

# UM's Jakubowski baffles Tribe 6-1

Miami pitcher Stan Jakubowski has been there before, and after his performance against Florida State Wednesday night at Seminole Field it's obvious he wants to try it again.

The senior righthander tossed a four-hitter at the second-ranked Seminoles as the Hurricanes walked away with a 6-1 victory that could only enhance their chance at a fourth NCAA tournament bid in five years.

And Jakubowski, the winningest pitcher in Miami history and a key factor in three NCAA offers since 1973, proved that he is no stranger to the late-season pressure.

Florida State, now 37-11, was scheduled to host the fourth-ranked Hurricanes again today in a day-night doubleheader with the first game beginning at 3:30 and the nightcap set for 7:30.

The first game of the twin bill is "senior citizen's day" and all senior citizens over 60 years of age will be admitted for 50 cents.

Miami's new-found ace, righthander Gavin Long, who leads the southeast with a 14-0 record and a 1.77 earned run average was tabbed as the first game starter against FSU righty Larry Jones, 7-2. Chris Lynch will pitch the nightcap for Coach Ron Fraser's crew against lefthander Bob Mayer, 6-0.

Long, a junior college transfer from Daly, Calif., and the terror among southeastern Independents this season, was originally scheduled to go last night but was held out of the rotation an extra day because of a 13-inning stint in his last outing.

With NCAA bids due out no later than Monday and several teams still in contention, the Hurricanes did themselves a huge favor by improving their record to 39-12 and more importantly tying the season's series with the Seminoles at 1-1.

Jakubowski, who won the 41st game of his college career and his ninth of the season against four losses, had little trouble in disposing with the Seminoles on a perfect night for baseball.

Given a four-run cushion when Miami exploded for four runs in the sixth inning off starter and loser Craig Eaton, Jakubowski allowed only one baserunner the rest of the way.

The Seminoles' only run of the night came in the fifth inning on a sacrifice fly by Chip Bifano that brought home first baseman Joe Hicks. From that point, the big righthander retired 14 of the last 15 batters he faced.

Eaton's problems began in the top of the fifth when the visitors loaded the bases with nobody out. The senior, who dropped to 4-4 with the loss, managed to get out of the jam, however, allowing only one run to cross. That on a sacrifice fly by Paul Hammonds.

His magic touch didn't last long, however, as Miami went to work again in the sixth.

After a leadoff single by Howie Shapiro, third baseman Billy Malpas sent a booming triple to deep left-center to give the 'Canes a 2-1 lead.

When Pat Callahan singled home Malpas and Randy Guerra drilled a line drive home run over the rightfield fence, FSU Coach Woody Woodward went to his bullpen for Jackie Smith.

Smith pitched a strong three innings,

allowing only an unearned run in the eighth before Brooks Carey came on to finish up in the ninth.

It was all too little, too late, however, as the Hurricane lead turned out to be as safe as money in the bank.
