Coach Hugh Durham's high-scoring FSU cagers hit the hundred mark for the fifth time this season here Friday night humbling the Miami Hurricanes 122-93 before a packed house at Tully Gym.

Miami never led in the one-sided contest as Florida State placed six men in double figures and dominated the rebounding 60-39 en route to its seventh win in its last eight outings.

Florida State opened with a slower-paced, deliberate style of play and after the first five minutes led 10-7.

Then the Seminoles began to step up the pace as Jan Gies and Dave Cowens dominated the boards while the floor play of Jeff Hogan and Darrell Stewart rattled the visitors.

Midway through the first half substitutes Randy Cable and Dale Klay took over for Stewart and Gies and dumped in eight and ten points respectively as the Seminoles built a 57-39 halftime lead.

Cowens and Gies contributed a dozen points each to lead the first-half Seminole surge, which effectively put the game out of Miami's reach.

Florida State was leading 34-25 with 5:51 to go in the first half when Bob DePathy sank a free throw. Cowens made good on a 30-footer. Klay pumped in a turn-around jumper, Hogan drove in for a layup, and Stewart dropped in a sensational hook shot to make it 43-25 with 3:45 left and change the complexion of the game.

Both teams traded baskets on even terms the rest of the half to leave Florida State ahead by 18 at the break, 57-39.

As the second half began, two tip-in shots by Dick Danford and a two-pointer by Hogan stretched the Seminole lead to 24 points and set the tone for the period.

Florida State methodically held onto its lead and occasionally increased it while pushing toward the century mark in scoring.

Gies' tip-in with 4:52 left gave the Seminoles a 100-77 margin. DePathy's free throws with 24 seconds remaining made the FSU tally 122, while

Tom Masters' final Miami basket left the Hurricanes with 93.

Cowens and Danford both fouled out midway through the second half, but the Seminoles continued to dominate the rebounding and increased their lead from 22 to 29 points after the duo left.

Miami's Don Curnutt was the game's high scorer with 26 points, followed by teammate Rusty Parker with 24. Half of Parker's points came in the final nine minutes after Cowens and Danford had fouled out.

Gles topped the Seminoles

scoring with 22, while Cable added 20, Cowens 17, Hogan 15, Stewart 12, and Klay 10 to the FSU total, second highest of the season. FSU sank 28 of 31 free throws and 47 of 100 floor shots.

Rebounding leader Cowens continued to dominate the boards, pulling down 17 while Gles added 12 and Danford and Klay seven each for the Seminoles. Parker and Billy Soens had nine each for Miami.

Victory gives Florida State a 9-4 record. Miami is now 8-6.

The scheduled game between the FSU freshmen and Tyndall Air Force Base was cancelled.
