Florida State's basketball team turned the tables on high-scoring Miami here last night, taking the Hurricanes, 93-69, as 4,000 fans whooped their approval.

After a slow start, the Seminoles did most things right.

The Tribe beat Miami decisively on the boards as Dan Boltz, 6-6 senior center, pulled down 23 rebounds, an FSU season high. Aided tremendously by this big individual effort, the Seminoles outrebounded UM, 72 to 47.

Once again, guards Hugh Durham and Don Bates were a deadly scoring pair. Durham, averaging better than 23 points per game, got 20 in this one. Bates' fadeaway shots were clicking smoothly and he totaled 25.

Playing its third game in as many north Florida nights, Miami appeared a bit road-weary. The Seminoles out-ran the visitors all evening.

Though Miami didn't hit a field goal until the game was 5:30 old, it managed to stay close for awhile.

Ahead 13-11, the Seminoles started their race, extended things to 25-13 before Miami got

another point.

It was 39-23 at halftime. Midway the last half, FSU held its biggest lead, 73-45.

FSU got a surprising contribution from John Richter, 6-5 junior college grad who had appeared but briefly in three previous games, getting no points. Richter racked 12 against the Hurricanes, did well defensively.

Joe Gardner, 6-2 Miami guard, threw in 19 points, was high scorer for Miami in its Tallahassee game for the third straight year. Dick Hickox, 5-6 guard, star netted 16. Dick Berghoff, the 7-0 junior center who's been demoted from starting rank since last season, didn't score.

It was FSU's sixth victory in 17 starts. Miami's sixth setback in 14. Earlier in The Citadel Invitational tourney, Miami had beaten FSU, 85-79. Miami had gone into the week with the nation's highest scoring average, 89.3.

The crowd of 4,000 was one of the largest to watch a basketball game at FSU.

FSU's next engagement is

Monday night against Georgia at Athens.

FSU's freshmen were at their best in the preliminary as they downed the Hurricane frosh, 92-72.

Miami made it close for a half, but the Baby Seminoles pulled away after intermission. The halfway score was 47-43, FSU.

Jack Davis and Tim Edney led the high-scoring attack with 22 points each. All FSU starters scored in double figures.

Rufus Ashworth netted 13, Ray Swain had 11 and Dave Fedor got 10.

Ken Allen paced the Miami scoring with 25 points.

It was the fifth win in six starts for the FSU freshmen.
