

Miami blasted Florida State lefthander Robin Flake for two home runs in a five-run fifth inning and took a 7-4 baseball decision here Saturday afternoon that evened the teams' season series at 2-2.

Flake fell victim to his own undoing as he gave up three walks and the two gopher balls in the big Hurricane inning.

After the Seminoles gave the senior from College Park, Ga., a three-run cushion in the fourth, the roof fell in.

Miami second baseman Ben Castillo greeted Flake with a home run to make it 3-10. After pitcher Terry Brown flied out to center, Flake couldn't find the plate and walked the next three men to load the bases.

Clean-up batter Pat Barrett flied to center to send the second run home, then catcher Al Volpe tagged a Flake delivery 400-feet over the centerfield fence for a 5-3 Miami lead.

The Seminoles, plagued by a lack of clutch hitting and

several mental errors, could never catch up even though they had runners on in each of

the last four innings.

In the sixth, third baseman Ron Cash, who collected three hits in the game, was safe at second on a single and an error. After Cash went to third on a wild pitch, Ken Doria drew a walk.

Dan Roatche bounced back to the mound, but pitcher Terry Brown couldn't make up his mind whether to throw to the plate or second. When he finally threw to second, Joel Green dropped the ball, Cash had scored, and all hands were safe.

The Seminoles were unable to take advantage of the extra life, however, as Greg Gromek bounced into a force at third and Larry Cocks popped up to end the inning.

The seventh brought another opportunity, but the Seminoles again failed to come up with the necessary punch.

A double by Mike Leber, an infield single by Dave Nichols and a wild pitch put runners at second and third with one out.

Cash bounced to short, but Leber was thrown out in a rundown between third and home. Saferight grounded to short; Green bobbled the ball, but recovered in time and threw the Tribe catcher out by a couple of steps at first ending the inning.

Miami meanwhile was checked effectively by relief pitchers Don Harbaugh and Marty Rice until the ninth.

In the final frame, the Hurricanes jumped on an opportunity for some insurance runs, scored two and had their 7-4 win.

The loss left the Seminoles with a 24-7 record. The Tribe now tries to regroup for a tough two-game series against Auburn Monday night and Tuesday at Seminole Field.

After that FSU takes to the road for a game at Valdosta State Wednesday, three games at Clemson Saturday and Sunday and a doubleheader at Georgia a week from tomorrow.

Following the Auburn series, the Seminoles' next home appearance will be when red hot South Alabama comes to town April 24-25.
