

U-M STRESSES TEAMWORK, WALLOPS FSU

Years of woeful University of Miami teamwork, unhappily mulled over by fretful supporters during past dry spells, appeared at an end today. Playing machine basketball like no other Miami team before it, Dave Wike's pupils dumped taller Florida State with simple set-ups last night, earning an easy 93-65 victory in the Gables Coliseum.

Disregarding its height disparity, Miami maneuvered under the basket with amazing success in shoving the Seminoles out of unbeaten status in the state title race, the Hurricanes now remain alone on top of the heap.

Main credit in the 30-point route goes to two productive, under-the-net agents, Willie Schayowitz and Howard Keene. To the delight of another slim audience of 1,193, Schayowitz, the home-town boy, and Keene, a Duquesne, Pa. transplant, scored 56 points between them, mostly on easy cribs while confused Seminoles staggered around aimlessly.

Wike Is Pleased

"Schayowitz was fine off the boards," Wike said after the lop-sided win, Miami's fifth in nine season starts and third in state competition. "He was putting them in there, wasn't he?"

Willie, who as an all-state high school star never scored over 25 in a single game, hit on 14 close field goals, 10 of which were executed on sharp passes from the outside. Keene had a hand here too, feeding consistently to Schayowitz who totaled 31 for the evening.

State tied itself up on its only advantage—height. Close-guarding Hurricanes pressed the Seminoles into long shooting where they were hopelessly inadequate. Schayowitz, Miami Jackson's 6'3" pride and joy who gets off the ground with the agility of a high jumper, blocked shots and stole rebounds from Seminoles four inches taller, exasperating to say the least.

FSU led once, 8-7 in the early stages, but slipped behind midway in the first quarter and slowly subsided. Out-jumped and out-shot, the Seminoles were at a 26-15 disadvantage in 10 minutes.

Novel Halftime Show

A four and one-half minute point draught early in the second period cut the Hurricane lead to 37-30 at halftime. While Wike figured out the point-famine in the dressing room, two football-basketball teams, complete in head gear and ignoring the gentlemanly basketball rules, fagged themselves out with body blocks and tackles for 10 solid minutes. Those who missed the half-time fiasco will get a chance to see it again Monday night when Miami meets Stetson.

Miami pulled away in the third period, marked by some radical officiating, leading 63-44 with a period left.
