I'm a pre-med student interested in oncology. A doctor who I shadowed over Christmas break reached out to me saying they needed help with volunteers for, I think, two reasons. First, hospitals and clinics, and really all healthcare facilities, are understaffed to deal with such a pandemic. We have not faced such a large outbreak since the Spanish Flu nearly a hundred years ago. Second, most volunteers are older and at-risk; they especially need to stay home.

I'm right there in the doorway when people walk into the clinic. I ask about travel histories and symptoms. We don't turn anyone away, but if someone looks like they could be displaying symptoms of the virus, they're given a mask and seen separately. We have isolation rooms that are cleaned and kept empty for an hour between patients.

These practices are aimed at preventing the spread of the virus. We're trying to protect everyone there, especially the patients with cancer whose immune systems are already compromised.

It's been really interesting to be here day after day. I've shadowed a lot of doctors in the past and in different fields, but I don't usually have a chance to interact with patients or get to know them at all. Volunteering every day now, I see a lot of the same people, and I've had a lot of really meaningful conversations.

I've seen women walk out after finishing their last breast cancer treatment. They're so excited, and I've had fun celebrating with them. I've also seen patients who just received rather sad news about their prognosis. I've learned empathy, and that has been very moving.

Another great thing about this experience is that I've been able to use Spanish in a medical setting. When I was twelve, I decided that I wanted to learn Spanish after being paired with a girl from Columbia in a golf tournament. With the growing Hispanic population in the United States, I knew Spanish

would be useful in everyday life. However, I have just recently come to realize how impactful it can be in a medical setting.

My dad is an orthopaedic oncologist, and he has made learning Spanish his passion. Several years ago, he began studying the language on an app. I would wake up for school, and he'd be sitting in his chair, drinking coffee and practicing Spanish. That iPad was always with him. I had to listen to his bad Spanish on long car rides and family vacations, and we all teased him about his new obsession. It wasn't too long before I realized why learning Spanish was important to him.

He started coming home, excited like a little kid, telling us stories about being able to have conversations with his Hispanic patients. Even when my dad's Spanish was choppy and full of mistakes, his patients were touched by his effort. Spanish is just one of the many ways in which my dad forms meaningful relationships with his patients. With some, he may have a conversation about the Memphis Grizzlies. With others, he may ask about their hunting season. Whatever it is, my dad recognizes that, for a lot of patients, going to the doctor can be scary, especially patients with cancer at the oncology clinic. It's a really uncertain time in their lives, and they want to be treated as a person, not a statistic.

I'm really proud of how my dad forms relationships with his patients, and it's something I want to emulate in my own career. I have continued to develop my understanding of Spanish language and culture. I even took a class entitled "Spanish for the Medical Profession" last spring, which taught me about the differences between the healthcare systems of the United States and Latin American countries.

While volunteering, I have a lot of fun whenever Spanish-speaking patients arrive. I think they're pleasantly surprised to hear me speak in their native language. The interaction often goes past the questions about travel and symptoms and turns into a more meaningful conversation.

I feel like I've always wanted to be a doctor. When I was five, my dad worked at St. Jude, and I'd often go round with him to meet all the patients. I've been exposed to the medical system for such a long time, and it's always been a dream of mine to be a part of it. Now, even though my contribution is small compared to that of most healthcare professionals, it's rewarding to be on the frontlines of this pandemic and to help in the ways that I can. It makes me look forward to being able to do more in the future.

It's tough right now not to be with my teammates playing golf. Most of our home courses are closed, so practice is sporadic. Staying mentally tough is key. We need to remain focused and continue to work hard through the end of the semester.

Our team knows that we're all there for each other. We know that we'll get through to the fall, and we'll be on the course again before we know it. Even though this year was cut short, we know we have a lot of potential, and we're excited for next season.

Notre Dame is committed to conducting its intercollegiate athletics program with excellence and integrity. As an avid supporter of the Fighting Irish, we ask for your continued efforts to adhere to all applicable NCAA, conference and institutional rules and regulations.

NCAA rules are incredibly complex. The NCAA Division I Manual includes over 4,000 rules, and there are over 10,000 NCAA interpretations of those rules. An NCAA violation committed by a fan of Notre Dame Athletics could end the college career of a student-athlete or result in severe sanctions against the University. Therefore, we ask that you operate with one major philosophy in mind:

ASK BEFORE YOU ACT.

It is impossible to summarize NCAA rules on one page, but we will get you started with a few basics. For example, NCAA rules apply specifically to boosters. A booster is an individual that:

- Promotes any Notre Dame athletics program.
- Makes a financial contribution to Notre Dame athletics or its booster organizations.
- Assists in the recruitment of prospects for Notre Dame.
- Provides benefits (e.g., jobs, occasional meals) to enrolled student-athletes or their family or friends.
- Has purchased season tickets for any Notre Dame athletics program.

