

Iron man Frank Davis became the winningest pitcher in Florida State baseball history and the Seminoles kept alive post-season tournament aspirations in a 16-3 pounding of Miami's Hurricanes here yesterday.

The teams were to duel again today at 1:30 in a regular-season finale that could send one team back to campus and the other to the District 3 NCAA playoffs at Gastonia, N.C., next month.

BIG INNING

Danny Litwhiler's Seminoles paraded 15 batters to the plate in an 11-run first inning yesterday that quickly quieted a nine-game Miami winning streak. It was only the sixth loss, three to FSU—inflicted on the Hurricanes, who have won 19 games.

FSU has a 12-9 record. A late-season resurgence that includes a two-game sweep over Florida and a possible victory today could project the hard-hitting Tribe into the tournament picture.

"I thought they were going to knock the fences down out there," Miami Coach Whitey Campbell said. Campbell had a point. Of 16 FSU hits, nine went for extra bases, five of them in that giant 11-run first.

An oddity of the opening barrage was a triple and a home run hammered by both center-fielder Bob Clem and second baseman Jack Dull before Miami could retire the Tribe for the first time. Clem's triple was his fifth this season, tying Bob Hudson's 1953 school record. Dull's homer was his fourth, keeping his team home-run lead one ahead of Clem.

RAISES MARK

Clem raised his team-leading batting average to .378 with his triple and homer in two official trips.

Davis, notching his eighth 1960 victory against three losses, got his most solid support in a successful bid for a career pitching record. The victory matched Davis' 1959 record and gives the Miami junior a two-year chart of 16-6. Tommy Garcia held the previous school record of 15 victories set over four seasons.

Davis tamed the 'Canes on four hits and one unearned run for five innings before giving way to Ray McShane and Mike Hudgins. Litwhiler wanted to save Davis for possible relief day. Jim Daniel (2-1) wa

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ter stroked a two-run homer.

After building up a 16-1 lead in six innings, Litwhiler practically cleared the bench. Twenty Seminoles saw action.
