Little (5-10) Jack Davis handcuffed little (5-6) Dick Hickox, and big (6-6) Dave Fedor outdid big (7-1) Mike McCoy as Florida State's plenty hot basketball team upset Miami's plenty touted squad, 89-78, here last night.

Fedor hit on seven, got 20 of 27 for 74 per cent.

Hotshot Hickox, who has scored more points than any player in Miami history, emerged from this one with the lowest total in his personal history.

Davis allowed him a free throw in the first half, a field goal in the second. Grand total: three points. Hickox shot eight times from the field.

It was a remote holler from Hickox's last appearance in Tully gym. A year ago he hit 31 points here and beat FSU on a last-second field goal, 93-91.

HOT SHOOTING

Fedor was his usually marvelous self, throwing in 23 points—16 in the first half—and pulling down 19 rebounds.

He was the leader of a rather phenomenal FSU effort at the foul line. The Seminoles bagged 27 of

30 free throws. Fedor hit on seven of seven.

The Zephyrhills junior had plenty of help. All five FSU starters hit in double figures—Fedor for his 37th consecutive game. Ray Swain got 21, Dale Ricketts 16, Rufus Ashworth 13, Davis 11.

Ricketts got his 16 in the first half. He hurt an ankle in the late going.

Miami's giant McCoy looked unstoppable on a twisting jump shot in the first half, bagged 14 points. Then FSU switched from its zone defense to a man-to-man. McCoy ended with 19 for the night, one less than teammate Julie Cohen, who also had 14 at intermission.

QUICK SWITCH

UM looked the stronger in the early going, quickly pulled to a 6-points lead, at 9-3. With 6:10 to go in the half, Miami led, 40-35, and that was when Coach Bud Kennedy pulled his defensive switch.

Miami enjoyed its biggest lead at 44-37.

Then the Seminoles, spurred by Ricketts, went on an 11-0 tear to grab a 48-44 halftime lead as Fedor leaped to steal a pass and fired in a 2-pointer as the buzzer sounded.

FSU recovered. The

sounded.

Miami never recovered. The Hurricanes pulled within two points a couple of times early in the last half. No closer.

With 9:33 to go the Seminoles had their fattest margin, at 75-61. Miami's muchly under-rated Ron Godfrey fouled out with 10:25 to play, and that helped. He had bagged 17 points.

EVEN RECORD

For the Seminoles, this was an even-upper, bringing the record to 6-6. Miami's loss was only its fifth in 14 starts. All setbacks have been on the road.

Florida State hit on 49 of its field goal attempts, Miami on 47. While the Tribe was bagging 90 per cent of its free throws, Miami

got 20 of 27 for 74 per cent.

The Seminoles had a slight edge in rebounding, 39 to 36.

Those 89 points were the most totalled by FSU this season.

Fedor, who along with Davis and Swain played all the way, now has scored 87 points (29.0 average) and bagged 49 rebounds in three games with Miami.

Tully Gym was packed with one of the biggest crowds ever to see a basketball game in Tallahassee, roughly 4,200 folks.

FROSH WIN

In a preliminary game, Florida State's freshmen tumbled Gulf Coast Junior College of Panama City, 68-42.

The Baby Seminoles jumped to a 10-lead and won going away, outscoring Gulf Coast, 35-17, after intermission. They held an 8-points halftime lead.

Guard Bobby Lovell of Chattanooga paced Coach Fred Jowers quint with 21 points, mostly on outside jump shots. Sam Butler added 14 points. Billy Cordell led the losers, now 2-6, with 16 points.

FSU's freshmen meet Auburn Freshmen at Columbus, Ga., Tuesday night as a preliminary to the FSU-Auburn varsity match period.
