The Allstate Sugar Bowl

For the Good of New Orleans

The Allstate Sugar Bowl, which will host the 89th edition of its football classic on December 31, is comprised of more than 100 male and female volunteer members whose sole purpose is to sponsor and promote amateur sporting events as well as to foster revenue to spark economic growth in the city of New Orleans and the state of Louisiana.

Colonel James M. Thompson, publisher of *The New Orleans Item*, and sports editor Fred Digby, first presented the idea of a New Year's Day football classic for New Orleans in 1927. After many years of hard work, the idea came to fruition during the depths of the Great

Depression, with the first Sugar Bowl Classic, between Tulane and Temple, being played on January 1, 1935. The event has gone on to survive many difficulties, including a World War and a devastating hurricane, to establish itself as one of the most uniquely successful amateur athletic achievements in the history of American sports.



While the Sugar Bowl Committee is known for its outstanding tradition of providing the best action that college football has to offer, the Sugar Bowl is more than just a football game – a whole lot more.

The founding members of the Sugar Bowl Committee, laid the groundwork for one of the most successful amateur sports franchises in history.

From its inception, the Sugar Bowl Committee, originally known as the Mid-Winter Sports Association, has been free of political entanglement. Under the charter it was stipulated that

it was to be a “voluntary, non-profit civic organization whose members serve without remuneration.” In practice, this means that every Sugar Bowler buys his/her own tickets to all events.

While the Sugar Bowl Committee is known for its outstanding tradition of providing the best action that college football has to offer, the Sugar Bowl is more than just a football game – a whole lot more.

The work of the Sugar Bowl's volunteer membership is evident in the many different

sporting events the committee sponsors each year. In addition to holding a prominent position in postseason college football, the Bowl also conducts competitions at the prep and intercollegiate levels. Sports included in the Bowl's repertoire include basketball, golf, lacrosse, sailing, soccer, swimming, tennis, track and field and volleyball; the bowl also serves as a sponsor for championship events of the Louisiana High School Athletic Association. All of these events introduce New Orleans' unique flavor of hospitality to competitors and fans from around the world. In a typical year, the Allstate Sugar Bowl gives opportunities and recognition to thousands of student-athletes from elementary school levels through collegiate competition.

In addition to its many events, the Bowl is also heavily involved with several other local organizations. The Allstate Sugar Bowl sponsors the Greater New Orleans Sports Hall of Fame; The Manning Award, given to the nation's most outstanding college football

quarterback; the Eddie Robinson Award, presented to the top college football coach at the FBS level; and the local chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame.

All of these activities hail back to the original goal of the organization of promoting tourism and economic growth in the region. Over the last decade, the Bowl has generated over \$2.2 billion of economic impact for New Orleans and Louisiana.

"I've performed the national anthem quite a bit," said Shaw, whose been in the music entertainment business since she was 10. "I've done it at NBA games, the (New Orleans) Hornets and then the (New Orleans) Pelicans. But as a girl who grew up in Louisiana, to go out in the middle of the green field of the Superdome for a Saints game is amazing. There's nothing more exhilarating than to have all those people come together and cheer at the end of the song. It's so intense; it's hard to put into words."

Music has been engrained into Shaw's world for as long as she can remember. That exposure greatly paid off as she has carved out her place in Cajun culture and

has become one of the most recognizable brands in Louisiana music. From national appearances on the Rosie O'Donnell Show, to once-in-a-lifetime performances with Cyndi Lauper, her magnetic presence has helped her build an extraordinary following of fans and supporters.

Younger fans look up to Shaw because of her extraordinary fiddling skills and sassy sense of style while older fans respect her strong work ethic and sincere sensibility. Audiences of all ages agree that Shaw's musical talent and appealing personality give her a special flair and make her an incredible representative of Louisiana's melting pot of music.

"I don't know if I consider myself a leader in the New Orleans music scene," Shaw said. "There are so many amazing performers in New Orleans. I'm just a girl with my fiddle. I will say this much; there are incredible roots and soil here. It fuels so many other genres and people from all over. I'm proud to be part of this scene."

Shaw's award-winning music and high-energy performances with her band, The Cute Guys, produces a unique balance of mainstream harmonies with grassroots charm. She continues to master her technique by putting a personal Louisiana twist on performances at festivals and events around the world - locally, regionally and internationally.

Shaw released her sixth album in 2020, titled Joie. It is her first traditional Cajun recording and it celebrates the rich history of Cajun culture infused through her roots in authentic Louisiana music.

"I knew I wanted to call it 'Joie,' which is French for joy," she told Nola.com. "Little did I know that 2020 was going to be an interesting time to have a record called 'Joie.' But I don't regret it at all. I feel like everyone could use a little joy."

In addition to her music, Shaw has established the Amanda Shaw Foundation, an organization dedicated to serving and supporting local families in the community. The foundation supports efforts to build, sustain and empower strong Louisiana families through music, food and culture.

But music remains her focus. And her legions of fans have flocked to her shows throughout the region and at events like French Quarter Festival and the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival.
