The Souhterners were even more deadly at the free throw, however, netting 14 of 15 charity tosses.

Jerry Westhafer and Ellenwood rounded out a new starting five for Coach Bud Kennedy which he relieved with only one substitution. Westhafer's push-shots were good for 14 points, and Ellenwood, who alternated at guard with Lou Fisher, looked especially sharp for a freshman playing his first varsity game. In fact, it was the first time that the Fort Wayne foots baller had dressed with the varsity.