It is important to remember that once designated a Notre Dame booster, you retain that designation permanently.

KEY REMINDERS EVERY FIGHTING IRISH FAN SHOULD KNOW:

- Boosters **MAY** forward the name or any information about a prospect to the appropriate Notre Dame coaching staff.
- Boosters **MAY NOT** contact a prospect and/or his or her family in an attempt to recruit him/her on behalf of Notre Dame athletics (this includes the use of social media such as Twitter, Facebook or Instagram).
- Boosters **MAY** speak to a prospect and/or his or her family generally about Notre Dame IF AND ONLY IF the prospect initiates the contact; however, boosters **MAY NOT** engage in "recruiting conversation."
- Boosters **MAY NOT** provide or make arrangements to offer the prospect and/or his or her family or friends any benefit or service — including transportation, meals, lodging (including booster's home), a loan, vehicle, gifts, academic assistance or summer camp fees.
- Boosters **MAY** provide a legitimate employment opportunity to a student-athlete provided the student-athlete is paid the going rate for work actually performed.
- Boosters **MAY** provide student-athletes with a *pre-approved* occasional meal in the booster's home or on Notre Dame's campus.
- Boosters **MAY NOT** provide a student-athlete and/or his family or friends with any free or discounted benefit or service not available to the general public. Examples include: transportation, cash, gifts, meals, clothing, use of unadvertised discounts, etc.
- Boosters **MAY NOT** use a student-athlete's name, picture or appearance in a commercial advertisement, business promotion or product endorsement.
- Boosters **MAY NOT** sell any memorabilia using the name or image of a current student-athlete, including items that have been autographed by a current student-athlete.
- Booster **MAY NOT** purchase game tickets, apparel, equipment or awards from current student-athletes.

The support of our fans is not only welcomed, but vital to the success of our student-athletes on and off the field. Our staff is readily accessible to answer your questions and we gladly serve as a valuable resource for alumni and boosters. 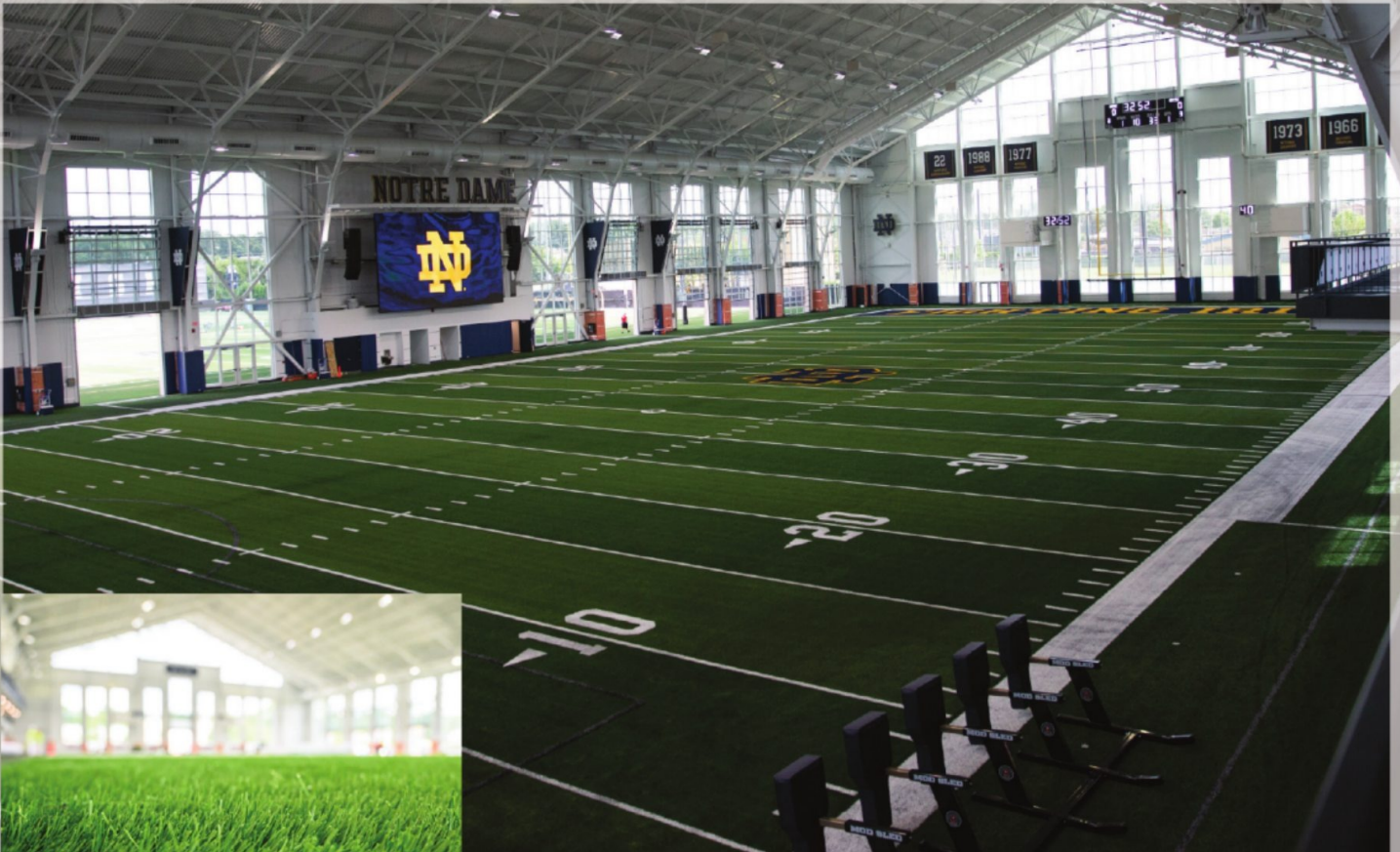

