Wayne Vincent helped dedicate Florida State's lighted field by striking out 18 Monday night, but Georgia's Bulldogs defeated the frustrated Seminoles 2-1.

The loss was FSU's second of the day as Auburn administered a 12-7 thrashing in an afternoon game. The Seminoles had a 3-0 record going into the Auburn contest.

A crowd, perhaps a bit in excess of 2,000, turned out for the first ever varsity game under the new lights.

Three more games were scheduled today as FSU's Invitational Tournament continues. The Seminoles were due to be involved in two, playing Springfield at 3 and Auburn at 7:30. In a morning game, Georgia was to meet Auburn at 11.

Tomorrow Auburn meets Springfield at 11, FSU plays Springfield at 3 and FSU tangles with Virginia Tech at 7:30. Georgia leaves after today's game, and goes to Gainesville to play the Gators Wednesday and Thursday, while Auburn departs after its morning game Wednesday.

LaDon Boyd will be on the mound for the Seminoles this afternoon, Linwood Garrett tonight.

The pony, given away in conjunction with the dedication, was won by Roy Krause of 127 Lipona Road.

Vincent gave up just one earned run last night. A throwing error by third baseman Dick Gold in the fourth inning gave the Bulldogs their first run of the game.

Georgia added the deciding run in the eighth when it got to the little southpaw hurler for three of its seven hits.

After an inning opening strikeout, Bob Etter, the left fielder who starred on the football team as a place-kicker, slapped a triple to right-center fence. Kit Bradshaw followed with a sharp single to left, scoring Etter.

Tom Grey tried to keep the Bulldogs going, rapping a single to center, but Vincent ended the inning by striking out catcher Bob Strickland for the third straight time and getting first baseman Woody Chastain to pop to left.

Florida State made its first serious bid in the seventh inning.

Dean Duchak led off the inning with a base on balls. Ken Spooner ran for him. Gold dumped a bunt down the third-base line to sacrifice Spooner

to second, and Lance Hitchcock followed with another base on balls.

Bob Canty was called on by Coach Fred Hatfield to hit for shortstop Jeff Hogan. Canty forced Hitchcock at second with a grounder.

Marv Stringfellow came to the plate to hit for catcher Mike English. On the first pitch, Canty broke to second. When the catcher fired down Spooner started home. Georgia, however, was ready. Shortstop Lamar Lewis took the catcher's throw and fired it right back home to cut down Spooner and end the threat.

FSU got its lone run in the eighth on a balk. Stringfellow, who stayed in the game at first base, led off with a crack and Vincent banged a shot to right, FSU's third hit off Georgia starter Charles Leonard. Stringfellow went to third.
