JACKSONVILLE — Out front by only six points at half time, Florida State applied extreme pressure over the final 20 minutes last night and blew Miami right out of the Civitan Sunshine Basketball Tournament with a spectacular 111-84 victory.

The red-hot Seminoles, now 2-0 for the season and averaging 115.5 points per contest, a surprising Jacksonville University quint which upset the University of Florida 67-64 late Friday night.

Sophomore Skip Young was the spark which ignited the Tribe run-away victory. The 6-3 speedster from Columbus, Ohio, tossed in 22 points, had 14 rebounds and five assists in a sensation performance.

This is one more point than he scored in Florida State's

120-75 opening game triumph against Valdosta State.

Four other Seminoles were in double figures as Coach Hugh Durham cleaned his bench during the second-half romp. Jeff Hogan contributed 16 points. Dave Cowens and Dale Klay 14 each, followed by Ken Bush's 12. Cowens grabbed 10 rebounds in a part-time performance since he has been hampered all week by the flu.

"I thought our pressure defense in the second half was the difference," said Durham. "We were real tight during the first half, but when we got limbered up in the last 20 minutes I thought we played pretty well."

The Hurricanes, who started three sophomores, just couldn't match Florida State's speed and quickness over the long haul. Miami's hot-shooting guard, Don Curnutt, got 18 of

his 20 points during the first half. He wound up tied with 6-6, 230-pound Willie Allen at 20 points apiece.

It was a close contest for 20 minutes with Miami pulling ahead 40-36 with just over two minutes remaining before intermission. However a bucket by Young, one by Willie Williams and another by Young plus Klay's jumper just before the buzzer gave Florida State a 46-40 advantage.

Then came the second-half onslaught, which at one time saw the Seminoles outscore Miami 38-5. With 1:16 lapsed following the break, Florida State had jumped its advantage to 56-40 and it took that amount of time for the Hurricanes to get on the scoreboard as Allen finally tossed in a pair of free throws.

First it was Young who

started FSU on the right track with two early buckets in the second half. Then Klay caught fire from the corners and poured three straight through the nets. From then on, everyone got into the act.

The flu-weaken Cowens contributed four baskets before retiring with about eight minutes left on the clock.

Miami who started a front

Miami, who started a front line consisting of Allen (6-6), Ron Welch (6-8) and Wayne Canaday (6-7) simply couldn't match FSU's speed and the Canes couldn't stay up with Durham's substitutions.

Durham used all 13 players and everyone but guard Ken Macklin got into the scoring act.

The Seminoles hit 47 per cent from the field, but had a poor night at the foul line when they sank only 15 of 26 attempts.