The University of Notre Dame opened a new indoor facility in July 2019 that expanded the indoor space available to the football and soccer programs.

Constructed on the former western-most field of the Notre Dame football team's LaBar Practice Complex, the 111,400-square-foot Irish Indoor Athletics Center has been under-written by gifts from a number of benefactors.

Jack Swarbrick, vice president and James E. Rohr Director of Athletics at Notre Dame, noted that new NCAA policies require colleges and universities to provide practice times for student-athletes that are conducive to a productive academic plan and healthy overall lifestyle.

"Much as we have done with our approach to the Compton Family Ice Arena and the recent additions surrounding the football stadium, our focus when developing athletic facilities is to create uses that extend beyond varsity athletics," he said. "In this instance, in addition to creating what we believe will be the best indoor football practice facility in



the country, we are creating additional recreational, club sport and community opportunities, while also ensuring that the students on our other varsity teams are practicing at times that allow for a more typical student experience."

The University of Notre Dame and exclusive football broadcast partner NBC Sports announced in September the broadcast crew for the 2020 campaign, which will mark the 30th season of the Notre Dame on NBC partnership. The slate will feature a pair of primetime games at Notre Dame Stadium, and coverage will feature Mike Tirico (play-by-play) and Super Bowl-winning head coach and Pro Football Hall of Famer Tony Dungy.

Dungy will be paired with Tirico and Kathryn Tappen as lead analyst to call Fighting Irish games. The crew will be joined by new NBC Sports host and Notre Dame alum Jac Collinsworth, who will host NBC Sports' pre-game, halftime and post-game coverage and on select weeks will be joined by Heisman Trophy winner Doug Flutie.

Tirico returns as the voice of Notre Dame Football on NBC and is joined for the first time by Dungy, who played quarterback at the University of Minnesota from 1973-76. Dungy has also been an analyst on NBC's Football Night in America since 2009 and has worked numerous NFL games as an analyst, including the Thanksgiving night primetime game. Tappen returns as sideline reporter for her seventh season, while Flutie transitions this season from the booth to the studio for select weeks.

Five of Notre Dame's six home games will be broadcast on NBC. The Notre Dame-South Florida game slated for Saturday, Sept. 19 is the exception, as it will be aired

on the USA Network, a member of the NBC family of networks.

Coming off three-consecutive seasons with at least 10 victories, Dick Corbett Head Football Coach Brian Kelly and his squad, ranked No. 10 in both major preseason polls, will open the home slate on Sept. 12 when Duke visits for a 2:30 p.m. ET kickoff. It will be the seventh meeting on the gridiron between the Irish and the Blue Devils. South Florida will then visit on Sept. 19 for another 2:30 p.m. ET kickoff.

The Irish return home for the first of two primetime games in the House That Rockne Built when they play host to Florida State on Saturday, Oct. 10. The Irish and Seminoles will kick off at 7:30 p.m. ET. Next on the home docket is a contest with Louisville, set for 2:30 p.m. ET on Oct. 17.

Nov. 7 will bring the Clemson Tigers to Notre Dame Stadium for the first time since 1979. The matchup will kick at 7:30 p.m. ET, with NBC pregame coverage beginning at 7 p.m. ET. The teams last met in 2018 at the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl.

