

MIAMI FALLS— Foul play was a familiar difference here last night as Florida State's basketball team fell to Miami's 82-75.

An average crowd of 4,534 watched FSU in Convention Hall. The Seminoles sank 30 of 50 shots, including 12 free-throws, but with less than half an hour to go in the second half, put in a 20-0 run in the final.

FSU coach Al McGuire called on it, comparing the game with four minutes to go in the first half. Miami coach Frank McGuire called.

The Seminoles played poorly, fell behind 20-10 after four minutes. In the first six minutes FSU scored 10. Top scorer, Al McGuire, hit 10 shots. Rick Barry, back to the bench with three fouls in the first half.

The Seminoles rallied from their 8-point deficit to overtake Miami at 17-17 on a Jerry Shirley field goal with eight minutes left in the first half.

But with Barry hitting seven of eight at the foul line in the first half and Wayne Beckner

hitting with floor shots, Miami moved to a 20-10 lead at intermission.

Barry finished with a game-high 24 points, getting 12 of 13 at the foul line. Beckner put in 20, as did Miami guard Junior Gee, who spurred Miami's last-half effort with 14.

Florida State fought back after intermission and moving within winning range a couple of times. On two occasions the Seminoles attempted a slow-down. During time pulled the court with paper cups and other items.

With eight minutes remaining FSU got within 20-26 range on a Shirley shot. But two free throws by Gee immediately moved Miami to a 5-points spread, and the Seminoles were never closer after that.

Five FSU players hit in double figures, led by Bobby Lovell's 18. Shirley and Gary Schull got 14 apiece, Ken Leaky 13 and Malmen 10.

Florida State put in six more field goals than Miami, leading 23 to 26 from the floor. The Seminoles hit better than 30 per cent of their floor shots, 32 of 99. But the spread in Miami's favor at the foul line was more than enough to offset it.

Miami led in rebounding 38 to 32 as Barry pulled down a game-high 12, just one more than FSU's Shirley.

It was Miami's 17th straight home victory as the Hurricanes closed the season with a 22-4 record. One of the setbacks was a 1-pointer to FSU in Tallahassee.

The Seminoles, with a 15-10 record, finish at home Saturday night against Georgia.
