The second baseman had not been held hitless since the Seminoles met Southern Illinois 'on March 28, which coincidently was the team's last loss.

St. Leo out-hit the Seminoles five to four, but four Monarch errors and erratic pitching cost them the game.

The Seminoles jumped on top in the second inning without benefit of a hit.

Mike Easom and Dick Nichols walked to open the frame, and Mike English grounded to third. Monarch third baseman Mark Monnerat stepped on the bag to force Easom, but threw wildly to first.

Nichels sped home on the throw, and when first baseman

Fred Cambria threw wildly back to the plate, English scored.

Dave Moates got the Seminoles' first hit in the third. After stealing second and third, he scored on Jeff Hogan's infield grounder.

A single by Hogan and three walks gave the Seminoles another run in the fifth inning for a 4-0 cusion.

Cambria cut that margin in half with a two-run double in the sixth, however.

Gene Ammann, who went the distance to pick up his eighth win, had hit a Monarch batter and given up a single preceeding Cmbria's slicing liner down the right field line. Cambria was thrown out at third when he tried to stretch his hit into a triple.

In the seventh, Gold was safe on an error, and Easom followed with his ninth home run of the season, 350 feet over the right-center field wall.

Ammann struggled through the middle innings of the game for the Tribe but, other than the seventh, he was never in serious trouble. He finished the night with 11 strikouts and three walks.

Gold went hitless in two official trips to the plate, flying 1 out to center and getting on by the error. He also walked i and was hit by a pitch.

Although there is no official f record of it, his streak is v considered to be the longest r in Florida State history.