The home slate concludes with a Dec. 5 visit from Syracuse. A kickoff time is yet to be determined.

NBC Sports Group and the University of Notre Dame began their landmark Notre Dame Football relationship in 1991 and have renewed the partnership numerous times.

FIVE CAPTAINS SELECTED FOR 2020-21 NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL CAMPAIGN



2020 TEAM CAPTAINS

SHAUN CRAWFORD | ROBERT HAINSEY | DAELIN HAYES | IAN BOOK | ADE OGUNDEJI

Dick Corbett Head Football Coach Brian Kelly announced five team captains for Notre Dame's 2020 football campaign this fall. They include returning 2019 captains QB Ian Book and OL Robert Hainsey, as well as first-time captains S Shaun Crawford, DL Daelin Hayes and DL Adetokunbo Ogundeji.

Book and Hainsey earn the role as rare two-time captains, just the 23rd and 24th Notre Dame players in the program's 131-season history to ever serve multiple seasons as a team captain. More than 200 players have served in the captain role for Irish Football.

IAN BOOK

Graduate student quarterback Ian Book returns as the starter in 2020, marking the first time the Irish enter a season with a quarterback boasting at least two seasons of majority of games started (23-of-26 games from 2018-19) since Jimmy Clausen in 2009 (22-of-25-games from 2007-08). Already named to the Manning Award, Maxwell Trophy and O'Brien Award watch lists for 2020, the 2019 team captain and Notre Dame Offensive Player of the Year finished the season 240-for-399 with 3,034 yards and 34 touchdowns, throwing just six interceptions. He also ran 112 times for 546 yards and four touchdowns.

With his 2019 performance, Book became the first quarterback in Notre Dame history with at least 2,500 passing yards, 500 rushing yards and 30 TD passes in a season. Oklahoma's Jalen Hurts was the only other FBS quarterback to reach those milestones in 2019.

SHAUN CRAWFORD

A sixth-year graduate student, Crawford was named Honorable Mention for the 2019 CoSIDA Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year, honoring his success and perseverance in battling back from multiple injuries. Awarded a sixth year (2020) by the NCAA due to these injuries, Crawford finished the 2019 season with 28 tackles (19 solo), one TFL, an interception, two pass break-ups and a QB hurry. He played in 11 games, making eight starts, while overcoming a dislocated elbow suffered against Virginia. He returned after missing just two games.

Crawford made a season-high five tackles against Virginia Tech, and his interception came in the 66-14 win over New Mexico.

ROBERT HAINSEY

A candidate for the 2020 William V. Campbell Trophy, recognizing the nation's top football senior scholar-athlete, Hainsey begins his true senior campaign following a season in which he did not allow a sack on 423 snaps (252 pass plays), and conceded just two QB hits and six QB hurries. The 2019 team captain and four-time offseason workout captain (SWAT captain) started the first eight games last season before suffering a season-ending injury against Virginia Tech, and was honored as team Offensive Lineman of the Year. He was named to the Pro Football Focus National Offensive Team of the Week (2019 Week 5 vs. Virginia) and the Irish Offensive Line was named to the Joe Moore Award Midseason Honor Roll.

DAELIN HAYES

Graduate student Hayes was selected to both the AFCA Good Works Team watch list, which honors a student-athlete's impact off the field, and the 2020 Wuerffel Trophy Watch List, known as "College Football's Premier Award for Community Service." He played in four games in 2019 prior to suffering a season-ending shoulder injury against Virginia. Over those games, he recorded six tackles (three for loss) and a sack. In his career, Hayes has totaled 78 tackles (14.5 TFL) in 41 games.

Hayes has also been a leader in Notre Dame Football's social justice efforts, leading the organization of a rally in honor of Juneteenth on the Notre Dame campus. Hayes spearheaded the charge in organizing the event in roughly 72 hours, and was one of the main speakers at the rally. He is also active with the Robinson Community Learning Center and other community service efforts.

ADE OGUNDEJI

A mainstay on the Irish defense, graduate student Ogundeji totaled 34 tackles in 2019 (seven for loss) and 4.5 sacks. Playing in all 13 games, he also forced three fumbles and recovered another, returning it 23 yards for a touchdown vs. Virginia. Additionally, Ogundeji earned the second-highest overall defensive grade on the team for 2019 per Pro Football Focus (82.2). With the departure of NFL talent in Khalid Kareem and Julian Okwara from the defensive line, Ogundeji will step into a starting role in 2020. In his career, he has played in 31 games, posting 56 tackles (28 solo), 10 TFL, six sacks and a pass break-up.
